

City Seeks Legal Advice on Zoning

Tawas City Council is to seek legal advice on the proposed rezoning of an industrial area in the Second Ward formerly occupied by Huron Rustic Furniture Company.

At Monday night's regular meeting, a petition signed by 22 property owners in that area asked that the property bounded on the north by First Street and west from the Tawas River to a tier of lots fronting on Second Avenue be changed to residential.

Appearing before the council with the petition was Fred Landon, a First Ward resident.

At the same time, minutes of the city planning commission were read recommending similar action.

This property came under discussion by the council last month when it was discovered that it was zoned industrial. For years, city officials believed that the property was zoned residential and non-conforming use had been allowed for industrial purposes. Because it was zoned industrial, the city allowed repairs to an old frame building for use as storage warehouse for fish nets.

It was emphasized by the council that any action taken on rezoning of this property would have no effect on the warehouse or operation of Tawas Trailers, Incorporated, which now occupies a cement block building located on that property.

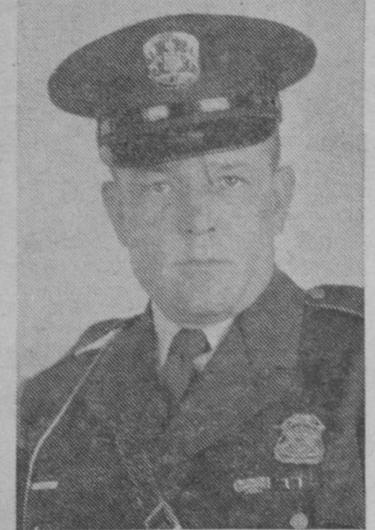
In a letter, the city's planning consultant, Vilican-Leman and Associates, Incorporated, said that from a planning standpoint, the area in question is logically residential and should be zoned that way. "The character of adjacent development is residential and the area is separated from the non-residential development to the east by Tawas River," stated its letter.

"Due to the fact that the character of the area is established as residential by the surrounding development of land uses, we would recommend that it be rezoned to a residential 'A' district at this time," said the planning consultant's letter. "It is likely that the proposed use of the property for industrial purposes would then have to be allowed as a legal non-conforming use within the residential district. It would, however, hold in check the future growth of industrial activity within this residential neighborhood."

Mayor George Tuttle questioned the feasibility of spot rezoning in the city. The planning commission is to be asked for a report on when complete rezoning of the city may be expected.

In the meantime, the council is to seek advice as to whether or

not the city may legally refuse building applications in questionable areas on the strength of the proposed new zoning ordinances.

Fire Danger High; Permit Required for All Burning

With an increasing number of grass fires being reported, Tawas City Council warned city residents this week that the state law regarding burning permits would be rigidly enforced.

Before burning grass, rubbish or leaves, a permit must be obtained from Assistant Fire Chief James Lansky.

Anyone allowing a grass fire to get out of hand will be prosecuted to the fullest extent. A burning permit does not relieve the applicant of any damage which may result from a fire.

At Monday night's council meeting, Alderman Howard Hutton urged strict enforcement of the state law and also asked that the city's ordinance covering burning of trash be brought up to date.

The city is to obtain a sample ordinance from the Michigan Municipal League governing grass fires.

Supt. Reginald Bublitz announced that clean-up days in Tawas City will be on April 23, 24 and 25. Pick-ups are scheduled to start in the First Ward on April 23.

New Constitution Adopted

Wins by Close Margin at Local and State Level

Michigan voters turned out in unprecedented numbers Monday to adopt the new state constitution by a narrow margin. Less than 10,000 votes proved to be the difference.

An estimated 1.6 million voters turned up at the polls for Michigan's last spring election. Under the revised constitution, such elections will no longer be held.

While the record turnout of voters gave Republican Gov. George Romney his first vote of confidence, Democrats had something to cheer about with capture of at least five of eight educational posts and two "non-partisan" seats on the state supreme court.

Justice Eugene Black and former justice, Paul Adams, were elected to the state supreme court. Here in Isosco County, voters favored Richard G. Smith of Bay City with 2,126 votes and gave Black 2,092. Adams received 1,296 votes in Isosco while Donald E. Holbrook of Clare had 1,571.

More than 4,000 Isosco County voters, or slightly more than half of those registered, went to the polls in Monday's spring election.

While main interest centered around the vote on Michigan's new constitution, several races at the local level held considerable voter interest.

Although Isosco County voters approved the new state constitution, 2,250 "yes" to 1,998 "no," the margin of difference was much less than expected in this county.

Voters in nine of the county's 20 precincts voted against adoption of the new document. Vote on the new constitution was as follows:

Mrs. Pelton Elected as Treasurer; Lixey and DeRosia Win

Three contests featured East Tawas non-partisan election, which saw a turn-out of 802 voters.

Mrs. Grace Klenow Pelton, incumbent treasurer, defeated James Patterson, 460-328. James DeRosia was elected First Ward alderman over George W. Hutchinson, 143-57, while Edwin Lixey, incumbent Third Ward alderman, defeated Robert Brookbank, 162-117.

Supervisor Starts \$50,000 Libel Suit

Claiming that a handbill being circulated contained false and fraudulent allegations, Supervisor Burdge Ashton filed a \$50,000 libel suit last week against two AuSable Township men.

Named as defendants in Ashton's complaint were Edward C. Fasbender and William Morrison.

Ashton asked Isosco Circuit Court to issue a temporary restraining order directing the two men to desist from circulating or distributing certain handbills.

According to the complaint, the handbills "imputed delinquency and malfeasance in office" on the part of Ashton and caused him personal and financial loss in the business which he owns and operates in the community in which he lives.

The complaint stated that the handbills were being circulated to influence voters in Monday's election. Ashton was a candidate for re-election as township supervisor.

Sticker Races Feature Vote in County

Featuring Monday's spring election in Isosco County, which will be the last one held under terms of the newly-adopted state constitution, were races at the township and city level to name local governmental officers for the ensuing year.

Seven of the 11 townships of Isosco had sticker candidates, along with a wide-open vote for Baldwin Township offices. The City of East Tawas had three contests.

ALABASTER TOWNSHIP

Henry Oates was unopposed for township supervisor in Alabaster, but two sticker candidates provided interest for voters. Hope Rescoe, running on stickers, defeated Jane Nelson for township clerk, 97-50. Viola Wemert, another sticker candidate, defeated Florence Gould for trustee, 83-62.

Other candidates besides the supervisor re-elected were: Leona Benson, treasurer; Theresa Roiter, justice of the peace; Claude Benson, four-year term, board of review; Elmer Slaven, two-year term, board of review; Harry Wellman, John Roiter, Vernon Hill, Ernest Nesbitt, constables; William Bessey, commissioner of highways.

AUSABLE TOWNSHIP

Burdge Ashton, incumbent candidate for supervisor, defeated Edward C. Fasbender, who ran on stickers, 295-110. Mornelva Snitcher was unopposed for clerk. Mary Spencer defeated Dorothy Colbath, sticker candidate for treasurer, 227-183; Bruce Caldwell was unopposed for trustee. Harlan Oliver, incumbent justice of the peace with 211 votes, defeated two sticker candidates, Herschel Wilhite, 123, and William Morrison, 36. Donald Grasser, running on the Democratic ticket for justice of the peace, had 32 votes. John Caldwell was unopposed for board of review.

BALDWIN TOWNSHIP

Election of officers in this township, which was thrown wide open by a ruling of the state election commission recently, saw Robert LaVoy, incumbent supervisor, defeating Richter Lixey in a close vote, 156-151. Frieda Rempert defeated incumbent clerk, Dale Butterfield, 151-120. Other candidates were Peter Lichtfusz, 28, George Foster, 10.

Other races were as follows: Treasurer Loretta Klenow ran without opposition. Paul Sobieski, incumbent trustee with 166 votes, defeated Stuart White with 117 votes and Steven Peterson with 32. Herbert Rempert had 196 votes for board of review, winning out over Floyd Peters with 46 and Henry Slykhouse with 41. John E. Chatel was unopposed for justice of the peace. Ray Coleman, with 159, and Kenneth McLean, 137, were elected to justice of the peace over Emmett Cecil, Charles Hunt and Chris Welteheff.

PLAINFIELD TOWNSHIP

George Webb, veteran member of the Isosco County Board of Supervisors, was re-elected.

No Contests in TC or Whittemore

There were no contests at Tawas City or Whittemore. Two changes in Tawas City's Republican slate finds Mrs. Delbert Albertson as treasurer and John Hosbach as Second Ward supervisor. Hosbach resigned as city treasurer to accept the unexpired vacancy of Cecil Lamb as supervisor and was unopposed in Monday's election. Mrs. Albertson was nominated at the Republican caucus.

At Whittemore, the only change in city government finds Bert Fortune elected as city clerk. He was nominated on the Democratic ticket when Henry Hasty retired from office. All other Democratic incumbents were re-elected.

Organization of Ander-Ett, Incorporated, is Announced

After pilot models of its new travel trailer received an enthusiastic reception from Michigan dealers last week, announcement is made today of the formation of a new manufacturing firm at East Tawas.

Ander-Ett, Incorporated, organized by three former employees of Anderson Coach Company, is expected to go into production in less than three weeks.

Officers of the new firm are Clarence Michalski, president; Bert Shorkey, vice president, and Arnold Hosbach, secretary-treasurer. All were long-time salaried employees of Anderson Coach Company, which closed its doors here in February.

Work started last Friday toward setting up a production line in the old final-finish building of Anderson Coach Company in Baldwin Township. Offices of the new firm are to be located in the same building.

Today's announcement has been anticipated for the past two weeks by most Tawas residents, who have watched with interest as activity increased around the final-finish building. Actually, the three men had been making plans for the new firm since February 20, when Anderson Coach announced its closing.

Considerable thought and field research was conducted by the three men as to consumer requirements in the camper or travel trailer market. Pilot models were produced and one was shown to dealers around the state last week. An evaluation of this exhibition has resulted in several minor changes on production models.

The field trip was also conducted to establish dealerships and to obtain orders so that a work schedule could be established.

Ander-Ett has obtained dealers in Bay City, Flint, Port Huron, De-

troit, Grand Rapids and Battle Creek, several of whom have multiple lot outlets in other cities.

"We did not expect this early enthusiasm from dealers, as a new product normally meets resistance," said Michalski. "The outlets we have made for our new trailers are very gratifying."

Shorkey and Hosbach, who visited sales lots around the state, said that for a pilot model, several dealers commented that the Ander-Ett was the "nicest trailer ever brought on our lots."

The new 16-foot camper features the convenience of sleeping six persons, has premium quality construction, lifetime aluminum exteriors are of pre-painted and baked-on enamel. The unit is so arranged that optional equipment requirements may readily be installed.

It is expected that the trailer will meet approval of the Mobile Home Manufacturing Association.

Some of the top cabinet men formerly employed by Anderson are going with the new firm.

Michalski, 43, who was the oldest man in length of service with Anderson Coach, started with that firm in 1947 and welded the first frame produced. He was line foreman when the plant closed.

Shorkey, 55, started with Anderson as a trucker when the plant first opened and later moved into the sales department.

Also working on Anderson's first coach produced in 1947 was Hosbach, who started in the cabinet shop and moved up to sales five years ago. He was assistant sales manager and assisted in purchasing when the plant closed.

This is the second camper trailer

manufacturing firm organized here during the past month. Tawas Trailers, Incorporated, was organized two weeks ago and now occupies the former location of Huron Rustic Furniture Company in Tawas City.

A rosary service will be said Wednesday night, 8:30 o'clock, at Jacques Funeral Home.

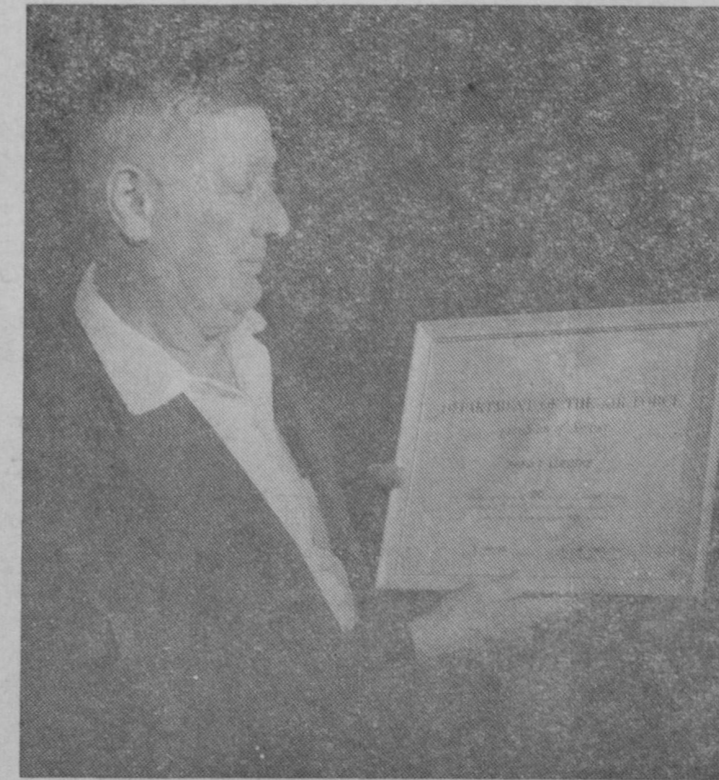
Negligent Homicide Draws Circuit Ct. Fine

Fire destroyed 30 acres of timber land Tuesday near Hale.

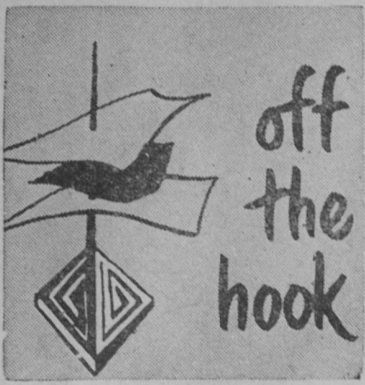


FRED T. LUEDTKE of Tawas City looks at a 20-year certificate awarded to him on his retirement.—Tawas Herald Photo.

When the state highway department presents formal plans for improvements to US-23 through Tawas City and East Tawas, it is hoped that some consideration will be given to one or two suggestions now being made locally.

According to plans as outlined recently by Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz, the highway department plans to eliminate the "rolled" curb on the lake side of US-23. It would be replaced with a straight curb, thereby eliminating parking along the shoulder.

While the elimination of the rolled curb may possibly have advantages to the free flow of traffic through the two communities, it would eliminate a considerable amount of valuable parking in an area which already lacks such facilities.

It is recognized that both communities must provide off-street parking, but it is important to remember, too, that motorists who now travel along US-23 are not looking for the shortest or fastest route to the Straits of Mackinac. Such a route is provided by the I-75.

People travel north on US-23 because of its scenic beauty, which, by the way, is a point that

will have to be promoted by all east-shore communities.

In taking this route, tourists make leisurely stops along the way... admiring the water and many points of interest. It is not uncommon during the summer months to see travelers pull off the highway to get a better look at Tawas Bay and then proceed on their way after a few minutes. This is where "shoulder" parking is important, in our opinion.

It is for this reason that we believe that parking should be allowed along certain areas of US-23. Naturally, the highway department should consider elimination of parking in areas most dangerous to the traffic flow.

The other suggestion which will probably be presented to the highway department is raising the bridge over Tawas River, should this structure be replaced in the current construction plans. Raising the bridge only three or four feet would mean a great deal to the future use of the mouth of Tawas River as a small craft harbor of refuge. During times of high water, most pleasure cruisers are unable to navigate under the bridge.

Raising the bridge would also open the entire river front to nearly as far as Mathews Street for cruiser traffic. The river channel would have to be dredged to achieve this, but it is certainly not out of the question.

Using a little imagination, one can see great potential in such a development.

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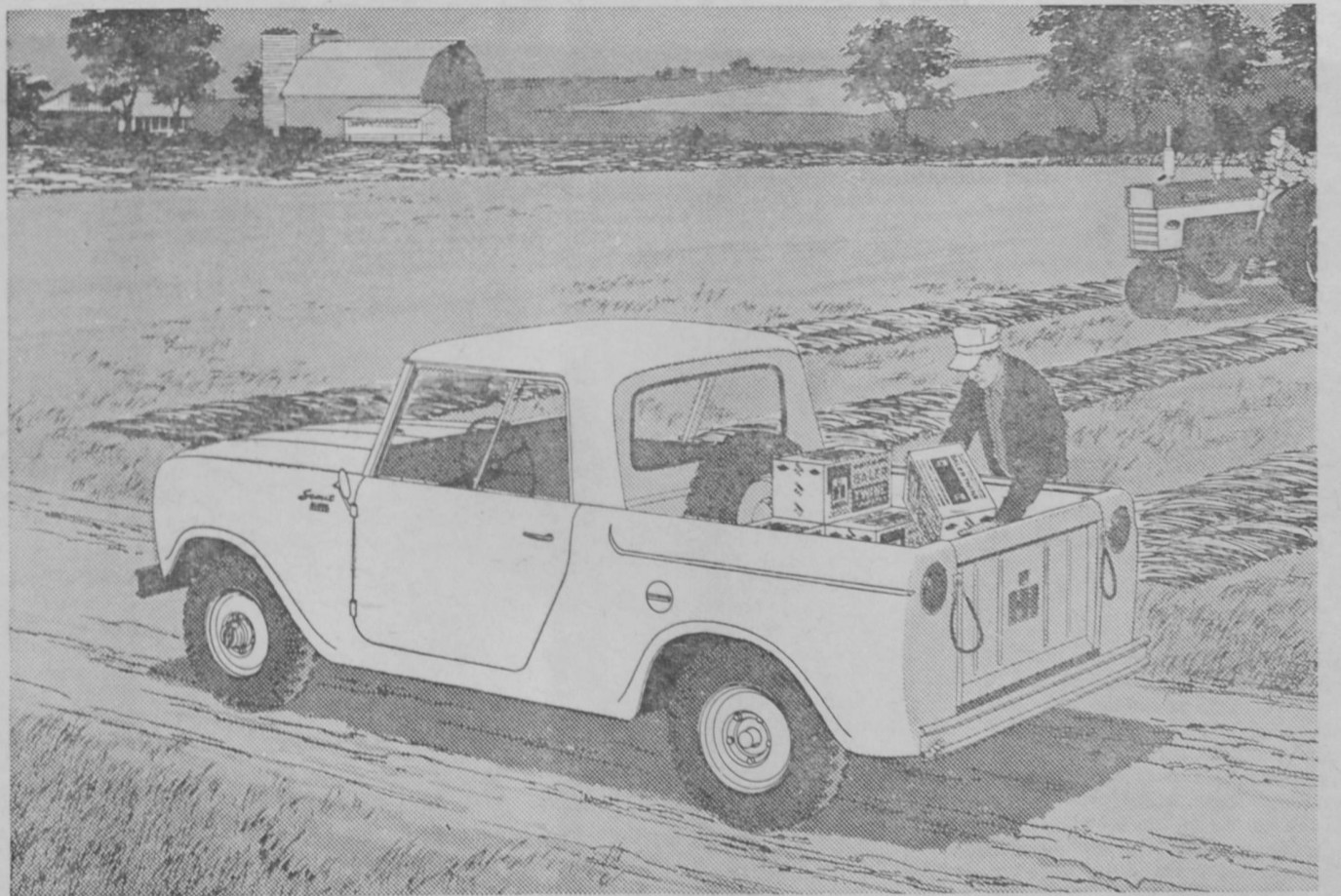

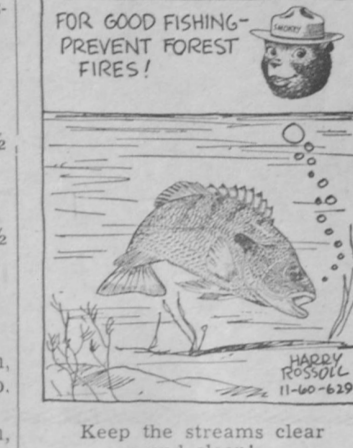

Tips Offered on How to Get Ail Social Security Credits

Timely tips were offered today by Paul M. Ellifritz, social security district manager in Bay City, to help you make sure you get all of your social security earnings credited when tax paying time rolls around April 15.

Mr. Ellifritz emphasized that if you worked for two employers during 1962, you may be entitled to have any excess social security taxes you paid refunded or applied to reducing the income tax owed.

In 1962, he said, you as an employee had 3 1/2 percent of your earnings up to the first \$4,800 a year deducted from your wages by your employer. Your W-2 Form should show no more than \$150 deducted from your wages in the F. L. C. A. (Federal Insurance Contribution Act) box even if you were paid more than \$4,800, the maximum creditable for social security.

Mr. Ellifritz pointed out that if you worked for two or more employers during the year and had the amounts of the F. L. C. A. boxes on all of your W-2 Forms add up to more than \$150, you have some money coming back.

The tax rate for a self-employed person for 1962 was 4.7 percent of the first \$4,800 of self-employment

earnings. Even if, because of a large number of dependents and small earnings, you do not owe any income tax, a self-employment social security tax must be paid and a return filed if your net earnings exceeded \$400 for the year.

Guard Helps Neighbors When Disaster Strikes

A wide variety of frequently little-known services are performed by National Guard units in times of crisis in their own home communities.

Valiant rescue efforts were made by members of the Army and Air National Guard when that ill-fated chartered airliner carrying Army recruits crashed near Richmond, Virginia, killing 77 passengers and crewmen. The 14th Tactical Fighter Squadron of Richmond sent the first and only heavy emergency equipment to reach the scene. Armored personnel carriers and jeeps of the 183rd Reconnaissance Squadron of Virginia's Army National Guard cut paths through the rugged terrain surrounding the scene so that this equipment could be moved in there. Once there, the men of the fighter squadron, wearing asbestos suits and hoods, waded into the fiery wreck to fight the fire and seek survivors. The men of the Guard also assisted in other ways such as searching the area for survivors and cordoning off the scene in order to keep spectators away.

In July, 1961, a flash flood hit Charleston, West Virginia, killing 22 people and injuring over 1600. The flood caused over \$6,000,000 in property damage. Before midnight a disaster task force of Guardsmen had been organized by Brigadier General Gene H. Williams, State Adjutant General, on orders from Governor W. W. Barron. Unit alert plans went into full operation as members were called into active state service for duty or reconnaissance patrols and relief crews.

Members of the 150th Armored Cavalry were placed on around-the-clock duty working 12 hours on and 12 hours off. Members of the 130th Troop Carrier Squadron of the Air National Guard volunteered to help without pay.

As work progressed they found that the equipment they had was insufficient to cope with the situation and sent out a call for additional apparatus. Within a few hours equipment and technical teams from all over the state were pouring into the stricken city. Reconnaissance teams scouted the area for people in need and security units sealed it off and protected it from looters. All told, it was the largest and most complex operation in West Virginia in more than three decades.

In mid-winter of 1962 a big snow storm hit the New Mexico mountains at the opening of the deer season trapping some 500 hunters. The snow piled up to three feet with as much as ten-foot drifts in some places. The Army National Guard from six towns cooperating with the State Police in the area began immediate rescue efforts which ended in bringing every hunter back alive and well.

Using only wheeled vehicles, the Guardsmen cleared paths in the snow to reach remote areas and also cleared existing roads so that the hunters could drive their cars out. They carried food to hunters who had taken refuge in the isolated ranches. As the Eddy County Sheriff put it, "the rescue of many would have been impossible without the National Guard."

When a million dollar fire burned El Centro, California's Barbara Worth Hotel to the ground, members of Company B, 40th Ordnance Battalion, were at hand to control the huge crowd which turned out to watch the blaze and guard adjoining buildings against looters. The fire took place on a record-breaking cold night in January of last year—but these men spent 14 hours out-of-doors on this assignment.

The 144th Medium Transport Squadron of Anchorage, Alaska, has an annual winter-time chore of flying food and fuel to ice-locked missions and Eskimo villages on Alaska's west coast. They have also helped transplant wildlife herds, carried gear to scientific expeditions to the islands, and hauled vital equipment to research parties studying Alaskan glaciers.

These are but a few examples of how the citizen-soldier is constantly ready and able to serve his community when help is needed.

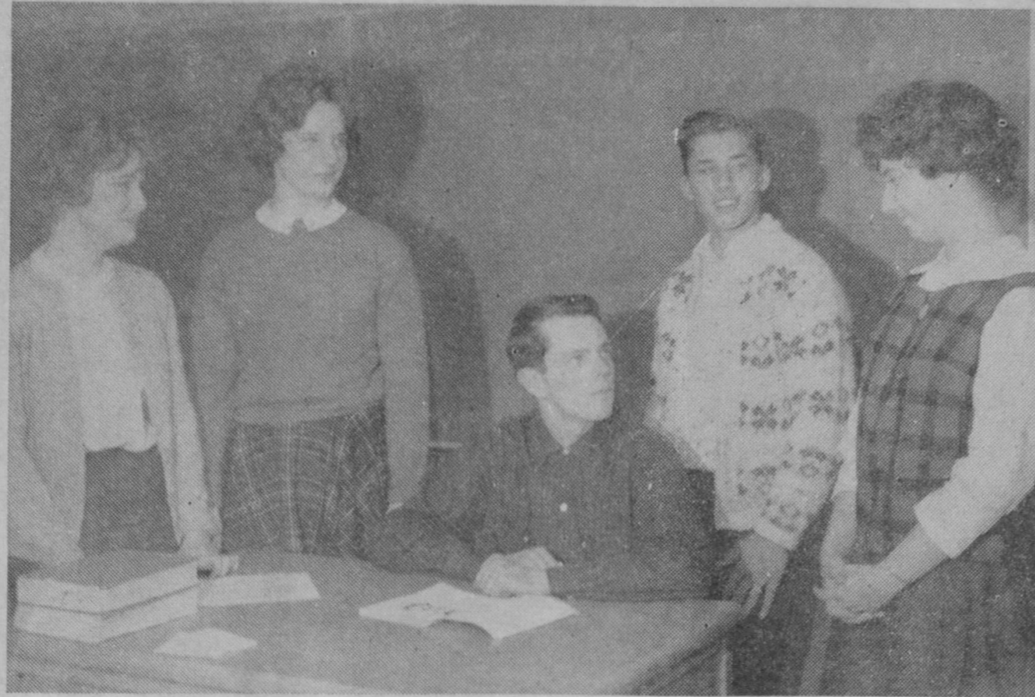

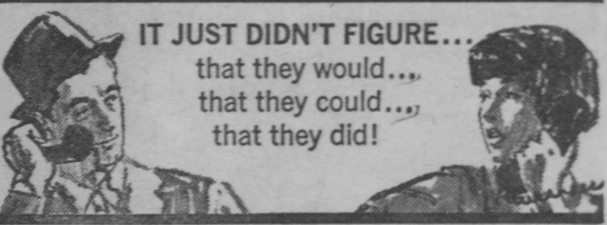
