TB Test Program Started Monday

Some 1,000 school students and school employees received tuberculin skin tests Monday as District Health Department No. 2 started a testing program in Iosco. This is a part of a four-county program which is being held this month.

First students to receive the tests here were at Tawas Area High School, followed by elementary grades at the East Tawas unit and St. Joseph School.

The program was to be completed in the Tawas Tuesday with tests being given to children at

the Tawas City Elementary Unit and Immaculate Heart of Mary School, Emanuel Lutheran and Zion Lutheran Schools.

Dr. E. A. Hasty of West Branch, district health director, said Monday that the tuberculin skin testing program was operating smoothly. Each skin test required about five seconds to administer.

Assisting Dr. Hasty were Mrs. Irene Wight, Iosco County nurse. Other county nurses assisting were Mrs. Mildred Johns, Oscoda County; Mrs. Margaret Tarr, Alcona County; Mrs. Martha McIntire, Ogemaw County.

Dr. Hasty emphasizes the fact that discovery and prompt treatment of active cases among children and school personnel can arrest the disease and also prevent its spread to others.



Funeral Services Held Tuesday for Forrest S. Streeeter

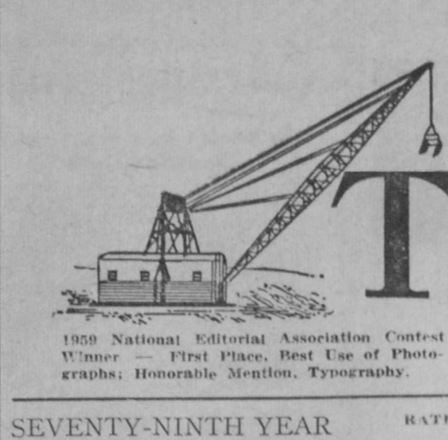

P-TA Panel Hears Education Discussion

A turnout of about 80 persons braved zero temperatures to hear William Tracy, Thomas Pintkowski and Miss Clara Bolen talk on different aspects of higher education at the January meeting of Tawas Area Parent-Teacher Association held Monday night.

Tracy, county school superintendent, talked of the need for higher education and Pintkowski, guidance counselor at the high school, spoke on the types of trained people in demand and the choice of schools and financial considerations.

Miss Bolen, elementary supervisor, stressed the fact that, in preparation, the first five years in a child's life are the most important. She also pointed out that children need direction and that one of the most enjoyable and valuable methods of direction consisted of encouragement in good reading, even at the expense of television.

Realizing that the surface of the topic had hardly been scratched, thought is being given to continuing the program in February, when points of interest will be discussed in more detail.

Her husband, S-Sgt. Donald M. Abers, 32, 445th Fighter Interceptor Squadron, is listed in serious condition at the base hospital, having also received lacerations to his body.

Tentative investigation indicated that Sergeant Abers inflicted fatal wounds to his wife and then apparently attempted suicide.

Wurtsmith's public information office reported Tuesday morning that air police, Michigan State Police and Iosco County Sheriff's Department officers were conducting the investigation.

Air base authorities said the couple lives in the Capehart housing unit at Wurtsmith. A next door neighbor heard a commotion at the Abers residence about 8:45 o'clock and went to investigate.

The neighbor then called air police and an ambulance took the Abers to the base hospital.

The couple's two children, ages seven and four, are being cared for by neighbors.

Because of the seriousness of Abers' wounds, he apparently has not been questioned as yet by authorities.

Mrs. Abers had filed for divorce action January 9 in Iosco County Circuit Court.

110 Scouts Compete in Klondike Derby

Iosco District Paul Bunyan Council Klondike Derby trophy, which has been held this past year by Troop No. 90, sponsored by the 60 Lakes Tourist Club of Hale, was won last week-end by Troop No. 101, sponsored by the Wurtsmith Air Force Base chapel.

The Beaver Patrol, under leadership of Irva Scoobe, won top honors by scoring 702 points out of a possible 860 points.

Two patrols tied for second place with 700 points each. They were the Eagle Patrol of Troop No. 90, Bruce Scofield as patrol leader, and the Hawk Patrol of Troop No. 74, sponsored by the Jesse C. Hodder Post, American Legion, Tawas City, Robert Brugger is patrol leader.

16 Violent Deaths in Iosco During 1962, According to Sheriff

Sixteen violent deaths were recorded in Iosco County during the past year, according to the annual report of Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell. This was the same number as investigated in 1961.

Five persons were drowning victims, there were eight traffic deaths, two farm tractor fatalities and one suicide.

The sheriff reported that the county jail had a total of 507 inmates during 1962, including 140 persons held on felony charges, 312 for misdemeanors, five delinquent and juvenile minors, three mental persons and 47 lodgers. This was an increase of 52 over the previous year.

The department logged 5,125 complaints during the year and issued 427 traffic summonses. There were 285 guns registered, 4,180 drivers licenses issued, 1,811 sets of finger prints taken, 382 civil papers served.

There were 226 auto accidents reported, of which 47 involved personal injury. One non-fatal hunting accident was listed.

The jail served 8,297 meals to prisoners. 110 emergency messages were delivered and 180 permits were issued for carrying concealed weapons. The department disposed of 215 dogs and issued 254 summonses for dog violations. Officers spent a total of 75 days in court and 265 citizens were summoned for jury duty.

The department had a very active year in water enforcement, issuing 180 watercraft warnings and 130 arrests. Iosco County has more than 2,500 registered boat owners, not to mention water craft owned by summer residents and week-end tourists.

Of the 394 boats checked, 95 percent were found in good condition and met all requirements.

The department transported 13 prisoners to Southern Michigan Prison, Jackson, and the Detroit House of Corrections. There were two prisoners returned from out of state, 13 prisoners returned from other counties and the department turned over 24 prisoners to other counties.

Silver Valley Set for 3-Day Carnival

Final plans for the 25th annual Silver Valley Winter Sports Carnival were made Tuesday night at a committee meeting held at the Tawas Chamber of Commerce office.

Crowning a new winter sports queen, the annual fish fry and queen's banquet will feature activities on February 1, 2 and 3.

With a little more than one week remaining before carnival week-end, Chairman James Campbell and his committee are in hope that prevailing weather conditions will remain for the program.

(Editor's note: After two weeks of sub-zero weather, most residents probably do not agree with the winter sports committee about what constitutes "perfect" weather conditions.)

Opening the carnival program will be the annual perch fry Friday night, February 1, at the Holland Hotel.

Revised from past years will be the queen's banquet, slated Saturday night at the Barnes Hotel. Winner of the queen's contest will be announced at that time.

The 1963 winter sports queen will be crowned Sunday afternoon at Silver Valley. On hand to officiate will be Bob Reynolds, WJR sports announcer, who has been crowning queens here since 1953.

Taking part in the festivities will be Carol Alderton of Hale, who reigned as winter sports queen last season.

A more complete schedule of Valley Activities—

Silver Valley will be visited this week-end by 500 boys and girls from the Lansing area. Sleeping facilities will be provided Saturday night for the boys, all explorer scouts, at the high school. Girls will be quartered at the Tawas City Elementary Unit gymnasium. In addition, 125 students from Mackenzie High School, Detroit, will take part in winter sports activities here this week-end.

'New Look'—County OK's Street Lights at Monument

Lumbermen's Monument on the south bank of the AuSable River will have a "new look" when the tourist season opens next summer.

Recognizing that the monument is this area's top tourist attraction, Iosco County Board of Supervisors has authorized Consumers Power Company to install seven new mercury vapor street lights at the intersection of Monument and River Roads.

These lights of 10,000-lumens each will aid in traffic control and reduce hazard to pedestrians who walk across River Road from a parking lot located near the Monument Store.

Annual cost of the seven lights would be approximately \$658. In addition to this action taken last Thursday, the board of supervisors authorized its building and grounds committee to donate two flood lights to the Oscoda Park Commission for illumination of Lumbermen's Monument at night.

These flood lights originally were installed in front of the county building. Removed several years ago, the equipment had been stored in the basement.

Many improvements have been made at the monument during the past year by the United States Forest Service. Included is the relocation of Monument Road, construction of a new parking lot and picnic area.

In other business, the board of supervisors approved a resolution from its building and grounds committee which recommended removal of the old house west of the county jail. The clerk was instructed to advertise for bids on this project.

This property was purchased by the county two years ago for eventual use as a parking lot. The house was constructed by the late Frank Whittemore, later owned by Walter Taylor and more recently by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Short. It had been used for storage purposes by Iosco-Arenac Regional Library until recently.

The board authorized the county clerk to arrange a conference between Attorney T. George Sternberg, Prosecuting Attorney William McCready and the board's conservation committee relative to discussing the proposed Tawas Lake dam. Sternberg represents a group of Tawas Lake residents who oppose construction of the dam.

Authorization was given to advertise for bids on the purchase of a new hot water heater for the county building.

The board agreed to pay one-half the cost of Blue Cross insurance for county employees, as in the past. A request had been received for full payment of the \$8.61 basic rate.

The board concurred with a resolution from Hillsdale County opposing any increase in the cost of fishing licenses for sport fishermen.

Chairman Long and three board members, C. S. Everette, Charles Smith and L. S. Little, were authorized to attend the state convention of county boards of supervisors at Lansing January 22, 23 and 24.

New Committee to Study Iosco's Rest Home Needs

A 12-member committee, composed of residents representing all areas of Iosco County, is to be appointed next month for the purpose of studying needs of a proposed home for the aged.

At last week's two-day January session of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors, Chairman Glenn Long instructed members to bring in a list of candidates for possible committee selection at the February 20 meeting.

This new committee would work with the board's welfare committee in formulating recommendations which would best promote and support a program for the aged in this county.

Need for such a facility was emphasized by Edward Burgess, county welfare director, who last week called attention to the "deplorable housing conditions avail-

able for the aged in Iosco." Burgess asked that the department of social welfare be authorized to look for a possible site for a rest home other than that considered by the county in 1961.

Before the session concluded Thursday afternoon, the board of supervisors authorized its welfare committee to purchase a new site for the proposed home.

Since defeat of its medical care facility proposal in December 1961, the board's welfare committee has continued its study of needed facilities for the care of Iosco's aged population.

The original proposition, soundly defeated by voters, asked that a 45-bed medical care facility be constructed west of M-55 near Tawas Hospital. The \$550,000 cost was to have been shared by the federal government.

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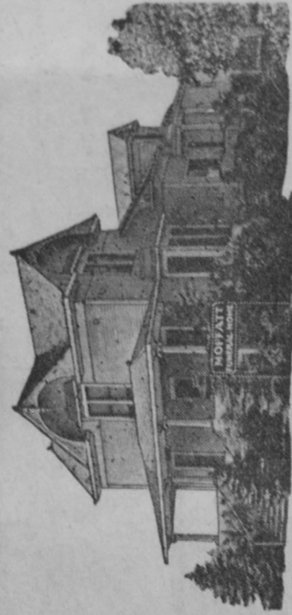

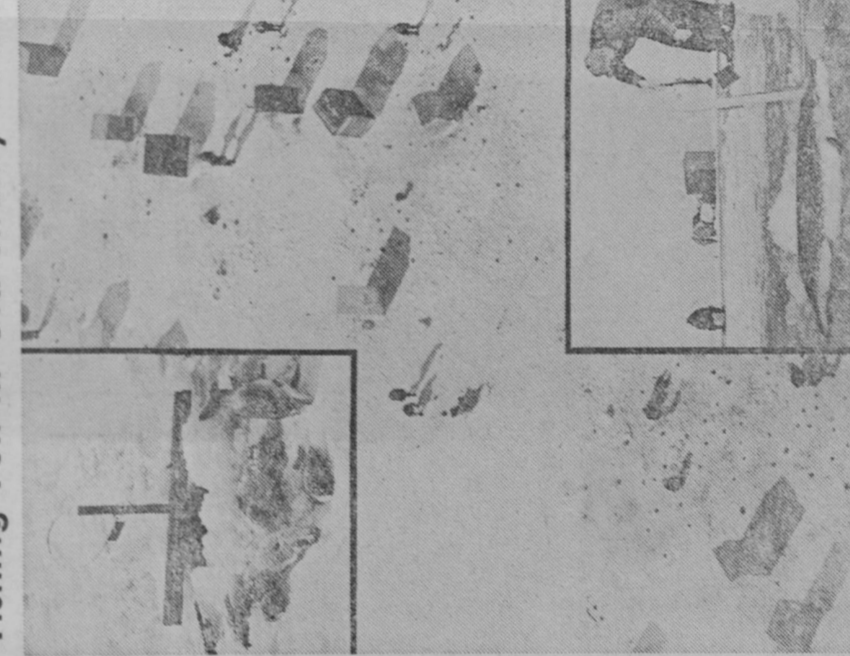

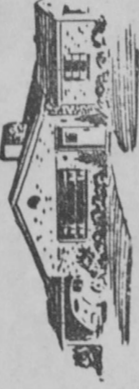

Christian Science Lesson-Sermon

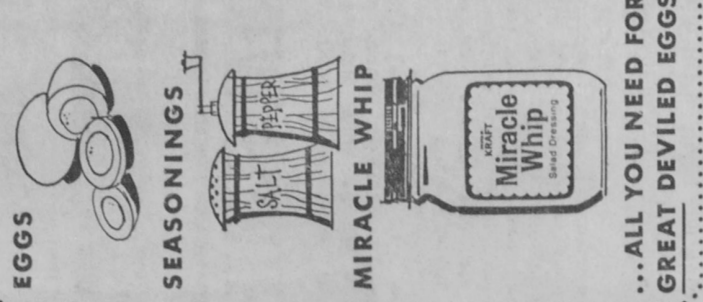

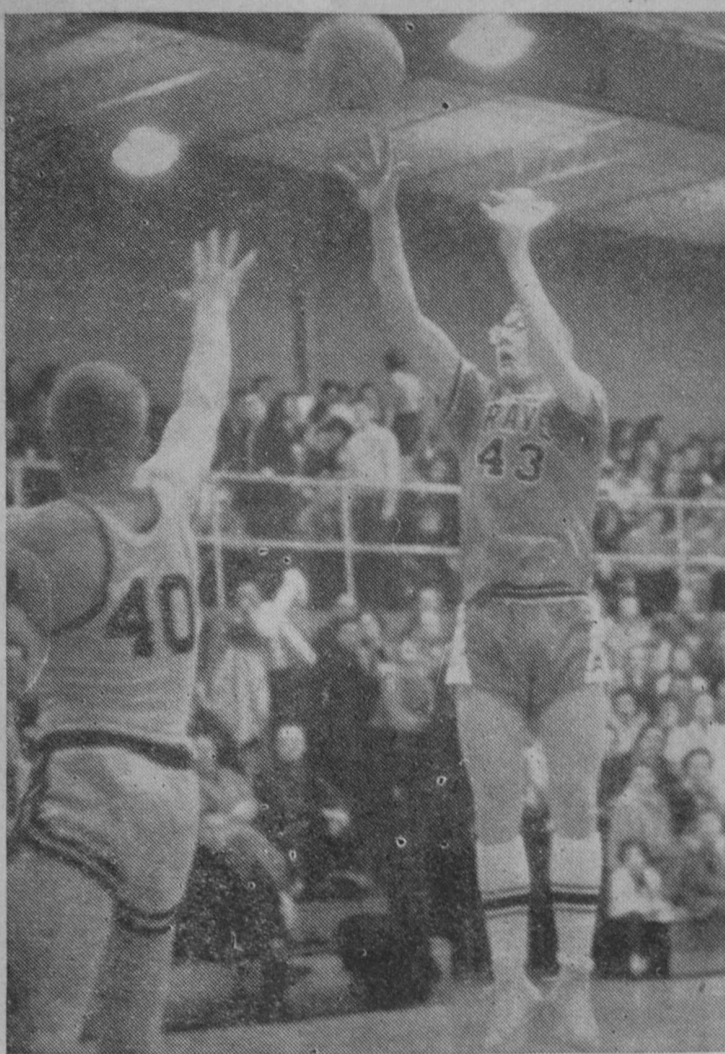

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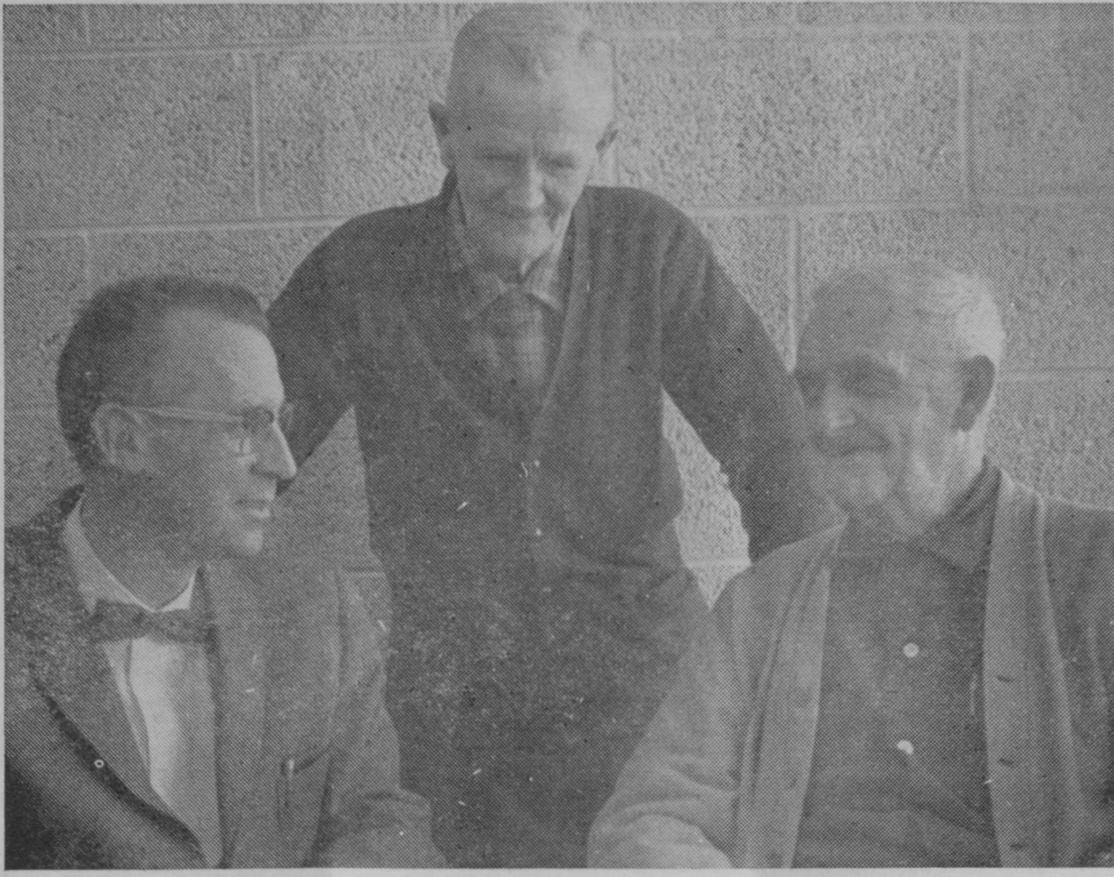

PO Prescribes Requirements for Mailing Pieces

If you are a proud parent about to announce a new birth, a mother about to send out your child's birthday invitations, a friend of a bride-to-be mailing shower invitations or a recipient of a gift about to send a thank-you note, you will want to know about the new size and shape requirements for mailing pieces prescribed by the United States Post Office Department.

According to Postmaster Martin Kasischke, these are the new limitations effective January 1, 1963, for all envelopes, cards and self-mailers: They must measure not less than three inches in width or 4½ inches in length and they must be rectangular in shape. In addition, envelopes more than nine inches in width or 12 inches in length or those which have a ratio of width to length of less than one to 1.414 (one to the square root of two) are not recommended.

"I mention birth announcements, birthday and shower invitations and thank-you notes specifically," the postmaster said, "because quite often these items are of unusually small dimensions or odd shapes. Although these restrictions are minor ones, full cooperation of the public will

During the exercise, Pres. John F. Kennedy praised the division at an inspection at Fort Stewart for its high state of readiness.

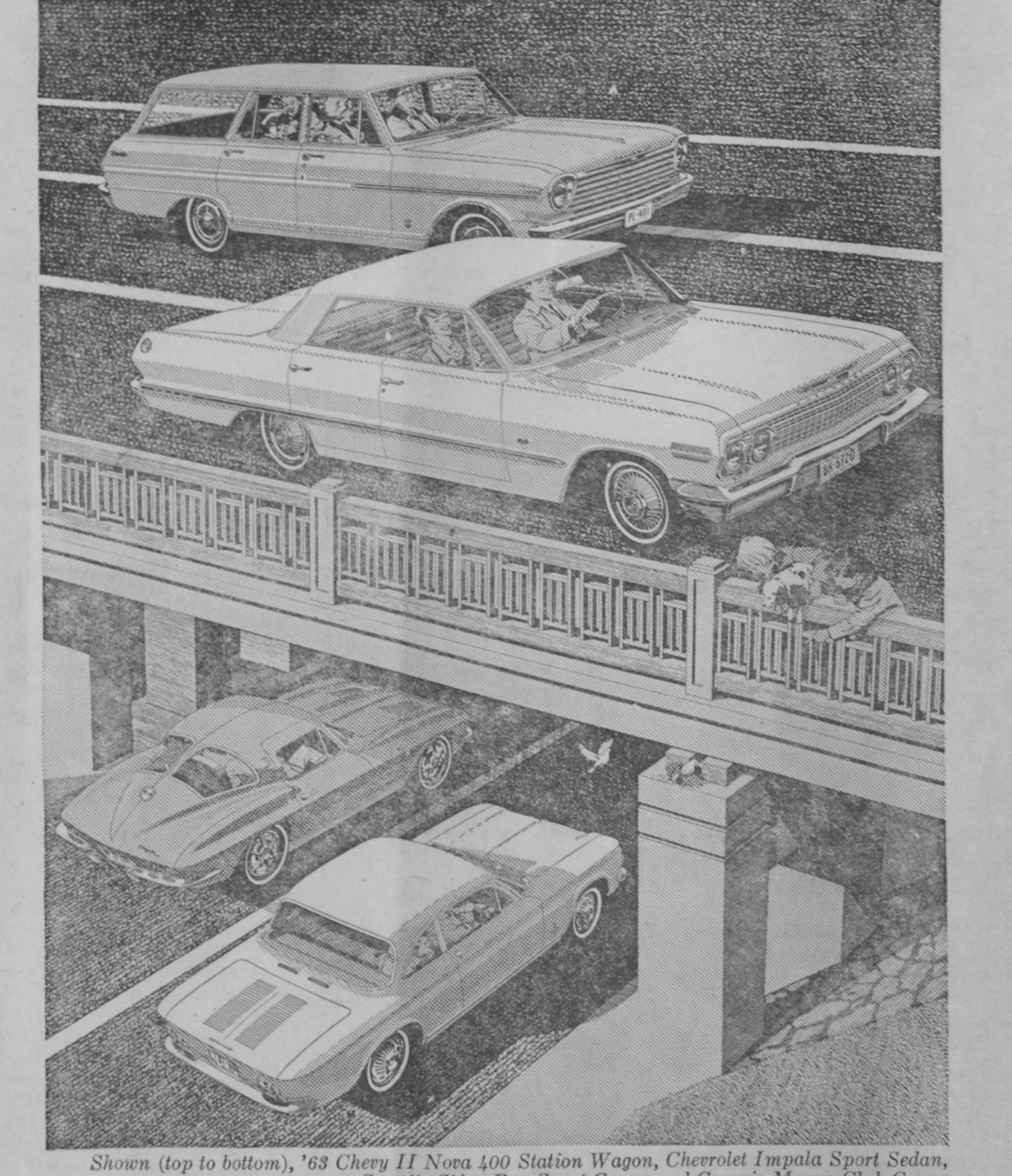
Woods is assigned as a mechanic in Service Battery of the division's Third Artillery at Fort Hood.

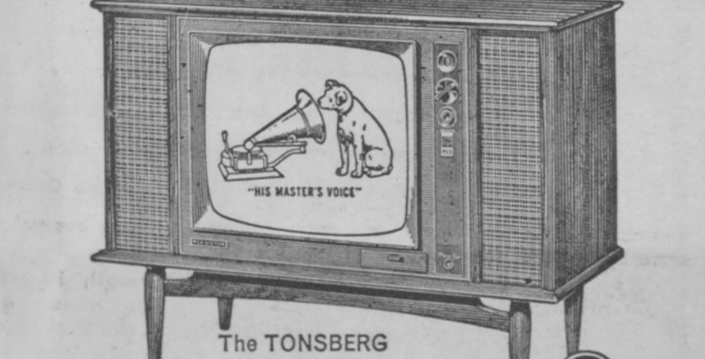
