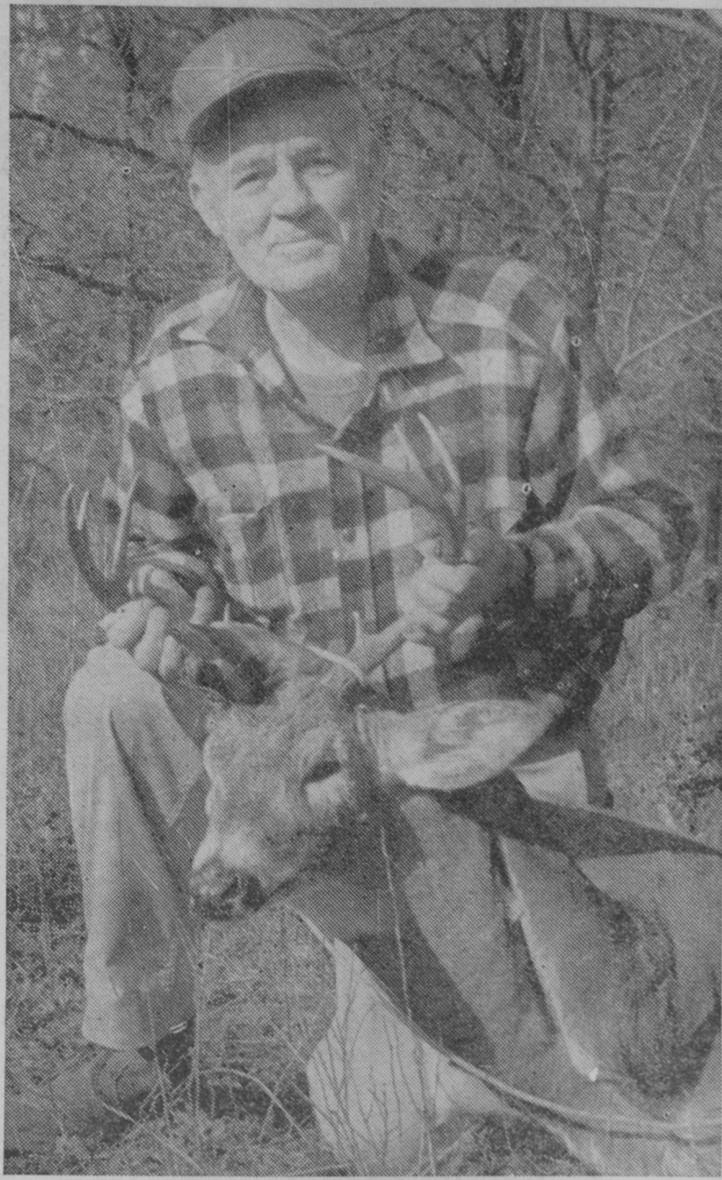


# Deer Harvest 'Best' in Years

"This season is like the old days." Comments like the above have been heard many times since last Friday's opening of the general deer season.

A large army of deer hunters invaded Michigan's north country last week-end and the Iosco area was jammed with red coats. Hunters swarmed into the county in numbers not unlike the plush 1950s.

Those area merchants who stayed open in the evenings as a service to visiting hunters "played" a happy tune on cash registers.

The largest deer kill in recent years has been reported, although it will be several weeks before an accurate estimate can be given by conservation department authorities.

Weather conditions seemed perfect for hunters, who enjoyed sunshine skies Friday and Saturday.

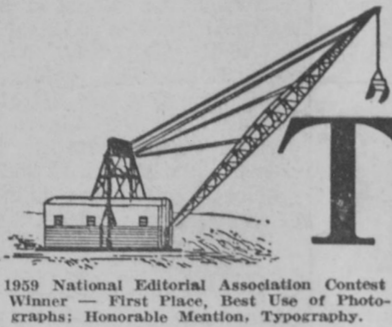

Rudolph Anderson reported getting his deer at 7:10 a. m. opening morning near his home in Baldwin Township.

While on patrol Saturday night, Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell spotted four deer crossing West State Street about one-half block west of Moffatt's Funeral Home in East Tawas. "The deer must figure that it is safer in town than out in the woods at night," said O'Farrell.

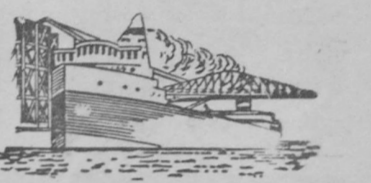

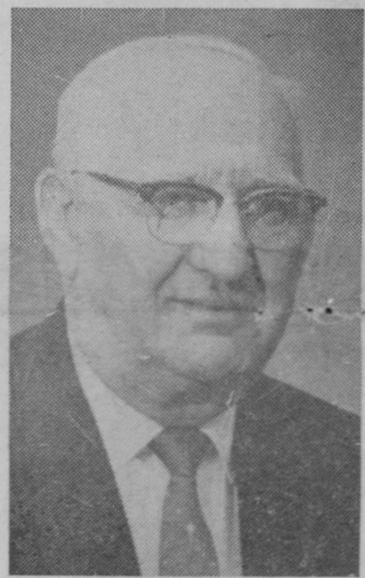

### Judge H. R. Smith to Retire Jan. 1st

Iosco Probate Judge H. Read Smith, 66, announced last week that he would retire from office effective January 1, 1964.

Judge Smith has served Iosco County for the past 24 years. He had been appointed in 1939 by the then Gov. Luren D. Dickinson to succeed Probate Judge David Davison.

Born in Lapeer, he graduated from high school there in 1916. He then studied at the Detroit College of Law for two years. After serving in the United States Navy during World War I, he returned to law college and graduated in 1921. He had been admitted the year previous to the state bar.

Coming to Tawas City in 1929, he established his law practice here and in 1932 was appointed city attorney. He served the city in that capacity for more than 20 years and also had served as acting county prosecuting attorney on a number of occasions.

Judge Smith has taken an active part in civic affairs here, having served on the Tawas City Board of Education, was elected justice of the peace at one time and retired only last year after serving as secretary-treasurer of the Tawas Hospital Association from its original organization.

He is a charter member of the Tawas Kiwanis Club, a life member of Tawas City Lodge, F&AM, and a member of Jesse C. Hodder American Legion Post.

"I have not made any particular plans about the future," said Judge Smith, "but I plan to vacation in Florida after the first of the year."

He said he expects to return here in the spring to resume his law practice "to some extent."

### Ralph Degesie Named Iosco Dem Chairman

Ralph Degesie of Whittemore was appointed to serve as chairman of the Iosco County Democratic Committee at a meeting held Thursday, November 14, in the Iosco County Building, Tawas City.

Degesie will serve until August 1964, replacing Donald Watson of Tawas City, who recently resigned. Other officers are Florence Stock, vice chairman; Henry Oates, secretary; and Roy Bergeron, treasurer. The latter positions remain unchanged.

### E. Tawas to Enforce Restrictions Soon on AM Street Parking

East Tawas will enforce its city ordinance prohibiting the parking of automobiles on all streets between the hours of 3:00 to 6:00 a. m. effective December 1.

At Monday night's regular council meeting, Supt. Paul Roper said that signs were to be erected this week notifying motorists of this ordinance.

Removal of autos from streets during those hours allows city crews to remove snow from the streets. Violators are to be prosecuted.

In other business, the council authorized removal of all parking meters between December 1 and April 1.

The department of public works is to install and decorate a Christmas tree at the state park by Thursday of this week.

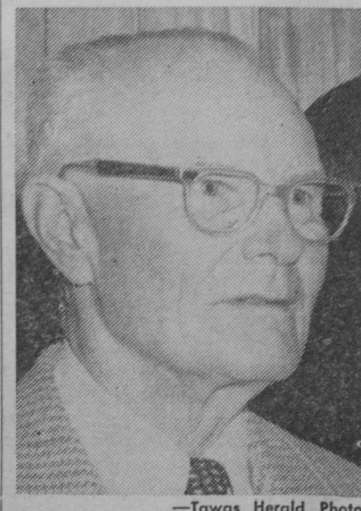

### Four Hunters Wounded in First Days of Season

Four hunters were victims of gunshot wounds during the first week of the general season on whitetails in Iosco County.

Latest gunshot victim was Max A. Evans, 45, Birmingham, who was treated Monday afternoon at Tawas Hospital for a lacerated and torn tip of the left ring finger.

Evans told officers that he was going to take a practice shot at a tree and found that the sights of his rifle were dirty. On brushing off the front sight with his left hand, the rifle discharged. The safety was in the "off" position.

Other gunshot victims included Richard Brabant, 25, of Detroit, who was hit twice by rifle slugs Sunday afternoon in Section 22 of Oscoda Township.

Brabant was struck in the right hip and upper right leg while walking down a trail with a companion. An unknown hunter was

said to have fired two times in rapid succession. He was treated at Tawas Hospital.

Warren H. Quine, 37, Detroit, became the season's first shooting victim in this area when a rifle slug fired by his son, Thomas, 14, struck him below the knee cap. The father and son were hunting in Wilber Township.

Officers said young Quine swung his rifle around to shoot at a fox and the blast hit his father. Fortunately, the slug passed through Quine's leg without hitting a bone. He was treated at Tawas Hospital.

David R. Simmons, 17, Flint, was treated on opening day at Tawas Hospital for a flesh wound above the right ankle. Hunting northeast of Hale near High Rollways, he was struck by a slug fired by Ralph Cain, 30, Owendale.

Serge V. Thomsson of Hale, "Mr. Scouting" of Iosco County, was honored last Wednesday night by receiving the Silver Beaver Award, the highest national honor a local council can give a scout.

Thomsson has been responsible for raising money for scouting at Hale for several years. His was the first community in the seven-county area of the Paul Bunyan Council fall.

While Hale raised the second highest per capita in the entire

Thomsson was responsible for organization of the scouting program in the Hale area. Following formation of the troop, he was instrumental in creating a cub pack and, within the past year, has organized an explorer post.

### Tawas Trailers Building New Ice Vending Units

Pilot models of a newly-designed ice vending machine are now being manufactured by Tawas Trailers, Incorporated, at its East Tawas plant.

Five of the ice cube dispensers have been completed and another five boxes are on the assembly line.

This new item is being manufactured by Vend-Master Company of Grand Rapids, owned by C. J. DeGaynor.

The Grand Rapids man had been midwestern representative for a large New York vending firm for a number of years and last July decided to go into business for himself.

He designed equipment necessary to dispense ice cubes in a coin-operated unit and then made arrangements with Tawas Trailers to manufacture a special insulated box in which to install equipment. Rotary vending reels are being manufactured by R. A. Meyers Company, East Tawas.

"We are very enthusiastic about prospective sales for this new vending equipment," said DeGaynor. "We have established a sales organization and, judging to early response, we should be manufacturing five or six boxes daily by next spring."

DeGaynor said he expects that the entire operation will be moved here eventually. At present, the dispensing equipment is being manufactured at Grand Rapids.

Such vending stations are being installed at service stations and in parks throughout the country. In addition to ice cubes, plans are to design equipment for dispensing charcoal, milk and bread.

The four-foot by eight-foot boxes presently being manufactured here are equipped with vending reels which hold 50 bags of ice cubes. The unit also has storage for an additional 150 to 200 bags.

DeGaynor said plans are to manufacture boxes as large as nine by 40 feet and equipped with self-contained ice manufacturing plants.

### Two Tax Errors Discussed by City; Attorney to Study

An error involving veteran's tax exemption was discussed Monday night by the Tawas City Council and a second bookkeeping error is to be investigated by the city attorney.

At the board of review meeting last March, only one tax exemption was allowed to a veteran, who is both disabled and blind.

Mayor George Tuttle said the city had learned from the state tax commission this week that such exemptions are accumulative and both should have been allowed. The city is to pay the difference.

The second error involves a bookkeeping mistake in which payment of taxes was not shown for the Tawas Masonic Temple. The city attorney is to make a complete report at the next council meeting.

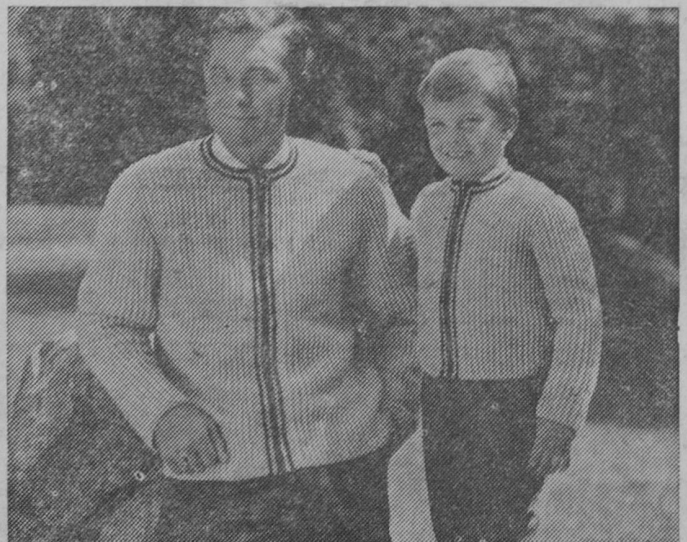

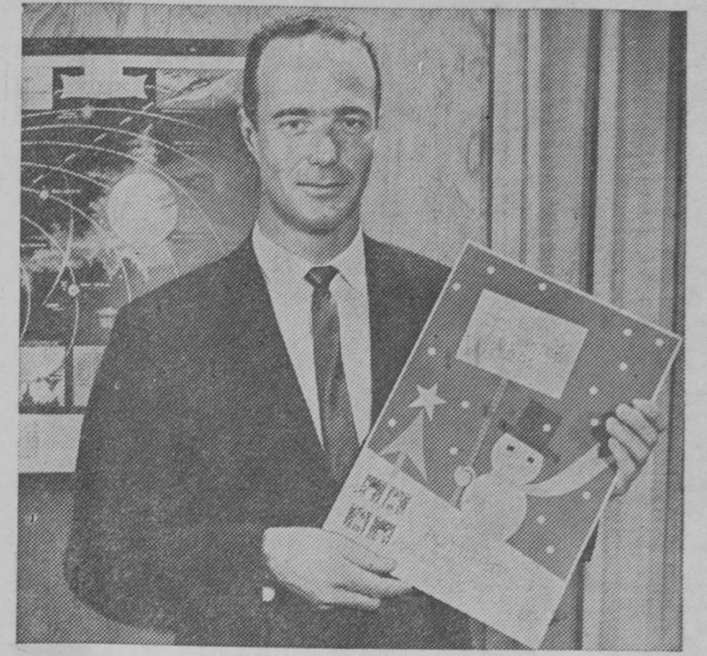

## Supervisors' Proceedings

NOVEMBER SESSION

November 5, 1963

Pursuant to October adjournment, the Isoco County Board of Supervisors was called to order at 9:30 a. m. by the chairman who ordered roll call. The following supervisors were present: Abbott, Ashton, Bellville, Blust, Everett, Gerard, Hosbach, LaVoy, Little, Nelkie, McKenzie, Meyers, Oates, O'Dell, Lixey, Stephan, Webb. Absent: Campbell, Smith.

Communications were read and referred to the proper committees by the chairman.

Mr. McKenzie for the insurance committee requested a check on all the county bonds in existence covering department heads, employees, deputies, etc.

Mr. Nelkie reported on the tour of county roads attended by members of this board together with road commissioners.

Mr. Little reported on his attendance at the Midland Conference for township officials.

Mr. Meyers read the following report of a meeting regarding

Isoco County Airport held in Lansing on October 23, 1963, attended by the following persons: Ralph Meyers, chairman, airport committee; Clarence Everett, airport committee; W. D. Nunn, county road commissioner; Otis Love, P. E., county road engineer; L. Smith, FAA; W. A. Colby, MDA; W. E. Hamlen, MDA; J. R. Carr, MDA; R. Perham, C. E.

Meeting on October 23, 1963, requested by the Isoco County officials to review their presentation for the 1965 Federal Aid Airport Program. Mr. Meyers advised that the appropriations were changed to make \$10,000 available for this current year, with the anticipation of an appropriation of an additional \$12,000 in the next fiscal year. This will still provide the total of \$22,000 toward an \$88,000 federal state-local project as previously discussed.

The estimates as prepared by the department of aeronautics for construction of a 3,500 feet by 75 feet runway, 150 feet by 40 feet taxiway and a 250 feet by 170 feet apron, including turnarounds at the ends of the runway and the construction of the intersection of the future runway, all this paving being a prime and double seal construction on a crushed stone base course, were reviewed. The unit prices appear reasonable, with the exception of the crushed stone

base course which the county would be making available to the contractor. It was estimated that this material could be furnished to the contractor for approximately \$2.50 a cubic yard and that the contractor's cost of hauling and placing would run about \$1.50 a yard. This would be a savings of approximately \$2 a cubic yard, or a net savings in the project construction costs of approximately \$11,000. This saving would then be adequate to allow the construction of the runway and the installation of medium intensity lights, beacon tower, etc., within the \$88,000 total available funds.

Mr. Peckham offered to the airport committee that he would prepare the plans at this time with the understanding that he would be accomplishing this during the next winter when his other work would be slack. He advised that this will assist them in getting their work done sooner and would then get away from the establishing of deadlines in the submission of plans for the program.

Mr. Hamlen dictated a memorandum on the county's dieting machine, advising of items which were to be furnished in order to complete the project request. This included a formal request from the county for inclusion in the 1965 program as well as the formal advice of the availability of these funds.

It was moved by Meyers supported by Blust that this report be incorporated in the minutes of this session. Carried unanimously.

Mr. John Henry presented the board with some bills from Consumers Power Company for street lighting at the Lumbermen's Monument. Referred to the committee on claims and accounts No. 1.

There being no committees ready to report, committees were ordered to their respective duties balance of the board to be at ease subject to the call of the chair.

Upon call to order at 12 o'clock noon, the board recessed until 1:30 p. m. upon motion supported and prevailing.

**AFTERNOON SESSION**  
Upon call to order at 1:30 p. m., roll call was ordered by the chairman. The same supervisors were present as at the morning session.

Mr. Little for the finance committee moved that the letter read by the clerk from the Michigan Children Aid Society be filed in the clerk's office. Mr. Little stated that it was the understanding of the finance committee that all bills for services rendered to this county by these organizations were to be referred to the Probate Judge for approval and then payment in full from the county general fund. The motion was supported by Bellville and carried unanimously.

Mr. McKenzie read the following report of the building and grounds committee:  
Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen:  
After reviewing the attached bids for furniture for the new supervisors room, we, the undersigned, recommend that the lowest bid of Yawman and Erbe of \$3,137.00 be accepted.

Also accept the bid of William Gregory to install and erect a podium as per letter dated 11-4-63 in the amount of \$686.00.

Upon commencement of the installation of a gas distribution system within the time specified, the Company shall proceed to complete the same as soon thereafter as reasonably practicable; provided, however, that the Company shall not be held responsible for delays due to weather or labor conditions, inability to procure necessary materials, or other causes beyond its control; and provided further, that such initial installation and all extensions shall be subject to the Main Extension provisions contained in the Company's Rules and Regulations for Gas Service as approved by the Michigan Public Service Commission.  
Section 3. Michigan Consolidated Gas Company, its successors and assigns, shall not unnecessarily obstruct the passage of any of the highways, streets, alleys or other public places within said Township and shall within a reasonable time after making an opening or excavation, repair the same and leave it in as good condition as before the opening or excavation was made. 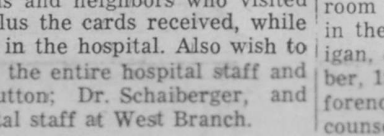

If such construction does not commence on or before that date this franchise shall terminate as more specifically provided in Section 6 hereof. Upon commencement of the installation of a gas distribution system within the time specified, the Company shall proceed to complete the same as soon thereafter as reasonably practicable; provided, however, that the Company shall not be held responsible for delays due to weather or labor conditions, inability to procure necessary materials, or other causes beyond its control; and provided further, that such initial installation and all extensions shall be subject to the Main Extension provisions contained in the Company's Rules and Regulations for Gas Service as approved by the Michigan Public Service Commission.  
Section 3. Michigan Consolidated Gas Company, its successors and assigns, shall not unnecessarily obstruct the passage of any of the highways, streets, alleys or other public places within said Township and shall within a reasonable time after making an opening or excavation, repair the same and leave it in as good condition as before the opening or excavation was made. The Company, its successors and assigns, shall use due care in exercising the privileges herein contained and shall be liable to said Township for all damages and costs which may be recovered against said Township arising from the default, carelessness or negligence of the Company or its officers, agents and servants.  
Section 4. The Company is now under the jurisdiction of the Michigan Public Service Commission to the extent provided by statute, and the rates to be charged for gas, and the standards and conditions of service and operation hereunder, shall be the same as now set forth in the Company's Schedule of Rules, Regulations and Rates as applicable in the City of Clare, or that shall hereafter be validly prescribed for the Township of Alabaster under the orders, rules and regulations of the Michigan Public Service Commission or other authority having jurisdiction in the premises.  
Section 5. The words "Michigan Consolidated Gas Company" and "the Company", wherever used herein, are intended and shall be construed to mean and include both Michigan Consolidated Gas Company and its successors and assigns, whether so expressed or not.  
Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately after the date of publication thereof, which shall be within ten (10) days after the date of its adoption, and shall continue in effect for a period of thirty (30) years thereafter, subject to revocation at the will of the Township at any time during the said thirty (30) year period and subject to the condition that if the Company shall fail to commence the installation of a gas distribution system within the time provided in Section 2 hereof, then this ordinance and the franchise hereby granted shall, without further action on the part of the Township become null and void and of no further force or effect; provided, however, that when this ordinance shall become effective the Township Clerk shall deliver to the Company a certified copy of the ordinance accompanied by written evidence of publication and recording thereof as required by law and that Michigan Consolidated Gas Company shall, within sixty (60) days after the date of the adoption of this ordinance, file with the Township Clerk its written acceptance of the conditions and provisions hereof.
