1962 Reviewed from Herald Files

January 3—Formal acceptance of the newly-constructed Isoco County Airport was made Saturday. City Fuel and Mason Supply Company building at East Tawas destroyed by fire Friday morning. John Swartz retires after 48 years of service with the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company.

January 10—Tawas City has retained Vilcan-Leman and Associates of Southfield to prepare a long range master plan for the community. Plans now being prepared for the East Tawas Centennial.

January 17—Superior Broadcasting Company has taken over Station WIOS from R. S. Underhill. Hale Boy Scouts awarded Timberland District Klondike Derby award.

January 24—A 12-man industrial committee was established by Isoco County Board of Supervisors. Steps taken by the city to establish special assessment districts for constructing sanitary sewers.

January 31—Some 51 Lower Michigan foresters attended a three-day meeting at the Barnes Hotel. Bob Reynolds named to officiate at Silver Valley queen coronation.

February 7—Miss Carol Alderton of Hale chosen Silver Valley queen. For the third year, Waldo J. Curry, Tawas Township farmer, has topped the nine-county area in crop yield. Award was made by Michigan State University.

February 14—Harold T. Ross, former Tawas City boy, has been appointed manager of ball bearing, screw and spline operation at Saginaw Steering Gear of GMC. Beards are being trained for the East Tawas Centennial. Adam J. Birkenbach has been appointed associate electrical engineer for the City of Los Angeles.

February 21—James Sheehan, Tawas City service station operator, rewarded by treasury department for his part in capturing counterfeit. Bruce Goupil, former Tawas City resident, has purchased the Sportsmen's Bar at Whittemore.

February 28—Some 26 members of the Tawas Flotilla, United States Coast Guard Auxiliary, were in attendance at a dinner meeting at the Tawas Bay Yacht Club Friday evening. Major snow storms with high winds have blocked the state's highways.

March 7—Dennis Cross, Tawas Area High junior, was champion in the state public speaking contest held Friday at Lansing. Deer Survival Club seeks aid in feeding program during present starvation crisis. Tawas City OKs salary hike for city employees.

March 14—Brick arrives for Tawas City elementary unit of Tawas Area Schools. Cooking school sponsored by The Tawas Herald opens today.

March 21—New Oscoda Area High School building dedication will be held Sunday. Leon Miller, 15-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Miller of Hale, killed in tractor accident.

March 28—Preliminary work started Monday on construction of Townline Road. Horace Dillon elected president of Whittemore Chamber of Commerce.

April 4—Mayor George Tuttle re-elected mayor of Tawas City; Clarence McKenzie elected mayor of East Tawas. Tawas City Methodist Church dedicates new organ. Tawas City's assessed valuation increased to \$2,232,500.

April 11—The Alpena-Detroit Flying Service plans to operate a scheduled airline service from the Isoco airport. Glenn Long

named chairman of board of supervisors.

April 18—Plans are being made to construct a new city hall at East Tawas. Construction underway on new Hale Wood Products plant which replaces plant destroyed by fire April 1.

April 25—New Zion Lutheran school building will be dedicated Sunday. Isoco Supervisors approve county budget of \$316,057.

May 2—The legislature has given an easement across state-owned submerged land in Saginaw Bay to insure continued operation of the new National Gypsum Company dock. A. J. Bopp, co-owner of Bopp-Busch Manufacturing Company plant in this city, died Wednesday at Detroit.

May 9—Orval J. Fuerst, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Fuerst of Whittemore, killed in auto accident near Long Lake. Lyall Smith, Detroit Free Press sports editor, guest speaker at chamber of commerce annual meet.

May 16—State making five-month survey for scheduled US-23 construction; crew now working in Tawas City. Mrs. Jennie Valley of Whittemore honored for 30 years service as teacher in the public schools.

May 23—Dr. George L. Morse of Lake Odessa and Wayne N. Black of Romeo were guests of East Tawas and Tawas City as exchange mayors during Michigan Week. Honor students of class of 1962, Tawas Area Schools, were honored Saturday night by the East Tawas Lions Club.

May 30—Kenneth Myles of this city is one of 57 students registered for Hope College Summer School in Vienna, Austria. Thursday, the Wurtsmith Air Force Base payroll of \$410,000 was paid with two dollar bills.

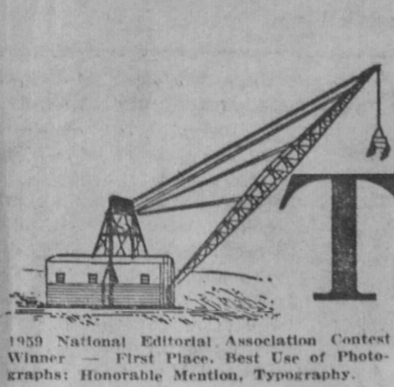

Highway Men—

Say US-23 to Connect With I-75 at Standish

US-23 will be retained as a state highway connecting with I-75 at an interchange in the "curve" area south of Standish, according to information received from state highway officials at a public hearing held December 20 at Pinconning.

I-75 will go through northern Bay and Arenac Counties approximately three miles west of US-23 and M-76.

Contracts for the first part of the freeway extension will be let during the third quarter of 1965. The final section, from the Arenac-Bay line to M-61, will be let in the first quarter of 1966. I-75 from M-61 north to M-33 at Alger has not been programed at the present time.

Local officials of Arenac County openly endorsed the route, once it was explained that a cut-over to US-23 would undoubtedly be built along with the freeway extension.

"Privately they expressed the same approval to state highway department officials present at the hearing," states the Arenac County Independent at Standish. "Recognizing the need for expressways and the inevitability of by-passes local officials have never fought the expressway program. They have asked that the road be closer to communities being bypassed so that freeway passengers could see the communities and would be more willing to leave the freeway for food and service."

Although the cutover is not a part of the building program at present, the interchange has been located and the approximate route of the cutover has been selected.

Highway men report that the federal government has approved construction of the all-important US-23 interchange as part of the I-75 freeway. This is vitally important because it puts the interchange into the program financed 90 percent by federal funds.

The actual cutover to US-23 must come from 50-50 funds and accounts for the construction plans not being included with the I-75 program. It will be approximately five years before the road reaches this point and the availability of 50-50 money at that time will probably control building plans.

Construction of the US-23 cut-

over will permit traffic to come north on the freeway and then transfer easily to US-23 and M-76.

Standish officials recognized the possibility of attracting more people to the area with the expressway but feared they would have difficulty getting them off into Arenac County without an easy exit for US-23.

The interchange south of Standish will serve that purpose and will serve as a funnel for traffic into the entire shoreline region.

US-23 in the Kawkawlin-Standish area is an extremely under-capacity highway with periods of great congestion due to high recreational demands.

"Existing US-23 with its high amount of commercial side friction cannot be expected to carry the future demands of traffic," stated one highway official.

At Standish, traffic is almost equally split between M-76 to the northwest and US-23 to the northeast. Due to these traffic characteristics, plus advantages offered the traveling public by an expressway facility, it is essential that this section of I-75 be located in such a manner so as to provide for the maximum utilization of this new route by US-23 traffic north-east of Standish.

Existing US-23 will remain on the trunkline system as an important arterial serving the Saginaw Bay shoreline.

Within the foreseeable future, the highway department feels that the proposed US-23 expressway alignment from I-75 should extend north to Oscoda and eventually as conditions warrant, it will automatically continue to Alpena.

Postal Rates Go Up Effective January 7

Postage rate increases go into effect January 7, according to Postmaster Martin Kasichke of Tawas City.

New rates are as follows: First class letters, five cents per ounce; drop letters (local), four cents per ounce; post cards, four cents.

Air mail letters will be eight cents per ounce and air mail cards will be six cents.

Oscoda Store Guttled by Fire Christmas Eve

Oscoda - AuSable Township Fire Department was credited with doing a fine job in preventing the spread of flames to other buildings in Oscoda's business district Christmas Eve when a blaze swept through Oscoda Home Furnishings.

Elwood Bronson, owner, said that the exact loss from fire damage would not be known for several days but believed it would be \$100,000 or more.

Bronson and Duane (Bud) Streeter, salesman, closed the store Monday evening at 5:50 o'clock. Fifteen minutes later, smoke was pouring out of the building and the alarm was turned in by Bernard Weber, owner of a gasoline station across the street.

When firemen arrived only minutes later, flames could be heard crackling in the back portion of the cement block building and plate glass windows were cracking in front. High pressure

pumper trucks and hoses were all in readiness before doors were opened.

Using fog hoses, firemen started knocking down flames in the furnace room while others equipped with face masks and air tanks entered from the front door. Flames in the main portion of the building were located between the ceiling and roof. Using ladders, firemen knocked several holes in the ceiling and began using high pressure fog nozzles to combat flames above the ceiling.

The blaze was brought under control about two hours later. Although fire did not reach the main sales area, heat destroyed the entire floor stock. Considerable damage was done to the building but walls are still standing and the roof is intact.

Fire Chief Howard Hofacer believed that the blaze was caused by an oil furnace explosion. The building housing Oscoda

Home Furnishings was expanded and completely remodeled last summer by Bronson.

Gene Spica Heads Tawas Kiwanis

Gene Spica, manager of Ottawa Equipment Company, was installed last Wednesday as president of the Tawas Kiwanis Club. He succeeds Ernest W. Jordan Jr., who served as 1962 president.

About 35 members attended the noon luncheon which was held at Vic and Zel's Restaurant. Installing officer was Dr. John D. LeClair of Tawas City, lieutenant governor of division 13.

John Schriber Retired Bank Director Dies

John H. Schriber, prominent long time East Tawas businessman, died Thursday, December 27, at Tawas Hospital. Mr. Schriber had been ill three months and in the hospital for two weeks.

Active in various business enterprises throughout his life, Mr. Schriber had operated a coal business, established in 1892, until his death. He retired in 1959 after serving as a member of the board of directors of the Peoples State Bank for 32 years. He had served East Tawas as mayor and member of the council for many years. He was a life-long member of St. Joseph Catholic Church.

Born May 25, 1872, at Saginaw, Mr. Schriber married the former Miss Emma Schramm November 25, 1901, at East Tawas. She died August 24, 1943. On July 9, 1949, he married Mrs. Corean M. Levis, who survives him.

Other survivors are two sons, Ashley of East Tawas and Francis of Kalamazoo; two daughters, Mrs. Dorothy Wieden of Detroit and Mrs. Betty June Lindebaum of Bay City; 19 grandchildren, and five great grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Monday morning at St. Joseph Catholic Church with the Rev. Fr. Henry Eickholt officiating. Interment was in St. Joseph Catholic Cemetery.

Director Says Isoco Welfare Load Higher; Finances Still OK

According to a report from Director Edward Burgeson, Isoco Welfare Department was caring for 38 aged persons as of November 1. This was eight more cases than a year ago at that time.

In addition, some 355 families are receiving surplus food from the county through cooperation with the United States Department of Agriculture. These 355 cases represent 1,148 persons.

Burgeson said that the social welfare department would finish out the year with a balance in its account. This is due mainly to an intensified campaign to collect outstanding welfare accounts owed the county.

As of December 15, the county had a balance of \$28,599.35 in social welfare to finish out the final 15 days of 1962.

The board of supervisors allocated \$24,000 as the social welfare department's 1962 budget. In addition, \$3,500 was allocated as the county's 10 percent participation in medical care to the aged.

Under old aged assistance, aid to dependent children and aid to the blind, the county is reimbursed 90 percent from state and federal programs. Individual recipients of these funds repay 10 percent to the county when able.

Under the medical aid to the aged program, it is not necessary for a recipient to repay the 10 percent allocated by a county. However, a person cannot collect both old age assistance and medical aid to the aged.

The county allocated \$18,200 as the 1962 budget for direct relief. As of December 15, this department had a balance of \$5,003.30 to finish out the year. This money is used for supplemental care for old people and assists needy families and widows.

Since becoming welfare director, Burgeson had also attempted to find jobs for potential welfare cases as a means of reducing the county's load. He said that it was more difficult to place people in jobs this winter than a year ago.

"The employment situation here does not look good," said Burgeson. "I don't look for it to be any better before weather breaks in the spring."

MSU Expert Explains New Zoning Laws

Changes in Michigan's zoning laws were reviewed Thursday night by Dr. Lewis Wolfanger, Michigan State University, at a meeting held at Tawas Township Hall. Attending were zoning boards of Tawas and Baldwin Townships.

Glenn Long, chairman of the Isoco County Board of Supervisors, said that similar meetings would be held in the future.

Long and other city and township officials of Isoco County are to attend a special meeting at Lansing February 1. Featured at the meeting will be a mock trial in which a zoning ordinance violation will be carried through justice court, circuit court to the state supreme court in one afternoon.

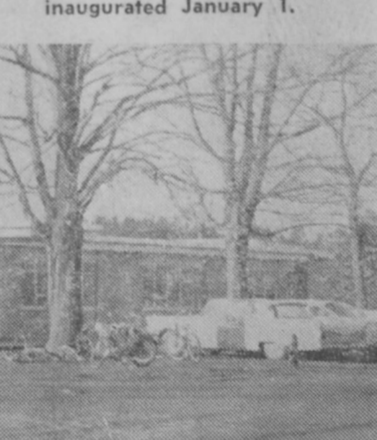

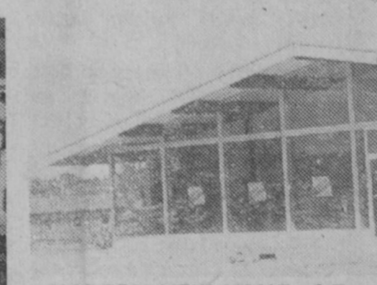

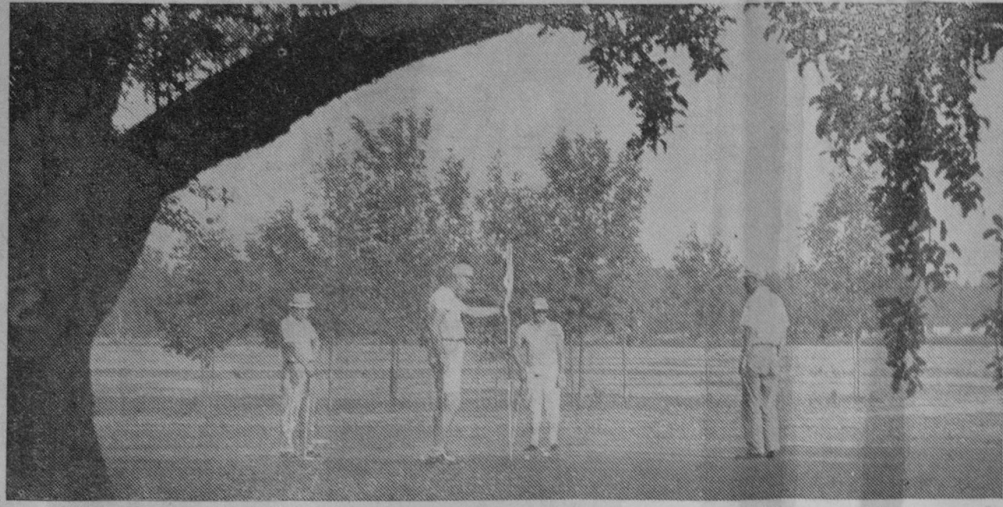

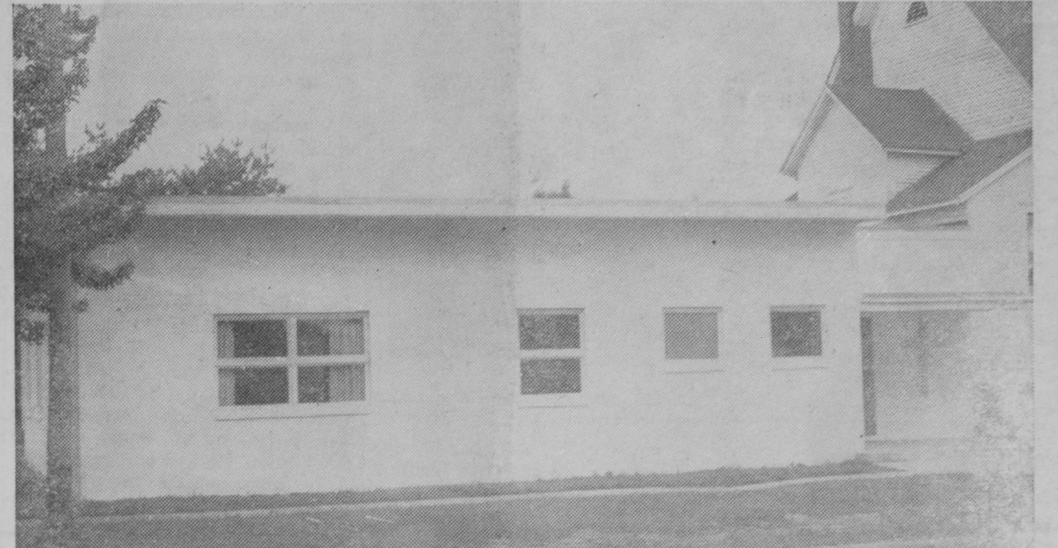
