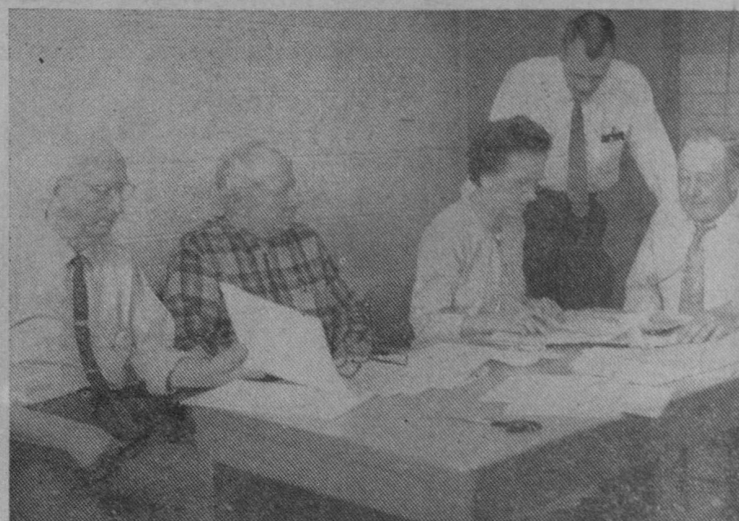

Find 'Human and Mechanical' Errors—

No Change in Iosco's Vote on Constitution

Monday's scheduled recount of the state constitutional vote in Iosco County turned into a complete fiasco as only four of the 11 precincts could be checked because of "human and mechanical errors" by election boards.

George Grits, chairman of the Iosco County Canvassing Board, said that election officials in every one of the 11 voting precincts checked had sealed ballot boxes improperly.

showed no changes in the April tally of votes.

In checking over ballots of the various precincts, Thomas Bradford, representing the state board of canvassers, said that local election boards had done a "beautiful job on the actual counting and tallying of ballots. Only one "no" vote and one "yes" vote were challenged and the canvassing board ruled in favor of election boards in both cases.

However, human and mechanical errors crept into the picture in every precinct. For instance, seal numbers were not recorded in Tawas City's poll books, ballot boxes were improperly sealed in Baldwin, Wilber, Reno and Tawas Townships.

East Tawas' ballot boxes could be reopened without breaking the seal. Seals on voting machines at Oscoda did not coincide with number in poll books and could not be recounted.

Three Schools Get Slight Millage Hike

Final tax allocation to four Iosco area schools were approved last Friday at a meeting of chairmen from tax allocation boards from Iosco, Ogemaw and Arenac Counties.

Three of Iosco's school districts received slight millage increases for operating expenses during the 1963-1964 school term, but were much lower than millage figures approved last month by Iosco Allocation Board.

Tawas Area School District, which requested 8.4 mills, was approved for 8.1; Hale Area, which requested 8.7 mills from the local allocation board, received 8.09 mills, while a similar amount was granted to Whittemore-Prescott Area School. Oscoda Area School District asked for and was granted eight mills.

Chairmen of the three tax allocation boards are required to reach agreement on a uniform tax rate between counties in which school districts cross county lines.

Acting on the board were Benjamin Richardson, Ogemaw County; Alfred Campbell, Arenac County; Arden Charters, Iosco County.

Hospital Marks 10th Anniversary

Tawas Hospital is celebrating its 10th anniversary with an informal tea on the front lawn between 2:00 and 4:00 p. m. Tuesday, June 11. Ten-year and five-year pins will be awarded to employees at this time.

During the 10 years of operation, 17,894 patients have been cared for and 4,668 babies have been born.

The hospital staff wishes to express appreciation to the board, clubs and associations who have given so generously to beautifying the grounds with shrubs and trees; the auxiliary for the new equipment and supplies.

Tawas City Department of Public Works approved three building applications during the past week.

Permits were issued to Walter Zaleski, 1005 Bay Drive, install new roof, \$150; Norbert L. Papke, German Street, erect new residence, \$3,000; Earl Goupil, 200 Second Avenue, repair front porch, \$100.

Council Picks New Site for Boat Ramp

Another possible site for a municipal boat ramp, which the Tawas City Council believes is the best yet considered in several months of study, will be discussed sometime this week at a special meeting of the park board.

Supt. Reginald Bublitz reported Monday night that the Detroit and Mackinac Railway had offered to lease property east of Ninth Avenue and north of the Tawas River bridge for a ramp and parking area.

Bublitz reported that the city's planning consultant had offered to make plans for the boat launching area and was to be contacted immediately.

The council also discussed the possibility of cooperating with owners of a marina at the river mouth toward dredging of the river. Work was started this week on the project by Dale Johnson, owner. A report is to be made at the next council meeting.

Mayor George Tuttle reported that representatives of the state highway department were to attend the June 17 council meeting to outline plans for widening and modernizing US-23 through Tawas City. The council and others interested are invited to discuss plans with the department.

The city is to ask for bids on this summer's seal-coating project for city streets. Last year, city street work amounted to \$3,000 and it is expected that this year's expenditure will be about the same.

New Methods Eyed in \$7,000 Street Program

Two new methods of road stabilization will be used in East Tawas' \$7,000 street construction program during the next month.

Yockey Construction Company of Alpena has been contracted to construct 1.15 miles of streets, with stabilization to be completed before July 1 and seal coating within two weeks following that date.

Wadsworth Street is to be stabilized with rock seal and gravel. After a period for curing, the road will then receive a prime coat and double seal.

Airport Road from Tawas Lake Road to Wadsworth is to receive an asphalt stabilization process and then seal-coated. Paul Ropert, superintendent of public works, said these two stabilization methods have the same load bearing qualities as the more expensive stabilization with gravel.

Other streets to receive prime and double seal are Smith Street from Franklin to Bennington and Sawyer from Franklin to Jefferson. One block of State Street shoulder from Church to Locke Street is to receive asphalt stabilization with single seal.

Four Teen-Agers Hurt in Auto Crash

Four Whittemore teen-agers were injured in an auto crash Friday afternoon on Prescott Road, two miles east of Whittemore.

Most seriously injured was Gail Ann Grabow, 13, who is in critical condition at Tolfree Hospital, West Branch. She received a scalp laceration, fractured right arm and possible internal injuries.

Others hospitalized were Dennis G. Grabow, 16, driver, chest injuries; Roi Anne Phelps, 14, fractured right ankle and knee; Juanita Bozik, 15, bruises to head and fractured right leg.

Another passenger, Paula Jane Partlo, 15, escaped with no injuries.

Investigating state police officers said that Grabow was headed toward Whittemore and ran off the road. Losing control, the auto rolled over several times, and hit a tree.

Commencement Exercises Thursday Night for Grads

Commencement exercises for one of the most outstanding graduating classes in Tawas Area High School's 11-year history will be held Thursday night at the high school auditorium.

Of the 96 graduates who will receive diplomas from Joseph N. Dimmick, trustee of the board of education, 33 are listed on the school's honor roll with scholastic averages of B or higher.

Nine of the graduates have received college scholarships and 37 plan to continue their education in schools of higher learning next fall.

In addition to its over-all scholastic average, this class also included some of the school's most outstanding athletes. Twelve varsity letters were presented to seniors who were members of an undefeated football squad last fall, five received letters for basketball (the nucleus of a team which won the district tournament in March) and five won letters on the track squad, which had an outstanding season capped by winning the conference and regional track meets.

Thursday night's commencement program includes the professional and recreational, "Pomp and Circumstance," Tawas Area Band; invocation by James Mick, president of the local chapter of the National Honor Society; salutatory, Gerald A. Hoshbach, and valedictory by Nancy M. Borosch. The benediction will be given by Dennis Cross.

Principal address during the program is to be delivered by Dr. Richard Wysong, department of history and political science, Central Michigan University.

The commencement program is scheduled to start at 8:00 p. m.

TA School Term in Final Days

Elementary children of Tawas Area Schools held picnics Tuesday and school will be in session only half-days during the remainder of the week.

Buses are to pick up children at the regular hour in the morning and return them home at noon. Report cards will be distributed Friday morning.

Final examinations started Tuesday afternoon at the high school for sixth and third hour classes; on Wednesday morning, first and second hour examinations will be held. There will be no school in the afternoon, although seniors will practice for the commencement program starting at 1:30 o'clock.

School will again convene for a half day Thursday morning with examinations for fourth and fifth hour classes.

Buses will make their final run of the term Friday morning when six 25-minute periods will be held for distributing report cards. Students will be returned home at noon.

There will be no hot lunch program Wednesday, Thursday or Friday.

City to Obtain Engineering on 5th Ave. Ditch

On request of a North Park Acres Subdivision property owner, Tawas City Council is to obtain engineering on the possible opening of a ditch along Fifth Avenue to drain surface water to the M-55 drain.

Appearing before the council Monday night was Gene Spica, who asked the council to again consider the possibility of constructing such a drain.

The council had considered opening the ditch along the west side of Fifth Avenue about two years ago but discontinued any action when a property line dispute arose between Huron Gardens and North Park Acres Subdivision. The boundary dispute was settled recently in circuit court.

Supt. Reginald Bublitz, who was authorized to contact the city engineer to make the study, said that rough elevations were taken on the project when it was first considered. He pointed out that there was still some question as to whether water would drain toward the north in that area.

Mayor George Tuttle emphasized that although the city had responsibility for the first 441 feet of a ditch running from Fifth Avenue east through North Park Acres, the remainder was on private property.

Whittemore Couple Hurt in Cycle Crash

A Whittemore motorcycleist and his wife were treated at Tawas Hospital after a crash on Long Lake Road in Plainfield Township Friday night.

Treated were Dennis Walt, 21, and Mary Ellen Walt, 20. Investigating sheriff's department officers said their motorcycle missed a curve and ran off the road.

National to Name Dock in Honor of Sen. Prescott

National Gypsum Company today announced it will rename its dock south of Tawas City in memory of the late Sen. Charles T. Prescott of Michigan's 29th Senatorial District.

Chairman Melvin H. Baker said "appropriate ceremonies for this purpose are being planned for July 20." He explained that the company's action is in response to a resolution adopted by the Michigan Senate April 17 and the house on April 26 urging the company to name the dock for Prescott.

A cattle rancher, livestock dealer and real estate broker active in the development of Northeastern Michigan, Senator Prescott followed the career of his father who served as a state senator and also as Michigan's secretary of state.

Mr. Baker noted that "it is quite fitting that the dock, which is such an important factor in the economy of the area, should bear the name of the distinguished senator who did so much to pro-

mote the growth and development of the area."

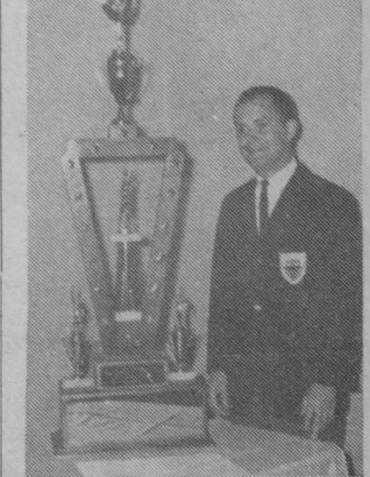
The joint resolution recalled that the lake bottom lands surrounding the National Gypsum dock were conveyed to the company by Public Act 176 of 1957.

National Gypsum Company, Baker noted, has more plants in Michigan than in any other state—eight in all. The company's Huron Portland Cement Division, with headquarters in Detroit, operates the world's largest cement mill at Alpena. It also operates cement distributing plants at Detroit, Muskegon, Saginaw and St. Joseph.

The parent company operates a paper mill at Kalamazoo and one of its largest gypsum quarries in Iosco County. Gypsum from this deposit is used to make gypsum building products in the company's National City plant. The gypsum ore is also transported by ship from the dock to gypsum building products plants at Lorain, Ohio, and Waukegan, Illinois.

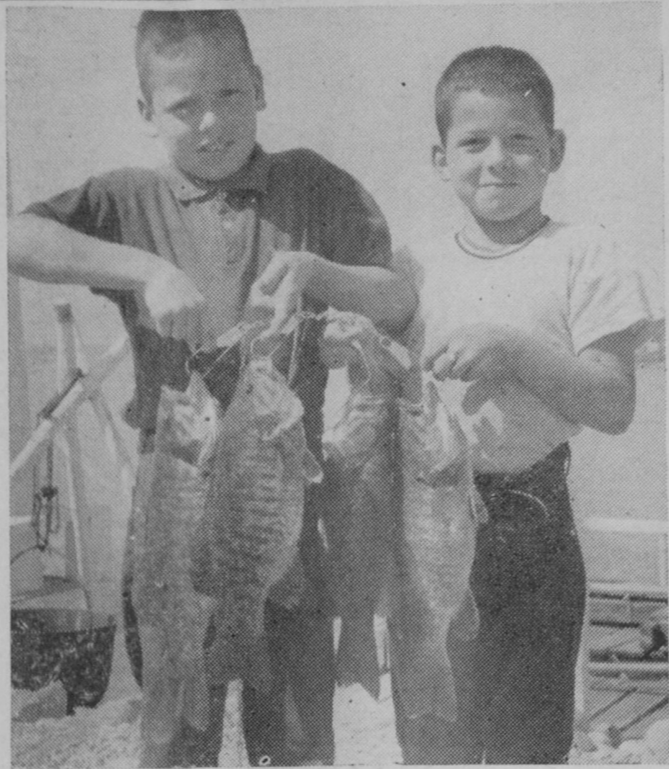

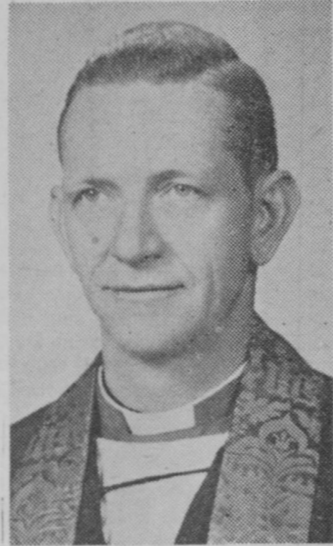

The Rt. Rev. Robert L. DeWitt, suffragan bishop of Michigan, will visit Christ Episcopal Church, East Tawas, Sunday, June 9, where he will officiate at the right of confirmation. Nine candidates will be confirmed at services scheduled for 11:00 a. m.

Bishop DeWitt was consecrated suffragan bishop of Michigan October 27, 1960, in St. Paul's Cathedral, Detroit.

Born March 12, 1916, at Jamaica Plain, Massachusetts, the son of W. J. and Ethel (Furness) DeWitt, he attended high school in Auburn, New York, and in 1937 received his bachelor of arts degree from Amherst College. He was ordained deacon in June 1940 and priest, October 1941. He married Barbara Anne DeYoe June 15, 1939, and they have five children.

Bishop DeWitt was curate of Christ Church Cranbrook, Bloomfield Hills, from 1940 to 1944. From there, he went to Ypsilanti where he was rector of St. Luke's Episcopal Church until 1948. He returned to Christ Church Cranbrook as rector in 1948.

Other officers named were F. F. Stutesman, Presque Isle County, vice president, and Francis J. Block, secretary-treasurer, Iosco County.

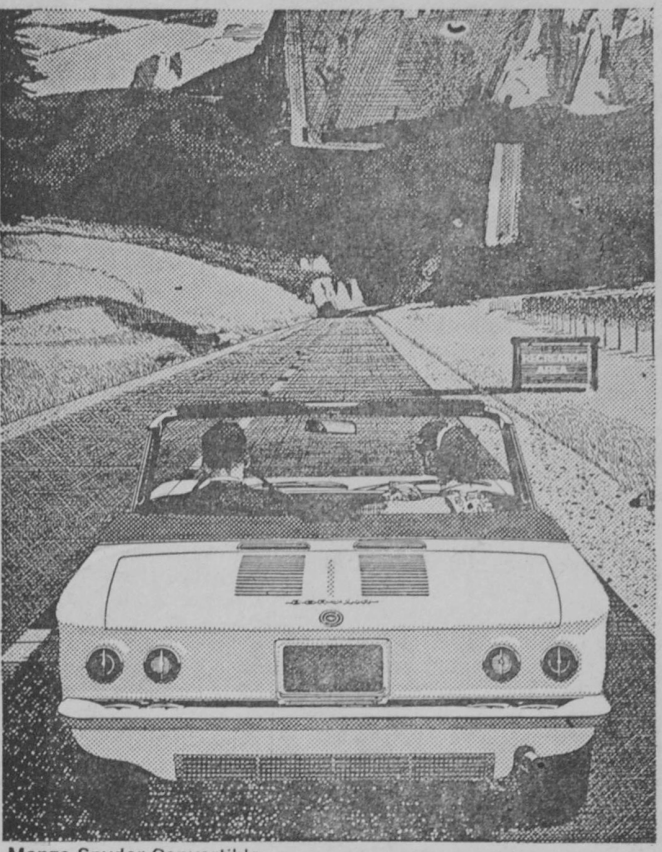

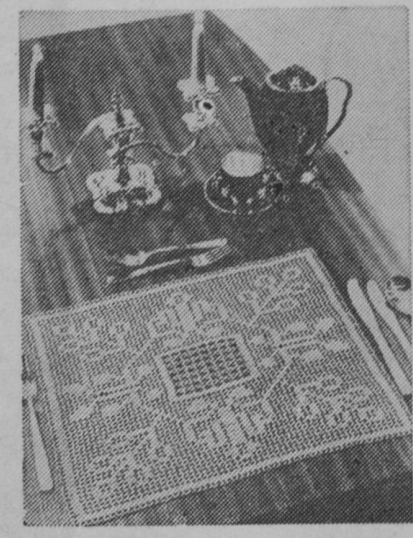


CUSTOM MADE LOOK

Communications were read and referred to the proper committees by the chairman. Mr. Long addressed the board stating that the assistant custodian of the county building had requested a raise in his hourly rate. Referred to the officer's salary committee.

Miss Scott addressed the board and informed members that the new county plat book would be available next week.

Mr. Little addressed the board discussing briefly the situation developing within this county as between school, township and county tax rates allocated within the 15 mill limitation by the county tax allocation board. Mr. Little informed the board that for the

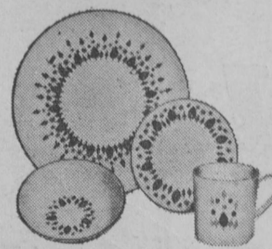

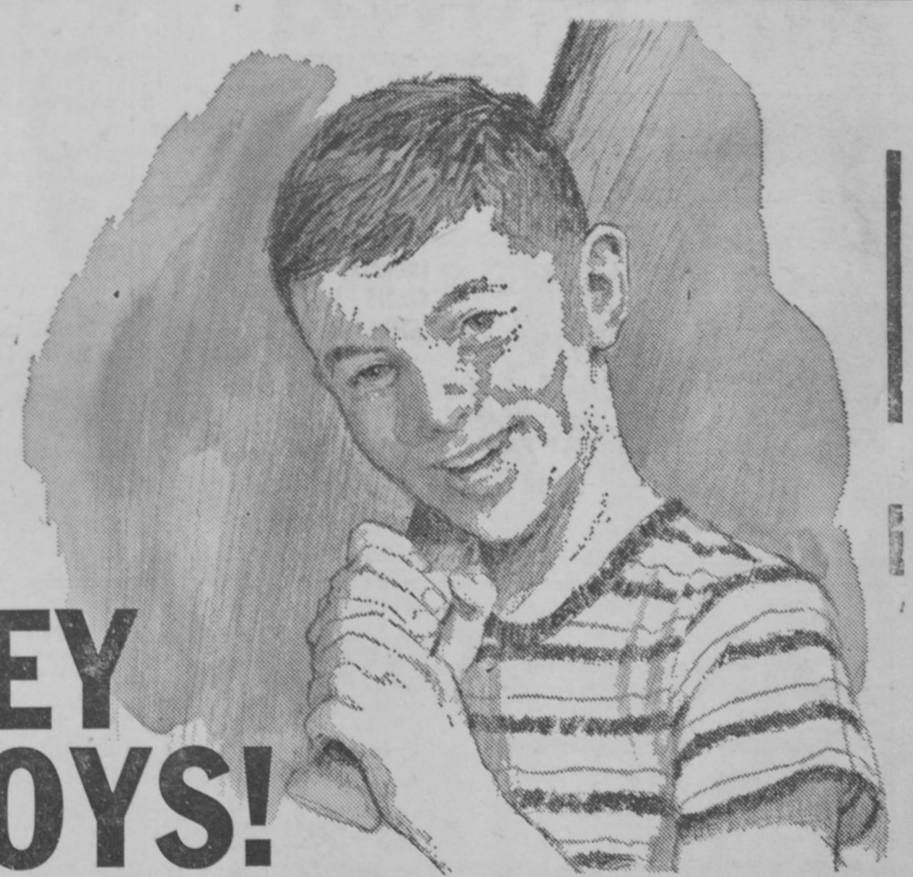
