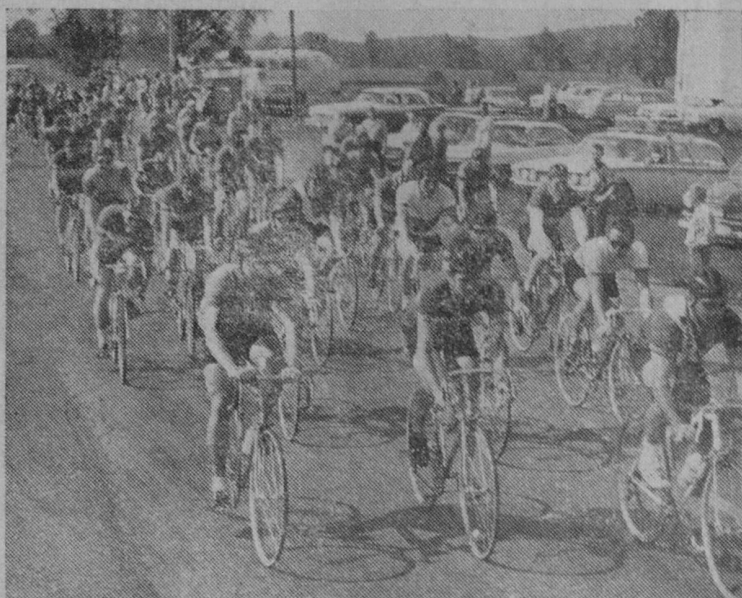

BETWEEN 40 and 50 racers will be here Saturday for a 50-mile bike race sanctioned by the American Bicycle League and sponsored by Wolverine Skating Club and the Michigan Tourist Festival. The race is scheduled to start at 9:30 a. m. Saturday and contestants will pedal their special 10-gear racing bikes over a course from the Federal Building, East Tawas, to Lumbermen's Monument and then to Oscoda. The return will be by way of old US-23 through Wilber Township to Tawas City and back to East Tawas. About \$200 in trophies and prizes will be awarded to winners. Racers will be coming from Michigan and several other states. Headquarters for contestants will be the Holland Hotel and Barnes Hotel which have donated rooms free of charge to participants. Most of the racers compete in speed skating meets during the winter and several are of olympic caliber.

## Tourist Festival Opens

### Five-Day Program Has Many Featured Events

First annual Michigan Tourist Festival opened today in the Tawas area and will run through Sunday.

Highlight of the event will be awarding of a 60 by 135-foot resort lot at Tawas Lake. This project has been made possible through the cooperative financial support of Tawas merchants.

Opening the program today will be a band concert by Tawas Area Summer Band, under direction of Edward J. Rima. The concert will be held at the East Tawas elementary unit.

Thursday's activities will be highlighted by a kids' day program, including races, games and contests. A street dance for teenagers is slated for the evening on Newman Street, which will be blocked off to form a mall during the festival.

Thursday's schedule of events for children's activities at the East Tawas athletic field will find a pie eating contest, 11:30 a. m.; greased pig contest, 3:30 p. m. Games from 10:00 a. m. to 12:00 noon and from 1:00 to 4:00 p. m. will include egg pitching, shoe scramble and races. Prizes will be awarded.

Friday's agenda includes a judo exhibition by a team from Wurtsmith Air Force Base, flower arrangement display by East Tawas Garden Club in the city hall, band concert and fireworks.

Saturday's program will get underway with a sanctioned 50-mile bicycle race, expected to draw some of the top racers from the Midwest. The race will start on Newman Street and the route will include Monument Road to River Road, then to Oscoda and back to Tawas City via old US-23 and Wilber Road. Racers will then peddle along US-23 back to East Tawas.

While the bicycle race is going on, children will be participating in the tri-cycle race, wheel and pet parade in the mall area on Newman Street.

At 11:00 p. m. Saturday, drawing for the lot will be held during a street dance. Furnishing music for this will be Kenny Roberts and his Circle Five Ranch group from WNM-TV, Bay City.

Rounding out the program Sunday is a scheduled water show on Tawas Bay at 10:00 a. m. and a sports car gymkhana.

A muzzle loaders shoot is slated at 2:00 p. m. Sunday by members of the Silver Valley Muzzle Loaders Club. This event will be held at Iosco Sportsmen's Club range on Monument Road. Anyone interested is urged to participate. A practice session will be held at the range Friday evening.

During the afternoons and evenings, Joseph Barkman's museum in the Legion Hall will be open. Featured will be lumbering pictures an local historical items. Of special interest will be a picture exhibit of former Detroit and Mackinac Railway employees.

Throughout the week from Tuesday through Sunday, Skirbeck Shows will operate 30 kiddies rides and concessions at the old fairgrounds.

J. Berkeley Smith is general chairman of the festival.

#### Gymkhana Slated as Tourist Days Event

The black top will never be the same after Sunday's bonanza of twists and turns scheduled during Michigan Tourist Days by the Huron Sports Car Club.

Proving itself as a feature attraction of the 1962 East Tawas centennial by drawing a great number of spectators and participating auto buffs, this year's event is expected to be bigger and better for the enjoyment of all.

Because of the interest generated by speed and skill events, a great number of cars are expected not only from the local area, but also from clubs and individuals from the southern part of the state.

Newman Street at State will be blocked off Sunday morning, the street washed down to eliminate dust and dirt from the pavement and the area will then be roped off behind parking meters in the interest of public safety.

Registration for the gymkhana will start at 12 o'clock noon for all cars and two practice runs will be allowed prior to the final two timed runs starting at 1:30. Four classes of cars will be entered by club members and guests with trophies going to the first three places in each class.

## City Seeks Further Talks on US-23 Construction

Tawas City may soon have an opportunity to present its "case" concerning US-23 construction to the state highway department.

At a meeting here Saturday afternoon, State Sen. Harold Hughes of Clare and State Rep. James P. Mielock of Whittemore said they would attempt to arrange such a meeting.

However, the city is not overly optimistic about the chance of any change in the highway department's plans for this community. Nonplused local officials are concerned about the highway department's "take it or leave it" attitude expressed during recent communications.

At the conclusion of Saturday's meeting, Hughes said, "I don't think you will get any construction this year." He said that because of the city's opposition to present plans, it would not be practical to make changes for the August 14 bid opening.

In discussing the department's move toward reclaiming highway right-of-way through this community, Mayor George Tuttle called it "an argument against the ridiculous."

Pointing to a set of plans which the city received only last week, Tuttle told the two visiting legislators, "I never heard of a law that reclaims right-of-way on one side of a highway and not on the other."

According to the highway department, federal participation in US-23 construction prohibits use of right-of-way for service or parking areas for business places. Many businesses, including gasoline stations, a grocery store and resorts, would be affected.

Tuttle said that the department was being inconsistent when it shows plans for barricading the right-of-way in front of some businesses and not doing the same in other cases. He pointed out a number of instances where this

## Mackie Tells State's Stand on Highway

The state highway department said Monday that special permits would be issued to some Tawas City merchants allowing them to leave up business identification signs that hang over the state right-of-way.

Commissioner John C. Mackie said there apparently has been a misunderstanding by some Tawas City businessmen of the highway department's sign removal program along US-23 through Tawas City in connection with a \$290,000 modernization project scheduled to be put under contract next month.

"Merchants with stores on US-23 apparently are under the impression they must remove their sign if it extends over right-of-way from the front of their building," Mackie said.

(Editors note: Local businessmen gained this "impression" upon receipt of written notification from the highway department that such signs were to be removed.)

"Where signs meet specific requirements of our policy, a revocable permit may be issued to the store owner allowing his sign to overhang highway rights-of-way," Mackie said. "This is in unit compliance with highway department and United States Bureau of Public Roads requirements."

"Upon request of a store owner for a special permit, one of our maintenance division representatives will visit the property owner to determine whether our requirements are met."

"If this be the case, our representative will obtain information on the location and the size of the sign along with a photograph and we will request approval from the Bureau of Public Roads to issue a revocable permit."

Mackie said that if the base of a sign is located on the right-of-way, it must be moved. If the base of the sign is off the right-of-way but the sign hangs over it, the overhang must be eliminated if there is room to do so. This is in accordance with a policy of the Bureau of Public Roads.

Mackie said the highway department contacted all property owners and businessmen who have signs that are either on the US-23 right-of-way or hang over it and explained the department's policy on such signs. "They were told," Mackie said, "that a letter would be sent to all property owners and business places with signs on or over the right-of-way asking them to remove signs within 30 days. Property owners may ask for a reasonable extension of time to remove the sign and we normally approve such requests."

Mackie said the Bureau of Public Roads, which supervises the expenditure of federal highway funds, has notified the state highway department that it will not participate in the cost of any project.

## Perfect Weather Conditions Greet Iosco Co. Fair Opening

Perfect weather conditions greeted yesterday's opening of the annual Iosco County Fair at Hale. Tuesday was the last day of entering exhibits and the giant midway also started its five-day stand.

Fair officials predict that this year's event will be one of the best on record and look for capacity crowds during the next four days.

Gerald Bellen, fair society president, said that the fair has something of interest for people of all ages—from fun on the midway rides to agricultural exhibits in the township hall.

This year's event will have the largest display of livestock in its history.

Two new barns were completely filled with exhibits Tuesday noon and fair officials were wondering what to do with late arrivals.

Four big days of harness racing will again feature the annual fair. Thirteen events are listed on the schedule with total prize money of \$17,000.

Thurman Scofield is superintendent of speed, assisted by Adolph Siegrist and Elwood Ruckle. Irving Pratt is presiding judge. E. J. McMurray will operate the starting gate. Ila Katterman will be clerk of the course. Jerry Cleary will again handle the announcing.

Anyone interested in assisting with operation of the fair as a volunteer is requested to contact Robert Ruckle, secretary-manager, or President Bellen.

Two show shelters will be awarded to winners in the livestock division, one for showmanship in cattle and the other for showmanship in horses.

George Erickson and Robert Robinson are livestock superintendents. Other department superintendents are Perry Shellenbarger, poultry, assisted by Glenwood Streeter; John Dooley, farm produce; Eva Doing, flowers and plants; Dorothy Mielock, home economics; Mrs. Gerald Ruckle, domestic arts; Wilma Wagner, art; Elwood Ruckle, games and contests; Lyle Bielby, conservation; 4-H division, Lois Schuster and Irvin Youngberg.

Friday's program will include a pig scramble while Saturday has been set aside as children's day. Starting at 10:00 a. m., there will be games and contests for all ages.

## Mother of Five Drowns in Lake

Mrs. Mary Lou Ormond, 41, mother of five children, drowned Tuesday in Lake Huron about four miles north of East Tawas.

The victim, clad in a swimming suit, was discovered about 200 yards off shore from Green Gables Resort by four teen-aged boys. This was about four miles south of the Ormond cottage on AuSable Point.

The boys, Harold Otto, 14, Saginaw; Ronald Miller, 14, Flint; Len Charette, 16, Belleville; Richard Bleeke, 16, Decatur, Indiana, found the body at 1:45 o'clock.

Coroner E. John Moffatt believed the victim had been dead from two to five hours. She was identified about two hours later by a friend, also a summer resident, Mrs. Joseph Cummins.

The victim's husband, Robert, is a radiologist at Ford Hospital. The family spends the summer at AuSable Point and two of the children had remained here this week while the other three returned home with Mr. Ormond.

Investigation is being conducted by the Iosco County Sheriff's Department and state police.

## Two Fires Remain Under Investigation

Investigation continues this week into two fires which destroyed an unoccupied farm house and another old frame building early Sunday morning.

Iosco Sheriff's Department officers believe that a fire which destroyed the Herman Hosbach home on McArdle Road and one which demolished the old Orange Hall on M-55 were both set intentionally by the same persons.

The Hosbach residence was unoccupied but furniture stored there was lost in the blaze. The Orange Hall had not been in use for many years and was partially razed several years ago.

## Buch Heads State Registers of Deeds

Albert H. Buch, Iosco County register of deeds, was elected president of the Michigan Association of Registers of Deeds at the 49th annual convention held at Harbour Inn, Harbor Springs, July 15-17.

Also elected were John G. Hosko, Muskegon County, first vice president; William J. Profit, Tuscola County, second vice president; Belzora Mullins, Cass County, third vice president; Donald S. Taylor, Montcalm County, secretary-treasurer.

Most of the time was devoted to discussing "New Responsibilities and Duties of the Register of Deeds as required by Uniform Commercial Code." This act becomes effective as of January 1. Also discussed were the following Public Acts of 1963: Act 42, regarding oil and gas leases; Act 150, name and address of the person drawing a land conveyance instrument must be given on the deed; Act 240, regarding recording fees.

The committee on uniform commercial code had several meetings with the representatives of the secretary of state's office and the auditor general's department. Parties representing banks, loan companies and suppliers of forms and filing systems attended the meeting.

## Dock Dedicated to Sen. Prescott

Almost perfect weather graced the dedication Saturday of the one million dollar National Gypsum loading dock in memory of the late Sen. Charles T. Prescott. The dock is located south of Tawas City in Alabaster Township.

A threat of rain early in the day prompted speakers to shorten their talks, but the ceremony went off without a hitch.

Several speakers outlined the economic impact the dock has had on this area and to the state. Included was Eugene W. Odenwald, company vice president, who forecast a 10-year period of economic growth for the Great Lakes area.

Sen. Harold B. Hughes, Senator Prescott's successor in the 28th district, called the big National Gypsum dock "a symbol of better understanding between our citizens, business enterprise and government."

Hughes recalled that the late senator was "instrumental in securing Lake Huron bottom lands for the National Gypsum Company dock through the passage of Act 176 of 1957."

Rep. James P. Mielock of Whittemore hailed National Gypsum's contributions to Michigan's industrial progress. He noted that the company employs 1,700 persons in the state and that they receive 14

million dollars a year in wages and salaries.

Nine-year-old Daniel Prescott, grandson of the late senator, unveiled a plaque which will be affixed to the dock. "It is an honor for me to dedicate this dock to the memory of my grandfather," Daniel declared.

President Ralph H. Western of Tawas Chamber of Commerce pointed out that "although we have the good fortune to live in an area that through its natural beauty and water attracts thousands to the area and gives our economy a terrific boost, this has to be supplemented by industry."

"National Gypsum," he added, "with its employment of 182 people in the Tawas area is one of those industries."

Odenwald said he has been told that the dock is "an interesting tourist attraction" and announced that the company will make it more visible from US-23.

He also disclosed that the "state has promised to help with a highway cutoff through tourists can pull off US-23 and view the dock and shiploading."

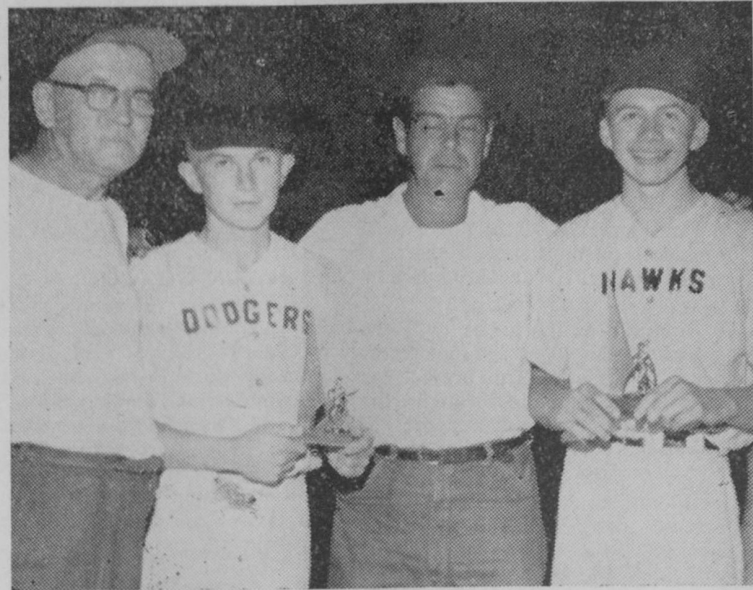

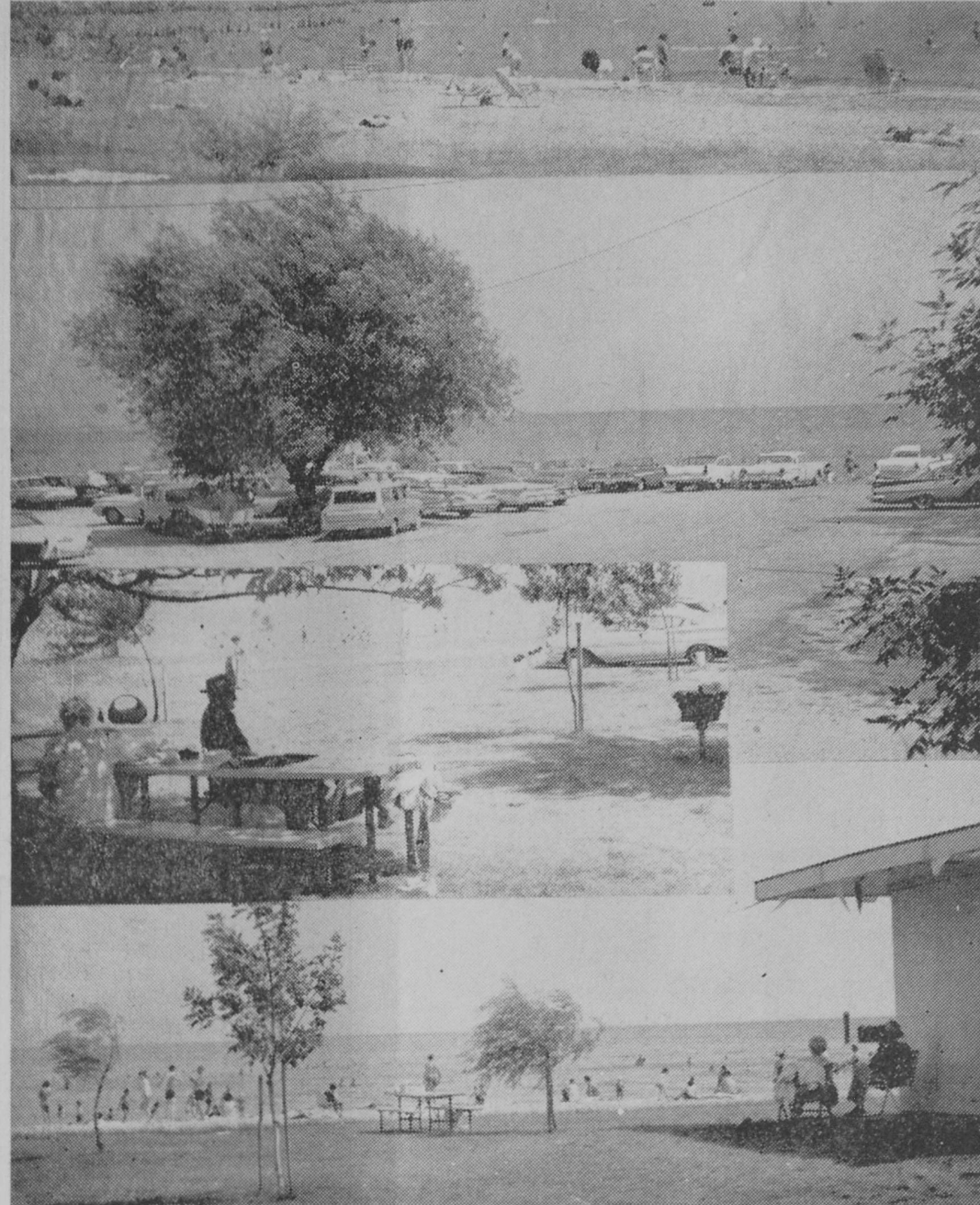
### GOLDEN-AGERS HEAR ADDRESS BY NURSE

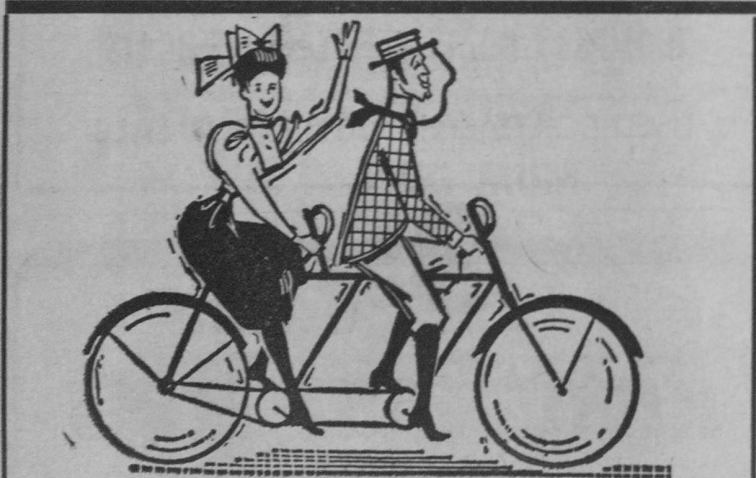

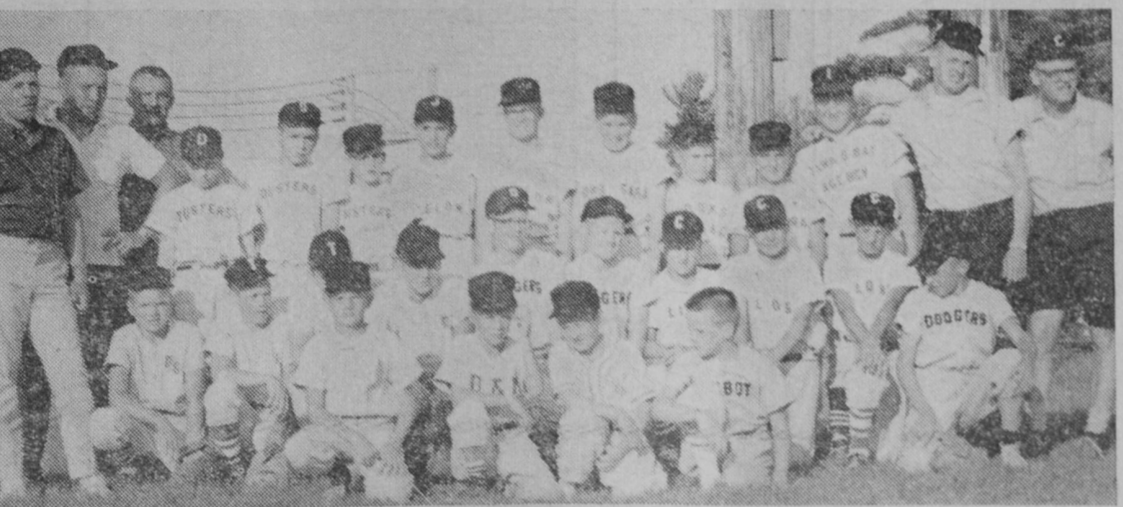

# The Lawes and a Bushel of Iris Bulbs

Thirteen years ago in 1950, a neighbor lady gave Mr. and Mrs. Laurel Lawe of Whittemore a bushel basketful of un-named iris bulbs. Mr. Lawe planted the irises and because he and his wife enjoyed them so much, Mrs. Lawe purchased \$10 worth of named varieties. Since that time, the number of named irises in their garden has increased to 225, which are in 400 plantings.

After a friend told them of an iris show in the area, Mr. and Mrs. Lawe began to exhibit their irises. Through the years, they received five silver medals for having the largest number of blue ribbons. The Lawes also have won eight purple rosettes for the best iris stalk.

Each year as it nears show time, Mr. and Mrs. Lawe observe and

evaluate their flowers. When the day of the show arrives, the stalks are transported to the place of the shows where Mrs. Lawe classifies them. After the judging, the Lawes will be certain to have several more ribbons to bring home.

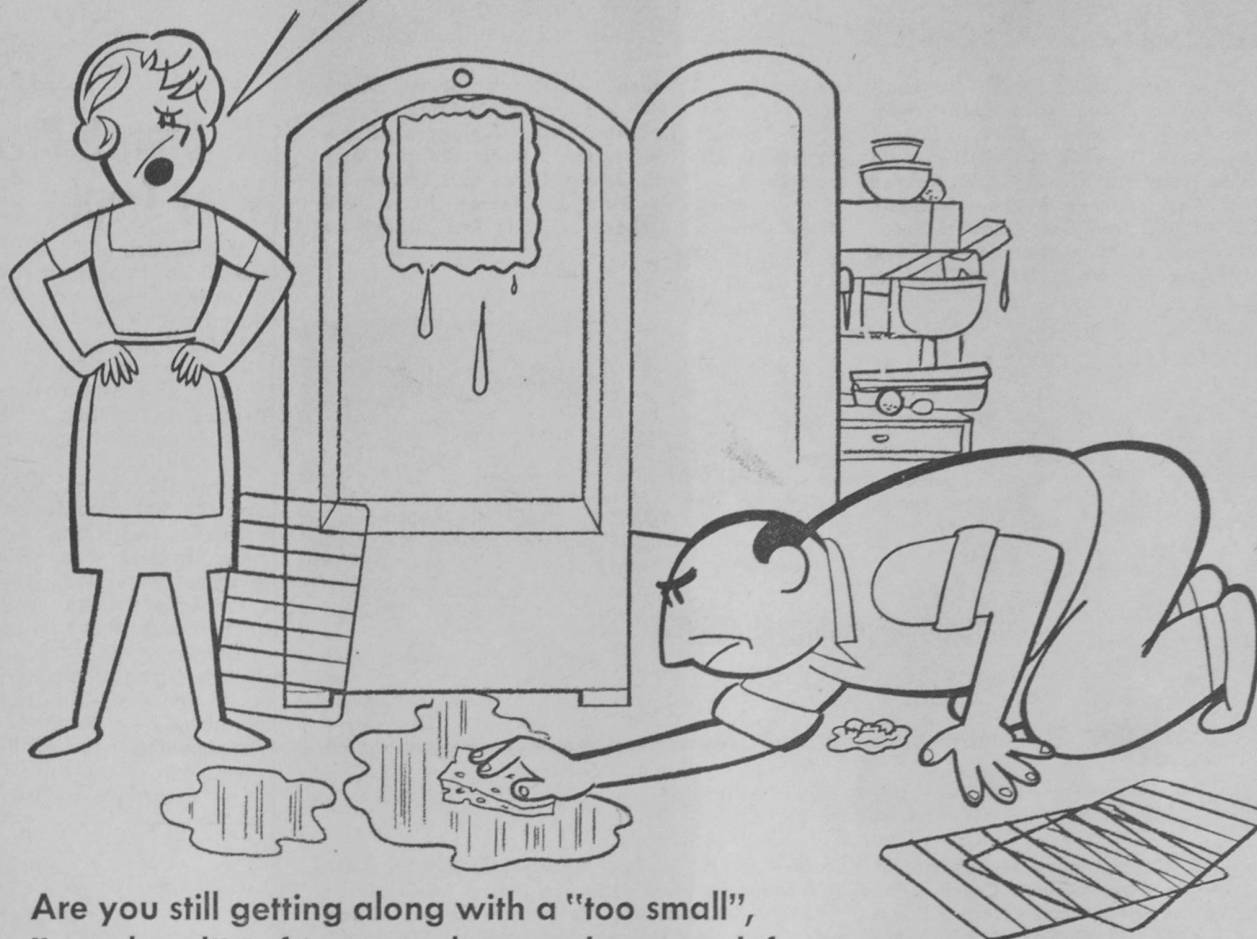

It was pointed out that the Tawas are to be bypassed by US-23 in the future. A divided limited-access highway is being planned and, according to Mielock, the old route probably would revert to the county.

Both Hughes and Mielock deplored what they called an apparent breakdown of communications between the highway department and this city.

Noting a "change in highway department attitude toward the people" during the past two or three years, Hughes said his first duty was to the district and that

he and Mr. Mielock would do everything in their power to arrange a meeting.

Among those attending the meeting were council members, city planning commission, businessmen and Michael Freel, who has been retained as the city's attorney.

(Continued from page 1.) ect until all signs and other encroachments on the right-of-way are removed or granted revocable permits. The federal share of the Tawas City modernization project will be approximately \$145,000, Mackie said.

At the same time, Mackie told Tawas City Mayor George Tuttle that the highway department must eliminate the rolled curb along US-23 starting at Whittemore Street for safety reasons.

"As explained to your planning consultant by our design and traffic engineers, we must retain the proposed straight barrier-type curb in order to provide adequate traffic control for the protection of motorists on US-23," Mackie said.

"Experience has shown that where rolled curbs or no curb at all in an urban area such as yours is provided, the motorists leaves and enters the traveled portion of the highway in a haphazard and uncontrolled manner, thereby causing confusion to the through motorist and greater potential for accidents.

"We believe that with only a minimum of cost, the city can provide for parking on its own property where your existing park now lies."

Mackie told Mayor Tuttle that if satisfactory arrangements regarding the design feature of the project and other matters cannot be reached between the highway department and Tawas City, then "We have no recourse but to accept your suggestion that the proposed project not be constructed."
