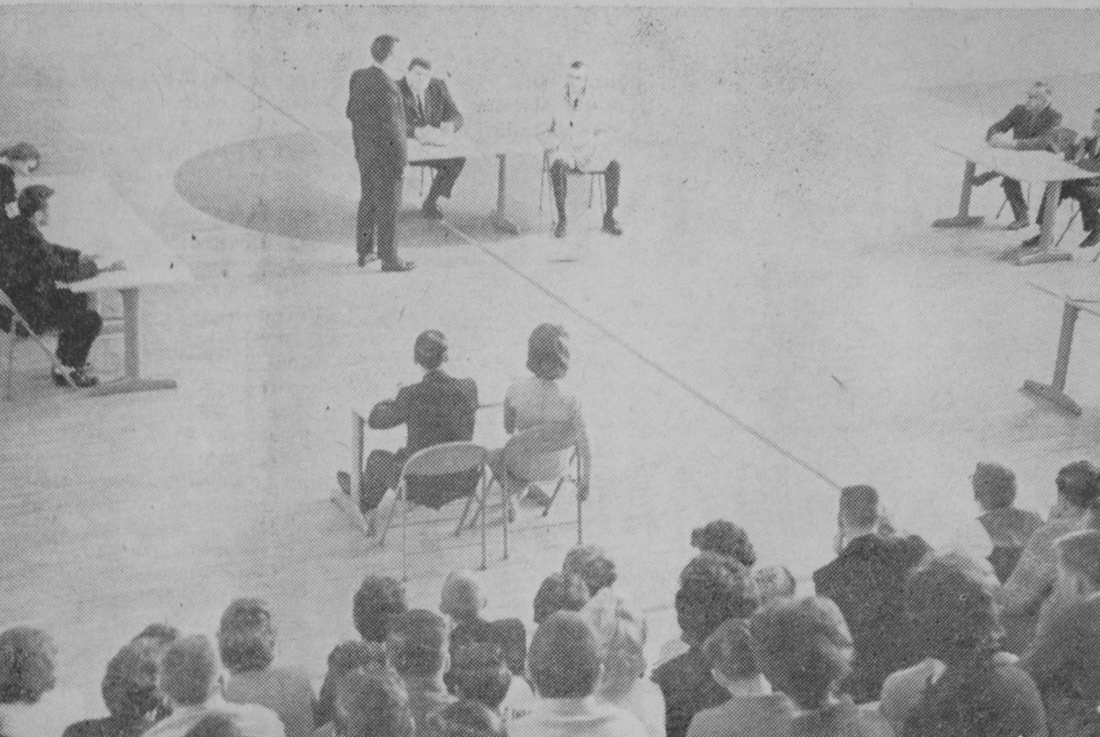

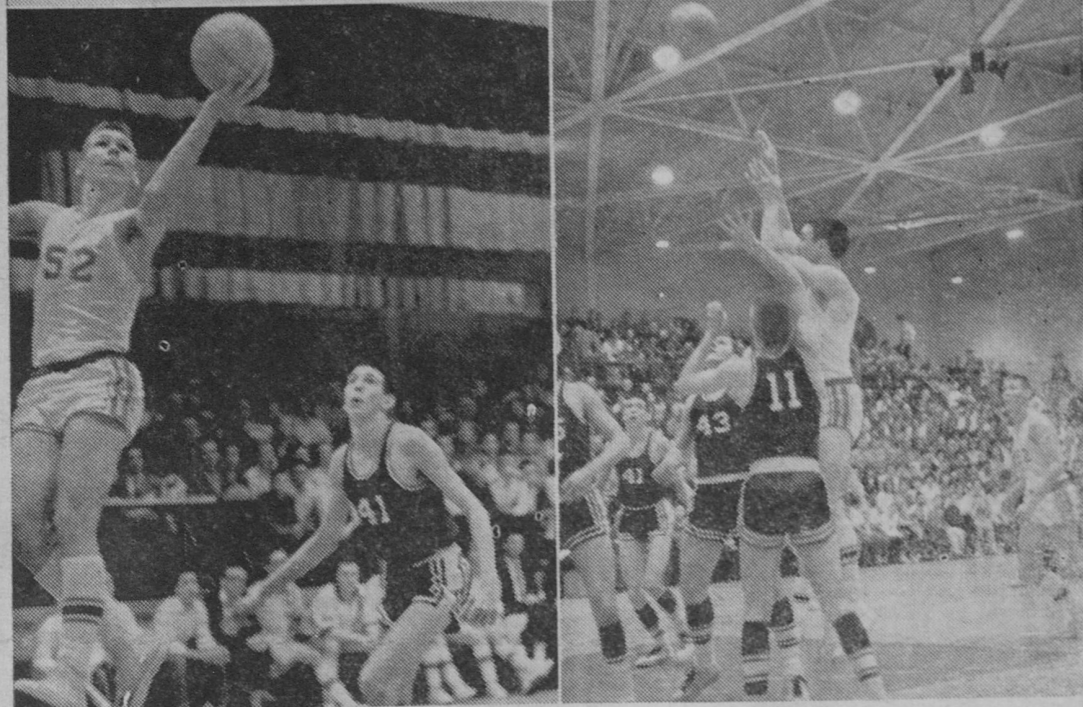
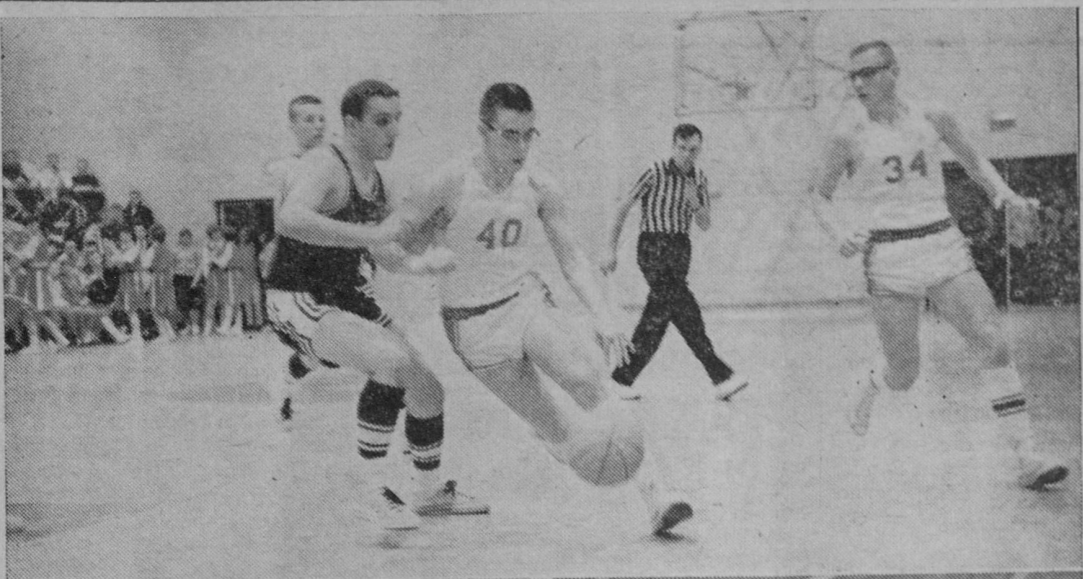

Tawas basketball fans have been left breathless after two great performances during the past week by the Tawas Area Braves.

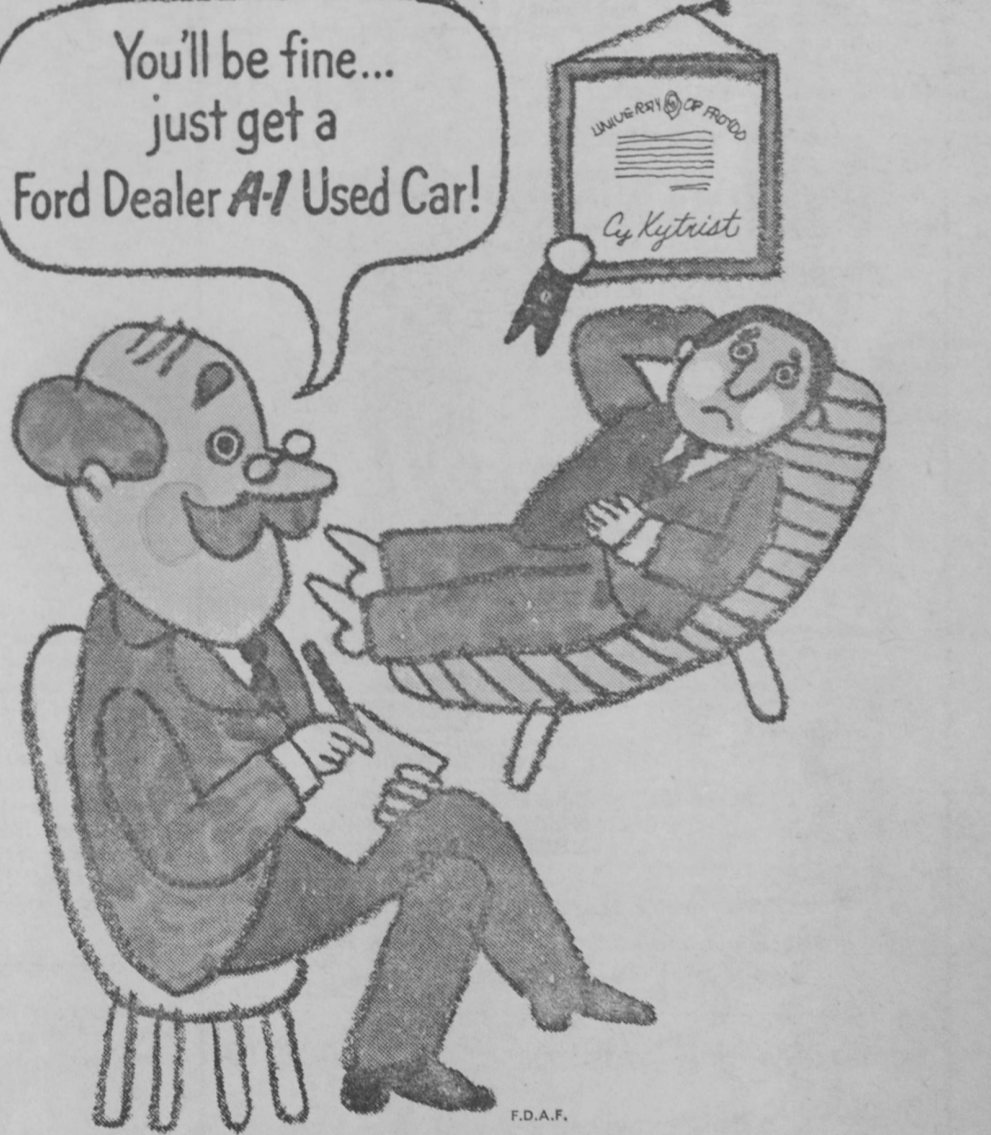

32 New Positive Reactors Discovered in School TB Tests

Of the 8,741 children receiving tuberculin tests in Isoco, Alcona, Oscoda and Ogemaw Counties during the past month, there were 32 new positive reactors, according to Dr. E. A. Hasty, director of District Health Unit No. 2.

Among 472 adults tested, there were 55 new positive reactors. Included were teachers and other school personnel.

"By new positive reactors, we mean children or adults who are found to be positive for the first time on our records," said Dr. Hasty. "Further study shows that at the present time in the entire school systems of the four counties, there are 88 children and 179 adults who are positive tuberculin reactors."

The procedures of follow-up on the newly-found positive reactors will follow the recommended procedure of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association. This advises that all such newly-found reactors be referred to family physicians for examination and study.

It further advises that all such patients should have a chest X-ray. Chest X-rays will be available either through family physicians or through the mobile unit of the Michigan Department of Health. The parents of each child or adult, who is found to be positive, have been informed concerning this by mail.

"Response to this project was excellent," commented Dr. Hasty. "More than 90 percent of the school children and 95 percent of the adult personnel of schools submitted to the tuberculin test."

Dr. Hasty compliments teachers and school personnel, as well as parents, for excellent cooperation in making this project successful.

Missionaries to Convene at East Tawas Church



A missionary convention at East Tawas Assembly of God Church will feature outstanding missionaries. The convention begins Sunday evening, February 17, at 7 o'clock with Miss Doris Jean Nimmo of Monrovia, Liberia, telling of trekking into the African bush to teach Christianity to Africans.

Her experiences as principal and teacher of a day-school with over 235 students enrolled, doing evangelistic work in towns not previously reached by the churches, organizing new Sunday schools and leading the Women's Missionary Fellowship Convention of Liberia will be authenticated with picture slides, curios and native costumes.

Miss Nimmo holds a bachelor of science and master degrees from Memphis State University and is under appointment of the Foreign Missions Board of the Assemblies of God, USA.

Tuesday night at 7:30, the second service of the convention will be presented with the Rev. and Mrs. Andrew McCabe, missionaries in Nawabganj, India, relating their missionary work among boys in the James Harvey Memorial School. Mr. McCabe was born in India, the son of Scots missionaries. Mrs. McCabe is from Garden City, Kansas, and had spent two terms in India prior to her marriage.

Wednesday night at 7:30, a former photo engraver for the Wichita Eagle and Enid, Oklahoma, News and Eagle, the Rev. Vinton H. Shumway Sr. will tell how 13 Assemblies of God Churches with more than 1,000 people in attendance each Sunday have been established in an area once terrorized by "Odozi Obodo."

"Odozi Obodo" was a murder society, terrorizing the Abakaliki area of Eastern Nigeria. The government investigated the gang for 193 murders; 417 arrests were made, 340 members were charged, 125 were convicted and 41 of the men, including the chief, were hanged. This murder society has now been crushed by the Nigerian government and it is in this area that the 13 churches have been established.

Mr. Shumway also developed the church's work in the Kaduna area. He built the Rahama missions station and laid plans for a Bible school in Zaria Province.

The Shumways have three children, Vinton Harry Jr., who is serving as an Assemblies of God missionary to India, Thomas Charles and David Robert.

A special group film will be shown during this service.

The public is cordially invited to attend every service of this convention and to hear the progress of missions in India, Nigeria and Liberia.
