





# Stresses Military Credit Use for SS

Paul M. Ellifritz, district manager for social security in Bay City, said today that a little known aspect of the social security law is the use of military credits.

According to Mr. Ellifritz, when a veteran who has had active military service between September 16, 1940, and December 31, 1956, retires, dies or becomes disabled, he may receive credit of \$160 a month wages for each month of such military service.

This military credit does not automatically appear on the individual's earnings record and can be established only at the time a claim is filed. This little known aspect of the social security law has helped many veterans to become entitled to social security benefits.

Beginning January 1, 1957, all military personnel were brought

under the law and deductions are being made from their pay.

Mr. Ellifritz pointed out that veterans and their families should be aware of these provisions. In order to receive these credits, a veteran or his survivors must present, at the time of filing a claim, proof of military service. The most acceptable proof is a discharge certificate or other official document showing the period of service.

Any veteran or his survivor who has already applied for social security benefits has had this provision of the law applied and this type of credit established in determining his benefits.

# Broken Organ Led To Hymn 'Silent Night'

The Rev. Josef Mohr was a priest of implicit faith and child-like trust in the goodness of man. He had a close friend, Franz Gruber, who was versed in music and dabbled now and then in composition.

Between them they composed the world's most simple and beautiful Christmas song—"Silent Night, Holy Night."

The song is sung in practically all civilized tongues. Yet, little or no thoughts, are given to the poet and composer and the little town and country in which they worked and lived.

And strange as it may seem, Gruber used a guitar to provide the musical accompaniment.

Thus was born the song that is universally loved and which has made Mohr and Gruber immortal.

Mohr died as vicar on December 4, 1848, in Wagrain, Salzburg. He was greatly loved and respected, but so poor that the town had to pay the funeral expenses.

Franz Gruber fared a little better, but according to our standards both author and composer were as poor as the shepherds on the fields near Bethlehem.

The church of St. Nicola at Oberndorf no longer stands. A simple memorial chapel has been built there and is a shrine receiving pilgrims from all parts of the world.

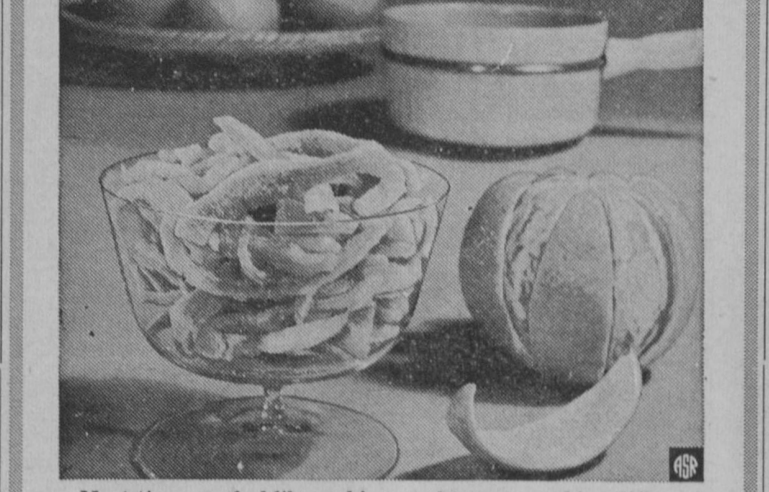

# Make Your Own Candied Orange Peel



Next time you feel like making candy, try something different, like candied orange peel. Its good tart flavor appeals to those who don't like anything too sweet. Choose oranges that have a good color and are free from blemishes. For variation, dip the ends of some of the finished candied peel in melted semi-sweet chocolate. Place on waxed paper to harden. Don't waste the syrup leftover from the cooking—it's delicious served with waffles and pancakes. Just bring to a full boil after straining the peel. Cool and store in the refrigerator until needed.

**Candied Orange Peel**

4 to 6 medium oranges with thick skin	½ cup Karo light corn syrup
Water	2 cups sugar
1 teaspoon salt	1 cup water
	Sugar

Wash oranges. Remove peel from each in 4 or 5 pieces and place in saucepan. Cover with cold water; add salt. Bring to boil, then boil 10 minutes. Drain. Boil and drain 2 times more, omitting salt. Gently remove any moist white membrane with bowl of spoon. (Peel should then be about ¼ inch thick.) Cut peel into strips.

Combine corn syrup, 2 cups sugar and 1 cup water in 3-quart saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until sugar is dissolved. Add orange peel. Bring to boil, then reduce heat and boil gently 45 minutes. Drain in coarse strainer or colander, collecting syrup in saucepan.

For red "Peppermint Punch," Marian Marsh combines 2 quarts each of sweetened cranberry juice, strong tea, gingerale and lemon-lime soda. A dash of grenadine is added, and peppermint extract to taste. (Peppermint tea may also be substituted for the regular tea.) Makes 16 pints.

The cherry-dotted blocks of ice are frozen in large square plastic refrigerator containers. These are filled and frozen bit by bit so that the ice is decorated throughout.

**Banana and Strawberry Magic Cream Mold (Makes 8 to 10 servings)**

1 envelope (1 tablespoon) unflavored gelatine	1 cup (½ pint) heavy cream, whipped
¼ cup cold water	1 (10-ounce) package frozen sliced strawberries, defrosted*
½ cup boiling water	3 medium size ripe bananas, peeled and cut into cross-wise slices*
1½ cups (15-ounce can) Eagle Brand Sweetened Condensed Milk	
¾ cup lemon juice	

In a small bowl, add gelatine to cold water. Let stand 5 minutes to soften. Add boiling water and stir until dissolved. In a large bowl, blend sweetened condensed milk and lemon juice. Stir in dissolved gelatine. Fold in whipped cream. Drain the defrosted strawberries, reserving juice to make a sauce. Add berries and sliced bananas to condensed milk mixture. Pour into lightly oiled 1½ quart mold. Chill in refrigerator about 2 hours, or until firm. Unmold onto platter. Prepare a favorite homemade strawberry or other fruit sauce to go with the cream mold. \*Reserve a few sliced strawberries and bananas for garnish.

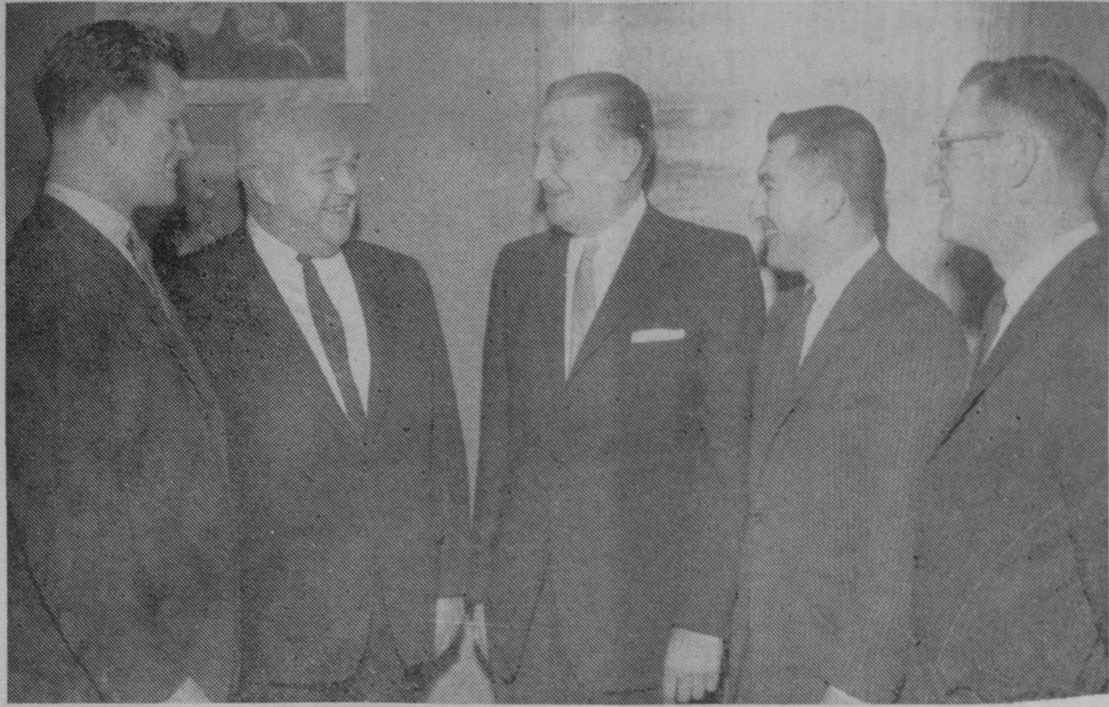

EACH OF US HAS, I suppose, a special pattern or design that we prefer — a favorite that we most enjoy working with. For many of us who like to crochet, that favorite is the pineapple pattern. And no wonder; its decorative design blends with any style of home furnishings, and graces with equal charm both formal and informal table settings.



### PINEAPPLE FAVORITE

Today's feature is called Pineapple Petals, and I think it's one of the most beautiful crochet patterns I've seen in the pineapple stitch, and certainly it's perfectly named, because it does look like folds of petals opening up from the center of the design. This is a circular tablecloth that measures 72" in diameter. The large areas of open work give it a lacy look that complements the basic pineapple stitch. Since the color of your table will show through, choose a color that will contrast with your furniture, such as white, ecru, or cream.

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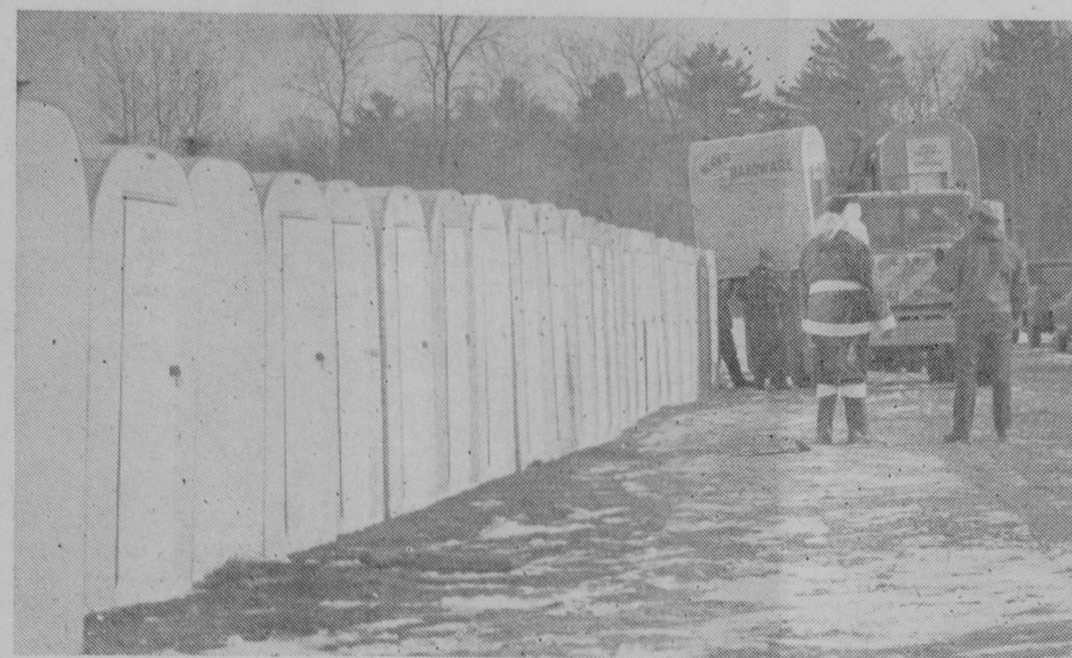

## St. Peter's Is Christendom's Largest Church

Twelve years ago, at Christmas, 1950, the late Pope Pius XII announced that excavators had found the tomb of the Apostle Peter precisely where Roman Catholics had believed it to be—beneath the papal altar of the church which bears his name.

St. Peter's, the largest church in Christendom, was built in Rome 336 years ago over the tomb of the Galilean fisherman. A masterpiece of the Italian Renaissance, the church represents the composite skills of some of Italy's greatest artists, including Michelangelo, Raphael, Bramante, and Bernini.

### Many Visitors

The church attracts visitors of many faiths because it is not merely a Roman Catholic shrine but an archive of history recorded in hundreds of monuments, sarcophagi, inscriptions, statues, and mosaic murals. Three queens are buried there—Christina of Sweden, Charlotte of Cyprus, and Clementina, the mother of Bonnie Prince Charlie.

The church's massive foundations dig into the soil which was a place of sootysaying (vaticinia) in pagan times.

Nero built his Circus at the foot of Vatican Hill. Christians were tortured there and burned alive. Tradition says the Apostle Peter was crucified head down in the arena.

### Renovation

In recent months, St. Peter's has undertaken a program of interior renovation: metal stands to replace the cumbersome old wooden structures put up for audiences of more than 70,000; indirect lighting; a new electrical system controlling the bells; a new organ and a new elevator.

The old elevator had lifted an estimated 20,000,000 pilgrims about 150 feet closer to paradise, their immediate destination being the roof of the basilica.

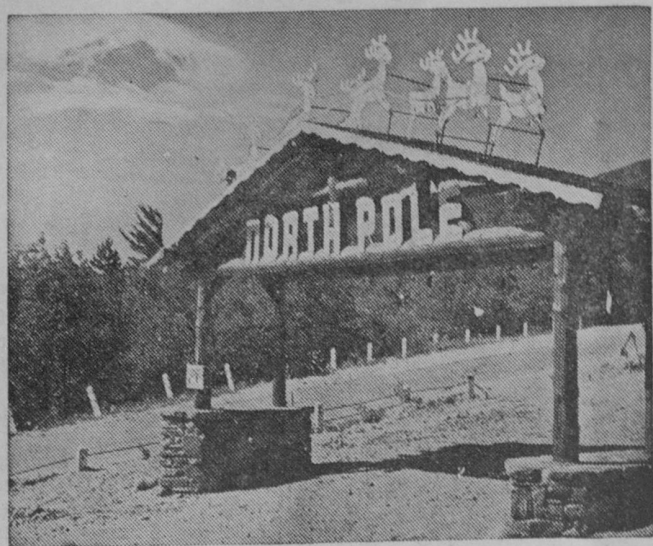

## City In Turkey Linked With Virgin Mary

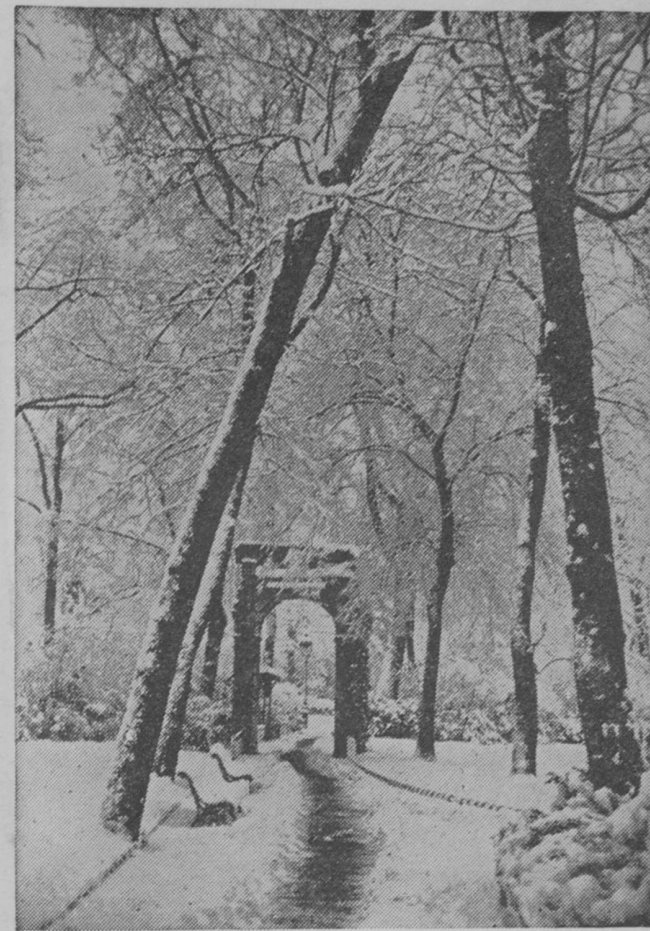
A ruined city in Turkey has been linked to the Virgin Mary. Ephesus, a ghost city, lies some 35 miles from Izmir, Turkey, near the Aegean Sea. It is a meeting place of archeologists, chiefly interested in the Temple of Diana, one of the Seven Wonders of the World. In recent years, however, Christian pilgrims come in increasing numbers, drawn by the old tradition that Mary spent her final years there, cared for by St. John the Apostle.

Here, amid the tumbled ruins of the 6th century Church of St. John a tiny chapel is believed by many to stand over the site of Mary's home. Local tradition says that both Mary and John died in Ephesus, but their tombs were never discovered.

### Once Important

Though Goths destroyed Ephesus in A.D. 262, the Christianized city revived and was the seat of two of the most important councils in Roman Catholic history. Later invasions by Arabs, Turks and Mongols completed its ruin. The harbor silted up, and Ephesus sank into oblivion.

At present, St. John's Church is being restored in an (American-Turkish) project inspired and led by a Lima, Ohio businessman.

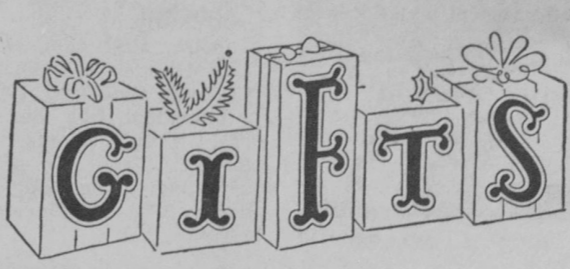

## ABOUT BUSINESS



Christmas business gifts, which by "guilt-by-association" tactics have been linked with payola and bribes, are proper practice, ports Business Goodwill Advisory Council, the non-profit research and information organization of the specialty advertising industry.

Citing a published legal opinion by the New York law firm of Dewey, Ballantine, Bushby, Palmer & Wood, the council emphasizes that there is a distinctive difference between legitimate Christmas business gifts, on the one hand, and unsavory practices such as bribes, kickbacks, secret commissions and the like, on the other hand. As far as Christmas presents are concerned, the legal document reads: "It is difficult to see any reasonable likelihood that even the largest gifts involved here, such as clocks, cameras, and the like, would influence a top management executive to favor the donor of the gift at the expense of the Corporation."

"The gifts, in addition to being small, appear to be part of a widespread pattern of Christmas giving," the legal document continues. It further states, "The Agency Restatement points out that even where gifts are received in connection with the principal's business, the duty to account for them may be negated by usage or custom." A custom as universal as the distribution of business gifts at Christmas makes this rule applicable here.

In addition, the Business Goodwill Advisory Council notes that businessmen should have little trouble to distinguish what constitutes a legitimate business gift if they adopt the BGAC "golden rule for business gift giving"—a legitimate business gift is modest in value and is given in appreciation, not in anticipation.

Noting that leading newspapers and trade publications this year have reported that the volume of business gift giving will reach record proportions, the Council points out the value for well-chosen gifts, correctly delivered, as goodwill builders. To help businessmen in the often complicated task of setting up an effective gift program, BGAC lists these suggestions for successful business gift giving:

1. Keep your gifts of modest value in relation to the importance of each recipient as an employee, prospect or customer. Extravagant gifts smack of bribery.
2. Choose your gifts individually, considering the tastes of each group of recipients.
3. Choose only high quality gifts that are useful, durable and dependable.
4. Personalize each gift, if possible, with the recipient's name or initials.
5. Package each gift attractively and securely.
6. Accompany each package with a personal note, greeting card or at least a special gift label.
7. Deliver each gift with a flair, if possible—personally or by special messenger—and preferably to each recipient's home rather than to his office.

Often overlooked, the insurance program of a farmer can be profitably utilized to accumulate money for a down payment or used as collateral for a loan through regular channels.

Consider what William P. Schany, a tenant farmer at West Bend, Iowa, is doing.

Schany, a hard-working, progressive farmer of 41, within three years' time is ready to lay down \$10,000 as a down payment on a farm of his own. That \$10,000 will come from the cash value of \$50,500 worth of permanent type insurance policies he has been buying since 1954.

"I bought a \$1,000 20-pay life when I was 17 and working on a construction job," Schany recalled, "and I thought I was covered. In 1954, my insurance

man sold me a \$10,000 policy and explained the facts of life. I haven't had to be sold since and the rest of the policies, totaling \$72,600, I have bought voluntarily."

Mr. Schany wants to buy a farm of 240 acres or more; he'd even consider buying the place that he is crop-sharing now. He owns a good supply of machinery and equipment and without any hired help, but using the man-sized aid of 13-year-old Billy, farms the 400-acre unit. Income is derived mainly from some 500 head of hogs sold per year and 210 head of cattle that go through his feedyards. During the winter, Schany is busy in his farm shop, fixing and building equipment, saving high overhead dollars that can go instead into his insurance savings program.

Right now the Schanys are paying premiums totaling \$1,645 a year on their insurance. The cash value of the policies, including interest and dividends, is increasing at the rate of \$1,548 per year. Thus the cost of his \$72,600 protection is only \$97 a year now.

The cash borrowed on Schany's policies can be paid back at a rate of his own choosing.

There are other financial benefits to Schany in the insurance program, too. For one thing, he's a better prospect for a regular bank or lending agency loan with such a protection plan in the background. And on year-to-year financing, such as for cattle loans, bankers feel more like making loans to adequately insured farmers.

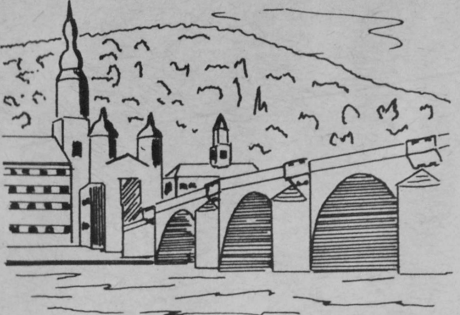


# Festive Foreign Foods

In some lands at this time of year the sun is brightly shining and palm trees are the only thing to decorate; in other places snow has come and wooden shoes are put outside the door for Father Christmas.



Wherever it is, the homemaker is busy making special dishes. If there's German in your background, Lebkuchen needs no introduction. Literally this is "sweet cake". The recipe is characteristically hard and chewy. Lebkuchen develops a better flavor upon storage. Begin your holiday preparations early.

Stollen, too, is from Germany. These are sweet, fruit-filled breads baked in the form of a folded-over roll, like a large Parker House roll. Some cooks put a layer of sugar and cinnamon between the layers, sometimes this is omitted. But almost always the baked loaf is frosted and then decorated with chopped or slivered walnuts, or perhaps with sliced candied cherries.

Stollen are traditionally served in Germany for Christmas breakfast. Often thin slices are served with tea or a glass of wine to guests or callers during the holiday season, as fruit cake is served in England. But this sweet fruited bread is suitable as a special treat at any meal.



## LEBKUCHEN

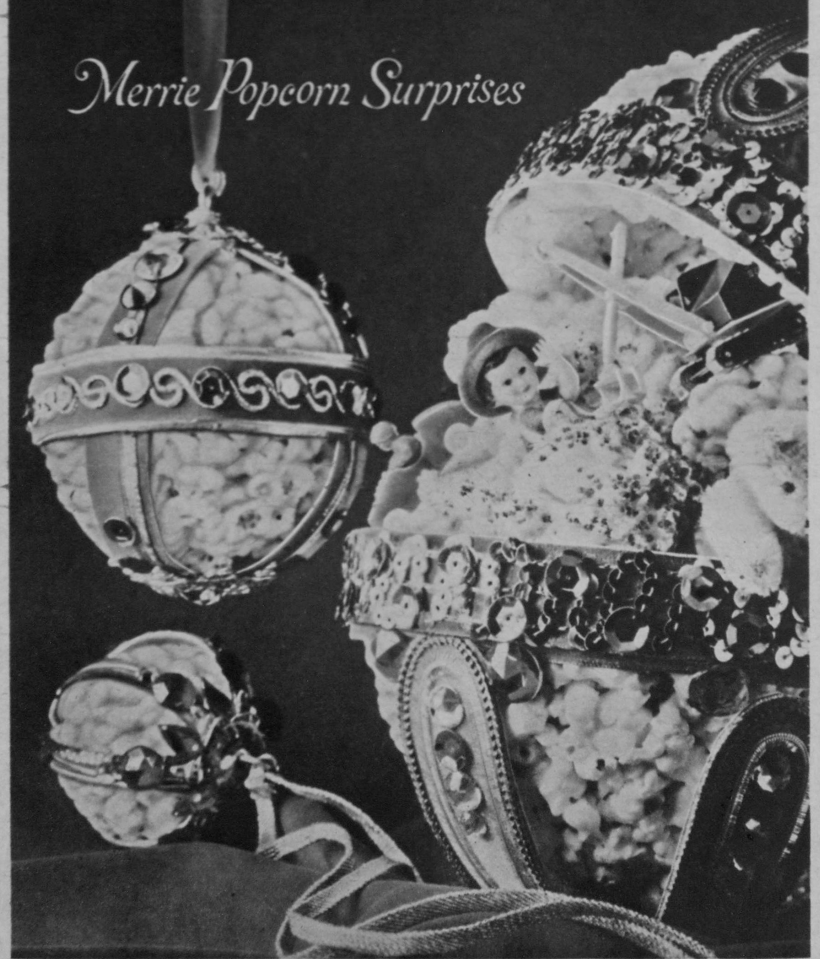
- 4 cups flour
- 1/4 teaspoon soda
- 3/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon cloves
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- 2/3 cup light corn syrup
- 1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
- 2 tablespoons water
- 1 egg, slightly beaten
- 3/4 cup (3 ounces) shredded candied orange peel
- 3/4 cup (3 ounces) shredded candied citron
- 1 cup walnuts, chopped

Sift flour once, measure, add soda and spices, and sift together three times. Combine syrup, sugar, and water and boil 5 minutes. Cool. Add flour, egg, fruits and walnuts, press dough into a cake, wrap in waxed paper, and store in refrigerator 2 or 3 days to ripen.

Roll 1/4-inch thick on lightly floured board. Cut in 1 x 3-inch strips. Bake on greased baking sheet in moderate oven (350°F.) 15 minutes. When cool, spread with Transparent Glaze. Store at least one day before serving. Makes about 5 dozen cookies.

To make Transparent Glaze, combine 1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar and 1 1/2 tablespoons boiling water. Add 1/2 teaspoon vanilla. Beat thoroughly. Spread on Lebkuchen while Glaze is still warm.

## Merrie Popcorn Surprises

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#### GERMAN STOLLEN

1 recipe Basic Sweet Dough  
 1/2 cup chopped walnuts  
 1/4 cup finely cut candied cherries  
 1/4 cup finely cut candied citron

1 teaspoon grated lemon rind  
 1 tablespoon soft butter or margarine  
 2 tablespoons sugar  
 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

Make Basic Sweet Dough. Stir in walnuts, citron, cherries and lemon rind before adding last portion of flour. Then finish mixing dough and knead. Shape into smooth ball. Place in lightly greased bowl. Cover and let rise until doubled (about 2 1/2 hours). Punch down. Cover and let rest 5 to 10 minutes. With palms of hands press dough into oval shape a scant 1/2 inch thick. Spread half of oval with soft margarine or butter. Mix sugar and cinnamon. Sprinkle over margarine or butter. Fold unspread half lengthwise over sugar and cinnamon, making edges even. Lift to lightly greased baking sheet. Curve the ends slightly. Press down the folded edge (not the open edge). This helps the loaf keep its shape as it rises and bakes. Cover and let rise until doubled (about 1 1/2 hours). Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 30 to 35 minutes. Remove from baking sheet. When cool, frost and decorate. Makes 1 loaf.

#### Frosting

3/4 cup sifted confectioners' sugar  
 1 tablespoon top milk or cream

3 candied cherries, sliced  
 2 tablespoons chopped or sliced walnuts

Mix sugar and milk or cream to make a smooth thick frosting that will just pour. Pour it over top of loaf, letting frosting drip down sides. Decorate with sliced cherries and sprinkle with walnuts.

#### BASIC SWEET DOUGH

1 package active dry yeast, or  
 1 cake compressed yeast  
 1/4 cup warm water  
 1/2 cup milk  
 1/4 cup sugar

1 teaspoon salt  
 2 tablespoons melted shortening  
 2 1/4 to 3 cups flour  
 1 egg

Sprinkle dry yeast into warm (not hot) water. (Crumble compressed yeast into lukewarm water.) Stir until dissolved. Scald milk. Pour into large mixing bowl or into large bowl of electric mixer. Add sugar, salt and shortening. Cool until just warm. Stir in 1 cup flour. Mix in dissolved yeast. Add egg and beat hard. (Egg may be beaten separately and then added to batter.) Stir in 1 1/2 cups flour. Sprinkle 2 tablespoons of the remaining 1/2 cup flour on bread board or pastry cloth. Turn dough out on flour and knead, adding more flour as needed to make a soft dough. Knead until dough is smooth and satiny (about 5 minutes). Shape into smooth ball. Wash mixing bowl and grease lightly. Press top of dough ball into bowl, then turn dough over. Cover and let rise until doubled (about 2 hours.) Punch down. Cover and let rest 5 to 10 minutes. This dough is the foundation for German Stollen and Russian Kulich.



Leckerlis are a Welsh cookie especially popular at Christmas. Because Leckerlis soften and lose none of their quality through storage, this cookie may be made ahead of the holiday rush.

4 cups flour  
 1 teaspoon baking soda  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 1 teaspoon cinnamon  
 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg  
 1/4 teaspoon cloves  
 1/4 teaspoon ginger  
 1/4 cup finely cut candied orange peel  
 1/4 cup finely cut candied lemon peel  
 1 1/2 cups walnuts ground fine  
 1 cup light corn syrup  
 1 1/2 cups sugar  
 1/2 cup shortening  
 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind  
 1 tablespoon lemon juice  
 1 1/2 teaspoons imitation rum flavoring

#### LECKERLIS

Sift together flour, baking soda, salt and spices into a large bowl. Prepare fruits and nuts; set aside. Combine syrup, sugar and shortening in a heavy saucepan; heat to boiling point; stir frequently. Remove from heat; add fruits, walnuts, lemon rind, lemon juice and imitation rum flavoring; mix well. Pour on top of dry ingredients. Combine thoroughly, finally working mixture with hands until dough is well blended. Divide dough into six equal portions. Roll each portion onto lightly floured board into a rectangle 10 x 6 x 1/2-inches. Cut into 15 cookies, each 2 x 2 x 1/2-inches. Place on lightly greased baking sheet. Bake in 350°F. (moderate) oven 10 to 12 minutes. Frost and decorate as desired. Store in tightly covered tin. Yield: 7 1/2 dozen cookies.

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#### BUTTERSCOTCH BROWNIES



Preheat oven to 350°F. Melt over hot (not boiling) water one 6-oz. pkg. (1 c.) NESTLÉ'S BUTTERSCOTCH MORSELS, 1/4 c. butter. Remove from heat. Stir in 1 c. light brown sugar, packed. Cool 5 min. ## SUGARPLUM CAKE

1½ cups prunes  
water  
2 cups sifted flour  
1½ cups sugar  
2½ teaspoons baking powder  
1¼ teaspoons soda  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1 teaspoon nutmeg  
1 teaspoon allspice  
1 cup buttermilk  
¾ cup cooking oil  
3 unbeatn eggs  
1 cup walnuts, chopped

Cook prunes with water until tender. Drain; pit and cut into small pieces. Sift flour with sugar, baking powder, soda, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg and allspice into mixing bowl. Add buttermilk, cooking oil and the prunes. Beat 1½ minutes. (With electric mixer, blend at lowest speed, then beat at a low speed. Or beat 225 strokes with a spoon.) Add eggs. Beat 1½ minutes. Stir in walnuts. Turn into 13x9x2-inch pan, greased and floured on bottom. Bake at 325° for 40 to 45 minutes. Serve warm with whipped cream and Sauce. To reheat, cover with aluminum foil and place in 350° oven 15 minutes. (Note: For a more moist cake, pour Butter Sauce over hot baked cake.)

**Butter Sauce:** Combine 1 cup sugar and 2 tablespoons cornstarch in saucepan. Add ¾ cup buttermilk, ½ cup butter and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Bring to a boil; boil 1 minute, stirring constantly. Serve warm. If too thick, thin with a few drops water.

Plum Pudding, long an English favorite, has taken on a new appearance in American homes. It's chilled, cut into cubes and decorated to make Festive Dessert Kabobs.

## FESTIVE DESSERT KABOBS

1 pound English-style plum pudding  
Red Currant Jelly  
Flaked or fine-grated coconut  
Preserved kumquats  
Maraschino cherries  
Pickled watermelon rind

Chill plum pudding. Cut into ¾-inch cubes and press each onto toothpick. Spread cubes on all sides with red currant jelly. Roll cubes in coconut. Or roll cubes in granulated sugar and alternate on wooden picks with kumquats, maraschino cherries or watermelon rind.

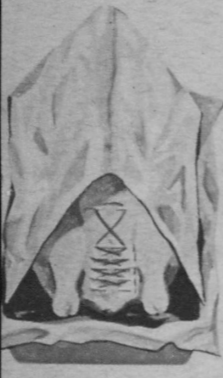

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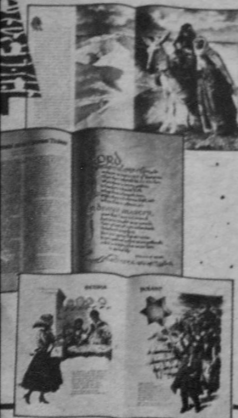
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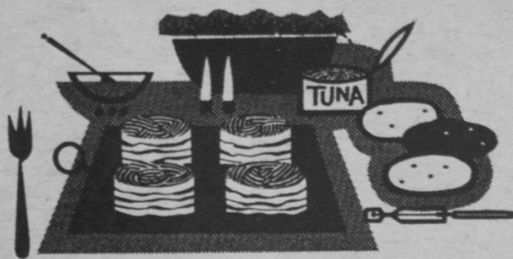


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## TUNA TIP #10



## CHICKEN OF THE SEA FILLETS

Ever so carefully, empty a small can of solid-pack Chicken of the Sea brand tuna for each person, right onto baking sheet, keeping the "fillet" whole. Bind each edge with strip of bacon, and broil. Turn once. Top with tartar sauce. Delectable! Serve with salad and french fries.

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From Russia comes Kulich, a sweet bread baked in tall, slender loaves. As the loaves rise above the tops of the cans in which they are baked, they take on the form of domes similar to those seen in pictures of some Russian churches. Kulich was originally a holiday bread, but it is appropriate the year round. Its round slices add interest to any meal, whether they are served fresh or lightly toasted.

Popular when friends drop in for a holiday chat, is the Russian recipe for Mazourka or walnut cake. Makes an ideal dessert at dinner time.



#### KULICH

1 recipe Basic Sweet Dough 1/4 cup chopped walnuts  
1/4 cup raisins 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind

Make Basic Sweet Dough. Stir in raisins, walnuts and lemon rind before mixing in the last cup of flour. Then finish mixing dough and knead. Shape into ball. Place in lightly greased bowl. Cover and let rise until doubled (about 2 hours). Punch down. Divide into halves. Shape into balls. Press each ball into greased 1-pint can (such as fruit or juice cans), or 1-pound coffee or shortening cans. Cover and let rise until doubled (about 1 1/2 hours). Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 30 to 35 minutes. Turn out of cans at once. When cool, frost tops with confectioners' sugar frosting and decorate with walnuts and sliced candied cherries, or sprinkle with small colored candies.

#### Frosting

1/2 cup sifted confectioners' sugar 2 tablespoons slivered walnuts  
2 teaspoons top milk or cream 2 candied cherries, sliced

Mix sugar and milk to make smooth, thin frosting. Pour over tops of loaves. Decorate with walnuts and sliced cherries. To serve, cut slices from top to bottom so each slice has a bit of frosting.

#### MAZOURKA (WALNUT CAKE)

9 egg yolks 1 pound walnuts, ground  
2 cups sugar 1/2 pound candied fruit peel,  
9 egg whites ground  
3 cups flour 2 tablespoons lemon juice

Beat the yolks in a bowl; add the sugar and beat well. Beat the whites in a separate bowl until stiff but not dry and fold into the yolk mixture carefully. Add the flour, walnuts, candied fruit, and lemon juice, mixing lightly. Preheat oven to 325°F. Butter a flat pan, about 8 by 12 inches, and dust lightly with flour. Pour the mixture into it. Bake for 30 minutes at 325°F., or until a cake tester comes out clean. Dust with powdered sugar. The resulting cake will be about 1 inch high and should be served in long, thin slices.



Many famous Christmas foods have come to us from Sweden — one of them is Swedish Fruit Soup. A favorite for its versatility, Fruit Soup can be served as an appetizer or for dessert. This is the time of year to introduce a Swedish dish that's sure to become a favorite with your family and friends too.

#### SWEDISH FRUIT SOUP

1/2 cup pearl tapioca 1 cinnamon stick  
6 cups water 1 tablespoon grated orange  
2 cups apple juice rind  
3/4 cup sugar 2 teaspoons grated lemon  
1 package (12 oz. or 2 cups) rind  
mixed dried fruit, cut in 1/4 cup orange juice  
small pieces 2 tablespoons lemon juice  
1 cup raisins

Soak tapioca in water to cover 2 to 3 hours. Drain. Combine in a large saucepan water, apple juice, sugar, dried fruit, raisins, cinnamon stick and the tapioca. Simmer until the tapioca is clear, the fruit tender and the mixture slightly thickened, 2 to 3 hours. Stir occasionally to prevent mixture from sticking to the bottom. Stir in orange rind, lemon rind, orange juice and lemon juice. Serve warm or cold, plain or with whipped cream. Makes 3 quarts.

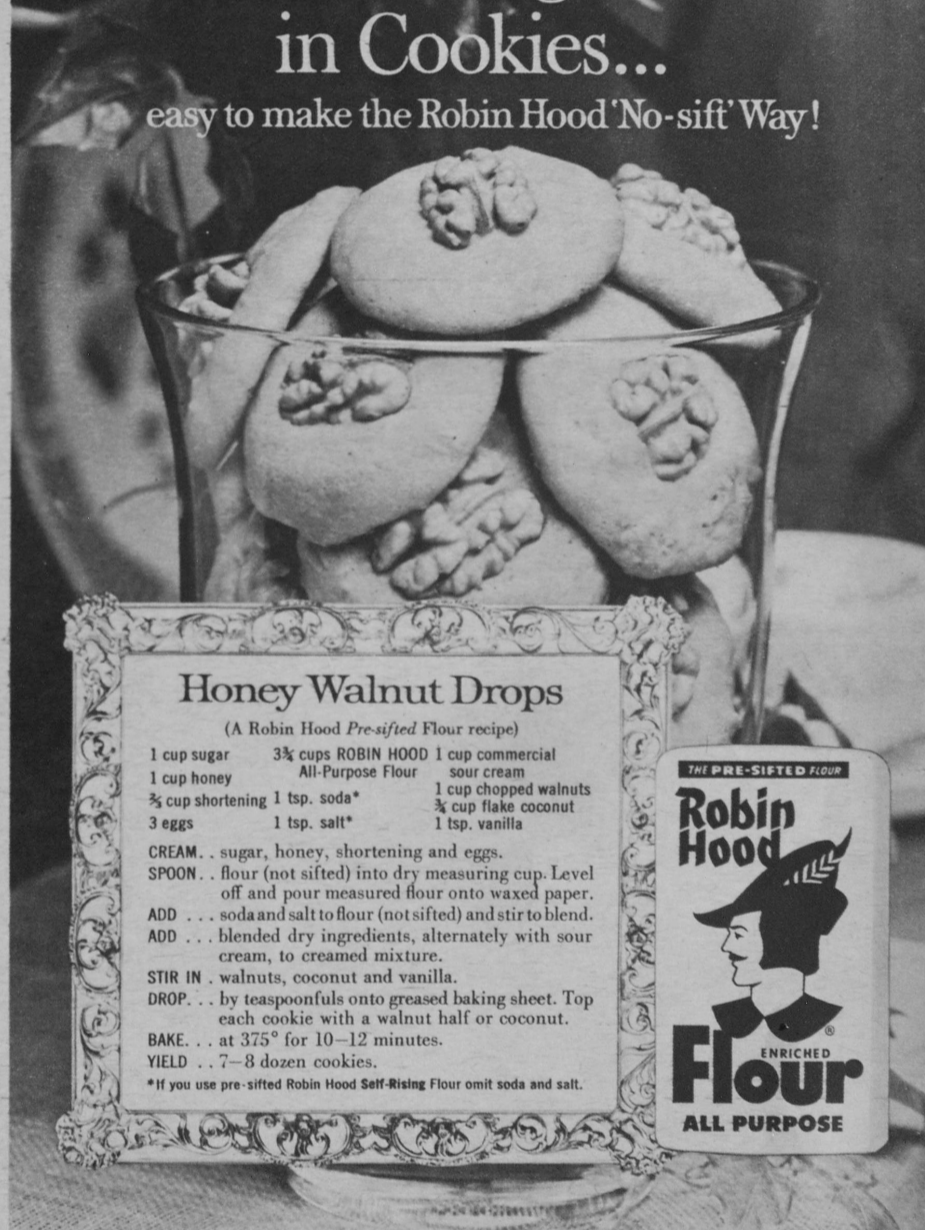

CREAM... sugar, honey, shortening and eggs.  
SPOON... flour (not sifted) into dry measuring cup. Level off and pour measured flour onto waxed paper.  
ADD... soda and salt to flour (not sifted) and stir to blend.  
ADD... blended dry ingredients, alternately with sour cream, to creamed mixture.

STIR IN... walnuts, coconut and vanilla.  
DROP... by teaspoonfuls onto greased baking sheet. Top each cookie with a walnut half or coconut.

BAKE... at 375° for 10-12 minutes.  
YIELD... 7-8 dozen cookies.

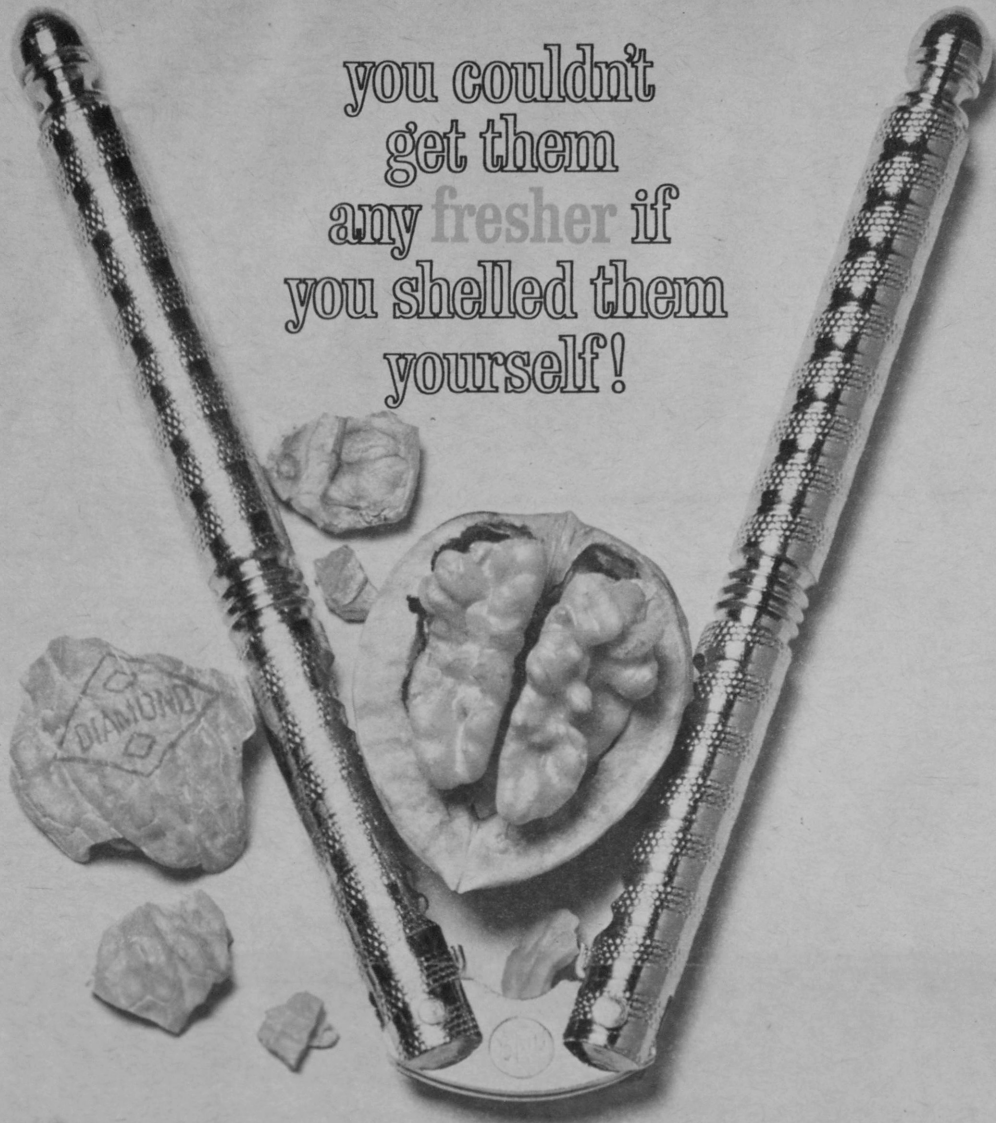

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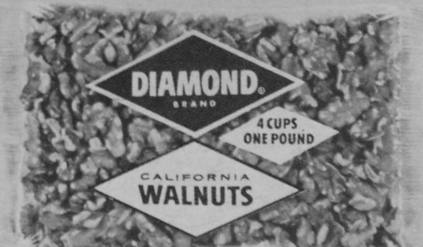
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
