



Time was when outdoor seekers looked to state parks in Michigan simply as good places to camp, swim, and picnic. Admittedly, much more needs to be done through illustrated talks, guided tours, forestry and wildlife demonstrations, and other activities to help visitors understand what they're seeing. 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

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

MICHIGAN CONSOLIDATED RATES ARE LOWER
