By converting two foul shots in the last 12 seconds of play, Tawas Area Braves defeated previously unbeaten Standish-Sterling Central in a 52-51 NBC clash Friday night

THE WIN sent Tawas into a three-way tie for conference leadership with Standish-Sterling and West Branch. The Orioles, bouncing back after losing to Gladwin last week, defeated the Owls, 81-68.


