Do not climb a tree or pole or television antenna to free a kite in wires even if you have chased a runaway kite for blocks! Just forget it.

He said that incidents of kites tangling in electric power lines were frequent enough in Michigan to convince him that the annual warning from parents and teachers to kiteflying children is more than worthwhile

Dangerous Spring Season for Fires



Conservation Department field crews look for this spring to be the most dangerous season for grass and forest fires in a good many years. Unless there is a generous spattering of spring showers, Michigan will be up against the same threat that it faced last fall when dry conditions led to a state-wide ban on smoking and burning in the out-of-doors. Debris-burning landowners, in particular, are being called upon to help offset this danger. They are again urged to get permits from the Department before burning as the first check against carelessness. Also, their burning should be done during the early morning and late afternoon hours when winds, humidity, and other factors are generally safest .- Mich. Dept. of Conservation
