

# Miller is First US Student in Ecuador

Allan Charles Miller, son of Judge and Mrs. Allan C. Miller of East Tawas, is in Quito, Ecuador, this summer under a student exchange program sponsored by the University of Michigan Club of Quito. He resides with Mr. and Mrs. Manuel Mantilla Mata and their five children.

On his arrival, Miller was presented at a special dinner meeting to the Quito club and James B. Opsata, director of information for the United States Embassy.

who addressed the group. He is the first student taking part in this program in Ecuador.

In a letter to Mrs. Carl Thunberg of East Tawas, in answer to her questions about the country, Miller said that they have United States newspapers, no censoring and many US foods—Libby's fruit cocktail at 65 cents, Campbell's soup at 50 cents, Kellogg's corn flakes at 66 cents. The diet, however, is very good with many different fruits and vegetables.

"The food is greatly different—we Americans are missing out on a lot of good eating," said Miller.

There is ample recreation—fiestas almost nightly and he has been introduced to polo and bull fighting. "The golf course is on the side of a mountain and is comparable to anything in the states," says Miller.

"I am living in a valley very high in the Andes and on a clear day it is possible to see eight volcano tops covered with snow. It is really beautiful and the opposite of our own beautiful Tawas," writes Miller.

Because of the summer session of the University of Quito overlaps the fall term of the University of Michigan, Miller is not attending school this summer. He reports that he is obtaining an excellent advanced course in practical Spanish.

The country has a class distinction between the Spanish speaking and the Inca people, he reports, but there is no noticeable unrest. It is a non-communist country.

Many of the people Miller has met have attended schools in the United States. "The people are all short. Anyone over five-feet, 10 inches is considered a giant," he said.

Dead is Harold G. Robinson, whose car crashed into a tree 1.5 miles east of US-23.

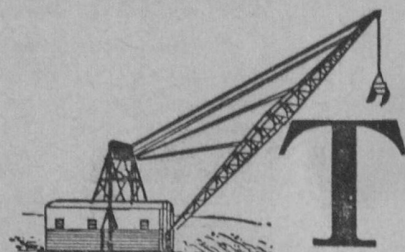
According to an autopsy, Robinson's death was caused by a ruptured liver sustained in the crash.

Police charged St. James with negligent homicide. He pleaded innocent in municipal court and was released on bond.



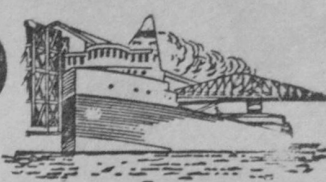

## Planners Seek Meeting With Highway Dept.

Vilcan-Leman and Associates, Incorporated, Tawas City's planning consulting firm, notified city officials this week that an attempt is being made to meet with the state highway department to discuss US-23 construction through this community.

According to information received by Vilcan-Leman, no changes are contemplated by the highway department in plans as outlined recently.

Several "bombshells" were dropped at the June 17 meeting of the city council when two representatives of the highway department outlined "preliminary" plans for the proposed highway

construction. Since then, the city has retained an attorney to attempt negotiations with the highway department.

In a letter to Highway Commissioner John Mackie and Gov. George Romney, the City of Tawas City officially protested the highway department's action. The letter charged that the council and city planning commission had no opportunity to view plans before June 17 and were not consulted or briefed as to any of the changes to be made within the city limits.

Bids are to be let for construction August 14, according to a statement at the June 17 meeting by the highway department representative.

"The city council objects strongly on the attitude of the state highway department in getting traffic through our city with no consideration for any local problem which might arise from their construction work and changes being made on the trunkline," stated the city's letter.

Specific objections were as follows:

1. Forced removal of signs attached to business places extending over the sidewalk which happens to be over highway easement.
2. Reclaiming of highway right of way in front of business places which state does not use and never will use and which may tend to put those places out of business.
3. Elimination of rolled curb on lake side of highway causing a definite traffic hazard in a heavily congested area.

The letter said the city had no objection to removal of signs from the highway right of way, but thought it was ridiculous to force removal of signs hanging over sidewalks on one side of US-23 and not along the opposite side. Tawas City gave an easement to the state in 1940 for US-23 which included the sidewalks on the lake side.

## Called Hazard; State Removes US-23 Parking

Parking will be removed soon on the west side of US-23 in the vicinity of Mill Street in AuSable, the state highway department reported last week.

"A joint investigation by state police and the highway department district traffic engineer has revealed that parked cars on US-23 are creating a hazard by obscuring the vision of drivers entering the highway from the west," said the department release.

State Police Commissioner Joseph A. Childs and State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie have signed an order prohibiting parking on the west side of US-23 for 200 feet north and 300 feet south of Mill Street.

The order will become effective as soon as signs are erected.

## Hearing Next Monday on TC Zoning Change

A hearing will be held next Monday night by the Tawas City Council to hear objections to changing lots in the Second Ward from an industrial district to residential A.

This action follows several months of discussion at council meetings and study by the city planning commission and its consultant.

Property which would be affected by the change includes Lots 14-20, Block 2, of the Map of Tawas City, and Block 5 of the Map of Wheeler's Addition.

This property is located west of the Tawas River and south of First Street. It was once the location of Huron Rustie Furniture Company and Tawas Trailers, Incorporated, is located in a concrete building on the west side of the property.

Discussion concerning this property came before the council on March 4 when an old frame building was remodeled as a warehouse for fish nets.

City officials had been under the impression that the property

was originally zoned residential and that the industrial operation had been allowed under a non-conforming use. Had this been the case, the property would have reverted to residential once the industrial operation was discontinued.

However, according to the city's zoning map, the property was zoned industrial and remodeling the building as a warehouse was permissible.

On April 1, the council received a petition signed by 22 property owners asking that the property in question be rezoned to residential. The city's planning consultant, Vilcan-Leman and Associates, Incorporated, has said that from a planning standpoint, the area in question is logically residential and should be zoned that way.

The planners pointed out, however, that the present industrial operation would have to be allowed as a legal non-conforming use within the residential area.

Monday night's hearing is slated for 8 o'clock at the city hall. The council meeting is scheduled to start at 7:30.

expected to be heard Wednesday. On September 22, Mrs. Gay's automobile rammed into a Grabow Distributing Company tractor and a semi-trailer truck parked on M-65 in Whittemore.

Mrs. Marion Dumas, a passenger in the car, was dead on arrival at Tolfree Memorial Hospital, West Branch.

Bublitz said that a six-inch trunkline connecting to the East Tawas water system was not large enough to supply the summer water demand. Future plans of the East Tawas Department of Public Works call for replacing this with a 10-inch line.

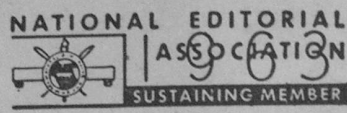

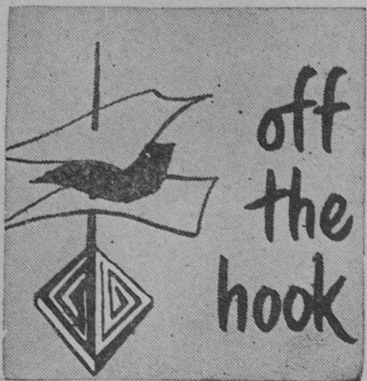


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Joseph Barkman, whose collection of old-time pictures has been featured during three centennials in this community, will have charge of a museum to be located

LETTERS to the EDITOR

This morning, I shaved my face with an American imitation of a Japanese imitation of a Holland-made razor and while thinking about those facts, I became disturbed by the recent news releases which indicate forces in motion with strenuous objection to the inclusion in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of "under God." Please read this letter throughout and give it some consideration, for though I know you are busy, this is so fundamental that I am taking time off from my work and devoting my time to writing this letter, trying to compose it carefully, because it is so important to everyone in these United States.

The deletion of the phrase "under God" recalls very vividly a group of people who came many years ago to lobby in the legislature of the State of Michigan for the purpose of the repealing and obliteration of the teacher's oath of allegiance to the government.

At that time, fortunately, there were a sizeable group of us who were alerted and came before a committee of the legislature and upheld the sense and propriety of the teacher's oath. We pointed out then that even a notary public was required to make such an oath and we could see no repugnancy and no actual objection to such an oath, and that anyone who did was basing his entire contention purely on frivolity and a dogmatism which was shielding a banner of intellectual "cuteness."

Even the atheists, as they so smugly call themselves, have a God, which they undoubtedly spell with a little "g," but nevertheless, they worship their atheism, therefore, that practice of atheism becomes their God, in spite of the fact that they say there is no God; and it little serves our purpose to analyze and try to find a proper name for whatever it is that they worship, but since what they worship is something that is mental in conception, and which impells them to speak out, is really their little god.

History shows very clearly that it is the little inroads made persistently and constantly by the organized minority that eventually create the crumbling collapse of a cultured majority. If we do not now stand on our feet and loudly and emphatically proclaim the value of our traditions and the wisdom of them, then sooner or later these little inroads will continue until we have nothing left to hold or defend. You may say that I am losing faith in American heritage and in American people. On the contrary, it is on that faith and on that heritage that I am crying out and speaking of now. If we permit this little minority to repeal the phrase, "under God," as was permitted the bridling of religious teachings, and I fully appreciate the argument presented by those people who accomplished the supreme court decision, then you are permitting the inroads that will eventually put the hole in the dyke, which even the little boy's finger cannot hold back, and eventually the dyke will go and we will be swept by the onrushing of the Red Sea overflow.

Oh, that I were skillful enough to write this letter of protest in such a way that it would attract an audience that would hear, eyes

that would see, and inspire bodies that would act, so that we would again restore that feeling of national dignity from which we have all thrived and prospered. Even the lowest beggar on the street in seeking his alms does not hesitate to revere the privilege of his right to beg that exists in this country and under this civilization. As a lawyer, I find an understanding of the legal reasoning and philosophy of the supreme court in the recent decision as to religious teachings in the public school, and I am inclined to say that I find great difficulty in not following the dogma of the several honored justices who rendered their several opinions; nevertheless, I would wish that the loquacious objectors to the very doctrine that has been abolished would have substituted something in its place or something better. Since I can find no such substitution, since I can find no replacement, I am convinced that these people are destructors and destroyers, and in their unknowing way are "haters," and haters need nothing but that passion of hate to destroy and demolish.

Now, does that mean we must say that all haters should be isolated? On the contrary, no—let them have their soapboxes, but by the same token, let others speak out by manners of making news so that the news' media will disseminate the opposition in equal if not greater forces, which will answer the persons that I strongly suspect sit back and surreptitiously inspire these little haters. The hidden leaders of this organized minority can and should be informed

that, by Heavens, the wrath of the ordinary citizens shall be felt if these little inroads on our culture are not stopped.

I am one single individual backed by no organization, tutored and trained by no skillful schemer, but I am speaking for a voice, a "crying in the wilderness" for the ordinary citizens who are now being hushed into the background so that the organized minority may shout out, inflict their will on the unorganized majority, and receive the plaudits of the news' media.

Accordingly, it follows that I am seeking your assistance and the assistance of all others, to reach out and speak for the ordinary little man, of which I may be the smallest yet. Even so, I charge that I am one of the proudest of little people because I am an American citizen, under God.

draw a 16 inch triangle and curve the lower edge. Baste the edge slightly. Pin the pattern on doubled fabric and cut. Baste Jumbo Rick Rack on both slanting sides of one triangle.

Cut Baby Rick Rack in four-inch lengths for leaf design on same triangle. Attach balls (cut from ball fringe) as flowers. Sew triangles together and finish seams. Sew twill tape to right side bottom edge of cap. Turn tape inside and slip stitch, leaving ends open.

Run elastic through tape, adjust for fit and sew ends together. Make big pom pom by looping yarn, tying in center, cutting loops and trimming. Stitch pom pom to peak of cap.

SUPERVISORS' PROCEEDINGS

JUNE SESSION June 19, 1963

Upon call to order at 10:30 a. m., Mrs. Hazel McClain addressed the board asking assistance in effort to preserve the old Indian Cemetery located near Mikado, Michigan. She stated that at this time ownership was vested in individuals who had no interest in the cemetery as such, it being a part of 80 acre description. She was advised to try and secure a deed for two acres more or less from the present owners and that Osoda Township would give every assistance they could.

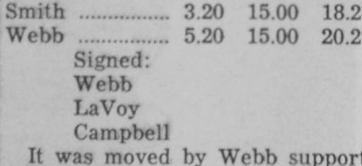

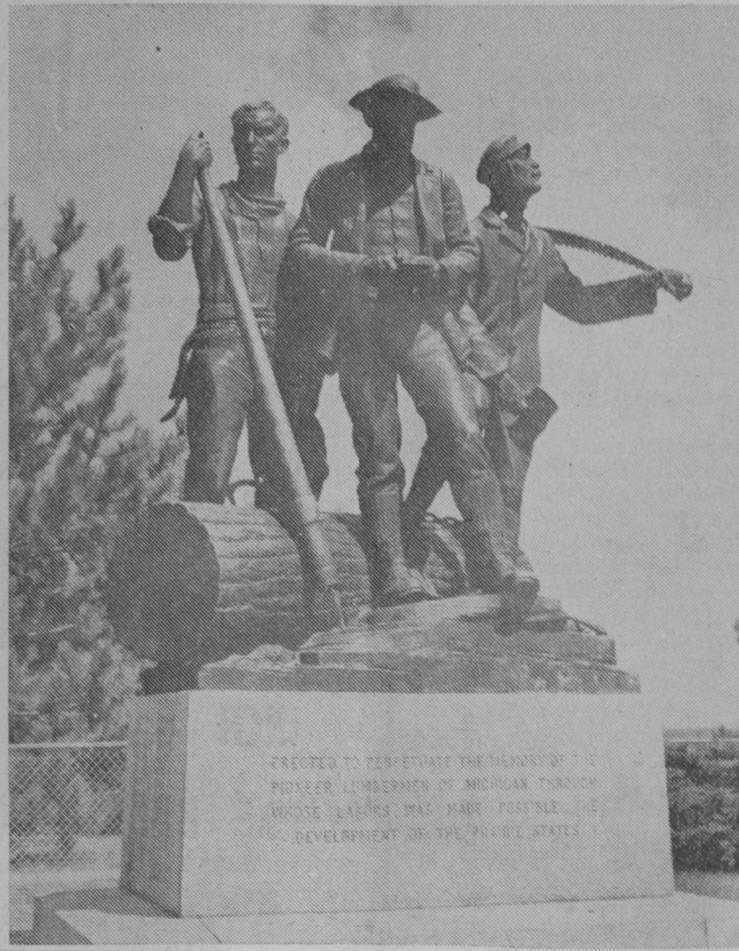

## Visit These Monuments

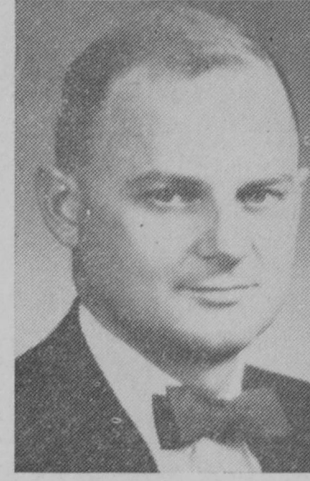

## Camp Personnel Study Closed Chest Heart Resuscitation



Water safety personnel of summer camps in the North Central Michigan area studied the new technique of closed chest cardiac resuscitation (CCR) at a session sponsored by the Michigan Heart Association at the Ogemaw Township Hall, west of West Branch Monday, July 8. Teacher of the new method of saving the lives of victims of drowning, electrocution, heart attack and overdose of drugs was Franklin V. Wade, M. D., Flint surgeon. The program was sponsored by the Michigan Heart Association, a Michigan United Fund Agency.

CCR consists of a proper combination of the usual mouth to mouth resuscitation with one rescuer blowing into the lungs of the victim while the second, by properly applying pressure to the center of the chest, indirectly massages the heart, causing blood to circulate in the body.

Because improperly applied heart massage can break ribs and do internal injury, Dr. Wade emphasized that the right amount of pressure must be properly and carefully applied in the right location. Too little pressure will be ineffective.

Dr. Wade also demonstrated on a rubber and plastic manikin named Resusc-A-Ne, which has a special sponge rubber heart connected to a pressure column device indicating when the proper amount of pressure is being applied. If the pressure is misplaced, the gauge shows nothing. The throat and chin on the manikin must be straightened and cleared so air can be forced into the lungs, the same treatment a human victim must get if he is to be revived.

Dr. Wade warned that speed in resuscitation is all important. A brain deprived of oxygen can be hopelessly damaged in four minutes. Six minutes is usually regarded as the final limit.

## Reminds Owners That Pleasure Craft Can be Overloaded

Everyone has heard of the straw that broke the camel's back—but the marine enforcement division of Iosco County Sheriff's Department and Committee for National Safe Boating Week, reminds boatmen that pleasure craft, too, can be overloaded.

"Common sense demands that boat owners make sure they know their craft's capacity and never exceed it," states Francis Block, marine enforcement officer for the sheriff's department.

"It is very simple—just check the manufacturer's capacity plate for his recommendation. If your craft is one of the few without such a plate, your marine dealer can advise you on your boat's safe weight limit.

"If your boat should capsize or swamp, take this word of advice from boating safety experts: Do not attempt to swim to shore, for it is probably much further away than it looks. Stay with the boat. Most pleasure craft will stay afloat even when capsized or filled with water," stated Block.

Observation of a few simple safety rules is essential to safe fueling of pleasure craft. First and most important of all, put out that cigarette while refueling along with all other flames and shut off all spark-producing machinery. Have a filled fire extinguisher handy. Keep the nozzle or fill can in contact with the tank to prevent a static spark. Avoid spilling fuel and do not try to fill the tank to the brim.

Outboards with removable tanks should be filled on the dock. When fueling craft with closed construction, close all hatches and ports. Then open the hatches and ports for ventilation and run the bilge blower for at least five minutes. Sniff in the lower part of the tank and engine compartments. If you smell gasoline, do not start. Continue to ventilate bilges until all trace of fumes have disappeared.

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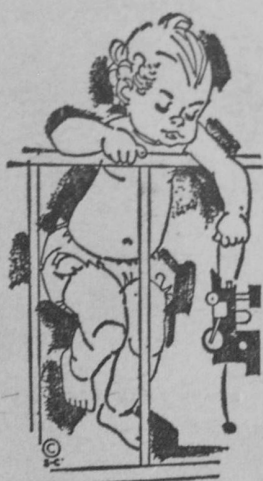

### For A Better Look at The Outdoors

Getting only a teasing glimpse of what Michigan's outdoors is all about? There's a way to overcome this for an inside look at our wide world of natural features and wildlife. It lies through the sensitive, sharp-focusing powers of binoculars or field glasses. How can you make the "right" choice from the many different glasses available? Don't be guided by price tags alone. More important, pick the kind best suited to you personally, much in the same way you would be fitted for eyeglasses. Your choice also will depend largely upon what you want to see most, and under what circumstances. Binoculars of six to eight power are popular for general use, including bird watching. Field glasses may be adequate for short-distance viewing. They are not recommended for bird watching and similar types of use because of their extremely narrow field of view. A good rule of thumb is to ask a friend who knows something about binoculars to help you make that right choice.—Mich. Dept. of Conservation.
