

East Tawas Moves Into New City Hall

Governmental offices of East Tawas moved into the new \$33,800 city hall Tuesday. Work of moving furniture from temporary quarters at 106 East State Street was expected to be completed last night.

Although some work remains on the new building, construction was so nearly complete that the city council authorized the move in order to save one month's rent in the temporary quarters.

Some new furniture has already been received for the offices and the city will make use of present furnishings on a temporary basis.

An open house is planned Wednesday, October 17. The building is located on the West-over Street site of old city hall which served East Tawas for nearly 80 years.

The new building includes a large council chamber, offices for the city clerk, police department, water department, city treasurer and superintendent of public works. It also includes quarters for the city library, connected by a doorway with the council room.

In other council action Monday night, authorization was given to construct a brick front on the fire hall located adjacent to the new building.

Supt. Paul Roppert was authorized to purchase gravel and salt for use on streets during the winter. Approval was also given to receive bids on a new truck and pick-up.

City Attorney J. Richard Newman was instructed to write a letter to all persons who are delinquent in payment of personal property taxes.

Building applications read included: John Brackenbury, repair; Leonard Sarki, new roof; W. D. Nunn, roof on garage; James Martin, remodel; A. S. Becker, construct new garage; Raymond LeViere, repair; Sophia Murrell, new porch; Donald J. Docking, construct new residence; Fred Pettibone, remodel home.

Del Myles Gets Appointment to TC Commission

Appointment of Delano Myles to fill a vacancy on the Tawas City Planning Commission was approved Monday night by the city council.

Myles will fill the one-year term of his brother, Bruce, who resigned recently after moving to Oscoda.

Name of the new commissioner had been submitted by the planning commission to Mayor George Tuttle, who appoints commissioners, subject to city council approval.

Planning commission minutes read Monday night revealed that a letter had been sent in reply to a Bay City Times classified advertisement in regard to a manufacturing site in a small town. No answer has been received.

On review of a building application of Ernest Mueller for an addition to his Fifth Avenue property, the commission recommended that council deny the application on grounds that its location in a class A residential district is contrary to the building code as a nonconforming use.

Approval was given to McKay Sales Company allowing a non-conforming frame building to remain on leased property at its US-23 sales lot. The permit would be nontransferable and can be canceled on 30-day notice.

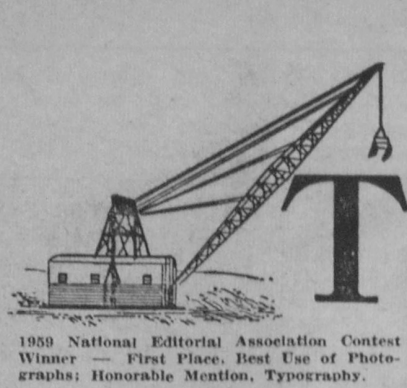
Good Attendance at Cooking School

Hearing Today—

City Concerned About Dam's Effect on River

State health department and water resources commission authorities have been asked by the City of Tawas to investigate what effect, if any, the proposed Tawas Lake Dam would have on the Tawas River.

A letter sent to these two

groups last Wednesday brought an immediate response. A representative of the water resources commission is here this week making an investigation.

At Monday night's meeting of the Tawas City Council, Supt. Reginald Bulbitz was instructed to attend the hearing set today (Wednesday) by the Iosco County Board of Supervisors concerning the proposed dam.

In last week's letter, the Tawas City Water Board posed the following questions to the two state agencies: 1. What effect during a very dry spell would this dam have on the amount of water we receive? 2. What could happen if the Lake Huron level should drop further?

"With a stable water level at Tawas Lake, we fear we may some day, under the right conditions, have a dry ditch in Tawas River," stated the water board.

"We have a sewage treatment plant to be concerned about along with fishing, boating, industry and resorts to add to our reasons for being assured of an uninterrupted water flow in Tawas River."

In a letter to the city council Monday night, Mrs. Helen Beckett, owner of Tawas River Trailer Park, said, "all people who own property bordering Tawas River should be protected against any hazard that may occur because of this dam."

Mrs. Beckett pointed out that during the hot summer months, very little water flows into Tawas Lake from its feeder streams. She pointed out that if the lake was maintained at its legal level, there would be additional evaporation loss from the sun and wind.

Councilman Howard Hatton agreed with Mrs. Beckett's letter and felt that a full investigation should be started.

Mayor George Tuttle said that the city wants to be sure that a specific amount of water is going down the river at all times.

New Gypsum Quarry Produces Cement Rock

A pair of gophers contributed to events which led to the development of Iosco County's newest gypsum quarry. It is located on the Elmer Britt and Sons farm in Sherman Township.

A deposit now being quarried there by Michigan Gypsum Company was accidentally discovered in 1946 when the Britts noticed that diggings left by nature's "miners" contained particles of gypsum rock.

Although Sherman Township is situated in the heart of a gypsum belt which extends many miles inland, the Britts did not realize that gypsum lay hidden underneath their farm.

Borings were made near the gopher holes and a sizeable deposit was located. Prehistoric upheavals of the earth had left a large quantity of high grade gypsum ore only a few feet beneath the top soil.

Development of a quarry was not started until 14 years later, when, in 1960, Sargent Construction Company of Saginaw made negotiations with the Britts and later founded Michigan Gypsum Company. The rock is being quarried there on a royalty basis paid to the property owners.

Sargent Construction Company is principal stockholder in the firm. Remainder of the stock is held by company employees.

Some gypsum was quarried that first year and the rock trucked to nearby Turner in Arenac County for rail shipment to Portland Cement plants.

It was not until last spring that adequate crushing and loading facilities were developed. A new stockpile area was located east of the quarry and a 1,700-foot rail spur constructed to connect the operation with the Detroit and Mackinac Railway.

The quarry operation is similar to methods used by nearby National Gypsum Company and United States Gypsum Company, only on a much smaller scale.

After overburden (earth) is stripped from the quarry by draglines, the rock is shattered into transportable chunks by blasting. Large masses of gypsum thrown on the quarry floor are then moved to the preparation area by huge bottom dump trucks.

A long ramp leads to the crusher and the three Euclid trucks keep a steady flow of rock moving into the hopper. The rock is then screened and conveyed into the stockpile near the rail siding. Cars are loaded by dragline.

The operation sounds simple on paper, but Michigan Gypsum Company had to overcome many obstacles before an efficient operation could be developed.

Operating on a limited capital, the firm used equipment at hand which was designed for road building work and not for the heavy work involved in gypsum quarrying.

The firm also lacked experience in quarrying and employees had to learn the operation on a trial and error basis.

Maintaining equipment and handling general supervision from the start has been the job of Kenneth Thibault, who had some previous experience in stripping operations.

With a recent spurt in cement rock orders, Thibault is now devoting full time to maintenance and Max Gallant of Saginaw is the new superintendent. Overall charge is handled by Wayman Rossman, also of Saginaw.

The firm, which employs 12 men in its operation, is now producing about 1,000 tons of rock in an eight-hour shift. Three gondola cars of cement rock are shipped daily to Michigan users.

Gallant, who had been grade

foreman for a Saginaw construction company, said his new job was quite different than in the field of road construction. "I had to spend three weeks in the quarry just to learn something about blasting operations," he stated.

Chief blaster is Jack Thornton, who explained that his only previous experience was blasting stumps in farm fields.

"Our first blast was a complete flop," said Gallant. "The explosion sent rock flying in all directions and pulverized much of it. We later tried a delayed blast, but that didn't work either."

Finally after drilling countless holes in rock for experimental charges, the men have developed a method of blasting which fits their needs.

Using a small drilling rig, holes are drilled to a depth of about 13 feet in the top strata of gypsum. After this has been blasted and removed, along with a layer of shale, a second layer of gypsum is shattered in the same manner.

Methods being used in the quarrying and crushing operation are a constant study in an effort to make the work more efficient.

"With gradual expansion of the business through receipt of cement rock orders, I believe Michigan Gypsum has a good future," stated Gallant.

Five persons entered guilty pleas when arraigned Monday morning in Iosco County Circuit Court.

Included were Richard J. LaFrance, breaking and entering in the nighttime; John Millenback and Ronald Guitier, entering without permission; Maureen Quinn, wayward delinquent minor; Ilene Pitts, larceny from a store.

Mrs. Pitts, 19-year-old East Tawas mother, was arrested last Wednesday by Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell and City Police Officer Donald Docking.

After questioning by officers, Mrs. Pitts admitted the theft of about \$50 in merchandise from several East Tawas stores the previous day, including A and P Store, Mathews 5c to \$5, the Pendleton Shop, Ray's Shoe Store, Dimmick's Cut Rate, Mooney's Best Franklin, Mill End Store and Hennigar's Department Store.

Merchandise stolen included women's apparel, baby clothing and baby food. Recovered articles were taken to the stores and identified by the owners.

Miss Quinn, 17, Rochester, a ward of Oakland County Probate Court, was arrested Tuesday night by state police. A 16-year-old East Tawas girl accompanying her was arrested as a delinquent minor and Probate Judge H. Read Smith authorized police to hold both at the county jail.

The two girls were arrested at Keiser's Drug Store, Tawas City. Owner Hugo J. Keiser told officers that he had received a telephone call stating that two girls were shoplifting in his store. He saw Miss Quinn put an item into a bag and when he approached, she ran out of the building.

Both girls were apprehended and police notified. Investigation disclosed that the pair had been shoplifting in several Tawas stores that evening.

Local authorities, including Iosco Probate Court, have investigated numerous shoplifting complaints in the Tawas area during the past several weeks.

LaFrance was convicted of breaking and entering early Friday morning of White Oil Company, East Tawas.

Robert Langlois, station operator, opened for business about 7:45 a. m. and found a desk drawer open and a window smashed out. More than \$600 in cash was missing.

Investigation by Detective LeRoy McCluer of the state police and Langlois, who is a deputy sheriff, revealed that tire tracks left by the burglar's car were identical to tires sold at the station.

A check of records revealed that LaFrance had purchased three tires there last July while he had been an employee. Officers believed that someone knew where the money was kept as nothing else appeared to be disturbed.

LaFrance's car was checked and it was found that the three tires matched plaster casts of those found near the scene.

At first, LaFrance denied being implicated and demanded a polygraph examination. After two tests were given at Bay City, he

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Antique Gun Show Here Sept. 29-30

Plans are now being made to stage an antique gun show and shooting demonstration at the Tawas City Park September 29-30. The event is being sponsored by the Tawas City Businessmen's Association and The Tawas Herald.

Members of the Wyandotte Muzzle Loader Club have been invited to take part in the two-day program. As of Monday, the exact number of Wyandotte club members planning to attend was not known.

An open air display of guns is planned Saturday afternoon at the park. If enough exhibitors are present, use of the Iosco County Building will be sought. A shooting demonstration is planned Sunday afternoon.

Muzzle loading arms to be displayed include flintlocks, percussion and muskets. Members of the club also will attempt to identify any old-time guns that may be brought in by area residents.

Max Schwartz of Wyandotte, who displayed part of his collection in front of Nunn's Hardware on the final day of East Tawas' centennial celebration, plans to bring \$5,000 worth of firearms ranging from the year 1780 to about 1880. Included will be a very rare whale gun and whale bomb.

This is the first time for such a show and demonstration here and the sponsors point out that the extent of participation by the Wyandotte club, other than Schwartz, will not be known until next week.

Local gun buffs and collectors are also invited to take part in the program.

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Building Permit Received for 18-Bed TC Rest Home

Plans were revealed Monday night for construction of a new 18-bed nursing home in Tawas City.

Building application of Mrs. Edna Schalm, who operates a nursing home at 316 East German Street, received tentative approval of the city council. The application is to be checked by City Attorney Jerry Cotter to determine if the structure would conform with class A residential district regulations under the city's zoning ordinance.

The new 40 by 80-foot rest home would be constructed near the present Schalm residence west of M-55. It would include a four-bed ward, seven two-bed wards, a dining lounge and kitchen.

The building application included a copy of the state fire marshal's approval and it was stated that approval from other state agencies had been received.

Such construction would require the city to extend Murphy Street about 300 feet. The council said the street would be extended as soon as construction of the rest home was assured.

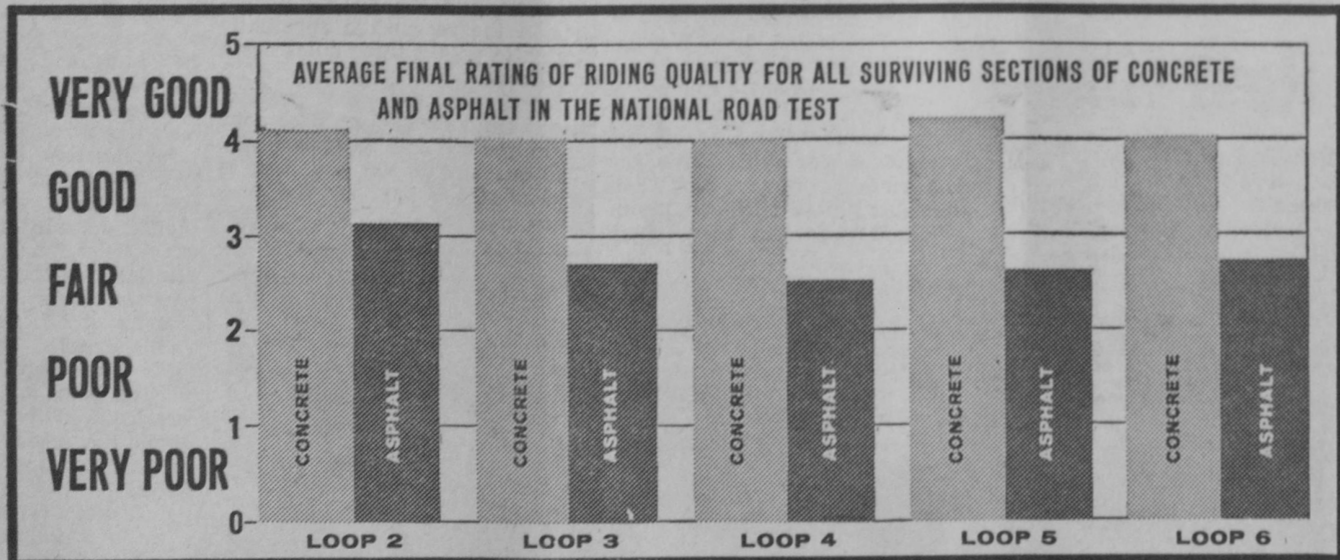

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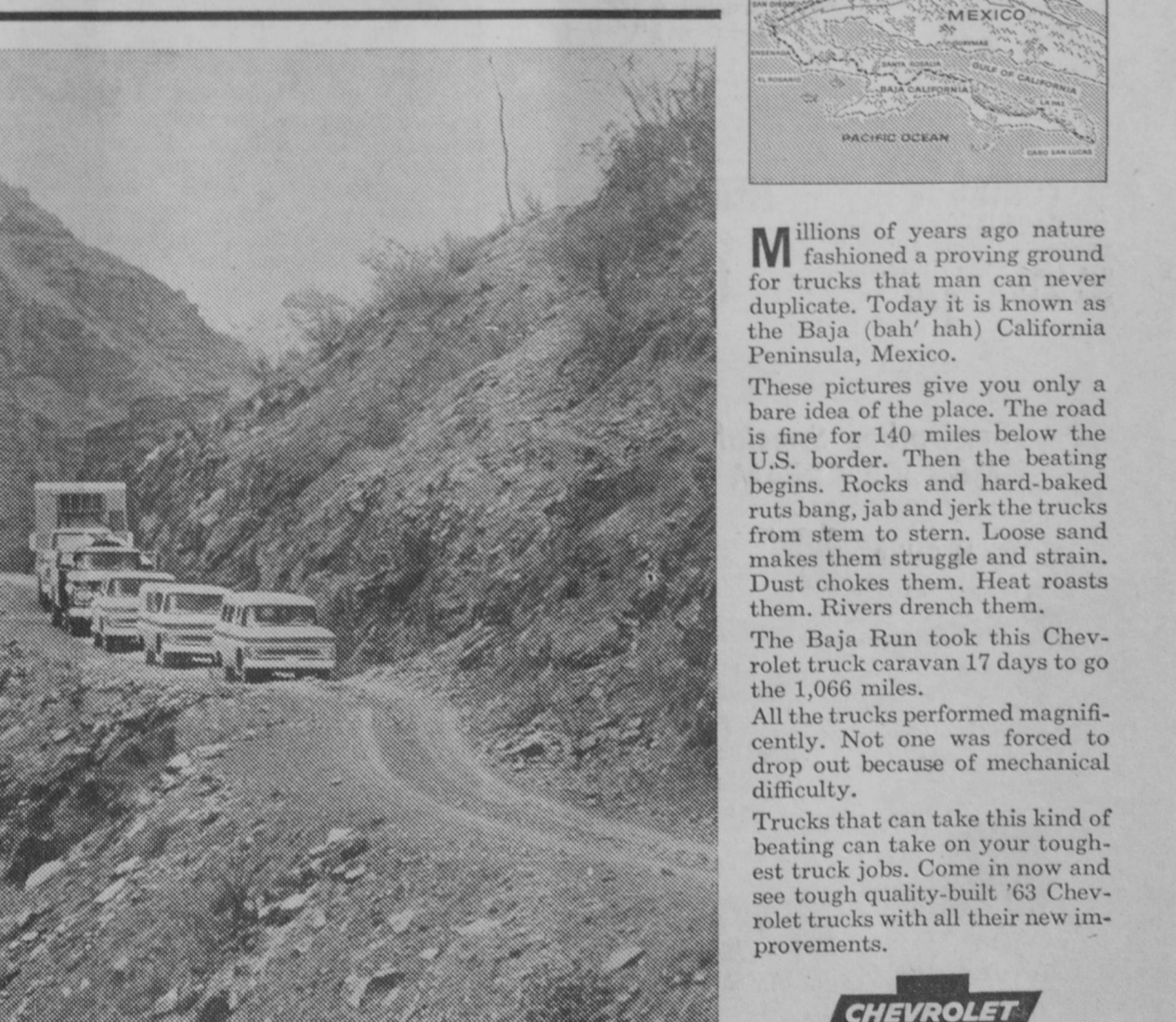

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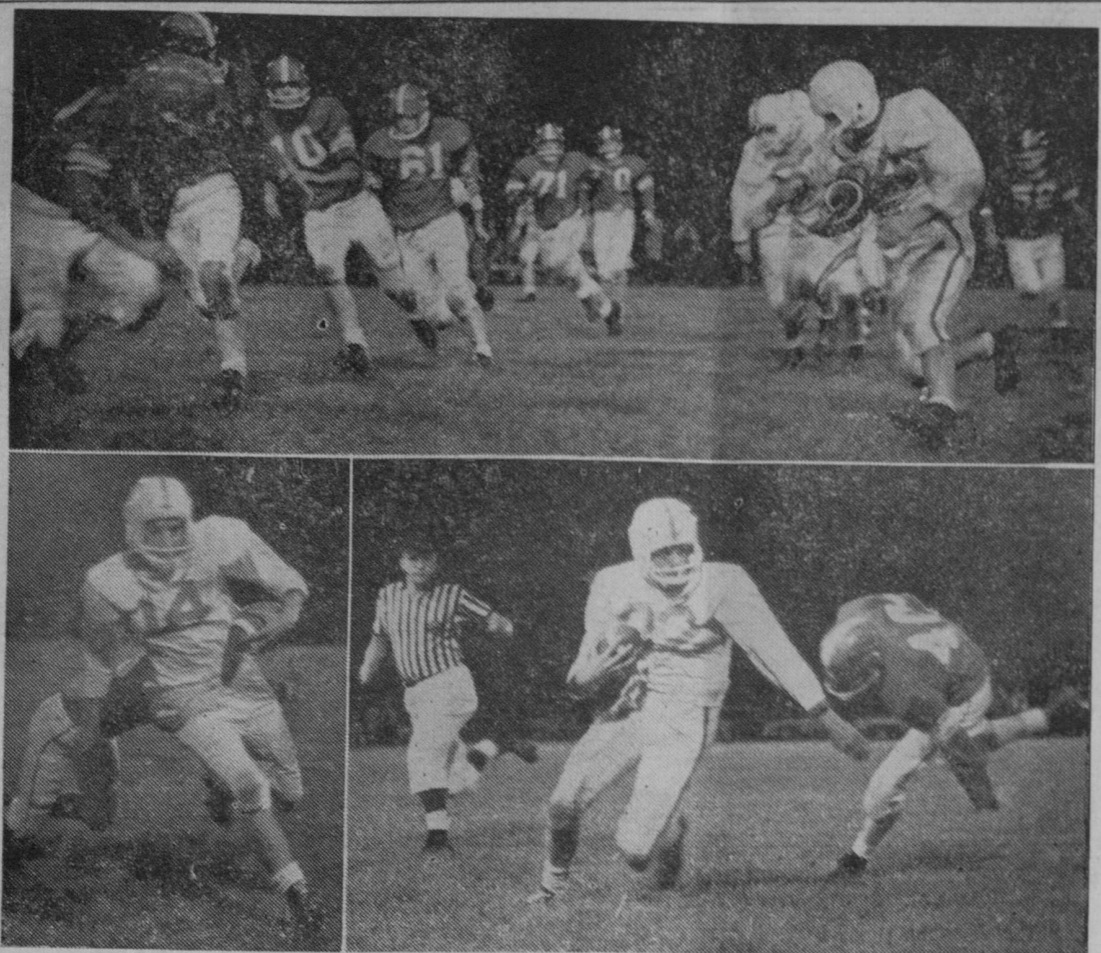

Braves Win Season Opener

Tawas Area, under Coach Herb Escott, unveiled a hard-hitting attack Friday night as the Braves rolled to a 26-0 victory over non-conference foe, Whittemore-Prescott Cardinals. All 23 Tawas players who dressed for the game saw action.

Although the Braves' defense in the first half left much to be desired along with a bogged-down offense in the third period, it was Tawas' bench strength which proved to be most impressive.

With Fullback Ed Collier seeing only limited service during the opener because of a pulled leg muscle, Guard Bill Western, Halfback Brian Helmer and End Steve Ferguson still nursing injuries and waiting another week before seeing action, several second string players came off the bench and turned in capable performances.

But stealing the show was Halfback Jim Herriman, Tawas' bread and butter man in the backfield. Herriman, who led the Braves in scoring last year, averaged 6.7 yards in 11 carries, piling up 74 yards and two touchdowns.

Leading a big and rugged Tawas line was Guard Randy DeWise. Opening night jitters probably accounted for the defensive line's lack of zip in the first two periods, but they settled down after intermission.

Although Larry Woodcock's opening night as the new Whittemore-Prescott coach was spoiled, the Cardinal offense led by Ron

Herriman picked up seven yards in two plays and Halfback Ernie Lixey punched through the middle for four yards to hit touchdown territory. End Herb Humphrey's kick from placement sailed through the uprights, but an off-sides penalty nullified the extra point. His second try was short and Tawas led 12-0 at the half.

The third period found Tawas going nowhere against Whittemore-Prescott's defense and Collier got the Braves out of trouble twice with long punts on third down quick kick situations.

Tawas' offense again warmed late in the third period after Guard Larry Killey recovered a fumble on T-35. In eight carries, the Braves set up the score with Herriman, three by Lixey, five by Collier, four by Lixey, two by Jim Smith (penalized five yards), eight yards by Collier and 10 by Lixey.

Herriman then cracked through for 25 yards off tackle to score. The extra point attempt from placement by Humphrey was good.

Final score of the game came with Tawas' entire second string seeing action. Jim Smith picked up nine yards in two plays and Lear scampered 10 yards for a first down. This set the stage for a picture play by Sophomore Quarterback Dale Harten. Rolling out to his right, Harten hit Smith with a jump pass, the play going 42 yards for a touchdown.

After a scoreless first half, Onaway scored a touchdown on a good run by Chum Elderich, fullback.

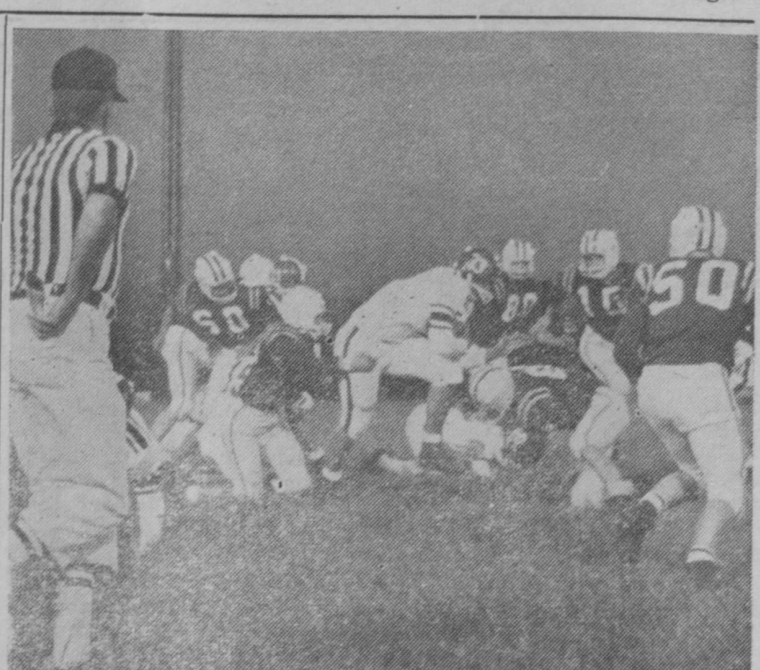

What Lures The Waterfowler?
Trophies Look High?

TROPHIES

look high?

Does a mounted head look too high to you? A prize rack of horns seem beyond your reach? Look again. You may be closer to a trophy than you think.

Fact is, in spite of booming human population pressures, there are still places in this country where sportsmen can go after more big game than their grandfathers could—and practice conservation in the bargain.

Popular belief to the contrary, the whitetail deer is not a lover of the forest primeval. He prefers young, brushy woodlands, especially those with irregular edges and openings, so he follows close on the heels of lumbering and small-scale farming. Thus there are many more whitetails in the United States today than there were 100 years ago.

As a matter of fact, the whitetail is present in such numbers in some spots that he threatens to eat himself out of house and home. As state after state seeks to crop its deer herd down to the capacity of its deer range, we are seeing regulations that permit the shooting of either sex over an extended season, and in areas close to big cities where the crack of a rifle has not been heard for a generation.



In the western states the mule deer takes the place of the whitetail. He, too, is thriving where intelligent management practices can be followed.

More and more hunters are also experiencing the thrill of going after two other trophy species in the west. One is the elk, or wapiti, he of the rocking-chair horns, now present again in good numbers in and around Wyoming. The other target is the antelope, or pronghorn, the only American representative of a family with many famous branches in Africa. You don't have to "pack in" to reach these animals, but it's well to have a rifle with a long, flat trajectory and a scope sight.

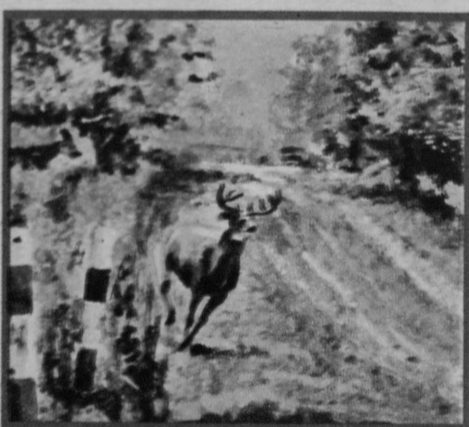
The black bear, too, is back again on the list of shootable animals in many states. Oddly enough, it is tourist garbage dumps that are responsible for the jump in his population.

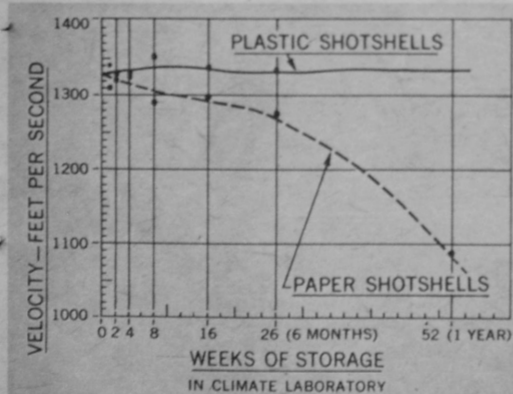

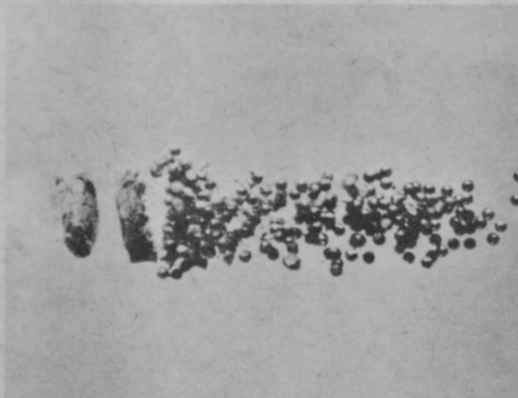

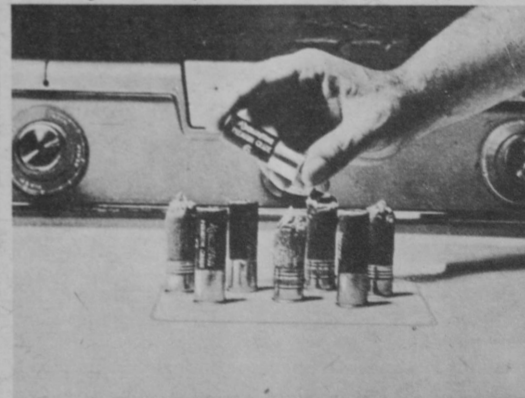

what lures the WATERFOWLER?

Faced this fall with some of the most stringent regulations in history, you might think waterfowlers would call it quits! Not so. Across the country they are counting the hours to opening day as eagerly as ever.

This is because a duck hunt is not just a simple sporting event. It is a great *American ritual*. Its special lure lies in its secret incantations, esoteric garments, and sacred proceedings.

The ceremony begins early in August, with the re-painting of decoys and the camouflaging of boats and blinds, all according to a routine as immutable as a baptism. Caught up in the spell, the duck hunter spends hours staring into sporting store windows or practicing on his duck call.

On a late fall night the ancient ceremony will approach its peak. To keep a date with a storm front moving down from Canada, the hunter flees the city in frantic haste.

The shore of a hidden lake is his lodge room. In the total dark that precedes the dawn he loads his skiff by instinct and paddles off. At an appropriate spot he assumes a kneeling position, tosses out the decoys, and mutters a supplication to the gods of the chase.

Off to the east the dawn is wrestling with the night on a mat of low-hanging clouds. The hunter hunkers down in the cattails to wait—and wait. At last out of the west there comes the sussurant sound of winnowing wings. A flock of mallards has joined the ceremony. To the waterfowler this is living. Nothing can match his personal excitement over a batch of feathered beauties coming into range of his buckshot.

Cautiously the ducks look over the set. As they flare they hear a plaintive chuckle from a call. A half-dozen break off and come sideslipping down.



This is the climax of the ritual. No matter how many times he has been initiated, to the waterfowler it is always a breathtaking experience. For him no other occasion is so fraught with primeval drama. For one awful moment there is nothing in time but the hunter, a little stretch of wind-swept pothole, and a huddle of wild waterfowl. For a magic moment he looks right into the eye of nature.

The firing of his gun is strictly anti-climactic, like the benediction after a sermon. If he misses, the waterfowler doesn't care. The ducks have fought a good fight, and he has kept the faith.

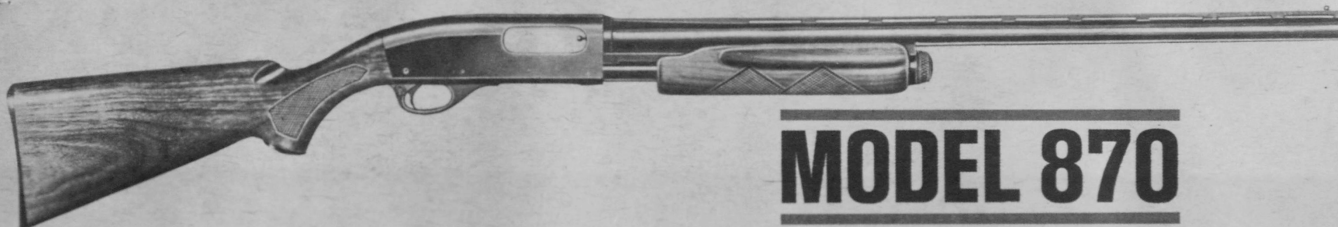

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Wild Game—Regale

When the hunters return with their game bags filled, you'll want to prepare for those conquerors, a wild game feast extraordinary. And, here are four suggestions to make your hunting table unforgettable.

These wild game recipes have been tested and tried by hunters and hunters' chefs. There's no knack to preparing a wild game meal. Cooking wild game can be fun, but eating it is even more enjoyable. Just think, pheasant under glass in your own dining room.

WILD RICE AMANDINE EN CASSEROLE

Wash 2 cups wild rice in several changes of cold water and drain. Heat $\frac{1}{2}$ cup olive oil or butter, stir in 2 tablespoons each chopped onion and chives, 3 tablespoons chopped green pepper. Stir the mixture into the rice and cook over a very gentle heat stirring constantly, until the rice begins to turn yellowish. Stir in 4-4 $\frac{1}{2}$ cups hot chicken broth or game stock, made with the bones and trimmings. Season to taste with salt and freshly ground pepper and lastly add $\frac{1}{2}$ cup blanched, shredded almonds. Turn the mixture into a casserole and bake, covered at 300 for 45 minutes or until rice is tender.

BROILED TOMATOES, DEVILED

Cut in half 6 medium-sized tomatoes of uniform shape. Sprinkle each with salt and pepper and a few grains of cayenne, top with bread crumbs and dot with bits of butter. Place on broiling rack. Mash finely with a fork 1 hard cooked egg. Add and mix 3 tablespoons soft butter, $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon prepared mustard, salt, pepper, 3 drops Tabasco sauce, 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce, 1 teaspoon sugar and 2 tablespoons wine vinegar. Stir in 1 large egg slightly beaten. Cook in double boiler, stirring constantly for 3 or 4 minutes or until mixture thickens. Remove from heat and allow to stand.

Put the tomato halves under the flame of the broiler and broil until the crumbs brown, top each half with a spoonful of the deviled sauce.

ROAST WILD DUCK PROVENCALE

Soak one dozen pitted ripe olives for one hour in a little olive oil flavored with a sliver of garlic.

Melt 4 tablespoons butter in a skillet, add one onion and 3 stalks of celery, all finely chopped, and saute them until soft. Remove the skillet from the fire, add $\frac{1}{2}$ cup toasted bread crumbs, the olives, 2 teaspoons cognac and salt and pepper to taste.

Divide the stuffing between two wild ducks, truss the ducks and butter the breasts generously, sprinkle with salt and pepper. Place the ducks on a rack in a roasting pan, pour over them $\frac{1}{2}$ cup red wine and $\frac{1}{4}$ cup water. Roast in a 450 oven for about 30 minutes, basting frequently. Lower heat to 300 and cook for one hour, covered.

Skim off the fat from the pan juices, stir in $\frac{1}{2}$ tablespoon cornstarch mixed to a paste with a little water. Stir until the gravy is thickened. Add two tablespoons butter, do not boil. Pour the gravy over ducks.

PHEASANT LA CHASSEUR

1 pheasant	4 green onions
Salt	1 ounce brandy
Pepper	1 cup dry white wine
Lemon juice	2 fresh tomatoes, peeled
1 tablespoon butter	$\frac{1}{2}$ cup chicken broth
1 tablespoon olive oil	$\frac{1}{4}$ cup minced parsley
1 dozen mushrooms	Pinch tarragon

Cut pheasant in serving pieces, rub the pieces with lemon juice, salt and pepper. In a heavy iron skillet put the butter and olive oil, when hot brown the pheasant until golden. Then add mushrooms, onions (including the tops), brandy, wine, tomatoes (chopped), chicken broth and parsley. Cover and cook over a gentle fire for $\frac{1}{2}$ hour to 1 hour depending on the age of the pheasant—or until tender. Before serving, sprinkle with tarragon.
