

# Fire Chief Retires After Long Service

After being associated with the Tawas City Fire Department for nearly 45 years, Chief Fred Musolf handed in his resignation last week. His retirement was for reasons of health.

Musolf, who has been associated with a city function longer than any other person in its history, started as a volunteer fireman in the early 1920s.

He recalled last week that purchase of the city's first fire truck touched off one of the most violent controversies ever heard on the city council.

Musolf joined the department on arrival of the new apparatus mounted on a Model T Ford truck chassis. It was first used on a fire at the Tawas Creamery Company, located on the present-day site of Buhlitz Oil Company on US-23.

"The pump was so weak that we had to knock out windows with nozzles," recalled Musolf. "The truck was put out of commission when it overheated and we lost the building."

A short time later, Tawas City purchased a new American LaFrance fire truck, which Musolf described as a "real pumper" but rather difficult to move about. Its rear wheels were chain driven and it had hard rubber tires.

In those days, the city hall and fire barn was located near the Mathews Street bridge. A bell atop the building called volunteers to fires.

Musolf first served as a line-man pulling fire hoses, then moved up in ranks to second nozzlemans and later to first position on the hoses.

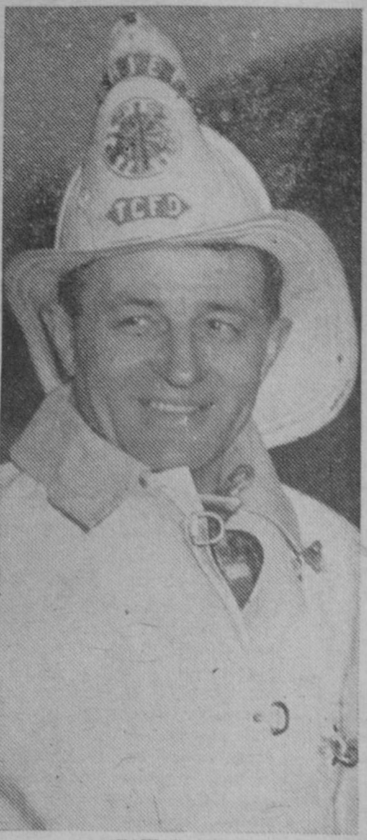
He became assistant fire chief serving under Abram Frank and for more than 20 years has served as fire chief. He also served on the water board during his tenure as fire chief.

Actually, Musolf's interest in the fire department goes back to the year 1919, when, as a young man, he helped to operate the city's old hand-pumper on a fire which destroyed most of Tawas City's business district.

With his experience in that fire, Musolf has seen the department grow from one piece of hand-operated equipment to its present-day facilities of two modern fire trucks and a tanker.

In paying tribute to the retiring fire chief this week, Mayor George Tuttle said that residents of Tawas City owe a debt of gratitude to Musolf and other members of the fire department, past and present.

"For years, Fred has been on call at all hours of the day and night in his capacity as a volunteer fireman. He has taken great pride in this important civic responsibility and his service to the people of Tawas City for these many years should not go unrecognized."

## James Lansky is Appointed TC Fire Chief

James Lansky, a member of the Tawas City Fire Department since 1950, was appointed fire chief Monday night by Mayor George Tuttle. His selection, along with other committee appointments, was approved by the city council.

Lansky had served as assistant fire chief since 1954. Daniel Ulrich was named assistant chief last week by a vote of the fire department.

A letter of appreciation is to be sent to Fred Musolf for his many years of service as a fireman. Alderman Cecil Cable was named mayor pro tem by the council, but not before a confusing situation resulted in voting. Cable was nominated by Alderman William Murray and seconded by Alderman Daniel Ulrich.

The name of Alderman Earl Davis was placed in nomination by Alderman Clyde Evril, but no second was received. A roll call had yes votes cast by Aldermen Howard Hatton, Murray and Ulrich. Cable, Davis and Evril abstained from voting.

Clerk Walter Nelson again called the roll after Mayor Tuttle pointed out that all members must vote on the question. Evril withdrew his motion in favor of Davis and Cable was elected.

Position of city attorney was left vacant. The city has been unable to find a successor to Jerry Cotter.

## Otis D. Love is New Co. Road Engineer

Otis D. Love, 53, has been appointed county engineer by the Iosco Road Commission. His appointment was effective April 9.

Before coming to Iosco, Love had a varied experience in the heavy construction field as engineer for highway, airport and bridge contractors and had served three years as engineer for the Kalkaska County Road Commission.

He had been employed by the consulting civil engineering firm of Spalding and DeDecker and Associates of Birmingham for the past two years.

Love is a graduate mining engineer from the Michigan College of Mining and Technology, Houghton, and a registered professional civil engineer and land surveyor in Michigan and Arizona.

## Zoning Question Back to Planners

A recommendation from the city planning commission to rezone industrial property in the Second Ward to residential has been returned to that group for further study. A meeting is scheduled Wednesday (tonight).

At Monday night's meeting of the Tawas City Council, Supt. Reginald Buhlitz reported that, on direction of the council at its last meeting, he had contacted former city attorney, Jerry Cotter, for advice on the matter.

According to Buhlitz, the former city attorney said he would be unable to act as the city's legal advisor because of his present business.

The property in question is the former location of Huron Rustic Furniture Company on First Street. A group of neighboring property owners requested that the property be rezoned residential, allowing present industry under a non-conforming use.

It was reported that Cotter felt that such a change in zoning may be challenged in court. He recommended appointment of some other attorney to take the case. On reviewing present statutes, Cotter told Buhlitz that changing

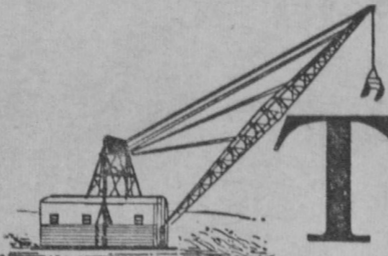
the zoning may be illegal and said a loss in court might jeopardize the city's position on complete rezoning of the city. He questioned the legality of non-owners asking the city to rezone another owner's property. He also believed that from a practical standpoint, the present owner would not build contrary to proposed rezoning of the city.

On motion of Alderman Howard Hatton, the matter was returned to the planning commission. It was his thought that the city council should not give a definite answer at this time and that the city's planning consultant may be able to offer legal advice.

In other business, transfer of the Tawas Cab Company franchise from John Wehrman back to George and Vivian Duff was approved by the council.

Authorization was given to purchase 10 car loads of gravel for use on city streets.

Building applications approved during the past week were as follows: Charles Landon, construct 27 by 66 home on First Avenue, \$8,000; Perry Crooker, 175 East Lake Street, construct screen between buildings, \$175.

## '64 County Budget Set at \$310,954.12

A preliminary budget of \$310,954.12 for 1964 county operation was approved Monday by the Iosco Board of Supervisors. With \$25,000 in anticipated fees from county offices, \$285,954.12 would be raised by taxation.

One year ago, the board's finance and apportionment committee brought in a preliminary budget of \$316,057.89, but by the October session this had been pared to \$283,677.

L. S. Little, chairman of the board's finance committee, said Monday that the county's 1964 budget would probably again be reduced before final approval at the October session.

He said, however, that the 1964 budget contained several contingencies, one of which was the low amount paid out last year to state institutions. The board had allocated \$25,000 for state institutions under its 1963 budget and only \$11,000 was expended.

In past years, this fund had been depleted before the budget period ended and for this reason the same allocation was made this year.

Slight increases were noted in nearly all county offices to cover rising costs of department expense.

The prosecuting attorney's budget was set at \$8,880, an increase of \$252; county treasurer, \$18,907, an increase of \$1,015; county clerk, \$14,315, an increase of \$108; sheriff's department, \$38,131, an increase of \$523.

The probate judge's budget remained at \$12,576, as did the drain commissioner's at \$1,700. The register of deed's budget was cut from \$14,212 to \$13,893. Iosco Extension Service was raised from \$5,750 to \$7,100. Iosco Circuit Court's budget was set at \$13,636.95, an increase of \$19.

Under the new budget, Iosco

Arenac Regional Library is to receive \$12,378.75, based on 75 cents per capita. This was the same increase voted last year by the board, but was reduced to 55 cents per capita at the October session when Arenac County's board voted to continue the same rate.

Social welfare's budget of \$22,000 last year was increased to \$25,000, while direct welfare was increased from \$20,000 to \$24,000.

The board of supervisors' budget was increased from \$12,000 to \$14,000, the county airport is to receive \$10,000, an increase of \$800.

## Group Formed to Study Hale's Sewer Problem

Plainfield Township has formed a four-man study committee to investigate the possibility of improving existing sewage facilities in the Village of Hale.

Named by the township board were Dennis Chrvia and James Mann. Two members selected by the Plainfield Township Board of Education were David Ormerod and Herman Mass. An additional two members are to be selected by the committee.

At present, a septic field serves the school and village. Negotiations are now under way to obtain the services of an engineering firm.

## Former Tawas Man Authors New Book

A new storybook for young children written by Dr. Leland B. Jacobs, a native of Tawas City, who now lives at Leonia, New Jersey, is to be published May 9. The book is entitled, "Good Night, Mr. Beetle."

Dr. Jacobs is a professor of elementary education at Columbia University Teachers' College, specializing in children's literature and language arts. He has been teaching 30 years.

He has written many articles in his special field, as well as a professional book, "Children and the Language Arts." He has also compiled an anthology of literature for elementary school children and his verse for children has appeared in several children's magazines.

Dr. Jacobs received his A. B. degree from Eastern Michigan College, his M. A. degree from the University of Michigan and Ph. D. from Ohio State University.

## Clean-Up Days

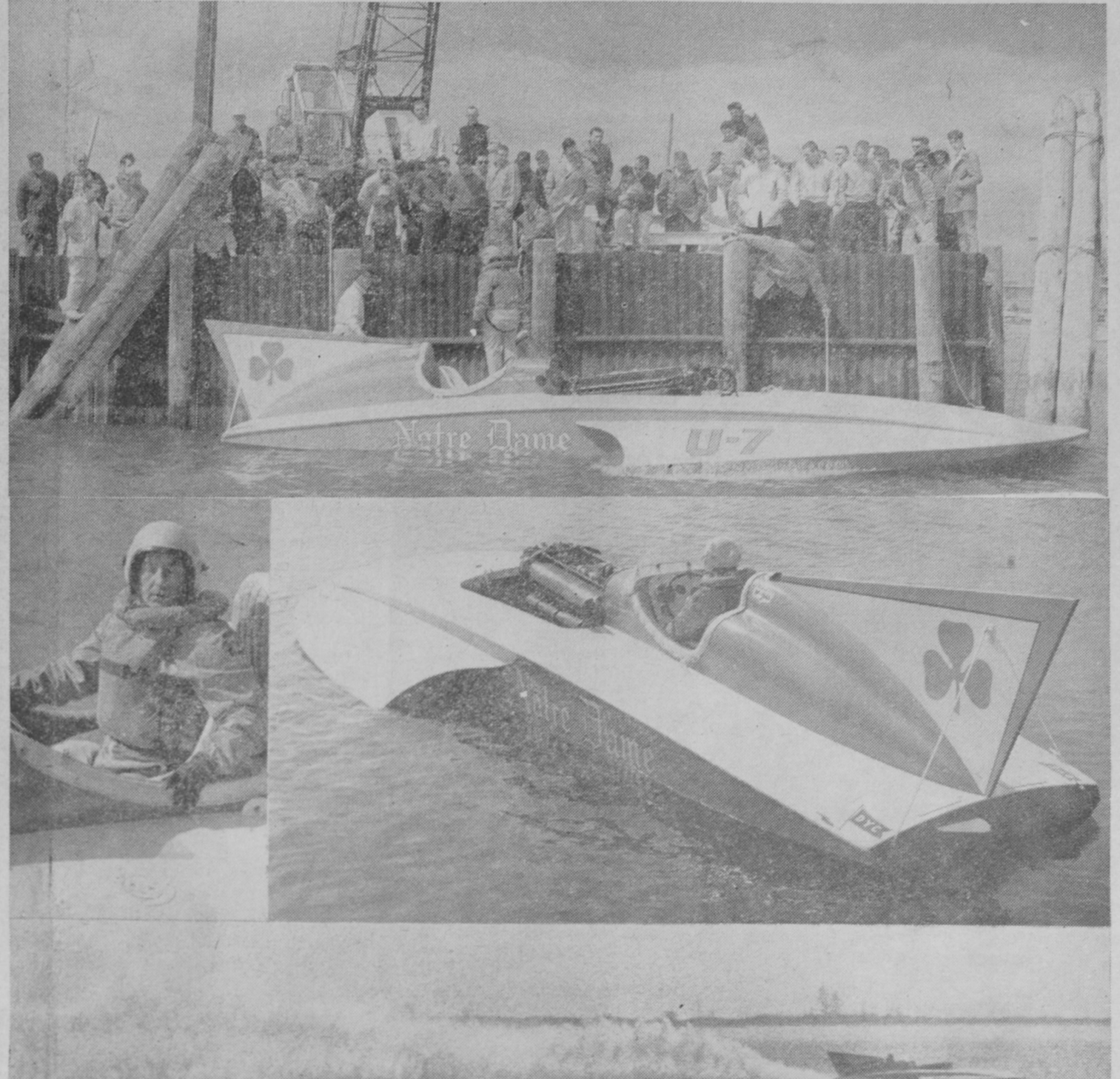

## Supervisors Approve Planning Commission

Establishment of a metropolitan Iosco County Planning Commission was approved Tuesday by a 16-1 roll call by the board of supervisors.

Chairman Henry Oates said that a commission, composed of from five to 11 members, would be appointed sometime Wednesday. A list of possible candidates is to be prepared by Marvin Davenport, cooperative extension director, who has been instrumental in organization of the group.

The commission, as outlined in Act 282, Public Acts of 1945 of the State of Michigan, was established to handle applications and other necessary details in connection with the federally-sponsored program of rural area development, agricultural readjustment and the accelerated public works program.

The board's resolution forming the new group said such a commission was necessary "because of the increased demand on the human and natural resources of

Iosco, because of the emphasis on the proper planning and use of resources.

Also discussed Tuesday morning was the possibility of sending a representative from Iosco County to a conference May 3 at Washington, D. C. United States Sen. Philip A. Hart has invited 200 Michigan mayors, chairmen of the

state's 83 county board's of supervisors and regional planning commission representatives to a one-day conference.

The conference would provide a greater understanding of federal program available to Michigan communities. It would also provide an opportunity for municipal and county officials to present problems to Washington officials.

It was reported that Arenac County is to send a delegate to this conference.

## DANGER STILL CRITICAL

Rain is expected to ease the critical dry condition in Michigan's north country this week. It has been 17 days since snow or rain has fallen and the forest fire danger is critical.

## Busy Schedule Set for East Tawas DPW

A progress report from Supt. Paul Roper indicated that the East Tawas Department of Public Works would have a busy schedule during the next few weeks.

Read at Monday night's meeting of the city council, the report indicated that coming projects would include cleaning the cemetery and park, prepare a planter at the city hall, construct a catch basin on Newman Street, curb and gutter and construct a catch basin on Westover Street from Main to Sawyer.

Also included is widening shoulders on State Street from Church to Wilkinson and gravel Wadsworth from Woodlawn north.

The council adopted a resolution calling for establishment of a special assessment district for financing sewer construction on Bay and Oak Streets. A hearing is scheduled May 20.

## Legislators Make Flying Inspection of Wurtsmith

More than 100 Michigan legislators visited Wurtsmith Air Force Base Tuesday for a briefing session and tour of facilities.

The legislature as a whole was extended an invitation by Strategic Air Command officials to be airlifted Tuesday morning to Wurtsmith for the session and then to be whisked back to Lansing in the afternoon.

The schedule began with the pickup at Lansing Airport of the legislators by crews of C-119s from Selfridge Air Force Base. They arrived at Wurtsmith about 10:00 a. m. and the lawmakers were addressed by Maj. Gen. Harold E. Humfeld, 40th Air Division commander.

Following Humfeld's talk, the lawmakers were given brief tours of the base and its facilities and viewed static displays of aircraft used by SAC and American Defense Command crews.

The legislators returned to Lansing and their duties at the Capitol at 2:00 p. m. It was the first time that the legislature as a

whole had been extended an invitation to visit the base.

Many lawmakers were in attendance in June 1961, when the first B-52 jet bombers were delivered to Wurtsmith.

## Council Approves Budget for 1963-64

A budget of \$92,260 for 1963-1964 was approved Monday night by the Tawas City Council. This was \$2,200 less than the budget of last year.

On closing the books March 31, the city had disbursements of \$93,084 during 1963-1964. It is anticipated that disbursements will be \$92,165 next year.

Property taxes collected last year amounted to \$31,186. Supt. Reginald Buhlitz, who prepares the annual budget, said the city's finances were nearly balanced last year. A balance of \$800 remained.

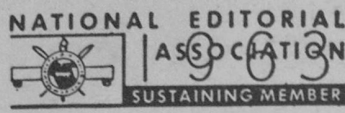

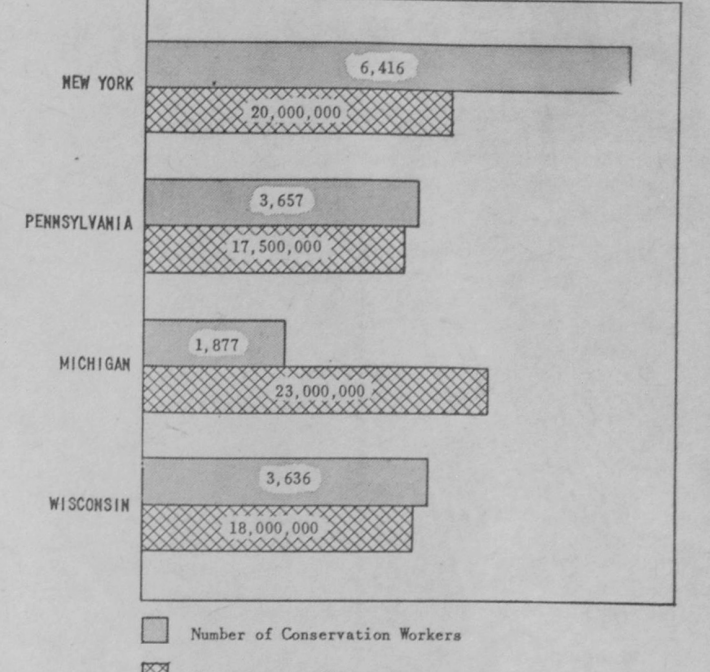

Land, Conservation, Manpower



The table above compares Michigan and three other "big" states as to their "wild land" acreage and manpower for conservation activities. Each state has sizable amounts of "wild land," large populations, and is highly popular among tourists. But notice the number of state workers involved in conservation work. Michigan is by far the lowest. It has for many years ranked at or near the top nationally in use of lands and waters by sportsmen. This state also consistently places high in game kill, in total dollar-volume of tourism, in state park use. Much of the basic research carried on in game, fish, and forestry work originated in this state. However, financial problems have in recent years weighed heavily against this record and hopes of further progress in Michigan's conservation movement. The Conservation Department is getting help from local groups on various projects, and reorganization plans are underway to make fuller use of its manpower and every piece of equipment. Yet, in face of rising costs, the Department cannot meet its pressing responsibilities in expanding the state's tourist industry unless more money is available to do the big job ahead.

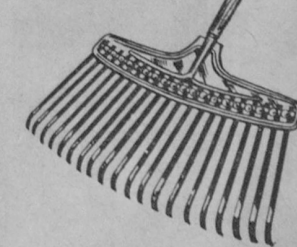

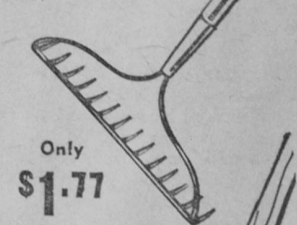

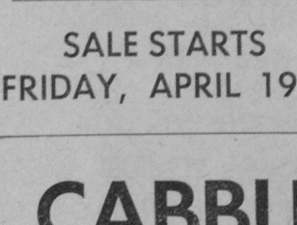

With the fire season at hand, there will be news bulletins on radio and television and words of warning in newspapers regarding the current "fire danger rating."

Many campers, fishermen, vacationists, travelers, farmers, resort owners and people in all walks of life will be reading and hearing of these fire danger ratings.

A few words explaining this fire danger, would be appropriate at this time.

Fire danger is also called burning index and refers to the total of the various factors which will determine how well a fire will burn and the difficulty of control of this fire. The term, fire danger, represents the combined probability of fires starting, spreading and doing damage at a given time.

Common factors used to determine the fire danger rating are wind velocity, relative humidity, the amount of rainfall or number of days since the last rainfall and the condition of grass and other vegetation.

A classification system has been devised for fire danger ratings. The system attempts to describe possible fire behavior at the different rating levels.

Safe, burning index of zero to one: Fire will not spread from a campfire or from burning slash.

Very low, burning index of two to three: Fires will spread from an unguarded campfire or a fire that has no line around it. However, fires spread slowly and may go out on their own accord.

Low, burning index of four to six: Fires will start readily and spread until controlled.

Moderate, burning index of seven to 12: Fires will start easily from a match, burn briskly and spread rapidly as they increase in size.

High, index of 12-24: Fires will start easily from a match or glowing cinder, spread rapidly and will burn into the crowns and branches of brush or young pine trees. A fire started at this rating would be difficult to stop.

Very high, index of 25-49: Fires will start from carelessly discarded cigarette butts or from sparks and spread quite rapidly. People in the woods at this time have to exercise a great deal of caution in using fire in any form.

Extreme, index of 50 and up:

This is the fire danger rating that all forestry men fear. Conditions are explosive. Fires start readily from any spark and are almost impossible to control during the heat of the day. When the forests are in such condition as this, restrictions may be placed on the use of recreation areas or other forest activities to help reduce the possibility of fires starting.

The present burning index in Iosco County presently stands at about 50-1. Area residents are cautioned that dry, windy weather calls for a special emergency alert to prevent the start of forest fires. Keep woodlands green, fires must be kept under control at all times.

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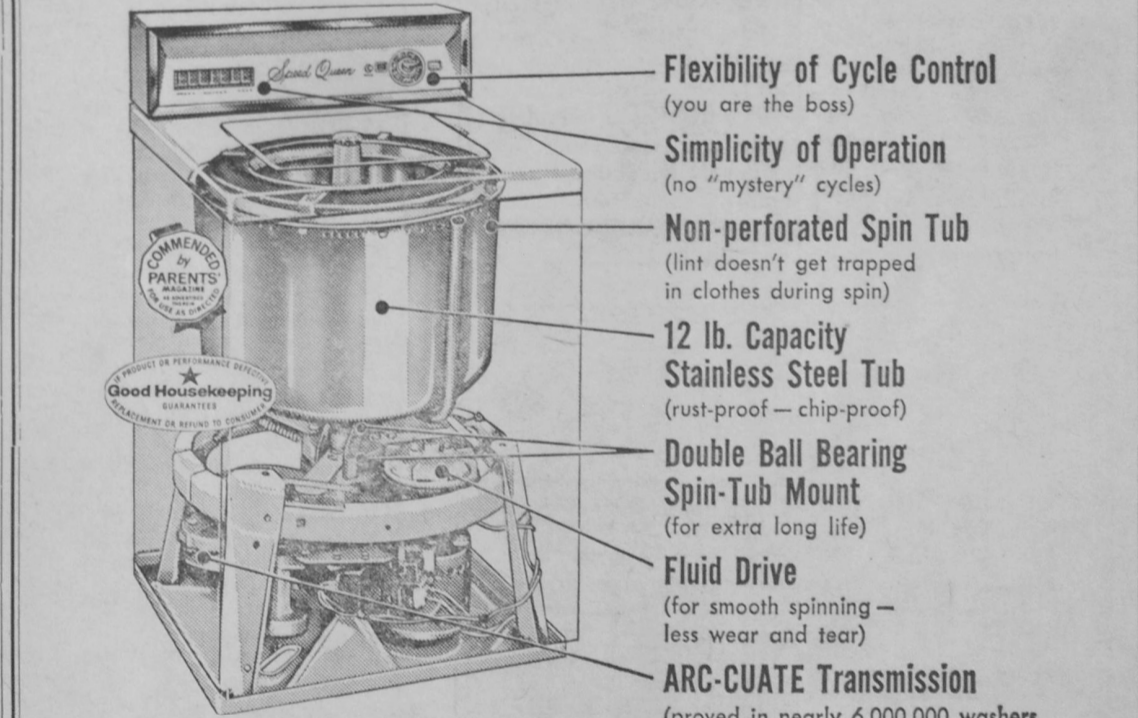

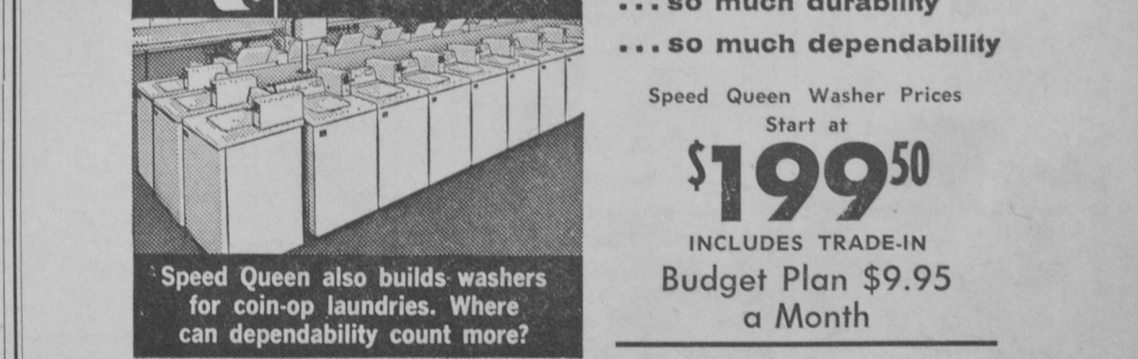

# NM Development Council Eyes Economic Expansion

Economic expansion in a 33-county area of Michigan, including Iosco County, is the goal of a Northern Michigan Development Council project which will start July 1.

Myrton Riggs, council president of Cheboygan, reports that the council's application to the Area Redevelopment Administration for a \$100,000 grant to carry out the project for the first year has been approved. The ARA project was announced recently by Senators Patrick McNamara and Philip A. Hart.

Riggs said the program will be carried directly to the counties by a three-man field staff.

In addition to industrial promotion, Riggs said the program will include efforts to promote and build Michigan's tourist and resort industry, development of the economic use of forest products and community development.

Communities in the northern half of Michigan's Lower Peninsula may avail themselves of the service which will use Central Michigan University's economic expansion center as its administrative headquarters executing most of the work in the counties themselves.

CMU will supplement the federal grant with \$18,000 in technical services through its schools of business administration, arts and sciences, health, physical education and recreation, and graduate studies.

Twenty-four counties in the Lower Peninsula area have been designated as eligible for ARA assistance. They include Alpena, Antrim, Arenac, Bay, Benzie, Charlevoix, Cheboygan, Clare, Crawford, Emmet, Grand Traverse, Kalkaska, Lake, Leelanau, Manistee, Mecosta, Missaukee, Montmorency, Oceana, Osceola, Otsego, Presque Isle, Roscommon and Wexford.

The economic expansion program will also assist business firms in Alcona, Gladwin, Iosco, Isabella, Mason, Midland, Newaygo, Ogemaw and Oscoda Counties which do not have an ARA designation but have economies closely related to those of neighboring redevelopment areas.

Among members of the Northern Michigan Development Council is Charles A. Pinkerton of East Tawas, president of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway.

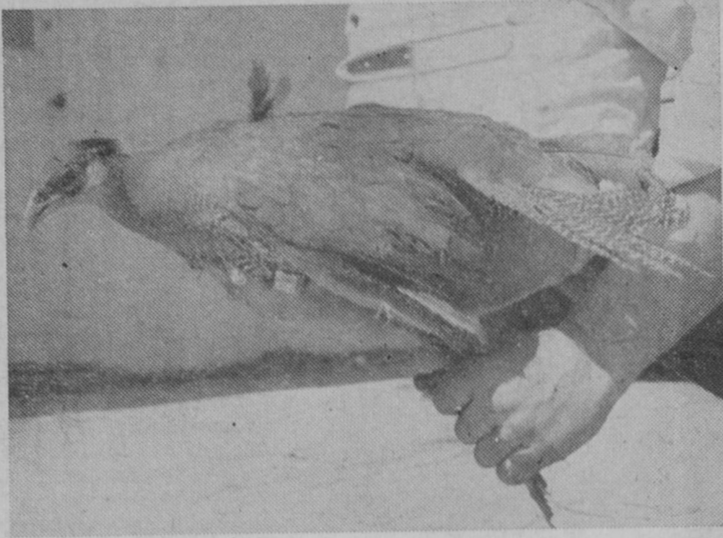

## 429,800 Visit Huron National Forest Recreation Areas

According to a report from Ranger Joseph Blake of Tawas District, Huron National Forest in Iosco County, had 429,800 visits for recreational use during 1962. The district has five picnic grounds and three camp grounds. Improvements last year included construction of 19 new units at the Monument campground, construction was started on the Monument picnic ground, while tables, fireplaces and parking lot were built at the Sand Lake picnic ground.

The district planted 550,000 red pine seedlings on 670 acres last year. Some 13,800 cords of pulpwood were sold to local operators. Blake said 11 fires burned 61 acres of forest land during 1962. "Prompt suppression action and the excellent cooperation of township fire departments and local people, prevented a much greater loss."

Wildlife activities included timber harvest to provide game foods, 78 acres of swamp were cut in four locations to provide browse, ponds were made in the Tuttle marsh with explosives to create duck ponds, aspen trees in the Tuttle marsh were progressively cut to furnish new sprouts for browse. The district also cooperated with the Michigan Department of Conservation on deer census.

A total of \$8,594.11 was returned to Iosco County, representing 25 percent of the district's gross receipts.

The district also provides a multiple use tour for vacationers and local residents. Ten miles in length, the tour consists of 10 stops where signs have been erected to show forest activity. The tour starts and stops at Lumbermen's Monument. Tour guides may be obtained at the monument or from the United States Forest Service, East Tawas.

The Tawas district employs six persons full-time and 12 persons seasonal.

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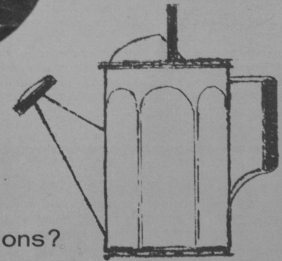
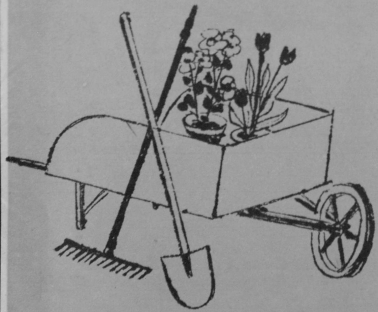

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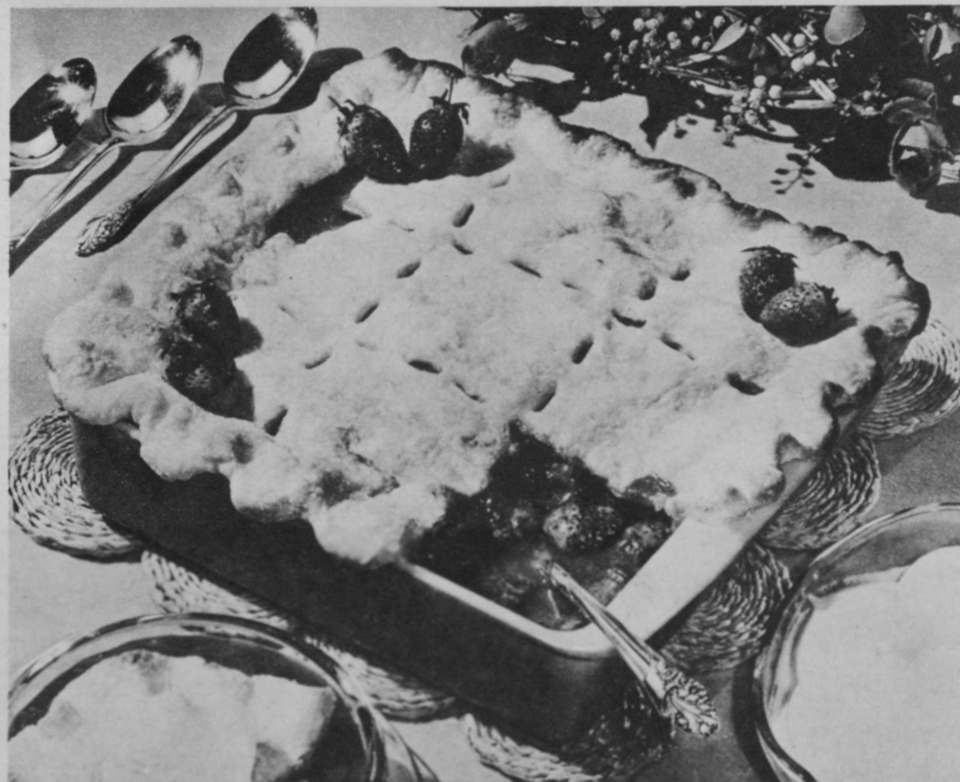
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# Springtime Specialties

But regardless of how she uses them, she'll add a special touch that is all her own to each springtime dish.



## DEEP-DISH STRAWBERRY PIE

### Five-Minute Pie Crust

2 cups flour  
1 teaspoon salt

$\frac{3}{4}$  cup lard  
 $\frac{1}{4}$  cup water

Combine flour and salt. Add lard and blend with pastry blender until mixture resembles coarse meal. Measure water right from the tap and add all at once to flour mixture. Press dough with knife until dough just holds together.

### Filling

4 cups strawberries, washed and capped  
 $\frac{1}{2}$  to 1 cup sugar (depending on sweetness of berries)

$\frac{1}{4}$  cup flour  
 $\frac{1}{8}$  teaspoon salt  
2 tablespoons butter or margarine

Mix sugar with flour and salt. Toss lightly with the berries. Fill a 1-quart baking dish with the fruit mixture and dot with butter. Top with the pastry which has been rolled out on pastry cloth to size 1 inch larger all around than top of baking dish. Flute edges and cut slashes in pastry to allow steam to escape. Bake in 425°F. oven for 25 minutes or until crust is browned. Serve slightly warm with plain or whipped cream.

## RHUBARB TURNOVERS

### Rhubarb Filling

2 cups sliced rhubarb  
 $\frac{1}{2}$  cup water

$\frac{1}{4}$  cup sugar  
3 tablespoons cornstarch

Combine rhubarb and water in saucepan and cook until rhubarb is tender (5 to 10 minutes). Mix sugar and cornstarch. Stir into rhubarb sauce and continue cooking until thickened and clear. Set aside to cool while making turnover dough. Makes about 1 $\frac{1}{2}$  cups filling.

### Turnovers

2 cups sifted enriched flour  
1 tablespoon baking powder  
1 teaspoon salt

$\frac{1}{2}$  cup shortening  
 $\frac{3}{8}$  to  $\frac{1}{4}$  cup milk

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Cut or rub in shortening until mixture is crumbly. Add milk to make a soft dough. Turn out on lightly floured board or pastry cloth and knead gently 30 seconds. Divide dough into 6 equal parts. Roll each part out to circle about 6 inches in diameter. Spread  $\frac{1}{4}$  cup rhubarb filling on half of each circle. Fold over other half and seal edge securely. Bake on ungreased baking sheet in hot oven (425°F.) about 15 minutes. Or if desired, place lightly greased griddle over low heat. Bake turnovers slowly until golden brown on under side (about 7 minutes). Turn and brown other side. Makes 6 turnovers.

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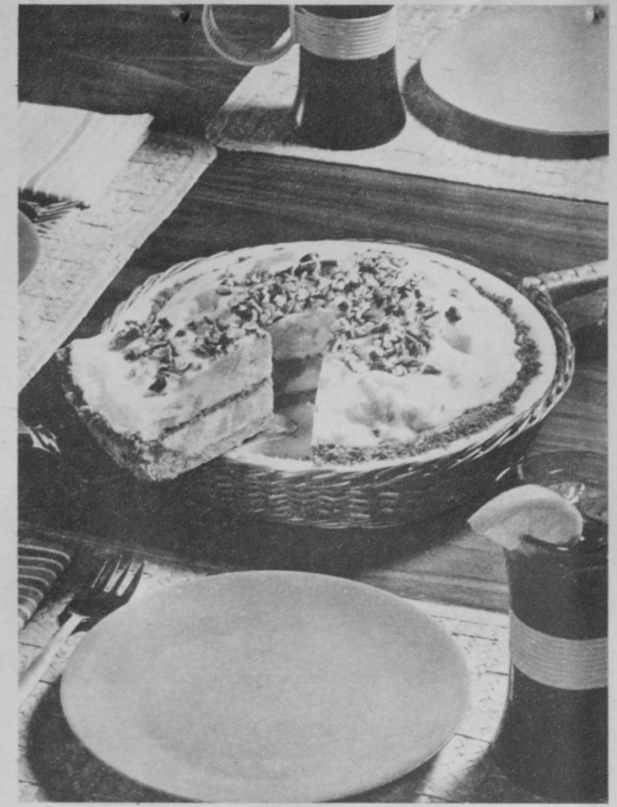

1 1/2 cups graham cracker crumbs      2 pints vanilla ice cream  
 1/4 cup sugar                              1/4 cup butter, melted  
 1/2 cup (1 stick) butter, melted      1/2 cup brown sugar  
 1 1-pound package frozen peach slices, thawed      1/2 cup chopped walnuts

Arrange broccoli and crabmeat in shallow 8x8x2-inch buttered baking dish. Saute mushrooms in butter; add. Season cream sauce with Worcestershire, salt and pepper and pour over. Spoon on cottage cheese, sprinkle with Parmesan cheese and paprika. Bake 20 minutes at 375°F. Makes 6 servings.



### ROAST LAMB WITH JEWEL GARNISH

The leg of lamb is easily roasted. The surface may be rubbed with a mixture of herbs if you wish. A popular combination is ground rosemary, paprika, sweet basil, salt, and pepper. A 6-pound leg of lamb roasted uncovered in a slow oven (325°F.) will be well done in about 3½ hours.

Remove mint jelly from the glass and cut two or three slices about ½ inch thick. Make emerald-cut jelly jewels by cutting into oblong pieces. Place a piece of mint jelly on top of the sour cream. Serve immediately with hot roast leg of lamb.

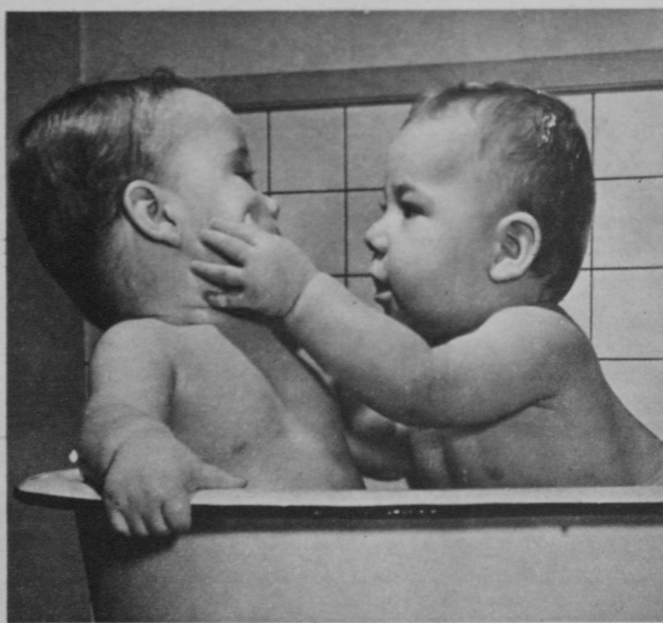

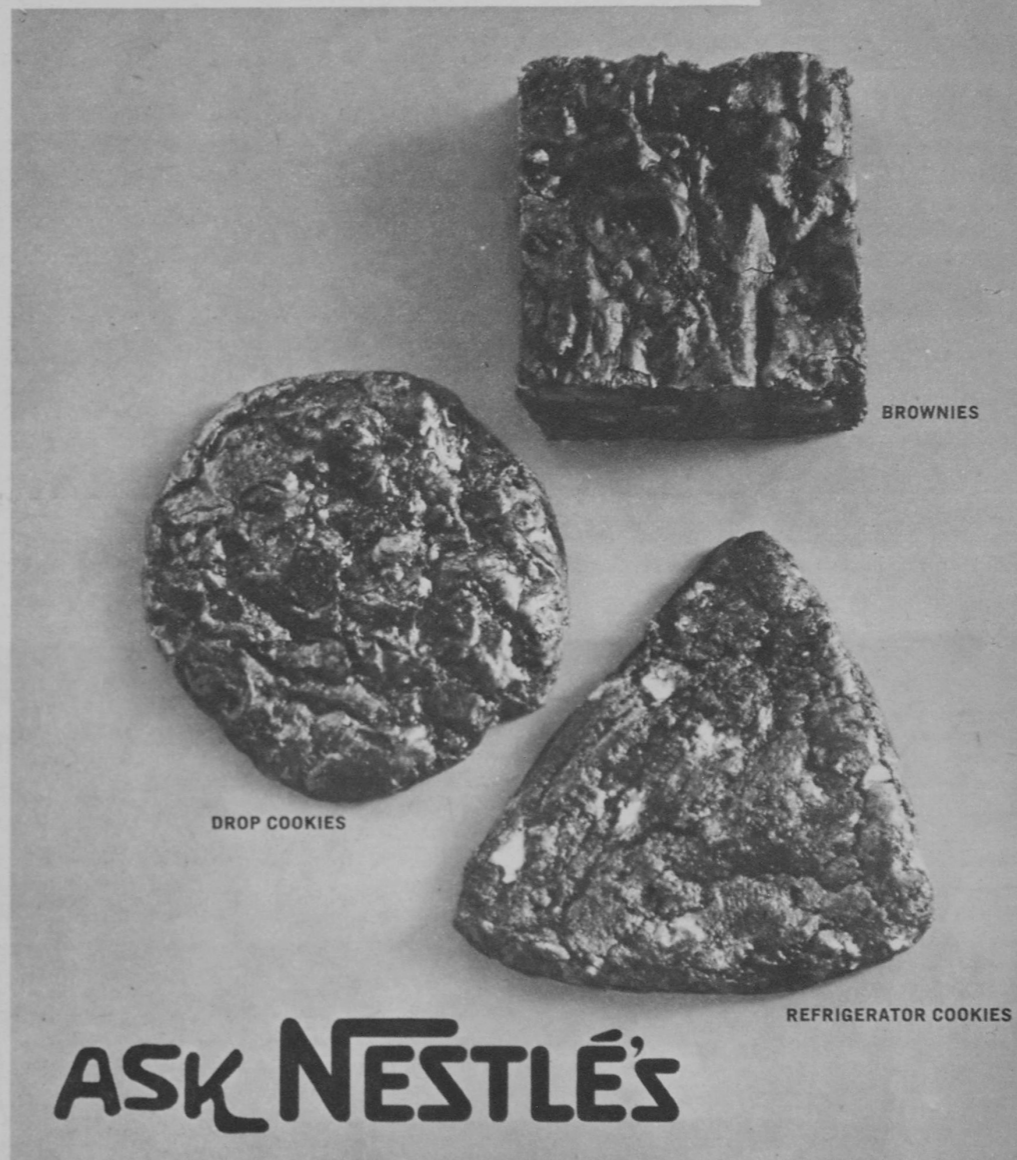

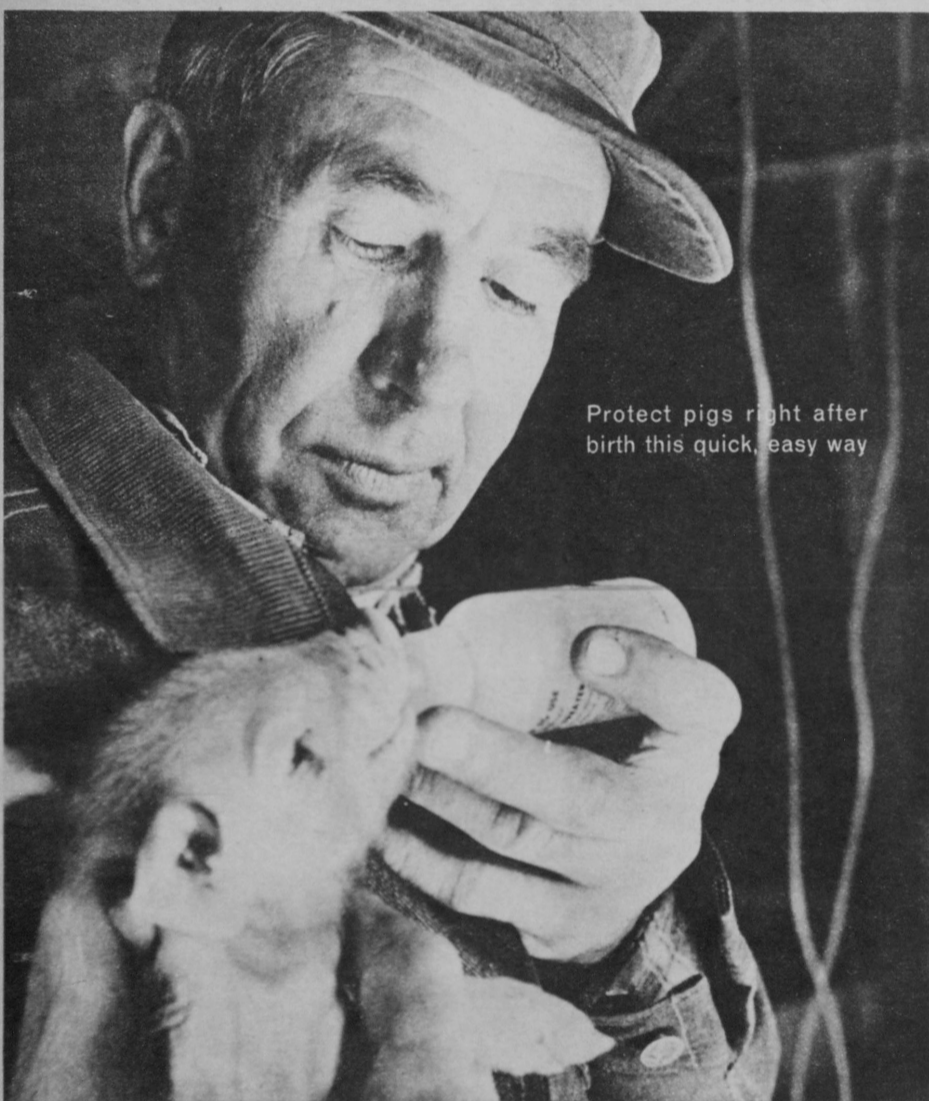

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The agricultural experts and rural economic "know-howers" keep harping: "You've got to save money, become more efficient, raise more on fewer acres, feed more with less work." To sum it up, what they're saying is farmers are going to have to spend less money and try to make more with the end result putting more cash in their profit pocket at the end of the year.

If you asked any good business executive how to increase the profits from a business he'd probably tell you: "Be ingenious! Devise ways of using what you have to make more money. This does not necessarily mean going out and spending piles of additional dollars in order to make an extra one percent return."

That's the crux of the whole story—in order to make money on today's farm—be ingenious. Let's look at an example of one farmer who seems to be doing a decent job of using what he has to increase his farm profit picture.

Cleo Nordmeyer is an Illinois farmer. His is primarily a dairy operation consisting of 490 acres near Chebanse, Illinois. Cleo owns 160 acres and also farms 330 acres owned by his dad. It is a diversified operation. Here is how Nordmeyer is making his farming operation pay off:

Last year he grew 200 acres of corn, 80 acres of oats and 20 acres of soybeans. He had 170 acres in pasture and hay. His corn, planted 16 to 19 thousand kernels per acre consistently tops 100 bu. per acre.

His pipeline-equipped dairy barn has a four-stall milking parlor. For added efficiency in his dairy operation Nordmeyer has an 80 x 46 hay storage area with a movable self-feeding rack in a post-free building. Carrying through with the theory of using what you have on hand for better efficiency, Nordmeyer and his son built the combination equipment-storage and hay storage building themselves in one month (with some help from neighbors). Timbers from a razed school building were used for uprights.

The feed mixing setup—built by the Nordmeyers themselves at a cost of \$1,000 including augers and bins—has bin capacity for 500 bushels of oats, 1,000 bushels of corn, 500 lbs. of dairy supplement, 3 tons each of swine and dairy supplements and a 3-ton holding bin for finished feed.

A concrete-lined trench silo adjacent to the barn is another example of Nordmeyer ingeniousness. The silo holds 350 tons of silage with alternating layers of grass and corn. A movable self-feeding rack, pushed into the silage by the cattle, is held in check by chains on each side. After estimating how long he'll have to feed silage, Nordmeyer knows how many links to let out on the chain each day.

Housed on an adjacent farm to their home place are 250 hogs which are farrowed and fattened each year. Starter feed and finisher supplement are the only commercial feeds Cleo uses for his hogs. Grower and sow rations are mixed right on the farm.

Nordmeyer's operation is a family one. Everyone helps. Son Nolan, 20, feeds the cows and feeds grain which is metered to each cow from a system of overhead hoppers and augers which are filled automatically. Cleo feeds the hay, adjusts the self-feeder for silage and beds the cows.

The Nordmeyer chicken layer operation is well organized too. The layer house, built in 1959 has capacity for 1,250 birds on each side of the center gathering aisle. It is complete with automatic feeders, forced draft ventilation and slatted floors. A bulk feed bin (Cleo made this from a discarded gravity water tank) is located inside the hen house. Since he doesn't have a bulk truck Cleo has improvised a permanent, swinging auger which extends from the bin into his grain truck. Cleo does all the feeding of the hens.

Half of their egg crop is marketed directly to a hotel, a hospital and restaurants in nearby Kankakee at 6-8¢ above Chicago prices. The remainder are sold at an egg station. Cleo candles all the eggs and delivers them himself.

Experience has taught Cleo that efficiency means extra profits. And he has learned through three years' experience with Diazinon fly control in his dairy operation that it can mean more money in his pockets. Prior to using Diazinon he used DDT and a leading insecticide, but due to resistance the flies could not be controlled.

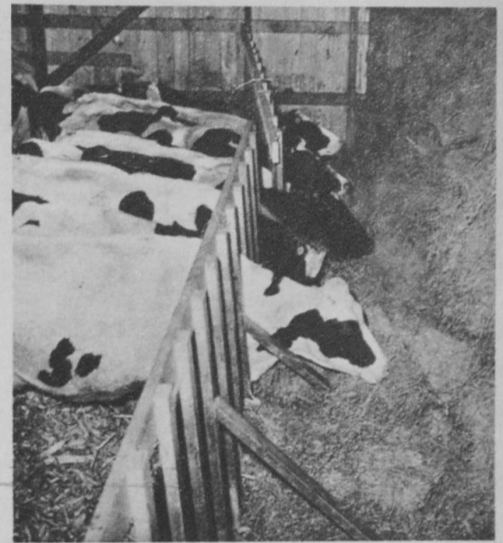
Nordmeyer takes a hand gun applied to his field sprayer and applies Diazinon to the walls and ceilings of the barn and loafing shed, and he even covers the outside areas of buildings and lots where cows congregate for shade.

Cleo says that two to three quarts of liquid Diazinon, applied in 25 gallons of water, will provide control for about three weeks, depending upon the weather. Four such seasonal applications for his 55-cow herd costs him \$45 worth of chemical.

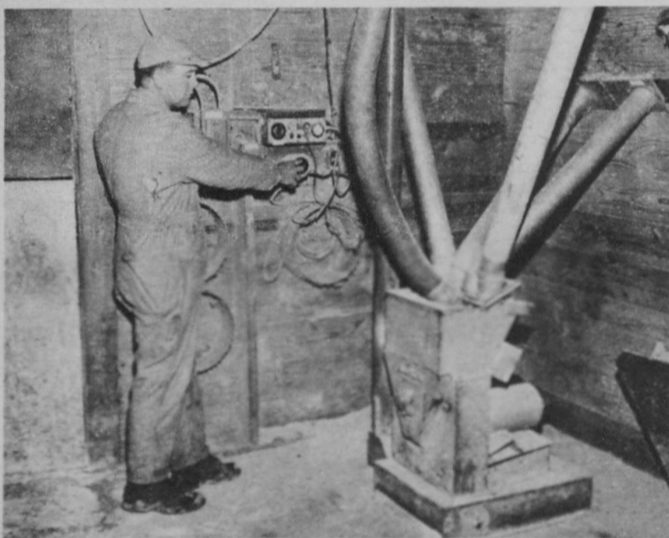

Son Nolan, 20, is mainly responsible for the Nordmeyer operation; he augers in the feed, fills the mangers, handles the pipeline-parlor setup (and, of course, works hand in hand with his dad in the field). Note how the Nordmeyers are using a new innovation in fly control. The Snip Fly Bands near the ceiling of the milking parlor are chemically impregnated, which knock flies dead in a couple of seconds. They are installed one band per 100 square feet of ceiling. They're not sticky and flies fall off simply by tapping the bands with a stick. These bands provide season-long control.



Nordmeyer's 52.8 grade Holsteins, according to 1961 DHIA records, showed 11,272 lbs. production with two times per day milking. The 1961 daily records also showed 457.4 pounds of fat.



Using his mix mill operation in his barn, the dairy feed is made once a week and augered directly to a special bin near the milking parlor.



The Nordmeyer daughters work too. Carolyn, 16, and Ellen, 14, gather the eggs. And if you haven't already guessed it, Mrs. Nordmeyer keeps the books. A third daughter, Nancy, 19, is away at nurses' training.



Even 11-year-old Richard Nordmeyer pitches in to help run the family farm business. He helps milk, washes the milking equipment and does general clean-up. Besides, Richard substitutes in the egg gathering and packing.

## Iosco County Equalized as Board Ends Session

Iosco County's equalized tax base for 1963 is \$55,626,999, an increase of \$654,087 over 1962's total valuation.

This report was brought in last Wednesday as the board of supervisors concluded its lengthy April session.

Total assessed valuation of Iosco County is \$25,595,755, as prepared by township and city assessors. This included \$21,359,315 in real property and \$4,236,440 in personal.

Real property showed an increase from \$20,856,815 in 1962 to \$21,359,315 in 1963, while personal property gained from \$4,215,980 last year to \$4,236,440 in 1963.

A resume of township and city valuations is as follows:

Alabaster—Real, \$1,361,400, up \$23,400 over 1962; personal, \$988,600, up \$3,300. With a unit ratio of 49.83, Alabaster's state equalized valuation is \$4,716,074, nearly 8 1/2 percent of the county total.

Ausable—Real, \$1,482,350, an increase of \$17,525 over 1962; personal, \$67,300, up \$1,500. An unit ratio of 43.26 gives Ausable a state equalized valuation of \$3,581,971, about 6 1/2 percent of the county total.

Baldwin—Real, \$1,632,925, up \$21,800; personal, \$91,500, a loss of \$14,100. With a unit ratio of 48.90, Baldwin has been equalized at \$3,526,211, representing 6.33 percent of the county total.

Burleigh—Real, \$454,100, up \$15,900; personal, \$71,600, an increase of \$8,600, Burleigh, which assesses at 52.81 percent of the state equalized figure, has a total valuation of \$995,509, representing 1.78 percent of the county total.

Grant—Real, \$1,106,400, up \$15,700; personal, \$439,100, up \$650. With a unit ratio of 50.08 percent, Grant has a state equalized valuation of \$3,085,477, representing slightly more than 5 1/2 percent of the county total.

Oscoda—Real, \$5,962,360, up \$194,700; personal, \$501,440, a drop of \$7,040. Assessing at 44.48 percent of the state figure, Oscoda has an equalized total of \$14,531,155 and pays slightly more than 26 percent of the county total.

Plainfield—Real, \$2,545,325, up \$67,125; personal, \$216,200, up \$5,300. Plainfield has a unit ratio of 44.06 and its state equalized valuation is \$6,267,876, representing about 11 1/4 percent of the county total.

Reno—Real, \$438,900, up \$1,800; personal, \$123,600, up \$20,600. Assessing at 45.19 percent of the state figure, Reno has an equalized valuation of \$1,244,676, representing nearly 2 1/4 percent of the county total.

Sherman—Real, \$609,950, up \$8,500; personal, \$950,350, up \$10,750. With a unit ratio of 44.84, Sherman has a state equalized valuation of \$3,479,534, or 6 1/4 percent of the county total.

Tawas—Real, \$733,400, up \$28,250; personal, \$78,500, up \$3,800. Tawas, with a unit ratio of 58.01, has a state equalized valuation of \$1,399,468 and represents 2 1/2 percent of the county total.

Wilber—Real, \$441,935, up \$6,700; personal, \$38,400, down \$200. With a unit ratio of 45.13, Wilber has an equalized valuation of \$1,064,440 and represents 1.91 percent of the county total.

East Tawas—Real, \$2,381,600, up \$28,000; personal, \$123,600, up \$20,600. Assessing at 45.19 percent of the state figure, East Tawas has an equalized valuation of \$1,244,676, representing nearly 2 1/4 percent of the county total.

## Iosco to Send Delegation to Washington Confab

The board's judiciary committee reported that approximate cost to the county for sending the three delegates would be \$200.

In other business last Wednesday marking the final day of the April session, the board approved hiring an architect to prepare plans for constructing an addition on the county building.

The 20 by 30-foot addition, to be attached to the west side of the building, would be for vault use. It would conform to the present style of architecture.

The resolution passed by a 13-4 roll call. Voting yes were Alton Abbott, Burdge Ashton, Theodore Bellville, George Blust, James Campbell, Everett, Edward Gerard, John Hosbach, L. S. Little, Ralph Meyers, Oates, Charles Smith and Clement Stephan. No votes were cast by Long, McKenzie, Harvey Odell and George Webb.

In accordance to its April 1962 resolution, the board authorized transferring \$2,500 from the general fund to the county road commission for construction of a new road to the county airport.

## Start Construction on Hale Elementary Unit

Ground was broken two weeks ago on construction of a new elementary unit at Hale Area School. This project is included in a \$135,000 bonding proposition approved by district voters last October.

In addition to construction of a new elementary unit, containing 7,200 square feet of floor space or six classrooms, the project includes remodeling of the present elementary wing for high school use.

Supt. Samuel A. Gravit said Monday that construction is to be completed by the start of school next fall. Remodeling work will not begin until the start of summer vacation June 11.

The new elementary building will house grades kindergarten through fourth. The building will also have a boiler room, teacher's supply and storage room.

The present elementary wing will be remodeled to facilitate teaching in instrumental and vocal music, physical sciences, library reference room and combined library-study area.

Warren Holmes, Incorporated, Lansing, is architect for the project. Serenus Johnson and Son, Bay City, is general contractor.

Footings for the new elementary building have been poured. Exterior walls are to be of tan face brick. The building will have a metal deck and built-up roof.

Contracts for the 1963-64 school year were offered Monday night to Supt. Reynold Mick and Principal Ernest W. Jordan by the Tawas Area Board of Education.

In addition, the board signed contracts with Miss Clara Bolen, elementary principal; Lyle Berry, elementary and junior high physical education; Miss Arlene Brown, girls' physical education; Mrs. R. J. Klenow, elementary vocal music.

Discussion on the superintendent and principal's contracts was held during a closed executive session.

After reopening the meeting to the public, it was voted to hire the superintendent at the same salary as last year, \$11,500. Jordan's base salary was set at \$8,700. He is to be paid an additional \$500 for assuming part of the superintendent's duties.

As assistant superintendent, he will be in charge of bus drivers and check morning bus runs. Mick will continue to handle bus routing.

It was reported that replacements had not been hired as yet for Miss Emma Whipple, elementary teacher who retires this year, or for Miss Marilyn A. Westrich.

## Judge Hands Prison Terms to Two Men

Two men were sentenced to serve terms in Southern Michigan Prison, Jackson, Monday by Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

Carl Wagner, alias Lloyd Black, was sentenced to serve not less than 4 1/2 years nor more than five years on conviction of breaking and entering in the daytime.

On April 18, Wilmer Alberts was placed on probation for three years, the first 60 days to be served in jail.

Charles Winchell was placed on probation for five years, six months of which are to be served in jail during unemployment. He was fined \$500 and ordered to pay costs of \$100 and restitution of \$157.

David Winchell was placed on two years probation, 30 days of which are to be served in jail during unemployment. He was assessed a \$50 fine and \$50 costs.

General Humfeld called dedication of the new base gymnasium another step in the milestones which have occurred during the past three years of Strategic Air Command in Michigan.

"It was obvious upon my arrival in 1960 as commander of the 40th Air Division that we had a considerable task to perform in developing these three units in Michigan, not only from the operational standpoint, but also to obtain the necessary facilities for the operational and maintenance requirement of these wings," said Humfeld. ## First Report on Master Plan Received by Commission

Tawas City's first master plan report was presented to the planning commission last Wednesday night by Villean-Leman and Associates, Incorporated, planning consultants.

The report deals with land use, population, housing conditions and residential planning units. It is the first of a series of seven study elements in the city's current two-year planning program.

This first report is concerned primarily with establishing the framework within which the subsequent master plan of future land use will be developed. Emphasis in the report is on describing existing conditions in Tawas City which will be important in influencing future growth and development.

Particular importance is placed on residential areas. The existing housing conditions and living environment are surveyed and future residential planning units are proposed which are intended to provide convenient, stable and pleasant living conditions.

Included in the report is an analysis of the city's population. This analysis covers past growth

trends, current levels and projections of future population. These are of considerable importance because such things as water and sewer facilities, school plant needs, recreational land needs and retail and industrial space requirements are all directly related to the size and characteristics of the population.

Some of the findings and conclusions contained in the report are:

1. In 1960, the population of Tawas City was 1,810 persons. This was an increase of 369 from 1950; a rate of growth of approximately 26 percent.

2. Although Tawas City showed a growth during the 1950s, the population increased at a decreasing rate over the previous decade when the rate of growth was 34 percent.

3. Since 1940, the school age population (ages five to 19) has increased 62 percent. This has been at a continually increasing rate; 19 percent increase between 1940 and 1950 and 37 percent between 1950 and 1960. This rate of increase is likely to fall off slightly between 1960 and 1970 because

the younger age group (under five years old) increased at a decreasing rate over the past decade.

4. The retirement age group (65 years and over) represents approximately 12 percent of the city's total population. This is somewhat higher than the state-wide average of eight percent. Past trends indicate that this age group will continue to increase in the future. Careful consideration must be given to making available adequate housing and community facilities geared to the needs of this segment of the population.

5. The ultimate population holding capacity of the city is estimated to be roughly 6,200 persons. The surrounding planning area has an ultimate capacity of approximately 4,500; thus giving the city, plus its adjacent planning area, an ultimate capacity of 10,700 persons. Trends and present indications make it doubtful that this capacity will be reached in the foreseeable future. Projections made for the next 20 years estimate that the population within the present city limits will be approximately 4,500.

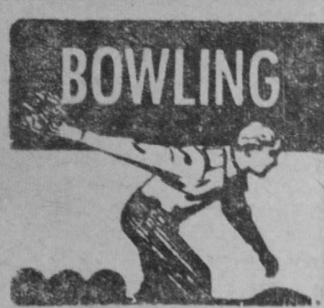

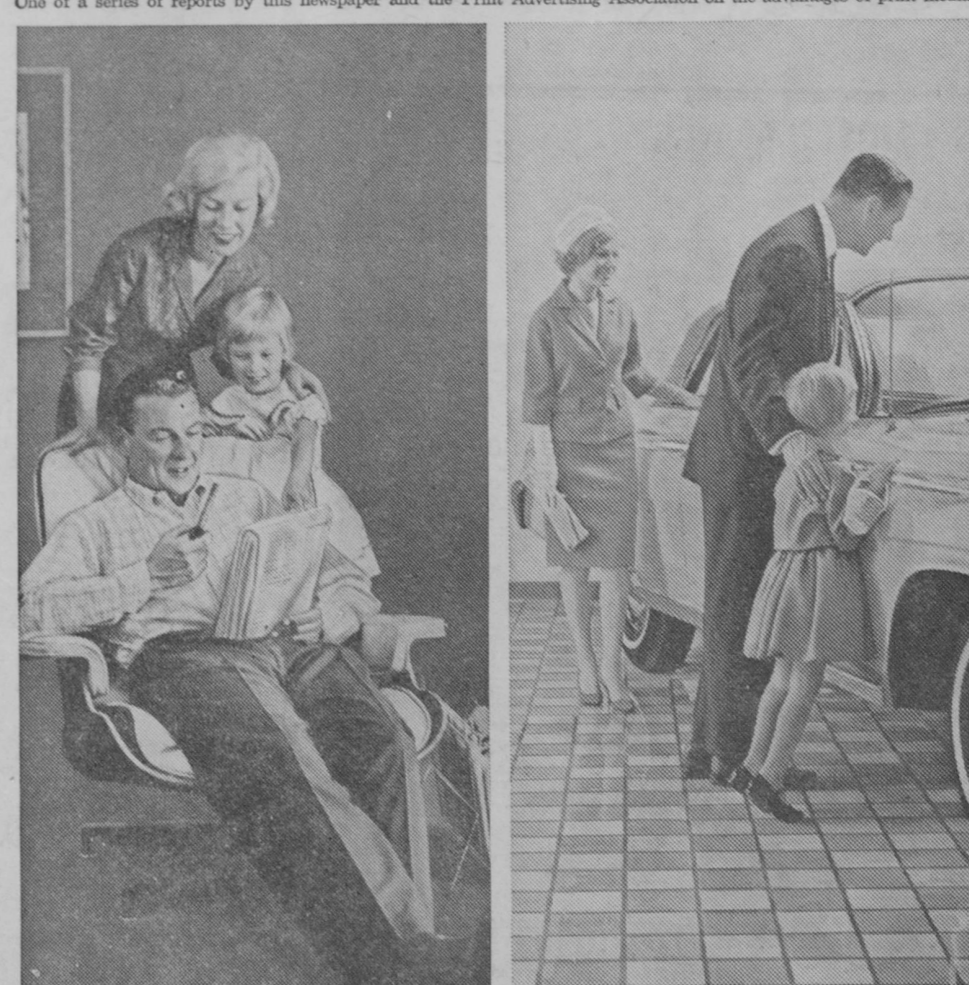

approximately 2,300 by 1970 and 2,800 by 1980.

6. The land use survey indicates that over 40 percent of the total land area in the city is presently vacant, thus leaving considerable land available for future development.

7. Approximately nine percent of the developed land in the city is devoted to commercial uses. This is considerably higher than normally expected and is due, in

part, to the large number of commercial lodging facilities.

8. The survey of housing conditions and residential environment in the city indicated the general conditions of housing is as follows: 17 percent of the city's residential structures are stable; 55 percent of the city's residential structures are minor conservation; 28 percent of the city's residential structures are major conservation.

Most cities also have areas which classify as redevelopment in which conditions are so poor that they can only be upgraded by complete clearance and rebuilding. There were no such areas in Tawas City, although there are isolated structures which fall in this category.

9. Ideally, residential areas should develop according to certain basic principles referred to as the residential planning unit concept. Three planning units have been proposed for Tawas City and its surrounding planning area which will accommodate the ultimate population holding capacity and provide safe, desirable places in which to live.

\$57,500; personal, \$321,000, down \$6,700. East Tawas with an unit ratio of 42.75, has a state equalized valuation of \$6,322,238, which represents 11.36 percent of the county total.

Tawas City—Real, \$1,950,100, up \$32,100; personal, \$307,700, down \$6,800. Unit ratios in Tawas City's three wards are 46.36, 44.87 and 51.23. Total equalized valuation is \$4,691,475, about nine percent of the county total.

Whittemore—Real, \$258,470, up \$6,200; personal, \$41,150, up \$800. Whittemore assesses at 41.56 percent of the state figure and has an equalized valuation of \$720,885, representing 1.29 percent of the county total.

### Commercial Fishing In Great Lakes Down 2,437,000 Pounds

Fish taken commercially from Michigan's Great Lakes waters dropped sharply in 1962, totaling slightly more than 22 million pounds at a value of nearly \$2,495,000. Commercial catch of all species totaled about 3,184,400 pounds in Saginaw Bay and 2,692,200 pounds in Lake Huron.

Compared with the year before, the commercial catch in Michigan waters was down 2,437,000 pounds and marked a drop of \$463,000 in value.

Chubs, lake herring, carp and yellow perch headed the list, accounting for 76 percent of the poundage total at a value of \$1,690,000. Commercial fishermen experienced another decline in smelt which hit its lowest level since 1950.

Last year's lake trout harvest reached an all-time low of 135,467 pounds. Only 819,600 pounds of whitefish were taken by commercial operators last year, a far cry from the annual catch which averaged about 3,000,000 pounds before lamprey predation started making inroads on the species' populations.

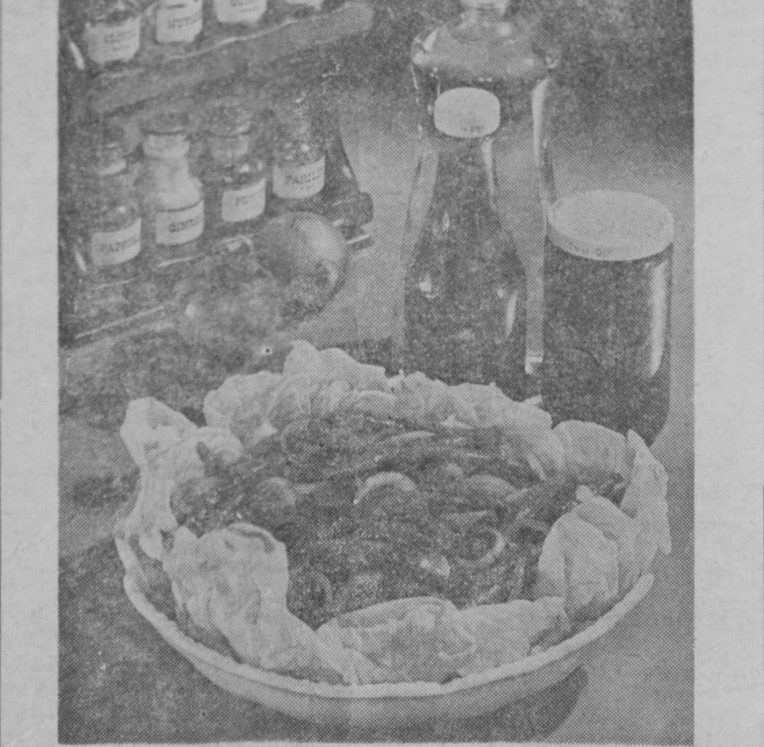

- 1/4 cup water
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 2 dashes Tabasco sauce
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 bay leaf
- 5 to 6 whole cloves

Combine ingredients, in the order listed, in a quart jar with tight cap. Shake well. Use as a marinade for vegetables cooked tender-crisp, Chinese style, or as a dressing for crisp vegetable salads. Yield. About 3-1/2 cups marinade or dressing.
