## Rev. Edwards to Speak at Vets Cemetery

The Rev. Ralph A. Edwards, pastor of Methodist Churches of the Tawas, will be principal speaker at Memorial Day services Thursday at Veterans Cemetery, East Tawas.

The program is being held under auspices of Audie Johnson Post No. 211, American Legion. A parade will assemble at the Legion Hall on Newman Street at 10:00 a. m. with scheduled departure at 10:30, states Commander Russell Meyers. In the line of march will be the American Legion and auxiliary, Tawas Area High School Band, boy scouts, campfire girls and bluebirds.

The parade will proceed to Michigan Waterways Commission Dock where the naval dead will be honored with a tribute and salute from the firing squad. The marchers will then proceed to the Michigan State Police Post where cars will be boarded for the cemetery. Arthur Dillon is parade sergeant. Chaplain John Mielock will deliver the invocation and benediction.

Placing of a wreath on the veteran's monument and a salute from the firing squad will honor the dead of past wars and those who have since departed.

## Two New Teachers Hired by Board; Still Two Vacancies

Two new teachers have been hired by the Tawas Area Board of Education for the 1963-1964 school term and two positions remain to be filled.

Richard F. Fairless, who graduates this spring from Adrian College, was one of 25 applicants filling for the vacancy caused when Lyle Berry asked for release from next year's contract.

Fairless will teach social studies, as well as becoming assistant reserve football coach, eighth grade basketball and junior varsity baseball.

Mrs. Susan Freel, wife of Attorney Michael Freel, who is now associated with the office of John Watkins at East Tawas, has been hired as second grade teacher. She is a graduate of Michigan State University.

Supt. Reynold Mick reported Monday night that there has been only one application received for a vacancy in the commercial department. Miss Marilyn Westrich, present teacher, has accepted a contract to teach at Fordson High School, Dearborn.

According to the superintendent one vacancy remains in the English department.

## Horsemen Start Trek Over Michigan Trail

Official opening of the Michigan Trail from Mio to the Tawas will be held Memorial Day when a guided group of horsemen will leave Lost Creek Sky Ranch at Luzerne.

James Hardy, guide, has promoted this segment of the trail in connection with a coast-to-coast trail from Traverse City to Kalkaska and then to Tawas.

The trail is being blazed across the state for the use of saddle clubs, hiking enthusiasts and Audubon Club members.

Starting from Lake Michigan, the trail crosses state and federal property, as well as Consumers Power Company and other privately-owned property. The trail closely follows the Boardman and AuSable Rivers.

The group opening the easterly portion of the trail is expected to arrive in the Tawas on Sunday.

Work was rushed earlier this spring in northern counties for a kickoff which is expected to be a major recreation boom this summer.

Work on the trail from Kalkaska to Grayling began in April and the 36-mile trip east has shown cooperative work by the forestry

division of the Michigan Department of Conservation, in cooperation with saddle clubs of that area.

Plans have been approved to put the trail on government-owned lands where there is no conflict of interests.

Land in the northern section of Michigan has a high recreation potential and riding trails are said to fit in perfectly. Horseback riding may develop along lines similar to canoeing, with liveries which pick up riders at the end of a trip, provide horse trailers and facilities for camping.

The value of trails in nature studies is also being discussed with promoters considering every potential of what they foresee as a growing outdoor recreation in this northern Lower Peninsula.

## TA Baccalaureate Services Sunday

Baccalaureate services for the 100-member graduating class of Tawas Area High School will be held Sunday, June 2, at the high school auditorium.

Principal speaker will be the Rev. Robert Morrison, pastor of Christ Episcopal Church, East Tawas. Janet Czaika will deliver the invocation and Sonja Vance, the benediction. Both are senior members of the National Honor Society.

Music for the professional will be provided by Tawas Area High School Band under direction of Edward Rima. The school choir will also participate.

## Make Plans for School Maintenance During Summer

Plans for summer maintenance work at Tawas Area School were approved Monday night by the board of education. Much of the work is to be handled by the school custodial staff.

Corridor in the Tawas City annex is to be redecorated while shower rooms and areas off stage are to be repainted. Two doors on the south end of the gymnasium are to be replaced and a bell system installed.

Grounds surrounding the building are to be seeded and, at the suggestion of Trustee Leonard Sarki, gutters and down spouts on the building are to be replaced. Possible replacement of shades is to be investigated.

The playground area at the East Tawas unit is to be reseeded and window sash is to be replaced as needed. A new water line is to be constructed to the boy's rest room. Two rooms are to be repainted.

Maintenance work at the high school includes painting of metal trim around the building. A flower bed on the east side of the building is to be removed and covered with gravel for additional parking facilities. Several dead trees are to be removed from in front of the building. Doors in the building are to be repainted, as well as several rooms.

In other business, a master plan report from the Tawas City Planning Commission was received for study.

The board approved participation in the summer recreation program. The program is being financed jointly by the school and Cities of Tawas City and East Tawas. Cost to each is \$300.

Miss Clara Bolen, elementary supervisor, reported that 77 children had been enrolled last Thursday for entrance into kindergarten next fall at East Tawas and 74 (See SCHOOL BOARD, page 10.)

## Work Completed on Golf Clubhouse

Work has been completed on remodeling the clubhouse at Tawas Golf and Country Club on Monument Road.

Owner Alvin Zaharias announced this week that the clubhouse dining room would be open Saturdays and Sundays. Effective July 1, the dining room will be open every day through Labor Day.

Remodeling of the clubhouse has been part of a three-year renovation and expansion program by Zaharias. Only last year, play started on nine new holes giving the golf course an 18-hole layout. A new watering system for greens was included in the construction along with enlargement of the parking lot.

Work on remodeling the clubhouse started last year with installation of carpeting in the dining area, sliding glass doors separating that room from the bar, installation of an air-conditioning system and remodeling the building's exterior.

During the past winter, the building's interior was remodeled with new windows, natural walnut paneling with redwood ceiling beams and drapes. The back bar was modernized with construction of a display rack for golf merchandise.

Later this year, work is to be resumed on changing the layout

of the front nine holes on the golf course. Initial work on constructing new greens was started last year and preparations will soon be made for seeding.

Zaharias reports that he has received many favorable comments concerning the new back nine, with its long, tree-lined fairways, watered greens and excellent turf. He said that plans for the front nine would include utilization of Sims Creek in the fairway layout and would be equally impressive when completed.

Fall meeting of the Michigan Society of Planning Officials is to be held in Tawas City, according to a report at Monday night's meeting of the Tawas City Planning Commission.

The meeting is to be held in late September or October 14-15. The Barnes Hotel will be headquarters.

Vilcan-Leman and Associates, planning consultants, will have displays in the Barnes Hotel lobby for the proposed plans for Tawas City during the fall confab.

East Tawas and Oscoda-AuSable planning groups are being invited to take part in the meeting.

Del Myles and John St. James represented the local planning commission at the recent state meeting held at Jackson. Some 200 city planners attended that session.

In Monday night's business session, the commission voted to change the order of master plan study allowing the economic base study to be conducted as the next phase of the program.

Parks and recreation areas had been scheduled next, but this study will now be third in line.

## School Board OKs Permanent Building Fund

Establishment of a permanent building and site fund for financing minor improvements to school property was authorized Monday night by the Tawas Area Board of Education.

On recommendation of Secretary Walter Niles, five percent of any balance remaining at the end of the school year from state aid funds will be transferred to this account. Such a transfer is permissible under state law.

In addition, money received for sale of the Alabaster school and house, along with money from the sale of property at the Watts school, will be transferred to this fund.

Niles pointed out that money from this fund could be transferred back to the general fund if needed, but a reserve could be established for minor improvements to school property using this method.

The board adopted a schedule for next year recommended by the administration and faculty calling for 187 membership days and 184 days in session during the 1963-64 school year. During the past year, school was in session 177 days.

This new schedule would have Christmas vacation running from December 23 through January 6. Easter vacation would start Good Friday and include the next week.

As a result, school would be extended five days next year, the final day being June 12.

## School Buildings Set for Busy Summer

More than 300 students will be using facilities at Tawas Area High School during the coming summer. In addition to band and driver education students, between 60 and 70 students will be taking part in an expanded education summer program.

Principal Ernest W. Jordan Jr. reports, however, that one segment of the program, English, may be dropped unless more interest is shown in the next week or so.

Although Jordan thought that the English course was one of the most important being offered, he said it apparently had the least appeal.

"There may be a change in thinking when some parents see final report cards," said Jordan.

The six-week summer program has a tentative enrollment of 26 students in algebra I, five in the mathematics enrichment course and 10 students have signed for calculus. These courses are to be taught by John R. Fortsen.

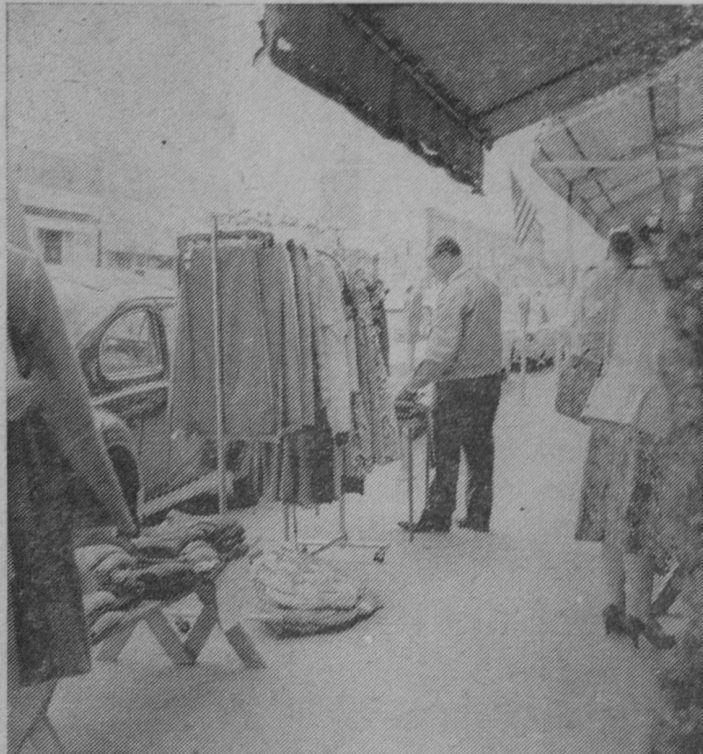
Miss Burnetta Miller's remedial program has a present enrollment of six in mathematics and 10 in reading, but more are expected to enroll during the next week.

Between 140 and 150 students will take part in the summer band program while 130 students are enrolled in driver education.

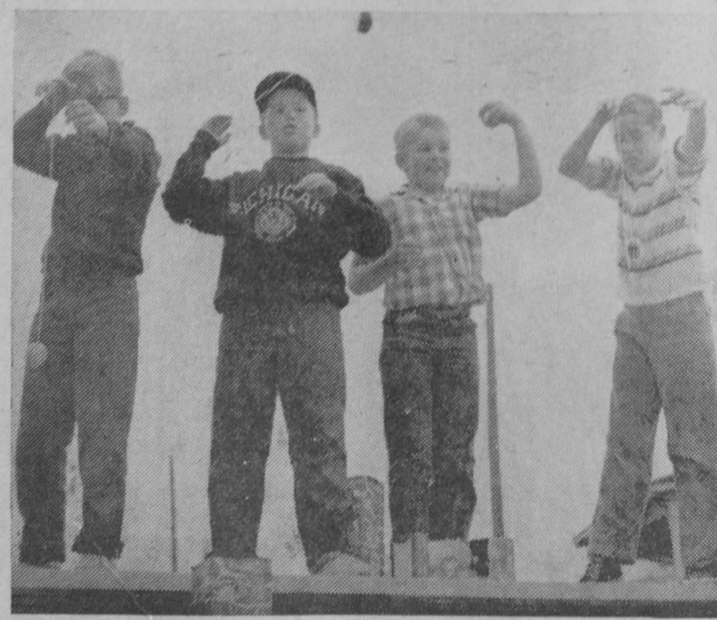

## Special Activities Close Michigan Week Observance



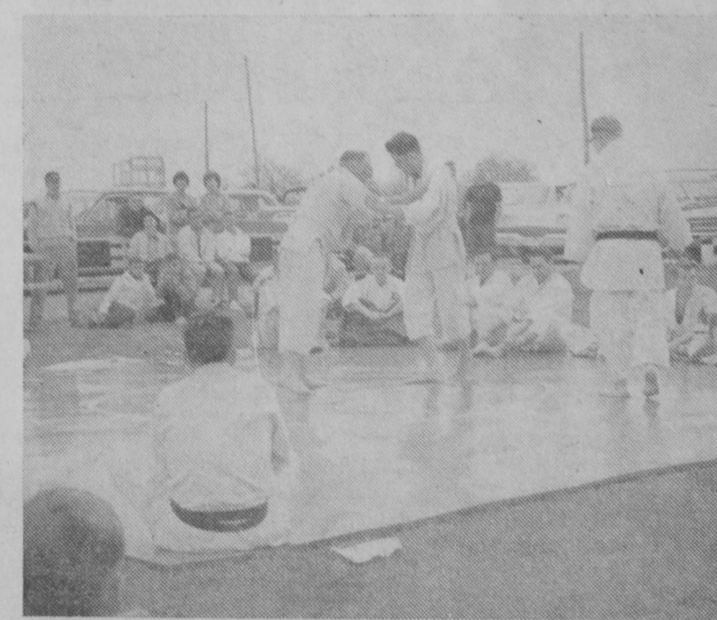

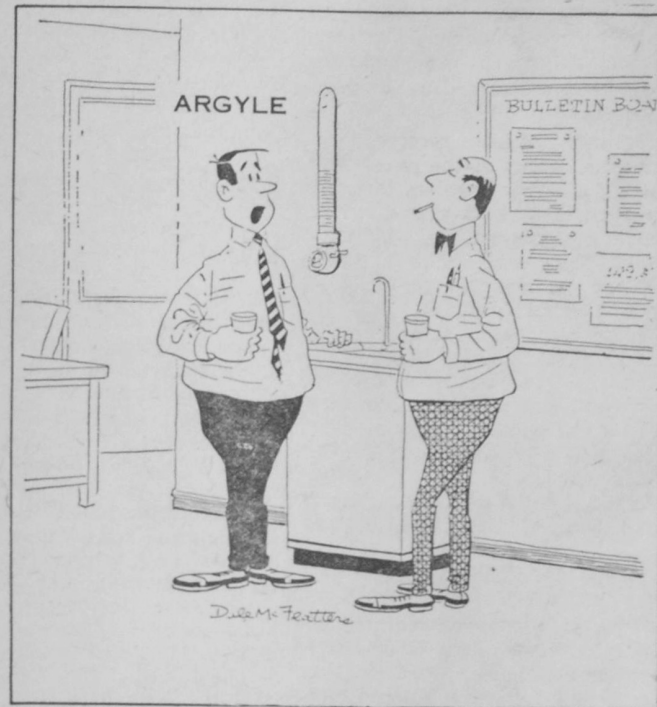

## Charity Islands Have Interesting History

Robert L. Hanson, who, with three other Saginaw men, purchased Big Charity Island May 18, has been keenly interested in this historical spot since 1948.

Over the years, he had collected a wealth of material on the island. A collection of these stories and legends is now being assembled for possible publication.

Both islands, Big Charity and Little Charity, have played interesting roles in the history of Michigan. Jean Nicolet, French voyageur and explorer, who worked with Champlain, is thought to have been the first white man to have visited Big Charity Island. Reference to the visit in 1629 is found in Nicolet's writings.

The French explorer, LaSalle, accompanied by his famous lieutenant, Henry de Tonty (The Iron Hand), visited Big Charity on the Griffin in 1679. It was after this visit, when the Griffin was being

deployed back to Fort Detroit from a LaSalle winter encampment on Lake Michigan's shore, that the famous ship vanished without a trace.

Indications of early-day Indian existence on the island is still in evidence in the person of artifacts found there many years ago. Journals of early travelers through the area of Saginaw Bay indicate that Indian campfires were often seen on the island from the mainland.

While the islands have long stood as havens of refuge for those at sea during stormy weather, the area surrounding them has also known its share of shipwrecks. There are three unidentified wrecks in the shoal waters off the island today, located by oceanographic surveys in recent years. Other shipwrecks, recorded in the area through old ship's logs and news stories of the day, have

not been pinpointed as to specific location.

Charity Islands received their unusual names as the result of the belief of early travelers that these spots of land were placed in Saginaw Bay through the charity of God. They were the only harbors of refuge from the great storms which swept down out of Lake Huron and into Saginaw Bay.

By their "charity," many a seaman or lake traveler was thus saved from death by drowning. Even the Indians regarded the islands as a land of refuge. Early travelers going from Pointe Aux Barques to Tawas would follow the shore of the Thumb to Sand Point, then swing northward across the waters toward Tawas holding close to the Charity Islands in the event that a storm or rough waters endangered the journey.

Little Charity Island once played host to a commercial fishing camp which employed a sizeable number of men on a permanent all-summer basis. The boat, "Skim Along," would call at the island every day to bring supplies, food and mail and then pick up the day's catch of fish to transport them to the mainland.

Eventually, the men of the fishing camp purchased a boat of their own which they named, "Little Marquette," because they said their life on Little Charity, with the work they had to do, was but one step better than life in Marquette Prison.

One of the buildings of this camp yet remains on the island, as well as a grape arbor planted by the men who once resided there.

As Hanson and the other Saginaw businessmen start work toward turning Big Charity into an island resort, the area will become more and more acquainted with the important and interesting part these two rocky islands have played in Michigan history.

When development of the island's recreational facilities is completed, Big Charity should become one of the top tourist attractions in Eastern Michigan. At present, the island's rocky shoreline is little changed from the year 1629 when Nicolet made his historic visit.
