Council Committee Sets Study of New City Dump

A meeting is to be held Friday night by the building and grounds committee of Tawas City Council and Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bulbitz to discuss a proposed new dump.

To be located off Townline Road, it would be operated jointly by Tawas City and Tawas Township on property leased from Harry Rescoe.

An agreement is to be prepared between the property owner, the city and township for operation of the dump. Attending the meeting will be James Quarters, garbage collector contracted by the city.

The new dump would be open only on certain days and under strict supervision, said Bulbitz. Cost of operation is to be one of the topics discussed at Friday night's meeting.

Members of the building and

grounds committee are Aldermen Daniel Ulrich, Clyde Evril and Howard Hatton.

In other business Monday night, information received from the city engineer regarding a drainage ditch along Fifth Avenue was tabled. The council had directed Spicer Engineering Company to prepare elevations to determine the possibility of opening a ditch on the west side of Fifth Avenue and diverting water to a ditch along M-55.

The engineer reported that water could be drained in either direction, toward M-55 or to the North Street drain. Action has been tabled because of the possible supreme court appeal of an Iosco Circuit Court opinion regarding a ditch between North Park Acres and Huron Gardens Subdivisions.

The council authorized purchase of a lot owned by Andrew Simons located along Dead Creek and east of the road leading to the cemetery. Cost of the lot is \$125.

Attending his first council meeting as an alderman Monday night was Clark Tanner, who was appointed to fill the vacancy of William G. Murray, who resigned effective August 1.

Inglis Heads New Co. Planning Group

William Inglis, Tawas City auto dealer, was elected president of the Iosco County Planning Commission at its regular meeting July 29.

Other officers named were Richard Harris, vice president; George Blust, recording secretary, and Sam Gravit, treasurer.

All officers are to serve one-year terms.

A proposed constitution and by-laws were read by Blust and discussion on this lasted until the meeting adjourned at 9:40 p. m.

The secretary was instructed to mail copies of a proposed constitution and by-laws to each member to be used as a working copy. Any changes are to be made at the September 18 meeting.

Among those present besides the above named officers were Ralph White, Ralph Degiesie, Adolph Siegrist, Marvin Davenport, Robert Fullerton and Jean Smith.

Water Meters Under Discussion by Council

Installation of water meters at East Tawas appeared to have complete approval of the city council Monday night although formal action was tabled until the next regular meeting.

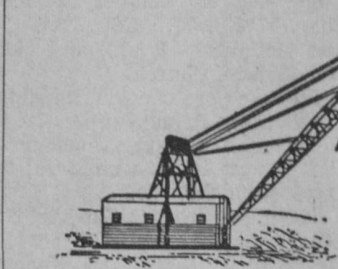
The board of public works recently recommended that meters be installed. Some 45 customers presently pay water rates on a metered basis and more than 300 customers are served on a flat rate.

City Clerk Fred Lomas reports that cost of installing meters for the remaining water customers would be in the neighborhood of \$45,000.

No objections were heard on a proposed sewer on Emery, Oak and East Bay Streets and a resolution was adopted authorizing construction under a special assessment district.

The council rescinded its recent action closing teen dances at 11:00 p. m. The three-times-a-week dances will again be allowed to close one-half hour later and the community building is to be cleared by midnight. Appearing before the council were Leland Moffatt and John Solomon, who sponsor the dances.

GAS VOTE IS DELAYED

Decision on naming a utility to provide natural gas service to the Tawas-Oscoda area has been postponed until August 23, according to action taken at a special meeting last Friday night.

Held at the East Tawas City Hall, the meeting was attended by members of the East Tawas and Tawas City Councils, along with Mayor George Tuttle, Mayor Clarence McKenzie, Supervisor Charles Smith of Oscoda Township and members of the Oscoda Township Board.

The session had been called between the three communities after representatives of both Consumers Power Company and Michigan Consolidated Gas Company had requested permission to provide gas service to the area.

Consumers Power Company outlined its program last Monday night and Michigan Consolidated Gas held a similar meeting Thursday night.

It was reported last week that West Branch had voted to sign a franchise with Michigan Consolidated Gas to provide service and no representatives of that community attended the meeting here.

It was the general consensus of opinion of those attending the meeting that a final decision should be postponed until more information is received on proposals of the two companies.

Mayor McKenzie, Mayor Tuttle and Supervisor Smith all said they were not ready to make a decision in favor of either company.

"We have gotten along without gas for a good many years. Why should we sign up overnight?" asked Mayor McKenzie.

Richard Newman, city attorney of East Tawas, and Michael Freil, attorney for Oscoda Township, believed that contracts of both companies should be studied thoroughly before any final action takes place.

L. S. Little, supervisor of Grant Township, and Harvey Odell, supervisor from Reno Township, attended the meeting and inquired of the possibility of serving those two townships with natural gas. Representatives of these two townships are to deal directly with the two utilities.

The two companies are to be asked to furnish a complete survey map of the area showing proposed mains and customers to be served.

Both companies have announced that if authority is granted by city councils or township boards of communities involved, one company or the other would embark on a multi-million-

dollar project to bring natural gas service to the area.

The companies have stated that service could be completed here by the heating season of 1964.

State to Open Bids Aug. 14 on US-23 Project

The state highway department will open bids August 14 on 45 construction and maintenance projects totaling 6.1 million dollars.

Included will be a 24.3 mile project on US-23 in Iosco County totaling nearly a million and a half dollars.

The construction is being let in three different projects. Starting at the Iosco-Arenac line, US-23 will be widened and paved for 6.3 miles to the south limit of Tawas City. Completion of this section, with an estimated cost of \$480,000, is expected by November 30, 1964.

Construction then starts at East Tawas and runs approximately 12.6 miles north to Oscoda. Estimated cost is \$690,000.

After moving through most of Oscoda, the project starts near the old M-171 junction and runs 5.4 miles north to the county line. Estimated cost is \$310,000.

The last two projects are to be completed by October 31, 1964.

Some headway was made last Wednesday on US-23 construction negotiations between the state highway department and officials of Tawas City.

According to latest information, the highway department has postponed its August 14 bid letting for work in this community because of local objections. Bids on other sections of US-23 are to be let as scheduled.

Mayor George Tuttle said that when arrangements were made for a meeting with Gerald J. McCarthy, chief of design for the highway department, it was agreed to postpone letting of bids on the Tawas City construction until a later date, possibly October.

Four representatives of the state highway department, including McCarthy, met with Mayor Tuttle, the city council, the city planning commission and its consultant last Wednesday afternoon.

Attending from Lansing were Harold H. Cooper, director of the traffic division, and H. J. Rathfoot, chief maintenance engineer. Also in attendance was Frederic Egan, district engineer from Alpena. This meeting grew out of a re-

No Major Change in US-23 Plans; Some Progress Seen

One of Tawas City's principal objections has been removal of a rolled curb on the lake side of US-23 from Rainbow Service to the east end of the city park. According to plans, a seven-inch straight barrier-type curb would be constructed.

In last week's discussion, city officials got nowhere with a proposal to have the rolled curb retained in the above mentioned area and along Tawas Bay from the chamber of commerce office to the east city limits.

Local officials maintain that such a curb is essential in this area because of space limitations for parking facilities and that it also provides easy access to Tawas

Bay, one of the principal attractions along the US-23 route.

"Rolled curbs are passe... we just do not build them any more," said McCarthy. "This does not mean that we are going into some area and tear out existing rolled curbs. It does mean, however, that we are not going to build any new ones."

The city maintains that a straight curb would be very dangerous on the lake side of US-23 inasmuch as cars would be prohibited from pulling off US-23 to park. The highway department states that parking is presently permissible in the outer lane and that experience has shown that with rolled curbs, motorists leave and enter the traveled portion of the highway in a haphazard and uncontrolled manner.

It was the opinion of one councilman that parking in the outer lanes would result in an increase in the number of auto accidents and that the state would then remove all parking on US-23.

McCarthy said that parking would be removed "between now and 1972" when traffic volumes reach the maximum allowed.

"Off-street parking should be encouraged," said McCarthy. "To depend upon street parking under a long range planning program is ridiculous."

In answer to the city's point of view that the community would be by-passed in a very few years and that off-street parking would be a waste of money, McCarthy said that "even if US-23 does by-pass you, you will have the same traffic volume or higher."

Mayor Tuttle pointed out certain "inconsistencies" in the present plans where barriers are to be built in front of businesses on one side of the street and not the other. It was stated that final plans had not been completed as yet and that where the right-of-way was wide enough, the state would allow parking behind ditches south of the river bridge.

"Our highway engineers will go through and work with each property owner to determine where exits and entrances are to be located," said McCarthy.

It was pointed out, however, that gas stations would not be allowed to service cars on state highway right-of-way. "We have no

Body of Boy Found Monday in Lk. Huron

A six-year-old Dearborn boy drowned in about 14 feet of water in Lake Huron Saturday afternoon, about one-quarter mile north of Oscoda.

The body of Daniel B. King, son of Mr. and Mrs. James C. King, was found Monday evening by two volunteer searchers, Fritz Lockhart and Thomas Halcro.

King and his family were vacationing at the Holiday Shore Cabins.

Investigating Oscoda Township Police officers said that Daniel had been playing on a paddle board and carried out into deep water by a strong wind. Witnesses on shore saw him roll off the board about 200 yards from shore, it was reported.

Two state police skin divers, Andrew Cunningham of Flint and Thomas Mechleder of the East Tawas post, were called to the scene. They were joined by several volunteer skin divers from Oscoda and Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

Joining in the search with the Oscoda Township Police Department and state police were the Iosco County Sheriff's Department, United States Coast Guard and a helicopter from Wurtsmith.

Two Local Reservists Now on Active Duty

Two Tawas City men, Capt. John A. Alexander and Maj. Wilbur C. Roach Jr., are now on active duty with the 9506th Air Force Reserve Recovery Squadron at Tri-City Airport near Freeland.

The unit began its annual 15-day active duty tour Sunday, August 4, and will serve through Sunday, August 18, providing various types of training for its members both in military skills and in the unit mission of dispersing and recovering military aircraft and helping to reconstitute air force installations damaged by enemy attack.

Captain Alexander, a teacher in Tawas Area Schools, is communications officer for the unit. Major Roach is a member of the 9610th Air Reserve Squadron but is attached to the 9506th for training. He began his active duty tour one week before the 9506th went on active duty as a unit and will conclude his tour this week-end. Major Roach has been working in recruiting and information duties for the 9506th.

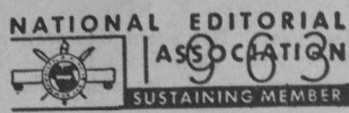

Hiking and Horse Trail Completion Discussed at Meeting

Completion of a hiking and horse trail extending from Empire on the Lake Michigan coast to the Tawas on Lake Huron as another summer attraction of Michigan's Lower Peninsula was discussed at a meeting held July 29 at Houghton Lake.

Features of the trail, a portion of which has been completed, were related by a panel consisting of Troy Yder, moderator; Fritz Williams, Traverse City attorney; Ed Youngblood, National Forest service, and Norman Smith, Michigan Department of Conservation.

The meeting drew participation from 48 interested persons.

It was pointed out that the trail has been completed from Empire to Kalkaska, 47 miles by highway.

The route eastward from Kalkaska will be to a point five miles north of Grayling where it will turn in a more southerly direction toward Luzerne, 23 miles east of Grayling, continuing to a point north of Mio Dam, to Alcona Dam, to Five Channels and on to Tawas.

A part of the proposal is to install a corral and other services for horsemen in or near Grayling. The trail's completed portion is approximately eight feet wide and has three campsites 12 to 15 miles apart. As proposed, it would be well marked by cedar posts and campsites would have such conveniences as a box corral, a hitching rack, wells and toilets. Camp ground would be maintained by the state.

It would be mapped and users of the trail would be provided with maps and other information. Some easements over privately-owned land remain to be obtained and these will be negotiated by interested parties in their respective townships and counties, it was understood.

Possibilities of obtaining financial help through state and federal sources are being explored, one avenue of which might be the accelerated public works program of the federal government.

Two tourist promotion organizations, the East and West Michigan Tourist Associations, have indicated interest in the trail and are supporting efforts to get it completed.

A group of 30 horsemen made the 75-mile trip from Luzerne to the Tawas the first week-end in June to officially open the east end of the trail.

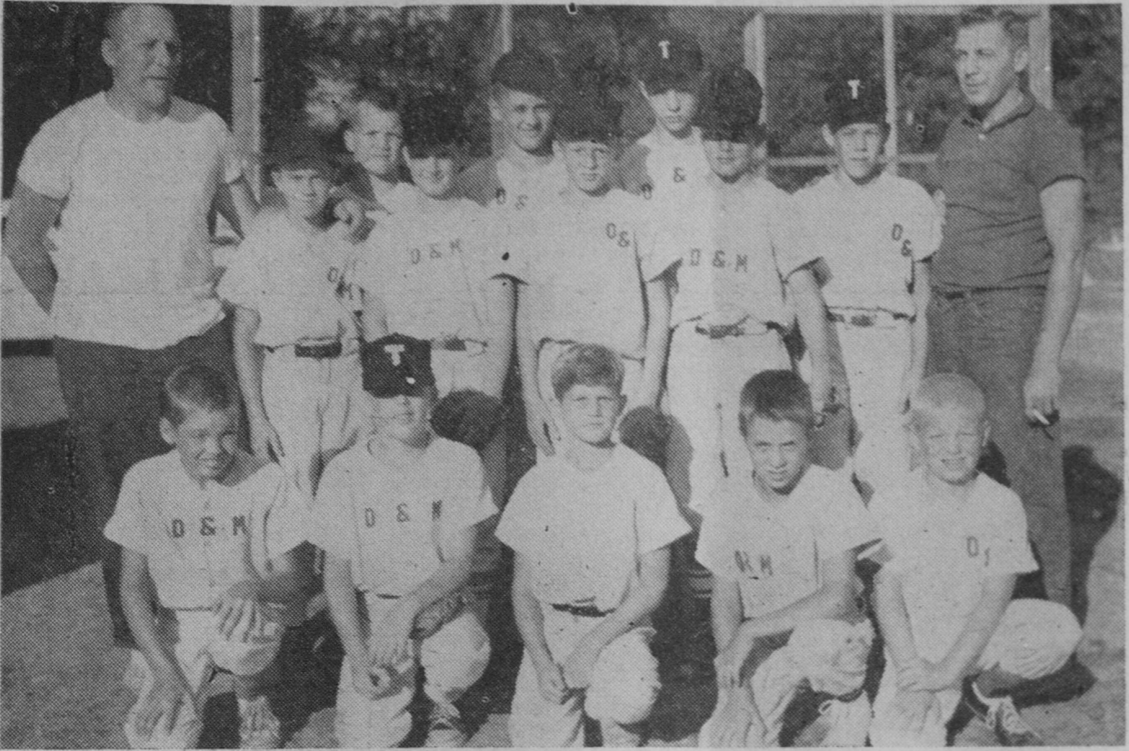

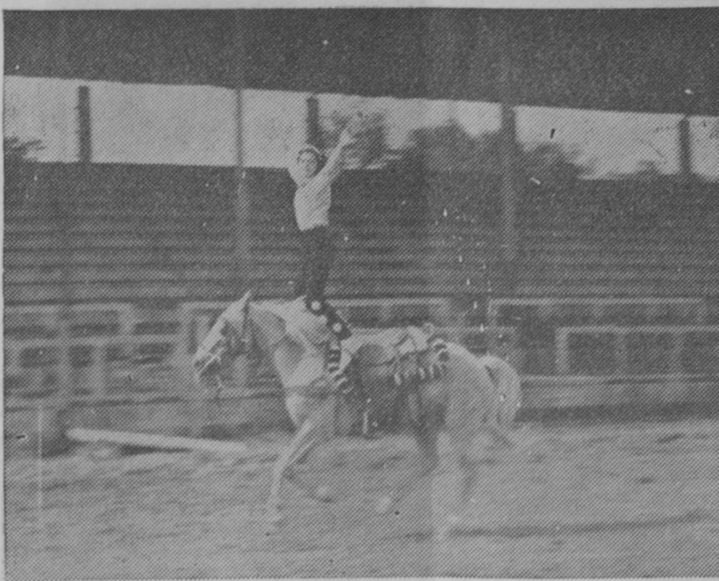

Employers Must File Social Security Returns Promptly

Quarterly social security tax returns must be filed with the district director of internal revenue by the end of July for the previous three months. Paul M. Ellifritz, social security administration district manager in Bay City, reminded employers today.

It is important that social security tax returns be filed on time and that they be complete. They must show the correct amount of earnings paid each worker during the quarter and his correct name and social security number. Otherwise, the worker and his family may not be fully protected in the event of the worker's disability, retirement or death.

Earning of employees of a trade or business must be reported each quarter regardless of the amount of wages paid. Cash wages of domestic employees and other household workers must be reported by each employer who pays cash wages of \$50 or more to an employee during the calendar quarter.

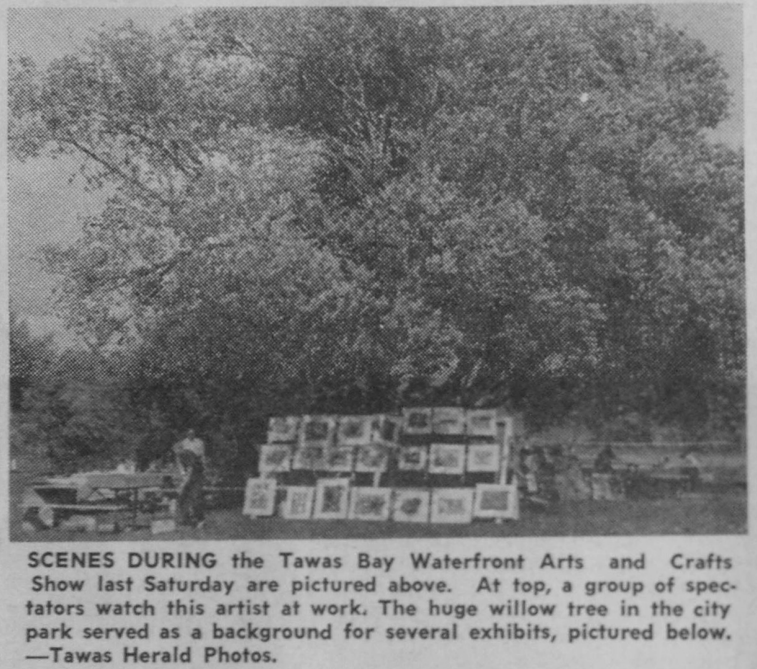

choice in the matter," said McCarthy. "It is the policy of the state highway department and Bureau of Public Roads."

Although stating that there would be no alteration of highway plans in which state money is used, McCarthy said the state would allow the city to construct a parking lane from a point in front of the post office to the east end of the city park.

This possibility has been studied by Villean-Leman and Associates, Incorporated, Tawas City's planning consultant, and preliminary sketches were exhibited during the meeting.

McCarthy said the highway department would "give any amount

of right-of-way you want" for a parking lane to be built behind a straight curb.

Rathfoot reported that where signs meet specific requirements of highway department policy, a revocable permit may be issued to the store owner allowing his sign to overhang highway right-of-way. "We have 10 projects completed where final payment from the federal government has been held up because of encroachments of one type or another," said McCarthy. "Our ability to build a project depends on federal participation and we must insist on enforcement of the sign policy."

Mayor Tuttle emphasized that US-23 entered Tawas City with a 200-foot-wide right-of-way. He said this narrowed down to a two-lane bridge over the Tawas River and then widened out

to four lanes again. From Mathews Street east, the street is 52 feet wide and then tapers to 48 feet.

Highway officials said that the present right-of-way was wide enough for four lanes, if parking was removed, and that no additional right-of-way would be purchased.
