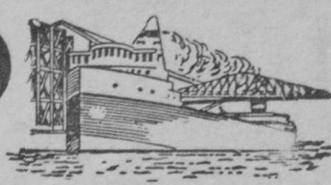

CD to Sponsor Medical Self-Help Classes

Officials of Iosco County Civil Defense Unit announced this week that classes in medical self-help are to be held at Tawas Area High School as soon as a sufficient number of persons are registered.

Anyone interested may register by phoning FOrEst 2-3485, giving name, address and night preference, or by sending a post card to Iosco County Civil Defense, 430 Lake Street, Tawas City.

"Medical self-help is a practical, community-family centered program designed to teach the basic emergency skills which could save your life and the lives of other members of your family," states Francis J. Block, deputy CD director for Iosco.

Developed by the United States Public Health Service in cooperation with the American Medical Association, the American Red Cross and the Department of Defense, national goal of the program is to train one adult member of each family.

The program provides information and training on life-saving techniques which would enable a person to care for others in time of emergency when professional medical assistance is not readily available.

A medical self-help kit has been devised containing enough training material to initially teach four classes of 25 students. The 12 lessons can be given in 16 hours of lecture and demonstration.

Tawas Debaters Win B Conference Trophy

Tawas Area High School debaters walked off with first place trophy in the Northern B Conference debate league tournament held last Thursday at Standish-Sterling High School.

Tawas won its four debates, followed by Gladwin with two, Standish - Sterling and West Branch with one each. During the season, Tawas debaters had seven wins and three losses.

The topic for debate, selected by the Michigan High School Forensic Association, was—Resolved: That the United States should join in forming a common market for the nations of the Western Hemisphere.

Tawas debaters will compete in district eliminations at Frankenmuth February 9. They are scheduled to meet Saginaw St. Peter and Paul.

Tournament hostess was Mrs. Barbara Carlstrom, Central debate coach. Judges were the Rev. Fr. Joseph Castanier and Mrs. Edward Perlberg.

Mr. DeBeau said that the Northern B Conference was to present the debate trophy to Tawas later this month.

Tawas Point is for the Birds, Says Audubon

The Michigan Audubon Society, at its 59th annual meeting January 26 at Delta College, took sharp exception to plans by the state conservation department's parks division for development of Tawas Point.

Michigan Audubon members asked: 1. Careful consideration by the department to preserving those habitats and conditions which have made Tawas Point an outstanding bird study area.

2. For the parks division to work with a special Audubon committee of ornithologists to effect an acceptable plan of development for the narrow sand spit between Lake Huron and Tawas Bay.

Society officials are apprehensive of any radical changes which would involve all of Tawas Point, famous as a stopping place for migrant shore birds and waterfowl.

"Full development of the peninsula for camping, picnic areas, bathing and water sports would largely ruin the area for birds," the Audubon Society stated.

Tawas Point, a tract of land measuring roughly 7,000 feet in length and 1,800 feet in width at the widest point, was acquired by

the department of conservation under a special legislative appropriation.

Specifically purchased for state park purposes, its sandy beaches and shallow waters make it ideal for development into a fine recreational area for camping, picnicking and aquatic sports. The parks division of the department of conservation is presently working on plans for development of the property as a state park.

"While the Michigan Audubon Society recognizes the urgent need for additional parks and camping facilities in the Tawas area, its members view with great apprehension any radical changes which would involve all of Tawas Point," according to the society's policy statement.

"Its value as a stopping place for migrant shore birds and waterfowl should not be destroyed. Full development of the peninsula for camping, picnic areas, bathing and water sports would largely ruin the area for birds."

Tawas Point is known as one of the outstanding spots along the entire Great Lakes shoreline at which many species of migratory birds may be found in season.

Through the years, not only have most of the common migrants among the water and shore birds been found along Tawas Point, but also many rare and seldom seen species have been observed and photographed there.

ET Council Calls Evans Building a Fire Hazard

Condemnation procedures to force removal of the old Evans Building on State Street were started Monday night by the East Tawas City Council.

The council directed Fire Chief Wilfred (Skip) Rapp to ask for an investigation by the Michigan State Police Fire Marshal's Division.

The frame building, called a fire hazard by councilmen, was constructed in the 1880s. The lower portion has been unoccupied since December. The second floor is used for storage by Evans.

Elmer Werth addressed the council and asked for a resolution supporting Anderson Coach Company in its bid for constructing pre-fabricated homes at Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

He said that the air force is advertising for bids on 300 units. These homes are to be built in 10-foot-wide sections, similar to a mobile home, and connected to form a 20-foot-wide unit.

Letters urging support of the local firm are to be sent to Cong. Elford A. Cederberg, Senators Philip A. Hart, Patrick McNamara and Neil Staeber, congressman at large.

Retired School Teacher Dead; Ill Four Months

Mrs. E. Margaret Worden Shaw, former Iosco County school commissioner and teacher in local schools, died Thursday, January 31, at Sheridan Hospital, Fenwick. She had been ill about four months.

Born September 16, 1887, at Fenwick, the former Miss Worden came here in 1915 as an instructor in Iosco County Normal.

She succeeded Miss Ina Bradley as county school commissioner and served until 1939. She later taught elementary grades in Tawas City.

She was a member and honorary member of the Twentieth Century Club, Tawas City, and president of Ionia-Montclair Retired Teachers Association.

Her husband, Alfred Shaw, passed away three years ago. She is survived by two cousins, Frank Worden, with whom she made her home at Fenwick, and Robert Worden of Montana.

Funeral services were held Sunday from the Fenwick Methodist Church. Burial was at Fenwick. Attending services from Tawas City was Mrs. Muriel J. Horton.

Eagles Hall Swept by Fire Last Thursday Night

Fire gutted the dance floor-party room of Eagles Hall last Thursday night. Front portion of the recently remodeled frame

structure was smoke damaged. Believed to have started in a rear furnace room, flames were discovered about 11 o'clock. East Tawas and Tawas City volunteer firemen fought the blaze in sub-zero temperature for nearly an hour before bringing it under control.

Most of the flame damage was concentrated on floors, walls and ceiling of the rear portion of the building.

Employees of Anderson Coach Company held a dinner party there earlier in the evening. When the fire was detected, several persons tried to extinguish the flames but were soon forced from the building. There were no injuries.

The building is insured for \$30,000. Officers of the Fraternal Order of Eagles estimated the loss at approximately \$12,000.

Indian Lake Man Has Honorary Title of Kentucky Col.

Terrill Winstead, a resident of the Indian Lake area since 1945, received notice last week that he had received the honorary title of "Kentucky Colonel" from the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

The commission was signed by Gov. Bert Coombs. Winstead has called Michigan home since 1919, but his ancestors were among the original settlers of Kentucky, who followed in the footsteps of Daniel Boone.

His great grandfather migrated to Kentucky in 1792, settling in Webster County. Receipt of the commission came as a surprise to Winstead. He has a sister living in Kentucky.

Former Newsmen Dies at Grand Rapids

Horace E. Meyer, former resident of Tawas City, died of cancer February 1 at Blodgett Memorial Hospital, Grand Rapids. He was a stockbroker for the Don P. Matheson Company of Grand Rapids and two Chicago firms.

A native of Mt. Pleasant, Meyer was northern correspondent for The Bay City Times during the mid-1930s and he resided in this community.

Surviving are his wife, Louise, and a son, Arnold of Lansing.

Services were held Tuesday at Metcalf Funeral Home, Grand Rapids, with burial in Rosland Park Cemetery, Berkley.

Leave a Water Tap Running --- It May Prevent Freeze-Up

The deep frost penetration of almost 4 1/2 feet is a serious problem. Water lines are freezing.

To help prevent this from happening, the Tawas City Water Department recommends that home owners leave a tap running very slowly at all times.

"If your water were to freeze right now, it could mean being without water for quite a period of time," states Supt. Reginald Bublitz. "This uncouth preventative measure could help prevent costly expenses and insure continued water service."

During the past week, three Tawas City families experienced frozen lines and were without any water for three to four days.

"This is a grave situation," states Bublitz. "Turn on a tap where it won't accidentally be turned off. We are sure you do not want to be without water."

State Approves Plans for New Tawas City Rest Home

Final state approval has been received for a new 18-bed nursing home in Tawas City, according to a report this week from Mrs. Edna Schalm, owner.

To be located west of M-55 near Tawas Hospital, the 80 by 58-foot nursing home has received approval from the Michigan Department of Health and Fire Marshal Division of the Michigan State Police.

Construction on the new nursing home is to start in the spring. Mrs. Schalm has operated a rest home at the corner of M-55 and German Street for the past three years. The new home is to be built near this same location.

"This new home for elderly people will look more like a country club or ranch home,"

states Mrs. Schalm. "It will be surrounded with large pine trees and should be a perfect setting."

Mrs. Schalm is a graduate LPN from the Chicago School of Nursing. She has had 10 years experience caring for the mentally incompetent for the Veterans Administration, besides experience in caring for tubercular and cancer patients. She has 15 years experience in caring for elderly patients.

"Such a facility would undoubtedly result in a saving of money to local and state government in the care of elderly patients," said Mrs. Schalm.

She cited the fact that elderly patients released from the hospital by physicians, who are still not well enough to return home but do not require hospital care,

Cautions Working People Receiving SS Benefits

Paul M. Ellifritz, social security district manager in Bay City, today offered a word of caution to working people who receive social security benefits.

In order to prevent overpay-

ments to working beneficiaries, Mr. Ellifritz advised them to report promptly to the social security office any change in their expected earnings.

Most people who receive social security benefits earn \$1,200 or less in a calendar year, Mr. Ellifritz said. They are entitled to receive benefits each month.

Workers who earn over \$1,200 in a calendar year are the ones for whom Mr. Ellifritz expressed concern. Many of them may still receive some benefits even though their earnings exceed the \$1,200 limit.

Those who earn more than \$1,200 are required to file a report of their expected earnings with the Social Security Administration at the beginning of each year. Their social security payments are based on this report.

The amount paid to such people depends upon the extent to which they have actually retired. When a person earns substantially more than shown on his estimate, an overpayment of benefits results. He will then be required to refund all, or a part, of the social security checks he has received for the year.

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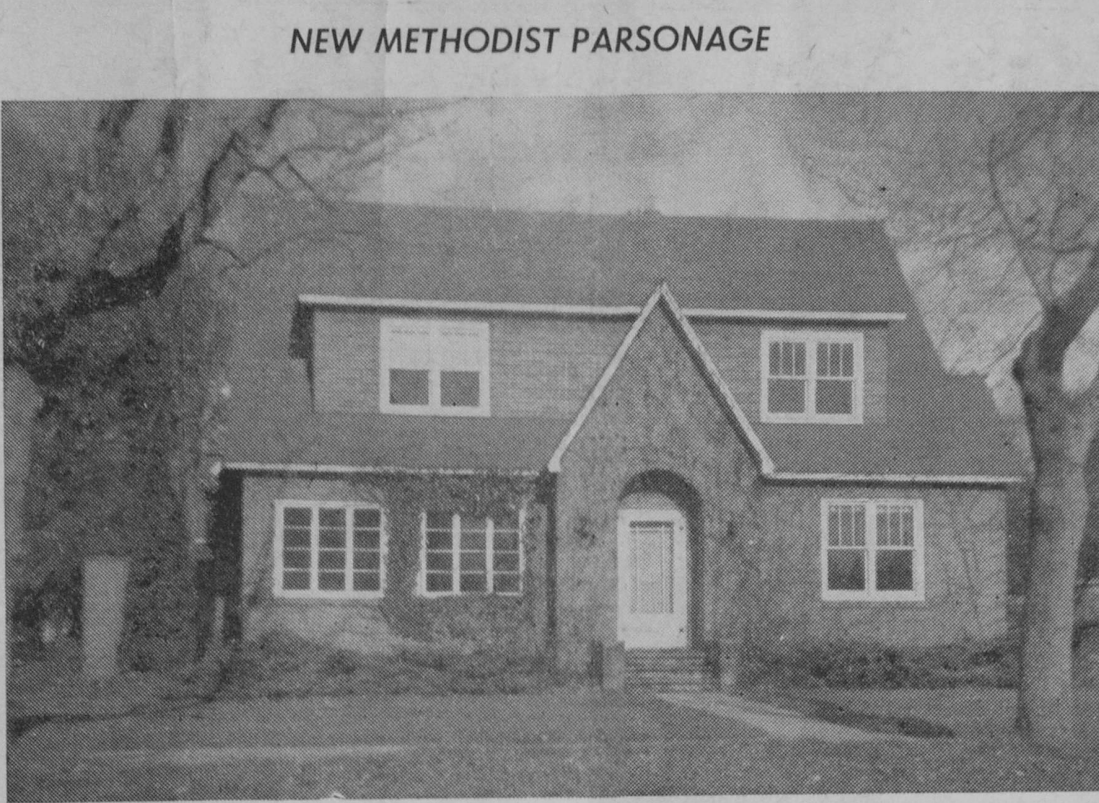
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NEW METHODIST PARSONAGE

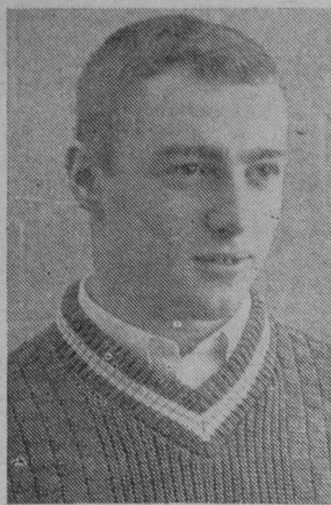

The Tawas Herald

This letter is in regard to a group of men from Oscoda and some servicemen from Wurtsmith Air Force Base. We call ourselves the Iosco Deer Survival Club. This club was organized to feed deer in different areas. We do not feed deer on private land or clubs, but only on state land.

This feeding is to prove to the conservation department and hunters that feeding deer through the winter months pays off. Last winter, we covered 50 miles a day and fed twice a week. Seventy-eight feeding stations were set up and eight to 12 bales of alfalfa and one to two bushels of corn were placed at each station. Corn was distributed in small piles along runways that were being used. Browse was also cut to provide a more balanced diet for the deer.

After a few weeks of feeding, we counted from 15 to 65 deer at each station. The amount of feed distributed in three months was 378 bales of alfalfa and 150 bushels of corn and our deer came through the winter in good shape and without any loss.

About 75 men made a survey of each section after the snow left the ground and we did not find a starved deer. What does this prove? Only one thing. Stop killing off our doe before it is too late. Yes, we all know that it takes money and time to feed deer. I know any good sportsman will contribute a dollar to help feed our deer herd. We have the time and the help.

We have 250 bushels of corn ready to start feeding when the deer have it tough going. Our corn is government surplus, but we need alfalfa and need the money to buy it. We are asking any sportsman wishing to donate to send his contribution to the Iosco Deer Survival Club, Oscoda. 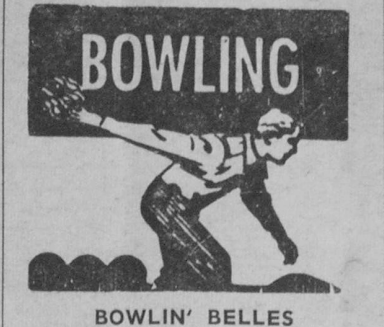
