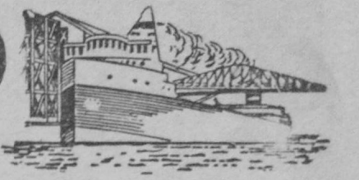

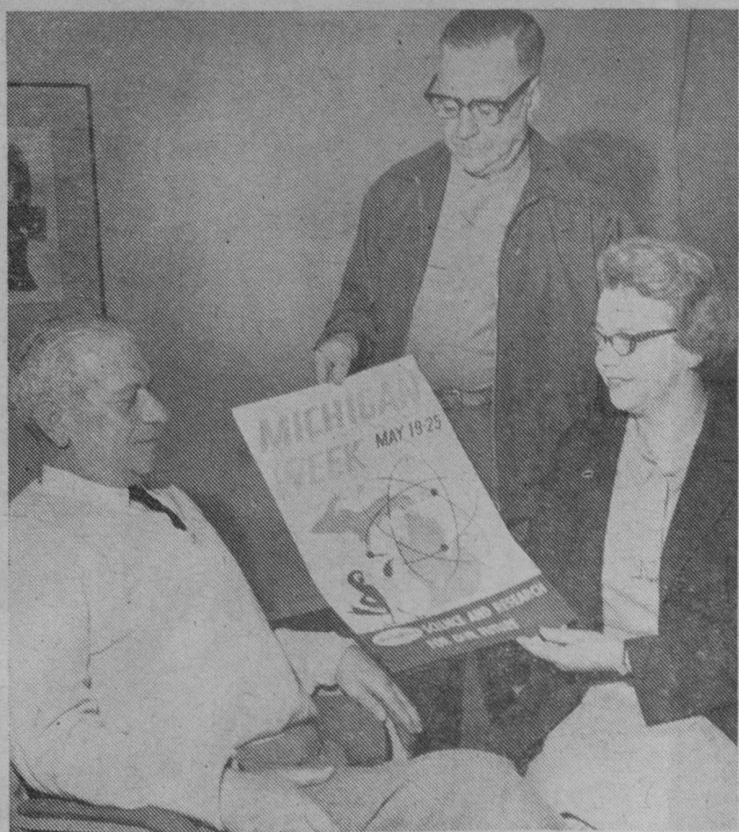

Plan Observance of Michigan Week

Plans were mapped last Friday for the Michigan Week observance, May 19-25, at East Tawas. About 25 businessmen and other interested persons attended a committee meeting held at the city hall.

In addition to observance of mayors exchange and other special days, East Tawas' program will include sidewalk sales specials, a display by auto dealers, merchants' jack pot and a display of items manufactured in Iosco County.

Mrs. Stanley Stasik will be in charge of arrangements for the sidewalk sales, to be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday of Michigan Week. Merchandise specials will be displayed in front of stores.

William Look Sr. was appointed to handle arrangements for the display of autos by local dealers. A side street is to be blocked off for this purpose.

Robert LaVoy, Donald Mooney and Joseph Branham were appointed as a committee to make arrangements for the merchants' jack pot. Cash awards are to be given away twice daily during the three days.

Leonard A. Calabrese and Lewis

F. Besancon were appointed to handle arrangements for the display of manufactured items.

Wurtsmith Air Force Base is to be requested to furnish a display of air force equipment during the week-long observance.

Tawas Band to Take Part in Festival

Tawas Area High School Band will play in the state band and orchestra festival Saturday, April 27, at Battle Creek. A division I rating is required in a district festival for entrance in the state festival, according to Edward J. Rima, band instructor at Tawas Area.

The 87 bandmen, plus about 10 adults, will leave Tawas Friday after school and stay overnight at the Holiday Inn, Battle Creek. Bandmen have earned their own expense money through a recent magazine sale, car washes, bake sales and a paper drive. Money given to the band from the St. Patrick's Day parade committee of Bay City has also been added to the fund.

The band will play at Battle Creek's Lakeview High School. This is one of 12 sections at three sites, all in the Battle Creek schools.

Although eligible to participate last year, the Tawas band did not attend because of a conflict with the spring vacation. Two years ago, the band was ineligible, so this is the first attendance at a state band festival since 1960.

Highest rating achieved by a Tawas band at a state festival was in 1959. At Jackson, the band received an all I rating.

Mich. Week Plans to be Discussed

Plans for the Michigan Week observance in Tawas City are to be discussed at the Thursday noon meeting of the Tawas City Businessmen's Association.

At present, the program includes participation in mayors exchange day.

Iosco County Equalized as Board Ends Session

Iosco County's equalized tax base for 1963 is \$55,626,999, an increase of \$654,087 over 1962's total valuation.

This report was brought in last Wednesday as the board of supervisors concluded its lengthy April session.

Total assessed valuation of Iosco County is \$25,595,755, as prepared by township and city assessors. This included \$21,359,315 in real property and \$4,236,440 in personal.

Real property showed an increase from \$20,856,815 in 1962 to \$21,359,315 in 1963, while personal property gained from \$4,215,980 last year to \$4,236,440 in 1963.

A resume of township and city valuations is as follows:

Alabaster—Real, \$1,361,400, up \$23,400 over 1962; personal, \$988,600, up \$3,300. With a unit ratio of 49.83, Alabaster's state equalized valuation is \$4,716,074, nearly 8 1/2 percent of the county total.

Ausable—Real, \$1,482,350, an increase of \$17,525 over 1962; personal, \$67,300, up \$1,500. An unit ratio of 43.26 gives Ausable a state equalized valuation of \$3,581,971, about 6 1/2 percent of the county total.

Baldwin—Real, \$1,632,925, up \$21,800; personal, \$91,500, a loss of \$14,100. With a unit ratio of 48.90, Baldwin has been equalized at \$3,526,211, representing 6.33 percent of the county total.

Burleigh—Real, \$454,100, up \$15,900; personal, \$71,600, an increase of \$8,600, Burleigh, which assesses at 52.81 percent of the state equalized figure, has a total valuation of \$995,509, representing 1.78 percent of the county total.

Grant—Real, \$1,106,400, up

\$15,700; personal, \$439,100, up \$650. With a unit ratio of 50.08 percent, Grant has a state equalized valuation of \$3,085,477, representing slightly more than 5 1/2 percent of the county total.

Oscoda—Real, \$5,962,360, up \$194,700; personal, \$501,440, a drop of \$7,040. Assessing at 44.48 percent of the state figure, Oscoda has an equalized total of \$14,531,155 and pays slightly more than 26 percent of the county total.

Plainfield—Real, \$2,545,325, up \$67,125; personal, \$216,200, up \$5,300. Plainfield has a unit ratio of 44.06 and its state equalized valuation is \$6,267,876, representing about 11 1/4 percent of the county total.

Reno—Real, \$438,900, up \$1,800; personal, \$123,600, up \$20,600. Assessing at 45.19 percent of the state figure, Reno has an equalized valuation of \$1,244,676, representing nearly 2 1/4 percent of the county total.

Sherman—Real, \$609,950, up \$8,500; personal, \$950,350, up \$10,750. With a unit ratio of 44.84, Sherman has a state equalized valuation of \$3,479,534, or 6 1/4 percent of the county total.

Tawas—Real, \$733,400, up \$28,250; personal, \$78,500, up \$3,800. Tawas, with a unit ratio of 58.01, has a state equalized valuation of \$1,399,468 and represents 2 1/2 percent of the county total.

Wilber—Real, \$441,935, up \$6,700; personal, \$38,400, down \$200. With an unit ratio of 45.13, Wilber has an equalized valuation of \$1,064,440 and represents 1.91 percent of the county total.

Iosco to Send Delegation to Washington Confab

Iosco County will send three representatives to a conference May 3 at Washington, D. C., called by United States Senator Philip A. Hart of Michigan. The meeting is being called to discuss federal programs available to Michigan communities.

Representing Iosco will be Henry Oates, chairman of the county board of supervisors; Glenn Long, regional planning board, and Clarence McKenzie, mayor of East Tawas. Clarence Everett was named alternate.

This group will be joined by Andrew Kopaczewski, chairman of the Arenac County Board of Supervisors, and will charter a plane from the Alpena Flying Service for the flight to the nation's capital.

The board's judiciary committee reported that approximate cost to the county for sending the three delegates would be \$200.

In other business last Wednesday marking the final day of the April session, the board approved hiring an architect to prepare plans for constructing an addition on the county building.

The 20 by 30-foot addition, to be attached to the west side of the building, would be for vault use. It would conform to the present style of architecture.

The resolution passed by a 13-4 roll call. Voting yes were Alton Abbott, Burdge Ashton, Theodore Bellville, George Blust, James Campbell, Everett, Edward Gerard, John Hosbach, L. S. Little, Ralph Meyers, Oates, Charles Smith and Clement Stephan. No votes were cast by Long, McKenzie, Harvey Odell and George Webb.

In accordance to its April 1962 resolution, the board authorized transferring \$2,500 from the general fund to the county road commission for construction of a new road to the county airport.

Start Construction on Hale Elementary Unit

Ground was broken two weeks ago on construction of a new elementary unit at Hale Area School. This project is included in a \$135,000 bonding proposition approved by district voters last October.

In addition to construction of a new elementary unit, containing 7,200 square feet of floor space or six classrooms, the project includes remodeling of the present elementary wing for high school use.

Board Offers Contracts to Administrators

Contracts for the 1963-64 school year were offered Monday night to Supt. Reynold Mick and Principal Ernest W. Jordan by the Tawas Area Board of Education.

In addition, the board signed contracts with Miss Clara Bolen, elementary principal; Lyle Berry, elementary and junior high physical education; Miss Arlene Brown, girls' physical education; Mrs. R. J. Klenow, elementary vocal music.

Discussion on the superintendent's and principal's contracts was held during a closed executive session.

After reopening the meeting to the public, it was voted to hire the superintendent at the same salary as last year, \$11,500. Jordan's base salary was set at \$8,700. He is to be paid an additional \$500 for assuming part of the superintendent's duties.

As assistant superintendent, he will be in charge of bus drivers and check morning bus runs. Mick will continue to handle bus routing.

It was reported that replacements had not been hired as yet for Miss Emma Whipple, elementary teacher who retires this year, or for Miss Marilyn A. Westrich.

Trout Season Opens Saturday

Trout fishermen should find Northern Michigan streams at or near average levels for the season opener Saturday, according to the conservation department.

Throughout most areas, snow made a hasty exit during the spring breakup, which means that trout waters may be warmer and clearer than usual.

Fishing fees remain the same as last year: \$2 each for the resident license and trout stamp, \$5 for the annual non-resident license and \$4 for the 15-day license which applies to out-of-state fishermen only. In addition to these licenses, nonresidents also need stamps to fish trout.

Judge Giennie Gives Ruling on Boundary Dispute

Circuit Judge Philip J. Giennie of Alpena has ruled in favor of Elmer J. Barrill in his suit to reform a deed and determine the boundary line between North Park Acres and Huron Gardens Subdivision in Tawas City.

Burrell, subdivider of North Park Acres, had brought suit against Olive M. Goldsmith and John A. Brugger as defendants. Victor A. and Doris M. Zaharias, subdividers of Huron Gardens, were intervening defendants and cross plaintiffs.

Judge Giennie ruled that the one-eighth line as established by R. J. Cooke, surveyor, was the dividing line between the two subdivisions. He also ordered reformation to include a strip of land lying south of the Goldsmith Addition, which had been deeded by Mrs. Goldsmith to Mr. Brugger.

Judge Giennie had been assigned to hear the case. Iosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller was city attorney of Tawas City when plats were accepted.

Ribbon-Cutting Opens New Wurtsmith Gym

A ribbon-cutting ceremony Friday afternoon by Maj. Gen. Harold E. Humfeld, 40th Air Division commander, officially opened the new \$308,000 base gymnasium at Wurtsmith Air Force Base. Heading the list of dignitaries on hand for the event was Gerald R. Ford, Fifth District congressman.

Other guests included members of the Wurtsmith Community Council. Also attending the ceremony were Maj. Gen. John B. Montgomery, air force reserve, who is on a two-week active duty tour at Wurtsmith; Col. Paul K. Carlton, 379th Bombardment Wing commander, and Col. Raymond J. Lacombe, base commander.

SM Sgt. Arlisha Polk, first sergeant of the 379th Civil Engineering Squadron and president of the Noncommissioned Officers' Academy Graduate Association, was master of ceremonies for the event.

General Humfeld called dedication of the new base gymnasium another step in the milestones which have occurred during the past three years of Strategic Air Command in Michigan.

"It was obvious upon my arrival in 1960 as commander of the 40th Air Division that we had a considerable task to perform in developing these three units in Michigan, not only from the operational standpoint, but also to obtain the necessary facilities for the operational and maintenance requirement of these wings," said Humfeld. "Equally important, in my opinion, was the necessity of obtaining facilities for the morale and welfare of the dedicated people who operate and maintain this equipment."

Congressman Ford spoke on the importance of Wurtsmith and other SAC bases in Michigan. Referring to the Cuban crisis, the congressman said it was SAC's power that had prevailed over communism.

Sergeant Polk presented Ford with a scroll from the personnel of Wurtsmith.

After the ceremony, the guests proceeded to the officers' open mess where a buffet and entertainment were scheduled. The USAF Hawaiian Strings provided music for the dance which followed the buffet.

Judge Hands Prison Terms to Two Men

Two men were sentenced to serve terms in Southern Michigan Prison, Jackson, Monday by Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

Lloyd Gessford, alias Lloyd Black, was sentenced to serve not less than 4 1/2 years nor more than five years on conviction of breaking and entering in the daytime.

Gessford was apprehended in Arizona and returned to Iosco County to face the charge. He and a woman companion, Mavis Black, pleaded guilty to looting a cabin near Five Channels Dam last September. They were apprehended in the act by the cabin caretaker, but escaped through the woods. Mavis Black awaits sentencing.

Clayton C. Atherton of Detroit received a prison term of from three to five years on conviction of carrying a concealed weapon.

Also sentenced Monday was LeRoy Pitts, Tawas City, who received a jail sentence of 30 days, \$15 fine and \$35 costs for second offense drunk and disorderly.

Carl Wagner entered a plea of guilty to breaking and entering in the nighttime at the Oscoda Belyn Shop. The case was referred to Probation Officer Richard K. Nelson for pre-sentence report.

Arraigned Tuesday were Stanley A. Meinkewitz, who pleaded guilty to selling mortgaged property. Carl Tvardas entered a plea of guilty to larceny from a dwelling.

On April 18, Wilmer Alberts was placed on probation for three years, the first 60 days to be served in jail.

Charles Winchell was placed on probation for five years, six months of which are to be served in jail during unemployment. He was fined \$500 and ordered to pay costs of \$100 and restitution of \$157.

David Winchell was placed on two years probation, 30 days of which are to be served in jail during unemployment. He was assessed a \$50 fine and \$50 costs.

First Report on Master Plan Received by Commission

Tawas City's first master plan report was presented to the planning commission last Wednesday night by Villean-Leman and Associates, Incorporated, planning consultants.

The report deals with land use, population, housing conditions and residential planning units. It is the first of a series of seven study elements in the city's current two-year planning program.

This first report is concerned primarily with establishing the framework within which the subsequent master plan of future land use will be developed. Emphasis in the report is on describing existing conditions in Tawas City which will be important in influencing future growth and development.

Particular importance is placed on residential areas. The existing housing conditions and living environment are surveyed and future residential planning units are proposed which are intended to provide convenient, stable and pleasant living conditions.

Included in the report is an analysis of the city's population. This analysis covers past growth

trends, current levels and projections of future population. These are of considerable importance because such things as water and sewer facilities, school plant needs, recreational land needs and retail and industrial space requirements are all directly related to the size and characteristics of the population.

Some of the findings and conclusions contained in the report are:

1. In 1960, the population of Tawas City was 1,810 persons. This was an increase of 369 from 1950; a rate of growth of approximately 26 percent.

2. Although Tawas City showed a growth during the 1950s, the population increased at a decreasing rate over the previous decade when the rate of growth was 34 percent.

3. Since 1940, the school age population (ages five to 19) has increased 62 percent. This has been at a continually increasing rate; 19 percent increase between 1940 and 1950 and 37 percent between 1950 and 1960. This rate of increase is likely to fall off slightly between 1960 and 1970 because

the younger age group (under five years old) increased at a decreasing rate over the past decade.

4. The retirement age group (65 years and over) represents approximately 12 percent of the city's total population. This is somewhat higher than the state-wide average of eight percent. Past trends indicate that this age group will continue to increase in the future. Careful consideration must be given to making available adequate housing and community facilities geared to the needs of this segment of the population.

5. The ultimate population holding capacity of the city is estimated to be roughly 6,200 persons. The surrounding planning area has an ultimate capacity of approximately 4,500; thus giving the city, plus its adjacent planning area, an ultimate capacity of 10,700 persons. Trends and present indications make it doubtful that this capacity will be reached in the foreseeable future. Projections made for the next 20 years estimate that the population within the present city limits will be approximately 4,500.

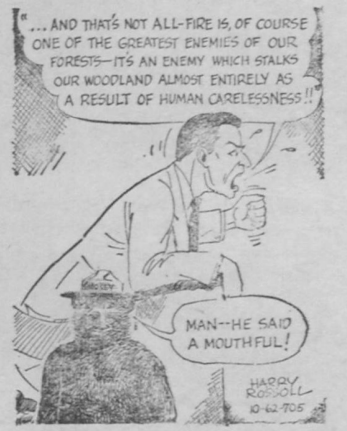

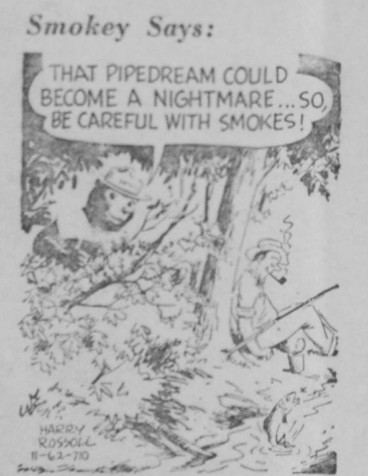

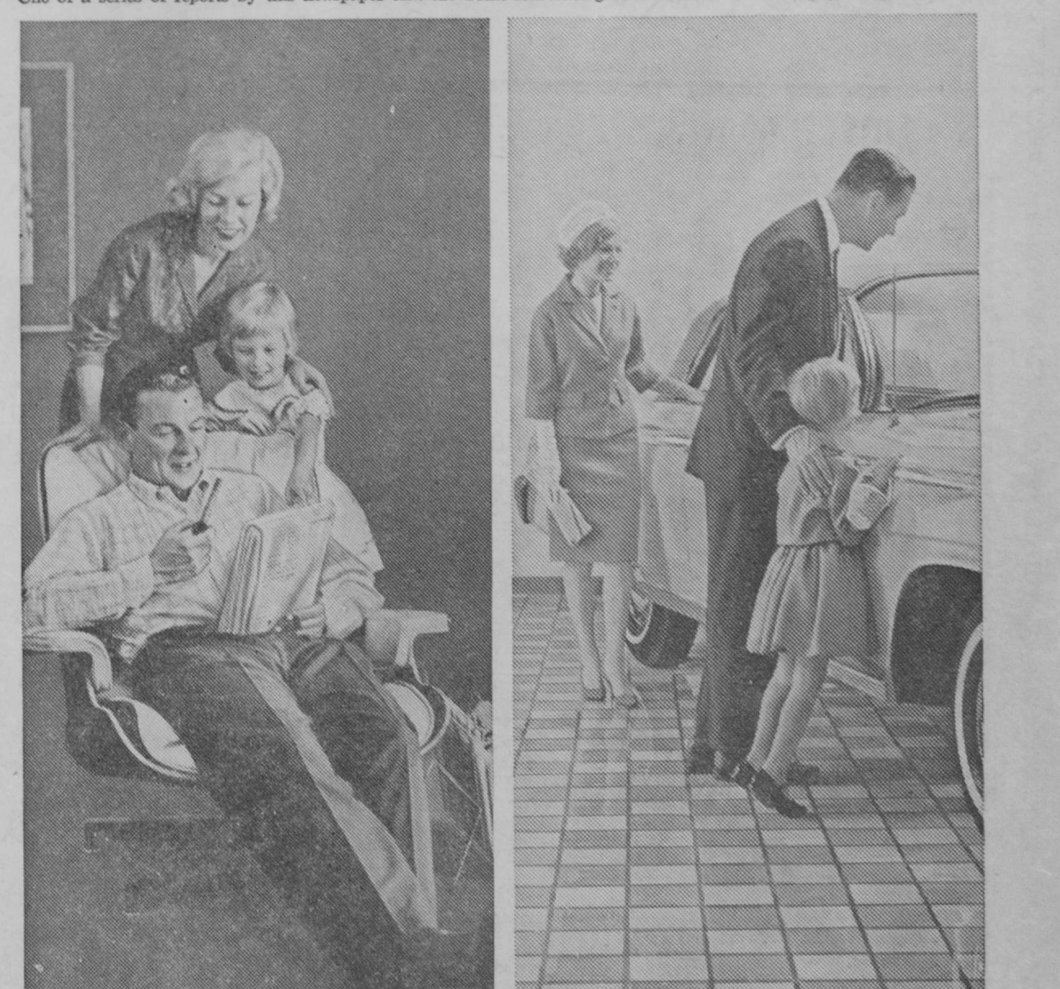

 approximately 2,300 by 1970 and 2,800 by 1980.

6. The land use survey indicates that over 40 percent of the total land area in the city is presently vacant, thus leaving considerable land available for future development.

7. Approximately nine percent of the developed land in the city is devoted to commercial uses. This is considerably higher than normally expected and is due, in

part, to the large number of commercial lodging facilities.

8. The survey of housing conditions and residential environment in the city indicated the general conditions of housing is as follows: 17 percent of the city's residential structures are stable; 55 percent of the city's residential structures are minor conservation; 28 percent of the city's residential structures are major conservation.

Most cities also have areas which classify as redevelopment in which conditions are so poor that they can only be upgraded by complete clearance and rebuilding. There were no such areas in Tawas City, although there are isolated structures which fall in this category.

9. Ideally, residential areas should develop according to certain basic principles referred to as the residential planning unit concept. Three planning units have been proposed for Tawas City and its surrounding planning area which will accommodate the ultimate population holding capacity and provide safe, desirable places in which to live.

Tawas City—Real, \$1,950,100, up \$32,100; personal, \$307,700, down \$6,800. Unit ratios in Tawas City's three wards are 46.36, 44.87 and 51.23. Total equalized valuation is \$4,691,475, about nine percent of the county total.

Whittemore—Real, \$258,470, up \$6,200; personal, \$41,150, up \$800. Whittemore assesses at 41.56 percent of the state figure and has an equalized valuation of \$720,885, representing 1.29 percent of the county total.

Commercial Fishing In Great Lakes Down 2,437,000 Pounds

Fish taken commercially from Michigan's Great Lakes waters dropped sharply in 1962, totaling slightly more than 22 million pounds at a value of nearly \$2,495,000. Commercial catch of all species totaled about 3,184,400 pounds in Saginaw Bay and 2,692,200 pounds in Lake Huron.

Compared with the year before, the commercial catch in Michigan waters was down 2,437,000 pounds and marked a drop of \$463,000 in value.

Chubs, lake herring, carp and yellow perch headed the list, accounting for 76 percent of the poundage total at a value of \$1,690,000. Commercial fishermen experienced another decline in smelt which hit its lowest level since 1950.

Last year's lake trout harvest reached an all-time low of 135,467 pounds. Only 819,600 pounds of whitefish were taken by commercial operators last year, a far cry from the annual catch which averaged about 3,000,000 pounds before lamprey predation started making inroads on the species' populations.

- 1/2 cup drained pickle relish or chopped sweet pickles
- 1/2 cup thinly sliced onion (about 2 small)
- 1/4 cup water
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 2 dashes Tabasco sauce
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 bay leaf
- 5 to 6 whole cloves

Combine ingredients, in the order listed, in a quart jar with tight cap. Shake well. Use as a marinade for vegetables cooked tender-crisp, Chinese style, or as a dressing for crisp vegetable salads. Yield. About 3-1/2 cups marinade or dressing.
