Take a crisp winter day, blanket it with a thin layer of fresh Take a crisp winter day, blanket it with a thin layer of fresh tracking snow, add several hard-working hounds and you have the ingredients for fast-paced sport---bobcat hunting in northern Michigan. Naturally, it also takes a good measure of go-power on the part of hunters to make the chase a success. From now through February 15, several hundred hunters will be on the swampland trail of 'cats in the northern lower peninsula. For many of them, the thrill of the hunt will be in the chase rather than in the kill. In recent years, a growing number of northern lower peninsula sportsmen have passed up changes to shoot 'cats' lower peninsula sportsmen have passed up chances to shoot 'cats they have treed, knowing the animal's numbers have fallen off in this area. The decline led to the area's season being shortened one month this year. In the upper peninsula, the bobcat's reputation as a great game animal has been dulled by a price tag on his head. 


