New Methods Eyed in \$7,000 **Street Program**

Two new methods of road stabilization will be used in East Tawas' \$7,000 street construction program during the next month. Yockey Construction Company of Alpena has been contracted to construct 1.15 miles of streets, with stabilization to be completed before July 1 and seal coating within two weeks following that date.

Wadsworth Street is to be stabilized with rock salt and gravel. After a period for curing, the road will then receive a prime coat and double seal.

Airport Road from Tawas Lake Road to Wadsworth is to receive an asphalt stabilization process and then seal-coated. Paul Ropert, superintendent of public works, said these two stabilization methods have the same load bearing qualities as the more expensive stabilization with gravel.

Other streets to receive prime and double seal are Smith Street from Franklin to Bennington and Sawyer from Franklin to Jefferson. One block of State Street shoulder from Church to Locke Street is to receive asphalt stabilization with single seal.
