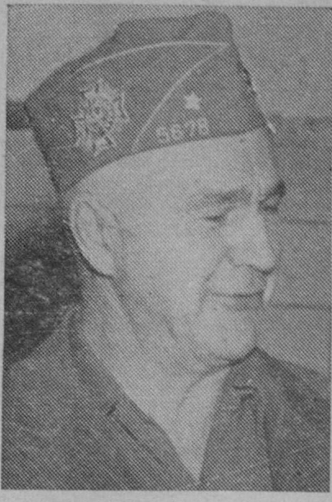


# Harry M. Morley Dead; First VFW Commander

Harry Marshall Morley Sr., 68, former Tawas City resident and first commander of Iosco Veterans of Foreign Wars Post, died October 22 in a hospital at Cocoa, Florida. He had suffered a heart attack.

Morley, who served in the signal corps with the famed Rainbow Division during World War I, was instrumental in organizing the VFW post here and was also past 11th district commander of the VFW.

Born October 21, 1895, at Sheffield, England, he came to Tawas City with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Parker Morley, early in 1903. He attended school here and lived the greater part of his life in Tawas City.

In September 1934, he married the former Elsie Lickfeld.

Morley operated a retail bait shop at the Tawas River mouth for a number of years and at one time was employed in the commercial fishing industry here.

In 1954, the family moved to East Leroy where Morley was employed. The Morleys then moved to Rockledge, Florida, two years ago.

He is survived by his wife; three sons, Harry M. Jr. and Charles Thomas, both of Cocoa, and Robert P. of Rockledge; two daughters, Karen L. of Orlando and Marjorie E., at home; seven grandchildren; one sister, Mrs. Guy Lickfeld of Tawas City.

Funeral services were held Friday at the Wylie Funeral Home, Cocoa, with the Rev. David Cathcart, pastor of Cocoa First Methodist Church, officiating.

Graveside service was presented by the Cocoa VFW Chapter.

## Mielock Sees Compromise in Tax Program

LANSING—The appointment of a 10-member "blue-ribbon" committee of legislators to work on tax compromise with Gov. George Romney has increased the program's chances, according to Rep. James P. Mielock.

"We are going to come out of this with some type of program," Mielock said. "But it may not have all the items that the governor originally requested. At least, it will be a start."

Voter reaction seems to be building up more against the plan in recent weeks, Mielock said. The more the people examine the proposals, the less they like them, he believes.

Letters and telegrams he has received from Alpena district citizens indicate that many "responsible people" in the area are finding fault with the revisions, the Whittemore Republican added.

"Many people have failed to recognize certain obstacles in the program. It is not as attractive as it first appeared to be, but we are going to try to get something out," Mielock said.

Mielock said the problem was too large to be completely solved in just "a couple of short months."

He has been critical of an unlimited income tax and is cosponsoring a resolution to limit any such levy in the constitution. The resolution proposes a four percent ceiling on personal income tax, six percent maximum on corporate tax and a top of eight percent on financial institutions taxes.

The proposal must pass both houses of the legislature by a two-thirds majority in order to be placed on the ballot in November 1964.

There is also a bill before the house to allow a graduated income tax.

"I would question the chance of a graduated income tax proposal passing," Mielock said.

The controversy over the proposed reduction of school property taxes and 20 percent rebate by the state still has not been resolved to Mielock's satisfaction.

"Many school people have been attacking it. They are seriously concerned about its effects on school revenue," he pointed out.

"Iosco County area schools are in the 'medium' bracket of schools which would not be tremendously affected, so I have not heard much from them," Mielock added.

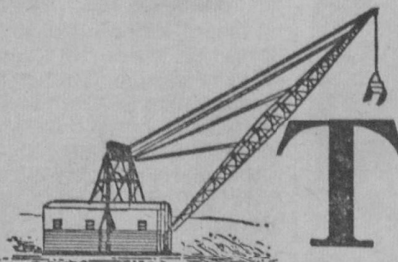
Mielock said that many county boards of supervisors throughout the state have been condemning the proposals to standardize assessment procedures. They feel that this would disrupt their present assessment setups, he said.

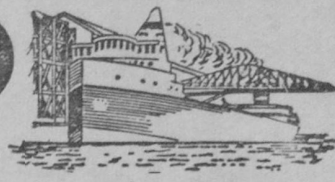

Richard Harwood, treasurer of the campaign, reports that 10 percent of the 1963 goal of \$7,350 had been collected as of Tuesday noon.

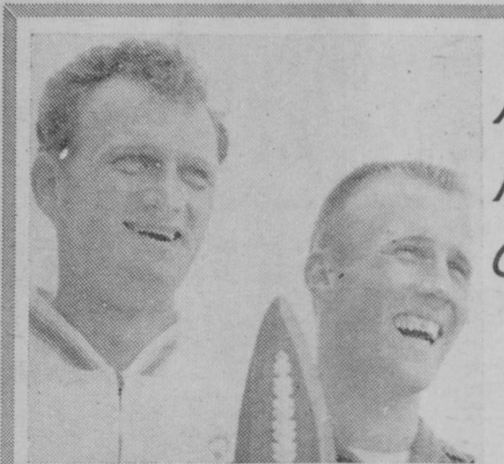
Boy scouts paraded through business districts last Saturday morning, calling attention to the community chest campaign which takes place during the next two weeks.

## New Automated Plant Sprays 'Velvet' Trees

Interest in developing a market for Iosco-grown Christmas trees has led to establishment of a new industry at East Tawas.

Starting operations this week is Creative Decor Products, Incorporated, located in a storage building once occupied by Anderson Coach Company.

This firm, which uses specially designed equipment to spray velvet on trees by an electrostatic process, is owned by four partners: Alois Chmelar of Detroit, F. D. English of Southgate, Daniel Thayer of Hale and Lou Stober of Detroit.

It is expected that six persons will be employed in the plant plus others in the tree cutting operation. Plans are to spray 150,000 trees for this Christmas season, depending upon success of marketing.

Story of this new operation began when Thayer and English set out to find a new method of marketing their 350,000 Christmas trees now growing near Hale and the Tawas.

In his native Czechoslovakia, Chmelar was a textile technologist and owner of a knitting factory. When industry was nationalized by the communist regime, he was forced out of his own factory by the Red take-over. Five years ago, he and his family made their escape through Austria and finally settled at Detroit.

A new "Velvetex" process developed by Chmelar has proven very successful in the decorating field. Thayer and English learned of the process and asked Chmelar to experiment with spraying trees. Using materials and equipment at hand, a few trees were sprayed. First experiments proved unsuccessful and Chmelar developed an entirely new process using rayon flock and designed special processing equipment.

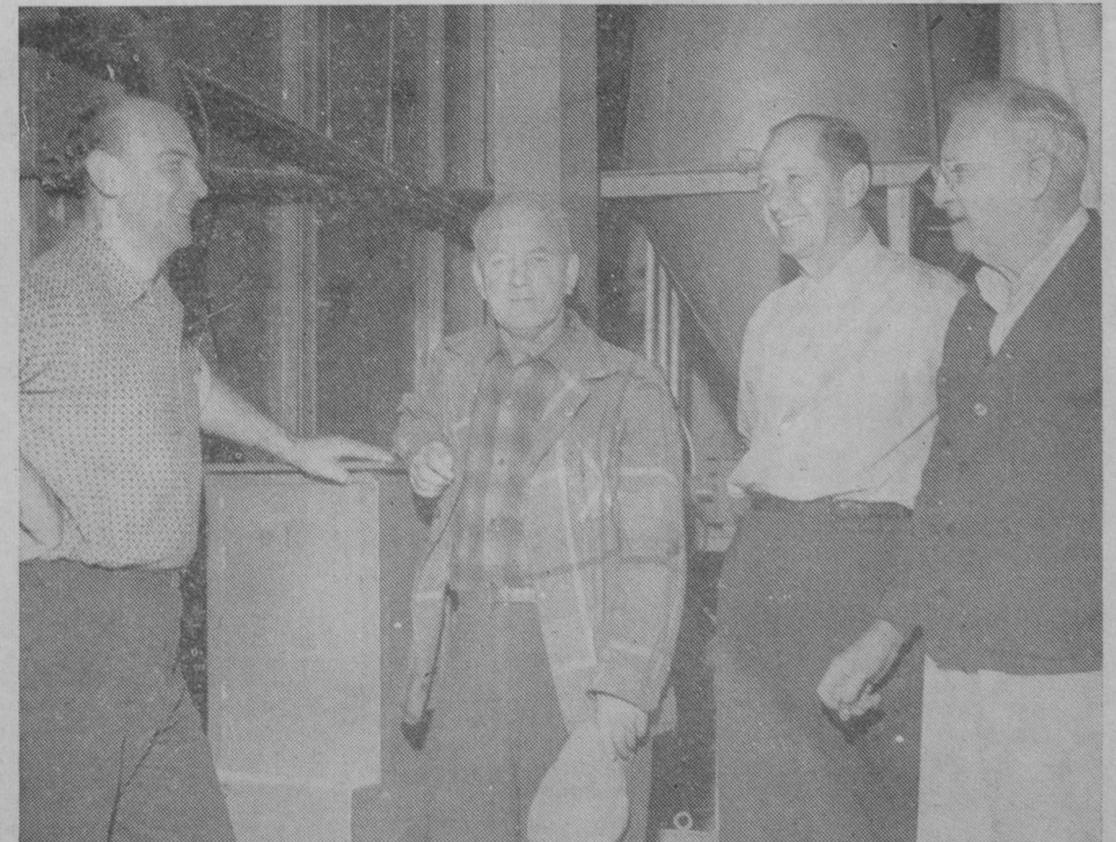
The new equipment, valued at approximately \$50,000, has been set up in the concrete block building adjacent to the state police post at East Tawas. (The main structure continues to be occupied by Tawas Trailers, Incorporated.)

Nearly entirely automated, trees are placed on hooks which move by conveyor belt through the electrostatic equipment. After

spraying with a special adhesive, trees are subjected to 128,000 volts of low amperage electricity. Electrostatically charged rayon flock is then sprayed on the trees, which then move through an 18-foot-long curing oven.

The rayon flock or fiber, a fire-retardant material, completely covers the tree and will last indefinitely.

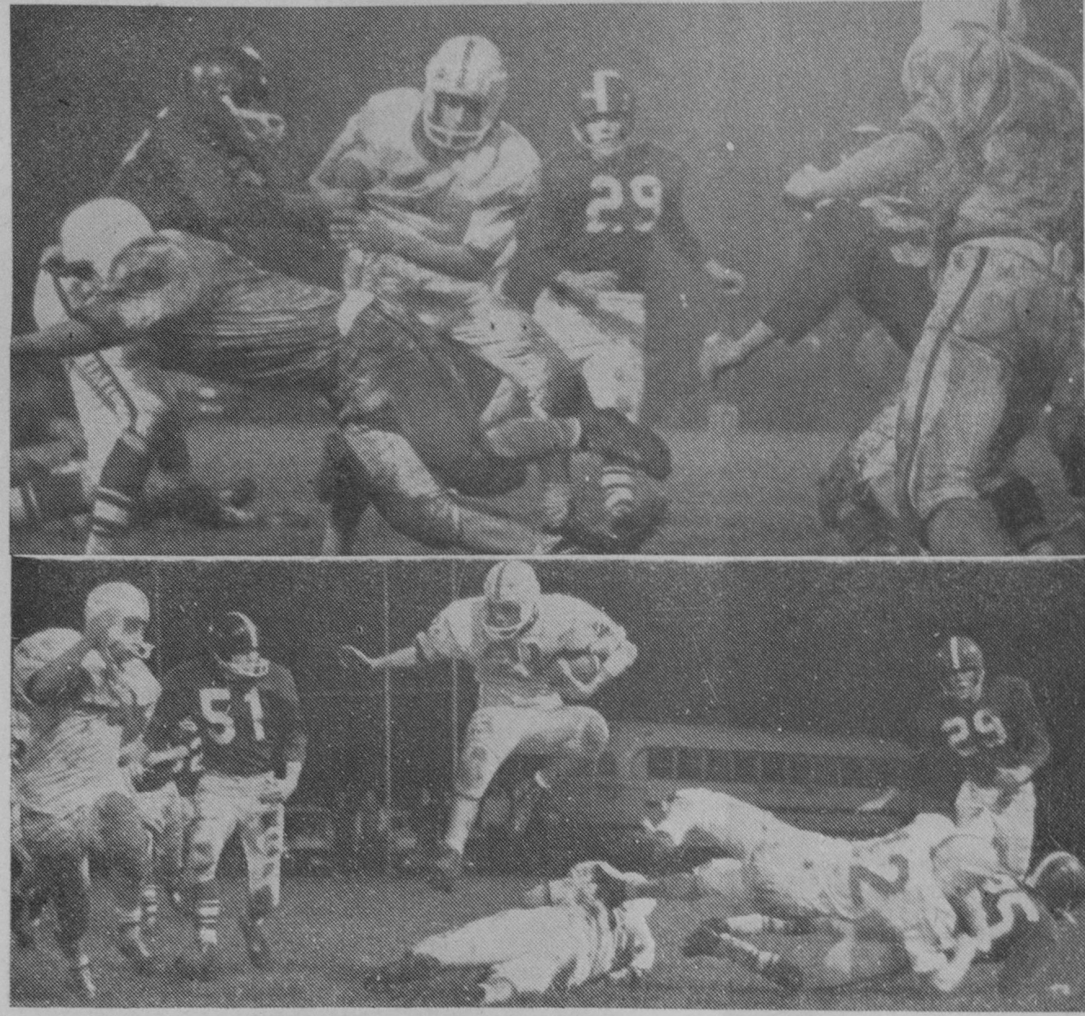

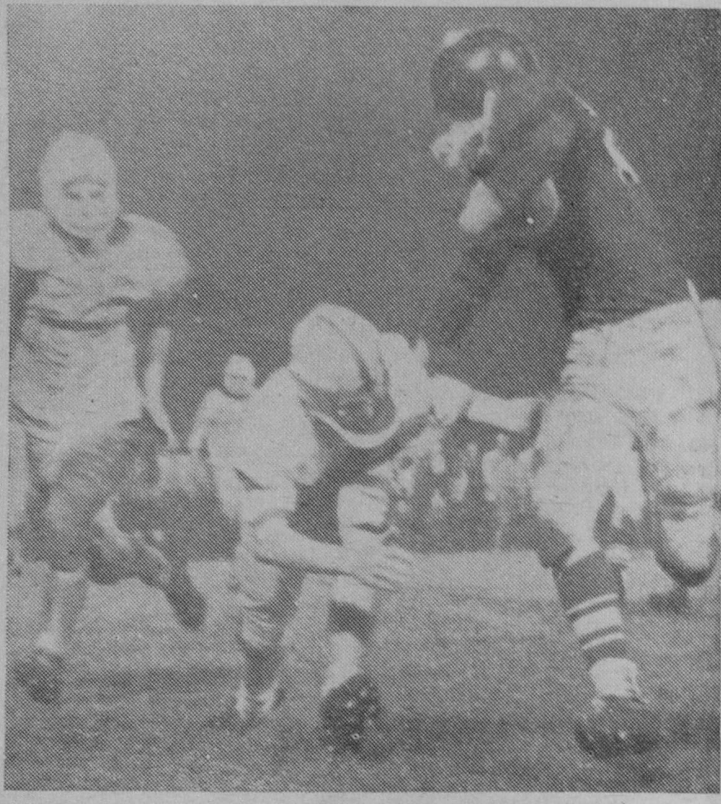

### Elk in Michigan



From a total of eight animals released in the Pigeon River area during the 1918-19 period, Michigan's elk herd has grown to become one of the major tourist attractions in this neck of the state's northern woods. It also has expanded to create a problem of numbers; a problem marked by such storm warnings as over-browsing and indications of elk starvation. Size of the herd is estimated between 2,000 and 3,500 animals. The Conservation Department has undertaken a long-range research program to refine this estimate and cross-check other information which has been collected since the herd was established 45 years ago. While this project has not been completed, one fact stands out clearly: Some small-scale, carefully controlled hunting is going to be needed soon, and carried on from year to year, to keep these animals from doing further damage to limited winter food supplies which are also used by deer. Main goal of the elk management program, of course, will be to maintain and promote the value of this herd as a public viewing attraction.

(Continued from page 1.) Initially, only the best, specially pruned trees are to be used and the process assures that needles will not drop off.

All trees must have the proper moisture content before processing and, after receiving the velvet treatment, are packed in plastic bags.

Trees are to be processed in four different colors—green, pink, white and blue. A glitter effect is also to be used.

At present, hand-sprayed flock trees are on the market but sell for about \$25. The East Tawas firm plans to market their trees for less than half that price.

After the Christmas season, the owners plan to make changes in the equipment so as to process flat ware.

With only minor alterations, the equipment can be used to spray plastic chairs, toys and shoes. Fibers of different lengths may be used to create surfaces ranging from velvet to mohair. "The number of products which can be sprayed is practically unlimited," said Chmelar.

"It is hard to change the tax system when the state is doing so well financially," he added.

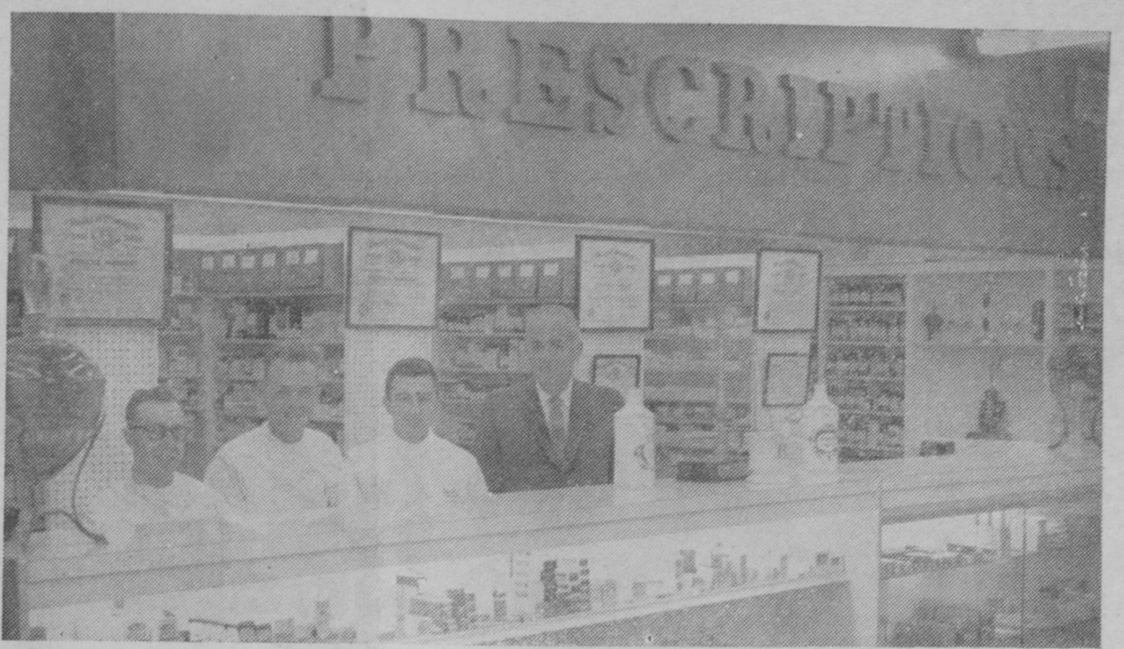
