

Tawas Extends Welcome to Lightning Sailors

All is in readiness for the International Lightning Association's North American championship regatta to be held on Tawas Bay September 2-8.

Plans for this national event, being held here for the second time, were finalized last week-end by Tawas Bay Yacht Club under Commodore Clarence R. McMullen, Regatta Chairman Charles Schreck and committee members.

With 95 boats entered, this regatta will go down on record as the largest Lightning class regatta

ever held in association history and one of the largest ever staged by a single class.

A total of 21 states will be represented in the fleet and one crew has entered from Lima, Peru, site of the world championship races this winter.

With 24 boats, New York has the largest entry, followed by Michigan's 12, Connecticut with nine, seven each from California, Ohio and New Jersey.

Several former champions are included among the competing

skippers and all have one thing in mind—winning the North American championship.

Among former champions competing will be Defending Champion Tom Allen, Buffalo Canoe Club, winner of 1962 and 1963 regattas; Herman Nickels, Lake Fen-ton, 1959 winner; Carl Eichenlaub Jr., San Diego, California, 1960 winner; Henry Cawthra, Crescent Sail Yacht Club.

Officials of Tawas Bay Yacht Club said that boats towed on trailers would begin arriving here by Friday. Sail measuring and hull weigh-ins are to start Friday morning.

Nearly 500 participants and guests are now expected by officials of the host club. Months of preparation have been devoted to insuring proper handling of visitors.

Final arrangements were being made early this week to handle boat launchings. All local sail boats have been removed from the yacht club's harbor and parking areas are being staked out by Nickels, who is chairman of launching.

Food and other supplies are being purchased to handle large crowds expected at the clubhouse. "Stand-up" breakfasts and noon

lunches will be served there daily for visiting sailors.

The yacht club has been a beehive of activity for months. The clubhouse has been enlarged and modernized, docking slips have been improved, board walks have been constructed, grass seed planted and parking lots enlarged and improved.

Tune-up races will be held Sunday afternoon and Monday morn-

ing with the first qualifying race slated to start at 1:30 p. m. Monday.

Second and third qualifying races will be held Tuesday and the annual association meeting will be held that evening.

The fleet of 95 boats will then be broken down into three divisions according to points earned in the qualifying rounds. From Wednesday through Saturday,


there will be five races to determine winner of the North American championship, five races for the president's cup division and four races for the governor's cup.

The United States Coast Guard and Auxiliary will patrol races. Entertainment during the week will include a fish fry Friday night at the Barnes Hotel and the banquet and awards presentation Saturday night at the Holland Hotel.

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Fall School Term Starts Next Tues.

School will start next Tuesday for all grades, one through 12, at 9:00 a. m. for a half-day session in Tawas Area Schools.

Kindergarten children will not attend school until Wednesday, September 4. Children who attended the Tawas City elementary unit last year will attend this unit unless notified of a change. Those who attended the East Tawas unit last year will attend this unit unless they have moved since school closed.

High school registration started on Monday of this week and is to continue through Friday, 9:00 a. m. to 3:30 p. m. All students are expected to register during these five days.

Three new teachers are listed on the high school faculty. Included are Miss Grace Asplund, formerly of Tustin, a 1963 graduate of Ferris Institute; Richard Fairless, Flint, a 1963 graduate of Adrian College; and Kenneth Gibbons, Pontiac, a 1963 graduate of Wayne State University.

Miss Asplund will be the commercial teacher, Fairless will be assistant reserve football coach, reserve baseball, ninth grade basketball and will teach physical education and social studies at the Tawas City elementary unit. Gibbons becomes a member of the high school English department.



Tawas City to Host State Planning Assn. Sept. 19-20

More than 300 persons are expected to attend the 1963 fall conference of the Michigan Society of Planning Officials to be held at the Barnes Hotel September 19-20.

Host to the two-day conference is the Tawas City Planning Commission. Del Myles, planning commission member, is program chairman.

Hugo Keiser, chairman of the Tawas City Planning Commission, will preside at the noon luncheon September 19. Guests will be welcomed by Mayor George Tuttle.

C. Dwight Wood, formerly of Tawas and now executive director of the St. Clair Regional Planning Commission, will speak on "Community Benefits from Planning."

The afternoon program will include a field trip with members having the choice of either a scenic cruise down the AuSable River on the paddlewheel river boat or perch fishing on Tawas Bay.

A banquet will be held that evening and toastmaster will be Professor Myles Boylan, chairman of urban planning studies, department of urban planning and landscape architecture, Michigan State University.

A talk will be given by Bernard M. Conboy, executive director of Michigan Department of Economic Expansion, entitled "Community Development Through Planning." "Saginaw Downtown Plan," a

color slide presentation prepared by Saginaw architects, will be presented by Cleve M. Orler, head of the Saginaw Comprehensive Planning Division.

A movie, Michigan as host for the 1968 olympics, will be presented by William Rowden, director of the Macomb County Planning Commission.

Friday's program will include a mock public hearing on a zoning change to be held at the Iosco County Building. Francis P. Bennett, head planner of the Detroit City Planning Commission, will be chairman. William Inglis, chairman of the Iosco County Planning Commission, will take part in the mock proceedings.

A mock public hearing on a zoning appeal will also be held that morning with Mr. Bennett in charge. Ralph Meyers, East Tawas councilman, will act on the zoning board of appeals.

Presiding at the noon luncheon will be Miss Alice E. Donnel, president of the Michigan Society of Planning Officials.

"Elements of Community Planning" will be the title of an address given by Paul M. Reid, executive director of the Detroit Metropolitan Area Regional Planning Commission.

Bids of Five Local Firms Accepted by TA Board

Bids from five local firms were accepted Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education. Four of the bids had been opened two weeks ago and tabled for further study.

Nelkie's Dairy was awarded the contract to furnish milk and ice cream bars in the school's hot lunch program. The school uses approximately 171,582 half-pints of milk per year and 2,639 dozen ice cream bars.

Although Clyde Soper's bid of 5.4 cents per half-pint of milk was lower than Nelkie's bid of 5.5 cents, an analysis showed that total cost during the year, including ice cream bars, would be \$11,680.16 from Nelkie's and \$11,693.30 from Soper. Nelkie entered a bid of 85 cents per dozen for ice cream bars while Soper bid 92 cents per dozen.

Michigan Bakeries, Incorporated, low bidder, was awarded the contract to furnish baked goods in the hot lunch program.

Barbier Gas and Oil received a contract to furnish approximately 100,000 gallons of No. 5 fuel oil and Bublitz received the contract to furnish approximately 30,000 gallons of gasoline. Bublitz had entered the low bid on all petroleum products, but the board decided to use fuel oil other than that furnished by a West Branch refinery.

Three bids were opened to install doors at the Tawas City Unit. Edward Doak's bid of \$645.40 was accepted. Other bids received included Eckstein Construction

Company, \$675.40, and Henry Oates, \$725.

The board authorized purchase of \$743 worth of physical education equipment at the high school. This includes two gym stands, tumbling mats, weigh-in scales, exercise bars.

An investigation is to be made into cost of constructing a track at the high school athletic field. Trustee Walter Champion was of the opinion that a track could be constructed using volunteer help at a cost much less than the previous estimate of \$15,000.

TA Board Approves Hiring of 14 Drivers for School Term

Hiring of 14 bus drivers along with a \$15 per month salary increase to each was approved Monday night by the Tawas Area Board of Education.

Three new drivers were hired, including Charles Schalm, Carl Eckman and Mrs. Joan Hamel. Other drivers include Roy Wright, Henry Gage, Clarence King, Clarence Stevens, Charles Clayton, Norma Worsham, Edwin Peterson, Harold Ellsworth, Mrs. Shirley Killey, Edgar Jenkins and Harry Pierson.

With a \$15 increase, Pierson receives the top salary paid to bus drivers of \$145 per month. Gage, King and Peterson receive \$135 per month and the remainder are to receive \$125 with the \$15 increases. Additional wages are paid to drivers handling extra kindergarten runs.

A five-cent an hour pay increase was granted to kitchen help. Head cooks now receive \$1.35 an hour while experienced helpers receive \$1.15. Wages of new employees remains at \$1 an hour.

Two Experiments in Student Segregation

Two experiments in segregated classes have been authorized in Tawas Area Schools this year by the board of education.

As a means of providing time for participation in both physical education and band, all sixth and seventh grade classes will be segregated according to sex at the Tawas City elementary unit.

Miss Clara Bolen, elementary principal, said that many parents had requested that their children be allowed to participate in both band and physical education.

This could be accomplished, she said, only through complete segregation of classes and offering band and physical education periods on a sectional basis. Junior band would be offered the first hour in the morning for seventh graders and beginning band the last hour in the afternoon.

The other case of class segregation at Tawas Area School was authorized Monday night by the board of education. The name of Miss Burnetta Miller was suggested as possible selections for supervisor of the eighth grade.

It would be the supervisor's responsibility to see that eighth graders were segregated from high school students prior to the start of school in the morning and at noon.

Cong. Cederberg Speaks Sunday at Dedication of Iosco County Airport

Iosco County will dedicate its new airport Sunday morning with a program filled with activities.

The program will start with a dawn patrol for visiting pilots at 6:00 a. m. sponsored by the Iosco Flying Club. Breakfast will be served at the airport hangar until 11:00 a. m.

Richard Egli, who has charge of the day's activities, said Tuesday that 96 planes had attended a dawn patrol last week at another airport.

"Given any kind of a break in weather, we should have an even larger attendance because of the dedication," said Egli.

Actual dedication of the airport is scheduled to start at 10:00 a. m.

Ralph Western, president of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, will be master of ceremonies. Guests will be welcomed by George Blust, chairman pro tem of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors.

Also scheduled as a speaker will be State Rep. James P. Mielock of Whittemore. Wurtsmith Air Force Base will furnish a color guard for flag raising ceremonies.

Principal speaker is to be Cong. Elford A. Cederberg of Bay City, who will unveil a plaque on a corner of the airport terminal building.

Prizes are to be awarded to visiting pilots and local residents following the program. Donald Watson and James DeWyse have

charge of that segment of the program.

Chairman Egli emphasized that all local residents are urged to attend the dedication ceremony and all are welcome to attend the pancake breakfast.

Other activities listed on the program will be a display of model airplanes by personnel of Wurtsmith Air Force Base and a display of experimental aircraft. Two parachute jumps are scheduled during the day.


The new airport is located five miles north of East Tawas and one mile west of US-23. A road leading from US-23 near the Tawas Drive-In Theatre to the airport was recently completed by the Iosco

County Road Commission.

Also in attendance will be officials from the Michigan Department of Aeronautics, Federal Aviation Administration and officers from Wurtsmith.

The new airport is equipped with a 24 by 32-foot terminal building with waiting room and manager's office. Financed by federal, state and local funds, the airport has a 3,500-foot runway, airplane hangar, fuel facilities and parking area.

Harbor Improvements to be Presented Today

Michigan State Waterways Commission will present plans today to the United States Army Corps of Engineers proposing construction of new harbor facilities on its present dock at East Tawas.

According to the plan, an additional 81 boat wells would be constructed giving dockage facilities for a total of 113 boats.

The proposal calls for extending the present dock 500 feet out into Tawas Bay with solid construction. Two "arms," similar in shape to one on the present dock, only longer, would extend eastward from the main structure.

If the plan is accepted by the corps of engineers and receives 50 percent federal participation, the waterways commission has stated it would participate for the remaining cost.

This afternoon's hearing, scheduled to start at 1 o'clock, has been called to hear desired improvements at Tawas Bay Harbor in the interest of navigation.

The district engineer is presently making a survey of the Lake Huron shoreline with a view to establishment of harbors and harbors of refuge for light draft commercial and fishing vessels and for recreational craft.





Officials noted that the NEM League constitution stated: "Any player who plays with another club on a date when his club has a regularly scheduled game shall be declared ineligible and cannot play with any Northeastern Michigan League Club."

Gondol, who plays for Skaff Furniture as well as being on the East Tawas list, pitched a game against Bishop Construction Company on July 28, the same day that East Tawas played Comins. Although on the player list, his August 18 appearance was his first for East Tawas.

Conference Points to Traffic Safety Measures for State

A motor vehicle inspection program, strong law enforcement with more and better-trained police officers, additional funds for the driver education program—these were the points most emphasized here last Wednesday at the regional traffic safety conference.

More than 150 persons—law enforcement officers, educators, state, county and city officials and others interested in traffic safety—participated in the day-long conference at the Holland Hotel, said to have been the best attended in the current series of meetings called by Gov. George Romney.

Among the speakers was Larry Burkhardt, special representative of the Auto Industries Highway Safety Committee, who stressed importance of periodic motor vehicle inspection.

State Police Commissioner Joseph Childs emphasized the point that the attitude of the people toward law enforcement was important—that it was up to the people if they want more and better law enforcement officers.

"We have become complacent thinking that new roads alone would do the safety job for us," said Childs.

Ferris Lucas, executive secretary of the Michigan Sheriffs Association, urged those present to contact area representatives in the state legislature if they wish more rigid driver tests. He also cited the need for investigation into the possibility of reducing speed limits on gravel or other rural roads.
