Last year's lake trout harvest reached an all-time low of 135,-467 pounds. Only 819,600 pounds of whitefish were taken by commercial operators last year, a far cry from the annual catch which averaged about 3,000,000 pounds before lamprey predation started making inroads on the species' populations.
