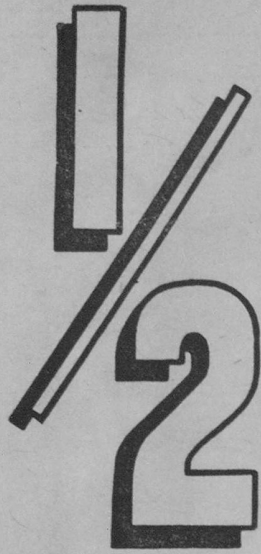

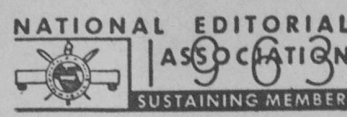

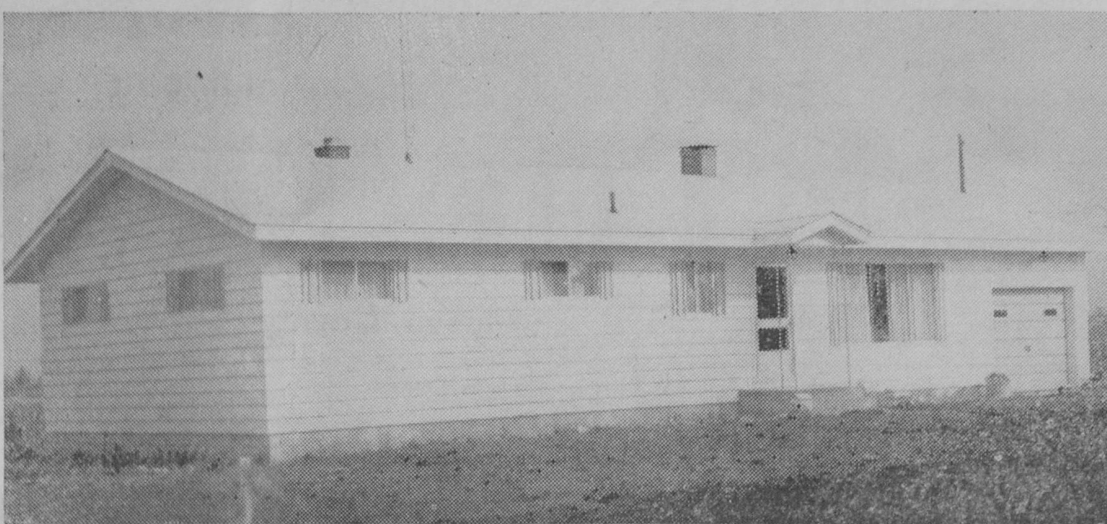

To The Editor:

Last week-end, we spent a few days at our cottage in the vicinity of the Tawas. As we have done many times in the past, we attended the Family Theatre on Saturday night and we could not help but notice the decrease in attendance since the close of the summer season. It prompted me to write this letter to your paper.

Our hometown is Midland, a city of approximately 35,000 population which is without an indoor movie house. Our last theatre was closed two years ago because of lack of attendance and an inability to control vandalism and rowdyism. It has meant to us an end of the family night out at the movies. A group of young people can no longer attend a theatre without arranging with parents to take them to Bay City or Saginaw. The teenager on a date must attend a school dance, the community center or look elsewhere for entertainment. We miss our theatre very much.

We have always found the Family Theatre in East Tawas a pleasure to attend. Your young people have been well behaved. The pictures shown there have been first run movies that we could all enjoy.

I am concerned that the people of your community may not realize that these are hard times for movie houses and their existence through the winter months merits community support. You will find it much easier to support an existing theatre than to convince a businessman to establish a new one in a town which failed to support its last. I am also prompted to remind you that financially your town depends upon the tourist trade and your movie house is a definite asset to that trade.

My family hopes to be able to attend the Family Theatre for many years to come.

Dear Editor:

The Michigan Education Association believes that tenure has been operating successfully in Michigan over a period of 20 years.

In that time, 59 districts, both large such as Grand Rapids and small such as Cheboygan, have voted to have tenure.

In the early period, only a few districts voted for tenure. The Michigan Tenure Act was passed in 1937. In 1938, Center Line, a suburb of Detroit, approved tenure. The superintendent of schools there was a member of a committee that studied tenure in other states and helped write the Michigan Tenure Act of 1937. It took a year to educate his teachers and the community so that they would understand their responsibilities under tenure.

He emphasized to the school board that only well qualified, efficient, moral and devoted teachers should be hired or kept in their positions.

He pointed out to his teachers that they must qualify as stable, well educated and ethical persons to remain under tenure.

The community was told to expect and demand an efficient school system. Teachers would be dismissed if they were proven incompetent, immoral or unqualified. Such charges would be presented in writing to the teacher involved 60 days before the end of the school year. The teacher would be entitled to a hearing before the board of education.

If the charges were considered unjustified by the teacher, he has the right of appeal to the Michigan Tenure Commission.

Center Line laid careful ground work and to date no charges have been carried up from there.

After intensified study of the Center Line experiment, Ann Arbor voted in tenure. Next came Highland Park and then Royal Oak. Mistakes were made and corrected in these systems and finally a school tenure policy was worked out based on a strict code of ethics and professional procedure. Later this tenure policy, published by the Royal Oak schools, was adopted in other tenure districts.

The success of the tenure act depends on a probationary period

of two or three years for each beginning teacher.

The new teacher is assigned to a qualified and experienced tenure teacher who advises and guides him under the direction of the principal until he is placed on tenure.

In a few cases, the probationer must have a third year of such guidance and training. Sometimes the probationer does not qualify and must be dismissed.

Amendments to the tenure act made in 1963 emphasized and clarified the probationary period and the right of a board of education to dismiss a probationary teacher upon recommendation of the superintendent.

This provision had been understood by tenure districts and had been followed until in 1956, a probationary teacher, dismissed for incompetence, appealed to the Michigan Tenure Commission and was refused a hearing there. She took her case to circuit court and was upheld. The case was carried to supreme court where the teacher was upheld because of insufficient evidence.

This had the effect of wiping out the probationary period which is the safeguard built into the tenure law.

For the next seven years, the MEA did not recommend new districts to come under tenure. Instead, they worked to get necessary changes in the law. This has been done.

Another change that seemed necessary was to get broader representation on the Michigan Tenure Commission. The act now provides for a school board member, a school superintendent, a lay citizen, a teacher and an attorney to constitute the tenure commission. These members have the jurisdiction of a court of law and are appointed by the governor.

Cases may be appealed to the Michigan Supreme Court by either party.

Cases from tenure districts have been relatively few. In a non-tenure district, cases of unfair dismissal go to the Michigan Education Association office. During March, April and May, there is always a deluge of these equity cases. During the current year alone, there have been over 600 cases requiring legal help. None were from tenure districts.

In the last 20 years, there have been a total of 109 cases carried to the Michigan Tenure Commission. Less than a dozen have gone to the supreme court.

The strong policies developed in the tenure districts, based on a strict code of ethics, has resulted in the professional growth of tenure teachers.

For these reasons, the MEA now wishes to initiate a petition to the state legislature to make teacher tenure mandatory rather than optional in the State of Michigan.

Petitions are being circulated over the state now to accomplish this.

Your cooperation is getting this matter before the legislature will be appreciated.

# Braves Nail Down Northern B Championship

Tawas Area Braves nailed down their second consecutive Northern B Conference championship last Friday with an 18-0 win over Gladwin's Flying Gs.

Halfback Jim Herriman, closely guarded by opposing teams all season, finally broke loose for two touchdowns, the first coming on a 35-yard off-tackle play. Halfback Don Lear won conference scoring honors by rambling 26 yards for a third quarter touchdown.

Undefeated in five league contests and one nonconference game this year, Tawas Area's victory string now stands at 14 over the past two seasons.

Now aiming for their second straight undefeated season, the Braves will play host to Houghton Lake's Bobcats this Friday night. Fathers of football players will be honored during halftime activities.

Tawas lost little time in getting the jump on Gladwin Friday night, but not before the home team put on one of its best offensive showings of the night for a partisan homecoming crowd.

Gladwin took the opening kickoff, picked up two first downs and marched to Tawas Area's 31-yard line before finally being stopped on downs by Tawas defense.

Although the Braves had trouble stopping Gladwin Halfback Dennis Breault in the first half, not enough can be said about the importance of this strong defense in Tawas' second conference title.

Led by Guards Don Evans and Larry Killey, along with Tackles Ken Sheldon and Ken Tarnosky, the Braves have racked up three straight shutout victories and allowed but 20 points in the other two league contests, along with six points in the nonconference opener against Whittemore-Prescott.

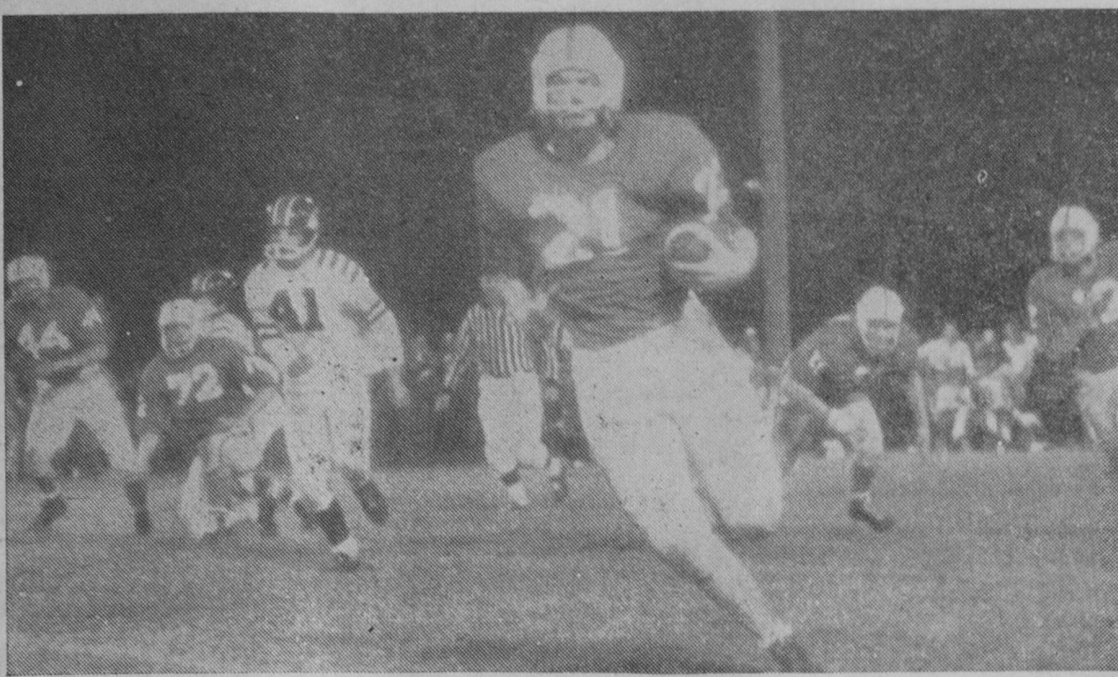
Tawas scored shortly after taking over on fourth down in the first quarter. Herriman picked up seven yards. Lear rambled 16 yards in two plays and Fullback Don Harten carried for one yard to put the ball five yards inside Gladwin territory.

The next play saw Herriman in an unusual role for him. He took a handoff from Quarterback Dale Harten, faked as if to run the ball and then hit End Herb Humphrey with a 10-yard pass along the sidelines. After Humphrey's great catch, Herriman slashed over tackle for a 35-yard touchdown run, hitting Gladwin's defenders like "the Herriman of old" when he scored 24 touchdowns in his sophomore and junior years.

Gladwin pushed into Tawas territory again, but Humphrey recovered a fumble on the 36 after the Braves' line racked up Quarterback Greg Juneau.

Tawas looked as though it would score again in the second quarter but, after picking up four first downs, fumbled the ball away on the Gladwin 17.

Most of the quarter was played in Gladwin territory as Lear returned a fourth down punt 17 yards to Gladwin's 38. The Braves

Gladwin was backed against its own goal to start the final period.

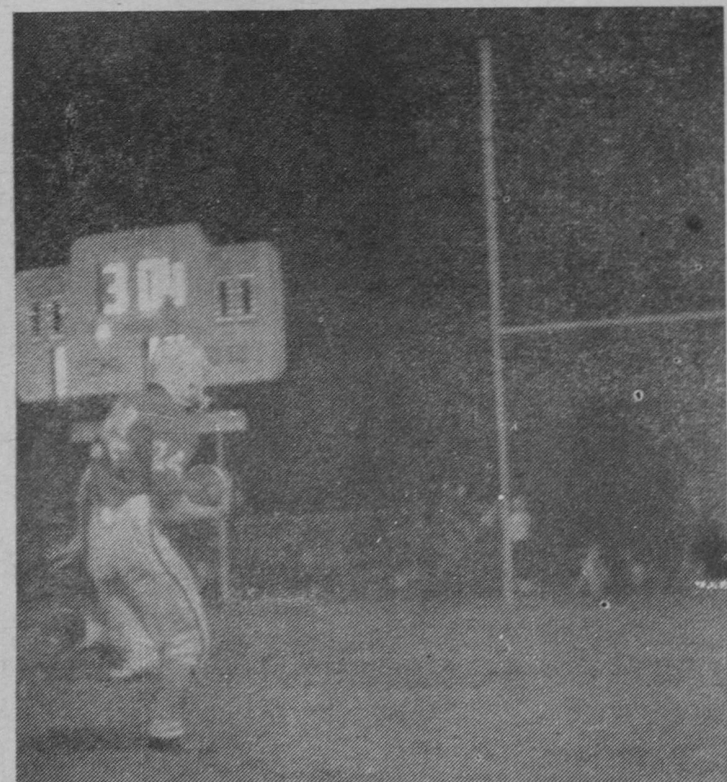
