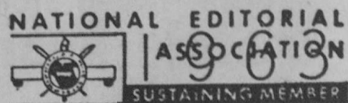

Annual Christmas Concert Date Set by Community Chorus

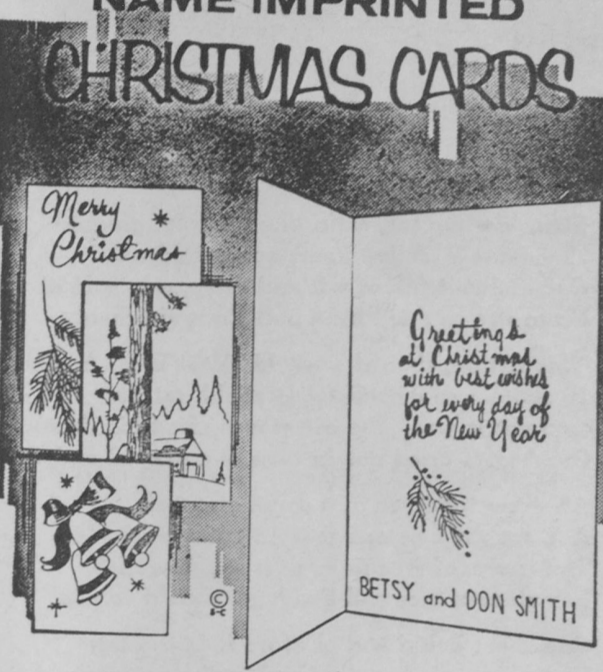
Final plans are being made for the annual Christmas concert by the Tawas Community Chorus. The concert will be staged December 7 in the Tawas Area School Auditorium.

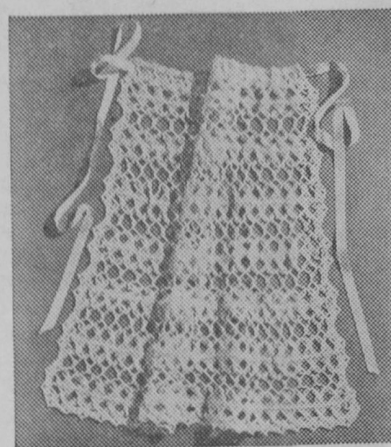

Hale Boy Begins Navy Basic Training At Great Lakes, Ill.

William H. Redman, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest E. Redman of Hale, has begun basic training at the Naval Training Center, Great Lakes, Illinois. The nine-week training includes naval orientation, history and organization, seamanship, ordnance and gunnery, military drill, physical fitness, first aid and survival.

During the training, recruits receive tests and interviews which determine their future assignments in the navy. Upon completing the program, they are assigned to service schools for technical instruction or to ships and stations for on-the-job training in a navy rating specialty.

Naval training produces the power in seapower by supplying qualified personnel to man the ships, aircraft and shore stations of today's navy.

Marine PFC John E. Deshano, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph L. Deshano of Turner, was graduated October 18 from the Field Radio Operators School at Division Schools Center, First Marine Division, Camp Pendleton, California.

The six-week course is designed to train selected enlisted communications personnel in the installation, operation and maintenance of field radio equipment. It included classroom lectures, demonstrations and practical application in the field.

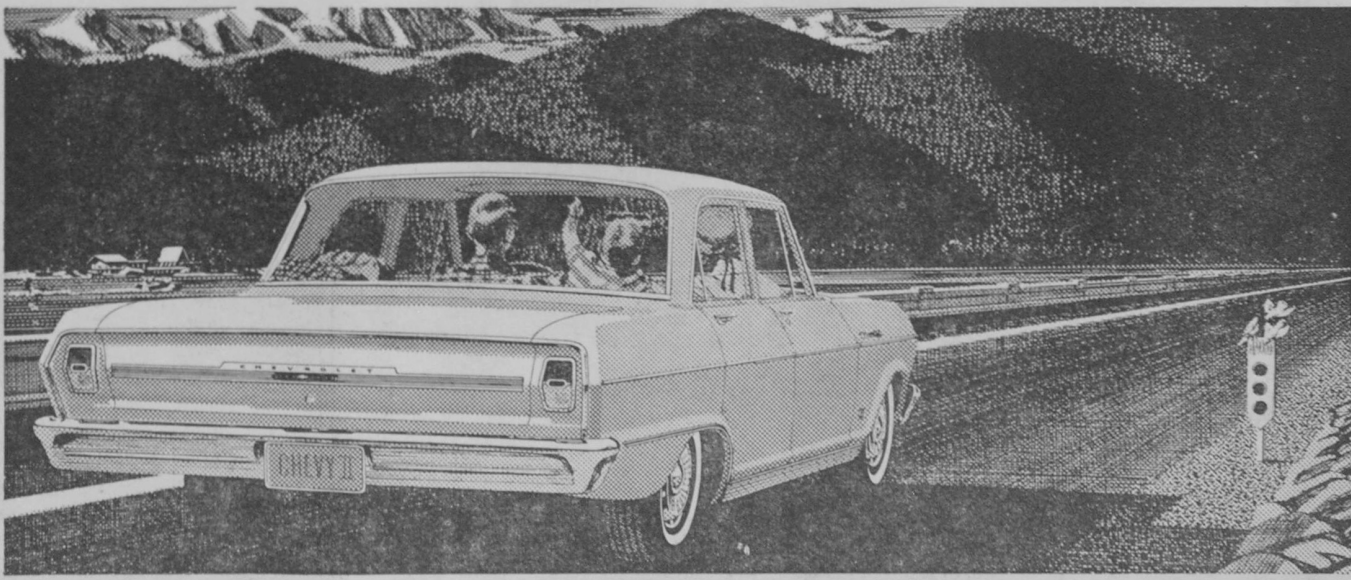

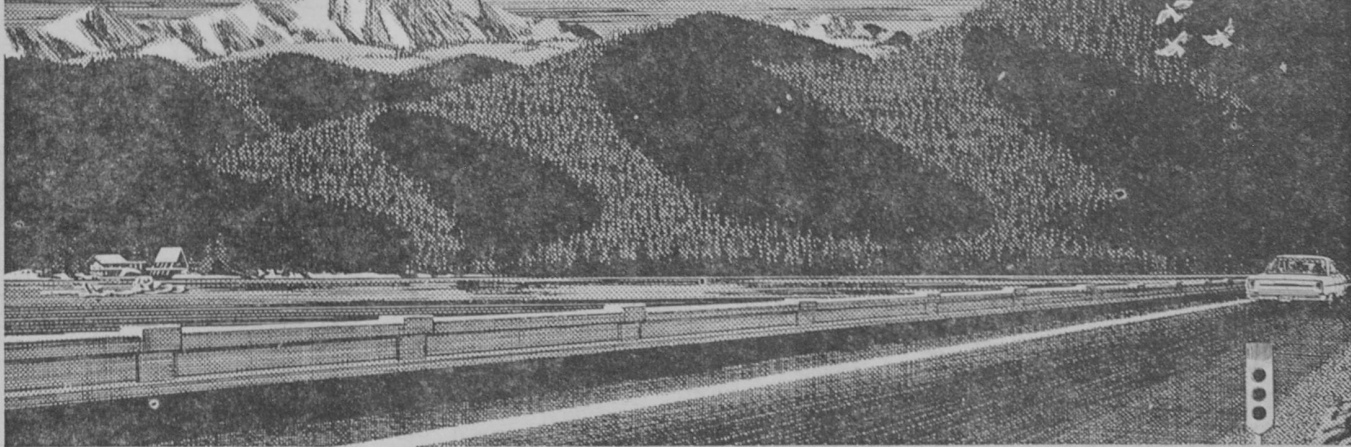
MRS. EDITH E. EARHART

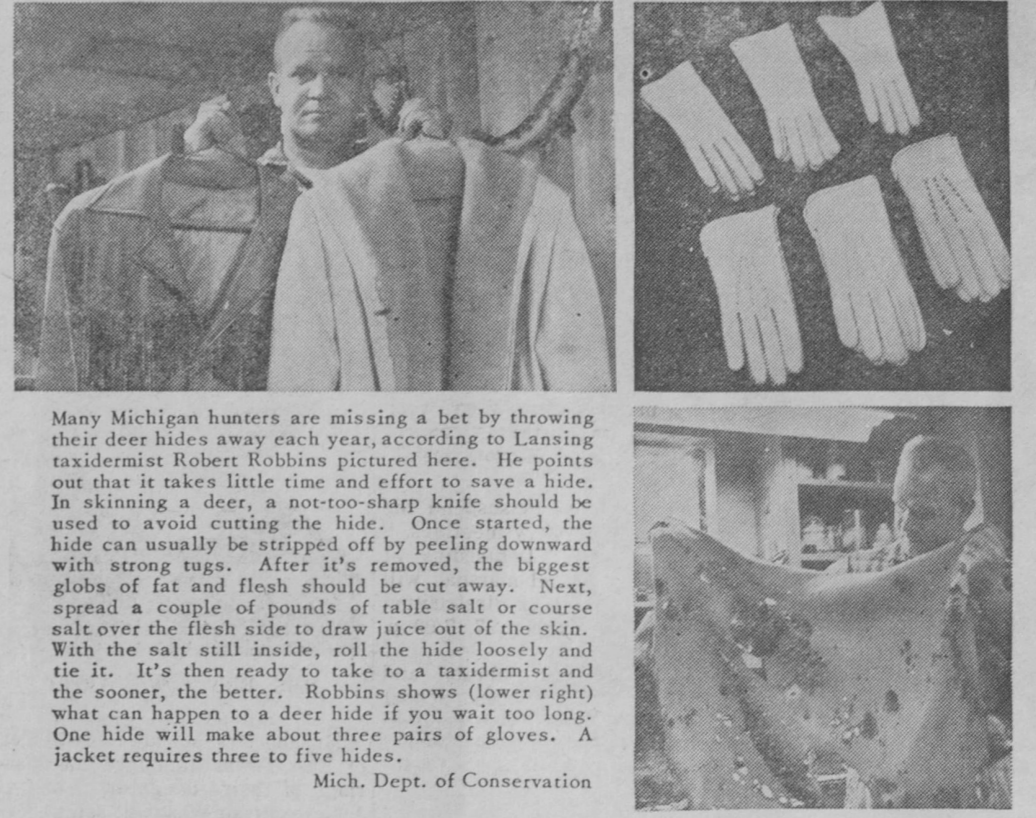

Making The Most of Deer Hides



Many Michigan hunters are missing a bet by throwing their deer hides away each year, according to Lansing taxidermist Robert Robbins pictured here. He points out that it takes little time and effort to save a hide. In skinning a deer, a not-too-sharp knife should be used to avoid cutting the hide. Once started, the hide can usually be stripped off by peeling downward with strong tugs. After it's removed, the biggest globs of fat and flesh should be cut away. Next, spread a couple of pounds of table salt or course salt over the flesh side to draw juice out of the skin. With the salt still inside, roll the hide loosely and tie it. It's then ready to take to a taxidermist and the sooner, the better. Robbins shows (lower right) what can happen to a deer hide if you wait too long. One hide will make about three pairs of gloves. A jacket requires three to five hides.
