



From a total of eight animals released in the Pigeon River area during the 1918-19 period, Michigan's elk herd has grown to become one of the major tourist attractions in this neck of the state's northern woods. It also has expanded to create a problem of numbers; a problem marked by such storm warnings as over-browsing and indications of elk starvation. Size of the herd is estimated between 2,000 and 3,500 animals. The Conservation Department has undertaken a long-range research program to refine this estimate and cross-check other information which has been collected since the herd was established 45 years ago. While this project has not been completed, one fact stands out clearly: small-scale, carefully controlled hunting is going to be needed soon, and carried on from year to year, to keep these animals from doing further damage to limited winter food supplies which are also used by deer. Main goal of the elk management program, of course, will be to maintain and promote the value of this herd as a public viewing attraction.
