

Registration Days Told for Start of Fall Term

Registration of students from grades eight through 12 for the 1963-1964 term at Tawas Area School will be held from August 26 to August 30, according to Principal Ernest W. Jordan Jr.

This year, as usual, there will be no special days for each grade. Students may register on any of the days convenient to them, regardless of grade. Registration hours are from 9:00 a. m. to 3:30 p. m.

All students are expected to

register during these five days. If any student is unable to register at these times because of work, illness or being out-of-town, he is requested to call the high school office and notify those on duty that he will be in attendance this coming school year.

"Registration during this time is imperative because if a class is filled, you may have to substitute another class," said Jordan.

The principal most urgently requested that all fees be paid during registration. Any fees owed from last year will be collected during registration.

Fees established by the board of education are as follows: Book deposit, \$5 per family; to be kept clear at all times; art fee, \$3; shop fee, \$5; mechanical drawing, \$2; chemistry, \$1; physics, \$1; home economics, 50 cents.

There are some special fees which will be collected during the first week of school. These include band, chorus, workbooks, chemistry supplies, home economics supplies and physics charges.

Any student new to the area is urged to call the office of the elementary and secondary principals immediately.

Physical examinations will be given Friday, August 23, 7:30 p. m., at the high school gymnasium. All boys participating in sports are required to have this physical. Football equipment will be issued at the same time.

Sept. 3 Opening for Elementary Grades

School will begin Tuesday, September 3, for all elementary grades, one-seven, at 9 o'clock for a half-day session in the East Tawas and Tawas City units of Tawas Area Schools.

Kindergarten children will not attend school until Wednesday, September 4. All kindergarten children who are transported will attend the morning sessions unless parents wish to provide for their child's transportation for the afternoon session.

Children who attended the Tawas City unit last year will attend this unit unless notified of a change. Children who attended the East Tawas unit last year will attend this unit unless they have moved since school closed.

Kindergarten through fourth grade children in Whitney and Alabaster Townships and the bus route along US-23 to the Tawas City bridge will attend the East Tawas unit. Grades five, six and seven are housed in the Tawas City unit.

New residents should register kindergarten through seventh grade children in the office of Miss Clara Bolen, 325 Newman Street, East Tawas, August 26 or 27 from 9-12 and 1-3 o'clock. Please bring birth certificate and immunization record. If it is impossible to register a child before school begins, please call FO 2-2151.

The fee for books and supplies for all children in elementary grades, kindergarten through seventh, is \$2.50 per child payable by September 16.

White milk will be available in both units starting Wednesday, September 4. Milk must be ordered and paid for on Friday for the following week. Hot lunch is available at \$1.25 a week or 30 cents by the day in both units.

Consolidated Proposes \$8 Million NEM Project

Michigan Consolidated Gas Company announced today that it desires to invest eight million dollars to help the development of industry and tourism along the eastern shore of Michigan from Tawas City to Alpena if it is granted permission to distribute natural gas in this area.

Fred H. McIntire, vice president, sales, of Michigan Consolidated, pointed out that the West Branch and Alpena City Councils and the Alpena Township Board have voted unanimously to award his company a franchise to serve their areas. The Tawas City and East Tawas Councils and the Oscoda Township Board have delayed action on the utility's request until August 28, pending studies of proposals to serve the area presented by both Michigan Consolidated and Consumers Power Company.

"If Tawas City, East Tawas and Oscoda also grant Michigan Consolidated franchises, we will run our pipeline from West Branch to Tawas City and north to Alpena along US-23, thus providing natural gas to approximately 70 miles of shoreline communities. No other gas utility has made such an offer," he added.

McIntire said that an abundant supply of natural gas along the eastern shore will make an important contribution to the tourist business and industrial development of the entire area and provide residents with more economical fuel for their homes and business places. "Everybody doing business in the trading area would benefit from having low cost, clean burning natural gas. In addition, each community and county would derive large new tax revenues from this multi-million dollar gas system," McIntire said.

lower cost fuel and will become much more attractive to new industry."

McIntire said that Michigan Consolidated has been studying the potential growth of Northeastern Michigan for some time and came to the conclusion that the extension of natural gas to the area would give the economy of the eastern shore a tremendous boost.

"Our experience along the western shore of Michigan, in such places as Montague, Whitehall, Ludington, Manistee and Traverse City, and inland cities; such as, Fremont, Scottville, Custer, and many other towns, proves that natural gas service has helped create new jobs and reduced the cost of living. We know we can do the same thing in Eastern Michigan if given the opportunity."

Councilmen wishing to attend are invited to board an airplane Friday morning at Iosco County Airport for the trip to Detroit. Last Wednesday, officials were guests of Consumers Power Company on a tour of its facilities.

Consumers Tells Plan for Local Job Expansion

Expansion of control and service facilities in the Tawas area as well as increased job opportunities here—should Consumers Power Company receive a franchise to bring natural gas to the area—the promise Monday night of Louis Vaupre, manager of the company's Bay City division.

Speaking before city and township officials of Tawas City, East Tawas and Oscoda, Vaupre said that Tawas had been developed as a service center for its electrical power operation and presently had 68 employees here.

"Should Consumers Power receive the gas franchise, Tawas would become an even more important center for the company," he said. "Anything we have in the Tawas area increases our desire to make it a control center."

He indicated that such a center, similar to one at Midland, would handle electrical power and gas interests in the company's entire northern area. He indicated it would mean expansion of the company's accounting, engineering and service department here along with new quarters to house such a center.

He said that success in obtaining a gas franchise would also mean a new local office located in the Oscoda-AuSable area.

Vaupre and other members of the Bay City division made their

final sales "pitch" to local officials following a dinner meeting at the Holland Hotel. The three communities are to make a selection between Consumers Power Company and Michigan Consolidated Gas Company to decide which firm will receive a natural gas franchise.

Lowell Shepard, assistant division manager, pointed out that Consumers Power was a sound and conservative company. He said that the area had been studied carefully before making a move. Key to bringing in gas, he said was to interest National Gypsum Company and Wurtsmith Air Force Base in using gas. He said that both were sound prospects.

Although stating that his company believed in competition and was interested in free enterprise, Shepard said one large utility would mean more to the area than two small ones. He also said that the area of competition does not exist between electric and gas companies. "It is not like a couple of furniture companies competing for business... rates are controlled by the Michigan Public Service Commission."

Other spokesman for the company said that the route of the gas main would be direct from Coleman to the Tawas area with laterals to intermediate communities. Size of the transmission line would be eight-inch and operated at 300

Plans Announced Friday for AuSable Canoe Race

Plans are now complete for the 16th annual AuSable River Valley canoe race to be held October 4, 5 and 6, according to an announcement made last Friday.

At a press conference held at Five Channels Dam Clubhouse, Robert Hayes, race committee secretary, said that entry blanks were to be mailed this week to professional and amateur canoeists who will vie for \$3,050 in top prize and \$300 in preliminary money.

Pole position and other starting places will be determined in a preliminary race to be held October 4 on Lake Margrethe.

Sponsors of the annual canoe classic are Consumers Power Company, Townships of Oscoda and AuSable, the Mio Chamber of Commerce, Crawford County Chamber of Commerce and the

East Michigan Tourist Association.

This will be the second successive year that the race has been scheduled for the first week-end in October, one month later than races held in former years. It will also mark the second year that the race will be a three-day affair with an overnight stop at Mio.

The race will again take place at the height of fall color season which is expected to provide added interest to spectators who crowd the river banks.

Starting from Grayling on the AuSable, famed for its lumber drive of an earlier day, contestants will set out in two-man canoes at 10:30 a. m. Saturday and paddle to Mio. Scheduled arrival of the first canoe at Mio dam is expected at 4:30 p. m.

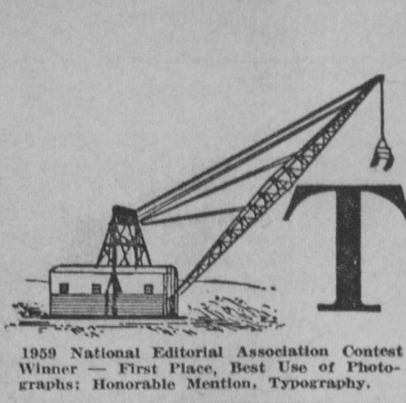
The Sunday, October 6, lap from Mio to Oscoda starts at 6:30 a. m. and the first team is expected to cross the finish line around 4:00 p. m.

Canoes are to start at 15-second intervals and over-all elapsed time on the river will determine winners.

Last year, Ron Hohman and Ralph Sawyer, both of Oscoda, won \$1,200 first place money by completing the 240-mile course in 14 hours and 50 minutes.

Prerace favorites this year are Jerry Lauwers of Tawas City and Stanley Hall of Oscoda, who have won first place in nine out of 10 races this season.

Grayling, Mio and Oscoda annually plan civic festivals to accompany the race.

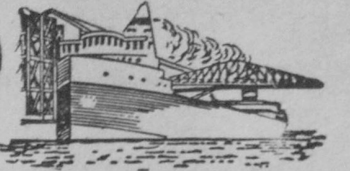

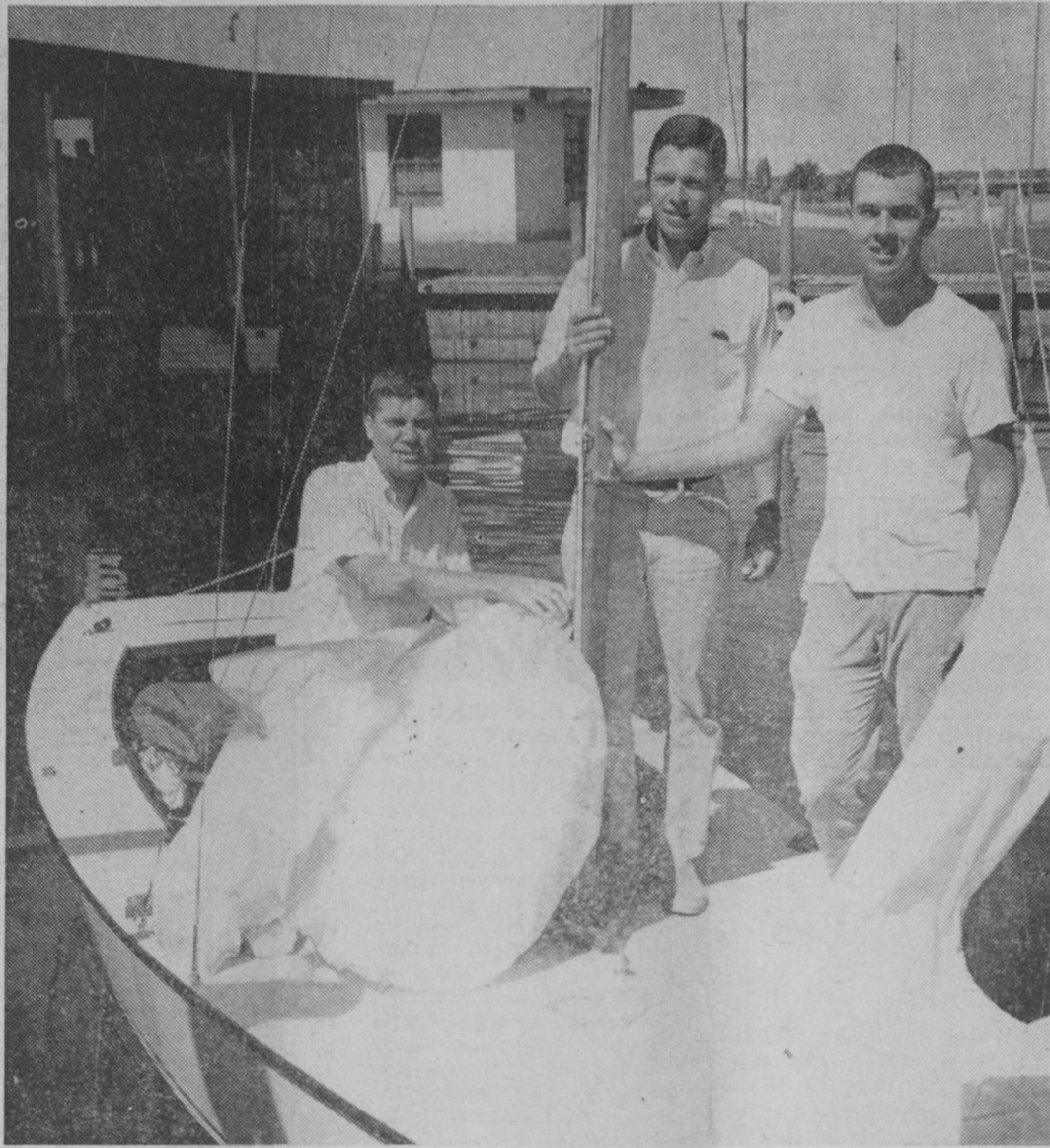

Tawas Bay will gain national attention next month when it is the site of the week-long International Lightning Association's North American Championship regatta.

As of yesterday, some 92 boats had been registered by officials of Tawas Bay Yacht Club, host of the event to be held here September 2 through September 8. This will be the largest fleet ever to compete in the regatta and more than 300 people are expected to take part.

This will be the second time that Tawas Bay has hosted this event. The first international championship regatta was held here in 1960. Some 68 boats were entered that year and Carl Eichenlaub Jr. of San Diego, California, was the winner.

Two Barton City Men Die in M-171 Crash Tues.

Two young men from Barton City were killed early Tuesday morning when their car missed a curve on M-171 five miles north of Oscoda. Their deaths were Iosco's sixth and seventh auto fatalities since January 1.

Killed instantly when thrown from the car were Leo VonFintel,

20, driver, and Frank Elmer Neil, 17.

Two passengers in the back seat, John Marshall Sr., 36, Alpena, and John Marshall Jr., 32, were treated for bruises by an Oscoda physician and released.

Robert Foster, Oscoda Township police chief, said that the car was traveling at a high rate of speed. The driver apparently lost control on a curve, hit the shoulder and then rolled and skidded for 600 feet.

Assisting Foster in the investigation were Oscoda Township Officers Charles Burke and William Hobart, along with Iosco County Sheriff Ivan L. O'Farrell.

Low Bidders Told on US-23 Project

Two firms were low bidders on three highway construction projects in Iosco County last Wednesday by the state highway department. Bids were opened on 39 highway construction and maintenance projects throughout the state.

Saginaw Asphalt Paving Company's bid, \$244,348, was accepted for 5.4 miles of paving on US-23 from the old M-171 junction near Oscoda north to the county line.

Saginaw Asphalt Paving was also low bidder, \$399,003, for constructing 6.3 miles of paving on US-23 from Tawas City south to the county line.

Straits Aggregate Company of Tawas City was low bidder, \$566,320, for construction 12.6 miles of paving on US-23 from East Tawas north to Oscoda. There were nine bids on all projects except the last named, which listed eight.

Work is to be completed in late fall of 1964.

Council Seeks to Explain Operation of Proposed Dump

Members of the Tawas City Council and Supt. of Public Works Reginald Hublitz are to attend a public hearing at Tawas Township Hall Tuesday, August 27, called for reviewing amendments and changes in the township zoning ordinance.

City officials hope to have the opportunity to explain operations and rules and regulations for a proposed dump to serve both city and township residents to be located off Townline Road.

A hearing was held by the township board July 1 to hear objections to establishment of a privately-maintained dump on property owned by Harry Rescoe. Approval was given for such an operation by township officials, but since the hearing, objections have been voiced by township residents.

In other business Monday night, the council authorized expenses of \$150 for Mayor George Tuttle to attend the Michigan Municipal League Convention September 4, 5, 6 and 7 at Mackinac Island. Tuttle is a vice president of this organization which wields considerable power in state legislative circles.

At the request of Donald Watson, motel operator south of the US-23 bridge, Police Chief George Ruth is to contact the state highway department in regard to placement of proper warning signs along the highway.

Watson said that a dangerous situation was created several years ago when traffic control signs were changed from 35 to 45 miles per hour. He said that pe-

TC Council Tables State Parking Pact

Action on a parking restriction agreement proposed by the Michigan State Highway Department was tabled Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

According to provisions of the agreement, parking on US-23 would be prohibited from M-55 to the east city limits where dangerous during periods of highway construction.

Last month, the council voiced opposition to the highway department's plans for highway construction through Tawas City. The project was to have been included in a bid letting last Wednesday. The project is to be considered again in October.

Mayor George Tuttle was of the opinion that the parking restriction agreement as presented was in error. Construction plans call for starting at the south limits on US-23 and extending to the east city limits.



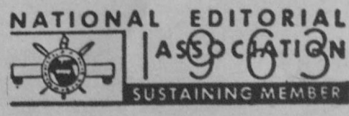

1963 is All-Time High Sales Year in Auto Industry

With the automobile industry establishing an all-time high sales year, automobile dealers in many Michigan communities are finding a brisk demand for passenger cars and trucks.

This, in turn, according to Secretary of State James M. Hare, keeps his 235 branch offices throughout the state busy processing titles and levying weight taxes.

An analysis of new vehicle registration in the first five months of 1963 shows that 395 passenger cars and 49 trucks were titled in Iosco County.

In the period studied, 201,695 new passenger cars and 19,497 new trucks were registered in Michigan's 83 counties.

Hare cited industry figures showing that more than 5,000,000 motor vehicles have been produced in the United States since the first of the year and that more than 7,000,000 cars and trucks had been manufactured during the 1963 model year.

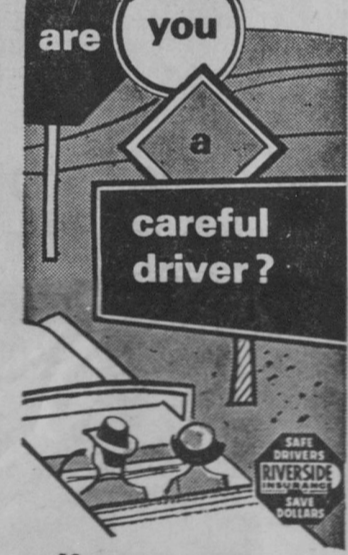
"National car sales have done much to improve Michigan's prosper-

ity and morale," Hare said. "As these vehicles are sold and used, they not only bring jobs and tax dollars to our Great Lakes state but they also move tourists in and manufactured materials out of Michigan. Peak vehicle registrations are something which should please everybody, workers, manufacturers, stockholders, tax collectors, restaurant owners, motel operators and many others. Car sales and a better way of life are synonymous, especially in Michigan."

Some Farmers Not Getting Full Social Security Credit

Because they are failing to use the optional method of reporting farm income, many farmers are not getting all the social security credit they could get, according to Paul M. Ellifritz, district manager of the social security office, Bay City. Mr. Ellifritz pointed out that a farmer can often get more social security credit under the option than his actual net profit would permit. This is because a farmer who has a gross income of \$1,800 or more can report \$1,200 under the option even if his actual net is less than \$1,200. A farmer who grosses less than \$1,800 is permitted to report two-thirds of his gross income for social security credit, even if his actual net is much less than the amount creditable under this option. The option can even be used if the farmer suffers a net loss.

Of course, it only follows that the more the farmer reports, the more social security tax he has to pay, but in the long run, he gains considerably since the amount of benefit that he receives, when he retires or becomes disabled, is related to the amount of reported earnings. With this in mind, it is easy to see the advantage of using the option when it can be used.

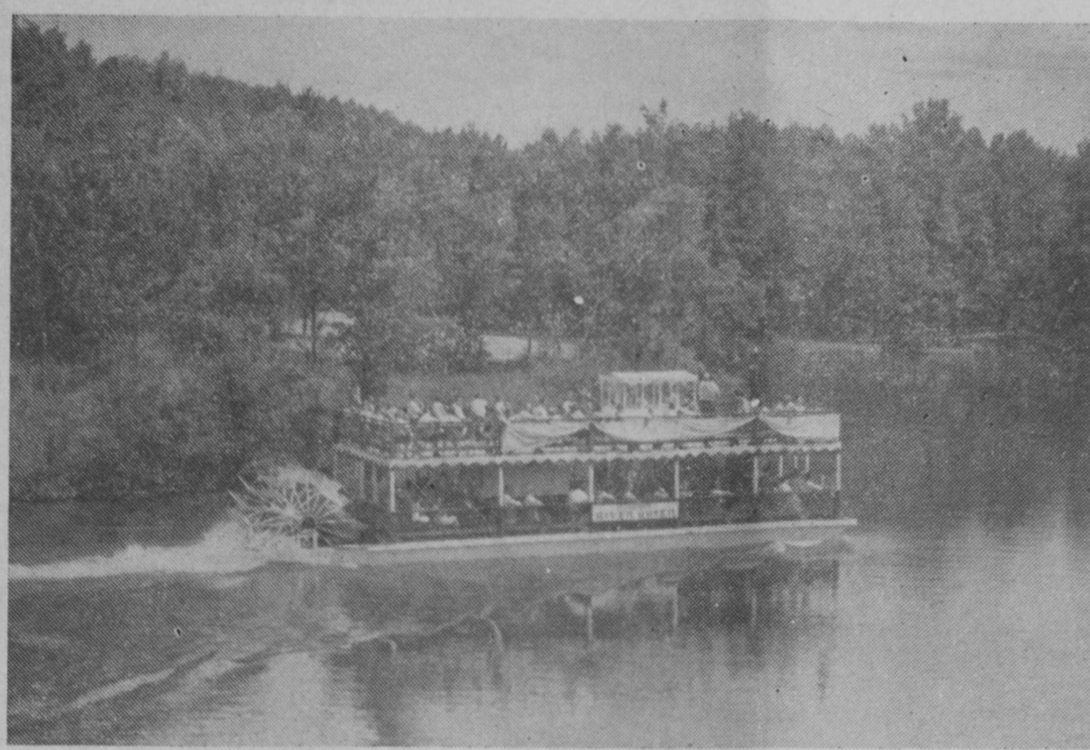

Dear Editor:
Last week-end, I witnessed a shocking event. On one of our inland lakes, a teen-age boy almost drowned. We came upon the scene too late to help as he had been already saved by an alert neighbor who was on the beach when the terrified cry was first heard. We were not too late, however, to observe a most pronounced case of apathy and indifference. Well within 100 yards of where the boy was swimming were two boats anchored. One contained one fisherman and the other held two. Those fishermen did not so much as reel in their lines to move in and help the boy. They simply sat and fished and watched a thrashing, frightened boy whose leg had cramped, scream for help. They watched the hero run from shore to aid him, a distance greater than theirs.

We've read a lot recently about the apathy and indifference that has been demonstrated by our people. Politicians fear for our national image, preachers fear for our souls and educators fear for our intellectual future, all blaming this on our "I don't care" attitude. Most of us have treated such warnings with that right, indifference. We like to mind our own business and have no real fear of complete moral dissipation. But if those fishermen are representative of the latest trend in our changing culture, if someday we all will be able to sit by and watch a tragedy in real life develop, and then do nothing to help avert it, we are sicker than we realize.

Every Vet Has One; Fails to Use It!

Every veteran has one. The trouble is he, or his dependents, do not use it.

Along with zip codes and seven-digit telephone numbers, a veteran has a "C" or claims number. It is one of his more material assets. Please, urges the Veterans Administration, get in the habit of using it when writing or telephoning.

The VA, declares Robert M. Fitzgerald, its regional manager for Michigan, just cannot trust a name. The Detroit regional office index system contains the names of more than 895,000 veterans.

Each veteran on his first contact with the VA is assigned a "C" number. It is his for life and when he dies it becomes "XC" and stays in the files as long as his dependents draw VA benefits.

Lack of identification slows down VA service. Most of VA's troubles could be solved, explains Mr. Fitzgerald, if the veteran would just keep his "C" number handy and use it when writing or telephoning.

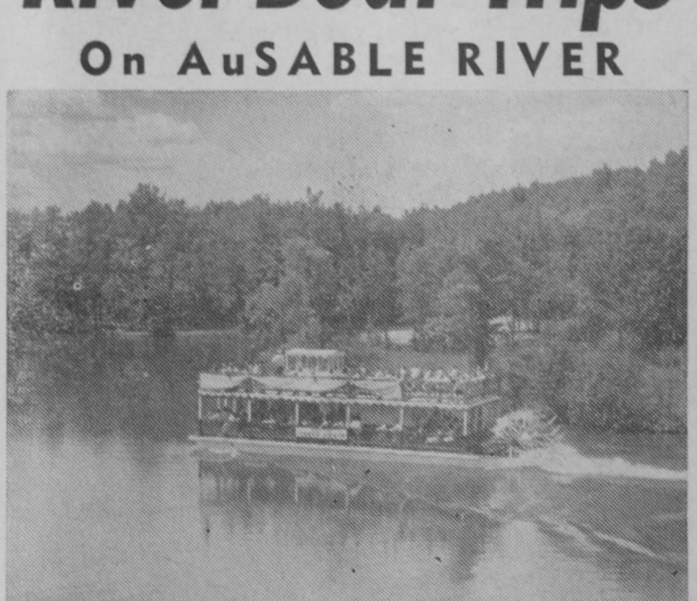

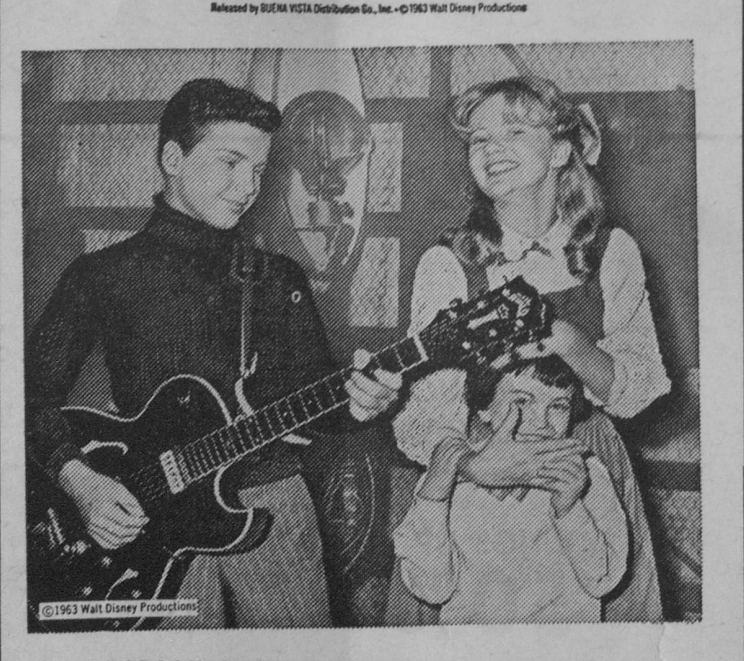

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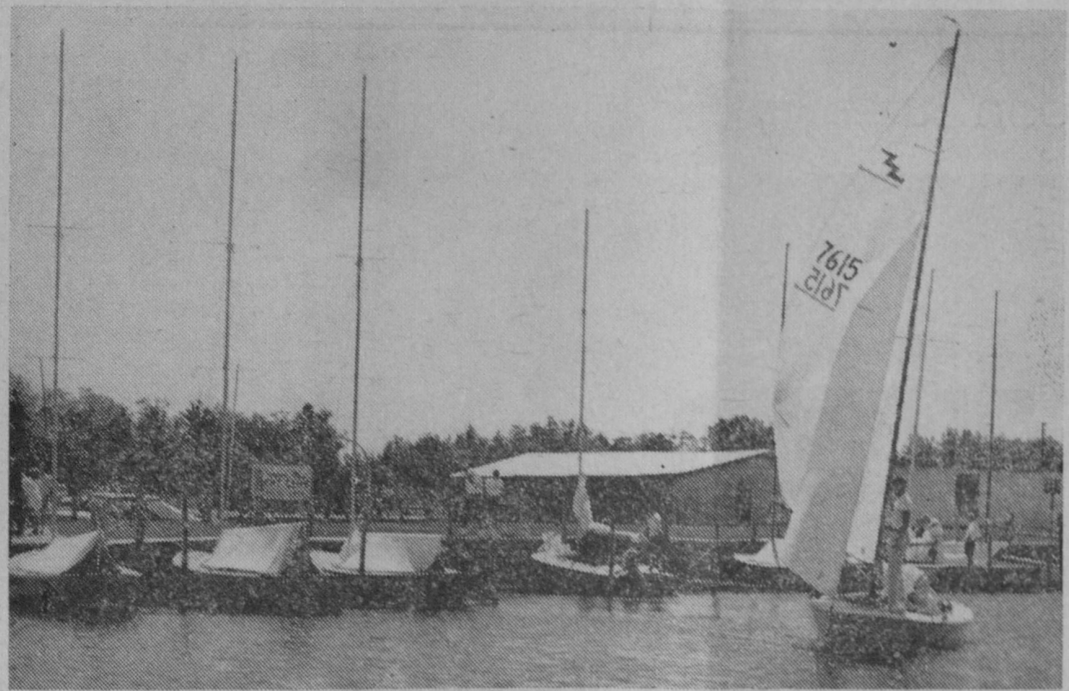
