## Circuit Court Jury Awards Judgment

A \$26,000 judgment in favor of a Mt. Clemens man was entered Friday by an Iosco County Circuit Court jury. This was the largest amount ever awarded to one plaintiff in the local court.

George V. Bennett, plaintiff, had asked for a judgment of \$200,000, plus court costs and attorney fees, against Earl R. Colbath and Maurice Colbath, co-owners of Colbath Fisheries at AuSable.

Bennett was a passenger on a motorcycle operated by Leo Bru-man which was involved in a collision with a rack truck driven by Earl R. Colbath. The accident occurred at Oscoda May 10, 1961.

The Mt. Clemens man claimed that Colbath crossed the centerline and cut in front of the motorcycle without warning.

According to testimony, Bennett's injuries were as follows: Basilar skull fracture, dislocation and fracture of cervical-thoracic vertebrae, compression of spinal cord, fracture of right shoulder, partial paralysis of the extremities and complete paralysis of the left side of his body.

Bennett, a sawmill hand at the time of the accident, claimed past medical and hospital bills of \$5,000, future medical hospital bills of \$5,000, past and future loss of earnings of \$100,000, past, present and future pain and suffering of \$89,000.

Judge Allan C. Miller dismissed Ellen S. Colbath as a party defendant in the cause.

## Council Approves Initial Action on Spec. Tax District

A three-man board has been appointed by Mayor George Tuttle to prepare a special assessment district for construction of a proposed sanitary sewer on Beach and Cedar Streets in the First Ward.

At a joint meeting of the council and water board Monday night, only one objection was heard to the proposed project. There are 14 property owners involved.

The city council then unanimously adopted a resolution authorizing the mayor and City Attorney Jerry Cotter to take the next step in legal proceedings toward establishment of the district.

Mayor Tuttle appointed Supervisor Clement Stephan, City Superintendent Reginald Bublitz and Carl Schaaft, water board member, as the special assessment board. This board is to meet Thursday night to prepare a tax roll for the special district.

Estimated cost of the project is \$2,450. This would mean that the 14 property owners involved would be assessed approximately \$175 each as his share of the total cost.

The board of special assessors will decide what benefit each property owner derives from the sanitary sewer and then assess the cost.

After receiving certification on individual property assessments, the city council would then decide on a date for another hearing to determine if there are any objections. At that time, if the council agrees with the special board, the assessment district would be confirmed.

Cotter said that the council would determine how to collect the property assessments. He said that tax payments could be spread over a period of 10 annual installments and at an interest rate of not more than six percent. Or, the property owners could pay the assessment in full.

It is hoped that the legal steps necessary in establishing such a district will allow enough time for completion of the sewer project this fall.

This is Tawas City's first special assessment district. Previous construction on sewer extensions had been financed through "gentlemen's agreements" between property owners and the city.

**Whittemore Housewife Faces Homicide Charge**

A warrant was issued Tuesday charging Mrs. Katherine Gay, 48-year-old Whittemore housewife, with negligent homicide in the September 22 auto death of Mrs. Marion Dumas.

Mrs. Dumas, mother of three small children, was a passenger in an auto driven by Mrs. Gay which crashed into the rear of a parked semi-trailer truck on M-65 in Whittemore. Mrs. Dumas was dead on arrival at Tolfree Memorial Hospital, West Branch.

According to Prosecuting Attorney William McCready, who authorized the warrant, the driver, if convicted, could be subject to a maximum prison sentence of two years and a fine of not more than \$2,000.

Mrs. Gay had been released from the hospital about 10 days ago after being treated for injuries received in the crash.

According to investigating officers at the crash scene Mrs. Gay, Mrs. Dumas and two of her children, Robert and Daniel, were on their way to the Gay home when their southbound auto struck a parked truck owned by Grabow Distributing Company.

The auto was completely demolished as it plowed under the rear of the trailer.

Mrs. Dumas' death was the fourth fatality on M-65 since the first of the year.

## Prescott Man Routs Safecracker from IGA Store

The farming community of Prescott, located near the Ogemaw-Iosco County line, awoke Sunday morning to learn that a burglar had attempted to crack a safe at the local IGA Store owned by Charles Chipps.

Harry Eyrner, who lives in a house trailer near the store, awoke about 5 o'clock when he heard a muffled explosion. Upon investigation, he saw someone in the store building and notified Walter Hoover, village marshal.

Investigating state police officers from West Branch, along with Detective LeRoy McCluer of the East Tawas post, believe that Hoover's action caused the burglar to leave before being able to finish work of opening the safe.

The safe door was partially off its hinges and could have been pried off. Windows in the building were not damaged by the blast. The burglar had made his entry into the building by forcing open a rear door.

**Iosco Gets Check from Forest Receipts**

Michigan leads north central states in national forest receipts, Louis A. Pommerening, forest supervisor of the Lower Michigan National Forest, announced recently.

Checks totaling \$456,845.31 were mailed to the nine states of the region. They represent 25 percent of the region's national forests annual income, from timber sales and special permit fees during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1962.

Each state distributes this annual dividend among its counties that contain national forest land. The county share, determined by the area of national forest land, is spent on county roads and schools.

With 102,395 acres of national forest, Iosco County receives \$8,594.11.

**Bloodmobile Here Next Wednesday**

Louis C. Awalt and Mrs. George Tuttle, co-chairmen of the Iosco Blood Bank, remind all Iosco citizens of the fall bloodmobile visit next week.

Bloodmobile centers are to be located at both East Tawas and Oscoda. Donors may visit either center between the hours of 2:00 p. m. and 8:00 p. m. Tuesday, October 30, at the Oscoda Community Building, or Wednesday, October 31, at St. Joseph's Social Center, East Tawas.

Based on the 520 pints actually used between July 1, 1961, and June 30, 1962, a quota of 350 pints is the goal for this bloodmobile visit.

"The blood bank program touches a great many people—it could be you or a member of your family who needs blood and quickly," states Awalt.

"Within the past year, extensive needs totaling 48 pints were met for two Iosco County people whose requirement quotas were great within a short span of time. They were located in out-of-town hospitals and obtaining local donors would have been impossible. At \$25 a pint, a nominal charge these days, it would have cost the two families \$1,200 to purchase the needed blood, with costs of administration added to that figure.

"Under the blood bank program, no charge is ever made for blood. Charges for administration are made by the hospital, of course," stated Awalt.

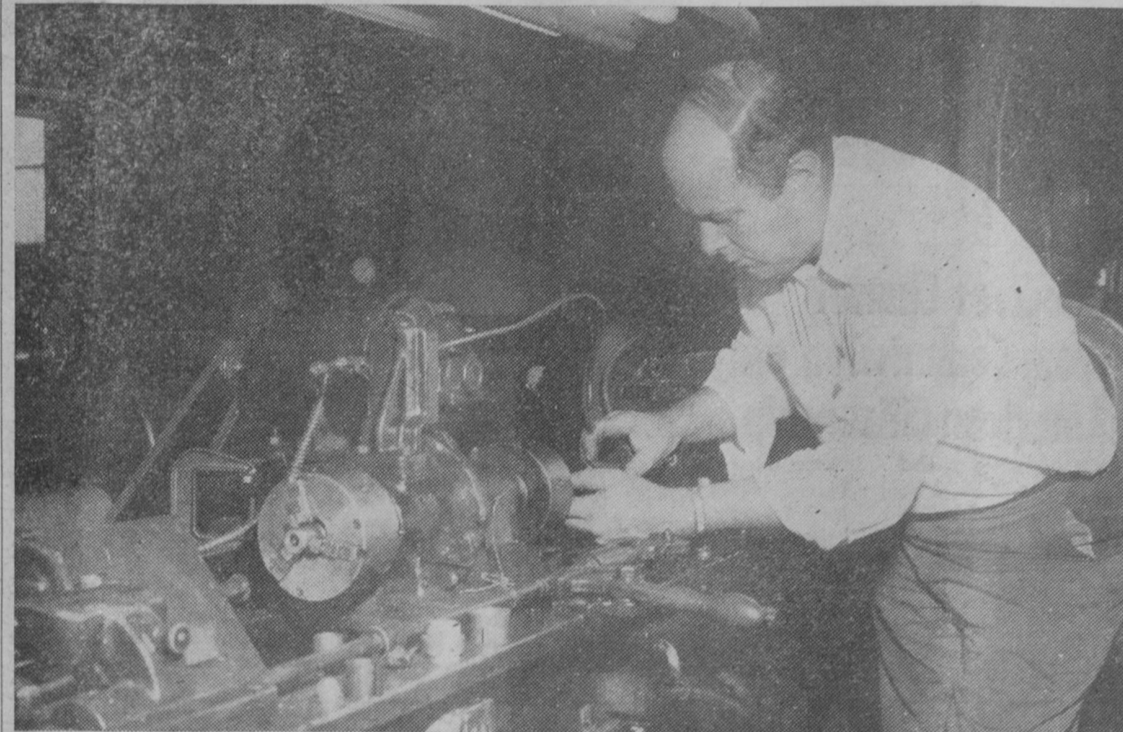

## Local Gunsmith Shop Busy Manufacturing Rifle Barrels

One of the few gunsmith shops, if not the only one in Michigan, equipped to manufacture rifle barrels is located at East Tawas. Owner of this unique local establishment is Esmond Smith, 42, Wurtsmith Air Force Base for several years, with a general gunsmith sideline here. Smith decided to enlarge his operation and devote full time to gunsmithing.

He acquired quarters on Wilkinson Street to house three large pieces of equipment—a rifling lathe, deep hole drill and deep hole reamer, along with other smaller metal lathes, grinders and equipment of the trade.

At present, his shop is turning out about 500 re-bored rifle barrels a year, along with 100 new barrels. Much of the re-boring work is for converting military firearms to sporting use. General repair work and scope sight mounting also constitutes much of his work.

Although the manufacture of barrels for sporting firearms accounts for much of his business, Smith also has a contract for the manufacture of industrial barrels. These barrels are mounted in guns which are used to fire projectiles into blast furnaces, thereby dislodging slag deposits.

The large, semi-automatic rifling lathe is the "heart" of his gunshop. Starting with bar stock of chrome alloy steel, spiral rifling can be grooved in approximately five hours. This is an exacting process and the lathe is equipped to cut anything from four to 16 grooves and from one right-hand twist in six inches to a straight broach.

Smith got his start in the business when only 17 years old and learned much of the trade as an employee of a Toledo, Ohio, gun company. During World War II, he served with a radar maintenance unit in England.

Late summer and early fall is Smith's busiest time of the year. Much of his work at this time is devoted to repairing sporting firearms brought in by hunters from various parts of the state.

participation of many donors—the people who volunteer to give blood. "The more who help the better," states Mrs. Tuttle. "People feel better themselves when they help, while a large number of donors makes meeting the quota a certainty."

For those who ask, "Can I spare this pint of blood?" The answer is "yes." This is but one of the 12 or 13 pints of blood in the body. The liquid part of the blood is replaced almost immediately; the cells and minerals in about 10 days.

"Giving blood is easy and painless," said Awalt. "Proof of this experience brings nine out of 10 donors back another time. Blood can be given as many as five times a year."

Another question is about eating. Do eat the regular meal before you give blood, just avoid making it a heavy, fatty meal. It is better to eat rather than skip a meal.

Mrs. Harold Grise, telephone Forest 2-2582, will arrange an appointment for a specific time. However, anyone may give blood at any time the center is open.

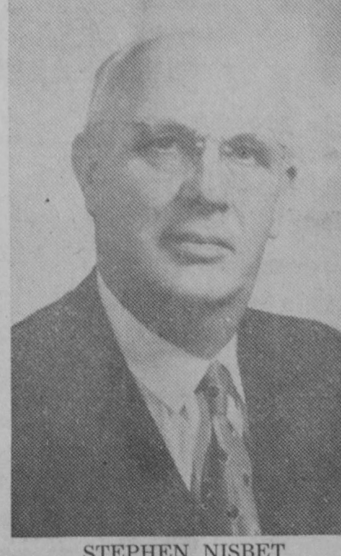
Nisbet, 66, is in Gerber Memorial Hospital. He was stricken at his Fremont Lake cottage about 3:00 p. m. Sunday.

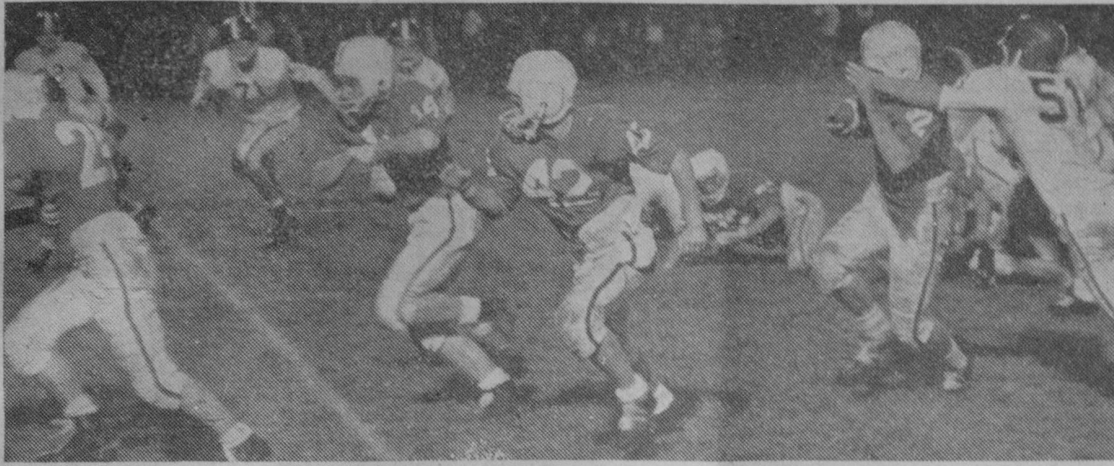

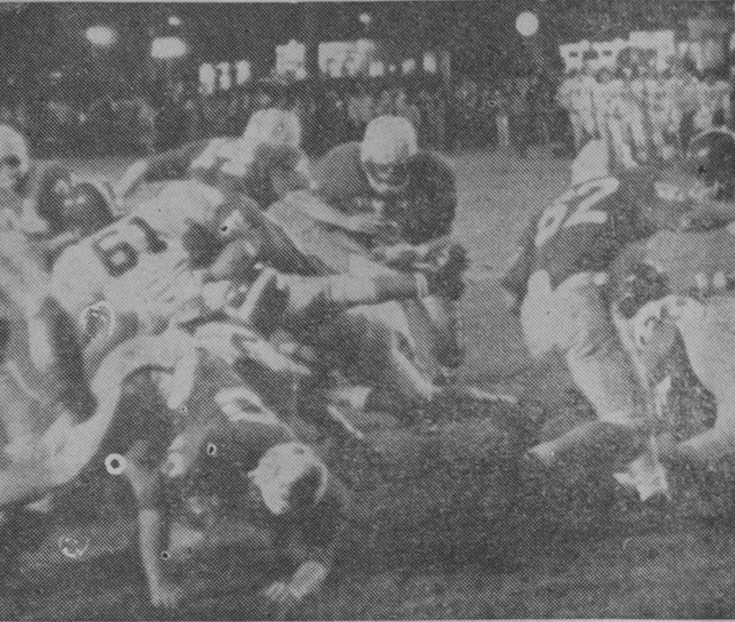
