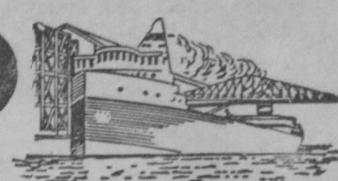

## 2,000 Fans Attend Final Racing Card

Veteran stock car driver, Rick Zettle of West Branch, won his third season-end championship trophy race Saturday night at Whittemore Speedway. A field of 13 stock cars was entered.

A crowd of nearly 2,000 racing fans saw Zettle maneuver his car No. 16 between two other entries to take over the lead in the 17th lap. He then headed the field with ease through the remaining 45 laps.

The 32-year-old West Branch refinery worker won his first championship trophy race at Whittemore 10 years ago. Radiator trouble had forced him out of the year-end features during the two previous years.

Finishing behind Zettle were Bob Kingen of West Branch and Moe Margrave of Oscoda, who headed the pack until Zettle made his move in the 17th.

Winner of the road car trophy was Mike Holstein of Skidway Lake. Other leaders in the 18-car field were John Gordon of AuGres, second, while Eddie Spencer of Whittemore placed third.

Heat race winners in the stock car preliminaries were Margrave, Donald Swain of National City and Ray Laney of Bay City. Swain, whose car cooked out in the feature, also annexed the Australian pursuit.

## Schools Are Open; Drive With Care

With the reopening of schools in Michigan and more than two million students in the daily traffic flow, state police are cautioning motorists that extra care is again required to avoid accidents in school and residential areas and where they see the familiar yellow school buses.

About 193,000 children are going to school for the first time. Less experienced in traffic than other older students, some of these first-timers may impulsively neglect their own safety in crossing streets and roads, it was emphasized.

Citing the need for increased vigilance whenever there are children in or near traffic, the state police point out that 104 children under 15 years of age were killed in car-pedestrian accidents in Michigan last year and another 3,504 injured. Also in the same age group, 24 bicyclists were killed and 1,581 injured.

Traffic in the vicinity of school buses is especially hazardous in rural areas. In 496 rural school bus accidents last year, two children were killed and 347 other persons, including adults, injured.

Michigan law requires motorist to stop for school bus. (See CAUTION, page 10.)

## Two-Car Collision is Fatal to Three

Three persons are dead as the result of injuries received Saturday afternoon in a two-car crash at the M-65-M-55 intersection in Western Iosco County. Four others were injured in the same crash.

Dead are John H. Hallwood and his wife, Marie, both 59 years old, and Geraldine Hart, 19, of Mikado. Hallwood died at 5:30 p. m. Saturday, one hour after the crash, while his wife died two hours later.

Miss Hart never regained consciousness after the crash and died Sunday night.

Two ambulances were required to transport the accident victims to Tolfree Hospital, West Branch. Injured were William J. Mann, 28, Twining, chest and left leg injuries; Marvin Hart, 16, Mikado, Geraldine's brother, abrasions and internal injuries; Ronald Gratopp, 27, Sterling, back injury; Harriet E. Houfek, 28, Turner, face lacerations.

Investigating officers said that Hallwood ran a stop light at the intersection and his car was struck broadside by Mann. No skid marks were left by the Flint vehicle and only 20 feet of tire marks were left by the other car.

From his hospital bed at West Branch, Mann told officers he did not see the Hallwood vehicle until it was directly in front of him. This was the only serious auto accident in Iosco County over the Labor Day week-end.

## 6,252 Pupils Return to Iosco's Public and Parochial Schools

All Iosco County public schools opened for the fall term Tuesday morning with a half-day session.

An estimated 5,848 youngsters were expected to return to their studies at the four schools, Tawas Area, Whittemore-Prescott Area, Hale Area and Oscoda Area.

Also returning to classrooms were children attending four parochial schools in the Tawas. These students also had half-day sessions Tuesday.

Total enrollment in the four parochial schools is 404.

Donald Sebald, principal of Emanuel Lutheran School, reports an enrollment Tuesday of 79 pupils while Dick Leu, Zion Lutheran School principal, reports 36 pupils.

As of Tuesday afternoon, there were 179 pupils enrolled at St. Joseph's School, East Tawas, while there are 110 enrolled at Immaculate Heart of Mary School, Tawas City.

Sister Juliana is principal at St. Joseph's School and Sister Clara is Immaculate Heart of Mary School principal.

## Police Laud East Tawas Teen-Ager for Honesty

An East Tawas teen-ager was commended for his honesty Sunday by Michigan State Police.

William Solomon, 13, son of Mrs. Elsie Solomon, 205 Wadsworth Street found some money on the sidewalk in front of Marion's Dairy Bar. Clarence Krueger, owner, immediately notified the East Tawas post.

Officers did not disclose the amount of money found by young Solomon. They are attempting to learn the rightful owner.

## Hale Area Voters to Hear School Proposal Discussion

A public meeting is to be held Friday night to acquaint voters of Hale Area School District with the proposed \$135,000 school bond election slated October 5.

The board of education has asked voters to authorize issuance of bonds in the above amount in order to erect, furnish and equip an additional elementary building and to remodel the present elementary wing.

The proposed bond issue, if approved, would be financed by a levy not to exceed two mills for 10 years. Any increase in the total district valuation, consisting of the Townships of Plainfield, Reno and Grant in Iosco County plus Hill and Logan Townships in Ogemaw County, could reduce the average annual levy.

Included in the program would

be a separate six-room elementary building to house grades kindergarten through fourth. It would also have a boiler room, teacher's supply and storage room.

The program would include remodeling of five rooms in the present elementary wing to provide a music room, science room, a combination library-study area and one high school classroom.

The building program would provide the necessary number of teaching stations and relieve crowded conditions that now exist. It would also provide adequate facilities in special areas, including instrumental and vocal music, all the physical sciences, library and reference material

area open to the students as well as a combined library-study area.

Estimated costs of the \$135,000 bond issue are as follows: New building, 7,200 square feet, \$93,600; remodeling existing elementary wing, \$8,000; planning and supervision (architect), \$6,100; septic tank and field, \$4,000; legal fees, \$2,000; bond qualifications, \$500; builders risk insurance, \$1,000; capitalized interest, \$3,000; library and science equipment, \$12,000; contingencies, \$1,800; site development, \$3,000.

Hale Area School District has no bonded indebtedness at the present time.

Property owners must be registered with township clerks to be eligible for the election. Registrations will be accepted until 5:00 p. m. today, September 5.

## Old-Timers Set Attendance Record

Largest number of participants in the history of old-timers' day baseball games here turned out for Sunday's annual event at the Tawas City Athletic Field.

A total of 40 former Northeastern Michigan League players took part in the two games scheduled, while another 18 old-timers registered and watched from the grandstand.

One of the oldest present was Fred Whitehouse of Turner, who sponsored and managed teams in

One of the featured attractions was a display of pictures showing baseball teams of past years furnished by the Tawas Herald. Whitehouse also provided a display of pictures showing former Turner teams, along with old newspaper clippings.

Two veteran NEM pitchers were honored during the day. Dan Metiva of Standish, one-armed pitcher of 40 or more years ago

## Chamber Starts Final Membership Campaign

Tawas Chamber of Commerce started a drive last week to complete its 1962 membership campaign. Dues paid this year entitle members to be included in 1963 advertising and promotions.

"Need for an active chamber of commerce to promote our own local area is increasing with importance each year," states Chamber President Roy J. McMurray. "We must promote the Tawas area in order to lure travelers off Michigan's freeways. The only way this can be accomplished is through a concerted effort by all local businessmen and resort operators," he stated.

As of last week, the chamber had 102 paid members, as compared to 151 members last year.

McMurray estimated that there is a potential of 275 members in the area.

Captains of the membership campaign are Arthur Wuggazer for Tawas City and Carl Thunberg for East Tawas. Wuggazer's co-captain is Edward Nelkie, while Lyle Mooney is assisting Thunberg.

Membership lists have been distributed to the campaign committee and contacts are being made this week.

## Consumers Power Co. to Honor Employees for Safety Record

Consumers Power Company's Bay City Division employees have chalked up two major safety milestones for their company, Division Manager Louis A. Vaupre revealed Saturday.

Tuesday, the 599 men and women, who help provide electric and gas service in a large area of Northeastern Michigan, completed a perfect accident-free work year. Just two weeks earlier, they had passed the one millionth, consecutive man-hour of work without an accident.

Mr. Vaupre said the employees will be honored for their outstanding achievement at two special dinner meetings. One will be held September 18 at the Holland Hotel for the Tawas area employees and a similar dinner will be held September 19 at the Wagoner Hotel for the Bay City-Midland area employees.

## Storm Strands Six on Island; Rescued by Coast Guard

A United States Coast Guard crew from Tawas Point rescued six persons who were stranded on Charity Island Monday night.

Mr. and Mrs. Emmett R. Cecil of East Tawas and a party of Detroit friends had used Cecil's 20-foot inboard cruiser to take them to the island.

No sooner had they landed when a sudden storm churned water of Saginaw Bay into waves several feet in height. In an effort to prevent damage to the boat, Cecil and Ronald Zemke took the boat out into deeper water while the others stayed on the island.

The storm continued and Cecil was forced to return to Tawas Bay, fearing that his craft would run out of gas.

In the meantime, Robert Brookbank of East Tawas, who had seen the Cecls leave port earlier in the day, notified the Tawas Point Lifeboat Station that the boat had not returned.

A cutter was dispatched and it met Cecil on his return to Tawas—minus six of his passengers. Coastguardsmen continued on to the island where a small skiff was used to rescue those who were stranded. The rescue was completed at 9:30 p. m.

## BUSINESSMEN TO INSPECT BELL TELEPHONE BUILDING

Tawas City Businessmen's Association will visit Michigan Bell Telephone Company's new office building on Oak Street September 12.

An invitation was extended to the businessmen last Thursday by Patrick F. Lawless of the telephone firm.

The new building, completed earlier this year, cost the firm more than \$50,000.

## New Lighted Field for W-P Cardinals

A new lighted football field will soon go into use for the first time at Whittemore-Prescott Area High School.

Constructed and financed through a joint effort of the school district and area residents, the new field is one of the best lighted football plants in Northeastern Michigan.

Planning started last year when a group of citizens representing the school's athletic booster club told the board of education they would raise \$1,000 annually for such a field if the board would match that amount.

An agreement was reached and the athletic boosters started a fund-raising campaign. The club gains about \$400 annually from the sale of coffee and doughnuts at basketball games.

The \$1,000 provided by the school district is to be repaid to the school's general fund over a period of years through gate receipts and rental.

## Farmers Do Not Believe in Govt. Control Says FB

"The vote in the 1962 wheat referendum indicates that farmers do not believe government control programs are the answer," said the Michigan Farm Bureau in a statement issued Friday.

A Michigan Farm Bureau spokesman pointed out that, "With an estimated 40,000 eligible to vote in Michigan, only about one out of eight bothered to go to the polls.

"Only 3,000 out of 40,000 believed enough in the marketing quota program with higher price supports to vote for it. "In 1961, about 5,000 Michigan wheat farmers voted for marketing quotas, but this year the number had fallen to 3,000.

"The vote is further evidence that farmers do not believe in a government controlled and subsidized agriculture. It repudiates the recent vote on the farm bill by Michigan's Senators Hart and McNamara."

The statement from the Farm Bureau, Michigan's largest farm organization, continued, "While nationally the vote gave a slim approval for the continuation of market quotas, the declining support for the program should give President Kennedy and Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman another reading of farmer resistance to a controlled, policed agriculture.

"Coming on top of the defeat of the administration food and farm control bill, the rejection of marketing orders by turkey growers and the disgust generated by the Billie Sol Estes type of disclosure, there should be little doubt in the minds of anyone—the administration, congress or the public—that farmers do not want a Khrushchev-type agriculture in America."

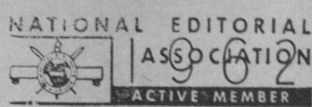

## Changing Vacation Travel Habits Bring Headaches

(Part III of a six-part series dealing with the current status of Michigan's vast tourist industry.)

When vacancies occur at resorts during July and August, operators sit up and take notice, and in parts of Northern Michigan, a growing number of vacancies are appearing during this traditionally "full house" period. Similar conditions prevail at restaurants, motels, hotels and other establishments in well-known tourist centers. Taking notice of this phenomena is one thing; correcting it is another.

Are people giving up their two-week vacations at housekeeping resorts and taking to the road? The answer is yes.

The reasons causing this change can be narrowed down to a few vital factors:

1. Better highways and automobiles allow people to travel further, faster and safer than ever before, thus they are seeing more, doing more, wanting more; all of which hurts the weekly vacation trade at resorts.

2. Traditional housekeeping cottages are not fulfilling the desires of American vacation travelers today as they did in past years.

3. Competing vacation resorts in other states and Canada are being more successful in attracting would-be Michigan vacationers to their respective areas along with many who used to vacation in Michigan.

We can retain and increase weekly resort business by point of origin advertising (getting the message to the vacation planners in their homes) telling of our upgraded resort facilities and activities, plus our improved hos-

pitality and urging reservations to be made. Then, the highway will be used to bring people to a resort for a week or more, not through the state in a two-day trip.

The fact that some people are no longer buying what Michigan resorts have to offer is an appalling one. But we can do something about it.

Changes can be incorporated into the offerings of the resort operators. Travelers today want the finest in personal accommodations. This means they want beds and bathrooms as good as at home; cooking equipment as good as at home, all at a lakeside or riverside location. They want their kids to have play equipment and safe, sandy beaches, water skiing, boats, programs at nature interpretation and the like. Fishing has not lost its appeal but it is not necessarily the major attraction at a resort as in past years. People want more and varied things to do.

Cost more? You bet it does. A complete set of new kitchen utensils or beach equipment costs money to the operator. Can he afford it? The answer to this question today is that the operator cannot afford not to spend money for new equipment and furnishings or the vacancies will soon put him out of business.

Much can be done with ingenuity and elbow-grease. Marking a nature trail at a resort is relatively simple and inexpensive. Play equipment can be constructed from salvage lumber and/or logs. Inexpensive indoor games can also be made cheaply to fill the bill.

Being a resort host today calls for increasing knowledge of the historic lore and natural beauty spots of the region, of indoor and outdoor games for youngsters, plus an investment in the desired equipment necessary to answer these desires. Increased personal attention to guests by the resort host is absolutely required today.

Resort hosts in other states and in Canada are doing these things, and they are becoming more and more successful in attracting would-be (or old) Michigan vacationers to their areas. They are answering the challenge of changing vacation habits and are proudly promoting this fact.

While many in Michigan are doing an outstanding job, there are many that are not. Unless changes are made soon, the trend will continue to give us vacancies at many of our resorts in the summer months.

These changes are real and are here today; they must be met. We have too much invested in our resorts not to fight back. We all should be interested because, when the resorts are not filled, the local stores, shops and entertainment spots are not doing the business either. We have got the natural attractions in abundance. We must adjust our man-made facilities and our human hosting abilities if we are to continue as a major tourist state.

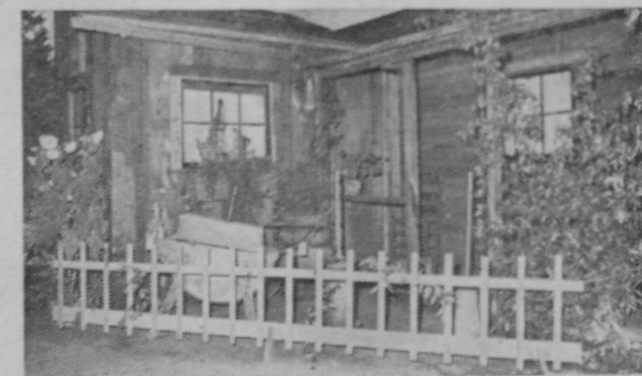

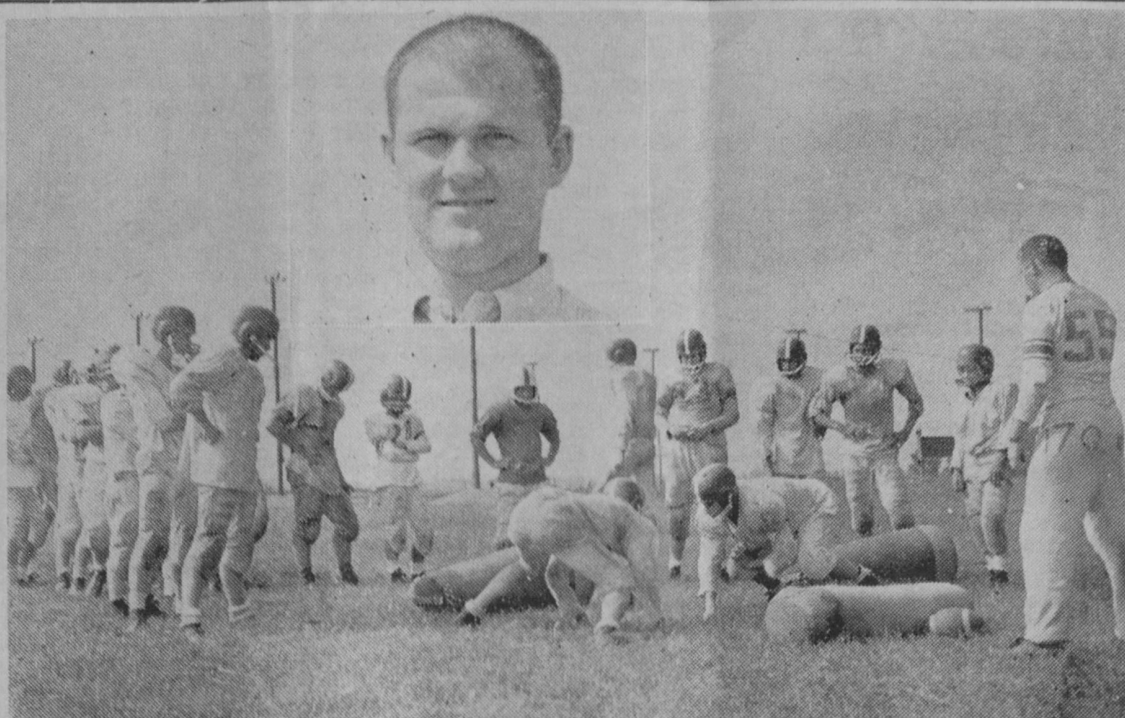

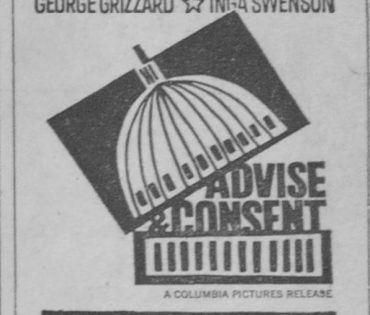
