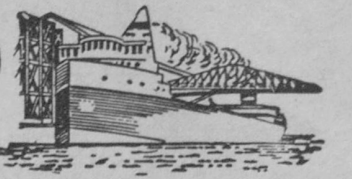


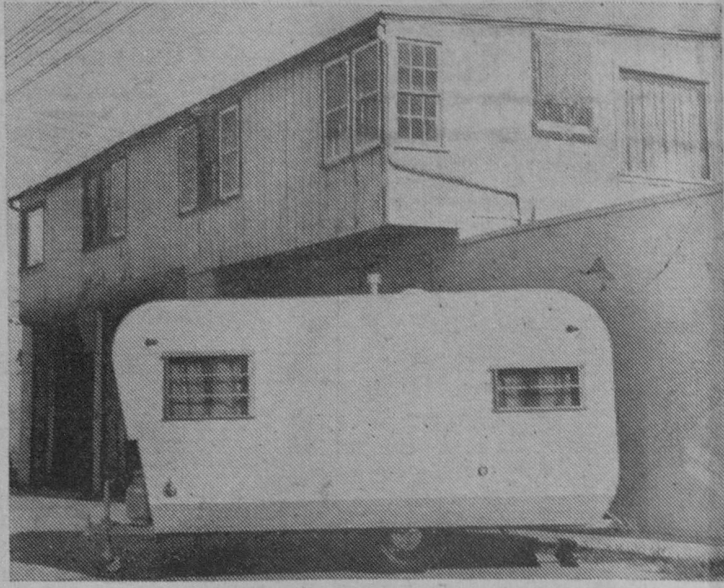

Tawas Trailers Moves Into Old Coach Co. Plant

Empty since August 1961, the old Anderson Coach Company plant at East Tawas will again be the home of a trailer manufacturing operation.

Tawas Trailers, Incorporated, which has been manufacturing 16-foot camper units here for the past five months, began moving its equipment into the concrete block building east of the state police post last Friday.

Production of the firm's Tawas Brave models is expected to resume today (Wednesday).

Green paint is now flaking off the building which once housed an industry hiring 150 or more local men. It holds many memories for Tawas residents . . . more than 13,000 mobile homes rolled out of its twin front doors during 13 years of operation.

The building was closed two years ago when Anderson Coach Company consolidated its operation in the Baldwin Township

plant. When the coach company closed its doors and moved to Logan, Utah, earlier this year, two smaller trailer manufacturing firms were organized by former employees.

One group, Ander-Ett, Incorporated, rented Anderson's old paint shop in Baldwin Township. Tawas Trailers, Incorporated, moved into the former location at Huron Rustic Furniture in Tawas City.

"We are not kidding ourselves—it is going to be a long haul this winter with higher overhead in this building," said Floyd Harten, president of Tawas Trailers. "We reached our limit in our former location . . . we had no choice but to move into larger quarters," he stated. "We had 10 men hired at one time and there was just not enough room to work."

The new location contains more than 30,000 square feet of floor space . . . much more room than is presently required for the firm's production. Parts of the building will be blocked off to conserve heat and the second floor office section will not be used.

Both Ronald Korthals, secretary-treasurer of the firm, and Clyde Montgomery, vice president, recalled that 18-foot coaches were being produced in the building when they went to work for Anderson back in 1949.

Ben Tarnosky, director, said that the object of the move was to increase production. "We were falling all over ourselves in the old location," he said.

Harten reported that the four partners were satisfied with their venture into industry and said that many new prospects for sales had been obtained at the recent show at Elkhart, Indiana.

"Everyone who saw our trailer liked it . . . if we can hang on this winter, I think we can make a go of it," he said.

Three Hurt Friday in East Tawas Crash

Three persons were injured and treated at Tawas Hospital following a two-car crash at the intersection of Franklin and Newman Streets, East Tawas, last Friday night.

Treated for severe lacerations and bruises were James Brooks, 20; Mrs. Fedora Nelem and her daughter, Mary Louise.

Investigating city police officers said that Brooks had been involved in a high speed chase with the Tawas City Police Department. Traveling east on West Franklin, he collided with the Nelem car on Newman Street.

Two teen-agers, John E. Siers and Ernest Soller, both 17 years of age, received minor injuries Thursday morning when their car ran off Tawas Point Road and struck a tree.

Harbor Expansion Proposed by State

Plans for expansion of port facilities at Michigan Waterways Commission Dock, East Tawas, were outlined last Wednesday by Charles Latimer, harbors administrator for the Michigan Waterways Commission.

Some 100 persons attended a hearing at the East Tawas City Hall called by the United States Corps of Engineers. Col. Jeff W. Coucher, district engineer, conducted the meeting.

Latimer outlined a proposal for a 1,300-foot expansion of the present dock at the foot of Newman Street. The expansion would include extending the present dock 500 feet south into Tawas Bay, with a 27-foot extension southeast and a 590-foot extension northeast.

According to the plan, an additional 81 boat wells would be constructed giving dockage facilities for a total of 113 boats.

would be of solid breakwater construction with the Waterways Commission providing docking facilities, both on the inside of the breakwater and the outside of the present dock.

Endorsing the project were representatives of the East Tawas Council, East Tawas Harbor Committee, Iosco County Board of Supervisors, Tawas Chamber of Commerce, Tawas Bay Yacht Club, businessmen and others.

If the plan is accepted by the corps of engineers and receives 50 percent federal participation, the waterways commission has stated it would participate for the remaining cost.

The district engineer is presently making a survey of the Lake Huron shoreline with a view to establishing harbors and harbors of refuge for light draft commercial and fishing vessels and recreational craft.

Consolidated Gets County Gas Pact

Michigan Consolidated Gas Company won unanimous endorsement to serve Tawas City, East Tawas and Oscoda Township with natural gas at a joint meeting of "town fathers" of the three governmental units last Wednesday night.

The three communities agreed to back Michigan Consolidated over Consumers Power Company and were to officially ratify ordinances granting the franchise at regular sessions last night (Tuesday).

About 60 persons, including officials of both utilities, attended the meeting at East Tawas City Hall. It lasted but 15 or 20 minutes before announcement was made by each individual community.

East Tawas and Tawas City councilmen caucused before the 8:00 p. m. meeting. In announcing the vote, it was stated that both councils favored Michigan Consolidated by 5-1 counts. No vote breakdown was given for Oscoda Township Board.

Granting of the franchise to Michigan Consolidated assured an eight-million-dollar project along the Lake Huron shore to bring gas service not only to the three Iosco County communities, but to others along US-23 from Oscoda to Alpena.

Fred H. McIntire, vice president in charge of sales for Michigan Consolidated, called it a "vote of confidence."

He said the action by the three councils "will insure an abundant supply of economically-priced gas for the entire Northeastern Michigan area."

"We take this responsibility seriously and look forward to constructing the project by the fall of 1964 and help to bring additional prosperity to this section of Michigan."

Work is to start next spring on the project and gas mains are to be installed by September 1, 1964.

By winning the franchise endorsement, Michigan Consolidated can claim Wurtsmith Air Force Base and National Gypsum Company's board plant at National City as potential customers.

Officials of both utilities had told community leaders that these two customers would make it more feasible to supply gas to the north state area.

The vote of the three governmental units climaxes an active sales campaign by both utilities which got under way in earnest last month. Until then, a natural gas supplier for this area seemed only a remote possibility.

Consolidated had earlier been

granted gas rights to Alpena and West Branch. The West Branch franchise was the first penetration of Michigan Consolidated into the area that had been served by Consumers Power Company electrical division for more than 50 years.

Under plans announced earlier by McIntire, Michigan Consolidated will run its pipeline from West Branch to the Tawas along M-55 and north to Alpena along US-23—providing gas service to nearly 70 miles of shoreline communities.

McIntire said that Michigan Consolidated had been studying the potential growth of Northeastern Michigan for some time and came to the conclusion that the extension of natural gas to the area would give the economy a tremendous boost by helping to create new jobs and reduce the cost of living.

City Council OKs Deepening Ditch Along Fifth Avenue

Authorization to open a ditch along the west side of Fifth Avenue to M-55 was given Tuesday night by the Tawas City Council. The meeting was delayed one day because of the holiday.

This action was taken after Attorney Paul Harvey, representing property owners in North Park Acres Subdivision, appeared before the council.

The city had discussed opening the ditch west of Fifth Avenue at a meeting earlier in the summer but tabled action when it was learned that a boundary dispute between owners of North Park Acres and Huron Gardens Subdivision was being appealed to the state supreme court.

Harvey said the boundary dispute had no direct bearing on the problem of drainage in the subdivisions.

Councilman Howard Hatton said that the city had already spent a considerable amount of money on legal fees in connection with the two subdivisions and believed that it should not become involved in another legal controversy. He urged that a drainage tube under Fifth Avenue, connected to a ditch under dispute, remain untouched.

Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works, said that from six inches to 1 1/2 feet of soil would have to be removed from some

Mrs. Gay Receives Probation Sentence

Mrs. Katherine Gay of Whittemore, who was convicted of negligent homicide July 11, was sentenced Tuesday to a three-year probation term.

In addition, Iosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller levied a fine of \$100 and costs of \$400 against her.

Mrs. Gay was driver of a car in which Mrs. Marion Dumas was fatally injured September 22, 1962. A circuit court jury found her guilty of the charge.

Iosco Sending Three to Land and People Confab

Harry Krueger of Wilber Township, chairman of the Iosco County Soil Conservation District will join William Inglis and Cecil Cable of the Tawas as Iosco County's delegation to the three-state land and people conference at Duluth, Minnesota, September 10.

Inglis is chairman of the Iosco County Planning Commission while Cable is chairman of the agriculture and forestry committee of the commission.

Richard Rose, United States Soil Conservation Service, is the fourth delegate from Iosco. Cable is being sponsored by Oscoda and Tawas Kiwanis Clubs while Krueger is being sent by the soil conservation district.

The land and people conference was scheduled by Sec. of Agriculture Orville Freeman, who will be the keynote speaker. Secretary Freeman invited both rural and urban people to attend and discuss ways and means to develop and make best use of natural resources in the region.

Attention will be focused on recreational development, agriculture, forestry, improved transportation and the general economic benefits which can be expected.

Part of the conference program will be devoted to separate group discussions. Krueger intends to meet with the group discussing multiple use management of resources. Cable will attend the discussion of outdoor recreation and its place in development of the region.

Inglis will attend a session on how to develop local planning, while Rose will attend a meeting on land ownership and governmental structure problems.

Iosco Airport Dedication Had Perfect Day --- Large Crowd

An estimated 2,000 persons attended Sunday's dedication ceremony for the new Iosco County Airport. Included in the day-long program were parachute jumps, model airplane flying and free airplane rides.

A dawn patrol held as part of the program attracted more than 90 private airplanes from various sections of the state.

Richard Egli, chairman of the dedication program, said that his committee was extremely happy with the outcome. "The weather was perfect, our visitors had a good time and the entire program ran smoothly," was his comment.

Earlier that morning, dedication

officials had only worried expressions when it seemed as though the day would be marred by heavy clouds and cold weather. Skies cleared before 10 o'clock and visiting airplanes began to land at the new field.

Ralph H. Western, president of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, was master of ceremonies. A color guard from Wurtsmith Air Force Base had charge of the flag raising and the Rev. Robert Morrison, pastor of Christ Episcopal Church, delivered the invocation.

George Blust, chairman pro tem of the Iosco Board of Supervisors, extended the official welcome. He also expressed regrets on behalf of

the entire board of supervisors that Chairman Henry Oates was unable to attend. Oates, who is ill, has taken an active part in development of the new airport.

State Rep. James P. Mielock of Whittemore congratulated Iosco County and representatives of the state aeronautics commission for their joint efforts with the federal government in this project.

Brig. Gen. John A. Roberts, commander of the 40th Air Division, Wurtsmith Air Force Base, commended the area for its efforts toward construction of a new airport and urged that steps be taken to expand facilities and lengthen runways in order that full advan-

tage could be realized in air transportation of the future.

Cong. Elford A. Cederberg of Bay City unveiled a plaque dedicating the new airport.

The festivities actually started at 6:00 a. m. with pancakes and bacon being served in the new hangar.

Among the nearly 100 planes flown in for the day's festivities were many vintage aircraft. Included were open cockpit bi-planes of the type used by barn-storming pilots of another era and several old military planes.

Stealing the show, however, were four tiny experimental air-

Work Starts in Huron Through APW Money

Eighteen men went to work in Huron National Forest Tuesday morning under the federal government's accelerated public works program.

Tawas District Ranger Joseph Blake said that \$15,000 had been received in the APW program to be used for labor costs in building camp grounds at Corsair Park, Round Lake and Lumbermen's Monument.

He said that additional funds were expected for local projects in Huron National Forest but no final word had been received as yet. Application has been made for funds totaling \$60,000.

According to a telegram received by Donald Watson, chairman of the Iosco Democratic Committee, \$30,000 in APW funds had been granted to construct a ranger station in this county.

Word came in a telegram last week from United States Senators Patrick McNamara and Philip A. Hart. Iosco's grant was included in \$210,000 awarded for work in Lower Michigan.

Blake said Tuesday morning that his office had received no official confirmation as yet on construction of a ranger station here.

"It's all news to us," said Blake. "We will have just have to wait until official notification arrives."

Brothers Admit Theft of NG Quarry Cable

Two brothers entered a plea of guilty Friday to a charge of grand larceny when arraigned Friday in Iosco Circuit Court.

Held at Iosco County Jail while awaiting presentence report are Curtis Kotewa, 36, and his brother, Joseph, 34, both of Sanford.

The two men admitted theft of approximately \$1,600 worth of copper transmission cable from the National Gypsum quarry in Sherman Township.

On July 30, Kenneth Bronson, foreman at the quarry, notified the Iosco Sheriff's Department that two men had attempted to steal a large roll of electric cable. Bronson was able to obtain the license number on the car which they were driving.

Through investigation, the sheriff's department learned that the license plates belonged to a Bay City resident. The owner told officers he loaned his plates to Curtis Kotewa.

On further checking the quarry, which was discontinued after the new White Rock Quarry went into service several years ago, National Gypsum officials found that approximately 1,600 feet of heavy transmission cable had been stolen.

The cable was traced to scrap dealers in Midland and Bay City. The Kotewa brothers were arrested by Bay City authorities on authorization of an Iosco County warrant.

Tawas Area's First Day Enrollment Up 28 Pupils

Tawas Area School enrollment was tentatively set at 1,598 students Tuesday, according to figures announced at the end of the first school day by Supt. Reynold Mick.

This total was up 28 students over the first day total of last year, reported Mick.

Enrollment was as follows: Kindergarten through sixth grade, 846 pupils; seventh and eighth grades, 226; high school, 526 students.

The junior class, with 141 students, is the largest grade enrolled in the high school.

Superintendent Mick said that there would probably be some change in enrollment totals at the end of this week but no major change is expected.

Today (Wednesday) is the first full day of school. Students reported for one-half day sessions yesterday and a meeting of teachers was held in the afternoon.

How Benefits Are Affected by Earning More Than Estimate

Paul M. Ellifritz, district manager of the social security office Bay City, reports that the following question is frequently received from people who have applied for benefits: How will my benefits be affected if I later find that I will earn more than I had previously estimated for the year?

If you find that you will probably make more during the year than you previously estimated, notify the social security office as soon as you can. If you are eligible for social security payments, the amount of benefits you receive is related to your report of estimated earnings, which you make to the Social Security Administration early in the year. If you are going to earn more than you estimated at the beginning of the year, you can see that it is necessary to report that fact to avoid possible overpayment of benefits.

It is best to avoid any overpayments during the year as these would have to be paid to the government—or future checks to which beneficiary is entitled would have to be withheld until the overpayment is satisfied.

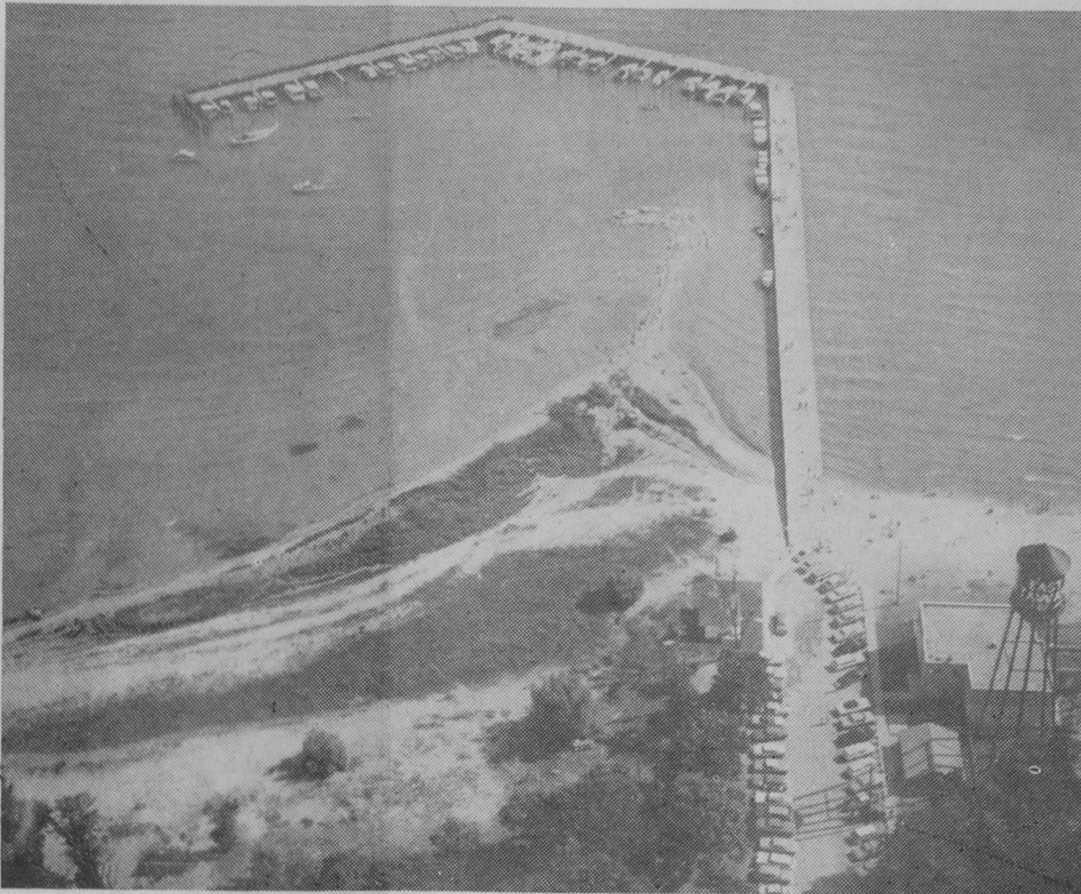

Area Merchants Receive Base Study Questionnaires

Area merchants were mailed questionnaires recently as part of an economic base analysis being conducted by the Tawas City Planning Commission and its consultant, Vilcan-Leman and Associates, Incorporated.

The study will analyze the economic base of Tawas City and outline the conceptual framework within which the future plan will be developed.

The economic base analysis involves the detailed study of two principal land use types—commercial and industrial. Facilities normally analyzed in the commercial segment are retail outlets, personal service shops and certain offices.

Industrial type uses, as used in the context of the economic base analysis, include those facilities considered as industry. In addition, such establishments as lumber yards, fuel storage areas, open

storage areas, wholesaling and warehousing facilities are also considered as industrial.

Method of study which will be followed in developing the economic base analysis is to include the following five stages of steps:

1. Concepts—Statement of the concepts which depict what the ideal situation would be, with reference to industrial and commercial development, if there were existing "fixes" to take into consideration.
2. Inventory of existing situation—Analysis of the existing commercial and industrial development in the city. This includes gathering of data on retail floor space, income levels of the trade area population and employment characteristics of the labor force.
3. Analysis and evaluation—At this stage, the existing situation is compared to the so-called "ideal" in order to point up problems existing at the present time or ones which may develop in the future.
4. Design—The design stage is the point at which recommendations are made regarding the future commercial and industrial land use plan, based on the above analysis.
5. Implementation—This step in the economic base analysis sets forth methods by which the recommendations made in the design stage can be brought about. Included are recommendations with regard to zoning controls and regulations and also possible means of financing the necessary improvements.

Also to be studied are concepts of commercial location, shopping center, types of commercial facilities, industrial base concepts.

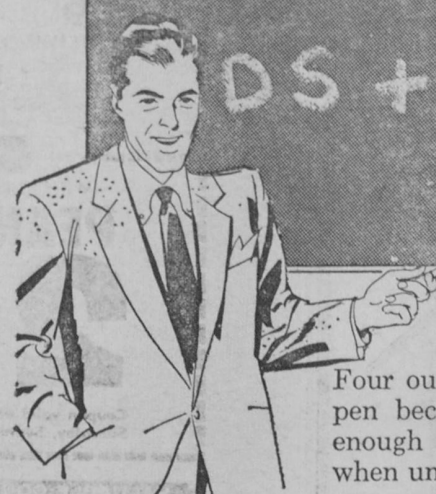

Man-Made Cover for Trout



More often than not, many of the Conservation Department's stream improvements go unnoticed by fishermen. And that's the way these projects are planned—to provide man-made changes which look like the work of nature's forces. The log sod cover shown above is a good case in point; without the aid of this hand drawing, the project's natural "finish" hides the work of men which has produced a place of escape for trout, and shored up an unstable stream bank. As you can see from this sketch, the log sod cover has been anchored by driving several posts into the stream bottom. So-called "whaler" logs were spiked to these posts; freshly-cut logs and poles were then fastened to the whalers. After lodging a large log along the outer edge, Department workers sloped the structure up the bank. They added finishing touches by sodding the entire structure. New impetus has been thrust behind this and a host of other stream projects by the Accelerated Public Works program which is being financed 50-50 by state and federal funds. Work has already begun which will turn out more than \$180,000 worth of improvements during the next two years to create choice fishing spots and protect streams against soil erosion.

Tawas Lake Dam Has Court Hearing Sept. 25

At its regular session last Wednesday, Iosco County Board of Supervisors heard plans for a proposed Tawas Lake Dam Assessment District.

E. H. Stickney, county drain commissioner, explained that a hearing is to be held September 25 to consider and review description of lands within the proposed district.

The hearing is to be conducted in Iosco Circuit Court by Judge Richard G. Smith of Bay County Circuit Court.

Stickney told supervisors that regardless of a favorable outcome of the hearing, it would be impossible to place the assessment on the October tax roll because of the lack of time. Possibility of issuing tax anticipation certificates for payment of construction of the dam was discussed.

In other business, the board passed a resolution endorsing the Michigan Waterways Commission proposition for expanding harbor facilities in Tawas Bay.

Sheriff Ivan L. O'Farrell reported that another attempt was being made at the state level to take issuance of drivers licenses from sheriffs departments and place under an independent agency. Action on a resolution was referred to the board's judiciary committee.

The board authorized Richard K. Nelson, county probation officer, to attend the annual state convention of the association of probation and parole officers.

The clerk was authorized to advertise for bids on furnishing No. 5 fuel oil for the county building and No. 2 fuel oil for the jail.

Supervisor George Blust of Whittemore reported on activities of the Iosco County Planning Commission. Blust said he was very encouraged with progress and interest shown by commission members.

Supreme Court Appeal Filed in Boundary Dispute

Supreme court appeal of an amended judgment and order denying a motion for rehearing by Circuit Judge Philip J. Glennie was filed August 29 by John A. Brugger, defendant, and Victor A. and Doris M. Zaharias, intervening defendants and cross plaintiffs.

A judgment was rendered August 7 in Iosco Circuit Court in favor of Elmer J. Burrell as plaintiff and cross defendant.

Following the formal program, airplane rides were offered by several pilots. Two parachute drops and an exhibition of radio controlled model airplane flying completed the day.

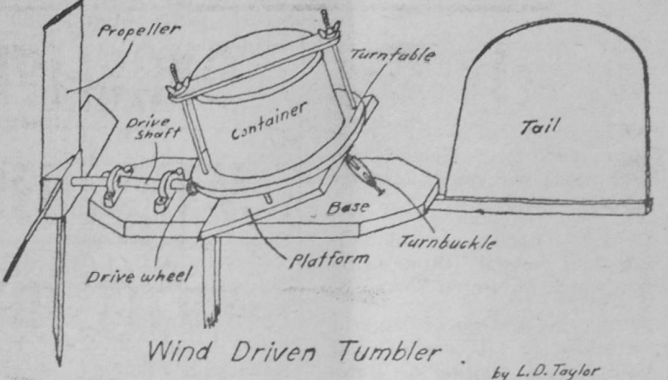
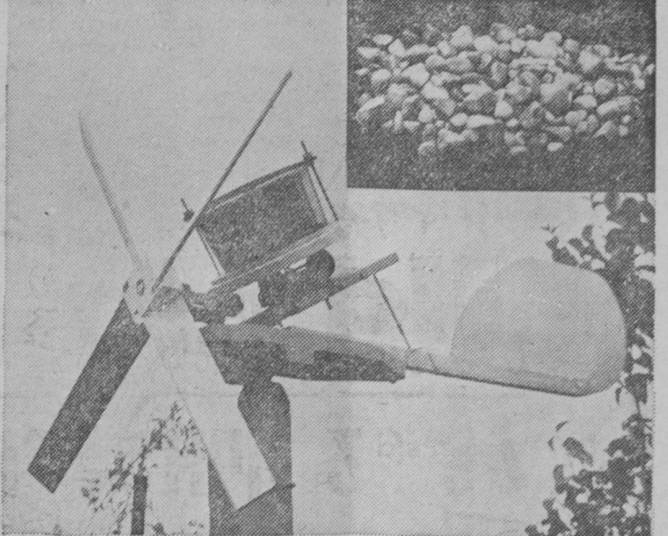
