# **Twin City Tax** Base for 1963 **Shows Gains**

Both Tawas City and East Tawas reported substantial tax roll gains this week following recent sessions of boards of review.

East Tawas' 1963 tax base shows a gain of \$82,500 over last year. according to report read at Monday night's meeting of the city

City Assessor Deloise (Dewey) Durant said that the total amount of assessed real and personal property was \$2,734,100, as determined by the board of review.

Real estate was valued at \$2,-413,100 this year, as compared to \$2,323,900 in 1962. There was a \$5,700 loss recorded because of a fire at Eagles Hall. Some property was adjusted upward to \$54,300

and \$40,600 listed as new. Personal property, valued this year at \$321,000, showed a loss of \$6,700 over the previous year. Actual loss recorded in personal was \$14,300, but there was an adjustment of \$500 and new busi-






Sugar Shanty in the Brown Sugar Bush

# Tawas Area Braves Eliminated by Ludington Orioles in Regionals

After upsetting the West Branch Orioles to win the Pinconning district basketball tournament March 9, Tawas Area Braves fell by the wayside in regional play last Wednesday night, losing to Ludington, 69-48.

Although becoming a cropper in their first taste of regional play since 1958, the Braves did not look as bad as the final score would indicate. With most letter men returning next year, last week's regional play should provide them with invaluable experience.

The Ludington Orioles, district winner in eight of the past 10 years, jumped to a 14-7 lead in the first quarter and then upped the margin to 26-18 at the half.






