Hale Area Voters OK \$135,000 Proposition

In a special election Friday, Hale Area School voters approved bonding the district for \$135,000 to finance construction of a new elementary building and remodeling of the present elementary building for high school use. Bonds are to be retired in 10 years and Hale Area School District has no bonded indebtedness at the present time. With a total of 455 taxpayers going to the polls, the bonding proposition won by a 263 to 190 margin. The district includes the Townships of Plainfield, Reno and part of Grant in Iosco County, plus Hill and Logan Townships in Ogemaw County. Following the vote tally, Supt. Samuel A. Gravitt expressed great satisfaction with the district's endorsement of the board of education's proposal, which had been adopted unanimously by all seven members. "Many people worked very hard to bring about a successful conclusion to this election," said Gravitt. He said that the next step would be to obtain permission from the Michigan Finance Commission for selling bonds and then the board would approve final working drawings on the project. It is hoped that bids will be let

not later than March 1963 for possible completion of the new facilities by next fall. The program adopted Friday included construction and equipping of a six-room elementary building to house grades kindergarten through fourth. The building would also have a boiler room, teacher's supply and storage room. The building program will provide the necessary number of teaching stations and relieve crowded conditions that now exist. It will also provide adequate facilities in special areas, including instrumental and vocal music, all the physical sciences, library and reference material open to the students as well as a combined library-study area. Warren Holmes, Incorporated, Lansing, is architect for the project.

Recover Body of Fisherman; Victim of Bay

The body of Max Adams, 51-year-old East Tawas insurance salesman who disappeared September 27 while fishing on Tawas Bay, was found Saturday about 20 feet off shore from the Weldon Real Estate office. He had been an employee of that firm. Investigating state police officers said that the body was found only 100 yards from the point where Adams had set out on his fishing trip. It is believed that his boat overturned about a mile from shore. Adams borrowed 12-foot aluminum boat was found overturned September 27 near the National Gypsum Company dock south of Tawas City, about three miles from where he had set out on his excursion. When Adams started out on his fishing trip, water of Tawas Bay had been calm. United States Coast Guard at Tawas Point said that a northeast wind kicked up waves of four to five feet and the boat probably overturned. The body was sighted Saturday by Paul Tittsworth of East Tawas and recovered by state police officers. Assisting in the investigation was Coroner E. John Moffatt.

District Health Staff to Start Immunization

On Monday, October 15, Dr. E. A. Hasty and the nursing staff of district health department No. 2 will start an immunization program at Tawas Area Schools. It is recommended by the Michigan Department of Health that all beginners in school shall be immunized against tetanus, diphtheria, whooping cough, small pox and poliomyelitis. It is further recommended that all fifth graders, the 10-year-old group, should have booster doses for diphtheria and tetanus and be revaccinated for small pox. All 10th graders, the 15-year-old group, should have booster doses for diphtheria and tetanus and revaccination for small pox. Poliomyelitis shots will be given if requested and the school records show they are needed. Permit slips have been sent home to parents of all students in above mentioned grades and should be signed by the parents and returned to school by Monday.

Highway Department Explains I-75 Routing

In a letter to the Tawas City Businessmen's Association, Robert S. Boatman, director of the Michigan Highway Department's planning commission, said that it would be inadvisable to revise the tentative location of I-75 as outlined in a recent letter written by President Vernon Pugh. "As you are undoubtedly aware, the I-75 freeway has been constructed from south of Grayling north to the Mackinac Bridge and from the vicinity of Kawkawlin south to Flint. "This, in effect, establishes the general termini for the north and south ends of the section of I-75 still to be constructed between Kawkawlin and Grayling," stated Boatman. The highway official said that the major function of I-75 is to serve traffic moving between the Detroit metropolitan area, Flint, Saginaw, Bay City, the northeastern part of the Lower Peninsula and the Upper Peninsula. "The north section of the freeway was constructed near the center of the Lower Peninsula to perform this function and to provide the greatest over-all state-wide service while remaining within the limits of our allocated interstate mileage," he stated. Boatman said that US-10 serves heavy traffic between Bay City and Midland and also provides an interim routing for traffic which will eventually utilize the new I-75 north of Bay City. "We assure you that the selection of I-75 location does not preclude the possibility nor feasibility of establishing a freeway facility along the major portion of the US-23 axis. "The future need for such a facility was set forth in our 1960-1980 state trunkline needs study. The exact date when such a proposal may be incorporated into a construction program will depend upon such variables as future traffic volumes, availability of finance and the urgency of this need as compared with other trunkline needs throughout the state," said Boatman.

Oscoda Team Wins AuSable Canoe Race

Ralph Sawyer, 25, and Ronald Hohman, 22, of Oscoda won top prize money of \$1,200 in the 15th annual running of the AuSable River Valley Canoe Marathon held last Saturday and Sunday. The Oscoda team completed the 240-mile run from Grayling to Oscoda in 15 hours, 25 minutes and 17 seconds, coming in 17 minutes, eight seconds ahead of the second place team of Gerald Lauwers of Sand Lake and Stanley Hall of AuSable. Winners had held an 11-minute edge Saturday afternoon when the first 80-mile leg was completed at Mio and picked up an additional six minutes between that point and Oscoda when the race resumed Sunday. With Lauwers and Hall earning \$600 for their second place efforts, \$300 in cash went to Irvin Peterson and Eugene Jensen, both of Minneapolis, Minnesota, who completed the course in 15 hours, 53 minutes and 52 seconds. Sawyer and Hohman practically sewed up the race 45 minutes out of Grayling and the marathon's most dramatic moment came when Steve Kolonich and his 16-year-old son, Kenneth, of Tawas crossed the Oscoda finish line in a dead heat with Peterson and Jensen. Actual winners of the third and fourth place positions were not known until a few minutes later when official timers ruled that the Kolonichs had a total elapsed time on the river of 16 hours, 52 seconds, seven minutes behind their opponents. Others sharing in the \$3,350 prize list were William Staples of St. Johns and Tom Gildersleeve, Oscoda, fifth place; Jack and Bruce Kent, Atlanta, sixth; Norman Brown of Greenville and Richard Whitney, Belding, seventh place; Charles Crellin, Mt. Clemens, and Blaine Brown, Roseville, eighth place. A total of 23 teams were sent on their way from Grayling Saturday morning by Carole VanValin of Roscommon, Miss Michigan for 1962, who acted as the official starter. Only one local team entered was Kenneth B. Brown of Oscoda and Larry Clute of Tawas City. After being disqualified for the post position in a pole race Friday at Lake Margrethe, Sawyer and Hohman worked their way past 14 other canoes only a few miles below Grayling. The Oscoda team never had a real threat after that. At several high vantage points along the river, principally at Largo Springs and Lumbermen's Monument, the two leading teams could be seen battling for position far below, but the precision strokes of Sawyer, a veteran of many marathons, and his partner gave them a substantial lead at all portages. This is the first year that Sawyer, who now is a four-time winner of the AuSable marathon, has raced with Hohman. They have won seven races in Michigan this summer. Sawyer and Peterson teamed up to win the three-day international canoe championship held at Shawinigan Falls, Quebec, Canada, over the Labor Day week-end. Drizzly weather prevailed throughout most of the event, although the sun broke through dark clouds on several occasions Sunday. Several thousand spectators, most of whom followed the en-

Library Board Lone Bidder on Alabaster Unit

A meeting is to be held today (Wednesday) concerning a proposal of the Iosco-Arenac Regional Library for purchase of the Alabaster school unit, retired from service September 28. At a bid opening held Monday night by the Tawas Area Board of Education, the library board offered \$17,500 for the old building. There were no other bidders. To be discussed today is the library board's proposal to pay off this amount over a period of 10 years. Three bids were received on the one-half acre of property at the old Watts school. Richard L. Matchure of Mt. Morris was successful with his bid of \$276. Other bids were received from Vincent J. Jesudowick, Detroit, and Beatrice Lane, Tawas City. Two bids were received on the house owned by the school district at Alabaster. Wilfred Hughes' bid of \$550 was accepted. Other bid was received from Jennie A. Johnson. No land is included with the house. In other business, the board authorized a group of scouts from Okemos Council to use the high school and elementary building gymnasiums for sleeping purposes on January 26-27. The scouts are coming for an outing at Silver Valley.

Supervisors Eye Final County Budget for 1963

October session of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors opened Monday morning. Principal work of this session will be to approve Iosco's 1963 operating budget, tentatively set at \$316,057.89 last April. With anticipated fees of \$25,000 from county offices, this would leave \$291,057.89 to be raised by taxation. Chairman Glenn Long reported Monday that many additional requests for money had been received since April. He believed, however, that the board of supervisors would hold the line on any further spending. This 1963 budget represents the highest in county history. During the present fiscal year, county government is operating on a budget of \$284,182.65. Raised by taxation was \$259,182.65.

Former Principal Promoted by GM

Appointment of George E. Freer as an assistant public relations regional manager in General Motors' New York office was announced this week by Anthony DeLorenzo, vice president in charge of public relations. Freer, one-time principal of Tawas City High School, had been a public relations staff assistant in Detroit since April 1960. He joined General Motors in 1953 as supervisor of training and education at the Detroit Transmission Division. In 1957, he moved to the educational relations section of the public relations staff. Two years later, he was named staff assistant for GM Management Clubs, an organization of executives in 34 cities. In addition to serving as high school principal here in 1951-52, Freer had taught school at Grayling. Born in Alcona County, he received a bachelor of arts degree in economics and political science from Central Michigan University in 1949. He also holds a master of arts degree in school administration from the University of Michigan. During World War II, he served in the European theater of operations with the United States Army's 65th Infantry Division.

Probate Court to Appoint Special Board

Steps were taken Tuesday for appointment of a special board to review a proposed assessment district for financing construction of a Tawas Lake dam. This action was taken by the Iosco Board of Supervisors, which directed Drain Commissioner Bert Stickney to present the proposed special assessment district to Iosco Probate Court. According to law, Judge H. Read Smith would appoint members of the board of review and a hearing would be held to air any objections from property owners involved. A meeting date of this board is to be set and all property owners will be notified. This move followed a resolution of the board last month which authorized the drain commissioner to establish such a district. This action had been requested by a group calling itself the Tawas Lake Property Owners Association. It was pointed out yesterday that an amendment had been added to last month's resolution of the supervisors prior to its passage. Supervisor L. S. Little said that the resolution was worded so as to protect Iosco County from any liability caused by the proposed dam. It was also stated yesterday that the new law under which the proposed dam would be constructed provides that all costs of construction, maintenance and any damages resulting therefrom would be assessed against the special tax district. Commissioner Stickney reported that cost of the proposed dam, plus interest on bonds for five years, would be \$30,000. Assessments to property owners would be made on a graduated scale, those closest to the lake paying more than the two back tiers of lots. Property on the north and west sides of the lake would also be assessed, but only on the tier of government lots fronting the lake. Edward Burgeson, a north side property owner, filed protest against the board's action.

The girls will circle the field riding in open automobiles and band members will furnish an honor guard for ceremonies which will take place in front of the bleachers. 
themums and stephanotis made up her bouquet.



Fire Prevention is Today's Challenge, Reminds Board of Fire Underwriters

Around the calendar and around the clock, fire strikes an average of over 1,000 American homes every day. Some are serious, some are inconsequential. But every fire means a loss. Fires take lives, too. Last year, there were 11,700 fire fatalities in

Last year fire losses totaled \$1,200,042,340, the greatest dollar loss in history and an increase of 9.1 percent over the preceding year. It was the fifth year in a row in which losses exceeded the billion dollar mark.

The efforts of every citizen in the nation are needed in the drive for fire safety.

Fire safety week is October 7 to 13. Practice good safety rules the year around, reminds NBFU.
