## TA School to Borrow on Anticipated Tax Revenue

Legal machinery was set in motion Monday night by the Tawas Area Board of Education to borrow on anticipated taxes for the district's building and site fund. Work is now under way on the new addition to the East Tawas Elementary Unit and the building and site fund presently contains a little more than \$32,000. A transfer of \$9,000 from state aid money plus delinquent taxes should bring the fund to at least \$49,000 by July 1.


Miss Hammitt received a third division rating for her solo.

## Isosco's Equalized Tax Base is \$55,978,584

Isosco County's equalized tax base for 1964-1965 is \$55,978,584, an increase of \$351,586 over the preceding year's valuation.

This report was brought in by the equalization committee and adopted on the concluding day of the board of supervisors' April session last week. Members of the committee were C. E. Smith, George Blust, William G. Savage and Clarence McKenzie.

Total assessed valuation of the county is \$28,096,641, as brought in by township and city supervisors. This included \$22,880,119 in real estate and \$5,216,522 in personal property.

Real property showed a 1 1/2 million dollar increase over 1963-1964 while personal property gained \$800,082 on the previous year.

A resume of township and city valuations is as follows: Alabaster—Real, \$2,371,900; personal, \$1,097,700; total assessed valuation, \$3,469,600. Assessing at 100 percent of the state figure, Alabaster has a state equalized valuation of \$4,269,600, or slightly more than 7 1/2 percent of the county total.

Ausable—Real, \$1,517,425; personal, \$71,100; total assessed valuation, \$1,588,525. Assessing at 42.70 percent of the state figure, Ausable was equalized at \$3,719,895, representing slightly more than 6 1/2 percent of the county total.

Baldwin—Real, \$1,668,925; personal, \$80,300; total assessed valuation, \$1,749,225. Baldwin assesses at 49.05 percent of the state figure and was equalized at \$3,566,481, or 6.37 percent of the county total.

Burleigh—Real, \$470,100; personal, \$73,200; total assessed valuation, \$543,300. This township assesses at 53.94 percent of the state's figure and was equalized at \$1,097,205, or 1.79 percent of the county total.

Grant—Real, \$1,130,900; personal, \$440,000; total assessed valuation, \$1,570,900. Grant assesses at 50.32 percent of the state figure and was equalized at \$3,121,538, or slightly more than 5 1/2 percent of the county total.

Oscoda—Real, \$6,139,049; personal, \$545,722; assessed valuation, \$6,684,771. This township assesses at 45.62 percent of the state figure and was equalized at \$14,653,672, or 26.1 percent of the county total.

Plainfield—Real, \$2,633,025; personal, \$216,900; total assessed valuation, \$2,849,925. Plainfield's unit ratio is 44.16 and was equalized at \$6,453,404, or 11 1/2 percent of the county total.

Reno—Real, \$446,100; personal, \$150,200; total assessed valuation, \$596,300. Reno assesses at 45.28 percent of the state figure and was equalized at \$1,317,055, representing 2.35 percent of the county total.

Sherman—Real, \$613,750; personal, \$950,250; total assessed value, \$1,564,000. Sherman's unit ratio is 44.80 and was equalized at \$3,491,246, or 6.23 percent of the county total.

Tawas—Real, \$757,750; personal, \$80,900; total assessed, \$838,650. Assessing at 58.54 percent of the state figure, Tawas has a state equalized valuation of \$1,432,648, or 2.55 percent of the county total.

Wilber—Real, \$468,645; personal, \$39,550. Total assessed valuation, \$508,195. A figure of 45.63 is listed as Wilber's unit ratio and the township was equalized at \$1,107,205.

## Supervisors Take Over Addressograph Dept.

Operation of Isosco County's Addressograph department has been taken under direct supervision and responsibility of the board of supervisors.

This action was approved during the final day of the April session last Tuesday. Operation of this department had been the responsibility of the county treasurer's office.

The department, which prepares tax statements for every township and city in the county, has witnessed a tremendous growth during recent years. Only last week, the board authorized Plainfield Township with 5,000 descriptions to come under the system.

## Plans Told for First Coast-to-Coast Trip Over Northern Michigan Trail

Plans for the first coast-to-coast saddle ride over the Northern Michigan Trail were outlined at a meeting Monday night at the Higgins Lake Conservation School. Representing the Tawas Chamber of Commerce were President Ralph Western, Clarence King and Lucy Toska, office manager.

On June 20, members of the Michigan Trail Riders Association are to start at Empire on Lake Michigan for a 220-mile ride by horseback completely across the state to the Tawas.

The eastern portion of the trail was opened last year when a group of horsemen made the trip from Luzerne to the Tawas City Park.

This trail, carved out of federal and state forest lands along with crossings over private property, is expected to become one of the top tourist attractions in Michigan.

The trail will also be open to hikers. Additional state and federal aid is being sought to improve facilities along the route.

Formal dedication of the trail is to take place May 22 during the observance of Michigan Week. No site has been selected as yet for this program.

## TA Teachers Study Sample Tenure Pacts

Sample contracts incorporating provisions of the new state teacher tenure act are now being studied by Tawas Area School administrators and a committee of teachers.

It is expected that the legislature will adjourn prior to the June 15 dead line and the teacher tenure act will become effective for the 1964-1965 school year. If so, present contracts signed by teachers would be invalid and new ones drawn.

Authorization was given Monday night by the Tawas Area Board of Education to sign those contracts already accepted, with the stipulation that tenure contracts be signed by teachers when new ones become available and a decision is reached by the professional study committee on the type of contract wished.

Acting on the above committee are John Alexander, Richard Fairless, Robert Blood, Mrs. D. A. Evans, Mrs. Waldo Leslie and Mrs. R. J. Cooke. This is an advisory group acting as a "clearing house" for ideas from the teaching staff.

Supt. Reynold Mick explained Monday night that the tenure contract differs from those now used in that, at present, the entire salary is listed in one lump sum. New contracts being considered would include a tenure portion providing for the annual base salary and increments and a non-tenure section providing additional pay for heads of family, number of hours earned toward a master degree, unused sick pay and such extra pay for employment as a coach, pay director, etc.

Under the law, any salary reduction on a contract would be classified as a demotion, which would be contrary to provisions of the teacher tenure act.

A meeting is to be held next Monday night by the committee of teachers for further study of contracts. Samples have been provided by the state school board association and from other schools already operating under provisions of teacher tenure.

## Chief DeRosia Takes Command at Bay City

Chief Leon DeRosia, former commander of the Tawas Point Lifeboat Station, will take over command of the United States Coast Guard's Saginaw River Light Attendant (Rescue) Station next month.

DeRosia, 41, who has 22 years in coast guard service, presently is officer in charge aboard the Huron Light Ship stationed in Lake Huron near the mouth of the St. Clair River.

Succeeding Master Chief Lawrence R. McDonnell when the latter retires June 1, DeRosia had charge of the Tawas Point station from 1956 until 1960. He begins his new duties May 15.

The new orders represent a change from original announcements made by Chief John J. Kelly, present commander at Tawas Point, was to succeed Master Chief McDonnell.

## Fr. Neuman Feted on Golden Jubilee

"It has been a long day and I'm a little tired—but it has been a memorable one for me."

Speaking was the Rev. Fr. Robert F. Neuman as he walked along a sidewalk on West Lincoln Street prior to a program given in his honor Sunday afternoon by children of St. Joseph Parish.

The above program concluded a day-long observance marking Father Neuman's 50th anniversary as a Catholic priest. Twenty-six of those years were served at East Tawas, where he retired in 1959 as St. Joseph's pastor.

Father Neuman was celebrant of a Solemn Mass of Thanksgiving Sunday morning, followed by a breakfast for relatives and close friends. His former parishioners honored him with a reception from 2:00 until 5:00 p. m. at St. Joseph Social Center.

He was honored again Tuesday by members of the clergy. Following Mass in the presence of Saginaw's Bishop Stephen S. Wozniak, he traded reminiscences with clerical friends from a wide area of the state at a reception held at the Holland Hotel.

Ordained in 1914, Father Neuman's assignments have taken him to Cadillac St. Anne, Cascade St. Mary, Hemlock St. Mary and Muskegon St. Joseph before he became pastor at East Tawas in 1937.

## Fourth Bopp-Busch Employee Certified





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

### Signup for Wheat Program Extends To May 15

Grant Bessey, chairman of the agricultural stabilization and conservation committee, stated that the signup period for the 1964 voluntary wheat program started Monday, April 20, and extends through Friday, May 15.

Mr. Bessey said the new program offers farmers payments for diverting wheat acres to conservation uses and price support through loans and purchases, provided they have planted within their allotment. If a producer has overplanted his allotment, he has the option of destroying some of his wheat to qualify for payment in the 1964 program.

### Regional Library Participates in Use Survey in State

Iosco-Arenac Regional Library was one of 271 public libraries in Michigan which participated in the first state-wide survey on public library use ever conducted in the state, according to Genevieve M. Casey, state librarian.

The survey showed that over 1,000,000 people use Michigan's public libraries every week and also one-out-of-three enrolled in Michigan's public and parochial schools.

Mrs. Clarence McMullen, director of the regional library, said that of 772 patrons surveyed in Iosco and Arenac Counties, 259 were elementary students, 210 high school, 12 college and university, 102 patrons were in business, industry, communications and the professions in addition to 148 housewives, 23 retirees and five unemployed. Locally, 637 persons listed personal use, 296 school use and 48 for job-related reasons.

Winter wheat producers, who seeded wheat last fall and even those who did not seed wheat, are eligible to participate in the program. The benefits of the program, of course, vary for those who seeded wheat and those who did not. Mr. Bessey stressed that the program is entirely voluntary. Any farmer, whether he agrees to participate in the program or not, is free to sell his entire production to anyone at any time and at such prices as he can get. There are no restrictions on sales of 1964 crop wheat.

The basic requirements of the 1964 wheat program are similar to the 1964 feed grain program. The cooperators cannot exceed the wheat allotment on his own or on any other farm in which he has an interest. He will put his diverted land to a conserving use and this diverted land will be in addition to his conserving base that is established for the farm.

Mr. Bessey wishes to remind the producers that they were notified of their wheat allotment last spring. Producers who would like more information, should contact the ASCS office, Federal Building, East Tawas, or phone 362-3842. There will be an informational meeting on the wheat program Thursday, April 30, 8:00 p. m. at Grant Township Hall.



## Announces Postal Service Changes at Whittemore PO

Some limited adjustments in postal services were ordered in Washington March 10 by Postmaster General John A. Gronouski to save 12.7 million dollars in post office department expenditures. Adjustments will take effect at the Whittemore post office and other cities May 4. Postmaster John Dickey said today.

Counter service at the Whittemore post office will be from 8:30 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. Mondays through Fridays. On Saturday, counter service will be from 8:30 a. m. until 12:00 noon for the sale of postage and delivery of parcel post. Money orders, COD parcels and postal savings certificates will not be sold Saturdays. There will be no counter service provided on Sundays and holidays nor after the closing hours of 5:00 p. m. on weekdays and 12:00 noon on Saturday.

The rural route service from Whittemore will not be effected in any way except that money orders will not be accepted by the carrier on Saturdays.

The postmaster emphasized that no essential major services are affected under these orders. There will be no change in the delivery of special delivery, registered and certified mail. Letters and other first-class mail will be handled with the same priority as ever. It is expected that these services adjustments will substantially reduce expenditures without seriously impairing essential postal services.

**Changes in Postal Services to Take Place May 4**

Limited adjustments in some postal services ordered by Postmaster General John A. Gronouski takes effect in the Tawas and other cities May 4. The economy step is in line with President Johnson's program under which the recent federal income tax cut was provided.

Money orders will not be sold on Saturdays and only one service window will be open for the sale of stamps, acceptance of parcel post, delivery of general delivery mail and parcel post.

No postal savings will be issued or paid at Tawas City on Saturdays, according to Postmaster Martin Kasischke.

City mail deliveries at East Tawas will continue on a six-day week basis of all classes of mail except parcel post, announces Postmaster Richard Price. Parcel post deliveries by city carrier will be reduced to five days a week, except that air mail parcels will be delivered six days a week and special delivery seven days a week.

The post office department has left it up to individual postmasters in regard to the day of the week to eliminate one parcel post delivery. At East Tawas, Tuesdays are the lightest and deliveries will be eliminated that day. So as not to cause any more inconvenience than necessary, any patron expecting parcel post on a Tuesday may call at the post office and make his own pick up.

Postmasters emphasize that no essential services are affected under the order. Letters and other first class mail will be handled with the same priority as ever.

To receive best service, patrons are urged to conduct their postal business on week days, rather than on Saturday.

tendent reported that provisions of House Bill 530, requiring that nine mills be levied by a school district for operation for full state aid participation, would not take effect until the 1965-1966 school year.

At its last meeting, the board authorized submitting a \$563,019 budget to the county allocation board asking for nine mills to raise \$245,617 as the district's share for 1964-1965 operation. This was prior to final action on House Bill 530 and was \$12,600 higher than the budget originally anticipated to meet operational requirements for next year.

Under provisions of the new law, a district will be required to levy seven mills to qualify for partial payment and nine mills for full payment, effective next year.

The board instructed its secretary to write State Rep. James P. Mielock of Whittemore thanking him for his efforts in delaying for one year these new millage requirements on state aid participation.
