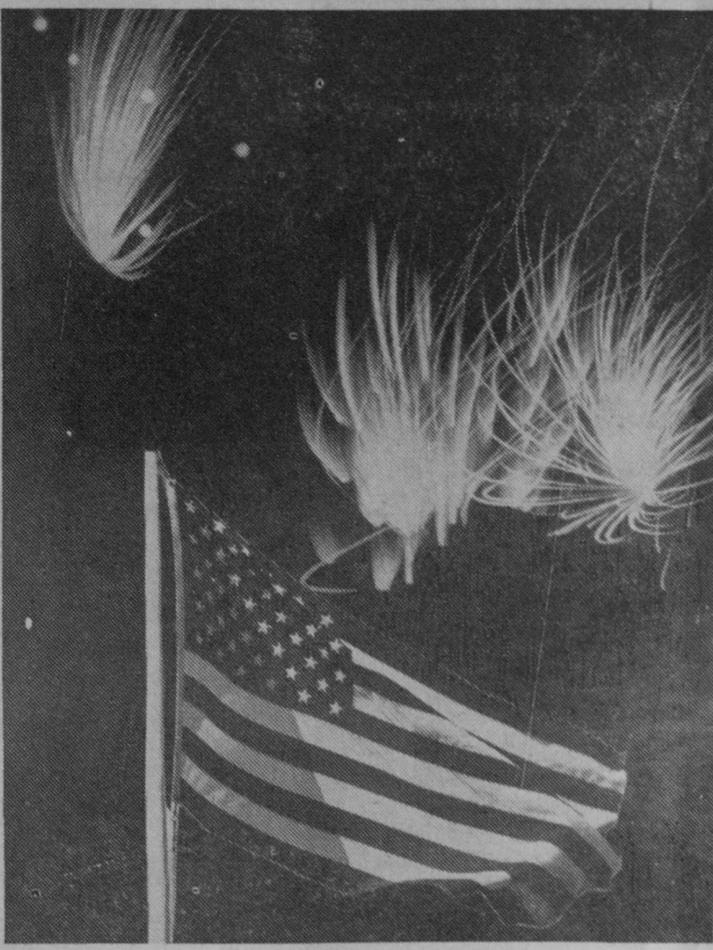

Fireworks and Concert Feature July 4 Program

The Fourth of July—1963 version—will have comparatively quiet observances in the Tawas and losco County.

This holiday marks the start of the annual tourist vacation season and local resort owners will have their eyes focused on US-23 traffic flow.

Junior Baseball All-Star Games Slated July 14

Annual Knothole and Pony League all-star games are set for Sunday, July 14, at Tawas Area High School athletic field.

Two divisions of the Knothole League will open the first game at 6:00 p. m. The Pony League teams will play under the lights at 8:00 p. m.

All team members and managers are to meet at the American Legion Hall, East Tawas, this Friday night at 7:30 o'clock. Tickets will be distributed and all members are to start canvassing the two towns for support of the program.

It is hoped that the community will support this drive in order to help defray the organization's \$1,200 indebtedness. With expansion of teams in the junior baseball program, uniforms were purchased for new teams and other necessary equipment was replaced.

Refreshments will be available at the athletic field during both baseball games.

Tourist Days Program Set July 24-28

Program plans are now being finalized for Michigan Tourist Festival Days which will be held in the Tawas area July 24-28.

To be awarded during the festival will be a 60 by 135-foot lot on Schill Road at Tawas Lake.

Some of the activities planned include a kids' day observance, along the lines of a similar day held during East Tawas' centennial. This will feature games, wheel and pet parades.

Other activities on the program include fireworks, band concert, Michigan Jubilee street dance with Kenny Roberts of WNEM-TV, sports car gymkhana, water skiing exhibition and muzzle loader shoot.

One of the highlights will be a sanctioned bicycle race run by the Wolverine Bike Club of Detroit. Starting point for the race will be the second block of Newman Street, turning down State Street and then to Monument Road. Racers will pedal to Lumbermen's Monument, then over River Road to Oscoda. The return will be over old US-23 to Wilber Road, down Fifth Avenue and Mathews Street in Tawas City to US-23 and then east to the finish line at East Tawas.

During the four-day observance, Great Northern Show will have its carnival at East Tawas. Site has not been announced as yet.

Architect to Study Cost of Two ET Classrooms

Tawas Area Board of Education has authorized its architect to determine cost of constructing two or three additional classrooms at the East Tawas Elementary Unit in the second phase of its five-year school plant expansion program.

At Monday night's special meeting, plans were reviewed showing construction of a 52 by 80 multipurpose room with 92 by 62-foot addition containing a kitchen, general office, superintendent's office and storage area.

Bryselbout, Starke and Hacker, the school's architect, had prepared a preliminary sketch for the above addition which would contain 5,700 square feet of floor space.

Two classrooms proposed would add about 2,100 square feet to the over-all structure.

It was stated that cost of the construction would be about \$10 per square foot, inasmuch as a new heating plant was constructed separate from the old building.

This would mean that total cost of the project would be approximately \$80,000.

The addition would be separated from the present elementary unit by a covered walk.

Construction of two or three classrooms at East Tawas has been one of the principal objectives of the board of education. The classrooms would allow removal of the entire fifth grade from the new Tawas City unit.

This would allow moving the eighth grade, presently located at the high school, to the Tawas City unit.

The five-year tax proposal approved by voters in 1961 collects approximately \$78,000 annually

for this construction program. First phase was construction of 10 classrooms at the Tawas City unit, costing slightly in excess of \$200,000.

City Retains Freel as Legal Counsel

Michael N. Freel, East Tawas attorney, has been retained as legal counsel for the City of Tawas City in its attempt toward negotiations with the state highway department concerning US-23.

At Monday night's council meeting, Mayor George Tuttle reported that Freel is now attempting to learn if any new directives have been issued by the highway department concerning signs along US-23.

Freel recently became associated with John R. Watkins, East Tawas attorney.

One of the principal objections voiced by city officials is the highway department's plan to force removal of signs attached to buildings which hang over the sidewalk on the lake side of US-23.

The sidewalk was included in an easement which Tawas City gave to the state during widening in 1940.

Tuttle said that the city is working closely with the Michigan Municipal League in the matter. A vice president of the league, he met recently with other officials of the organization and another meeting is planned.

Councilmen Cecil Cabbale and Howard Hatton urged the council to set forth its objections to present plans for US-23 in a letter to Highway Commissioner John MacCie and Gov. George Romney. A

council resolution has already been sent to the department.

In other business, Mrs. Ruth Albertson, city treasurer, gave her monthly report. A letter was read authorizing Mrs. Mary Bergeron to collect city taxes at the city hall.

At the suggestion of Mrs. Albertson, the city is to rent a safety deposit box at the Tawas City Branch of Peoples State Bank for safekeeping of deeds, agreements and other important city papers.

Mrs. Albertson also asked the council to set a deadline on when tax rolls were to be turned over to the city treasurer by supervisors.

One building application approved during the past week was for the Detroit and Mackinac Railway, 120 Oak Street, replace windows and alter walls in office building, \$2,000.

Busy Summer Season Ahead at State Park; Camps Filled

East Tawas State Park was at full capacity last week-end with 186 camp sites in the park, some 19 turn-aways as early as last Friday

evening. A long line of campers awaited vacancies on Saturday and Sunday.

PARK RANGER William Kusey said Saturday that he looks for another record summer. With 186 camp sites in the park, some 19 prospective campers had to be turned away the previous week-

end and park use is about 50 camper units ahead of last year. "Over-all attendance in the park is down from last year because of cold weather during the month of May," said Kusey. "April's park attendance was well above the same period last year."

From January 1 through Labor Day last year, there were some 4,219 camp sites used as compared to 4,000 the previous year. In addition, the 1962 park attendance was 237,000, an increase of 35,000 over the previous year.

Sale of vehicle permit stickers is slightly higher than last year. At this time in 1962, some 1,800 stickers had been sold. As of Saturday, 1,850 had been dispensed to vehicles using the park.

BECAUSE of its wooded camp sites, sandy beach on Tawas Bay, the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock and nearby business dis-

tribution, the state park here has long been one of the most popular in Michigan.

The park now has a full complement of summer personnel. In addition to Kusey, Frank Gawne is assistant ranger, Terry Hughes, Gordon Dewitt, William Kent, Emerson Frank and Gerald Russell are park rangers.

Other employees include Roger Helmer, Mrs. Harold Moeller and Mildred Miller. Douglas Evans is the American Red Cross lifeguard at the beach.

Kusey said that park personnel here were also responsible for emptying garbage cans at the undeveloped state park on Tawas Point.

"When the new park is developed, a lot of pressure will be relieved on the East Tawas park," said Kusey. He predicted, however, that the old park would continue to be popular with vacationers.

Faces Check Charge in losco Circuit Court

Bound over to circuit court on a charge of uttering and publishing Saturday was John Coyle, 44, Tawas City. He waived examination on arraignment and was released under \$2,500 bond to await trial.

Davison Wins School Contract

Davison and Son Builders, Incorporated, of Tawas City were successful bidders on the new Osoda elementary school, it was announced last week.

Davison's bid was \$191,700.

Low bid of \$74,384 for plumbing and heating was awarded to Northern Plumbing and Heating, East Tawas. Electrical contract for \$26,778 was let to Norm Smith Electric of Cheboygan.

Rooms in the school, to be built in the same area as the high school, will include 14 classrooms, remedial reading room, cafeteria, library and kindergarten room.

Sizzling Weather Benefits 'Touristry'

Sizzling hot weather over the week-end saw area highways packed with down-staters seeking refuge on lake frontage in losco and other Northeastern Michigan counties.

Saturday and Sunday traffic on US-23 through the Tawas area ranked as the heaviest in past recent years. The same held true for M-65 through western losco.

State Police Sgt. Frank Roti commented that traffic flowing past the East Tawas post brought back memories of a few years ago.

"It was the first time since the 1950s that I have seen such a jam of camp trailers waiting to get into the state park," said Roti. Cars and trailers were parked along US-23 all the way from Newman Street to the state police post.

Cars also lined both sides of the highway along the state park, on the lake side of US-23 from the Tawas City-East Tawas boundary to the Tawas Chamber of Commerce office and in front of the Tawas City Park.

In spite of the high concentration of traffic, drivers apparently drove with caution as there was not a single auto accident reported on US-23 in the Tawas area.

An inspection of area parks revealed that bathing beaches at East Tawas and Tawas City were jammed. Picnic facilities in both parks were also filled. The same held true for the Whitney Township Park, Old Orchard Park along the AuSable River, Silver Valley and Corsair Camp Grounds in Huron National Forest.

In addition, hundreds of persons made use of beaches at Tawas Point, future site of a state park. Although this property is completely undeveloped, the shoreline was crowded with picnickers and bathers.

Gasoline service stations reported steady business over the week-end, as did area entertainment spots. Tourist accommodations in the area were not filled to capacity.

New Utility Boat Pride of Coast Guard Station

Great Lakes cruising range of the Tawas Point Lifeboat Station has been extended considerably with receipt of a new utility boat.

Measuring 44 feet, nine inches in length, the new boat is powered by two V-6 200-horsepower diesel engines. The craft will cruise at 14 knots and has a maximum speed of 17 knots.

Built at a cost of approximately \$200,000, the boat is said to be unsinkable and carries a pump system for fire fighting or may be used to pump water from another boat.

This boat replaces the old 40-foot utility boat which is now stationed at Detroit and a 36-foot motor lifeboat.

The boat will sleep four crew members, has provisions to carry 25 persons and has an 190-mile cruising range.

Equipment includes a galley, radar, depth finder, ship to shore radio, direction finder. It is capable of carrying enough supplies to remain several days on water during search and rescue operations.

Built at the coast guard's Curtis Bay, Maryland, yards, a crew of three men spent three weeks in bringing the boat to Tawas Point. The voyage was made by way of the St. Lawrence Seaway and Erie Canal.

PRIDE of the United States Coast Guard at Tawas Point is this new 44-foot utility boat. The craft features the latest improvements in navigational aids and rescue equipment. It has a maximum speed of 17 knots and cruising range of 190 miles.—Tawas Herald Photo.

New Brides Asked to Notify SS Office Of Change in Name

June is the month of new brides and they are reminded to notify their social security office of their change of name as soon as possible after the event. Paul M. Ellifritz, district manager of the Social Security office, Bay City, points out that a change of name requires the issuance of a corrected social security card. The same account number is kept but the card is issued in the bride's new name. Immediate reporting by the bride will lessen the possibility that her future earnings may be incorrectly reported.

Continuing, Mr. Ellifritz said, "If you are married and have not yet changed your name on your social security account, do so immediately. If you are just planning marriage, be sure to notify the Social Security Administration after the happy event takes place."

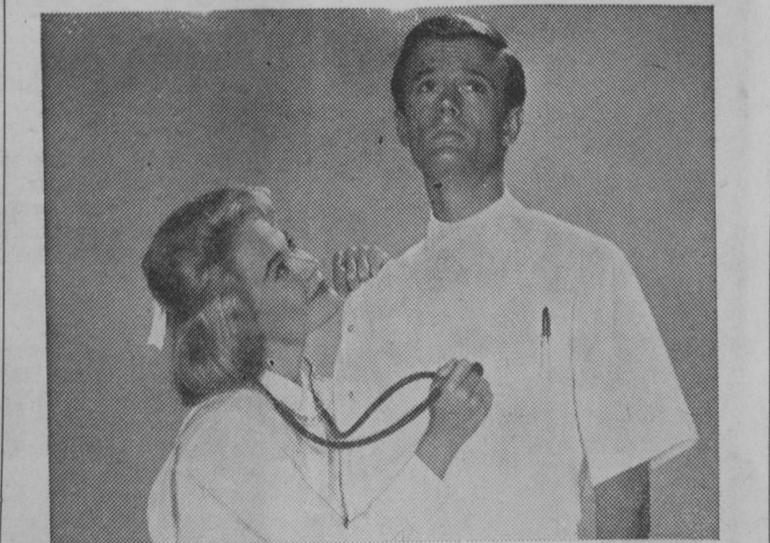

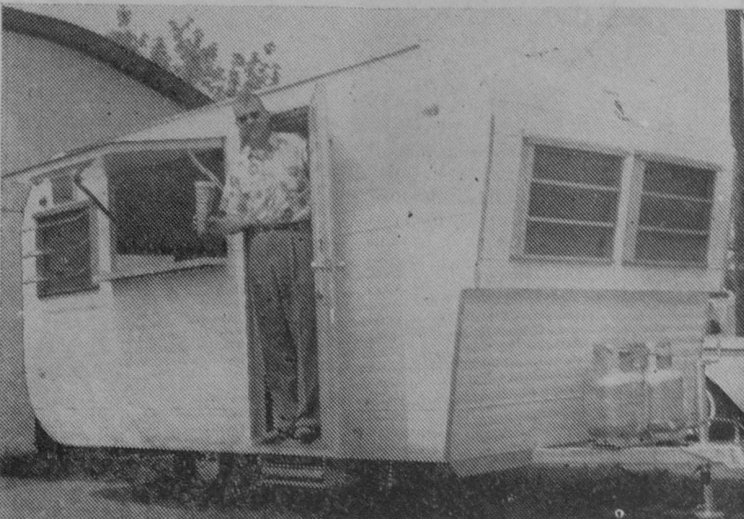

Against Law to Go Boating Without Proper Equipment

Going boating without the proper equipment is not just foolish—it is also against the law!

The marine enforcement division of Iosco Sheriff's Department and the Committee for National Safe Boating Week, June 30-July 6, points out that on all waters of this state, there must be a life saving device for everyone aboard a pleasure craft.

Water craft up to 16 feet in length operated on the waters of this state must carry proper lights and a fire extinguisher, if of closed or semi-closed construction; craft from 16 to 26 feet long must carry, in addition, a hand whistle or horn audible for at least one-half mile. Larger pleasure craft, up to 65 feet in length, require a hand or power operated whistle audible at least one mile and a bell.

Most other states have similar equipment requirements, reports Deputy Sheriff Francis Block, marine enforcement division, Iosco Sheriff's Department.

Other items of equipment not mentioned in the requirements, but common sense dictates that they are carried on board boats, are anchor, line, paddle, first aid kit, flashlight, fenders, tool kit, extra can of fuel, compass and distress flares.

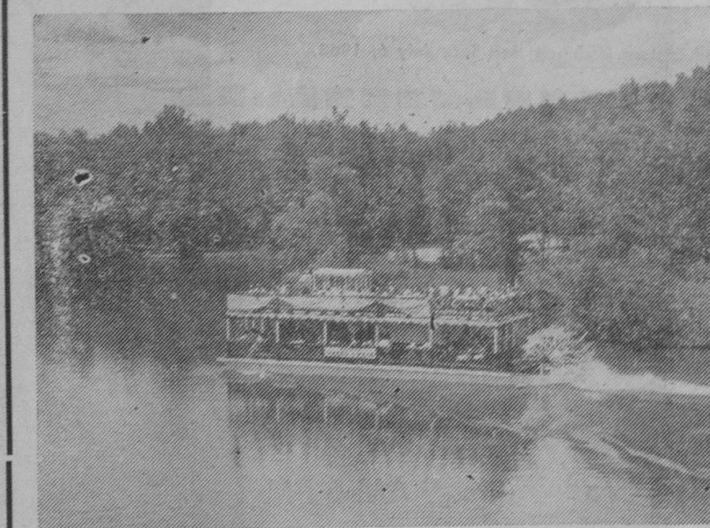

Veteran USG Quarry Worker Retires

Another veteran employee at United States Gypsum Company's Alabaster installation retired last week. Ending 38 years of service was Fred "Mooney" Erickson.

Although spending most of his career in the quarry, Erickson started in the plaster mill in the summer of 1912. After two years of summer employment, Erickson started steady employment in 1914. He remained there until 1933 and returned in 1938.

Erickson has handled nearly every operation in the quarry except shovel operator. He has fired steam engines, drilled, served as a blaster's helper, was a "swamper" or oiler on draglines and finished out his service as a locomotive operator.

The Erickson family has long been associated with the gypsum operation at Alabaster. Erickson's brother, Elmer, is employed there as are two nephews, John and Arthur.

"Mooney," as he is known by all of his fellow employees, was a member of Alabaster's baseball team for many years and in later years served as an umpire.

East Tawas Hires Engineer for Survey

On recommendation of the board of public works, East Tawas Council has authorized a study of the possible construction of water and sewer extensions along with plans for a new sewage disposal plant.

At its meeting Monday night, the council authorized hiring Spicer Engineering Company to make the study.

In other business, no objections were heard toward construction of a sewer from Grant Street to East Bay Street and Emery Street. Authorization was given to prepare plans.

The council approved \$9,000 for construction of a water line from Alice Street to Emery Street.

The council agreed to remove two-hour parking signs along US-23 in front of Feather-Lite Manufacturing Company until December 1.

East Tawas Fire Department reported that it had received a letter from the state fire marshal's office stating that there was no reason to condemn the old Evans Furniture Building on East State Street.

Gov. Romney Signs Apportionment Plan June 13

A congressional apportionment plan was adopted June 5 by the Michigan Legislature. Gov. George Romney signed the measure June 13 and the statute becomes effective September 6.

Congressional reapportionment within the state arose from two major factors: 1. The population increase of Michigan between the 1950 and 1960 census; 2. Shifting of population (with some counties losing) and the unevenness of population growth among the state's remaining counties.

Since the 1960 census was published and Michigan was allocated its 19th congressional seat, the legislature has struggled with the problem of redrawing congressional district boundary lines.

The United States Constitution requires apportionment of representatives among the states according to population every 10 years, with the provision that each state shall have at least one representative. It further provides that no house member shall represent less than 30,000 persons. Actual apportionment of the representatives among the states is accomplished under federal statute. The size of the house is established at 435—thus giving a representative ratio of 410,481 persons, based on the 1960 census.

The new Michigan congressional apportionment act, which represents a compromise between several conflicting interests, creates 19 new districts ranging from 305,984 to 490,310 in population.

Boundary lines of each of the state's present 18 congressional districts were changed. Included was the 10th Congressional District, which has grown from 15 to 22 counties. Counties included in the district under the change are Iosco, Isabella, Midland, Bay, Clare, Gladwin, Arenac, Missaukee, Roscommon, Ogemaw, Kalamazoo, Crawford, Oscoda, Alcona, Antrim, Otsego, Montmorency, Alpena, Charlevoix, Emmett, Cheboygan, Presque Isle.

Two counties, Osceola and Mecosta, were taken from the district and added to the ninth. The eight northern counties of the Lower Peninsula, formerly part of the 11th have been added to the 10th.

Wurtsmith Airman Killed in Crash on M-55 Wednesday

A 21-year-old airman from Wurtsmith was killed early last Wednesday morning on M-55, 3 1/2 miles west of Tawas City.

Killed was A2c David G. Nelson, 2030 Communications Squadron. His home was at Farmington.

Officers said that Nelson, headed east, apparently fell asleep at the wheel. The vehicle struck a culvert.

Pontiac Driver Won Feature Race Saturday

Archie Flanagan of Pontiac became the first driver to win a feature race this year at Whittemore Speedway other than Rick Zettle or Bob Kingen of West Branch.

Flanagan annexed Saturday night's feature while Moe Margrave of Oscoda won the Australian pursuit.

Margrave also won one of the heat races, as did Zettle and Kingen.

Road car honors went to Darrell Blumlein, Skidway Lake, who won the feature and a heat race. Bob Callahan, Linwood, and John Gordon, Au Gres, were the other heat winners.

Motor bike winners were Gene Farrant, Bill Stevens, Jerry Downy, all of Bay City; Sam Hawley of Burt.

Racing is held every Saturday night at 8:30 o'clock. Time trials start at 7:30.
