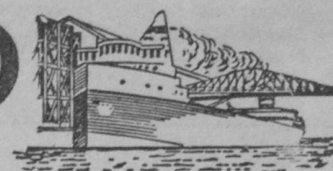

Doors Close at Alabaster Unit

There is nothing quite so lonely as an empty school building. It was that way Friday at the Alabaster unit where fifth and sixth grade youngsters walked through open doors, boarded buses and departed for classrooms in the Tawas.

If the walls of the old school building could only speak they would bring back many memories of the Alabaster community. The two-story brick structure had been opened for occupancy in January 1924 and, today, has outlived its usefulness as a school.

Thirty-eight years is not generally considered a "lifetime" for a well constructed public building. An expenditure of approximately \$50,000 would have brought the structure up to present-day requirements for school use.

But, because of the cost of transporting students and other factors, it was decided to abandon the building.

Among those present for the final day of classes at Alabaster was Miss Clara Bolen, elementary supervisor of Tawas Area Schools. She was a grade teacher in the six-room building when it opened for occupancy shortly after the Christmas holiday in 1924.

Miss Bolen recalled that the building was filled to capacity when it first opened and boasted 12 grades under Superintendent Gibson. This was before the aerial tramway was constructed at United States Gypsum Company and during the days when large numbers of men were employed in the plaster mill.

Through the years, Alabaster High School was noted as being one of the class D powers in athletic competition. The school produced many championship baseball and basketball teams and a girls' basketball team coached by Miss Bolen was undefeated.

The last class to graduate at Alabaster was in June of 1944 and a member of the present-day

Tawas Area Board of Education, Leonard Sarki, was a member of that class. Others were Marilyn Tate, Edward Wellna, Patricia Bolen, Illa Hughes and Thomas Fry. John B. Youngs was the last superintendent.

The school continued as a grade unit operated by the Alabaster Township School District until reorganization of the Tawas Area School District in 1952. It served as a junior high school for several years and later was utilized by fifth and sixth grades.

Miss Bolen, who spent most of her teaching career there, and Supt. Reynold Mick were the last persons to eat lunch in the school kitchen.

Before custodians made an inspection of the building and closed its doors for the last time, Miss Bolen gathered up several of the athletic trophies won by Alabaster teams. They are now on (See SCHOOL, page 12.)

Council Expects Appeal on Building Application

Possible appeal of the Tawas City Planning Commission's denial of a building application to Ernest Mueller appeared certain following a meeting of the city council Monday night.

Mueller appeared before the council and requested information as to the next step in such proceedings. He was told that the council acts as a board of appeals and that a formal declaration would have to be submitted.

The First Ward property owner's application for an addition to his former cement block plant on Fifth Avenue had been denied by the planning commission on grounds that it did not conform with zoning regulations of a residential district.

Under the ordinance passed in 1947, present nonconforming use of the property could be continued but additional construction on buildings would not be allowed.

Mueller told the council that he wished to establish an export business in the building and the proposed addition would be used as a showroom.

He said that sales tax reports had been filed every month, even though his block plant has not

been operating, and that he was now trying to re-establish his business. He also indicated that he has plans for constructing residential dwellings on six of his lots in that area.

Mueller felt that he should have some consideration for continuing in business, inasmuch as his cement block plant had furnished employment to 15 or 20 persons at one time. He indicated his new export business, in time, could employ about the same number of persons.

He said there was no need to retain his manufacturing equipment any longer as competition in this field was too great. Equipment in the plant was once valued at \$84,000 and, although he had sustained a considerable loss when the plant closed, Mueller said he had spent 2½ years planning his new venture.

"We have plenty of residential building lots in the city," said Mueller. "Why not give consideration to a business that will furnish additional employment?"

Mueller said he had sustained considerable loss due to vandalism by youngsters. He said that much of the equipment had been damaged.

Tavern Owner Slugged and Robbed of \$430

Jack Tyson, owner of the Oasis Bar, located on M-65 south of Glennie, was beaten and robbed of approximately \$430 shortly after closing his tavern early Monday morning.

Tyson was treated at Tawas Hospital for severe cuts and bruises about the head. Officers stated that 42 stitches were required to close his wounds.

When reporting the incident to state police at East Tawas, Tyson said he had closed the bar about 12:20 a. m. and drove to his home. As he got out of the car, he was struck from behind.

Tyson said he could hear his two assailants talking before he lost consciousness.

Tyson's wife heard his calls for help and found him on the lawn. She drove him to Tawas where he reported to state police and

was then taken to the hospital. The money taken consisted of a roll of bills secured by a rubber band. The two men did not take his billfold which was in another pocket.

City Attorney Seeks Legal Definition

City Attorney Jerry Cotter reported to the Tawas City Council Monday night that research of the city's zoning ordinance had, as yet, failed to clarify regulations concerning construction of a nursing home in a residential district.

An application had been received at the last council meeting for construction of an 18-bed nursing home to be located west of M-55 across from Tawas Hospital. The building application had been submitted by Mrs. Edna Schalm.

According to Cotter, a nursing or rest home was not specifically named in the city zoning ordinance. Under the 1947 ordinance, a class A district allows construction of boarding houses, hospitals and clinics while wording of the class B district allows construction of a boarding home for retired persons.

Cotter is to check terminology of nursing or rest homes under state laws and report his findings back to the council for action.

In other business, the council accepted the low bid of Barkman Outfitting for purchase of an oil furnace to heat the city library located in the Buch Building. Cost of the furnace and installation was \$315.

Vernon Pugh, representing the Tawas Knochle League, was present and asked if the city had a recreation fund to finance cost of constructing dugouts at the league's diamond west of the Tawas City elementary unit.

Pugh and others interested are to contact local sources for contribution of concrete blocks to be used in the construction of dugouts.

It was stated that work was to start this week-end on constructing new dugouts at East Tawas. Work will be accomplished by volunteers and anyone interested in assisting the junior baseball program should contact Pugh or other league officers.

Attorney Cotter presented a resolution setting up machinery for a proposed special assessment district to construct a sanitary sewer from Beech to Cedar Streets in the First Ward.

This is the first time that petitions have been received here for creating a special assessment district for financing such a project. In previous years, sewer construction had been financed by a "gentlemen's agreement" under city property owner participation.

Gun Show Had Touch of Old Frontier Days

A colorful era of American history lived again in realistic fashion Saturday and Sunday at the Tawas City Park.

The muzzle loader's gun show and demonstration drew several hundred spectators and spokesmen for the Tawas City Business-

men's Association and The Tawas Herald, sponsors, were well pleased with the interest shown by area residents and out-of-town visitors.

Featured during the show was the antique gun collection of Max Schwartz, secretary of the Wyandotte Muzzle Loader Club, and a shooting demonstration by members of the Midland Antique Gun Club.

Although several members of the Wyandotte club were unable to attend, Schwartz's vast array of firearms proved to be most interesting to those attending. The collection, valued at more than \$5,000, was arranged in historical order. It included viewers with early models of flintlock weapons, through the evolution of percussion conversions, percussion muskets, carbines of the Civil War and early breech-loading weapons.

Also displayed were handguns and accoutrements used by federal forces during the Civil War, sabers, scale model cannons and other military equipment.

William Schwartz, father of Max, also demonstrated how rifle balls were molded from hot lead.

The Midland club staged shooting demonstrations on both Saturday and Sunday. A temporary range was built along the shore of Tawas Bay under direction of Regional Bublitz, superintendent of public works.

Midland club members attending were Gerald MacInnes, Bruce Dundas, Neil Jenkins, Richard Anthony, Jack Adams and Clifford Anthony.

Dressed in buckskins patterned after the garb of early American frontiersmen, the Midlanders demonstrated their prowess with flintlock rifles of the Kentucky pattern. This type of weapon has a long and colorful history, having been in use for about 300 years.

The rifles, beautifully inlaid with brass and German silver, were made in the basement workshops of the individual Midland club members. Each weapon represented (See GUN SHOW, page 12.)

Break Ground Sunday for GL Parsonage

Ground was broken Sunday morning for the new \$33,000 parsonage of Grace Lutheran Church, East Tawas.

Following regular Sunday morning worship service, members of the Grace Lutheran congregation were joined by members of other churches in witnessing the ceremony.

The Rev. William C. Lindholm, pastor, presided at the ground breaking ceremony. Others taking part were W. D. Nunn, Ralph White, Charles Nash and Dr. H. H. Brinkman, all members of the church board.

Each of the participants turned over a spadeful of earth during the ceremony. Some 200 persons were in attendance.

The new parsonage will be constructed at 101 East Lincoln Street, directly across the street from the Federal Building and west of the church. This property was purchased by the congregation about 10 years ago and an old dwelling located on the property was demolished by 25 volunteers last week.

Contractor for the new home of the pastor and family is Edward Doak of East Tawas. He was low bidder on the project.

The new parsonage will be of tri-level construction with approximately 2,300 square feet, including the two-car garage.

It will be of modern design with living room, dining room, study, kitchen and three bedrooms. Lower level of the structure will be occupied by a family room and mechanical room.

There will be an open ceiling of exposed beams in the living room and dining room, along with a fireplace and open stairway.

Construction will be completed sometime in 1963.

Body of Flint Man Still Missing in Bay

Search continues this week for the body of Max Adams, 51, an East Tawas insurance salesman who disappeared Thursday while fishing on Tawas Bay.

Patrols from the United States Coast Guard Station on Tawas Point searched along the shoreline Monday but no trace could be found of the former Flint man.

Adams set out on a fishing excursion early Thursday morning. A coast guard spokesman said that water of Tawas Bay was calm at the time, but a northeast wind soon kicked up waves of four to five feet and Adams' boat probably overturned.

A helicopter from Wurtsmith Air Force Base was used in the search Thursday, but did not attempt to battle gale winds the following day. Also assisting in the search were patrol cars from the state police post at East Tawas.

Adams' boat was spotted by Carl Grubaugh, 1109 South Huron Drive, near the National Gypsum Company dock south of Tawas City. The 12-foot aluminum boat was about one-half mile from shore and was turned over.

Adams had borrowed the boat from Joseph Heenan of East Tawas. It was found three miles south of where he had set out on his fishing trip.

Mrs. Adams is a school teacher at Flint.

Canoe Paddles-Leaves in Autumn Spectacular

Canoe paddles and colored leaves will be waving in the breeze this week-end in Eastern and Central Michigan's "Playtime Country," according to the East Michigan Tourist Association.

The canoe paddlers will be handled by those hardy sportsmen who will tackle the mighty AuSable River in a 240-mile race from Grayling to Lake Huron on Oscoda on Saturday and Sunday, October 6-7.

The colored leaves will be at their peak blossom time throughout most of Northeastern Michigan at this same time, association officials point out, and will turn mil-

lions of acres of forestland into brilliant autumn colors.

Travelers heading into Northeastern Michigan can combine these two outstanding events. Well marked state and county roads follow the AuSable from Grayling east to Mio, the race course for Saturday. The Grayling start will be at 10:30 a. m. with estimated finish of this first leg in Mio at 4:30 p. m.

On Sunday morning, the paddlers will continue on their way starting at 7:30 a. m. Race fans and color tourists can again follow state and county roads to the finish line at Oscoda.

Expected finish time in Oscoda is 5:00 p. m.

Along the auto routes on the north and south shores of the AuSable are many bridge crossing viewing sites of the racing canoes.

The communities of Grayling, Mio, Glennie and Oscoda are all planning special festivities for visitors during the week-end.

Included will be the participation of Carole Jean Vainin of Roscommon, Miss Michigan of 1962. She will be the pole position starter for the official race on Lake Margrethe, near Grayling, to take place Friday, October 5.

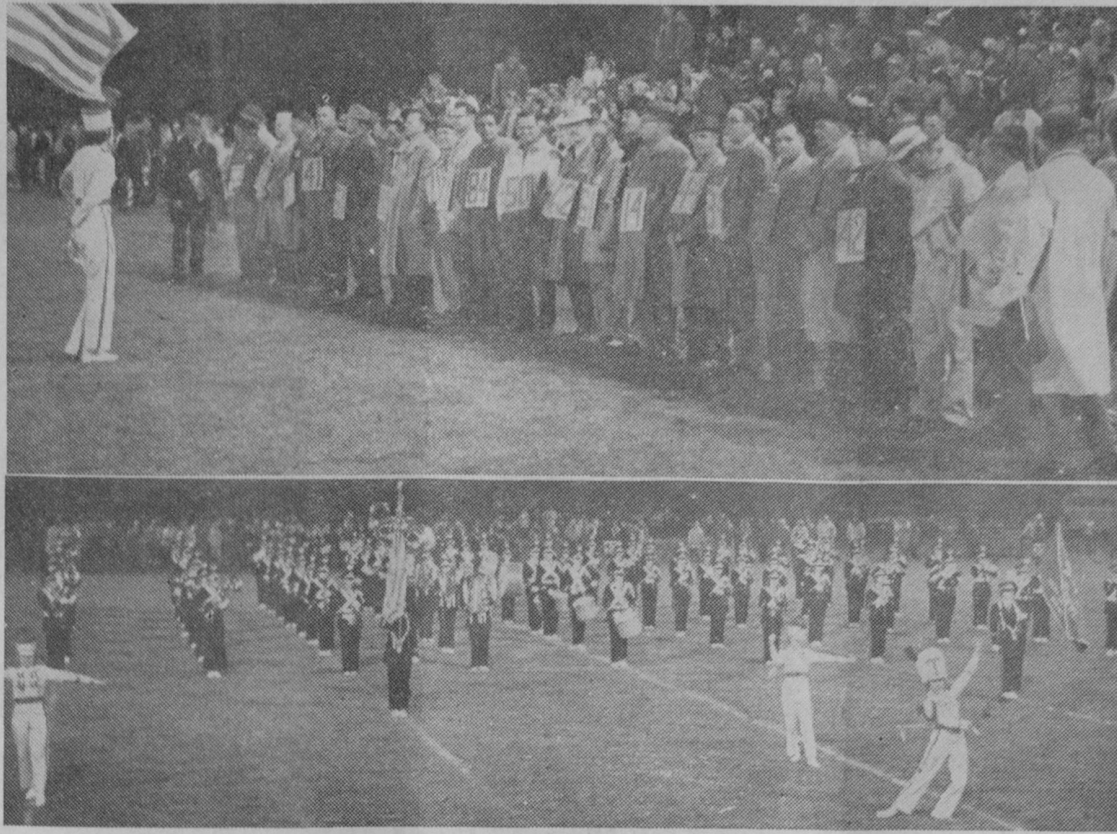

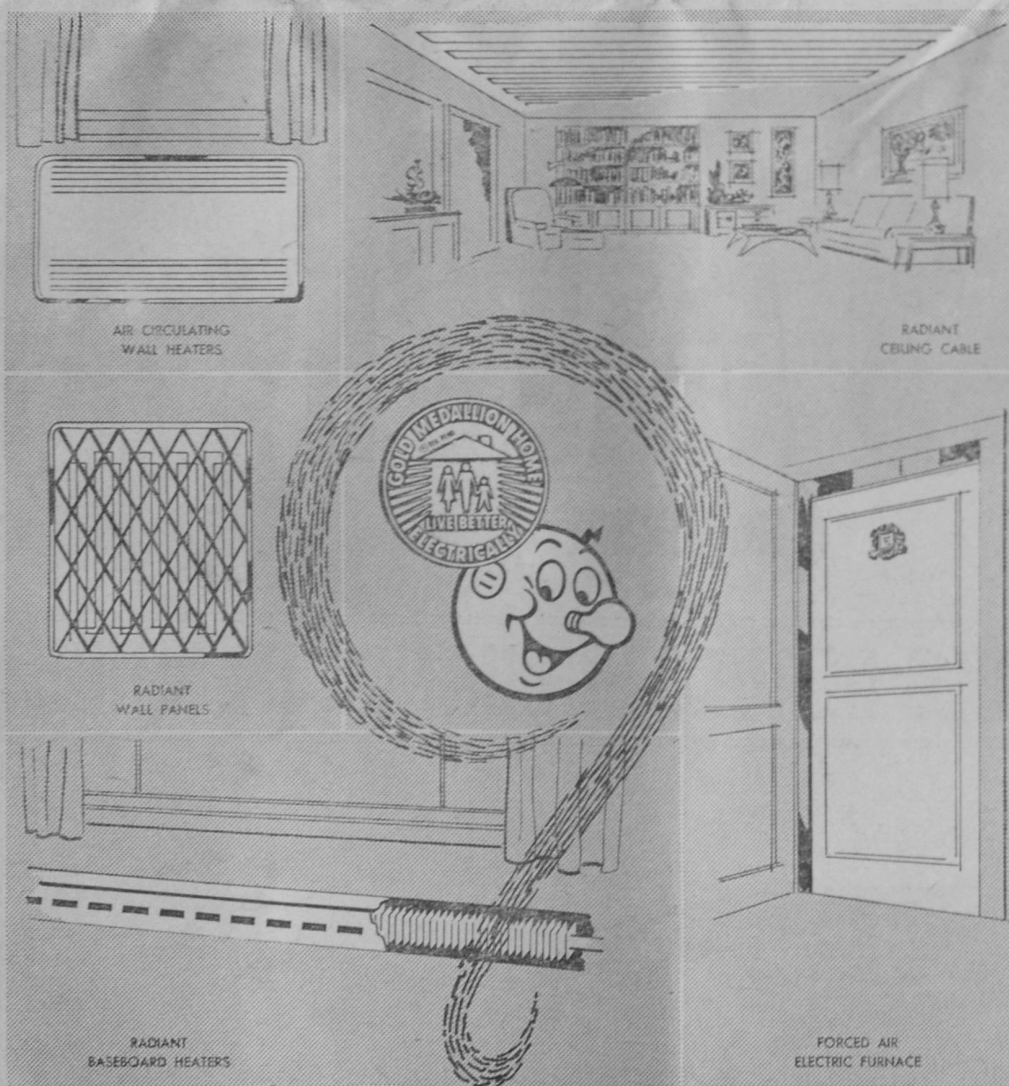
Iosco Soldier In 'Aggressor' Force of Texas Maneuver

Named NEM District Winner

Whittmore Grange has been named Northeastern Michigan district winner in the 15th annual community service contest sponsored by the Sears-Roebuck Foundation and the National Grange. This organization will be presented with a \$50 bond at the State Grange Convention, Fremont, October 17-20.

One of the group's projects, according to Mrs. Marguerite Aulerich of Whittmore, community service chairman, was blood typing and securing identification tags for 573 school children and adults. It took two evenings and 114 hours of work by members to complete this task.

Members were disturbed over the failure of the fire department to respond to a rural fire alarm and sought better identification of rural residences in fire department records. Members also cut brush and cleaned rubbish along 13 miles of roadside.

Youngsters of the Grange collected funds for UNICEF in 20 miles of travel at Halloween. The Grange entered a float in the East Tawas Centennial parade.

Grangers carried on Golden Rule projects of aiding shut-ins, serving dinners to bereaved families and extending helping hands to neighbors in need. They gave blood, attended first aid classes and helped the County Health Council. They solicited two townships for the Red Cross, sponsored a 4-H Club and a Juvenile Club by civic groups.

Considerable attention was given to civil defense, because of the proximity of Wurtsmith Air Force Base. Master of Whittmore Grange is Brian Bellville of Whittmore.

Winner in the state contest was Egypt Grange in Kent County. This Grange instigated community-sponsorship of the construction of a \$400,000 motel-type housing facility for senior citizens.

"Participation in this contest has helped the Grange become rural America's greatest force for community improvement," says Herschel D. Newsum, master of the National Grange. "Some 5,425 Granges in the past year voluntarily contributed over 5,000,000 man-hours of time and effort to planning and conducting projects which will make their communities better places in which to live. This is community service the self-help way—the American way."

Newsum added that since the contest started in 1948, Grangers have devoted over 50,000,000 man-hours to building better libraries, youth centers, health clinics, recreational areas and thousands of other facilities that contribute to a better way of life. These activities have resulted in community improvements valued at more than 1½ billion dollars.

Use Care in Filing Social Security Info

Paul M. Ellifritz, social security district manager at the Bay City Social Security office, would like to remind all employers who are required to file quarterly returns of wages on Form 941 to be sure to show the employee's name and social security number on the return exactly as it is shown on the employee's social security card.

Failure to follow these instructions may result in wages not being credited to the employee's social security account. Since the amount of retirement, disability and survivors benefits payable is based on the amount of wages posted to a worker's account, it is extremely important that his wages be properly reported.

Many employers report a recently married girl's wages under her married name when she has not changed her name on Social Security Administration's records. The proper procedure is to continue to report the employee under her maiden name until she gets a new social security card showing her married name.

Braves Defeat West Branch; Play Oscoda Friday Night

Tawas Area Braves, rolling over West Branch Friday night for their third win of the season, will go against the Oscoda Owls this week in an important Northern B Conference encounter.

Friday night's tilt against the Owls and next week's contest between Tawas and Standish-Sterling Central may well prove to be the deciding games for the NBC toga.

All three teams are undefeated, although the Owls and Central battled to a 6-6 tie two weeks ago and trail the Braves in conference standings. The Braves-Owl game Friday night will be played at Oscoda.

In Friday night's game, the Braves scored on the first play from scrimmage against the Orioles and then went on to a 50-0 victory as Coach Herb Escott substituted freely with his reserves.

Before the night was over, Tawas had piled up 390 offensive yards, 277 yards by rushing and 113 yards by passing.

This was the first time this season that the Braves tried an aerial offensive attack. Dale Harten, second string quarterback, completed four out of four tosses, one going for a touchdown, while Halfback Brian Helmer completed

ed a touchdown pass in his only attempt. Quarterback Jim Mick's one pass attempt went incomplete.

West Branch, on the other hand, tried to get through Tawas' defense with a passing game. This move failed as the Orioles completed only one pass out of 15 tries and two were intercepted.

Halfback Jim Herriman broke the game wide open on the first play from scrimmage when he went 56 yards to a touchdown. The Braves scored two more TDs before the quarter ended. Defensive Linebacker Larry Killey intercepted a West Branch pass and moved 43 yards to yardline, while Herriman swept around end for a 40-yard touchdown play.

Key blocks on Killey's return were thrown by Guard Don Evans and End Bob Smith, who each took out two West Branch defenders on the play.

The second quarter found Helmer going three yards for a touchdown. The play was set up by Helmer when he returned a punt from Tawas' 30 to the West Branch 43 and Ernie Lixey moved the ball within striking distance of his 22-yard sprint.

After Fullback Ed Collier returned the second half kickoff 30 yards, Lixey scored Tawas' fifth touchdown of the night on a 26-yard run. This play had been preceded by a 32-yard touchdown run by Mick but was nullified by a penalty.

Tawas' second touchdown of the third quarter came on a pass from Helmer to End Bob Smith, who made a fine running catch.

The final quarter found Tawas' reserves scoring two touchdowns, the first coming on a 23-yard run by Halfback Don Lear. This play was set up by a pass from Harten to Joe LaBlance. The final score came on another pass play, a 25-yarder from Harten to LaBlance.

Outstanding linemen during the night were Randy DeWyse, Bill Western and Bob Erickson, while Ends Steve Ferguson and Smith turned in key blocking.

Hale Eagles Win Again in Second Half

Hale Area Eagles pulled another game out of the fire Saturday night, scoring two touchdowns in the second half to defeat the Alpena Junior Varsity, 13-7.

After two scoreless quarters and trailing 7-0 in the half, John Heilman punched over nine yards for a touchdown in the third quarter. Barton Caverly ran the point after touchdown as the teams were tied at 7-7.

The final quarter found Caverly moving seven yards for a touchdown and the PAT was missed.

Caverly was the top ground gainer of the night, picking up 208 yards on 26 plays. Dan Ellsworth converted four passes for 50 yards.

This was the strongest offensive drive in Hale Area School history, the Eagles picking up a total of 360 yards.

Hale and Mio will tangle Saturday night at the Whittemore-Prescott Area School field. The two teams are currently tied for second place behind the Huron Shore League leader, Hillman.

Tawas Area Junior Braves racked up their third win of the season Thursday night by downing the West Branch JV, 38-6.

West Branch took a 6-0 lead in the first quarter, but Halfback Dennis Lorenz tied the score in the same quarter with a 65-yard run off tackle. Quarterback Dick Grebe ran the point after touchdown and Tawas had a 7-6 lead.

Lorenz scored the second Tawas TD on a 47-yard off tackle play and Grebe's sneak for the PAT was stopped. The Junior Braves scored two more times in the quarter, Lorenz going 70 yards on a punt return and Halfback Jim Herman going 19 yards around end. Lorenz converted the PAT.

Single touchdowns were scored in the third and fourth quarters, Lorenz going 90 yards for his fourth touchdown of the night and Harten picking up the final TD on a 24-yarder.

Owls - Panthers Keep Pace in NBC Race

Standish-Sterling Central and the Oscoda Owls kept pace with Tawas Area in the Northern B Conference last Friday night by winning over opposing schools.

Sophomore Pete LeRouech continued his spectacular play for Oscoda, scoring on runs of 40 and 31 yards in the first quarter to subdue an inexperienced but spunky Pinconning unit, 27-0.

Barry Young sparked a second quarter drive with 21 and 12-yard runs and Jeff Eoff plunged across for the score from a yard out. Richardson missed his first PAT attempt of the season.

Taking a Punny punt on its own 40 immediately after the second half kick-off, Oscoda went across in nine plays, Al Young getting the TD on a three-yard slant. A fumbling team all season, Gladwin tried to extend the same hospitality to S-S Central but the Panthers would not accept the hand until the second half. Central could not capture the bouncing ball and Gladwin parlayed two fumbles into a total gain of 30 yards. This was more than they gained against Central in the entire game, not counting a 65-yard touchdown jaunt by Jim Rickerd in the first quarter.

Application forms are available at high schools or from the navy recruiting station in the Federal Building, East Tawas.

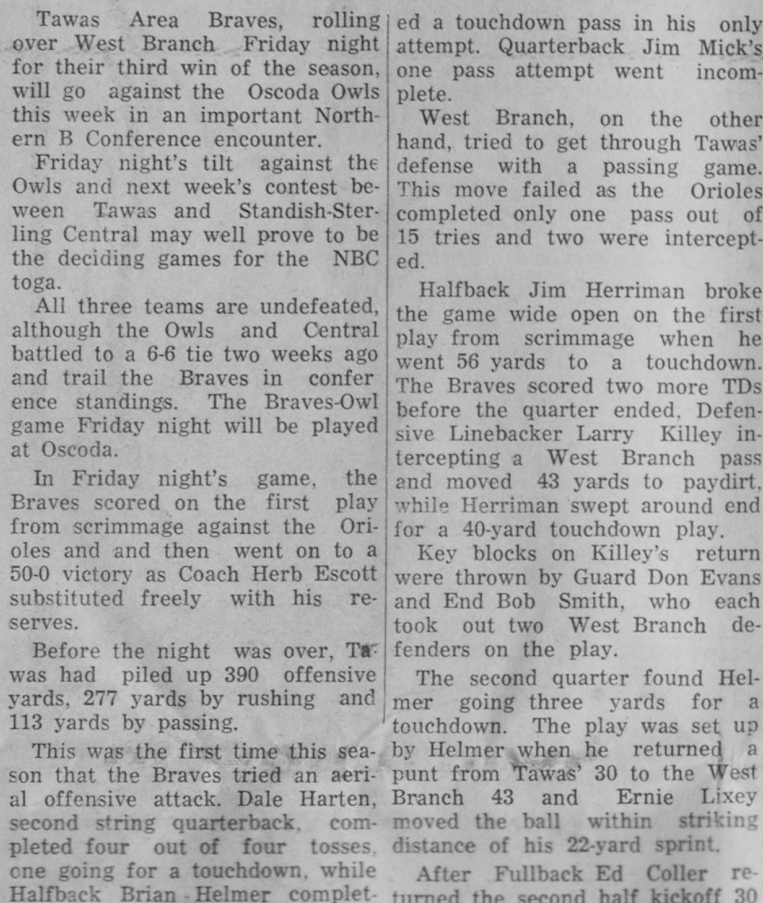

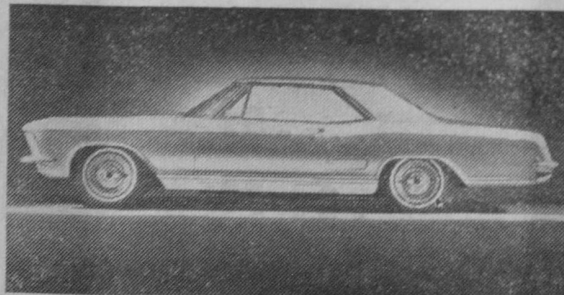
