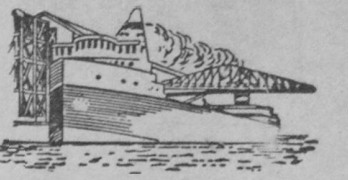

Tawas Meet Drew 125 Speed Skaters

About 125 speed skaters competed here Saturday in the Tawas Chamber of Commerce's third annual skating meet. Feature of the event was the state association's annual high point banquet held that evening at the Holland Hotel.

Adverse weather conditions, which plagued the two previous meets, again caused considerable difficulty for the local committee and several events had to be canceled in the program.

Strong winds out of the northeast broke up Tawas Bay ice Thursday and Friday, forcing Edward Seifert Jr. and his committee to arrange for a new rink inside the bight of the Tawas Waterways Commission Dock.

The area proved suitable, but sand blowing from shore and large cracks in the ice proved treacherous with numerous spills on the turns.

Cold weather, high winds and snow all added to the discomfort of participants as a fairly large crowd of spectators. Official scorers were about the only ones present who watched the meet in comfort. A new 55-foot heated mobile home was furnished for this purpose by Anderson Coach Company. It overlooked the track from a perch on the waterways commission dock.

Top honors during the meet went to Terry McDermott of the Bay City Speed Skating Club, who swept the senior men's field with firsts in the 220-440-880 for 15 points.

Terry Browne of Detroit, on hand to defend his state barrel-jumping championship, staged several exhibition events instead when no challengers were forthcoming.

Canceled out because of poor ice conditions was a five-mile cross country event, but a two-mile race was substituted with Detroit's Bill Freund taking first and McDermott, second. No mile races

were skated, curtailing the planned 49 regular events. Senior men's class B honors went to Dick Blasy of Midland with nine points and senior women proved a sweep for Alpena's Kay Gapezynski, who scored 15 points without much in the way of opposition except the strong wind.

Other winners who swept events included Kathy Sullivan of Cheboygan in intermediate girls; Mark Hickner of Bay City, junior boys; Judy Markel of Wolverine Skating Club, midget girls; Cynthia Wayne of Wolverine, toddler girls, and Paul Holiday of Wolverine, toddler boys.

First place winners in other divisions were Jimmy DeLoof, Detroit, pony boys; Susan Carroll, Detroit, pony girls; Dale Horstman, Petoskey, midget boys; Linda Hernesko, Detroit, juvenile girls; Eddie Bertrand, Detroit, junior boys; Bill Freeman, Detroit, intermediate boys.

County Boards Discuss Possible Consolidation

County boards of education of Iosco, Alcona, Arenac and Ogemaw met Tuesday night at the Iosco County Building to discuss implications of Public Act 190, which provides for formation of intermediate school districts.

Other guests of Iosco School Superintendent William F. Tracy and the county board of education were school superintendents of the four-county area.

George Schutt, consultant of the Michigan Department of Instruction, conducted a question and answer period concerning the possibility of consolidating county districts into one intermediate district.

Under Act 190, county districts with a school population under 5,000 must join with another county by July 1965 to form an intermediate district. No more than three counties may combine to form one district.

Such a merger would have no effect on the actual operation and organization of existing kindergarten through 12th grade school districts.

"However, with additional geographical area as a tax base, the new intermediate district would be able to supply needed special education in the fields of speech correction, mentally and physically handicapped and other areas of special education," said Tracy.

"If there is a desire to form an intermediate district, it would provide a unit of school which would make for a more comprehensive program in these special educational fields and at a savings to individual districts," he stated.

Under the new act, intermediate districts would receive greater reimbursement from the state in these special educational fields. Iosco County is in a unique position in that it has a large enough school enrollment to form an intermediate district. However, all four school districts in Iosco cross county lines.

National City Plant Receives Top Award for Safety Record

National Gypsum Company's National City plant has been awarded a certificate of achievement in recognition of its sound and effective accident control program. Since March 6, 1961, the plant has operated 650,000 man hours without a lost time accident.

The award, in the form of an inscribed laminated plaque, was presented by Richard E. Sholtz, district safety engineer for the Hartford Accident and Indemnity Company. The firm is carrier of workmen's compensation insurance for National Gypsum.

The certificate of achievement is the highest accolade conferred in the accident control awards program administered by Hartford's engineering department.

Official presentation was made Saturday night at the annual dinner meeting of plant supervisory personnel held at the Holland Hotel.

Accepting the award on behalf of all employees of the National City plant, John B. Pitts, plant manager, who left Sunday for a new assignment at Phoenix, Arizona, said:

"We appreciate the close cooperation received throughout the year from hourly employees who worked so hard to achieve this fine goal."

In addition to its "no lost time" accident record, National City worked the entire year of 1962 with no accidents serious enough to even require a doctor's attention. This achievement was significant as it was the first time that National City had led all 44 of the competing plants.

New School Approved by St. Inspectors

The recent Christmas vacation saw installation of floor tile in the corridor of the original portion of Tawas City Elementary Unit, according to a report heard by Tawas Area Board of Education Monday night.

Supt. Reynold Miek said that work started on the project December 21 and was completed seven days later. He said that the installation greatly improved the building's appearance.

The new building was recently inspected and approved by the state fire marshal and state electrical board.

In other business, the board of education received an answer to a letter concerning electrical wiring at the athletic field. Installed in 1957, wiring on several of the poles has deteriorated. The supplier, Standard Electric Company, said that wiring was covered by a standard warranty of one year.

Register of Deeds Reports on 1962

Real estate mortgages filed in Iosco County during 1962 totaled \$6,454,533.44, according to a year-end report from Register of Deeds Albert H. Buch.

Largest single month was September when \$1,727,817.50 worth of real estate mortgages were filed.

In addition, the past 12 months saw chattel mortgages totaling \$6,319,689.27, while federal, state and mechanics liens totaled \$37,352.06 during the same period.

Total number of chattel mortgages filed in 1962 was 2,166, or 662 more than the total filed during the previous year.

The register of deeds office sold \$5,038.90 worth of federal revenue stamps during 1962. These stamps are attached to all deeds where there is a consideration of \$100.01 or more at the rate of \$1.10 per \$1,000 or 55 cents for the first \$500 or fraction thereof.

There were 57 sheriff's deeds recorded with total sales amounting to \$388,516.45. Fifty-four of these deeds were recorded October 23 in a \$367,183 sale.

Judge Miller disposed of 59 criminal causes, 73 law causes and 81 in chancery.

Circuit court hearings during the past year required a total of 127 days. There were three jury trials.

Under the first revision of Michigan's judiciary act since 1915, methods have been changed this year in reporting judicial business to the court administrator of the State of Michigan.

Law-civil and chancery causes are now lumped under one heading of civil. Clerks are required to separate auto negligence and divorce causes in reports to the state.

Iosco Circuit Court Had Busy Year

George A. Prescott, clerk of Iosco County Circuit Court, reports that 234 causes were heard last year by Judge Allan C. Miller. This represents 71.5 percent of the load in the three-county circuit.

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Seek Citizens' Aid in City Master Plan

Tawas City Planning Commission will distribute questionnaires to 25 percent of the households in the city in the immediate future. These questionnaires were developed through joint efforts of the planning commission and Villan-Leman and Associates, Inc., professional city planning consultants to Tawas City.

The questionnaires are designed to provide supplemental information which, together with detailed technical studies prepared by the planning consultants, will help in developing a comprehensive master plan for Tawas City.

The planning consultants request that each household receiving a questionnaire answer all questions in full. In this way, the thinking of local citizens can be recognized and taken into consideration during the course of preparing the master plan.

"It should be emphasized that no one need sign the questionnaires," states Hugo J. Keiser, chairman of the planning commission. "Information obtained will not be disclosed on an individual basis."

Distribution of the questionnaires represents the initial step on the part of the planning commission and its consultants in a two-year program which will culminate with the preparation of a complete master plan for future development of Tawas City.

The result of this master plan will be a better and more enjoyable community, both for present residents and those who come to live here in the future.

"It is hoped that the citizens of Tawas City will cooperate with the planning commission in this important program and thus have a hand in shaping the future of Tawas City," states Keiser.

Iosco County Finishes 1962 in 'Black'

According to year-end reports to be submitted today (Wednesday) to the board of supervisors, Iosco County finished out fiscal 1962 with a balance of \$24,717.56 in the treasury.

Starting with a deficit of \$2,346.94 at the end of 1961, during the past year Iosco had receipts of \$317,809.21 and disbursements of \$290,744.71.

Disbursements during 1962 were \$6,562.06 more than the budget set by the board of supervisors in October 1961. During its session last October, the board established a budget of \$308,677.16 for fiscal 1963.

Reports from all county offices are to be heard during the January session.

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Auto Sinks in Bay; Two Men Escape

Two Tawas men managed to reach shore safely after their auto broke through the ice of Tawas Bay Friday night. The vehicle disappeared in about 16 feet of water.

The two, Carl B. Babcock Jr., driver, and Roney Roach, set out on a junket across the ice in Babcock's 1962 Volkswagen. About a quarter mile from shore, between Tawas Point and East Tawas, they saw open water ahead.

High winds had been breaking up the ice and the two men abandoned the auto when the ice floe they were on began cracking up. They hopped ice cakes back toward shore and had to swim the last 30 feet before reaching safety.

Both state police and coast guardsmen were alerted by shore residents, who saw the auto's lights on the bay.

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Local Men Purchase Jefferson Trucking Co.

Purchase of Jefferson Trucking Company, contract carrier for National Gypsum Company since 1932, is announced this week by Ralph T. White and Jerry Cotter, new owners. Sale of the firm was effective January 3.

Under the new partnership, White will serve as president of the firm and Cotter as secretary-treasurer and executive vice president.

Ezra Dettling, former owner and president, is being retained as chairman of the board.

Complete repair facilities are operated at National City, the terminal there being managed by Dale Blust of Hale. Average employment locally is about 30 men, including drivers and maintenance personnel. Twenty-five persons are employed at Lorain.

In January 1960, Jefferson added another fleet of trucks to serve National Gypsum's new Lorain plant.

The firm operates 45 trucks in its fleet, 24 out of National City and 21 at Lorain.

From National City, Jefferson Trucking has operating rights to haul finished products to all points in the Lower Peninsula and also to Ohio, Illinois and Indiana. Its Lorain operation includes Ohio, Michigan, Illinois, Indiana, West Virginia, New York and certain portions of Pennsylvania.

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White entered the employ of Jefferson Trucking in the spring of 1950 as general manager. He came here in December 1956 when the terminal and office were moved. Mr. and Mrs. White and daughter, Barbara, a junior at Tawas Area High School, make their home at 611 East Bay Street, East Tawas. Cotter started with the firm in June 1958 as accountant in the Tawas City office after his graduation from law school. He was appointed secretary-treasurer in 1959. A practicing attorney, Cotter served as city attorney for Tawas City until resigning recently to devote full time to the business. He and his wife are parents of two children, Joseph and Anne, and make their home at 710 West Lincoln, East Tawas.

Although it has been a trying season for Coach Bill McIntosh, the Tawas mentor had good reason to smile after his young charges evened their won and loss record at three and three.

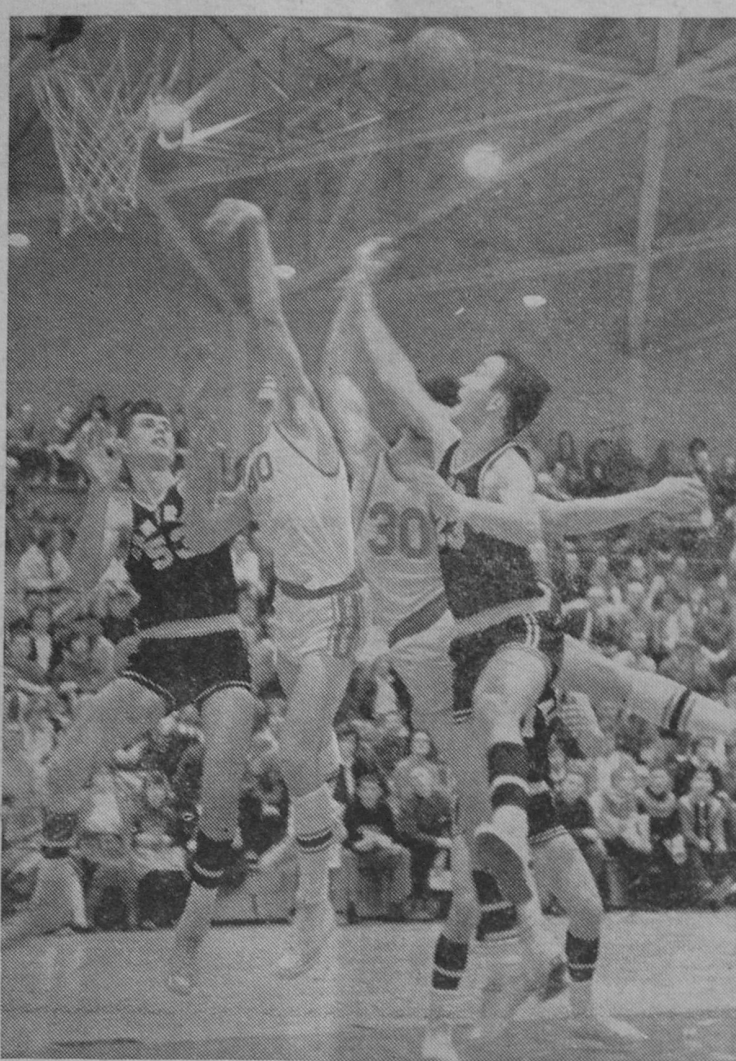

Also turning in a very capable performance at center was Randy DeWyse, husky all-state footballer, whose rebounding and 11 points added greatly to the Tawas attack.

But the big difference in Tawas' offense was Senior Guard Jim Mick, who led both teams with 16 points. Mick seemed to have regained the shooting eye which made him the team's second highest scorer last season.

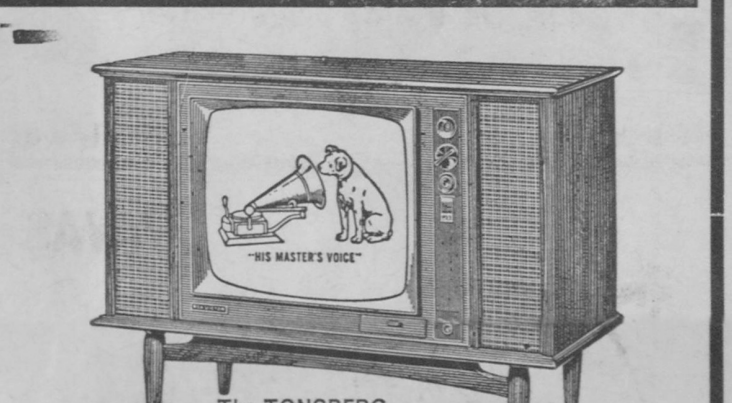

Iosco Co. Business Population Up 50% Since World War II

Business population of manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers in Iosco County has increased 53 percent during the post World War II period, announces W. B. Garrison, district manager of the Detroit office of Dun and Bradstreet, Incorporated.

He states that figures obtained by a physical count of the January 1963 edition of the Dun and Bradstreet Reference Book included 342 businesses listed in Iosco County as compared with 224 in 1947.

According to the listing, Oscoda has seen the largest increase with 116 businesses listed in 1963 as compared to 41 in 1947.

East Tawas has increased from 73 in 1947 to 84 in 1963; Tawas City, 59 in 1947 to 71 in 1963; Hale, 20 in 1947 to 42 in 1963.

Whittemore's listing dropped from 23 in 1947 to 17 in 1963, while Long Lake remained the same with five and National City increased from three in 1947 to seven in 1963.

Dun and Bradstreet lists those manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers who seek or grant commercial credit but it does not include some of the service and professional businesses. These include beauty and barber shops, security dealers and real estate brokers.

The board is considering possible methods of increasing salaries of starting teachers. Salary for starting teachers here is \$4,100 and Superintendent Mick reported that a recent survey of 45 Michigan schools of comparable size indicated that the average wage paid to new teachers was \$4,400.

Higher SS Rates Go Into Effect This Month

Workers and their employers will pay higher social security taxes beginning January 1. By law, the tax rate on wages increases on that date from the present 3 percent each on workers and employers to 3 1/2 percent each. The self-employment tax rate goes from the present 4.7 percent to 5.4 percent for 1963 earnings.

Social security taxes are collected on only the first \$4,800 of wages or self-employment income. A worker who has wages of \$4,800 and also has income from a business pays only on his wages.

Self-employed people pay their social security taxes once a year when they make their federal income tax returns. When making returns on 1962 income, self-employed businessmen will pay the 1962 tax rate of 4.7 percent. The new rate applies only to 1963 income, which, in most cases, will not be reported until 1964.

The new rates will, under present law, be in effect through 1965. Another increase is scheduled in 1966. The top rate scheduled to go into effect in 1968 is 4 1/2 percent each for workers and their employers and 6.9 percent for the self-employed.

According to Paul M. Ellifritz, district manager for social security, these increases are to keep the system self-supporting and soundly financed. Mr. Ellifritz said that based on actuarial estimates, these rates will provide ample funds for all payments set by present law.

Traffic Accident Toll Higher in 1962 Reports State Police

Although Michigan's provisional 1962 traffic death toll of 1,559 was four less than 1,563 in 1961, delayed reports will raise the count from one to two percent and, in addition, all-time record highs in injuries and accidents were set during the year, the state police reported.

Michigan had 94,196 injured in 201,443 accidents through the first 11 months of the year, the latest information available, but those totals exceeded the previous high marks of 91,026 injured and 209,724 accidents established for the full year of 1961.

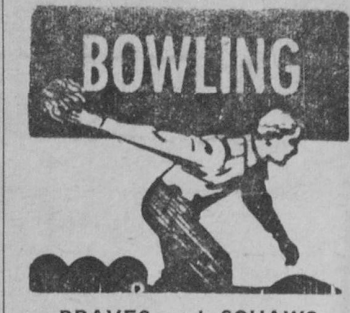
December's provisional death toll of 92 was 48, or 34 percent, fewer than 140 in the same month a year ago. This was the lowest peacetime December since record-keeping began in 1933 and the only lower mark for the month was 79 in wartime 1942 when there was gas rationing and fewer and fewer persons motoring. The previous peacetime low was 118 in 1934. December's average over the past 29 years was 153.

More complete figures for November showed 132 killed and 9,194 injured in 19,295 accidents. This was a decrease of 16, or 11 percent, in deaths, but increases of 1,226, or 15 percent, in injuries, and 2,261, or 13 percent, in accidents, compared with the same month in 1961.

Michigan's accumulated record for the first 11 months showed 1,467 deaths, an increase of 44, or three percent, and the 94,196 injured and 201,443 accidents were respective increases of 15 and 16 percent over the corresponding 1961 period.

Estimated mileage for the first 10 months, the latest information available, totaled 27.5 billion, an increase of four percent compared with the same period in 1961, while the death rate of 4.8 per 100 million vehicle miles was unchanged.
