





Hill Ends USG Job as Diesel Operator

Elgin E. "Red" Hill, 64, Tawas City, retired effective last week after 17 years with United States Gypsum Company, Alabaster. He had been on sick leave since last October.

A diesel locomotive operator for the past 12 years, Hill started with USG in 1945 as a repairman in the quarry.

As a locomotive operator, he had made between six and seven

trips daily between the quarry and crusher operation. Each train carried approximately 110 tons of gypsum rock.

His first job with USG was also in connection with the rock moving operation. He installed a set of flutes in one of the old steam locomotives, a trade which he learned as an apprentice with the Detroit and Mackinac Railway.

Prior to his employment with USG, Hill had worked for Dafoe Boat Works, Consumers Power Company, Rowley Manufacturing Company, the state and county road commissions.

Three of his sons, Frank, Alton and Vernon, are presently employed by the gypsum firm.

Born in Saginaw County, as a child he moved to Rose City with his parents. The family later lived at Hale and he came to Tawas City when 18 years old.

During retirement, Hill plans "to do a little work in my garden and catch up on my fishing." He and his wife, Frances, make their home at 906 Harris Avenue.

Public Hearing Set on Proposed Zoning Change in Tawas City

A resolution was adopted by the city council Monday night calling for a public hearing to be held July 15, 8:00 p. m., to hear objections toward rezoning industrial property in the Tawas City Second Ward to residential A.

This action came on recommendation of the city planner and planning commission, following discussion of recent months concerning location of an industrial zone in a residential area.

Proposed rezoning would include Lots 14 through 20 in Block Two and Block Five, south of First Street. It has been emphasized in the past that such rezoning would have no effect on present industrial use of the property under current ownership.

Part of the property in question contains a cement block building in which Tawas Trailers, Incorporated, is located.

Claim 'First' for New Fly-In Furniture Store

Stanley R. Lane Jr., manager of Bargaintown, Tawas City, announced last week that an airstrip adjoining the West Branch store has been completed. The airport will be known as Bargaintown Airport and the West Branch store will cater to pilots from all over Michigan.

"There are plenty of drive-in furniture stores, but I believe this is the first 'fly-in' furniture store in the country," states Lane.

Grand opening of the airport will be July 4.

Find Abandoned Auto; Stolen from Wurtsmith

An auto which was reportedly stolen from Wurtsmith Air Force Base was found Sunday on the new airport road north of East Tawas. The car had become mired in loose sand and attempts to push it out of the sand by two unknown subjects was to no avail.

US-23 Plans Discussed; City Wants Roll Curb Retained

Preliminary plans for widening, modernizing and resurfacing US-23 through Tawas City were presented at Monday night's council meeting by district representatives of the state highway department.

Joining in the discussion were members of the Tawas City Planning Commission and several local residents. Representing the highway department were Fred Eggen, district field representative, and Frank DesChamps, district engineer, both of Alpena.

It was announced that bids are to be let for construction August 14. Curbs are to be constructed and widening accomplished this fall with blacktopping of the entire route from Townline Road to the east city limit next spring.

Discussion disclosed that the highway department plans to eliminate all roll curbs on the lake side of US-23 through the city and replace with straight curbs. The highway will be widened to 52 feet from Townline Road to Sunset Motel where it will taper back to two lanes over the Tawas River

Bridge and back to the 52-foot width connecting with the existing four lanes.

Elimination of the roll curbs brought immediate objection from council members and the planning commission, who felt that this would eliminate a considerable amount of parking spaces. At present, motorists may drive over the curb and park vehicles on the lake side of US-23 from Coyle's Service to Cholger's Service, from Rainbow Service past the county building to the east end of the city park and from the Tawas Chamber of Commerce to the east city limit.

Eggen said that construction of roll curbs is against present highway policy. One reason for this, he said, was that a straight curb improves street drainage. He also pointed out that cars pulling off the shoulder interferes with traffic flow.

The highway representative said that US-23 is actually considered a two-lane highway through Tawas City, inasmuch as parking is not prohibited in the two outside

lanes. "All we ask is city officials to accept the fact that when traffic volumes dictate, parking (in the outer lanes) will have to go," said Eggen.

Hugo Keiser, chairman of the city's planning commission, pointed out that long-range planning as outlined last year by the highway department, indicated that Tawas City would eventually be bypassed by US-23. Under the circumstances, he said it would be difficult to provide additional off-street parking because of the lake on one side and Tawas River on the north.

Principal objection by council and planning commission members was elimination of the roll curb in front of the post office to the east end of the city park. Opinions were expressed by Councilman Howard Hatton and others that parking in the outer lane on the lake side in this area was particularly dangerous.

Mayor George Tuttle suggested the possibility of moving the curb approximately four feet toward the lake in front of the city park to provide additional parking. Eggen said that this would raise the project's cost and suggested possible financial participation by the city.

Robert Shattuck, representing the city's planning consultant, Villean-Leman and Associates, Incorporated, said that long-range development of the park was important to the community and that elimination of parking and easy access to this public facility would be severe.

Eggen said he would take the question of straight versus roll curb at the park "under advisement." He said this concerns a matter of department policy and would be investigated further.

Eggen also pointed out that plans presented Monday night were preliminary to the actual road plans. He said that the meeting was called to clear up any possible misunderstanding about construction. No public hearing is scheduled for the project.

DesChamps pointed out that a number of gasoline service stations south of the river bridge had pumps located on or very close to the highway right-of-way. He said that pumps on state property would have to be removed and some stations may not have access to pumps on the traffic side.

The highway representatives said that written notice is also to be given to all owners to remove signs from the highway right-of-way. This includes some signs in the business district which project over the sidewalk located on the highway right-of-way.

Plantation to Honor Memory of Forester

A forest plantation will be dedicated Saturday, June 22, to honor the memory of William B. Piper. This event will take place within Huron National Forest on Monument Road two miles south of Lumbermen's Monument at 2:00 p. m.

Mr. Piper's friends and the public are invited to attend.

Born November 21, 1880, at Cambridge, Massachusetts, Piper received his master degree as forester from Yale in 1905. That same year, he entered the United States Forest Service as forest assistant and was sent to Saratoga, Wyoming.

From 1905 until 1910, Piper remained in the western United States on various forest activities with frequent trips to Washington, D. C. In 1911, he was appointed forest supervisor of what was then known as Marquette and Michigan Forest with headquarters at AuSable-Oscoda.

In 1916, he resigned from the forest service and remained at East Tawas serving on the board of education, city council and Iosco Board of Supervisors.

With the advent of the OCC program, he was initially employed as foreman. During 1933-1934, he was instrumental in training technical foresters who were then employed in the eight OCC camps within Huron National Forest. After termination of the OCC program, Piper acted as assistant ranger of the Tawas district.

In 1945, Piper retired from the forest service and was employed by the AuSable Forest Products Association as secretary-treasurer

Three Hurt in Grant Auto Crash

Three persons were injured in an accident Sunday evening on Beck Road, Grant Township.

Treated at Tawas Hospital were Gertrude Anderson, 19, National City, driver of the car, and two passengers, Kathy Miller and Sherry Martin, both 15.

Miss Martin is the most seriously injured. She sustained a fractured collar bone, fractured vertebra and abrasions. Miss Miller received a lacerated left leg and abrasions, while the driver sustained minor hurts.

Investigating officers learned from witnesses that the car apparently met another car while attempting to pass on Beck Road. The car skidded and the driver lost control, the vehicle rolling in a ditch.

Lauwers and Hall Repeat as Tawas River Canoe Champs

Gerald Lauwers of Tawas City and Stanley Hall of Oscoda retained their Tawas River canoe race title Sunday afternoon by finishing ahead of 19 other teams.

Winning last year's East Tawas centennial race, Lauwers and Hall completed Sunday's race from Tawas Lake to the Tawas City Park in 53 minutes, 54 seconds.

The winners were nearly a minute ahead of the second place team of Ron Hohman and Ralph Sawyer, who completed the course in 54 minutes, 50 seconds. Third place went to Albert and Pat Widing of Holly with a time of 55 minutes, 37 seconds.

Cash awards of \$75, \$25 and \$15 went to the first three places along with trophies down to the 10th place team.

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Recreational Phase of Master Plan Presented

Tawas City Planning Commission completed its second step toward development of a master plan for the city at its regular meeting last Thursday. A recreation and community facilities study was presented by the planning consultants, Villean-Leman and Associates, Incorporated.

Included in the study are recommendations for the provision of adequate facilities and services related to desirable land use and community development.

The report places special emphasis on evaluating recreation as it pertains to tourists and "seasonal" residents. Several "sketch" site plans have been included in the study to show the possible development of future parks and recreational facilities.

Second part of the report deals with community facilities, including the fire station, city hall, library, DPW garage-yard and the municipal sewer and water systems. These facilities are evaluated in terms of present adequacy and capacity for meeting expected future needs.

Some of the major findings and recommendations contained in the report are:

1. The city should eventually

develop a citywide park facility on the publicly-owned land adjacent to the Tawas City Elementary Unit and Dead Creek.

2. The present Tawas City Park on US-23 should be expanded and developed as a major tourist and vacationer facility. A plan has been prepared showing the nature and timing of these recommended developments.

3. The Tawas River mouth area should eventually be developed as a marina and boating facility. It is likely that the actual construction

of such a facility would be accomplished by private enterprise; however, the city could further this development through its land improvement and control policies.

Completion of this and subsequent master plan studies are being financed under a Federal 701 Planning Grant. Studies to follow will include the economic base analysis major thoroughfare plan, public improvements program, future land use plan and the preparation of a new zoning ordinance and subdivision regulations.

Eligibility Requirements Tighten on Fed. Surplus

The United States Department of Agriculture is requiring states to tighten up eligibility requirements immediately for persons receiving surplus commodities, reports Edward Burgeson, Iosco welfare director.

This will make a new certification of eligibility necessary on all cases receiving surplus commodities who have non-public assistance members in the household or who are not receiving any form of assistance.

Eligibility for commodity assistance must now be determined on the basis of an entire household and all income from all members must be considered, said Burgeson. No individual members within a household may now be certified as eligible for commodities.

Tawas City Signs Lease for Boat Ramp

Tawas City Council, with approval of the city park board, has signed a lease with the Detroit and Mackinac Railway for use of property north of the Tawas River bridge as a boat launching ramp.

This property, located east of Ninth Avenue, is located in an area once occupied by a number of private boat wells. The city leased a strip of land measuring 75 by 95 feet.

Including city-owned property, the launching ramp will have 215 feet along Ninth Avenue with an 155-foot width to the river. The property has a river frontage of approximately 225 feet to the east from Ninth Avenue.

Construction of a public boat ramp has been under consideration for several months. Several sites have been investigated before final action was taken.

Leasing the property will cost the city \$50 annually. The agreement may be terminated by either party on 30 days written notice.

Plans for the ramp are now being prepared by the city's planning consultant.

The council also voted to make a donation of \$50 toward assisting owners of a marina on the west side of the river mouth with dredging the river. This work was completed two weeks ago.

Deceased Veterans' Dependents Will Receive 10% Raise

Approximately 1,800 children and 1,300 dependent parents of deceased Michigan veterans will receive an increase of about 10 percent in their monthly dependency and indemnity compensation payments in July.

Robert M. FitzGerald, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office, Detroit, said today that the increases are the result of a new law signed by the president last week.

The increased payments will be automatic and will be reflected in the July checks mailed about August 1, Mr. FitzGerald explained. A child now receiving \$70 per month will receive \$77 per month under the new law.

Two children, currently receiving \$100 a month, will receive \$110 equally divided between them.

Three children, receiving \$130 per month, will receive \$143, also equally divided among them. If there are more than three children, each additional child will add \$28 to the total, which still is equally divided.

In case of dependent parents living together with annual income of less than \$1,000, their present payment of \$50 each will be increased to \$55 each under the new law.

Nationwide, more than 45,000 children and 30,000 parents will benefit, Mr. FitzGerald explained.

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
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LOOKING BACKWARD—

Congregation to Celebrate Final Mortgage Payment

June 19, 1903—The Rev. Saylor, rector of Christ Episcopal Church, East Tawas, announced today that the mortgage on the church building was paid and canceled. This is pleasing news to the people of the community and members of the church are to be congratulated. Mr. Saylor said that consecration services would be held some time in July.

Disabled Workers Should Check on Benefit Eligibility

Shakespeare said, "defer no time; delays have dangerous ends." This advice could apply to severely disabled workers who fail to check with the social security office about their eligibility for disability benefits.

Paul M. Ellifritz, manager of the Bay City social security office, has pointed out that some disabled workers and their families may not be getting social security disability insurance benefits because they have not applied for them. Further, delay can cost the disabled worker benefits because there is a limit on the payment of back benefits. In addition, a person who waits for more than 18 months after he has become disabled before applying for benefits may find that he can no longer meet the work requirements.

Disabled individuals also are reminded by Mr. Ellifritz that disability benefits can be paid only to those under age 64½ years and those who have been working in employment or self-employment covered by social security for at least a five-year period out of the 10 years before disability began. The condition must be such that the worker is unable to do any kind of work—in the words of the law "unable to engage in any substantial gainful activity." Inability to continue in former work is not necessarily sufficient to qualify for disability benefits under social security.



Further Discussion on Rerouting Drain

Proposed rerouting of a drain crossing Fifth Avenue brought further discussion at Monday night's Tawas City Council meeting.

Mrs. Ronald Wiltse and Mrs. Goyle Kiley, who reside on the east side of the street, requested additional information concerning discussion on the drain at the last council meeting.

They expressed fears that deepening the ditch may be a hazard to small children in the area. Reginald Blitz, city superintendent, said that the engineering on the project had not been obtained as yet. The city engineer is to determine if the ditch on the west side of the street could be cleaned to allow drainage north to M-55 or south to the North Street drain.

It was pointed out that the city is concerned only with water draining from property west of Fifth Avenue. The drain running east is located on private property.

Because of the fact that a tube running under Fifth Avenue is higher than the ditch, very little water, if any, crosses to the east, stated Blitz.

The two visitors also asked for enforcement of the weed control ordinance in their neighborhood. Yockey Construction Company of Alpena was awarded a bid to resurface city streets next month. The firm is also contractor for street work at East Tawas and is to be in this vicinity between July 8-15.

Total cost of the project is \$3,025.56. Yockey will prime and double seal 6,355 square yards of streets at a cost of \$1,684. 3,055 square yards of double seal coat at \$702.65 and 5,555 square yards of single seal at \$638.82.

One other bid was received from Alcona Paving Company, Harrisville. Building applications approved during the past week were as follows: Clyde M. Evril, 308 Third Avenue, replace three windows and reside; residence with brick and aluminum, \$1,500; Keith L. McCorm, 716 West Lake, construct patio and awnings on front of motel, \$850.
