### **Card Mailers Pay** Same Postage Rate As A Century Ago

People sending Christmas cards oday at the five-cent, first class rate pay the same to mail Christmas greetings as Americans did

well over a century ago. Research shows that in 1847 the post office department issued its first stamps, including a nickel stamp for the basic prepaid

And, of course, in those days a nickel would buy a meal where it usually cannot even buy a cup of coffee today.

Since 1932, Postmaster Martin Kasischke observed, while living costs for the American family have skyrocketed considerably more than 100 percent, the cost of mailing a first-class letter has the setting off of fireworks tradionly increased by two cents or two-thirds.

The postmaster's comments were made in connection with a Eve. recommendation to Tawas City residents to use the first-class, five-cent Christmas stamp on portrays the national Christmas tree on the "Eastern Ellipse" in the nation's capital. The stamp is available at the local post office.

Danish-Style Dinner Favorite

To be hospitable is to serve good food, as any Dane will tell you. And they can say so because the Danish cuisine is one of the best on the continent, as any American who has visited Denmark will testify.

Here is a recipe which has been tested and adapted for use by the American homemaker by the Borden Test Kitchen in New York City. It combines veal and pork, plus seasonings, and is topped with cheese. Shaped and baked in a ring mold, it is served with instant whipped potatoes, an exclusive American

> Danish-Style Cheese-Veal Ring (Makes 4 to 6 servings)

2 tablespoons sweet pepper 2 eggs, slightly beaten flakes

1 tablespoon celery flakes
2 cup hot water
1 chicken bouillon cube
1 pounds ground lean veal ½ pound ground lean pork

cup grated onion teaspoon salt ½ teaspoon pepper ½ cup dry bread crumbs 1 (6-oz.) package Vera-Sharp

In small covered saucepan, simmer sweet pepper and celery In small covered saucepan, simmer sweet pepper and celery flakes in ½ cup hot water for 10 minutes. Drain and set aside. In large mixing bowl, dissolve bouillon cube in ¾ cup hot water. Add cooked drained pepper and celery flakes and all ingredients, except cheese. Mix until thoroughly combined. Press into lightly buttered 2-quart ring mold. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 1 hour. Remove from oven. Drain off any liquid. Let stand 2 to 3 minutes. To unmold, invert a baking sheet or oven-proof serving platter over top of ring mold. Quickly turn upside down onto baking sheet. Cut cheese slices diagonally through center to form triangle. Arrange cheese triangles over top of baked veal ring, edges overlapping. Return to oven for 2 minutes, or until cheese just begins to melt. To serve, slice into portions.



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
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
