

"Civil rights can best be furthered at the local level," the chairman said. "Each county has different problems in this regard and a bipartisan approach here, duplicating that being established at the state level, will go a long way in solving local problems and achieving equality in civil rights." The chairman's reference is to the appointment last month of two state coordinators of human relations, one from each party and the agreement of both political parties to remove civil rights from the

state for nonpayment of taxes, will be the site of a marker unveiling Sunday at Sand Lake.

Dedication of an official State of Michigan historical marker will be held at 2:00 p.m. at Pioneer Cemetery, located west of Sand Lake on the old Iosco-Ogemaw State Road.

Heading up the project to install a historical marker at the cemetery has been Grant Township Supervisor L. S. Little. The marker was purchased last summer after several years of efforts on the part of Little and members of his board.

It was not until 1950, the year when Little became supervisor, that residents realized that the cemetery was not actually owned by the township. It had fallen into disrepair and was in need of much work.

Through investigation, Little learned that the property had been purchased by the township for a burial grounds in 1870, three years after organization of Grant. It was not actually deeded to the township and remained a part of an 80-acre tract which went back to the state in 1890 for unpaid taxes. The property was later traded by Michigan to the federal government.

Through a search of files in the county register of deeds office. the original deed filed in 1870 was located. With this proof of ownership, along with considerable correspondence with state and federal officials, the property was finally deeded to Grant Township.

Land for a township cemetery was purchased by the Grant Board of Health from William and Rosina Dommer. Township officers at the time were Daniel E. Fries, Herman
