Tourist Festival in Planning Stages

Plans for the Michigan Tourist Days Festival, expanded this year to include the entire Tawas area, were discussed at a meeting last Thursday night.

To be held August 6, 7, 8 and 9, this year's tourist festival is being sponsored by the Tawas Chamber of Commerce. Leonard Calabrese and Cecil Cabbie are co-chairmen.

Feature attraction of the festival will be the Lumbermen's Monument bicycle race. This event was staged here during last year's festival and proved most successful. In addition to this race on Saturday, there will be sprint races the preceding evening on Newman Street.

'Baby' Twister Picked Hay Off Farm Wagon

A baby twister dipped down into Plainfield Township Friday evening, picked up six bales of hay off a farmer's wagon, uprooted a large cedar tree in his field and then disappeared.

"I was on the tractor and could see the whirlwind cloud coming for me, but I couldn't do a thing about it," said George Webb, who resides on Long Lake Road northwest of Hale.

The twister picked the six bales of hay off a wagon which Webb was towing with his tractor and disappeared.

"That old cedar tree had weathered many a storm," commented Webb, who is supervisor of his township. "I could see the funnel moving along the ground until it hit the tree and then it went up and out of sight."

The storm took about the same path as a destructive tornado in 1931 which hit a number of barns in Plainfield Township.

This was the only reported sighting of the baby twister. After an unusually hot day Friday, which saw the temperature climbing to above 80 degrees, the entire county was hit by high winds, lightning and rain in the evening.

High winds struck the Tawas area causing some scattered damage. Elmer Slaven of Douglas Drive reported that two covered boat hoists along Saginaw Bay were picked up by the wind and then smashed on the shore.

Supervisors Adopt \$327,787 Budget

An operational budget of \$327,787 was approved Monday by the Iosco County Board of Supervisors. This was \$16,833 higher than the preliminary budget adopted a year ago this month.

In submitting the budget for board approval Monday morning, Supervisor L. S. Little of Grant Township, finance chairman, said that millage of 5.322 would be required to raise the above amount by taxation.

The budget was submitted to the Iosco Allocation Board Monday, which met for its organizational meeting.

With \$30,000 to be raised through anticipated fees from county offices, \$5,000 higher than last year, the total amount to be raised by taxation would be \$297,787.

According to a letter received Monday from the state tax commission, Iosco's state equalized valuation in 1964 is \$55,962,551. This is \$314,406 higher than last year.

Budgets of elective county offices were as follows:

Prosecuting attorney — Salaries and clerk hire, \$7,400; clerk help, \$200; department expense, \$1,280. Total, \$8,880.

Treasurer — Salary, \$5,012; deputy and clerk hire, \$7,300; wages-department help, \$1,800; department expense, \$3,867. Total \$17,979.

Clerk — Salary, \$5,082; deputy and clerk salary, \$7,000; department expense, \$3,500. Total \$15,582.

Sheriff's department — Salaries, \$20,700; department expense, \$21,300. Total \$42,000.

Judge of probate — Salary, \$6,000; deputy and register, \$2,976; department expense, \$3,600. Total \$12,576.

Register of deeds — Salary, \$5,012; register, \$4,000; clerk, \$2,400; department expense, \$4,250. Total \$15,662.

Drain commissioner — Salary, \$1,200; clerk, \$300; department expense, \$200. Total \$1,700.

Slight increases were noted in several of the county offices, which reflected pay hikes to deputies and clerks. Salaries of county officers remain the same under the budget. Other allocations showing an increase were: Airport, \$4,300; county publicity, up \$1,000; social welfare, up \$2,000.

Other divisions of the budget includes: County extension, salary, \$2,850, and department expense of \$3,200; Addressograph, \$5,745; courthouse and grounds, \$13,637; Iosco-Arenac Regional Library, \$12,380; board of supervisors, \$14,000; civil defense, \$1,000; District Health No. Two, \$13,306; justice and new courts, \$1,000; airport, \$14,300; bee inspection, \$150; county publicity, \$3,000; tax allocation, \$420; bonds and insurance, \$2,900; elections, \$1,500; state institutions, \$25,000.

Medical assistance to aged, \$3,500; social welfare, \$27,000; direct welfare relief, \$24,000; veterans counselor, \$300; emergency, \$20,000; Northeastern Michigan Child Guidance Clinic, \$1,000; social security, \$1,800; soldiers burial, \$3,600; coroners, \$1,600; county nurse, \$660.

Tawas Band Wins 'I' Award at Festival

Tawas Area High School Band, accompanied by Director Edward J. Rima, Robert Huddy and Thomas Horning, attended the State Festival at Lansing Everett High School Saturday, April 18.

The band received two I division ratings and one II from the three concert judges for a final rating of I. The sight reading rating was II, but this did not affect the final rating of I.

The final rating of I earned by the Tawas band at a state festival was in 1959, also on April 18. This date happens to be Mr. Rima's birthday. Perhaps the bandmen tried just a little harder to get an I for a birthday present for their director.

East Tawas Seeks Grant to Aid Sewer Expansion

Two resolutions were adopted Monday night by the East Tawas Council seeking assistance from the federal housing and home finance agency for sanitary sewers and lift stations.

A survey on city sewers was presented to the council by Spicer Engineering Company of Saginaw.

The city seeks a grant under Public Law 345 to aid in this construction. Total cost of the project would be \$722,156, with the city paying 50 percent of that amount.

In other business, Mayor Clarence McKenzie reported that he had heard from Gov. George Romney in regard to the proposed parking lot and turn around at the state park and was awaiting word from the conservation department.

The city seeks to construct a parking lot east of the harbormaster's office in order to relieve a parking problem which will develop when US-23 is widened through East Tawas. Parking between the highway and the railroad tracks is to be removed and no provision has been made to handle cars of fishermen and others who use the Waterways Commission Dock.

In other business, the council may soon take action to regulate operational hours of the city dump. City Supt. Paul Ropert reported that many people other than residents of East Tawas were using the disposal grounds and cost of maintaining the dump is on the increase.

Other disposal grounds in the area, including the Tawas City dump, are regulated according to certain hours and days.

Appointed to a committee to investigate the problem were Aldermen Clifford Wilkinson, James DeRosia and Edward Higgins.

Following discussion concerning the expense of constructing a sidewalk along Newman Street to Tawas Lake, the council authorized purchase of two large signs to warn motorists of pedestrian

Busy Season at Rainbow Ranch

The name, Rainbow Ranch, sounds fitting enough for a large cattle spread in Texas but, actually, it is a trout farm located west of the Tawas in Tawas Township.

While Owner Albert Zubek will probably tell you his operation is just a "one boss" outfit ("Boss" is the name of one of two huge German shepherd dogs which guard the place against poachers), six ponds on the ranch contain a total of 125,000 rainbow trout.

Ranging in size from one inch in length to whoopers of 15 pounds or more, these 'bubs represent a trout rearing program which was started seven years ago by Zubek, who is licensed by the State of Michigan.

The program also represents an investment of more than \$25,000 for Zubek. Starting with 8,500 trout fry purchased at Harrisville and the State of Washington in 1957, Zubek has increased this original stock through his own trout rearing program.

Rainbow Ranch furnishes legalized trout to stock private ponds throughout Michigan and is one of the largest operations in the state.

A live fish distributor from Richmond, Indiana, making his regular call here Saturday, told the Herald reporter that Zubek's trout were the healthiest he had found and this is important in the trout-stocking business. The trout were to make the 15-hour trip to Indiana in a special tank truck which uses bottled oxygen to keep the fish alive.

Today, about 400,000 trout eggs are nearing the end of their incubation period at Rainbow Ranch. From this number, Zubek can expect about 200,000 trout fry to be hatched.

Incubating trout eggs is a pretty touchy business and Zubek keeps a watchful eye on his two incubators. Last year, all of the eggs in one incubator had to be thrown out because of a faulty water valve. Water must circulate around the eggs at the proper temperature, along with life-giving oxygen, to assure development of the fry.

Eggs now in the incubator were stripped from the huge female trout last week. This breeding stock represents Zubek's original purchase seven years ago. A long seine is used to corral the fish in the pond, which are removed individually by dip net. Knockout drops are administered to the fish to restrict their movement during stripping operations. After artificial fertilization, the eggs go directly to the incubators for a period of a week or more.

Selling trout eggs to fishermen for use as bait is a sideline at Rainbow Ranch, although Zubek is not too interested in this part of the business because of the time and expense involved. Trout eggs in a nylon sack offer sure-fire bait for steelhead trout.

Water diverted from Cold Creek flows through six ponds at Rainbow Ranch. Each pond occupies about one-quarter acre of space.

Fr. Neuman's Golden Jubilee to be Observed

Golden jubilee observance for the Rev. Fr. Robert E. Neuman, a priest for 50 years and a pastor of St. Joseph Church, East Tawas, for 25 years, will be held next Sunday.

Father Neuman, who retired in 1959 as St. Joseph pastor, will be celebrant of a Solemn Mass of Thanksgiving on Sunday morning.

A breakfast will follow for relatives and close friends. His former parishioners will honor him with a reception from 2:00 until 5:00 p. m. at St. Joseph Social Center. A program in his honor will be presented by the children.

Father Neuman will be honored by the clergy on Tuesday, April 28. Following Mass in the presence of Saginaw's Bishop Stephen S. Woznicki, he will trade reminiscences with clerical friends from a wide area of the state at a reception to be held at the Holland Hotel.

Born at Dorr, Allegan County, in 1887, Father Neuman was ordained in 1914. His assignments took him to Cadillac St. Anne, Cascade St. Mary, Hemlock St. Mary and Muskegon St. Joseph before he became pastor at East Tawas on his 50th birthday in 1937.

Under his direction, St. Joseph parishioners built a new church in 1953 and a new school in 1957, renovated a convent and converted the old church into a parish hall.

Boy Scouts Embark on Ambitious Job to Clean Bay Shore

Members of Tawas City Troop No. 74, Boy Scouts of America, will commence a program Saturday which their elders have been talking about for months but, as yet, have taken little action.

Scouts under the leadership of Scoutmaster William Clark and assistant, Thomas Horning, will start at the Tawas River bridge and move in a northeasterly direction along the shore of Tawas Bay picking up debris exposed by low water conditions.

The City of Tawas City, under authorization of the city council, will furnish its tractor and loader, plus the operator, to assist with this worthwhile project.

Tawas City Budget OK'd; Finances Balanced in '63

An operational budget of \$97,440 was adopted for fiscal 1964-1965 Monday night by the Tawas City Council. This figure is \$3,275 higher than what was budgeted for fiscal 1963-1964.

In submitting the budget to the council for approval Monday night, Supt. Reginald Bublitz said that slight increases in revenue do not begin to match the increase in cost of operation. "If we can have a balanced budget or come as close as we did this year, the city can feel very fortunate," said Bublitz.

Tawas City came very near to having receipts and expenditures balance last year. A budget of \$94,165 was set up for the year and expenditures amounted to \$94,243.

"This new budget is just an estimation—it will be difficult to determine what is coming up during the next year," said the city superintendent.

Less than one-third of city operating expenses comes from property taxes. The difference is made up from trunkline maintenance (US-23-M-55), sales tax, gasoline tax refund and Act 51. All of the above state money goes toward maintaining streets and highways.

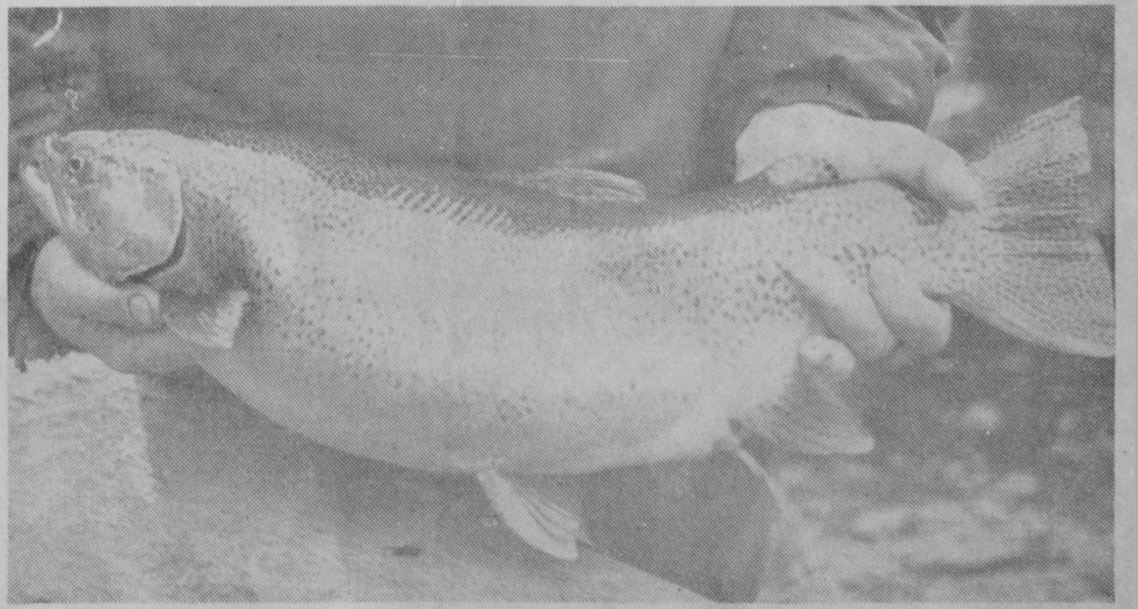
Last year, the city received \$31,639.50 from property taxes (summer). Only a slight increase in valuation was noted this year.

Largest single expenditure was in local street maintenance. With \$17,750 budgeted for this item, only \$14,743 was expended. A mild winter with little snow helped this category.

New street construction had a budget of \$7,000 and expended \$7,327. State streets had a budget of \$4,850 and \$6,014 was expended.

Other principal expenditures included disposal grounds, \$6,052; police department, \$5,567.23. The city dump has \$6,575 budgeted for the coming year and the police department has a budget of \$5,810.

In other business, the council voted unanimously to hire Yeo and Yeo Certified Public Accountants, East Tawas, as the city's auditor. Councilmen Howard Hatton and Cecil Cabbie had supported such a move for the past three years, but the measure had been

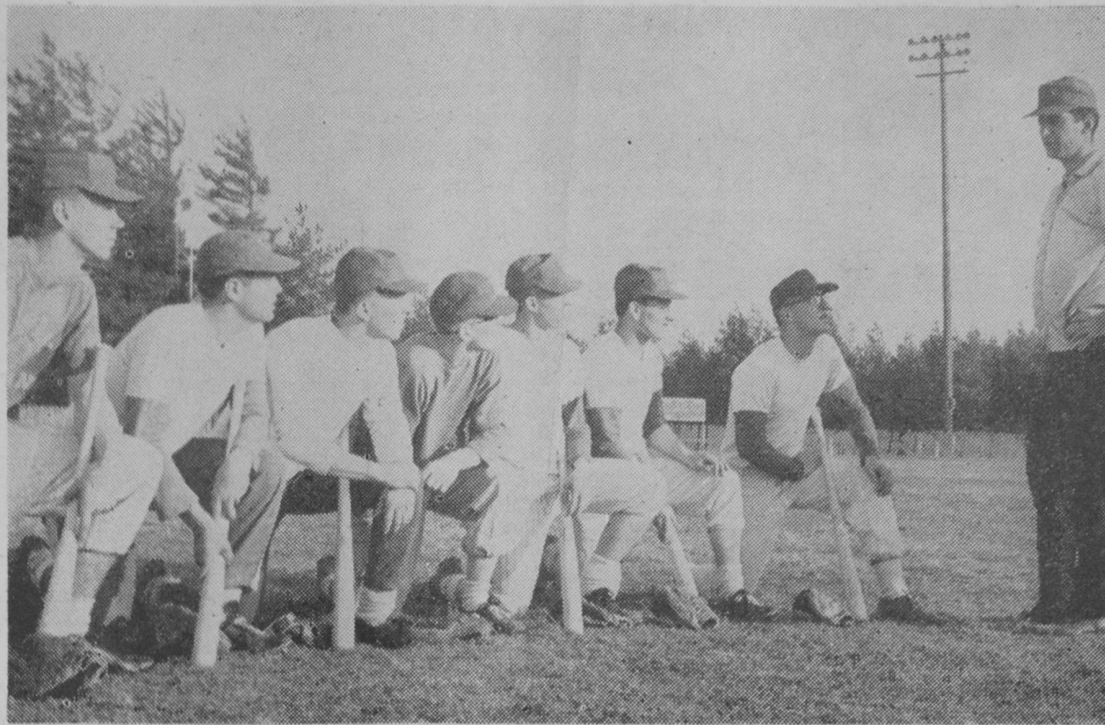

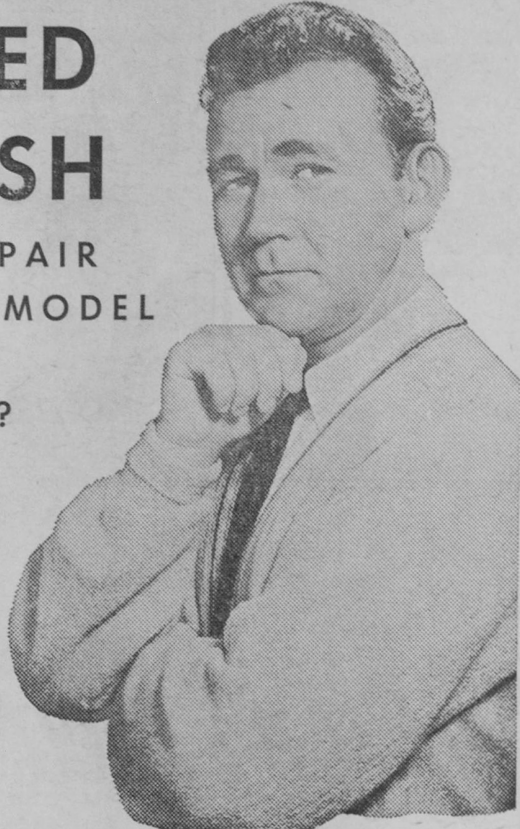

Elected President of Tawas Area P-TA Monday Evening

Monday evening, Tawas Area P-TA opened its final meeting of the current school year with election of officers for two-year terms. Chosen were Neil Luedtke, president; Mrs. Reynolds Mick, teacher vice president; Mrs. Merton Killey, secretary, and Mrs. Robert Huddy, historian.

Mrs. Gwen Starling, program chairman, introduced Miss Clara Bolen, elementary school principal, who discussed briefly many factors that affect a child's ability to learn: 1. Five-year-old children vary greatly in maturity, in their emotions, their intellect, their ability and in many other things. 2. There is an average difference of 18 months in the maturity of girls and boys five years of age. The boy is at a definite disadvantage—not because he is dumb or stupid—but because he does not mature as fast as a girl. 3. The IQ of a child, or the intelligence of a child compared with that of the average child of his age, is determined to a surprising extent by the environment in which he spends the first five years of his life. A child who is loved, well nurtured and well cared for, other things being equal, has a higher IQ than a child who is abused and ignored.

4. A child needs discipline. 5. A child should be trained to accept authority and do what he is told. If not, he is a problem at home and at school.

Mrs. Bolen also made these comments on the relationship of parents to their children: 1. Parents should be emotionally sincere when children are criticized. 2. Parents should let children learn by trying to do things that interest and challenge them. 3. The child must be wanted and loved at home to have a receptive mind.

If there are questions in the parents' minds concerning the possibility that their child is still too immature for school, there are standards available which quickly show whether or not a child has the physical and intellectual ability to start school. A child who starts school before he is ready is likely to suffer the effects the rest of his life.

In the fall, there will be between 180-190 children entering kindergarten in the local schools, according to Clyde Soper, outgoing president.

The final 20 minutes of the meeting featured a film on the detection and early treatment of cancer.

Few People Know Its Heritage—

Our State Flag

"We ought to be proud of our state flag and display it every chance we get," Secretary of State James M. Hare said as he opened a state-wide campaign for promoting display of the flag during Michigan Week May 17-23.

Hare said he hoped every "Michigan-minded" citizen would help promote "our state" by displaying the flag.

"Actually, few persons know the long and illustrious heritage of our flag. . . That it goes back nearly 130 years to 1837, the year Michigan was admitted as the 26th state in the union," Hare said. The present design on the state flag was adopted by the legislature in 1911.

He stated the flag should be displayed in every public building, in schools and meeting places not only during Michigan Week but all year through. "It is unfortunate," Hare said, "but many Michigan citizens did not know Michigan had a flag of its own before Michigan Week was started a few years ago."

The secretary of state called on school organizations, civic, patriotic veterans and fraternal organizations to "join in the campaign to see that every schoolroom, every office, every youth group in Michigan is equipped with a Michigan state flag." He noted that P-TA groups had made promotion of the flag one of their major projects of the year.

Hare also urged private citizens to purchase flags for their homes for display during Michigan Week. "Observance of Michigan Week has helped to publicize the Michigan flag, but we still have a big 'selling' job to do," Hare asserted. He called upon news and broadcast media to help promote the sale and use of the Michigan emblem.

Flags may be ordered from three flag companies in Michigan as well as from retail outlets in many cities, Hare said. The three flag companies which will furnish information on the flag are: George P. Johnson Company, 23171 Groesbeck, Warren; Detroit Flag Company, 407-9 East Fort Street, Detroit; Spartan Flag Company, Northport.

As an example of costs involved, Zubeck ordered two new aerators Saturday at a cost of \$800. These units are necessary to assure that water in ponds will have an adequate amount of oxygen during the hot summer months. Depth of ponds range from seven to 15 feet.

Feeding the trout is an expensive proposition. The rainbows dine on concentrated food pellets along with a mixture of ground fish, which Zubeck obtains on the local market.

At feeding time, the normally placid ponds seem to explode into boiling froth as the fish compete for pellets.

Rearing trout started out as a hobby for Zubeck, who owns and operates an automobile dealership and garage on M-55. Today, he divides his time about equally between his two businesses.

"I just grew into the business," explains Zubeck. "I was always interested in fishing and rearing trout just seemed to come naturally."
