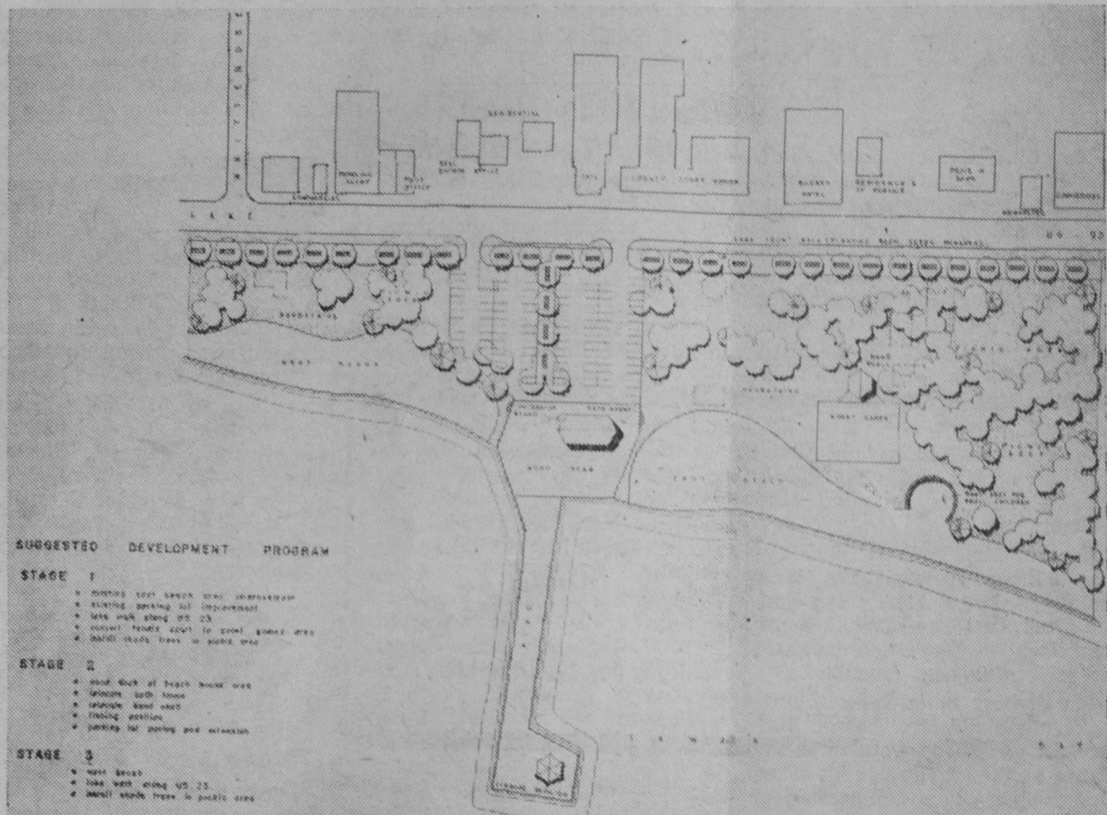

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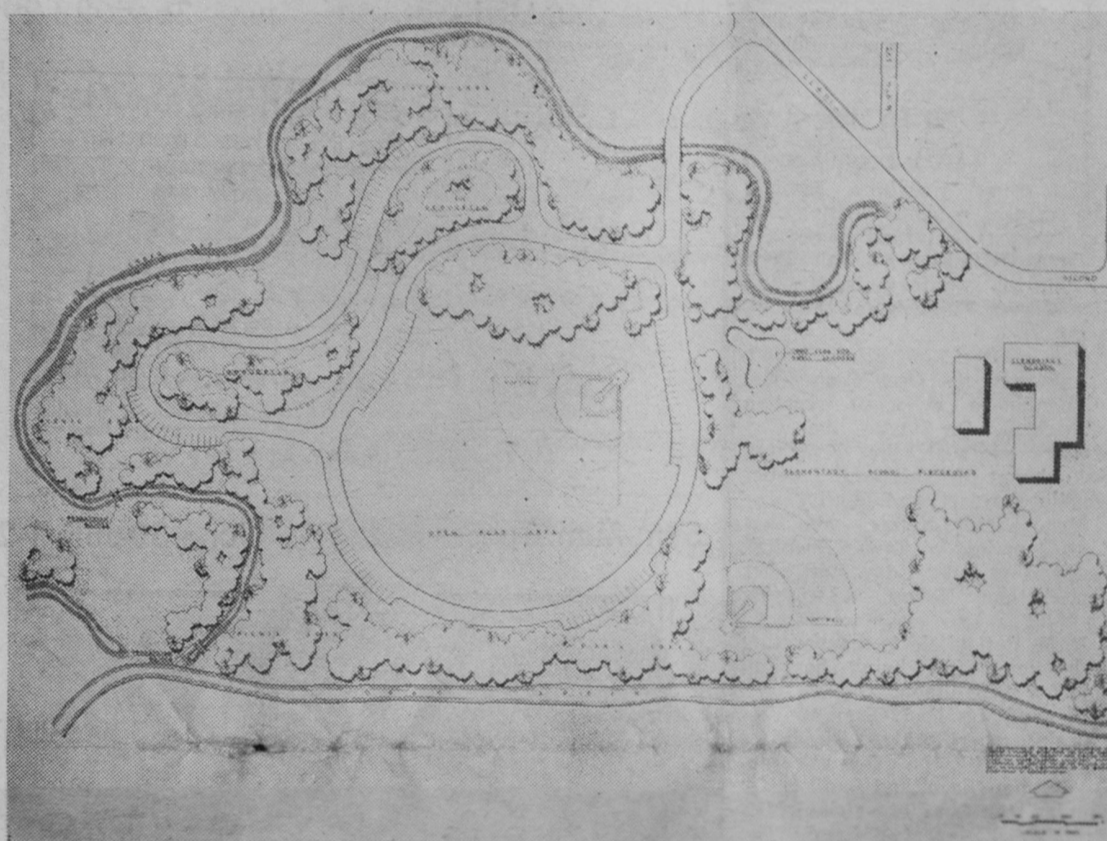
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### Proposed Tawas City Park Development . . .



SECOND PHASE of Tawas City's master plan, presented last week, included proposed developments to two parks. The above sketch shows proposed future developments to the Tawas City Park, considered to be one of the most important elements of the city's recreation program. Because of the natural attraction of Tawas Bay and the beach, this park has potential for becoming a major vacation and tourist attraction. Up to the present time, this potential has not been fully realized because of the size and condition of the existing park area. The proposed development plan indicates three general stages by which needed improvements and ex-

pansion could be accomplished. During the first stage, emphasis would be placed on improving the over-all appearance and quality of the present park area. This could be done by improving the quality of the swimming beach and giving the park a more attractive appearance from US-23 by planting, landscaping and construction of a sidewalk and perhaps a rolled curb. Later, additional beach area and new facilities could be provided. It is recommended that the park be expanded to approximately nine acres in size, an increase of slightly more than five acres from the present area and would also add nearly 1,000 lineal feet of shoreline.



EXPANSION of a neighborhood playground park is being recommended on city property west of the Tawas City Elementary Unit. Proposed as a future city-wide facility, the park is located on approximately 15.7 acres of land presently owned by the city. At present, one baseball diamond is located there and the proposed plan calls for construction of a second diamond. The sketch shows a circular driveway entering from Harris Avenue with parking

places and several picnic areas. Construction of this park could also be accomplished in several stages and a considerable amount of work has already been started. One of the important things to be recognized, states the report, is the need to reserve this public land for future park purposes. Development for some other purpose would be rather difficult because of the fact that the area is almost isolated by the former Dead Creek stream bed.
