

Sidewalk sales at East Tawas and a judo contest at Tawas City will feature events planned here during the remainder of the Michigan Week observance.

In addition, East Tawas merchants' jack pot days are to be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Drawings of \$50 each are to be held at 4:00 p. m. Thursday and Friday, while two drawings are scheduled Saturday at 11:00 a. m. and 4:00 p. m.

There will be a display of new cars sponsored by area dealers. Also planning displays in store windows are the United States Forest Service, Iosco Extension Service, Michigan Department of Conservation, United States Gypsum Company, National Gypsum Company, Feather-Lite Manufacturing Company, Tawas Trailers, Incorporated, will exhibit one of its new coaches and the air force will have a display of survival equipment.

Tawas City's judo tournament is scheduled at the city park starting at 2:00 p. m. Saturday. Four contests will be held under sanction of the National Amateur Athletic Union. Approximately 30 registered judo belt holders are expected to compete.

The invitational meet is being sponsored by the Tawas City Businessmen's Association through cooperation of local representatives of the Delta Judo Club. Charity Island Development Plans Revealed

Area Allocation Boards in Annual 'Showdown' Soon

Iosco and two of its three neighboring counties—Arenac and Ogemaw—appear to be headed toward another showdown over allocation of operating millage to school districts. Three of Iosco's school districts have asked for and tentatively received millage increases to meet budgets for 1963-1964.

This millage problem has been an annual occurrence since schools were first reorganized here crossing county lines. Before final allocations are made, agreement must be reached on a uniform tax rate between counties in regard to such school districts.

Traditionally, Iosco's allocation board has granted a larger slice of the tax pie for school operating than neighboring counties and is expected to do so again this year.

In past years, however, Iosco has been out-voted three to one when final operating millages were agreed upon by chairmen of allocation boards from the four counties involved. (Oscoda Area School District crosses the Alcona County line, but that district's operational budget remains at eight mills, the same as last year, and no conflict is expected.)

Iosco has the distinct advantage of having a larger tax base than its neighbors, thereby levying a lower millage for county operation and able to allow higher millage for school operation and still stay within the state's 15-mill limitation.

Arenac and Ogemaw Counties have argued in the past that because of their higher millage necessary to meet county budgets, a levy of more than eight mills for school operating would place fractional districts in those counties above the state limitation.

At last week's meeting of the Iosco Tax Allocation Board, a preliminary order was approved setting operational millage as follows for the four districts in this county: Tawas Area, 8.4; Oscoda Area, eight; Hale Area, 8.7; Whittemore-Prescott Area, 8.7.

In addition, Iosco County was allowed 5.15 mills to meet its operational budget, the new Iosco Intermediate School District received .015 of a mill and townships submitting a budget received one mill. All but Tawas and Baldwin asked for millage.

Before adoption of this final figure, however, passage required three separate votes by the allocation board. First vote on the above named millage resulted in a three-three tie. Squeezed in between the two was a vote on a proposition calling for nine mills for all school, 4.85 mills for county operation, .015 mills for the intermediate school district and one mill for townships. This failed four to two.

Actually, Hale Area and Whittemore-Prescott Area had submitted

budgets which would have required a higher millage than that granted. Hale Area's budget would have required 10.34 mills and Whittemore-Prescott, nine mills.

Chairmen of the four allocation boards are to meet sometime between May 28 and June 4 to establish the final millage. New fireworks are expected at that meeting.

Four Arrests Solve Wave of Cabin B&Es

Arrest of three men by Iosco Sheriff's Department officers Saturday has solved an organized wave of cabin burglaries in Oscoda Township.

Entering guilty pleas Monday when arraigned before Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller were William Crimmins, 21; James R. Meyer, 21, and Wendell J. Little, 22, all of Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

A fourth airman, Regina Brown, 22, was arrested by Sheriff Martin Gehris of Harrisville. He was arraigned before Judge Miller in Alcona Circuit Court. All face charges of breaking and entering in the nighttime.

The three men arraigned here were arrested Saturday night by Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell and Oscoda Township Officer Robert Foster. The officers were taken to a wooded area in Oscoda Township where loot estimated at a value of \$5,000 was recovered.

One of the men had been arrested earlier on a charge of tire theft and apparently they decided to bury the loot in two separate locations, one in Alcona County. While checking out a report of a game violation, Conservation Officer Jack LaPear of Oscoda discovered tire track leading into the wooded area. His inspection of ground showing signs of freshly turned earth uncovered the cache.

Included were rifles, shotguns, radios, binoculars, tools, bedding and household articles, all stolen from area cabins.

The four men have been placed on bond and are held by military authorities while awaiting sentence. Sheriff O'Farrell said he will seek warrants for the arrest of several other suspects.

William F. Tracy, Iosco County school superintendent, pointed out at last week's meeting of the Iosco Allocation Board that only chairmen from the counties involved may, according to law, vote on setting operating millages for school districts which cross county lines. (See ALLOCATION, page 10.)

Search Saginaw Bay for Bodies of 4 Fishermen

Saginaw Bay, off-shore from Point Lookout in Arenac County.

Missing are Wallace E. Zinck, 50, Saginaw; Donald W. Schultz, 40, and his son, Donald Jr., 13, Saginaw, and August Yde, 70, Au Gres.

Six state police skin divers were pressed into service Monday following an afternoon of fruitless search the preceding day. High seas hampered operations.

In addition, coast guardsmen from Tawas Point, along with a helicopter, were searching the water where the men disappeared Sunday noon, while state police from East Tawas and Arenac County Sheriff's Department officers searched the shore line and shallow water.

According to investigating officers, the three men and boy left Au Gres on a fishing expedition about 9:30 a. m. Apparently they anchored their 17-foot boat in about 20 feet of water some 300 yards east of Point Lookout.

The boat was found capsized with six life preserver cushions, said to be on board when they departed, missing from the boat. An anchor rope was tangled in the outboard motor prop, which led officers to believe that the boat overturned while an attempt was made to free the motor.

State police skin divers at the scene are Troopers Thomas Meehler of East Tawas and Lawrence Rees of Bay City, who made one dive Sunday but had to terminate the search until Monday because of rough water; Trooper Robert Gonzer, Ithaca; Cpl. William Carter, East Lansing; Troopers D. J. Parolari of Houghton Lake and A. G. Cunningham of Flint.

Tawas Thinclads Win Regional Title

Tawas Area's track team—with two firsts, two seconds and two thirds—won the regional class B trophy Saturday at Mt. Pleasant. It was the first time an area school has won first place in this event.

Sparked by the brilliant performance of Jim Boldt, who won first place in both 120-yard high

hurdles and 180-yard low hurdles, the Braves piled up 25 points to out-distance their nearest rival, Alma, with 19 points.

Participating in the regional meet were 14 class B schools from Northeastern and Central Michigan.

On the strength of its win Saturday, Tawas will send seven trackmen to the class B state finals this Saturday at Ann Arbor.

Besides Boldt will be the mile relay team of Joseph LaBlance, Ed Cain, Dennis Blata and Donald Evans. The squad will win second place in the regional.

Others qualifying for the state finals were Ed Collier, who won second place in shot put and Dick Peters, a third in broad jump.

Evans won third place in the half-mile and LaBlance won fifth place in the 440-yard dash.

Coach Robert McDonald reports that the Braves will participate in the conference meet today (Wednesday) at Bay City Handy. Preliminaries start at 4:00 p. m. and finals commence at 7:00 p. m.

Surveys in 1961 indicated that the bird's summer range takes in parts of Alcona, Crawford, Iosco, Kalkaska, Montmorency, Ogemaw, Oscoda, Otsego, Presque Isle and Roscommon Counties.

Saginaw Men to Make Island Tourist Mecca

A syndicate of Saginaw men, headed by Robert L. Hanson, announced yesterday that they have completed negotiations for the purchase of Big Charity Island from the Gillingham family of Bay Port and Caseville. Purchase option papers were signed May 18.

The island, consisting of some 200 acres of heavily-wooded land in Saginaw Bay, will be developed into a recreational resort area according to Hanson.

Hanson, a New Hampshire native who came to Saginaw in 1948 to enter the insurance business, has been keenly interested in Big Charity Island since his first visit to the historical spot shortly after his arrival in Michigan.

Over the years, he has collected a wealth of material on the island, consisting of both current and historical charts of the waters surrounding the area, topographical studies, aerial photographs, news clippings and stories, plus a copy of the original 1853 United States Government survey of the island.

This past winter, Hanson conveyed his enthusiasm for the island development to four friends, Hugo E. Braun Jr., Kenneth Ferguson, Wallace Strobel and Jack Parker, a former Tawas resident.

The four men joined Hanson in the project and will now form a corporation to handle the creation and development of the island's recreational facilities.

Long known as a "seaman's landmark" due to its location straddling the mouth of Saginaw Bay and for its picturesque lighthouse station, now deserted on the northernmost tip of its land, Big Charity Island will now provide Michigan with another recreational area to serve the thousands of tourists who annually enjoy the Water Wonderland State.

Hanson states that it is the plan of the Saginaw group to eventually develop the entire island into recreational area. Guest lodges will be erected, dining facilities provided, bridge and hiking trails will be laid out, a complete and protected marina will be developed from the 7 1/2-acre inland lake on the west end of the island and airplane landing strips will eventually make the island accessible to guests visiting by air.

Hanson further stated that it is the firm intention of his group to preserve the island's natural beauty and charm at all costs. This will be accomplished in part by a rule which has long made Mackinaw Island popular with guests—no automobiles will be allowed on the island.

Big Charity now joins four other Michigan islands affording facilities for residents and visitors: Beaver Island in Lake Michigan, Mackinaw and Drummond Islands in the Straits area and Isle Royale in Lake Superior.

Hanson indicated that it is too early yet for his group to predict when their island will be opened to the public. It is hoped that a channel can be dredged from Saginaw Bay into the island's inland lake by this summer.

He said, however, this would be primarily for the purpose of bringing work boats into the area with supplies and materials. If all work proceeds without incident, the island could be partially open to the public next summer, Hanson concluded.

Michigan Week Feature—

'Wildcat Banking' Recalled with 1837 Paper Money

On display at the Tawas City Library during Michigan Week is an interesting collection which recalls this state's "wildcat era" in banking more than 125 years ago.

While going through the effects of his late father-in-law, Thomas Nemecek, Donald Watson of Tawas City found some old paper money which had been issued by Michigan banks in 1837. Still in good condition, these odd one-sided bills once flooded the young state and were the direct cause for one of the worst panics on record.

Watson's research into the background of this currency has uncovered considerable information concerning the wildcat era. He made a special trip to Lansing recently for the express purpose of obtaining background material to be used in this Herald feature.

Before Michigan was admitted into the Union and was still part of the Northwest Territory, it had four incorporated banks. In 1836, the legislature chartered eight more banks and in 1837, when Michigan became a state, the legislature adopted a system of free banking, under which were organized a great number of those institutions since known as wildcat banks.

By this law, banks of specie were authorized and empowered to issue circulating notes supposedly backed by gold and specie reserves. This law was responsible for the era of wildcat banks, so called because many of those institutions were "located in woods or swamps inhabited only by wildcats."

Inaccessible places were apparently deliberately chosen by the bank promoters to render difficult the visit of bank commissioners and to discourage redemption of notes issued by the banks.

Basis for establishment of the banks was a small percent of capital in specie and the redemption of bills to be secured by mortgage on real estate. Very soon after the passage of the 1837 law, banks sprang up all over the state and their bills were "plenty as blackberries."

In some cases where the stockholders had not enough land of their own, they mortgaged a piece of federal property, unbeknown to Uncle Sam. Fortunes were made in a few months. New cities and villages sprang up as fast as surveyors could plot them.

Large topographic maps were issued showing contemplated railroads, hotels and mills; large parks were dedicated for public use. Men built fine homes, furnished them handsomely, set up their carriages and lived sumptuously.

Hon. Alpheus Felch was appointed bank commissioner. He was known to be honest and a man that could not be swerved from an honest discharge of his duty.

Attempting sharp practice, bank officers filled specie boxes nearly full with old scrap iron from a blacksmith shop, which was covered with specie and the commissioner was asked to take the mint coin as marked on the box. He was not caught so easily—the boxes were turned over and emptied on the floor, thus exposing fraud.

Another trick was tried. Banks clubbed together and procured specie sufficient for any one bank and, while the commissioner was making his examination, he was inquired of what bank he intended to examine next. When that was ascertained, the specie which had been hastily repacked, was loaded into a wagon and hurried off to the bank indicated.

But the commissioner was too sharp for this scheme. While the specie was going in one direction, the commissioner had changed his mind and took another.

The country was running wild with speculations. Farmers left their fields untilled, the mechanic his shop, the merchants their counting rooms, the lawyers their offices. Even women left their homes and plunged deeply into fortune-making. Prices of everything were inflated; every one was rich (in imagination).

The state specie circular was issued and the bauble was stabbed, it collapsed. Prices fell with accelerated motion, fortunes vanished as if by magic. Those

who had set up fine carriages were compelled to dispose of them as best they could or the sheriff did it for them. Ninety-nine in 100 of the speculators were left without a dollar and many debts hanging over them.

Congress came to the aid of the fallen with the general bankrupt law and a large number paid their debts by availing themselves of it. The mania was not confined to Michigan, nor chargeable wholly to the wildcat banks beyond the boundaries of the state.

The story of wildcat banks is now a part of Michigan history, never to return. In Watson's collection are bills issued by the Calhoun County Bank of Marshall, along with banks at Constantine, Clinton and Ypsilanti. Anyone interested in Michigan history should make a point of viewing his display at the library.

Offers Assistance in Professional Nurse Education Program

In order to fill 2,000 vacancies in the army nurse corps, the United States Army is offering assistance to young men and women in obtaining the educational foundation to become professional nurses.

Student professional nurses, registered professional nurses or those having a bachelor of science degree in nursing may be qualified to receive important financial aid to help complete or advance nursing education by being accepted for one of four plans of financial aid offered by the army.

Individuals continue their studies where they are presently enrolled at a nursing school approved by the National League for Nursing and/or the department of the army. Well paid during study, upon completion of education, individuals who have qualified become officers in the army.

Complete details on all four of the financial assistance programs may be obtained from the local army recruiter.

ALL-PURPOSE SPRAY PREVENTS DISEASE

An all-purpose spray can control insects and prevent disease all in one operation.

More than four billion dollars worth of agricultural crops are destroyed each year by insects and diseases, says Donald P. Watson, horticulturist at Michigan State University.

Many all-purpose sprays are prepared and labeled for specific use on trees, shrubs, flowers or vegetables. Generally, three applications of an all-purpose spray will

provide fairly good control on most trees and shrubs for a whole season. Spray the second week in May, the first week of June and again during the first week of July. Spray only when the air is still and temperatures are above 65 degrees and below 85 degrees Fahrenheit. However, roses should be sprayed weekly.

"It is the responsibility of every homeowner to see that the spray materials are locked up and stored away from the reach of children and animals," points out Watson. Burn insecticide and fungicide containers as soon as you have emptied them and be careful not to breathe the smoke. Wash your face and hands thoroughly as soon as you have finished spraying.







lines. This had not been the case in the past.
"For instance, only Arenac and Iosco County have any concern over the Tawas Area School District," said Tracy. "I believe only the chairmen from these two counties should meet on the question of setting an operating millage for this school."
According to Tracy, if the two

chairmen could not agree upon a millage, the deciding vote would be cast by the probate judge from the county which has the largest area and valuation contained in the school district.
Tracy also contends that action must be taken at the state level to relieve the present situation where a small fractional part of a district may control operational millage received.
"Under present circumstances in three Iosco school districts, it

has been a case where the tail wags the dog," said Tracy. "I believe the majority portion of the district should decide the tax rate."
The problem is not unique to Iosco and its neighbors. Other counties of the state are experiencing the same difficulties over setting millage rates for schools crossing county lines.

Iosco County farmers voted overwhelmingly against the 1964 wheat program Tuesday. There were 157 farmers against the program and 20 voted in favor.

County Building Addition OK'd

Approval was given last Wednesday by the board of supervisors for construction of a 40 by 30-foot addition to the Iosco County Building.

The addition, to be constructed on the north end of the building, would be used as a meeting room for the board of supervisors. Authorization was given to have the county's architect start work on planning the addition and to advertise for bids on construction.

Work started immediately on moving Addressograph equipment from the treasurer's office into the room formerly occupied by the board of supervisors.

The board's building and grounds committee offered two proposals for the board's consideration. One would have built the new addition on the west side of the building facing the jail. This was rejected.

In other business, the board authorized hiring a full-time deputy sheriff in Oscoda Township. The county is to pay \$200 per month toward the salary.

AuSable River Golf Club was granted permission to build and maintain a foot bridge across Van-Ettan Creek for 60 days. A report on the bridge is to be made later by the board's conservation department.

Salary of the assistant custodian at the county building was increased to \$1.70 an hour.

A petition signed by 60 residents of the Sand Lake area was presented concerning regulations of traffic speed in that area. The petitions recommended setting the speed at 25 miles per hour on Indian Lake Road.

"We are not just concerned with outside traffic, but we feel that our own people are, in many instances, endangering our as well as their own safety," stated a letter accompanying the petition.

Edward Lixey, who was recently elected mayor pro tem at East Tawas, is the new supervisor replacing Edward Seifert Jr. Because of his appointment as friend of the court, Seifert was ineligible to sit on the county board.

Tawas City Council OKs Participation in Recreation Program

Tawas City Council has authorized participation in the Tawas Area Recreation Association program for the coming summer.

As a result, the city will pay one-third of the salary for Director Lyle Berry, who will again handle the 1963 program. East Tawas and the Tawas Area School District are to have an equal share of the cost. Cost of each unit in 1963 was \$300.

Vernon Pugh, who outlined the program during Monday night's council meeting, said that two new teams have been added to the Knothole League this year which will involve additional work for the director.

He commended Berry for his work last summer and said that he had done considerably more work on athletic fields than what was called for in his three-month contract.
