
Rock Hunting "Gems"














Each year, more people are striking it rich in outdoor fun collecting rocks and minerals in Michigan. Specimens that may be worked into pendants, earrings, and other jewelry are found in a number of places with the foremost area being the Keweenaw Peninsula---"Copper Country." Shores of Lake Superior are some of the best collecting places; colorful agates and thomsonites are much sought after along pebble beaches. Waste rock dumps of old copper mines offer excellent opportunities for finding such treasures as datolite. Another rock that takes a gem-like finish is jaspilite, found in the Marquette region of the "Iron Country." Garnet and magnetite are other popular collector's Country." Garnet and magnetite are other popular collector's items from this country. Among the lower peninsula's outstanding display specimens are calcite crystals, located in limestone quarries near Monroe. The Petoskey stone, a fossil common in beach rubble along the south shore of Little Traverse Bay, rates high on the wanted list of many "gem" hunters.
