Amended Judgment Monday Paves Way to High Court Appeal

By granting a motion to amend a judgment in a recent lawsuit, Judge Philip Glennie paved the way Monday for possible supreme court appeal of an opinion he handed down last April in Isosco County Circuit Court.

The cause in question is Elmer J. Burrell, plaintiff, vs. Olive M. Goldsmith and John A. Brugger, defendants, and Victor A. Zaharias and Doris M. Zaharias, intervening defendants and cross-plaintiffs. The original bill of complaint was entered May 5, 1961.

Burrell is subdivider of North Park Acres while the Zaharias are subdividers of Huron Gardens.

T. George Sternberg of Bay City, attorney for Mr. and Mrs. Zaharias, said Monday that he would file an appeal sometime next week concerning the judge's ruling which established the boundary between Huron Gardens and North Park Acres subdivisions in Tawas City.

Judge Glennie amended his judgment entered June 10 to include the determination that the amount of value of right in the cause was more than \$3,000. Under the general court rules now in effect, it is necessary that the judgment recite this amount in controversy. This determines whether the party may take an appeal as a matter of right or upon leave.

At the same time Monday, Judge Glennie denied a motion by Mr. and Mrs. Zaharias which asked that the names of four North Park Acres families be added as cross-defendants.

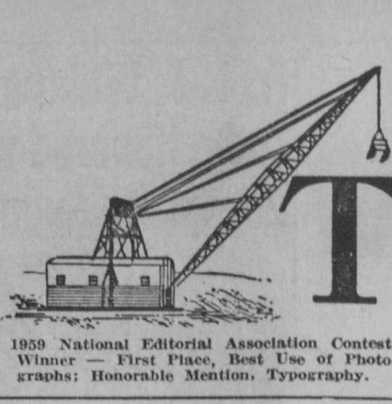
The motion asked for a rehearing and to open proofs to take testimony of Russell Small, registered surveyor, "for the reason that his testimony is material to the issue of the boundary location and particularly in respect to the issue as to whether the Zaharias are estopped from claiming the fence line as the boundary between their premises and those of Elmer J. Burrell."

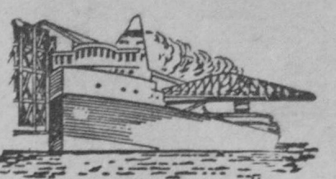

Decision of Civic Officials Awaited—

Two Utilities Bid to Furnish Natural Gas Service

Consumers Power Seeks 30-Year Pact With Communities

Consumers Power Company became the second Michigan utility within the past week to express interest in extending natural gas service to the Tawas-Oscoda area.

Letters of intent were submitted Monday night for approval of city councils of Tawas City and East Tawas. Councilmen and city officials were dinner guests of Consumers Power Company at the Barnes Hotel.

Consumers Power Company seeks a non-exclusive, 30-year natural gas franchise to serve the area.

Louis Vaupre, Bay City division manager of Consumers Power Company, told city officials Monday night that the company had spent the past year making a survey of the area to determine the market for natural gas.

He announced that Consumers Power plans a multi-million dollar expenditure to bring natural gas service to the area.

"We feel your decision here is an important one for this part of Michigan," B. G. Campbell, vice president in charge of marketing of Consumers Power's Jackson office, told local officials.

In outlining expansion of natural gas service in eight Michigan communities, Campbell said that his company has a great sense of responsibility to its customers and has acquired underground storage areas which would be adequate for the next 15 years.

Campbell said that if franchises were approved by Tawas City, East Tawas, Oscoda and West Branch, Consumers Power Company would be prepared to have natural gas in the Tawas area for use by the heating season of 1964.

Assisted by Lowell Shepard, assistant division manager, and Gordon Huck, Tawas district manager, Campbell outlined Consumers Power Company plans for constructing a 10-inch pipe line from storage near West Branch to the Tawas and north. The line would follow the route of M-55 east and US-23 north to Oscoda.

Vaupre announced that Consumers had received a go-ahead from the federal government to survey Wurtsmith Air Force Base for natural gas installation.

"We know you are part of your community, we think we can do a great deal for Tawas and grow with you. We have the storage facilities and would like your business," said Campbell.

Installation of natural gas service to the community would require laying mains along city streets. Company officials said that cost of a residential installation within 60 feet of the main would be \$47.

Consumers Power, second largest gas company in the state, is emphasizing its ability to present a "total energy package" (electrical power and gas) as a means of attracting industry to the area.

No action is to be taken on the franchise until regular council meetings next Monday night. Proceedings would require about 60 days as a vote of the people would be required.

It has been suggested that the proposals from both companies be discussed at a joint meeting of officials from the four communities.

Ronald Krontel, art assistant to Michael Church of the University of Michigan Extension Service, will be present as consultant. A chicken barbecue dinner will be served by 4-H Club members under direction of County Agent Marvin Davenport. An ice cream social is also planned.

Public Hearing to Air Harbor Improvements

A public hearing in the interest of providing improvements for light draft navigation at Tawas Bay Harbor, East Tawas, will be held August 28 by the United States Army Engineer District.

The district engineer has been directed to make a survey of the shore of Lake Huron with a view to establishment of harbors and harbors of refuge for light draft commercial and fishing vessels and for recreational craft.

The survey will consider improvements at a number of locations along the shore of Lake Huron, including a site on Tawas Bay. The public hearing will be held at East Tawas City Hall starting at 1:00 p. m.

All interested parties are invited to be present or represented at the meeting, including representatives of federal, state, county and municipal agencies; navigation, industrial and railroad interests and small boat owners, yacht clubs and associations, or others whose interests may be affected.

All desired improvements at Tawas Bay Harbor in the interest of navigation should be presented at the hearing, states the district engineer. Proponents of the improvements are urged to present pertinent, factual information bearing on the general plan and to furnish detailed supporting data on the economic justification of the undertaking. Opposing interests, if any, are also urged to state the reason for their position.

This hearing will primarily consider requests for improvements in the interest of recreational craft and other small boats. Definite and detailed information is especially desired concerning nature of improvements desired, data relation to craft presently using Tawas Bay Harbor, developments now being considered, difficulties attending navigation at the present time and extent of cooperation which local interests are prepared to furnish.

For small boat harbors, the federal government usually constructs the breakwaters, if need

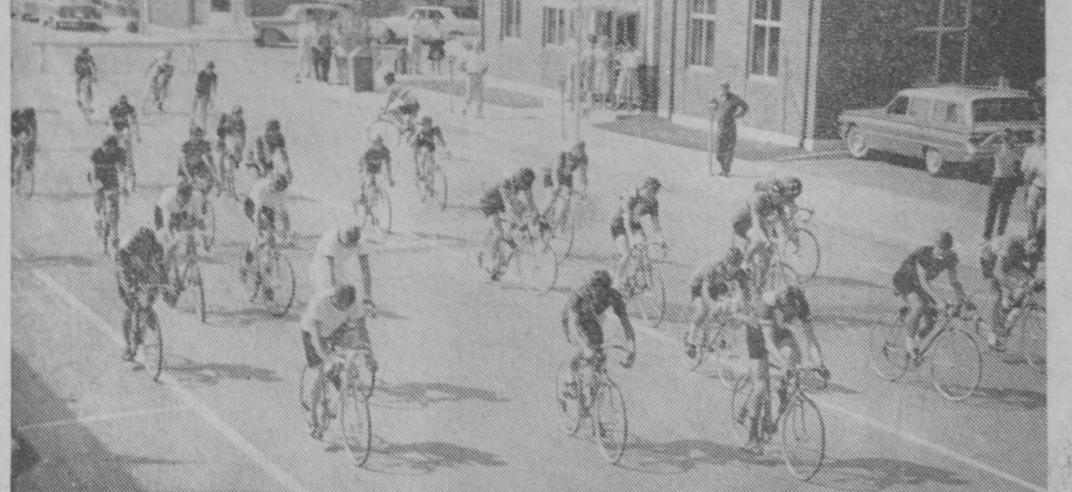

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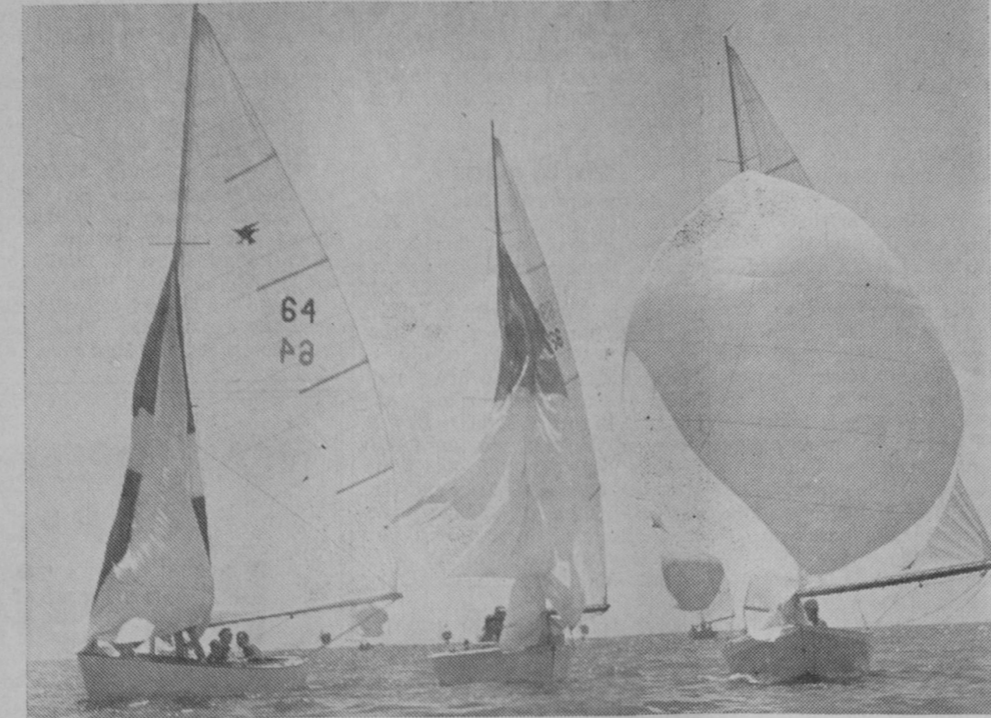

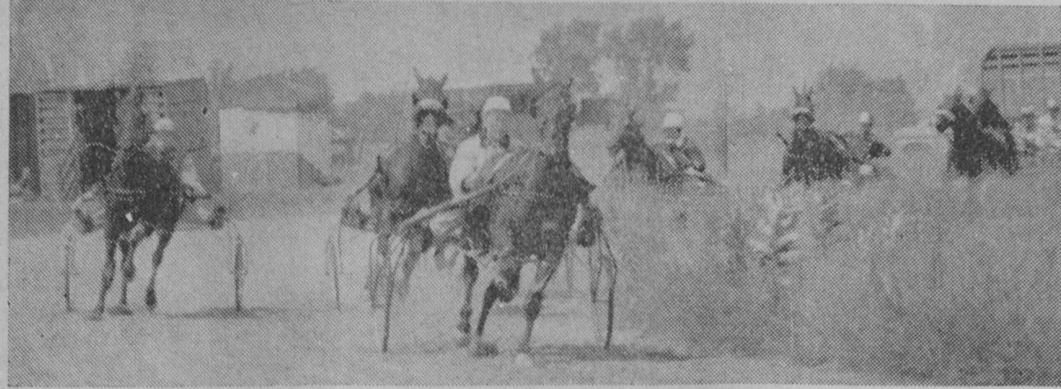

Iosco Teen-Agers Enter Labor Force At Increasing Rate

Teen-agers in Iosco County are entering the labor force at an increasing rate. They reflect the rising number of young persons in the 14-19 age bracket. These are the ones who were born during the baby-boom following World War II.

Many of them, according to government reports, are dropping out of school and going to work. Others are moving into the labor force immediately after finishing high school.

How to provide jobs for this flood of teen-agers is a prime problem.

Figures compiled by the United States Department of Commerce and the Department of Labor indicate just how big a problem it is.

In Iosco County, they show, the number of youngsters who will have reached the 14-19 age group in the five-year period ending 1965, will total 1,446.

On the basis of recent experience, 32.6 percent of them or 473, will be looking for full-time or part-time jobs before 1965.

In some areas of the country, an even greater proportion of teen-agers are cutting short their education creating an acute employment situation. Such drop-outs are finding a minimum of job opportunities, it is pointed out.

In the United States as a whole, 23.5 percent of the teen-age group are now to be found in the labor force by the time they reach 19. The ratio in the east, north and central states is 24.8 percent and, in the State of Michigan, 23.1 percent.

The problem will become even more severe in the subsequent five years, the reports show.

Between 1965 and 1970, the number of youngsters in Iosco County in the 14-19 bracket will amount to 1,682.

If they follow the current pattern and quit school at the same rate, 548 additional job openings will be needed for them within that period.

Nationally, according to Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz, the number of teen-agers in the labor market will jump from the 6.2 million counted in 1960 to 7.7 million in 1965 and to 8.4 million by 1970.

This prospect, he states, "sends up a warning signal that says to all Americans that the post-war population explosion is now making itself felt on the size and makeup of the labor force."

SUPERVISORS' PROCEEDINGS

JULY SESSION
July 17, 1963

Pursuant to June adjournment, the Iosco County Board of Supervisors was called to order at 9:30 a. m. by Chairman Oates, who ordered roll call. The following supervisors were present: Abbott, Ashton, Bellville, Blust, Everett, Gerard, LaVoy, Little, McKenzie, Meyers, Oates, O'Dell, Lixey, Smith, Webb. Absent: Campbell, Long, Stephan.

Communications were read and referred to the proper committees by the chairman.
Mr. McKenzie addressed the board and presented the prints and specifications of the new addition to the courthouse. He informed the board that the architect would be present after lunch and that the sealed bids would be at hand for opening for the pleasure of the board.

Mr. Higgins, representing Tawas Lake Dam Association, addressed the board and requested an answer of some sort to give property owners at Tawas Lake on the progress of the proposed dam across Tawas River.

Mr. Davenport addressed the board and presented copies to board members of a program of work for 1963-1964 of the Cooperative Extension Service.

Mr. Little again addressed the board concerning payment of autopsy bills. He wanted to go on record as one firmly opposed to the payment of autopsy accounts without a thorough check into the circumstances as to the possible cause of death. He stated that his

understanding was that autopsy was made only when there was some suspicion of foul play or unnatural causes.

There being no committees ready to report, committees were ordered to their respective duties. Balance of the board to be at ease subject to the call of the chair.
Upon call to order at 12 o'clock noon, the board recessed until 1:30 p. m. upon motion supported and prevailing.

AFTERNOON SESSION
Upon call to order at 1:30 p. m., roll call was ordered by the chairman. The same supervisors were present as at the morning session and Mr. Stephan took his seat.
Mr. Earl G. Schulwitz appeared before the board stating that he had at hand five sealed bids for the construction to the addition to the county building. He was asked by the board to then open the bids.

Judge Miller Denies Motion to Dismiss Damage Suit

An order was signed July 23 by Judge Allan C. Miller denying a motion to dismiss a damage suit brought by John Pinter, manager of the Holland Hotel, against George Warren of Saginaw.

Attorneys for Warren asked that the suit be dismissed on grounds that action was barred by the statute of limitations applying to causes in assault and battery. A second motion asking that the case be dismissed for failure to state a cause of action was also dismissed.

The lawsuit has grown out of an incident at the hotel November 17, 1959, in which Pinter's eye was injured. An argument allegedly started between Warren and another customer in the hotel lobby. Both Pinter and Ard E. Richardson, co-owners, were present and tried to stop the fight.

In the scuffle, Pinter was struck on the eye and hospitalized for a scratched eyeball. Claiming partial loss of vision, on November 16, 1962, Pinter started suit and asked judgment of \$75,000. At last week's hearing, Pinter's attorney said the suit was to recover hospital bills in the neighborhood of \$2,000 along with doctor bills.

Attorneys for Warren claim that he struck no blow and that the accident resulted, in no intentional act on his part, when Pinter "turned around suddenly and ran his eye into the outstretched finger of defendant, who was trying to point out another individual."

Assault and battery was stricken from the cause by Judge Miller, who ruled that element of an action in negligence was found. Warren has asked for a trial by jury.

District Health Unit Ready to Offer Home Nursing Services

Dr. E. A. Hasty, director of District Health Department No. 2, announces that the health department is prepared to offer home nursing services. Under this program, Dr. Hasty states, personnel from the health department will provide nursing services in the home to patients who have been designated to be in need of these services by their family physician.

Part of the program will include the teaching of others in the home to carry out nursing procedures. Your doctor and the health department nurses will work as a team to plan the best possible care for you. Therefore, the first step in getting nursing services in your home is to be under your doctor's care. "If your family doctor thinks it is advisable for you to have home nursing care, these services will be rendered in response to the doctor's orders," Dr. Hasty pointed out.

These services will not be rendered on a free basis. They will be provided on an hourly fee schedule basis for those who are able to pay. Dr. Hasty emphasized, however, that no one will be denied these services because of his inability to pay.

For information concerning this program, patients are advised to call the county nurse's office at Tawas City, the district health department office in West Branch or Mrs. Harold Drenberg's residence in Whittemore.

nie ordered that the north one-eighth line surveyed by R. J. Cooke as the dividing line between the two subdivisions. On June 10, the judge determined that the Zahariases and their successors in title "shall have the use and benefit of the ditch lying immediately to the north of said boundary line for drainage purposes and that right shall be a continuous easement until such time as it may be determined by surrender, abandonment or adjudication by a court of competent jurisdiction."

According to the motion for rehearing, denied by Judge Glennie, two property owners have allegedly caused a six-inch tile to be placed in the drainage ditch and have filled the ditch to ground level.

Judge Glennie was assigned to hear the cause when Iosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller disqualified himself. Miller once served as city attorney of Tawas City.
