Judge Adjourns Hearing; Await Tax District Map

Hearing on a proposed tax assessment district to finance construction of a Tawas Lake dam has been adjourned to a later date by Circuit Judge Richard G. Smith of Bay City.

Filling the bench in place of Iosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller, who disqualified himself, Judge Smith adjourned the case indefinitely in order that property descriptions contained in the proposed district may be presented to the court.

This action followed testimony last Wednesday of Drain Commissioner E. H. (Bert) Stickney, who reported a modification of the proposed assessment district.

The modification, as outlined by Stickney, eliminated a considerable amount of property from the proposed assessment district on the north, south and west sides of the lake.

He said that only property receiving a direct benefit from the proposed dam would be taxed.

When completed, a date is to be set by the court for reviewing a map showing the proposed assessment district.

Judge Reserves Decision on Sign

Announcement of a decision on forcing removal of a sign from state highway right-of-way north of Oscoda has been reserved for 30 days by Iosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

At a pretrial hearing Monday, Judge Miller indicated that his decision at that time would be "adverse" to Carl A. Brownell Jr., plaintiff.

On September 5, Judge Miller issued a restraining order which stopped the state from removing Brownell's large advertising sign along US-23. At that time, the judge ordered the highway department to show cause why the restraining order should not be made a permanent injunction.

Attorneys for Brownell admitted in court that the sign was within the highway-right-of-way. It was pointed out that there were many sign encroachments on the highway in that area and that Brownell wished the same treatment accorded to others.

Attorneys for the state said that as a general policy, all signs will be removed from the highway right-of-way.

Mielock Graduates as State Police Recruit

Larry Mielock of East Tawas graduated September 25 from the nine-week Michigan State Police recruit school held at East Lansing headquarters.

Mielock has been assigned to the Redford post where he will spend his six-month probationary period. He will then return for four weeks of advanced training at East Lansing.

The new trooper's wife, nee Janet Klein, and their two boys, David and Kevin, will join him at Redford to make their new home.

New Varsity Club Seeks to Upgrade Athletics at Tawas Area High School

Members of a new Varsity Club, organized for the purpose of upgrading policies and behavior of athletes at Tawas Area High School, were introduced during last Friday night's football game.

Charter membership in the 1963 group includes 13 boys who graduated from Tawas Area last spring. Candidates become eligible to enter the club upon winning a varsity letter, but application for membership must have been made by the individual. Prerequisites for entry in the organization are scholarship, citizenship, loyalty to the school and community interest.

Those members who are presently attending school here were issued red blazers. The jackets are to be worn at school functions and are to be returned at the end of the school term.

Members attending high school are to perform various duties during the school year, including parking of cars and selling programs at athletic contests.

Graduating seniors are to be honored each year at a banquet and dance. At that time, a three-year pass to athletic events is to be issued each alumni member.

Officers for 1963 include Donald Lear, president; Charles Anschuetz, vice president; Thomas Ferguson, secretary; Larry Killey, treasurer.

The club is governed by an athletic council consisting of Coaches Herbert Escott and Bill McIntosh,

Athletic Director Ronald Wiltse, plus the president and vice president of the club.

16th Annual AuSable Race Starts Saturday

Sixteenth annual AuSable River Valley Canoe Race will be held this Saturday and Sunday on a 240-mile course from Grayling to Oscoda.

The race is expected to attract 30 or more of the best canoe racing teams from the United States and Canada. A pole position sprint race is to be held Friday on Lake Margrethe near Grayling. Teams are to leave that community Saturday morning at 15-second intervals in the order of their finish in the sprint race.

First lap of the race is to start from Grayling at 10:30 a. m. Saturday with the finish at Mio about 4:00 p. m. Second lap will start from Mio at 6:30 a. m. Sunday and the winners are expected to cross the finish line in Oscoda by 4:00 p. m.

Total prize money of \$3,050 will be divided among the top 10 teams. Top prize money to the winning team will be \$1,200 and

the first 10 canoe teams across the finish line will receive cash prizes and participation medals.

The race is co-sponsored by the Crawford County and Mio Chambers of Commerce, Townships of Oscoda and AuSable, Consumers Power Company and the East Michigan Tourist Association.

Bipartisan Canvassing Board Named by Iosco

A new county canvassing board was appointed last Thursday by the Iosco Board of Supervisors. Organized under a new provision of the state constitution, two Republicans and two Democrats were named to the board.

The county canvassing board has responsibility for tabulating returns and checking ballots after local elections. It also conducts election recounts when necessary. Previously, it had been composed of three members.

Four-year board members named were C. L. McLean of Tawas City, Republican, and Arden Charters, Democrat, Whittemore. Two-year members are Fred Holzheuer, Republican, Hale, and Harold Peterson, Democrat, Tawas City.

Candidates were selected from a list furnished by each political party in the county.

In other business conducted last week, Robert Curtis of Whittemore was named to replace Mrs. Harold Adams on the Iosco-Arenac Regional Library Board.

Drain Commissioner E. H. (Bert) Stickney addressed the board and a site for the proposed Tawas Lake dam was approved.

The board's roads and bridges committee announced that a tour of county roads would be arranged

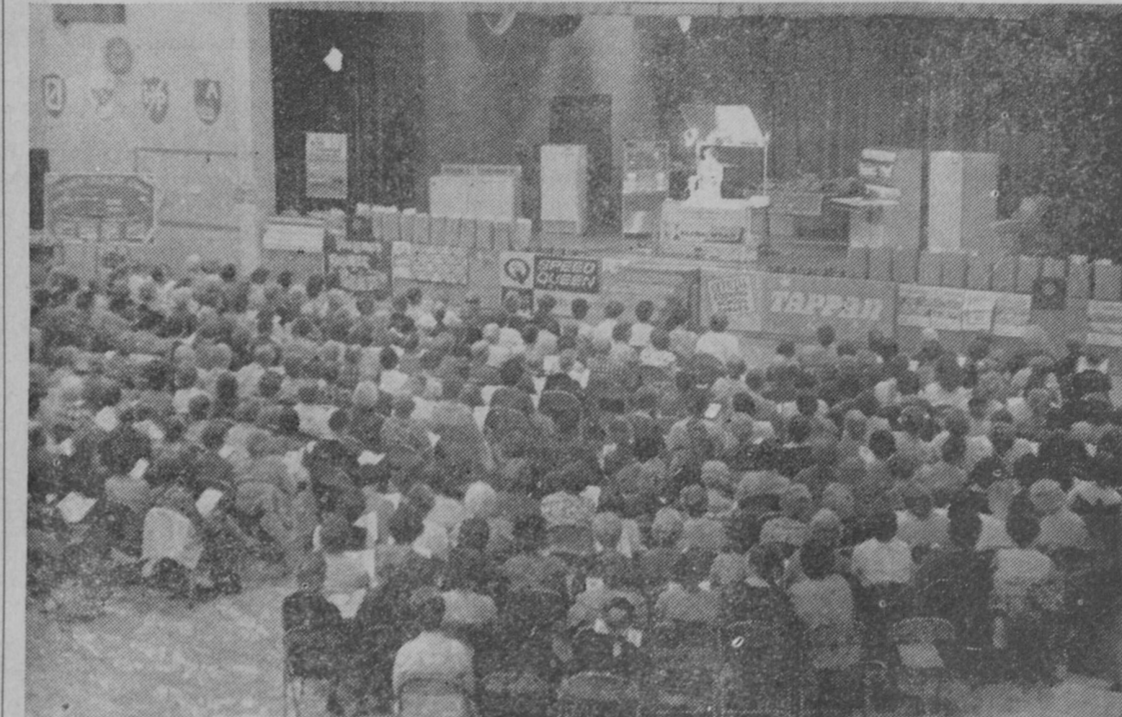
soon by the Iosco County Road Commission. This is an annual inspection by members of the board of supervisors.

Miss Dorothy Scott, county extension agent, reported that 800 of the 1,000 plat books printed for Iosco County had been sold.

The board authorized rehiring of a clerk in the cooperative extension agent's office for the remainder of the year. Employment of the secretary terminated in August. She is recording secretary of the county planning commission.

Authorization was given to all tax assessing officers in the county to attend the tax assessors conference September 3 at Grand Rapids. Eligible to attend were city tax assessors of East Tawas and Whittemore and supervisors of other units. Expenses were to have been paid by the county.

The board appropriated \$265 to the Oscoda Chamber of Commerce as its share for printing new maps. Recommendation to appraise contents of jail and county building failed on a 10-7 roll call. A survey recently conducted had made this recommendation but majority of the members felt an inventory presently in the hands of the clerk was sufficient for insurance purposes. The appraisal would have cost \$600.

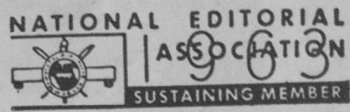
He is a World War II navy veteran, is married and the father of three sons. His mother is Mrs. Harry Gaul of Tawas City.

How Much Do We Want 4-H?

During the past 50 years, 4-H Clubs have grown to be the largest youth organization in the world with approximately 2,285,600 boys and girls enrolled in more than 94,700 clubs throughout the United States and Puerto Rico. And there are 307,750 local leaders and many thousand 4-H friends assisting in this work.

Through the 4-H Clubs, the nation's youth learn many skills through their many projects and develop desirable ideals and sound standards for better farming and homemaking practices. They acquire better understandings and attitudes toward family and community living, and develop better citizenship and leadership abilities.

Are we making the most of this 4-H Club program in Isosco County? Are the county's young people receiving an appreciable and creditable amount of training, experiences and rewards from this free and voluntary youth program? These are good questions to ask ourselves during this annual National 4-H Club Week?

The theme of this 1963 National 4-H Club Week is "4-H Young Citizens In Action." Some of the goals of this week's theme as expressed by the National Extension Service are:

"To focus on 1963's citizenship-in-action goals for members, to emphasize career exploration and the value of wise decision-making regarding vocational choices, influence more boys and girls 10 to 19 years of age to join or form 4-H Clubs, acquaint more parents with 4-H and seek their cooperation, encourage capable and youth-minded men and women to volunteer as local leaders, honor 4-H friends locally and nationally, and express appreciation for the important part they play."

What added action can we take to assist in this "National 4-H Young Citizens In Action" movement and improve our 4-H Club program in Isosco County?

First perhaps, we have to acquaint ourselves (and this includes parents, club members and leaders both active and prospective) with the possibilities 4-H Clubs have for young people through training, experiences and awards when they join or form a 4-H Club. This can be done by contacting the county agents or their assistants at the Cooperative Extension Service offices in the Federal Building, East Tawas, or seeing one of the local leaders in your home community.

So it becomes the responsibility of everyone to GO to their superior to acquaint themselves with their responsibilities and then to give a little more than is required or expected of them to see that the job is done.

Members with this 4-H Club philosophy and the interest and encouragement of their parents will win the medals. Leaders with it will make a 4-H Club program GO!

4-H Club leadership can be a challenge and a great satisfaction and is a responsibility not to be accepted lightly. For as a local leader, we are helping to form the habit channels and characters of the young people with whom we work and how well our club programs are organized, how punctual we are in following this program, and how fair and dependable we are in our work with these young people—may their characters be influenced and formed.

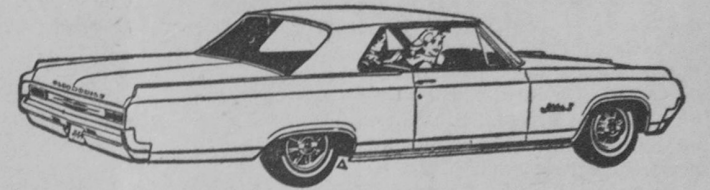

More Protection Under SS Than Most People Realize

"Many people have more protection under social security than they realize," according to Paul M. Ellifritz, social security district manager in Bay City. "We are continually surprised by the number of people who still think of social security only in terms of retirement benefits," he said.

Actually, retired workers account for little more than half of these in the total benefit rolls. The younger worker has the reassurance of knowing that his social security contributions will also provide monthly benefits for his widow and minor children in case of his death. These can total as much as \$254 a month. Nearly half a million widows under 62 are receiving those monthly benefits for themselves and the more than 2,000,000 children in their care.

"Disability payments are one of the newer aspects of the social security program. The majority of the people we talk to know that we have such a program, but many of these have a hazy understanding of its provisions," Mr. Ellifritz said. "In order to qualify for disability benefits, a worker must be

unable to do any substantial work and must have worked under social security for at least five of the 10 years before becoming disabled." Monthly benefits are payable to the worker if all the requirements are met, as well as to his children under age 18 and his wife.

"Retirement is a much more pleasant prospect to contemplate of course," said Mr. Ellifritz, "and practically everybody knows that we make payments when the worker reaches age 65. Not everyone knows, though, that a worker can retire on a reduced benefit as early as 62 and that his wife can also qualify when she is that age."

And if he has children under 18, payments can be made to them and to his wife, even if she is not 62."

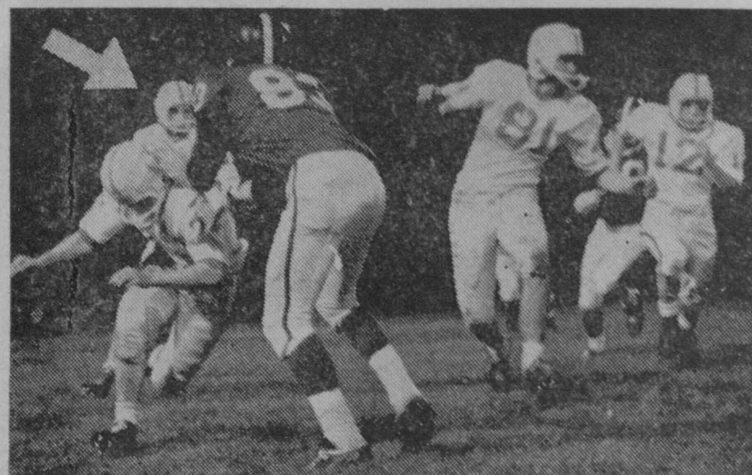

Showing improvement for the second straight week, Tawas Area Braves downed Oscoda, 13-6, last Friday night to extend their winning streak to 11 games over the past two seasons.

The two teams played on fairly even terms but Tawas held a slight edge in the defensive department and its offense connected in the first quarter on a key touchdown situation.

Tawas Area's first touchdown came on the game's opening series. Halfback Jim Herriman picked

up five yards on the opening play and Halfback Don Lear ground out a first down in two runs.

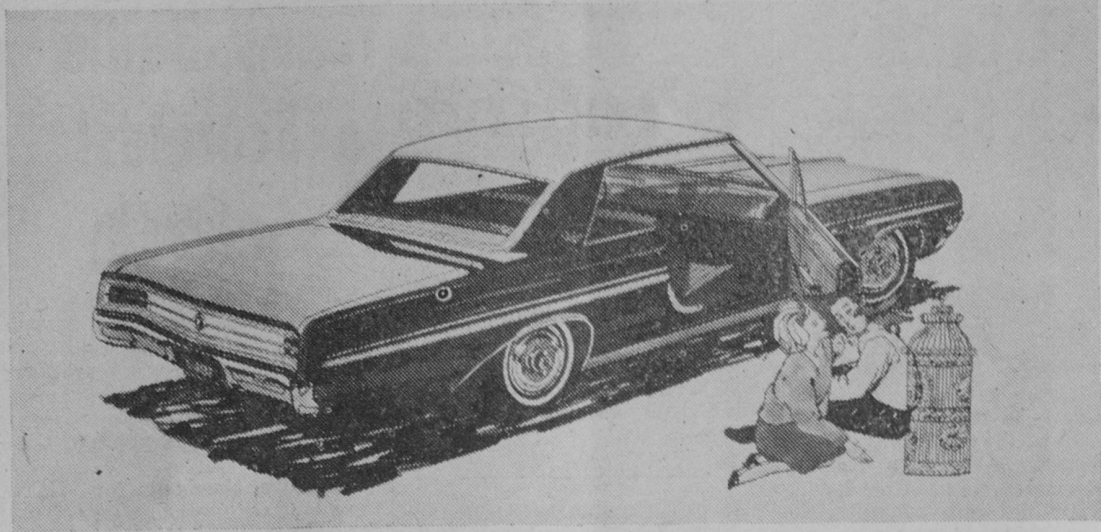

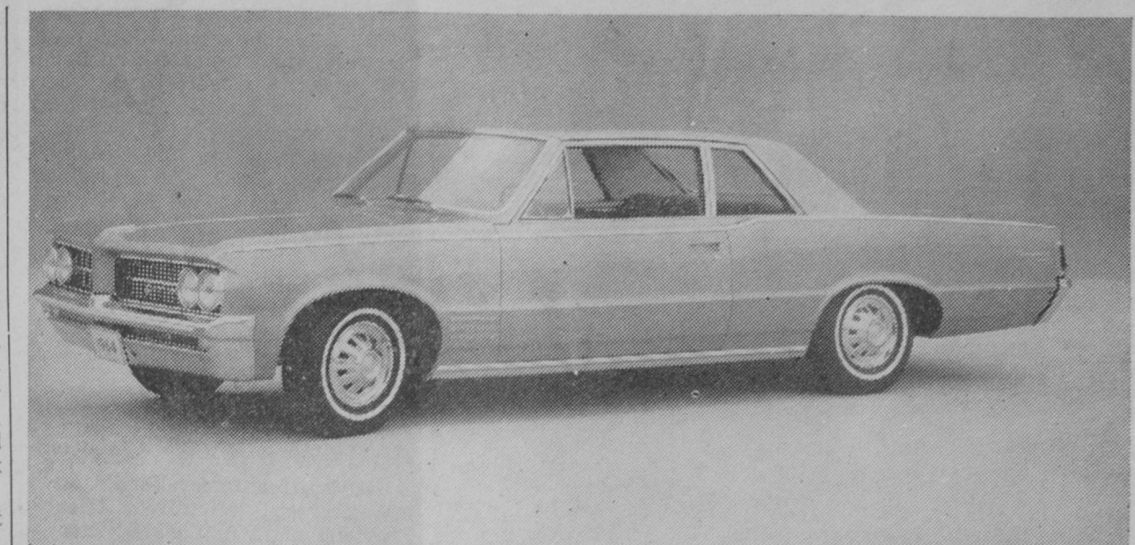

ORDINANCE NO. ONE

THE CITY OF WHITTEMORE ORDAINS:

Section 1. Subject to all the terms and conditions mentioned in this ordinance, consent is hereby given to Michigan Consolidated Gas Company, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of Michigan, and to its successors and assigns, to lay, maintain, operate and use gas pipes, mains, conductors, service pipes and other necessary equipment in the highways, streets, alleys and other public places in the City of Whittemore, Isoco County, Michigan, and a franchise is hereby granted to Michigan Consolidated Gas Company, its successors and assigns, to transact a local business in said City of Whittemore, for the purpose of conveying gas into and through, and supplying and selling gas in said City and all other matters incident thereto.

Section 2. The Company has made application to the cities of Tawas City and East Tawas for franchises to supply and sell gas therein. If such franchises are granted to the Company and continue effective, and if the provisions and conditions herein contained are accepted by the Company as in Section 6 hereof provided, then Michigan Consolidated Gas Company, after it receives such regulatory approval as may be necessary to convey natural gas to the cities of Tawas City, East Tawas and Whittemore, shall within a reasonable time thereafter commence installation of a gas distribution system within the boundaries of the City of Whittemore and shall proceed to complete the same by September 1, 1964; provided however, that the Company shall not be held responsible for delays due to weather or labor conditions, inability to procure necessary materials, or other causes beyond its control; and provided further, that such initial installation and all extensions shall be subject to the Main Extension provisions contained in the Company's Rules and Regulations for Gas Service as approved by the Michigan Public Service Commission.

Section 3. Michigan Consolidated Gas Company, its successors and assigns, shall not unnecessarily obstruct the passage of any of the highways, streets, alleys or other public places within said City and shall within a reasonable time after making an opening or excavation, repair the same and leave it in as good condition as before the opening or excavation was made. The Company, its successors and assigns, shall use due care in exercising the privileges herein contained and shall be liable to said City for all damages and costs which may be recovered against said City arising from the default, carelessness or negligence of the Company or its officers, agents and servants.

No road, street, alley or highway shall be opened for the laying of trunk lines or lateral mains except upon application to the City Council, or other authority having jurisdiction in the premises, stating the nature of the proposed work and the route. Upon receipt of such application, it shall be the duty of the City Council, or such other authority as may have jurisdiction, to issue a permit to the Company to do the work proposed.

Section 4. The Company is now under the jurisdiction of the Michigan Public Service Commission to the extent provided by statute, and the rates to be charged for gas, and the standards and conditions of service and operation hereunder, shall be same as those now set forth in the Company's Schedule of Rates, Regulations and Rates as applicable in the City of Clare or that shall hereafter be validly prescribed for the City of Whittemore under the orders, rules and regulations of the Michigan Public Service Commission or other authority having jurisdiction in the premises.

Section 5. The words "Michigan Consolidated Gas Company" and "the Company," wherever used herein, are intended and shall be held and construed to mean and include both Michigan Consolidated Gas Company and its successors and assigns, whether so expressed or not.

Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately after the date of publication thereof, which shall be within one (1) week of the date of its passage, and shall continue in effect for a period of thirty (30) years thereafter, subject to revocation at the will of the City at any time during said

Varieties grown include DeKalb, Funk, King Cross, Michigan and some experimental varieties.

Michigan State University crops department specialists, Leyton Nelson and Stuart Hildebrand, will be on hand to weigh, record and discuss the yields of the several varieties.

Farmers growing corn in this area should attend to see for themselves the varieties that grow best in this area. This one-hour meeting can mean \$100 more income for a grower, states Marvin Davenport, county extension director.

There will be appropriate door prizes available, including a bushel of seed corn for 1964.

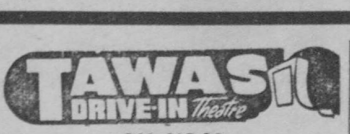
