Two plans were offered to the city by Gordon Huck, Tawas manager for Consumers Power Company.

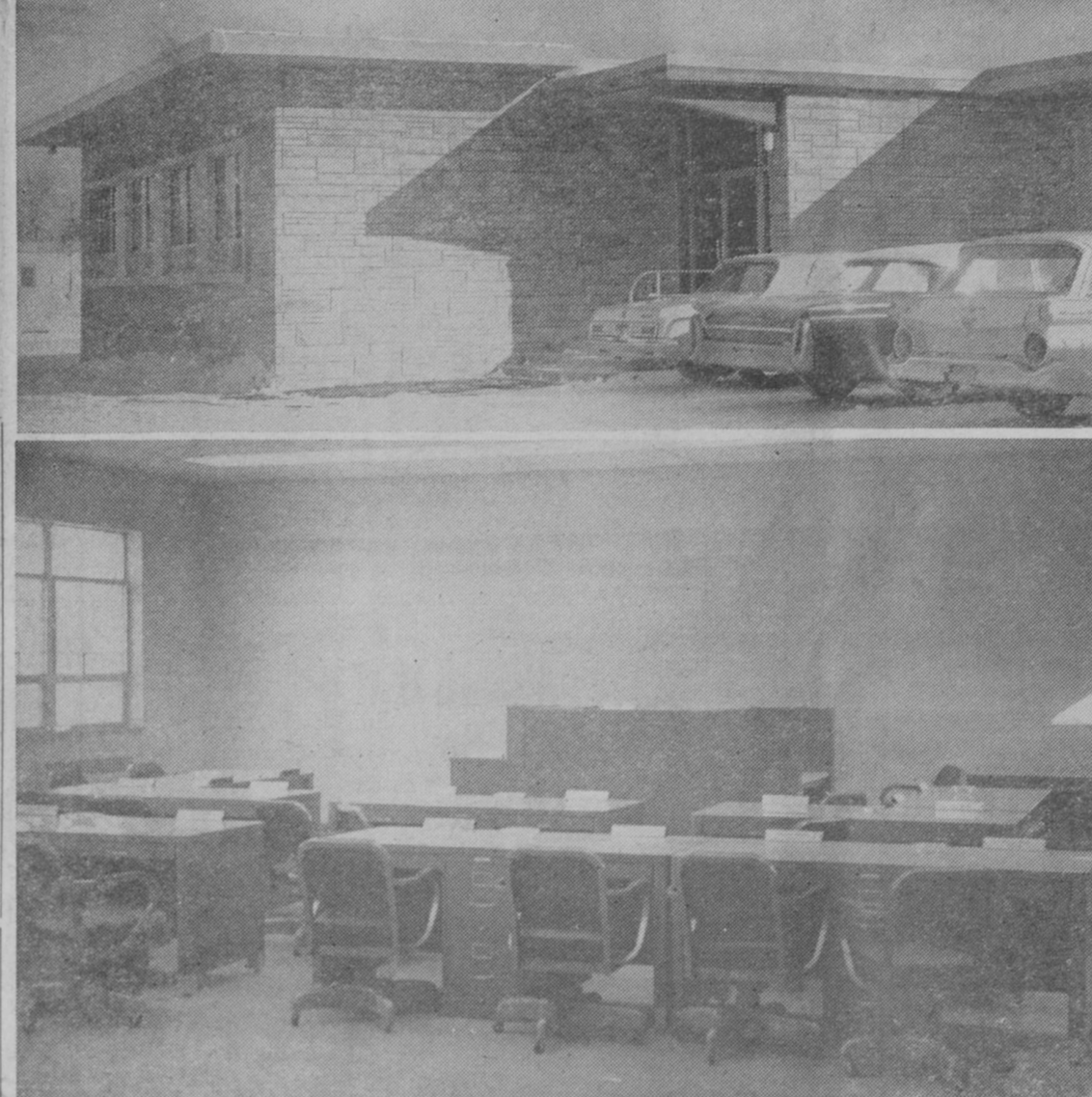
The second plan called for installing 24 fluorescent fixtures at \$122 each per year or an annual cost of \$2,928.

## Probate Court Retirements Point to Pending Changes

Pending retirement of Probate Judge H. Read Smith, along with retirement of Mrs. Karl Kobs, register of probate, and Mrs. Charles Kurtzrock, juvenile officer, focuses interest on the upcoming reorganization of Michigan courts.

Steps are expected to be taken within the next two weeks for continued operation of the probate court until a new judge is elected. Judge Smith's retirement, along with that of his staff, is effective December 31.

How the judgeship is to be filled has not been determined as yet, according to latest information. The deputy court administrator for the State of Michigan is expected to be here next week to discuss the matter with local authorities.

In any event, the new probate judge will have an entirely new staff and may have a job much different than the one handled for the past 24 years by the present probate judge.

Judge Smith said Monday that, under provisions of the new state constitution, justices of the peace would be discontinued within five years. "I expect that there will be a vast change in the probate court, even as early as next year," he stated.

Judge Smith said that discussions are now being held by committees of the state legislature, state supreme court and state bar association toward implementing provisions of the constitution which affect courts.

probate is being trained by Judge Smith and Mrs. Kobs. The circuit court has appointed Mrs. Richard Prescott to fill this position on a temporary basis.

Both Mrs. Kobs and Mrs. Kurtzrock are veteran members of the probate court staff, each having served 17 years at their jobs.

Mrs. Kobs, who is responsible for all records and is authorized to issue notices and fix times of hearings, spent 6½ years as clerk of the Iosco Draft Board prior to starting in Judge Smith's office.

The retiring register of probate and her husband will vacation this winter in Florida and, on their return next spring, she will become secretary to Judge Smith when he resumes his private law practice.

As the county's juvenile officer, Mrs. Kurtzrock has had supervision of boys and girls who do not have correct parental guidance, working closely with the probate judge. She also has supervision of foster homes for children.

Prior to starting on this job she had been an elementary teacher for seven years at Whittemore.

He is one of a group of volunteers who have recently spent many off-duty hours doing maintenance and repair work for welfare agencies in Philadelphia.

**WSCS Christmas Tea is Well Attended**

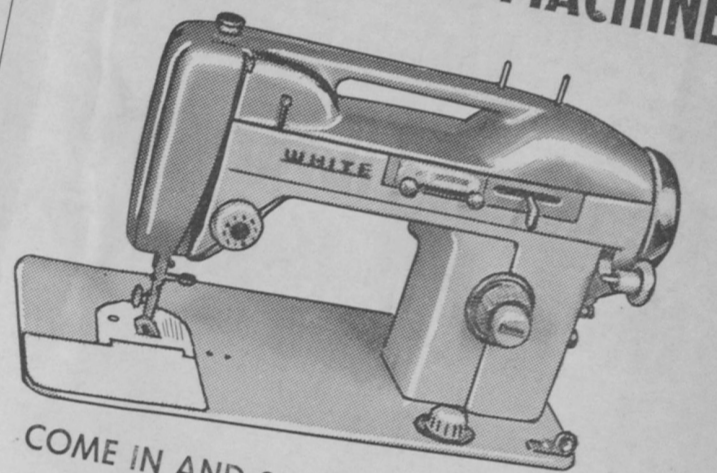

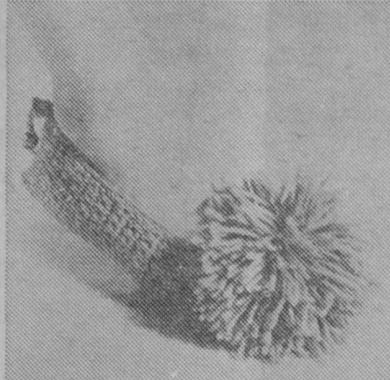

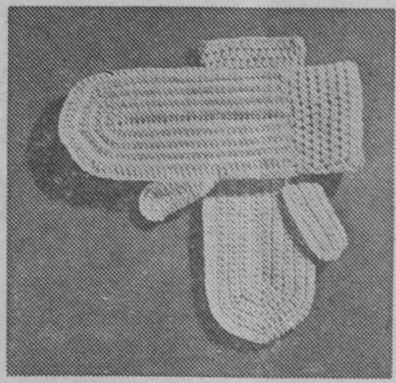

## Card Mailers Pay Same Postage Rate As A Century Ago

People sending Christmas cards today at the five-cent, first class rate pay the same to mail Christmas greetings as Americans did well over a century ago.

Research shows that in 1847 the post office department issued its first stamps, including a nickel stamp for the basic prepaid rate.

And, of course, in those days a nickel would buy a meal where it usually cannot even buy a cup of coffee today.

Since 1932, Postmaster Martin Kasischke observed, while living costs for the American family have skyrocketed considerably more than 100 percent, the cost of mailing a first-class letter has only increased by two cents or two-thirds.

The postmaster's comments were made in connection with a recommendation to Tawas City residents to use the first-class, five-cent Christmas stamp on their Christmas cards. The stamp portrays the national Christmas tree on the "Eastern Ellipse" in the nation's capital. The stamp is available at the local post office.

The five-cent rate permits forwarding or return of the letter where necessary, allows the use of a handwritten message on the card—adding a personal touch—and also provides speedier handling and faster delivery, particularly for cards going out-of-town.

In recent years, people have been buying better and more expensive greeting cards—and it seems a shame, when only four-cent, third class postage is paid and the addressee has moved that we normally cannot even forward the card, it is poor economy to try to save a few pennies and lose several dollars worth of cards in the bargain.

Reports from the greeting card industry indicate it is not uncommon for an average family to send more than 100 cards during the holiday season.

To avoid trouble and waiting in line, I suggest that two full sheets of the Christmas stamp—100 to the sheet—be picked up when at the post office and then there is no last-minute panic about getting stamps to put on cards to send to those who have been overlooked or added to the list.

Christmas stamps, of course, are usable for postage at any time, Mr. Kasischke emphasized.

### HOLIDAY MENUS

In France, after the elders return home from midnight mass, it is time for a grand feast. In some sections of the country, the roast goose occupies the center spot on the festive board. 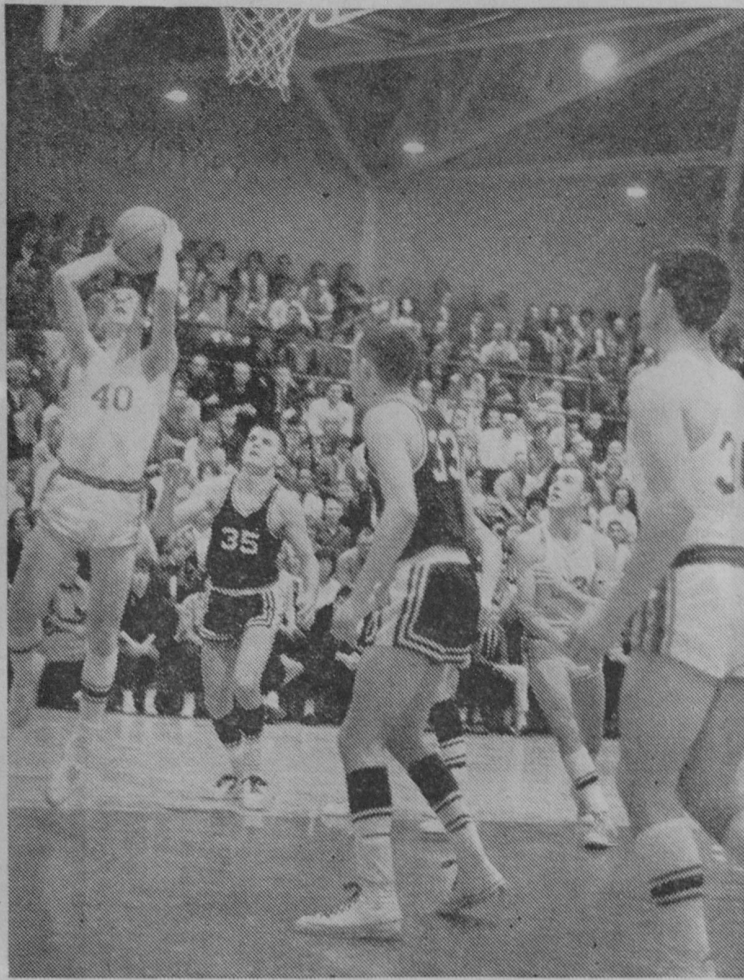

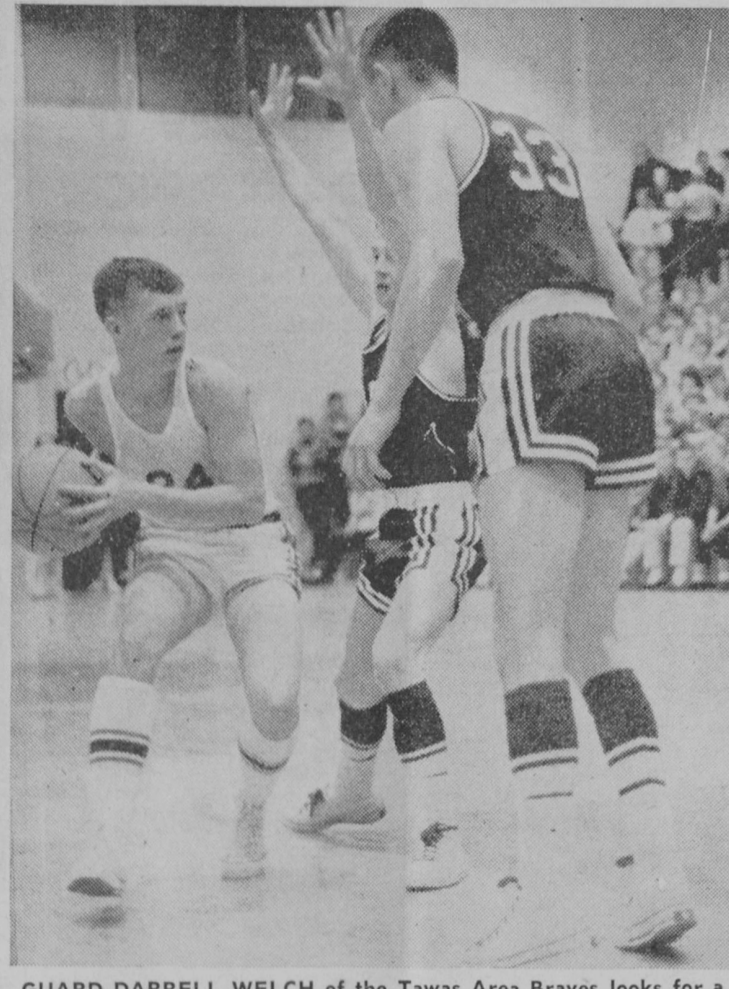

## French Reveillon Elaborate Feast

In France, where the season's greeting is "Joyeux Noel," many homes now have Christmas trees as well as the traditional crèche populated with terra cotta figures called santons. This custom can be traced back to the 12th century when it took the form of a liturgical drama.

Young French children, like children throughout the world, will—or should—be asleep when the old members of the family return home from Midnight Mass on Christmas Eve. If they happen to be awake, as they often are, they may take part in the Reveillon. This elaborate feast of many courses begins with pate de foie gras and oysters. Roast turkey or goose with all the trimmings follow, along with a variety of complementing cheeses and fruits. Topping off the meal is the traditional buche de Noel, a log-shaped cake with chocolate icing simulating bark.

In small covered saucepan, simmer sweet pepper and celery flakes in 1/2 cup hot water for 10 minutes. Drain and set aside. In large mixing bowl, dissolve bouillon cube in 3/4 cup hot water. Add cooked drained pepper and celery flakes and all ingredients, except cheese. Mix until thoroughly combined. Press into lightly buttered 2-quart ring mold. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 1 hour. Remove from oven. Drain off any liquid. Let stand 2 to 3 minutes. To unmold, invert a baking sheet or oven-proof serving platter over top of ring mold. Quickly turn upside down onto baking sheet. Cut cheese slices diagonally through center to form triangle. Arrange cheese triangles over top of baked veal ring, edges overlapping. Return to oven for 2 minutes, or until cheese just begins to melt. To serve, slice into portions.

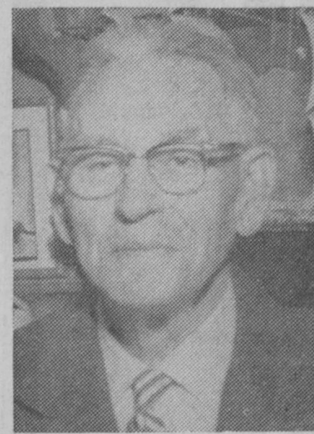
1. Two large shopping bags: one for paper and ribbon you want to keep, and one for scraps to be thrown away.

## Clifford Jones to be Sentenced Dec. 31 in Circuit Court

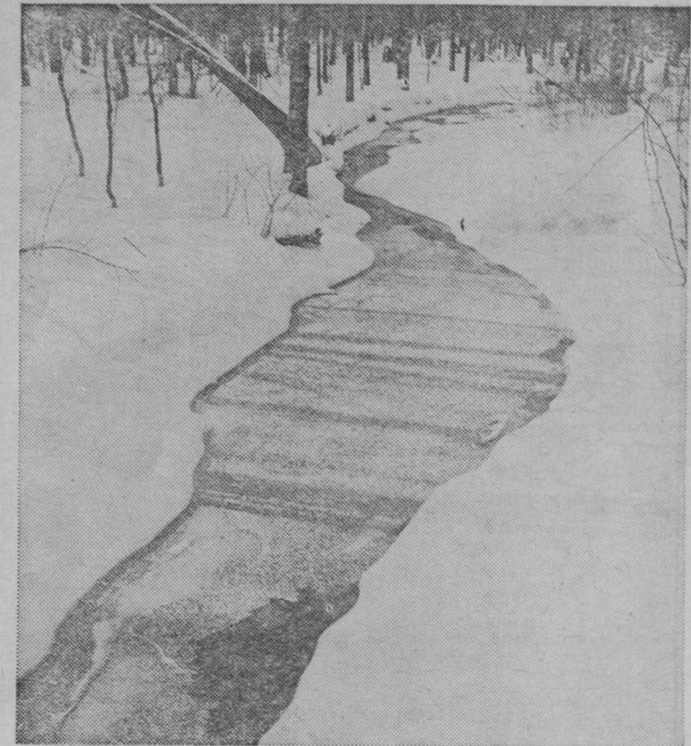
