

Constitutional Import of Tuesday's Election

(Editor's Note: This "open letter to the voters, regardless of party preference" was received by the Herald Tuesday morning from the Hon. Herman Dehnke, retired circuit judge of the 23rd Judicial Circuit and Alpena District delegate to the recent Michigan Constitutional Convention. We are giving his letter prominent display because we believe every voter should read it prior to next Tuesday's election.)

Inasmuch as the proposed new Constitution is not to be voted on until next April, I have not thought it necessary to comment on it in the papers until later.

There is, however, one matter of constitutional importance which is of such momentous significance in the November election that I feel obligated to call attention to it at this time, even though it may wound the sensibilities of some personal friends of long standing.

That issue is apportionment of legislative districts. It presents a conflict between two viewpoints which cut across party lines. Each has supporters in both parties. It is therefore, basically, not a party contest as such.

One theory is that population is the only permissible consideration—that BOTH houses of the Legislature must be set up on that basis, even if it results in three or four abutting counties being able to outvote all the rest of the state in BOTH houses.

The other theory is that our American democracy, in order to operate safely and protect scattered minorities, must have an in-built system of checks and balances, represented in part by apportionment of at least one house on a basis which makes reasonable allowance for other factors in addition to population. This principle has been reflected in the constitution of the United States and of the several states since the beginning. This is what the people thought they had under the constitution of 1908 (re-affirmed by a stunning majority in 1952, by the "one man, one vote" process), until four out of seven Justices of our Supreme Court sitting in the Scholle case recently ruled that the 1952 amendment is invalid, and that the 1908 Constitution COMPELS apportionment on a population basis in BOTH houses. (The utter, ly emotional spirit of this decision is reflected by the Order that in the final eventuality, all senators must not only be ELECTED, but NOMINATED, by a state-wide popular vote. The nominations, at least could have been made by party conventions, affording some assurance that not all senators would come from the same area.)

On a "one man, one vote" basis, the majority living in three or four counties can now elect all state officials in the executive and judicial departments, and a majority of one house. By this method we find ourselves with a governor, lieutenant governor and secretary of state, and both United States senators, all from the same county; and the other state officials, including Supreme Court Justices, wherever they may live, know that their political fate is largely in the hands of this concentrated majority. Yet all this not enough to suit Mr. Scholle and his lieutenants and followers—they cannot be content until they have achieved control of the last one-sixth of the state government also. It is not difficult to understand why so many voters living in the metropolitan area view with alarm the possibility that the same influences and methods they are familiar with in some of their own areas might be placed in complete control of the state government also.

May I respectfully remind the voters that this is not one of those

campaigns in which people may understandably feel, either that there is no clear-cut, important issue at stake, or that the candidates for key-position offices have not clearly and unequivocally declared themselves on it. It is not one of those campaigns in which we can afford to vote for "good fellows," merely because they are "good fellows." Furthermore, in this election it is particularly important for ALL voters to express their preferences

Garden Club Fulfills Pledge on Project

A pledge made 10 or more years ago to assist with landscaping at Tawas Hospital is being fulfilled by the East Tawas Garden Club.

The club is presently financing cost of planting two beds of shrubbery on the north side of the hospital grounds. Work is being done by Harold Clark of Clark Garden Center, East Tawas.

This particular planting of shrubs include six mock orange trees, six forsythia, six quince, a sunburst locust and a large bed of lilacs.

Mrs. Joseph Hennigar, president of the garden club, officiated last Friday at ceremonies marking the start of work on this project. The club has 35 members.

The planting is in accordance to a master landscape design prepared last July by Joseph Cox, extension landscape architect at Michigan State University. This plan, completed at no charge to the hospital, is on display in the hospital's reception room.

L. G. McKay Jr., who has charge of the landscaping project for the hospital board of directors, said that Cox made the plan so as to utilize shrubbery and trees now in place.

Many different varieties of shrubs are incorporated in the master plan to provide for continuous colorful blooming during the spring and summer. It has also been planned so as to require only a minimum of maintenance by the hospital.

Cost of the two shrubbery beds to the East Tawas Garden Club is approximately \$100, states Mrs. Paul Harvey, Mrs. Harold Clark is the club's project chairman.

The lilac bushes, all named varieties, will be tagged for the benefit of visitors.

Any other organization or individuals wishing to contribute to the hospital's landscape project may inspect the master plan at the hospital or contact Mr. McKay.

Hot Political Campaign in Closing Stages; Vote Nov. 6

Another hot political campaign at the state level is rapidly drawing to a close and voters will go to the polls next Tuesday, November 6, to make the final decision as to which political party will guide Michigan's destiny over the next two years.

Taking the campaign spotlight has been the race for the state's top post. Both Gov. John B. Swainson and George Romney, Republican hopeful, have traveled thousands of miles throughout the state during the campaign.

Although the race for governor has received most of the headlines in this campaign, there are also contests for five other state positions. All incumbents are Democrats.

T. John Lesinski, incumbent lieutenant governor, is opposed by Clarence A. Reid, who held that position in a previous Republican administration; James M. Hare is opposed for his position as secretary of state by Norman O. Stockmeyer; Attorney General Frank J. Kelley is opposed by Robert J. Danhof; Sanford A. Brown, state treasurer, has opposition for state treasurer from Glenn S. Allen Jr., while Billie S. Farnum, auditor general, is opposed by L. William Seidman.

Michigan voters will do some-

thing this November that has not been done for 50 years. They will elect a congressman to represent the entire state. This became necessary when Michigan gained an additional seat in congress as a result of the 1960 census and the state legislature could not agree with Governor Swainson on a reapportionment of all congressional seats.

As usual, citizens must vote once for a United States representative from the congressional district in which they reside. But, in this election, they must vote a second time for a congressman-at-large who will be voted upon by all the citizens of Michigan and represent the entire state.

The two major parties in Michigan have each nominated a candidate for this office. The Republicans have chosen Alvin Bentley of Owosso, former congressman, and the Democrats have nominated Neil Staebler of Ann Arbor, former party chairman.

In the race for 10th District representative in congress, Elford A. Cederberg, Republican incumbent, is opposed by Hubert C. Evans, Democrat.

In the two races for legislative seats, only three candidates are listed. Harold B. Hughes of Clare, Republican incumbent, is opposed by Carroll E. Jones, Democrat, for 28th District state senator. James P. Mielock of Whittemore is unopposed for Alpena District state representative.

Michigan voters will also name two justices of the supreme court. In this non-partisan election, Paul L. Adams is opposed by Michael D. O'Hara for the term ending December 31, 1967. Otis M. Smith is opposed by Louis D. McGregor for the term ending December 31, 1965. Both Adams and Smith were appointees of Governor Swainson.

There are no contests at the local level. Unopposed are the following Republicans: William H. McCready, prosecuting attorney; Ivan O'Farrell, sheriff; George A. Prescott, clerk; Grace L. Miller, treasurer; Albert H. Buch, register of deeds; E. H. Stickney, drain commissioner; Edward D. Jacques and E. John Moffatt, coroners; Arthur J. Aulrich, road commissioner.

Voters will also receive a referendum ballot. This is a proposed amendment to the state constitution authorizing the legislature to provide for general revision of the statutes.

Inspect Airport to See if State Will Participate

Three members of the state aeronautics commission inspected Iosco County Airport Tuesday to find out if the state should contribute \$5,000 toward construction of an access road to the airport.

Walter Hink of Detroit, chairman, said a final decision will be made at a commission meeting at Lansing December 13. Earlier in the day, the commissioners visited Baldwin and Handley Airports at Munising.

With Hink on the flying trip were Ray Dirksen of Kalamazoo, Walter Jakems of Grand Rapids and L. C. Andrews, chief engineer.

Criminal warrants have been issued against two drivers involved in recent fatal auto accidents in the Oscoda area.

A warrant charging Ernest J. Przeslawski, Alpena, with negligent homicide was authorized October 17 by Prosecuting Attorney William McCready.

Przeslawski was driver of a school bus loaded with children which collided with a car on US-23 north of Oscoda. Receiving fatal injuries in the September 15 crash was Mrs. Bessie Flint, 75, of Detroit.

Raymond Utterback, 17-year-old Oscoda student, is charged with manslaughter in the September 14 death of Dale Pelton, 13-year-old Oscoda eighth grade student.

Pelton, who was pedaling his bicycle on River Road, was killed instantly when struck by Utterback's car.

A third warrant was issued last Tuesday charging Mrs. Katherine Gay, 48-year-old Whittemore housewife, with negligent homicide in the September 22 auto death of Mrs. Marion Dumas of Whittemore.

Construction on Londo Lake Road was also viewed and the group then traveled over South Branch Road, Kokosing Road and Wicker Road. From that point, the bus followed Monument and River Roads to Oscoda where streets in that community, maintained through township-county participation, were viewed.

Lodge Road, which serves the Capehart Housing area at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, was inspected and the group viewed Muncy Road, which was reconstructed during the past summer.

On the return trip to East Tawas, supervisors inspected the proposed road which will serve the new county airport in Baldwin Township.

Trout reported that cost of Townline Road was \$160,000, while construction on Muncy Road, from Johnson Road to old US-23 in AuSable Township, cost \$25,000. He said that 11 miles of double asphalt seal in the county this year had averaged approximately \$4,000 per mile.

The county road engineer explained some of the plans for future road construction. Projects are to be discussed at a future session of the board of supervisors when Trout presents a more detailed study for consideration.

Supervisors View Iosco's Road Net

State Tourist Industry Faces Serious Challenge

Competition facing Michigan's tourist industry was revealed to members of the East Michigan Tourist Association at the 52nd annual convention in Bay City last Thursday when a Canadian Government Travel Bureau spokesman told of gains made by Canada in tourist volumes during recent years.

Frank H. Galipeau, director of Canada's Chicago tourist office, detailed the scope and size of Canada's attractions and how it aggressively advertises to tell the world (especially the United States) about them. The results have been instrumental in boosting revenues to Canada from tourist travelers.

Galipeau addressed more than 200 members and guests at the convention's noon luncheon.

Carole Jean VanVallin, Miss Michigan of 1962, received a special citation award for her contribution to Michigan.

Cliff Abbs, West Branch hardware man, was elected as the 35th president of the association since its founding in 1924. Elected vice presidents were Frank Catto, Lansing; Ron Gamble, Greenbush; Theodore Benton, Houghton Lake, and Dr. F. H. Letchfield, Pinconning.

Members also heard reports from chairmen of the legislature's two tourist industry relations

committees, Sen. Thomas Schweigert, Petoskey, and Rep. Walter Nakkula of Gladwin. Both legislators urged more promotion activities by individuals, communities and counties, citing the need to increase support to the well-established programs of the EMTA and other Michigan regional associations.

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To Discuss Plans for Financing New Library

Iosco-Arenac Regional Library is to meet November 13 to discuss the final agreement on a method of paying for the former Alabaster school. It is proposed that the school building be used as library headquarters.

After several years of searching for a new home, the regional library board bid \$17,500 for the two-story school building when it was abandoned earlier this fall and offered for sale by the Tawas Area Board of Education. It was the only bid entered.

No empty building in the area had been considered satisfactory by the library board and cost of a new building had been estimated at \$50,000 for the required 6,000 square feet of floor space.

The library board is asking to have payments spread over a 10-year period.

Library board members are pleased with the school building as a library headquarters. It is more centrally located than the present Tawas City office and includes about 8,000 square feet of useable space.

The building is 60 by 100 feet with the gymnasium and two classrooms on the first floor and five classrooms plus an office on the second.

It is proposed that the gymnasium be filled in order to bring the floor level with the first floor level of the school. This would eliminate need for a ramp and would reduce room height at the same time.

This area would be used for book storage and a bookmobile garage, permitting easy loading of the vehicle.

Henry Oates, an Iosco County board member, said that outside of the possibility of a new roof and repairs to the heating system, he did not believe that much would have to be done to the building and will submit repair suggestions to the library board at its November meeting.

TC Council Hears Report Monday from Special Assessors

A three-man board has recommended that \$153.12 be assessed against each building site in Tawas City's first special assessment district. This amount would finance cost of a proposed sanitary sewer on Beech and Cedar Streets in the First Ward.

At a meeting of the Tawas City Council Monday night, recent action by the three-man board in preparing a special tax roll was reviewed. Members of the assessing board are Clement Stephan, Reginald Bublitz and Carl Schaaf.

Total cost of the \$2,450 project would be borne by the 14 property owners involved.

A map of the proposed assessment district was filed with City Clerk Walter Nelson, along with the tax roll. A home situated in the center of two lots is to be assessed as a single building site.

A hearing is to be held at the November 19 council meeting to review assessments and to give an opportunity to all interested persons to express their views.

YOU COULD LOSE YOUR REPRESENTATION!

Remember July 18?

Memories are short these days. So much is happening that we sometimes forget the events of only a few months ago.

But, when we vote on November 6, we'd better remember July 18. That was the day when the Supreme Court of Michigan threw out, by a one-vote margin, the State Senate apportionment we voted for just 10 years ago. The court told us we had to take the kind of apportionment demanded by Gus Scholle, regardless of the fact that the people had overwhelmingly rejected it at the polls. By that same one-vote margin, the Court also cancelled the primary election and told the people they might have to elect 32 Senators on an at-large basis.

This could easily have meant that all the Senators would come from one or two counties, depriving us of our voice—of any voice—in the Senate of Michigan! Only action by the U. S. Supreme Court saved us! And the fight isn't over yet. What does this mean to us on November 6?

Well, the present Governor has said that the Michigan Supreme Court decision, which almost cost us our representation in the Senate, was "A great victory for the people." Which people, Governor Swainson? Certainly not those of us who live here. Certainly not the 1,269,807 of us (a 294,289 majority) who voted for the present Senate plan that the Michigan Supreme Court threw out.

Fortunately, the Governor's opponent, Mr. George Romney, supports a Senate apportionment plan which provides effective representation for all the people. He also supports the right of the people to vote on the kind of legislative representation they want. Romney has called the Swainson-Scholle apportionment steamroller a "power grab." He's right.

When we vote on November 6 we ought to remember what John Swainson wants to do to our voice in the legislature. We ought to remember where George Romney stands.

We ought to remember that Governor Swainson's appointee, Attorney General Kelley, deserted the people and argued for Gus Scholle.

We ought to remember that two Justices of the Supreme Court are up for election, and that we can change the make-up of the Michigan Supreme Court by electing two new Justices.


Let's remember July 18 on November 6. Let's do what we can to see that we still have a voice in the State Senate.



Following a 7:30 o'clock breakfast, introductions, speeches and hand-shaking at the Holland Hotel, Romney left Tawas on a week-end campaign tour of Northern Michigan.

Michigan's . . . any deer controversy is still raging, just as it has for the past several years. Conservation Director Gerald E. Eddy and Clifford Ketcham, commission secretary, appeared in Ontonagon Circuit Court Monday to show cause why antlerless deer shooting should not be canceled this fall. Because

of the pending court action, included with the 82,300 permits now being processed by the department will be a warning that they could be invalidated. Arguments on both sides of the fence in the any-deer controversy can be heard in this area. In fact, take a stand for one side or the other and you will find strong opposition.

The subject of deer population is also a burning controversy in the Iosco area. Some hunters report seeing larger numbers of deer this fall than in any recent year. Others take the opposite view, but both viewpoints may be correct. The deer may be concentrated in certain areas.

One of the strongest arguments in favor of an any-deer season is the fact that government surplus corn was allotted to this area last spring to feed "starving" deer. This fact is often forgotten in the fall of the year.

In our opinion, one of the biggest problems is this. Too many people are luring deer into private hunting property with apples, sugar beets and carrots. Some forget about the deer herd once the season is over. This fact, coupled with natural overbreeding, could be one of the reasons for overcrowding of deer in certain areas.

It's not too late . . . to give a pint of blood in today's (Wednesday) visit of the Red Cross Bloodmobile. Iosco Chapter of the American Red Cross has its blood donor center set up at St. Joseph's Social Center, East Tawas. The blood center will be open from 2:00 until 8:00 p. m. Louis Awalt, county blood bank chairman, reminds residents of the importance of their support. More than 1,000 pints of blood have been used by Iosco County residents since joining the blood bank program. Quota for the fall visit is 300 pints of blood, 150 at East Tawas and 150 at Oscoda. Mrs. George Tuttle is the Tawas area chairman and Mrs. Robert Richardson has charge at Oscoda.



Braves-Sebewaing Indians Clash Friday Night in Finale

Two undefeated prep football teams sporting feathered war bonnets will put their perfect records on the line this Friday night to close out the 1962 season.

Moving into the wigwam of the Tawas Area Braves will be the Sebewaing Indians, one of the top class C powerhouses in the state. With identical records of seven wins and no losses, both teams are champions of their respective leagues. The Braves, with scalps of five league foes on their belts, nailed down top rung in the Northern B Conference, while the Indians have done likewise in the Class C Thumb Conference.

Area fans, who have watched the Braves roll over all opposition with surprising ease this fall, have had their eyes set on the night of Friday, November 2, for about two months. One way or another, an undefeated team will emerge after only 48 minutes of play... an entire season wrapped up in one game.

The visitors, third-ranking class C school in Michigan, have two players who won all-state honors last year as juniors. The Braves, although not favored with a listing among the 10 top B schools in state polls, have a backfield which has run wild this year, an equally strong offensive line and a tough defensive unit. The meeting between these two teams should live up to its billing as the game of the year.

Tawas Area racked up its seventh consecutive win last Friday night by defeating the Houghton Lake Bobcats, 48-6, in a non-conference tilt. This was the first meeting between the two schools since 1960. Houghton Lake, which

dropped athletics for a full season, faces a big rebuilding job after being a NEM power for several seasons.

The first quarter of Friday night's game, played in freezing weather on a snow-covered Houghton Lake field, seemed to be one of the shortest on record. The cold weather apparently had an effect on the officials' stop watch as the quarter went only about nine minutes instead of the regulation 12.

The Bobcats warmed up to the occasion by recovering a Tawas fumble mid-way in the quarter. With the ball only 10 yards from the end zone, Houghton Lake lost eight paydirt, Houghton Lake lost eight yards in two plays and Halfback Brian Helmer intercepted a pass on the 14. This set the stage for the first quarter's only score when Halfback Jim Herriman romped 86 yards to a touchdown. The try for PAT was stopped.

After the two teams slogged back and forth in mid-field mud, Helmer ran a Bobcat punt back 20 yards to set up another score. Three plays later, Quarterback Jim Mick slashed over on bootleg play to score and Herriman followed with the PAT conversion.

Tawas struck again before the half ended with its best sustained drive of the night. Herriman paced off the last eight yards of the drive for a touchdown and Halfback Ernie Lixey ran the PAT to give the Braves a 20-0 lead at intermission.

The Braves took the second half kickoff on their own 36 and marched to a touchdown, Mick going the final 15 yards on another bootleg to score. End Steve Ferguson gathered in a pass from Mick to make it 27-0.

Although Tawas' second string saw most of the action in the fi-

nal quarter. Fullback Helmer scored one TD on a 52-yard scamper early in the period. Herriman ran the point after touchdown.

The Braves struck two more times in the fourth quarter, Sophomore Quarterback Dale Harten making a nice run of 41 yards through the HL defense and Linebacker Randy DeWyse got his name in the scoring column by intercepting a Bobcat pass and then ran 22 yards for a touchdown. Both attempts for PAT were good, Joe LaBlance running the first and Herriman the second.

In the final minutes of the game, Tawas lost the ball on downs deep in its own territory and Houghton Lake received a golden opportunity to score. Until the last 30 seconds of play, only one other team, Oscoda, had scored against the Braves this year.

The Bobcats gained two first downs on penalties called during Tawas' goal line stand and finally punched over in nine plays. Quarterback Dick Wooteaman scored from one yard out.

In the seven games played thus far this season, Tawas has scored 282 points to the opposition's 13.

Draft Board Now Reviewing Records of IV-F Classifications

Michigan draft boards have been directed to review classification of 118,000 registrants, including about 200 in Iosco County, now in class IV-F to determine if they would be eligible for military service in time of national emergency.

Registrants who might be available for military service in case of national emergency will be reclassified into class I-Y. This new classification was recently created by the Selective Service System to identify those registrants who are qualified for military service only in time of war or national emergency.

All registrants reclassified will be mailed a notice, states Mrs. Joseph Dimmick, clerk of Local Board No. 36 for Iosco County. First notices are to be mailed this week and others are to be mailed as the work progresses at later board meetings.

Almost 50 percent of the registrants currently being examined for military service are being disqualified on physical, mental or moral grounds under rigid acceptance standards now in effect. Many of the disqualified registrants would be acceptable for military service in time of war.

The new I-Y classification will put such registrants on notice that they have a continuing liability for military service.

Col. Arthur A. Holmes, state director of Selective Service, has directed local boards to complete the review by December. Changes in classification are being based on information in files at the local board.

"If there have been changes in status of marriage, family, occupation, education, physical condition as well as address, these facts should be reported to the local board at once, whether or not they might result in a different classification being available," states Mrs. Dimmick.

Veteran of WW I Rainbow Division Retires from AF

The military career of S-Sgt. Clayton Gregg of Wurtsmith Air Force Base came to a close last Friday. The sergeant assumed his former rank of captain upon retirement and, with his wife, headed for England, where they will make their home.

As far as can be determined, he was the last man to retire from active duty who was a former member of the World War I Rainbow Division.

Gregg first enlisted in the Indiana National Guard April 4, 1917, and was called to federal service August 5, 1917. He was then transferred to the 150th Field Artillery and was among the first contingent to be sent to France during World War I.

The sergeant was gassed in the Argonne campaign and sent to the hospital November 8, 1918, and was returned to the United States May 14, 1919, being discharged shortly thereafter.

He was recalled in 1942 during World War II as a first lieutenant and left the service in 1946. He was a civilian until being recalled in 1948 and had since remained on active duty.

on the judicial ballot as painstakingly as for any other offices.

Our present governor has consistently and definitely placed himself on the side of Mr. Scholle in his lawsuit against the state, and made clear his purpose to veto any apportionment bill which is not based on "population" for BOTH houses. Every bill passed by the Legislature setting up new Congressional districts has been vetoed by him because it did not comply with this formula; and that, incidentally, is the reason why we have to vote for two Congressmen in this election—one from our own district and one from the state-at-large. The makeup of our House of Representatives is such that it is impossible to obtain the two-thirds vote necessary to override the veto.

To sum up: If Governor Swainson and Justice Smith are re-elected, Michigan will have forced upon it apportionment of both houses on a population only basis either by an apportionment bill based on that formula, or by Supreme Court decree. Their opponents are Mr. Romney and Judge McGregor. Unless Mr. Danhof is elected as Attorney General, the state and our constitution will continue to have no advocate to speak for them in future stages pending and prospective litigations. If Mr. Bentley is not elected Congressman-at-large, it will result in one more vote in Washington for population apportionment of Congressional Districts, under bills now pending in Congress. Eternal vigilance on the part of the people is the price not only of liberty, but of sound government.
