The club, in cooperation with the East Tawas Department of Public Works, has sponsored an ice skating rink at the East Tawas Athletic Field for the past four years.

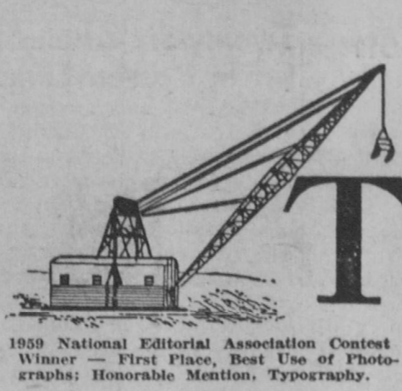
Facilities include a warming shelter and the concession stand is to be operated this year by the Tawas Area School Varsity Club.

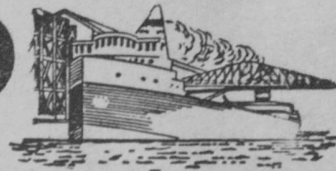

Suit Against Gypsum Co. Starts Today

Trial of a \$400,000 damage suit against National Gypsum Company is scheduled to open today (Wednesday) in Iosco Circuit Court.

The gypsum firm is being sued by property owners in the vicinity of the Charles T. Prescott Dock south of Tawas City, who claim damages allegedly caused by the installation.

Original bill of complaint in this case was filed December 23, 1957. Since then, some 114 different proceedings have been filed.

National Gypsum quarries rock inland and transports it to a site south of Tawas City and over the water of Saginaw Bay to lake freighters.

It was allowed to complete construction of the multi-million dollar installation after a 1957 decree was issued by Judge Herman Dehnke, who retired in 1959. Signing of that decree had followed long months of litigation.

The decree was appealed to the state supreme court, which ruled that construction of the loading facility subjected the company to payment of such damages as plaintiffs may be able to prove in court.

Original plaintiffs are Malvern F. Obrecht, Arthur L. Johnson, the Rev. Fr. Robert Neuman, Earle B. Clark, Elmer Slaven, Walter J. Hellenberg, J. B. Shively, Howard C. Davis, Albert F. Piggott and Maurice E. Brown.

Since the suit was started, some 16 or more plaintiffs have joined in the litigation. Judge Allan C. Miller has stipulated that original plaintiffs are to present proofs first.

Pool Hall Ordinance to be Revised Soon

East Tawas' ordinance governing operation of pool halls is to be revised by City Attorney Michael Freil, according to action taken at Monday night's council meeting.

Included in regulations would be provisions that no minors would be allowed on the premises after 10:00 p. m. that pool halls would close at midnight and that Sunday hours would be regulated.

A report is to be made by Freil at the next council meeting.

One building application approved during the past week was issued to Donald Eklund, 805 East Bay Street, install new roof.

Permission to install gas lines to serve the city hall and garage was granted to Michigan Consolidated Gas Company.

Airman Died Saturday in Oscoda Cabin Blaze

A 28-year-old airman burned to death early Saturday morning in his small rented cottage at 6170 Loud Drive, Oscoda.

Dead is A2E Donald R. Bingham, whose charred body was found by firemen in the smoldering ruins of the frame structure.

The fire was discovered at 6:45 a. m. by a neighbor, who called the

Oscoda-AuSable Township Fire Department after going outside to investigate what sounded like a loud crackling noise.

The cottage was a mass of flames when firemen arrived and beyond saving. It appeared as though an explosion had blown out the front windows.

At first, firemen were unaware that anyone was home. The victim's wife, Dixie, who was at work in an Oscoda restaurant, told Police Chief Robert Foster that Bingham had called her by telephone at 3:45 o'clock. He was home at the time.

Foster learned that two friends had taken the Wurtsmith-based airman home at 2:30 o'clock. After investigation at the scene, authorities were of the opinion that

the blaze was caused by a faulty space heater.

Aiding Foster in the investigation were Fire Chief Howard Hofacer, Coroner E. D. Jacques and Sheriff Ivan L. O'Farrell.

Bingham is survived by his wife, one child by a previous marriage and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. J. Bingham of Ecru, Mississippi.

Two Auto Crashes Reported in Area

Three persons were injured in two area auto accidents Saturday.

Treated at Tawas Hospital were Terry L. LaForge, 21, and Marilyn LaForge, 18, Tawas City.

LaForge was driver of a car which was struck by a vehicle driven by Marvin D. Collier, 21, Flint. Collier was traveling at a high rate of speed and rammed the LaForge vehicle on US-23 south of Tawas City. Two passengers in the LaForge vehicle, Mr. and Mrs. John Engle of Tawas City, escaped injury.

Lee A. Lundquist, 16, Birmingham, received minor cuts Saturday afternoon when the car which he was driving rolled over at the Monument Road and Wilber Road intersection. Three passengers escaped injury.

School Board Lets Contract on Bell System

A contract to install a bell system at the Tawas City Elementary Unit was awarded to St. James Electric last week by the Tawas Area Board of Education.

The contract was awarded on the basis of an early completion date guaranteed by St. James. The project is to be completed by December 10 and the contract calls for a 10 percent penalty clause if not completed by then.

According to the board, other contractors did not give such a guarantee.

In other business, the board authorized installation of two 20,000-lumen street lights in the bus loading area in front of the school. These lights are to remain in operation during the night. Lights in the parking lot on the east side of the school are to be in operation each night and are to be turned off by clock.

Principal Ernest W. Jordan Jr. reported that bids had been received on shop equipment to be purchased for the automotive shop program conducted by Robert Reasner. Bids are to be opened at the next meeting.

Federal Funds for New APW Projects

More than \$920,000 in federal money was recently credited to Michigan to carry out fish, forestry, game and parks projects during the 1964-65 period under the Accelerated Public Works Program, the conservation department reports.

Included in this allotment is \$263,000 which will be translated by men and machines into 200 campsites at East Tawas State Park (Tawas Point) and 160 sites at Indian Lake State Park, Schoolcraft County. Toilet buildings, water supplies and electrical services will be added for these new sites.

Allotment of the federal funds is conditioned by the state's ability to provide matching money which would total about \$680,000 for the entire two-year program. If appropriated by the state legislature, Michigan's share of financing funds would come from hunting and fishing license fees and general tax funds.

The projects, designed to boost employment in distressed areas, would provide 175 man-years of work in 45 counties, most of them in Northern Michigan.

Teacher Tenure Drive Completed in State

The teacher tenure campaign has been successfully completed in the state and the effort in Iosco was also satisfactory, report Misses Marion L. Jennings and Cleopatra Shelp, county tenure chairmen. The help given by workers who circulated petitions was appreciated.

An intensive study program is now in order to understand the provisions of the act. The cities already under tenure had intensive study program with panel discussions and workshop sessions before tenure was adopted.

Policies made by the school boards of these cities are available for study. The Michigan Education Association may be contacted for copies or requests may be made to school superintendents of tenure districts.

Credit Union to Hold Annual Meet Jan. 30

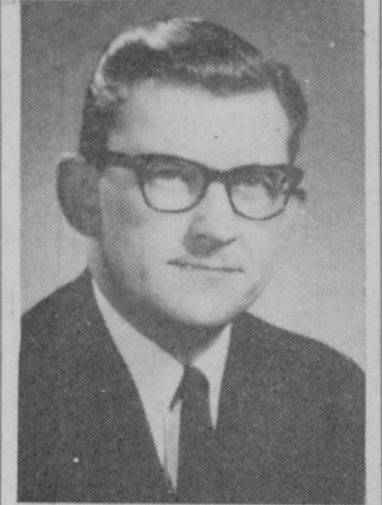
Tawas Community Federal Credit Union will hold its first annual meeting January 30 at Tawas Area High School. Guest speakers from the Michigan Credit Union League will be present to address the group. All members are encouraged to attend. Refreshments will be served after the business session.

Tawas Community Federal Credit Union was organized in February 1963 as an outgrowth of the Anderson Coach Employees Credit Union. It was a highly successful venture, paying dividends on savings every year of operation and also returning interest refunds to its borrowers.

Much the same success is foreseen for the new group which is composed of residents in the Tawas area, says Albert Friedrichsen, president. Anyone living within a radius of 10 miles of the Iosco County Building in Tawas City is eligible to join, he said.

"The credit union is a group of people with a permit—in the case of the Tawas group, a federal charter—to do business with each other. They save money in a common fund and make loans to members from that fund," explains Treasurer Ronald Korhals. "A credit union is not a credit bureau, a labor union, a loan company or a finance house. It is a group of people who have joined together to manage their own money."

During the past 10 months, the group has grown steadily from its beginning. Recently, a new service has been added for the benefit of its members. A family group life insurance plan is offered to all members. To encourage savings, a system of payroll deductions has been devised so that employees of area businesses may automatically add to their saving accounts.

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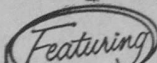


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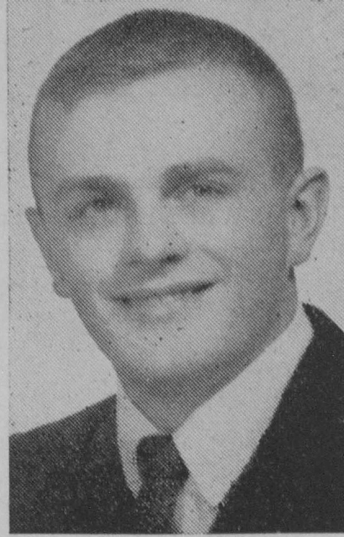

Holiday Wreaths Gay Yule Decorations



Inexpensive and colorful decorations for the holidays can add to the joys of the Christmas season. A little ingenuity and a few basic materials are all that is needed to give your home that warm Yuletide glow.
 The makers of Handi-Wrap plastic food wrap offer some basic instructions for making the holiday wreath pictured above, and the directions can be modified to make other decorations for the home. The wreath adds a bit of Christmas sparkle to the fireplace mantle or serves as a hallway wall decoration. Since the weather won't harm this wreath, it is also practical as an outside door decoration.
 The pom-poms which are used to form the wreath can be attached to other shapes to achieve other interesting effects. Either wire outlines, such as those used in the wreath, or forms made of Styrofoam can be used. The pom-poms themselves can be used as package decorations and are especially suitable for packages which are to be mailed.

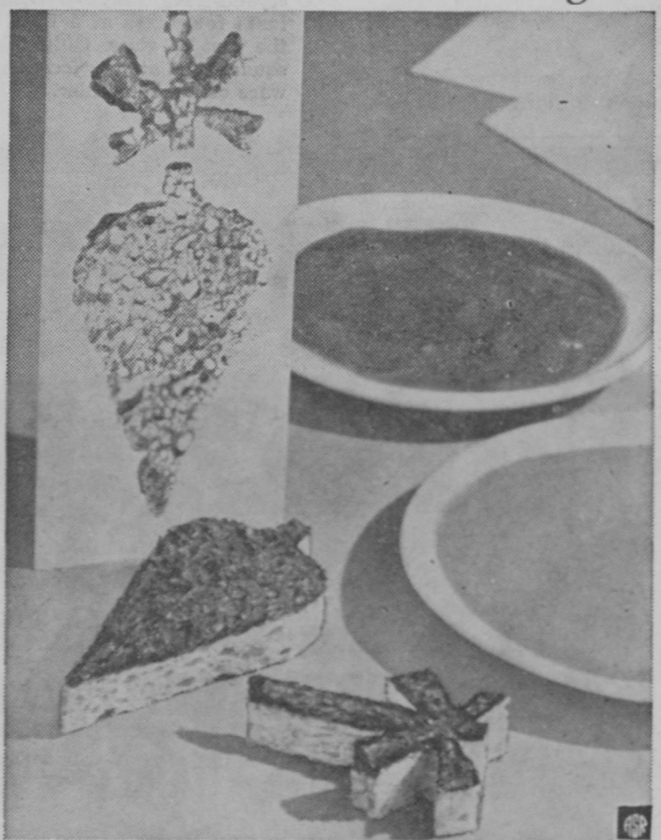
Holiday Wreath

- 1 Roll of Handi-Wrap
- Fine wire
- Small Christmas ornaments
- Form coat-hanger into a round wreath shape. Using wire, attach pom-poms made of Handi-Wrap (see directions below). Space pom-poms close together on wreath, interspersing with small Christmas ornaments. Attach bow to top of wreath to cover hanger hook. Add pine cone or other holiday trim to center of wreath if desired.
- Large colored plastic bow
- Knife
- Wire coat-hanger

Pom-Poms

Tear off a 48-inch length of Handi-Wrap. Gather it into a narrow strip about 2 inches wide forming a thick strand. Wrap the strand loosely around hand, forming four or five loops. Fasten wire around center of loops and cut both ends of loops with knife. Spread pom-pom into half-round ball, trimming uneven ends. Approximately 20 to 22 pom-poms are needed for wreath described above.

Handmade Season's Greetings



Finger paint and cut out sponge shapes print handsome Christmas cards quickly and easily. Finger paint is made at home from corn starch and other standard kitchen items.

Christmas greetings are warmer and more personal when they arrive on handsome, hand-decorated cards. Handmade cards usually take too much time but beautiful ones can be made quickly using a sponge and finger paint.

Take a cellulose sponge and cut it into a design. Simple shapes make the best ones. Among the objects which make good subjects are Christmas ornaments, crowns, trees and very stylized angels. Differences in sponge textures will produce various interesting results.
 To print cards, thin finger paint to a soupy consistency and pour onto shallow plates, one for each color, of course. Using desired sponge shape or shapes dip into finger paint and press gently against a plain card. Set aside to dry and repeat process with new card. Be sure to protect work surface with oil cloth or newspapers.

Finger paint is easily made at home from inexpensive materials. A whole colorful batch can be made for less than fifty cents and will be sufficient to print hundreds of cards. Food coloring, tempera paint, or all purpose dye produce the bright reds, blues, greens and golds appropriate to the season.

Finger Paint Recipe

- 1/2 cup corn starch
 - 1 cup cold water
 - 1 envelope unflavored gelatine
 - 2 cups hot water
 - 1/2 cup soap flakes or detergent
 - pure food colors, tempera paint or all purpose dye
- Combine corn starch and 1/2 cup cold water; soak gelatine in remaining 1/2 cup water. Stir hot water slowly into corn starch mixture. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture boils and is clear. Remove from heat; blend in softened gelatine. Stir in soap or detergent until dissolved. Cool mixture, then divide into a jar for each color. Stir food colors into mixture in each jar to desired intensity. Cover jars to store.

Slowly add sugar mixture to egg whites, beating constantly until meringue makes stiff and glossy peaks. Drop about a teaspoonful of mixture lengthwise on each piece of wafer. Bake in very slow oven, 300° F., until meringues are golden, about 25 to 30 minutes. Cool away from drafts. Meringue will shrink and crinkle slightly and be chewy on the inside. They may be stored several days in airtight container. Yield: 36 meringues.

Beat chilled gelatin mixture until light and foamy. Fold in whipped nonfat dry milk. Pour mixture into lightly oiled 1½ quart mold. Chill in refrigerator 1½ to 2 hours, or until firm. To serve, unmold and garnish with fresh fruit.

Tiny colored candies

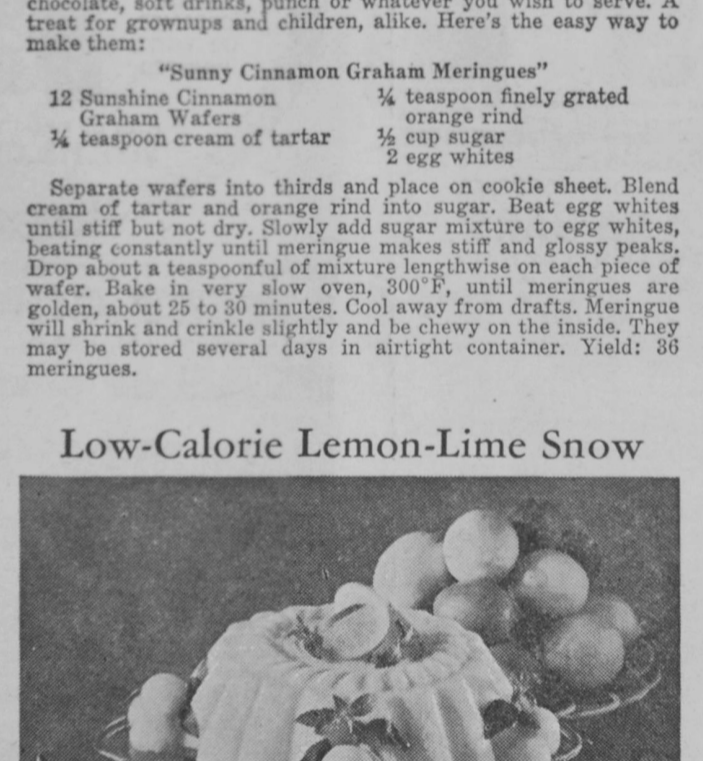
1 cup sugar
1 cup water
½ cup light corn syrup
1 envelope Cherry-Lime Kool-Aid

Combine sugar, water, and corn syrup in a saucepan. Bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring until sugar is dissolved. Continue boiling, without stirring, until mixture comes to a temperature of 200° F.
