

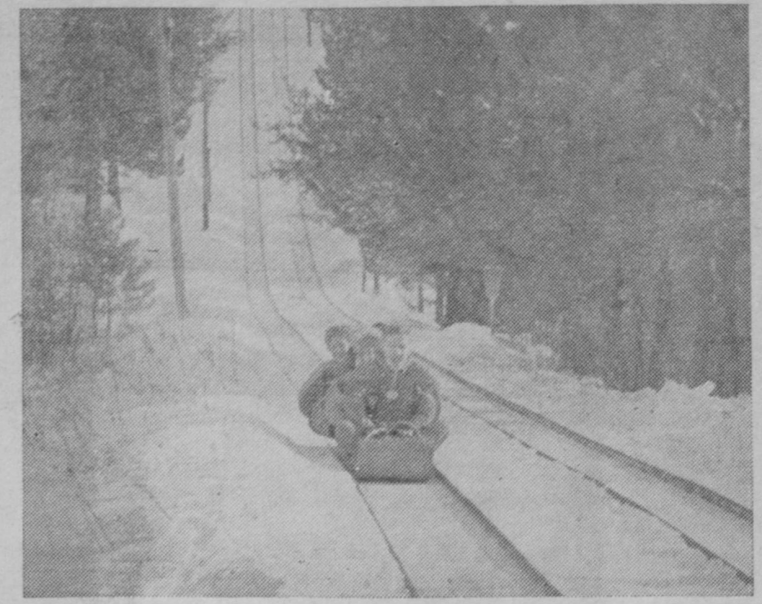

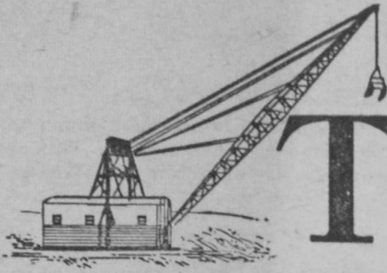

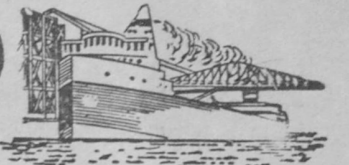

Seek Aid in Project to Beautify Hospital

Letters were sent out this week to all civic organizations of the Tawas and others in Iosco County asking cooperation in the landscaping plan at Tawas Hospital.

This program is a cooperative venture of the East Tawas Garden Club and the Tawas Hospital Board.

A complete landscaping plan for the hospital grounds has been prepared. The plan has a large number of separate plantings of various sizes, so arranged that various civic organizations, or even individuals, who may wish to make a memorial planting may undertake to landscape a particular portion of the grounds.

With all of the work following the master plan, already approved by the board, the completed project will have the same integrity of design that characterizes the hospital building itself, even though separate plantings may represent the combined efforts of a dozen or more organizations and individuals.

Two areas have already been planted in conformity with the master plan by the East Tawas Garden Club.

Blueprints of the complete landscape plan and lists of plant materials required are mounted

Annual Winter Carnival—

All Facilities are 'Go' at Silver Valley Area

Twenty-fifth annual Silver Valley Winter Sports Carnival will be held this week-end and weather conditions appear to be perfect for the three-day event.

One of the oldest winter carnivals in Michigan, Silver Valley's first was in 1938, some two months after the winter sports committee was originally organized.

This season's attendance should go down on record as one of the best in recent years. According to a report at Monday night's committee meeting, more than 2,500 winter sports enthusiasts enjoyed facilities Sunday at Silver Valley.

The winter carnival opens Friday night with the traditional perch fry at the Holland Hotel. Bob Reynolds, WJR - Detroit sports director, will make his annual radio broadcast from the Holland at 5:30 p. m.

The perch fry, scheduled to start at 8 o'clock, is to be preceded by a cocktail hour at 6:30.

Saturday's activities will include fun in the snow at Silver Valley and the coronation banquet that evening, 7:30 o'clock, at the Barnes Hotel.

A new winter sports queen will be crowned Sunday afternoon by Reynolds, who has been officiat-

ing at winter sports events here since 1953.
All facilities will be "go" at the winter sports park this week-end, reports Committee Chairman James Campbell. Included will be ski tows, twin toboggan slides and sleigh rides. Concession stand in the toboggan area, which was opened last week-end, will again be operated by the winter sports committee. A concession stand in the ski area chalet will be operated by the East Tawas American Legion Post.

Robert Brookbank, operator of the ski shop, reported at Monday night's committee meeting that week-end receipts amounted to \$1,381, including \$150 from the main concession in the toboggan area.

Saturday and Sunday's crowd was swelled by several youth organizations from the Lansing and Detroit areas. Largest was a group of 590 boys and girls from Lansing. The boys spent Saturday night at the high school auditorium while girls were quartered at the Tawas City Elementary Unit. Meals were served at the high school cafeteria and a dance was held Saturday night at the auditorium.

Upcoming activities include annual ski races February 16 and 23 and the annual visit of the East Detroit Lutheran Caravan Sunday, February 10.

Perchville Being Renovated by Chamber of Commerce

Perchville, the seasonal village of fish shanties on the ice of Tawas Bay, get a new lease on life this week.

Work started Monday morning at Anderson Coach Company on construction of 25 new aluminum shanties destined for the perch

fishing village. Before the project is completed, Tawas Chamber of Commerce officials hope to have 50 or more new shanties available for winter visitors.

Perchville, originated in 1950, received national publicity some years ago in Life Magazine, daily newspapers and other publications. It was also featured over a network television program.

Until recently, interest in sponsoring the colorful village had waned and most of the remaining shanties were damaged in storage last summer.

Chamber of commerce officials decided that the fishing village had considerable publicity value to the area and should not be allowed to die. President Ralph Western appointed a special committee to investigate costs involved and the go-ahead was given.

Cost of constructing these new shanties is being financed by local business places. A committee headed by James DeWise is contacting local merchants and individuals who are interested in making contributions to this project.

The coach company has been contracted to construct the shanties at a cost of \$42.50 each. Shanties will be numbered and names of sponsors are to be painted on signs affixed to front doors of each structure.

Assisting Chairman DeWise in the fund raising campaign are Carl Thunberg, Ralph Terreault, Donald Watson and Vernon Stern.

Four Girls Vie for Queen Title of Silver Valley

Four high school girls will compete for the title of Silver Valley winter sports queen this week-end.

Candidates are Lynn (Penny) Klenow, Tawas Area High School senior; Stephanie Woinowsk, Oscoda Area High School senior; Joanne Ponak, Whittemore-Prentiss Area senior, and Deanna Holzheuer, Hale Area junior.

The 1963 winter sports queen will be announced Saturday night at the coronation banquet slated at the Barnes Hotel. J. Berkeley Smith is chairman of the queen's committee.

Coronation of the new queen will be held Sunday afternoon, 2 o'clock, on a stage in front of the ski area chalet.

Three of the girls were homecoming queens during the past football season at their respective schools. The only exception is Miss Ponak.

Taking part in the festivities will be Miss Carol Alderton of Hale, who represented Silver Valley last season.

Names of judges are to be announced Saturday night.

TC Fire Department Answered 21 Calls

According to a recent report of the Tawas City Fire Department, 21 blazes in 1962 resulted in a total fire loss of \$95,000 in Tawas City, Tawas and Alabaster Townships.

There were three auto fires, eight dwelling fires, seven grass blazes and three fires in buildings other than residential.

Total loss on buildings was \$43,000, loss of contents was \$51,000. The remaining \$1,000 was listed as "other fire losses."

The department answered five false alarms during the year.

With \$5,875 budgeted to the department, cost of each fire call amounted to approximately \$230. This included all expenses of the department, including equipment and wages.

Enters Guilty Plea in Circuit Court

John L. Smerkol of Dravosburg, Pennsylvania, entered a plea of guilty to a charge of statutory rape when arraigned last week before Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller. He is being held at Iosco County Jail under \$2,500 bond while awaiting pre-sentence report.

Smerkol was arrested January 18 by sheriff's department officers and first charged with issuing a no-account check. Accompanied by a 15-year-old girl from Dravosburg, he had registered at a local motel.

AuGRES Man Killed in 3-Car Crash Saturday

A 47-year-old AuGRES man, Ervin J. Brabo, was killed Saturday night when his pickup truck was involved in a head-on collision with AuGRES west city limits.

Brabo and his eight-year-old son Donald, and another passenger, Russell Bador, 51, were headed west on US-23. An eastbound auto driven by Arthur G. Horrie, 41, also of AuGRES, crossed the centerline and collided with Brabo's vehicle.

The victim was pronounced dead at the scene by Arenac County Coroner Clair Forshee. After smashing into Brabo's truck on the north side of the road, Horrie's auto careened into the left side of a westbound state police car operated by Trooper

Motion to Quash Under Advisement

A motion to quash a manslaughter charge against a 17-year-old Oscoda youth, Raymond Utterback, is being taken under advisement by Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

Utterback was arraigned Monday before Judge Miller and entered a plea of not guilty. He was driver of a car which struck and killed Dale Pelton, 13-year-old Oscoda Youth, last September 14.

Tawas Board Sets Preliminary Talk Monday on New Teacher Contracts

Tawas Area Board of Education will discuss teacher contracts for the coming year at a special meeting slated next Monday night.

No formal action is to be taken at that time, inasmuch as the meeting will not constitute a legal session. Board President William Look, presently on vacation, is to be in attendance at the February 11 meeting when final action will be taken.

Ernest Jordan Jr., high school principal, and Miss Clara Bolen, elementary supervisor, have been directed to prepare an evaluation of teachers for consideration of the board. This evaluation is to be geared on each faculty member's professional ability.

Unanimous action of the board directed the administration to supervise use of the school-owned station wagon. This vehicle is to be used only for school-sponsored activities approved by the administration. The board did not approve its use for school maintenance purposes.

Principal Jordan was authorized to contact local automobile dealers for costs on vehicles to be used in the driver education program, slated to start in March.

Final release slips were approved for the architect and contractors on construction of the new Tawas City Elementary Unit.

The school administration is to investigate cost of installing heat

ducts in the high school's main office. A report is to be made at the February 11 meeting.

Miss Bolen reported that, after consulting with Fred Hickman, building principal at the Tawas City unit, and the cafeteria staff, hot lunches could be made available at 12:30 p. m. to students of Zion Lutheran School. Zion had asked permission to participate in the program.

Contracts for the coming year were offered to Supt. Reynold Mick, Principals Jordan and Miss Bolen. Salaries are to be discussed at a later time.

This action followed informal talk at an executive session of the board.

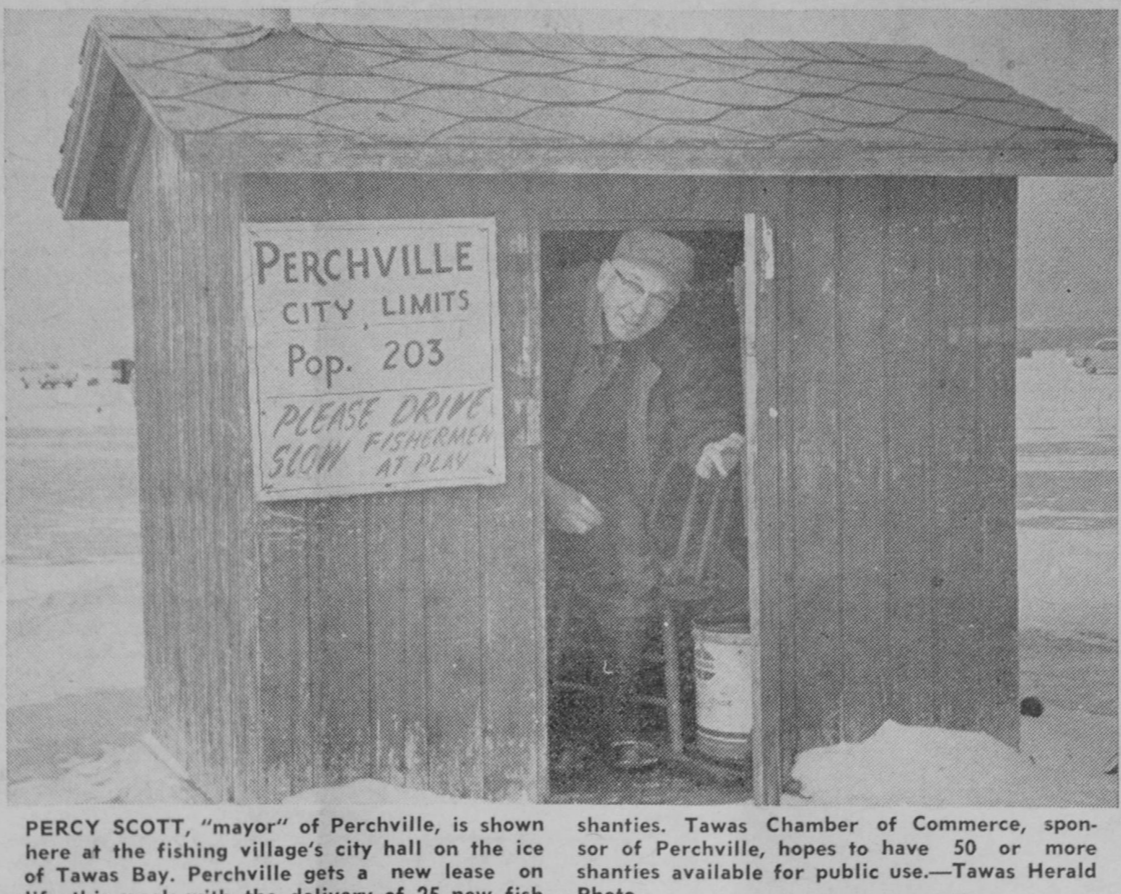

Action this week found the Braves traveling to Alpena Catholic Central last night (Tuesday) and they will move to West Branch Friday night in a return match with the Orioles.

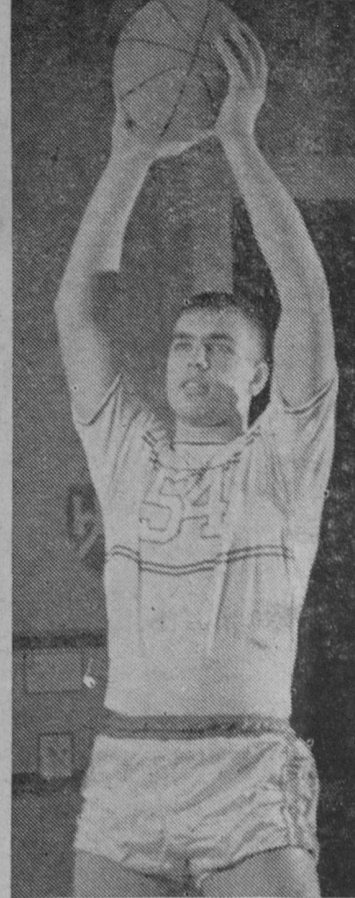

Take a crisp winter day, blanket it with a thin layer of fresh tracking snow, add several hard-working hounds and you have the ingredients for fast-paced sport—bobcat hunting in northern Michigan. Naturally, it also takes a good measure of go-power on the part of hunters to make the chase a success. From now through February 15, several hundred hunters will be on the swampland trail of 'cats in the northern lower peninsula. For many of them, the thrill of the hunt will be in the chase rather than in the kill. In recent years, a growing number of northern lower peninsula sportsmen have passed up chances to shoot 'cats they have treed, knowing the animal's numbers have fallen off in this area. The decline led to the area's season being shortened one month this year. In the upper peninsula, the bobcat's reputation as a great game animal has been dulled by a price tag on his head. He's hunted year 'round both for sport and a \$5 bounty payment above the Straits.—Mich. Dept. of Conservation.

Behind Closed Doors

Is an executive session of local government necessary during a regularly scheduled meeting? The question is being raised by this reporter, who, along with three other persons was asked to retire from the meeting room of Monday night's session of the Tawas Area Board of Education.

Discussion behind closed doors apparently concerned 1963-64 salaries of our two school principals. At least, this was the next item on the agenda.

The two principals being "discussed," Ernest Jordan Jr. and Miss Clara Bolen, were also requested to leave the room, along with County School Supt. William Tracy, who was in attendance. Leonard G. Hoshbach, who is the board's paid secretary, left the room a few minutes later.

It is my understanding that a tape recorder which was being used to transcribe minutes for the benefit of Supt. Reynold Mick, who is hospitalized at present, was also turned off.

In my opinion, had Mr. Mick been in attendance he would have walked out of the room on his own accord. As we recall, this is what happened last year when the board proposed to go into executive session to discuss salaries of principals. As it turned out, such action by Mr. Mick was not necessary as the board changed its mind and made the meeting public.

Since when are salary discussions or other school business that matter, not a concern of the public? A school board is a public-elected body administering the use of tax money. Its actions are a matter of public concern.

I do not doubt an executive session, closed to the public, is perfectly legal. However, I question the propriety of holding such a session during a regularly scheduled meeting.

This reporter urges taxpayers of the district to attend meetings of the board of education. Its actions are of vital concern to the general public.

Gun Legislation

How many hunters noticed the UPI release Friday concerning proposed legislation which would require hunters to be schooled in safety practices before they could go after game with firearms?

This proposition should stir up plenty of controversy in the state legislature, as well as set off some repercussions among hunters around the state.

A Detroit senator and four colleagues are offering the hunter safety training measure. The bill, which if made law would become effective October 1, 1964, would make it unlawful for a person to hunt or carry a firearm in a hunting area "unless he shall first be issued and have on his person a certificate of competency."

The safety course, which would be established by the conservation department, would "consist of at least four hours training, including but not limited to the principles of safety in hunting, the handling of common hunting firearms and in hunter survival in the woods."

Violation of the act would constitute a misdemeanor and the court could also revoke for three years a convicted hunter's gaming privileges.

On the surface, a gun safety course would have considerable merit. At first reading, however, this one smacks of just another attempt to tamper with your constitutional right of bearing firearms. The American people should never lose sight of this right, in spite of well-meaning intentions of legislators.

Far be it from this writer to discourage the teaching of safe hunting practices. To the contrary, state-wide public participation on a voluntary basis would be beneficial, particularly to the younger hunters who are making license application for the first time.

What do the thousands of ex-GI's in the state think of such a scheme? It would also be interesting to learn the thoughts of the thousands of hunters, who, for years, have tramped the fields and forests of Michigan.
