Board OKs Salary Hike for 7 School Employees

Tawas Area Board of Education equalized its salary schedule for school custodians at its regular meeting Monday night. As a result, four custodians will receive an increase in pay while one will receive a decrease.

Effective July 1, salaries of Joseph Johnroe, Vaino Lake and Bernard Nelkie will be increased \$150 a year to an annual salary of

\$4,150. Wilmer Frank, who had been receiving \$3,850, will also receive \$4,150.

Ernest Nash, who had been receiving \$4,400 as head custodian was reduced to an annual salary of \$4,150. Some of his duties have changed under a general reorganization of the work schedule.

The salary of Fred Bublitz, maintenance superintendent, is to remain at \$5,250.

The custodial force works on a 40-hour basis during the summer months and 44 hours weekly during the school term.

Salary increases were also granted to the secretarial staff. Mrs. Ruth Minard, bookkeeper at the high school, received a \$200 increase on her annual salary of \$3,000; Miss Shirley Tarnosky, who had been receiving a salary of \$2,700, received an \$150 increase as did Miss Barbara Durant, whose salary is now \$2,510.

Mrs. Minard works on a 10-month basis. Miss Durant works 10½ months and Miss Tarnosky is hired on an annual basis.

General work policies in regard to the custodial staff, bus drivers and secretarial staff are to be adopted at the next meeting.

Inglis Ford Wins School Bus Contract

Inglis Ford Sales of Tawas City was successful bidder on furnishing a new 66-passenger school bus to the Tawas Area School District.

Inglis' bid for furnishing a Ford chassis, was \$82,100 under the bid of International Harvester Company. A third bid on the chassis was entered by William Look and Sons.

Accepting a bus with a Wayne body, total cost of the new unit is \$74,274.40.

Only one bid was received on constructing a new roof at the Tawas City annex. The bid of Curley Roofing, Oscoda, was tabled. The board is to readvertise for bids on the construction, which is to include removal of the old roof.

The board accepted a bid from Michigan School Service for furnishing three sets of bleachers for the athletic field. The school district is to purchase one set of bleachers at \$361. The varsity club and student council are to raise funds for purchase of the other two sections. With the three additional sections, the football field will have a seating capacity of 770. Bid of the Iosco County News was accepted for typewriter service.

Small Voter Turnout in Monday's School Election

Only a "handful" of voters turned out for Monday's election to name trustees to the Tawas Area Board of Education. All three incumbent candidates were unopposed.

A total of 250 voters went to the polls, including 87 at East Tawas; 114, Tawas City; 24, Grant-Tawas Townships, and 25, Alabaster-Whitney Townships.

Elected to a two-year term was Walter Champion with 224 votes. He received 71 votes at East Tawas; 107, Tawas City; 21, Grant-Tawas, and 25, Alabaster-Whitney.

Harold Hammond and Leonard Sarki were re-elected to four-year terms. Hammond received 63 votes at East Tawas; 98, Tawas City; 19, Grant-Tawas, and 25, Alabaster-Whitney.

Sarki received 63 votes at East Tawas; 76, Tawas City; 21, Grant-Tawas, and 14, Alabaster-Whitney.

There were a number of persons whose names were written in by voters. Merton Killey received 31 votes. Sixteen others tallied one or two votes.

W-P Electors Name McLean-Farro to Board
Keith McLean of Burleigh Township and William Farro of Prescott were elected to four-year terms on the Whittemore-Prescott Area Board of Education in Monday's annual election.

McLean was top vote-getter of the day which saw 293 votes cast in the election. The front-runner received 119 votes, followed by Farro's 75.

The two other candidates were Carl Youngs of Reno Township, 56 votes, and Roy Thompson of Mills Township, 43 votes.

McLean and Farro will succeed Earl Daugharty and Everett Smith, whose terms expired this year and chose not to run for re-election.

Maas and Brumfield Win Hale School Posts
Herman Maas and Dale Brumfield were elected to the Hale Area Board of Education in Monday's annual school election.

Maas received 158 votes compared to the 61 votes received by his opponent, Mrs. Marie Pember, for the four-year seat as trustee. Brumfield, unopposed for a one-year term to fill a vacancy, received 184 votes.

Bodies of Fishermen Recovered from Bay
Bodies of two fishermen who drowned in Saginaw Bay off Point Lookout Sunday, May 22, were recovered last Friday and Saturday. Bodies of two other fishermen in the same party were recovered June 1.

Found floating near Pt. AuGres Friday was the body of Wallace E. Zinck. On the following day, the body of Donald Schultz Jr., 13, washed up on shore near Sims Ranch.

Recovered June 1 about one mile off shore from Point Lookout were the bodies of August Yde of AuGres and Donald W. Schultz Jr. of Saginaw.

An area-wide search started May 22 when a boat used by the four fishermen was found overturned in the bay.

APARTMENT FIRE
Fire, smoke and water caused several hundred dollars in damage Monday afternoon to an apartment located next to Cowan Motor Sales, Tawas City.

Occupants of the apartment, Mr. and Mrs. William Purdy, had left Monday morning for Flint. About 2:20 that afternoon, smoke was pouring from the building.

Tawas Hospital marked its 10th anniversary of service to the community Tuesday afternoon with an informal tea. Ten and five-year pins were presented to employees.

To have been held on the lawn, the program was moved indoors because of cold weather.

Among those honored were six employees who took part in the hospital's first great contribution to the welfare of this community.

It was 10 years ago, June 8, 1953, when the hospital's doors were literally "blown open" to care for victims of a tornado which dipped down in Plainfield Township and then raced through Eastern Iosco County to Lake Huron north of East Tawas.

In its wake, the tornado left an 18-mile path of death and destruction. Iosco's worst tragedy of nature saw four persons killed and nine injured.

Tawas Hospital, which was completed but still awaited installation of some equipment in June 1953, was opened to victims of the storm. Supplies were quickly unpacked and a complement of doctors, nurses, nurses aides and many volunteers helped to treat the victims.

During its 10 years of operation, 17,894 patients have been cared for and 4,688 babies have been born in the hospital's maternity ward.

An organizational meeting of the board will be held Monday, July 1. This session will constitute the board's first regular meeting in July. It had been scheduled for the second Monday.

Members Named to County Board
Two new members were to have been elected to the Iosco Intermediate School District Board of Education at a meeting Tuesday night held at the county building.

Terms of Ira Scofield, Hale and Charles Harsch of Whittemore have expired.

Iosco's four school districts were to send delegates to the meeting to elect two members for six-year terms.

This is the first election of members since a state law changed formation of the old county district into an intermediate school district.

Under the new law, it is permissible to select board members at a general election, states Supt. William Tracy, and future elections may be held in this manner.

Other members of the intermediate school district board of education are Cecil Kennedy of Oscoda, Walter Niles of Tawas Township and Ronald Korthals of Wilber Township.

Oscoda Golf Course Set for Play Saturday

After more than 20 years without its own golfing facilities, the Oscoda area will hold a grand opening Saturday morning to officially open play at the AuSable River Golf Club.

Ceremonies will be held at 7 o'clock Saturday morning with the Rev. Henry P. DuBassel, pastor of Sacred Heart Church, hitting the first ball down the 10th fairway.

Philip Reed, manager of the golf club, said Monday that play would open on the back nine of the 18-hole layout. The front nine is to be ready for play shortly.

The new \$150,000 golf course, located on 203 acres west of US-23 near the Capehart housing unit and south of M-171, is equipped with a 40 by 80 split-level clubhouse. A pro shop, showers and locker rooms are located in the lower section with dining facilities on the top level. A patio overlooks the first tee.

The Oscoda area has been without a golf course since the early 1940s. The old nine-hole course was discontinued early during World War II and top soil was removed for use at the air base.

Several years ago, a group of Oscoda area golfing enthusiasts decided to study the possibility of a new course and on January 8, 1961, a corporation was formed to finance the venture through the sale of stock.

Heading up the group has been Howard Eymmer, first president of the association, Hugh Bissonette is secretary and Vernon Hawkins, treasurer.

Work started last summer on preparing the course, which borders the AuSable River. VanEttan Creek also courses through the property.

These two waterways, along with construction of several artificial lakes, were incorporated into the layout by Frederick A. Ellis of the architectural firm of Ellis, Arndt and Truesdell, Flint.

Depending upon the type of play—men's, women's and championship division—total length of the 18 holes range from 6,000 to 6,800 yards.





GRASSROOTS GLEANINGS
 by Bill Stokes

Do you ever get the feeling that maybe the space age is moving too doggone fast in some areas? I got that feeling some time ago when I thumbed through the *Redfield (S.D.) Press* and read that the modern way to spread fertilizer is with aircraft.

"No waste, even distribution, fast application," the advertisement read. I'd just like to know if the fellow who wrote that ad copy ever had to hand-spread a load of manure on a windy, wintery day? The daily manure run was one of my youthful chores when school wasn't in session, and I can vividly remember the necessity for developing a successful spreading technique. When throwing a forkful into the teeth of a blizzard, for example, it is absolutely essential to turn your face immediately away from the direction in which you have thrown.

Frequently, I suffered the consequences of not moving quickly enough. One learns from such experience. We used a bobsled and a team of horses, and the horses were guided from a precarious perch on the rear of the sled. You had to stand with your feet spread wide apart, because it just wasn't smart to fall to either side. Nor was it advisable to fall forward. This meant that you leaned backward, and if you lost your balance, the chances were fair that you'd fall off the back of the sled. This made for a longer but much cleaner fall.

Sometimes when a runner of the sled hit a rock, there would be a sudden interruption of forward progress, and avoiding a forward fall was absolutely impossible. It is an unforgettable experience, and must be the basis for the saying about it being possible to take the boy out of the farm but not the farm out of the boy.

My father was a very particular barn keeper. He demanded that the floor be white and spotless. It is only too obvious that he wasn't concerned about his son staying in like condition. Dad's way of telling me to make the manure run was to assure me that I needed the fresh air. I could never quite figure out how you were supposed to get any fresh air while riding on a mound of manure.

I never asked him about it though, because he would have told me to "think fresh," and under the circumstances I just wasn't up to it.

An editorial in the *Crookston (Minn.) Daily Times* criticizes college boys for "that silly and dangerous business" of competing

for the record of being tumbled in a clothes dryer for as long as possible. You can't but tend to agree with the *Crookston* editor that it is silly and dangerous, but you just might ask why this hasn't given someone the idea of marketing a machine especially designed to wash boy—*younger boys.*



The machine would, of course, have to slow down the agitator action and provide for an air supply while a boy was going through the washing cycle. And if most boys are anything like ours, there would have to be a huge sand and mud filter on the machine's drain in order to avoid plugging up the plumbing. If enough mothers would like to see a clean-boy-machine, perhaps this column can persuade a manufacturer to try the project.

A United Press item that doubtless appeared elsewhere also, but which came to this column's attention in the *Watertown (Wis.) Daily Times*, said that people could improve their posture by acting like cats.

It said that if a person would get down on all fours and arch his back like a cat, his posture would improve. Another suggested exercise was the "dog stretch" in which you bend down from a standing position until the palms touch the floor. The fingers are then "walked" forward until the body is in "push-up" position. The feet are walked toward the hands and you stand up straight or straighter.



Now, if I tried either of these exercises the following things would likely happen: someone would step on my fingers, one of the kids would jump on my back, the dog would bite me, my wife would demand I smell my breath, and if the neighbors were looking in the window they'd call the police.



OLD FASHIONED STRAWBERRY SHORTCAKE

1 quart fresh strawberries, cut in half
 1 cup sugar
 2 cups sifted flour
 2 teaspoons baking powder
 1 teaspoon salt
 1 cup sugar
 1 cup shortening
 1 egg, beaten
 1 cup milk
 2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine
 1 cup heavy cream, whipped

Combine strawberries and 1 cup sugar; mix well. Sift flour, baking powder, salt and 1/2 cup sugar together. Cut in shortening. Add egg and milk and mix lightly. Knead gently 10 minutes. Roll out on lightly floured surface into 8-inch circle. Press lightly into greased 8-inch layer pan. Bake in hot oven (400°) 30 minutes. Split layer in half. Push lower half with butter or margarine. Top with half of strawberries, half of cream and remaining layer. Top with remaining strawberries and cream.





Turn out on floured board or pastry cloth and press dough together. Cover or wrap in waxed paper. Place in refrigerator while preparing Strawberry Rhubarb Filling. Roll about two-thirds of dough to circle ⅞-inch thick and fit into 9-inch pie pan. Trim edge. Roll remaining dough out to rectangle about ⅞-inch thick. Using a pastry wheel or knife, cut dough into strips ⅞-inch wide. Turn filling into bottom crust. Arrange strips diagonally over pie filling like spokes of wheel. (Or, if desired, bake strips on pan and place on filling after baking pie.) Brush rim of pastry with water. Place strip around edge and then press firmly. Bake in hot oven (425°F.) 35 to 40 minutes. (Bake pastry strips 10 to 12 min.)

Strawberry Rhubarb Filling

1 cup sugar (about)
¼ cup flour
½ teaspoon cinnamon
¼ teaspoon salt

3 cups sliced fresh rhubarb
2 cups whole or sliced strawberries*

Combine sugar, flour, cinnamon and salt. Add to rhubarb and strawberries and mix lightly. Turn into bottom crust. Makes one 9-inch pie.

*Frozen strawberries which have been thawed and well drained may be substituted for fresh strawberries, if desired.

20-INCH ROWS, 33,500 PLANTS, 301 BUSHEL

If you should stop by the farm of Richard M. Smith & Sons near Medina, Ohio this summer, you'd likely see an outstanding example of thick corn planting and what can happen under favorable conditions.

For the past six years the Smiths have planted a one-acre plot of corn in 20-inch rows on bottom land soil. They attain a plant population of about 33,500. This is done by setting the planter to drop a kernel every 7 inches.

This exceptional acre yielded 301 bushels. His harvest stalk count on 40-inch rows was 20,000 per acre.

Admittedly, this plot is experimental, but it's an attempt to see what can be done. The Smiths account for their yields this way:

"First we put on lots of manure . . . at least 100 tons. Then we plowed down 1,000 pounds of 12-12-12. We plowed only once.

"At planting we applied 500 pounds of 6-24-12 with the planter. This past year we sprayed with Atrazine and didn't cultivate. At silking time we irrigated with urea dissolved in river water. We applied 125 pounds of actual nitrogen."

To irrigate with urea they dump it into a barrel to dissolve. Then they use a suction pump to take the fertilizer solution out of the barrel where it is mixed with more water and sprayed on the field.

To get 20-inch rows they use a standard 2-row planter set for 40-inch rows, then swing the drawbar and go over the field again in the same tracks.

Mr. Smith in commenting on this experimental plot observed: "This would be practical if it could be harvested by machine."

But the Smiths don't only get tremendous yields on "souped-up" experimental plots; they attain big yields on all of their cropland. In 1962 they averaged 150 bushels on the upland fields and 186 bushels on river bottom fields. Here's the corn growing program they followed this past year on their 61 acres of corn grown for grain, as well as the 16 silage acres.

1. They spread sawdust and sloppy manure all winter . . . whenever weather and ground permitted.

2. They spread 500 pounds of 12-12-12 on the bottom land that is in continuous corn. The upland got 400 pounds per acre. They spread just ahead of plowing.

3. Good plowing at the right time. This is one of the most important keys to getting high corn yields, Smiths believe. "We're never in a hurry to plow," Smith says. "We like to plow when it's not too wet, yet just ahead of planting. In fact, we like to plow one day and plant the next."

"If the ground is plowed at the right moisture, one disking is enough. Once over with a double disk and our ground is ready for planting."

4. At planting, 6-24-12 was applied at the rate of 250 pounds per acre.

5. Used chemical weed control. This year they used Atrazine on the bottom land, 2-4D on the upland.

"We've had continuous corn in our river bottom for the past four years and it gets better every year," observed Smith.

On the uplands the Smiths use a rotation system. "We leave the meadows as long as they're good; some of 'em are 8 to 10 years old," he said. "We re-seed after corn with alfalfa-brome."

One thing's for sure with the Smiths, when there's a chance for boosting corn yields through improved methods, they'll give it a try. "We try to do the same thing in our dairy operation. We can't afford to do otherwise," he says.

Last year Keith Smith, Jasper, Michigan had a yield check showing 165.8 bushels per acre in a test area . . . and his whole crop from nearly 100 acres averaged out an even 150 bushels. "This is a jump of 20.8 bushels per acre from my yield check a year ago," says Smith.

Smith is a young farmer who aims for top efficiency as he steadily expands his business. Already the owner of 120 acres, he rents an additional 60 and he pushes for top yields of both corn and wheat on all the land he handles. He is now feeding 100 head of beef cattle and is working on plans to expand to around 300 head.

Using a special fertilizer program for corn, Keith Smith is following fertilizer recommendations based on a complete test of the soils in each field. Last year he applied 400 lbs. of 5-20-20 per acre at the row, placing fertilizer to one side and below the seed. Then he followed with a sidedress application of anhydrous ammonia. For continuous corn he figures a minimum of 100 pounds of actual nitrogen is probably needed in addition to the 20 lbs. or so contributed by the row application of fertilizer.

On his naturally fertile soils, Keith plants 21,000 kernels to the acre, aiming for a harvest time population of 18,500 to 19,000 ear bearing stalks. His high yielding corn in 1962 was one of the single crosses. With his fertilizer program, this single cross produced sound, well-filled uniform ears at the high population needed for 150+ bushels corn.

The program Smith follows is well within the reach of most Top Farmers in the Midwest.

How far should you go with corn plant productions?

One of the best informed men in the world on the subject of corn plant populations and the many factors which contribute to resultant yields is Mr. G. H. Stringfield, research agronomist for DeKalb Seed Corn.

What is a thick corn stand? Stringfield's answer was that any finished stand of 12,000 plants per acre or more in the southern part of the corn belt is heavy corn. In the north, 16,000 or more is considered high. You find quite a number of finished stands of 20,000 or more. He said that the great majority of farmers plant at less than 16,000. He further explained that plants are smaller in the north and therefore more are needed to fill an acre. Fewer large, leafy plants in the south provide as much shading effect as larger counts of smaller plants up north.

"String" says that any farmer who really knows his farm . . . has been growing corn on it for years . . . has a good chance of being able to increase his stands without running into trouble. He says such a farmer can almost produce the size crop he desires by proper seed corn selection, proper rates and ratios of applied fertilizer, and high populations. Of course, nature must cooperate.

The successful farmer isn't bashful about the use of fertilizer. It takes certain amounts of basic elements to produce certain amounts of corn. It's that simple . . . low plant food level . . . low yields."

One of the rules of thumb he gave as a guide to plant populations in a given field was: "An optimum stand should produce

air dry ears that average a half a pound or slightly more."

String listed environment factors and genetic factors which should be considered. Environmental factors include: Soil productivity — texture, slope and drainage along with sufficient nutrients; weather and climate — the higher the rainfall, the higher the plant populations (North and Eastern Iowa up to 9,500 plants per acre and parts of Indiana up to 20,000); day length — shorter seasons up north. Hybrids require higher populations to utilize each acre.

Listed among genetic factors are shade tolerance — some varieties are much more tolerant. Stringfield feels shading can cut yields by a third. Barrenness can also be linked with shading feels Stringfield. Stalk quality is a genetic factor.

A resistance to stalk rots as well as a good strong rind is a protection against a tangled mess at harvest time. A good root anchor can also prevent lodging and the greater genetic tendency toward prolificacy, the lower the incidence of barrenness.

Another set of conditions that have led to serious trouble is heavy stands and low fertility.


